## Special Services Day Care Child Find

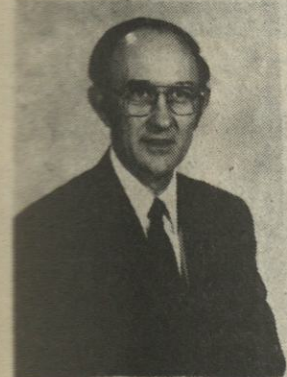

## County Jail Installs N.C.I.C. Machine

A highly sophisticated machine which links Tishomingo County with the National Crime Information Center has been approved by the Board of Supervisors and located at the Sheriff's Office.

The device is actually com-

posed of two parts which work simultaneously. As the operator, most likely the dispatcher, selects the format requesting needed information and feeds it into the computer via the keyboard, immediately printing begins to appear on the

screen as the print out component begins at the same time to record the identical information on paper. These printed sheets are to be kept for future references.

The sheriff's wife, Mary, was on hand Monday explaining the N.C.I.C. machine,

which is also a new experience for her. Mary puts in many voluntary hours at the jail facility working as assistant to her husband she says, while he is busy "being sheriff". She maintains the records, does payroll, dockets and bills. Mary, along with one of the dispatchers went to Jackson last week and took a "crash course" concerning the N.C.I.C. machine.

What they were taught in Jackson, basically, was how to select the format for information needed and how to feed it into the machine. Information on any item such as tag numbers or serial numbers are available within seconds by pressing the correct keys. Mary said the three other dispatchers have caught on real fast as she passed on to them her newly acquired knowledge.

It was explained that only three different categories of people could ask for criminal records which are closed to anyone except authorized personnel and those are law enforcement officers, judges, or district attorneys.

Much is to be learned concerning the many features of the machine; however, future advance courses will be available once a month to the dispatchers.

The N.C.I.C. machine will be particularly helpful to all county law enforcement and Tishomingo County is fortunate to have one.

## United Blood Service Drive To Be In Area

The United Blood Service from Tupelo will be conducting a blood drive in this area on March 21, 23, and April 3. On March 21, the blood services will be in Burnsville at the Burnsville High School Gym from 1 p.m. until 6 p.m. On March 23, the services will be at the Iuka Baptist Church from 12:30 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. and at the Iuka High School

New Gym on April 3, from 2 p.m. until 6 p.m.

The United Blood Services, (UBS) is a non-profit community blood center, provides blood and blood products for patients in area medical facilities. Community-minded, volunteer blood donors supply the material out of which these products are made.

UBS is an operating

division of Blood Systems, Inc., a non-profit corporation. Blood Systems, Inc. operates 22 blood centers, which provide blood for patients in nearly 800 hospitals located throughout the United States.

The blood will be used for medical advances and modern surgical techniques such as cancer treatments, organ transplants, and open heart surgery. Depending on patient needs blood may be separated into several different components. Some blood components most often needed and their uses include: Red Blood Cells, surgery, Platelets-leukemia, cancer, Plasma-burns, accident victims, Antihemophilic Factor-hemophilia. Because of the various blood components, as many as four patients may benefit from one blood donation.

Your donation helps ensure that blood will be there for you, your family, friends and neighbors when it is needed. Since it takes up to 24 hours to prepare some blood components, volunteer donors are needed on a continual basis in order to maintain the community blood supply at all times.

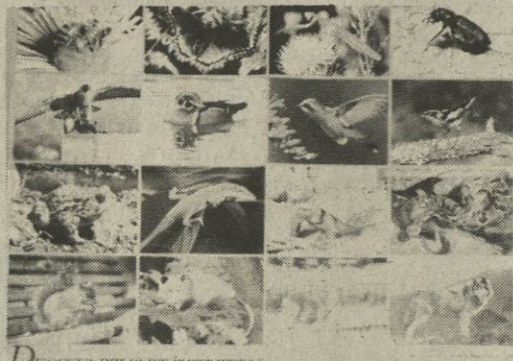

## National Wildlife Week

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District joins the National Wildlife Federation in celebrating National Wildlife Week, March 16 to 22. In observance of this years theme "Discover Wildlife in your World", we hope you will discover something new in the following wildlife facts:

**DID YOU KNOW.....**  
\*The flying squirrel can glide up to 164 feet over 1/2 the length of a football field.

\*Twenty newborn opossums can fit in a teaspoon.

\*Clay soil which turns to mud has been known to collect on the feet of the Pintail and Mallard ducks, weighing them down to the point of exhaustion and even death.

The wise old owl is not just a saying but the symbol of wisdom in Greece. One recorded to have lived to age 68 in captivity.

\*During the first year after leaving the nest the young bald eagle is larger than either parent.

\*More people die each year from being struck by lightning than from snake bites. The snake uses its forked tongue to smell.

\*The beaver can cut down a willow 5 inches in diameter in three minutes. To protect

these trees from beaver cuttings the trunk should be painted with creosote.

\*Only the female mosquito bites, the blood collected is used to help nourish her unborn young. Avoid wearing blue it is the mosquitoes favorite color.

\*The smallest bird is the Bee Hummingbird weighing 1/28 oz. The largest being the Emperor Penguin at 300 pounds.

\*Researchers are studying antler growth in deer as a possible link in the cure of human bone cancer.

\*Mocking birds can imitate sounds like lawn mowers, gate hinges, and even ducks.

\*The ears of the grasshopper are on its legs.

take on new proportions and more shape. The news is suit dressing...to directions. One look-long, lean jackets and sensational over short narrower skirts, the other short, shaped jackets, and very feminine over a longer, fuller skirt.

Shoulders take on a softer less squared set-in look. Blouses are more fitted, yet retain an element of width. The Big Shirt is still a popular silhouette, displaying a looser fit but with narrower detailing. Pants in the shape of a classic trouser but with a wider, softer upper portion which narrows toward the ankle.

There are plenty of body-baring clothes for spring. Look for cutaway armholes, bare midriffs, cropped tops, sleeveless and halter styles.

Watch for some of the "retro" influences in fun, young fashion for spring: the Nehru jacket; 1940's-style print dresses with swingy hems; the cowgirl look for bandana prints, denim and western details; the Miami Beach mood with bandeaus, sarong skirts, and tap shorts under full skirts in bold, tropical prints.

Prints and floral are big in fashion. Flowers are everywhere, from tiny overall florals in pale shades to giant blossoms strewn across fabric, the bolder and brighter the better. While florals are the shining star, they aren't the only prints on stage for Spring '86 Fashion. Look for fruits and vegetables prints, bold polka dots, paisleys, bright awning stripes, abstracts and op art prints.

Shiny or lustrous fabrics are important for spring, in cottons, linens, silks or synthetics with a sheen or a chintz finish. Fabrics from the sofa and dining room table, including light tapestries, chintz, toile, damask, jacquards, have been transformed into jackets, skirts, and pants. Denim is seen in printed as well as solid fabric for spring.

Colors are strong - garden colors, with yellows and greens being the newest on the fashion horizon. Colors range from subtle shades to vivid brights shot with sunlight. Bright white and kohl black are important and individual as accents.

Bright pastels such as peach, lavender, periwinkle, mint and banana, as well as sun-wrenched brights of kelly green, clear red, cerulean blue and vivid orange will be prevalent this spring, as will the deep jewel tones of emerald, sapphire and rich indigo.

### Tuna Tossed Salad

3 cups torn lettuce  
1/2 small red onion, thinly sliced and separated into rings (about 1/2 cup)  
1 can (6 1/2 or 7-ounce) tuna, drained and flaked  
4 ounces Swiss cheese

(about 1 cup), cut into narrow 2-inch strips  
1/4 cup olive oil or salad oil  
1 tablespoon vinegar  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon dried tarragon leaves, crushed, optional  
Dash pepper

Put lettuce in large bowl. Place onion rings around sides of bowl. Heap tuna in center; surround with cheese. Combine remaining ingredients in screw-top jar; shake. Just before serving, toss dressing mixture with salad. Makes 4 servings.

An unusual server for dip was a rosette cabbage head surrounded with chips. The spring color theme was carried out with Spring flowers, ink candles, pastel napkins and fruit punch. There were 35 workshop

participants from Belmont, Burnsville, Iuka, North Crossroads, and Tishomingo. This was the first of the series of workshops that will be provided for 4-H'ers interested in personal development, modeling, etiquette, and self-expression.

## Destruction Of Public Libraries As They Now Exist

Governor Bill Allain's

recommendation to abolish the \$1.7 million personnel incentive grants program administered by the Mississippi Library Commission would mean the destruction of public libraries in Mississippi as they now exist.

According to MLC director David M. Woodburn, the loss of the state funding would also jeopardize an additional \$1.37 million in federal funds for public libraries through the Library Service and Construction Act. Woodburn explained that LSCA requires that state financial effort be maintained at the level of the second preceding year.

On the local level, abolishment of the personnel incentive grants program would mean the loss of 93 professional library positions across the state. Of the 82 counties statewide, 78 would be directly affected by lost positions.

Loss of federal funds to the agency would mean the discontinuation of service to more than 37,000 residents of 15 state institutions. In addition, film service to public library patrons, junior colleges, public and private schools and nursing homes will be lost.

All federal grants to public libraries will be eliminated as a result of passage of the Governor's recommendation. Grants include maintenance of the Mississippi Union Catalog, a microfiche catalog which lists public library book holdings and enables sharing of materials by libraries, automation of public libraries and construction of library buildings.

Revenue losses would also mean loss of inter-library

loan, reference service, and public education support to public libraries. The agency's book budget, already cut to a minimal level, would be zeroed out.

According to Fredda Sanderson, Iuka Librarian, the Iuka and Tishomingo County libraries will also feel direct results from this budget cut. The Iuka Library which circulated 61,543 books in the year 1985 could possibly face a cut in library hours and personal cuts. There will also be a complete cut in the film services which is a vital service provided by the library to the schools, churches, mental health center, kindergarten, clubs and library programs. The elimination of inter-library loans would affect the students, the professional person, and the reader who wants material that is not available in the library. Last year the Iuka Library borrowed 523 books from other libraries in the state. There will no longer be material available for the Summer Reading Program which is a vital program for the young readers during the summer months. There will no longer be any funds for the blind and handicapped persons in Tishomingo County. At the present time 37 people in Tishomingo County receive this service.

Fredda Sanderson urges all citizens in Tishomingo County to contact Representative Billy McCoy about this most vital issue. There are form letters in the library that can be picked up and mailed to Mr. Billy McCoy or he can be contacted at his home in Rienzi.

On January 28, the space shuttle Challenger and its heroic crew met a tragic end. Among the crew members who lost their lives that day was U.S. Air Force Lieutenant Colonel Ellison S. Onizuka, a former 4-H member.

Ellison Onizuka was the first Japanese American and the first native Hawaiian to fly in space. His first mission was in January 1985. During that mission, he carried three 4-H flags with him. He presented one flag to the Hawaii state 4-H program, one to the Texas state 4-H program, and was scheduled to present one to the national 4-H leadership forum in February.

He recently participated in the production of a new 4-H educational television series, "Blue Sky Below My Feet-Adventures in Space Technology."

He credited the 4-H program with giving him opportunities to develop self confidence, the ability to achieve and a spirit of exploration and challenge.

It was during a visit to Washington, D.C. to participate in National 4-H Conference that Colonel Onizuka decided on a career in aerospace. He never forgot the many ways 4-H helped him in his personal and professional life.

Colonel Onizuka always made time to talk to young people and encourage them to strive for excellence. He described how 4-H helped

him achieve and develop confidence.

He taught boys and girls about space, what it was like to fly, and how the borders of countries disappeared and the world became a single space for all people. He wanted to share the wonders of space, the challenge of exploration and the necessity of taking risks.

The 4-H members, leaders, parents and supporters in Tishomingo County take this opportunity to express our sympathy, admiration and respect to the families of Colonel Onizuka and the Challenger crew.

would allow regional banking in Mississippi a period of years.

A revised bill to help cities and counties attract new industry also won House approval last week. The bill would permit issuance of state bonds to provide loans and grants to assist local governments in securing industrial development projects such as the Boeing plant in Greenville and a four-ship Navy base in Pascagoula. The legislation was a revised version of similar bills passed earlier by the House and Senate.

A number of bills involving health care program won House approval during the past week, including a measure to allow the State Health Department to levy new or increased fees for certain services such as inspection of restaurants and milk plants. Backers said the bill will provide badly needed revenues and help avoid a threatened cutback in some of the services performed by health officials.

Another House-passed bill calls for a reorganization of health care programs in an effort to improve efficiency. The Medicaid program would stay under the Governor's Office but any increase or decrease in benefits would be subject to certain restrictions. The Health Care Commission would be abolished under the measure and its duties shifted to the State Health Department.

The House voted to authorize a new Vulnerable Adults program giving extra protection to adult citizens not able to care for themselves. And bills were approved to upgrade the office of county coroner; provide for registration of non-licensed group care facilities for children; permit closed circuit television or videotaped testimony in some child abuse cases; and provide for classifying municipal and domestic wastewater facilities.

County supervisors would have broader authority to deal with local matters, within specified limits, under a Home Rule bill passed by the House. However, an election on the question of a county-unit system of road management would be required before a county qualified for Home Rule. A Home Rule law was enacted in 1985 for municipalities.

Other bills recently approved by the House would establish a new 10-member board to oversee the state's junior colleges, including the opening of new branches; require county constables to wear uniforms and complete a law enforcement training course; allow school districts to lease school buildings; reenact the state's anti-

racketeering law; provide that a parolee who is convicted of a felony will have his parole automatically revoked.

A proposed constitutional amendment was approved to extend the maximum lease from 25 to 40 years on 16th Section School Lands other than forest and agricultural lands.

House members passed bills to make it illegal to have redfish on boats carrying a purse seine, and to protect catfish producers by establishing a fair practices act for processors. The House passed another bill that supporters said would provide extra protection from lawsuits to landowners who permit others to enter their lands for such purposes as hunting, fishing or camping.

Financial troubles continued to plague lawmakers as they prepared for a deadline this week for floor action on appropriations and revenue bills passed earlier in the opposite chamber.

A summary of potential ways to deal with the state's budget problems was unveiled last week in the Mississippi House. The list was suggested as a starting point or alternative plan to get a grip on the critical financial situation without a general tax increase. It contained 43 suggestions where money might be saved or additional funds generated, ranging from changing average daily attendance requirements used in funding schools to authorizing a state lottery.

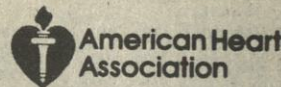

### House Report

Rep. Mack Loyd Wadkins The 1986 legislative session is entering its final weeks following House of Representatives' action on such important and controversial issues as uniform school laws, statewide banking, health care reorganization, and home rule for counties.

A 191-page measure to establish more uniformity in public school laws was among more than 60 bills approved last week by the House. A revised version of an earlier Senate measure, it includes a provision to require county supervisors to fund school board requests. Municipal officials already are mandated to levy taxes to fund budgets submitted by city school boards.

Residents of a school district could petition for an election on the increase if the school budget is more than 7 percent above the previous year's budget. The bill was approved 83-36 following defeat of amendments to cut off certain funds by 1993 to school districts with elected rather than appointed superintendents, and to make public kindergartens optional with local school boards.

Statewide banking would be allowed under another House-passed bill if differ-

ces between House and Senate versions are settled. The bill, as passed by the House, would do away with a controversial 100 - mile limitation and permit banks to open new branches statewide by July 1989. In addition, banks would be allowed to buy or merge with other banks located more than 100 miles away, starting this July. Other provisions

## Low Interest Loans To Family Members

Agriculture lenders can  
join with the Farmers Home  
Administration (FmHA) in a  
three-year interest "buy-  
down" program to help far-  
mers having trouble repaying  
their loans or obtaining new  
ones, John Arthur, said today.

Under the new program,  
lenders may make or refinance  
FmHA guaranteed loans to  
eligible farmers at reduced in-  
terest rates. FmHA will match  
a lender's reduction of in-  
terest rates up to 2 percent. If  
a lender reduces an interest  
rate 2 percent, FmHA can  
match that, providing a 4 per-  
cent interest rate reduction  
for the farmer.

FmHA can guarantee up to  
90 percent of another lender's  
loan, Arthur said. If the  
borrower should default, the  
Federal agency would pay up  
to 90 percent of the loss to  
the lender.

"We hope agriculture lend-  
ers in Mississippi will make  
use of this program," said Ar-  
thur. "By making Federally  
guaranteed loans at reduced  
rates to qualified farmers,  
lenders will strengthen their  
agriculture loan portfolio,  
reduce their chances of loss,  
and increase the availability  
of affordable credit to family

farmers."

To qualify for a loan under  
the new 3-year, \$490 million  
program, a borrower must be  
unable to get a loan else-  
where at reasonable rates and  
terms; must be unable to  
make loan payments unless  
the interest rate is reduced,  
and must show enough  
projected income to make the  
reduced-rate loan payments.

## Rainfall Short Of Normal

There was considerable  
improvement in precipitation  
in the Tennessee Valley

during February, but the month  
still fell short of normal,  
TVA figures show. The  
average for the region was  
3.72 inches compared to a  
normal of 4.66 inches. TVA  
continued to generate  
hydroelectric power at  
reduced levels—a little over a  
billion kilowatt-hours during  
February, which was 61 per-  
cent of normal.

Rainfall so far in 1986  
remained more than 4.5 in-  
ches below normal at the  
beginning of March, which  
traditionally is the wettest  
month of the year in the  
region. At the end of February  
the accumulated rainfall in

the Valley was 4.89 inches  
compared to a normal of 9.47.  
Because of rainfall pattern-  
s in February, most TVA  
tributaries were near normal  
levels for this time of year.  
However, Fontana and Blue  
Ridge were 12 to 15 feet  
below their normal range and  
were in need of heavy rains in  
their watersheds to reach  
desired levels.

### Smell Of Smoke Is heralding Annual Peak Month For Wildfires

A lot of that smoke that you  
are smelling as you move  
about outdoors in Mississippi  
these days isn't coming from  
chimneys, according to the  
State Forestry Commission.

The annual season for wild-  
fires is edging toward its  
traditional peak during the  
month of March as more  
people are moving around  
outside and showing  
carelessness in the use of fire  
in dry, windy days. The usual  
high proportion of woods ar-  
son is being reported in some  
counties.

State Forestry Commission  
Fire Protection Chief Jim  
Bright has issued another  
high fire danger alert for vir-  
tually the entire state this  
week as frost-killed lower

vegetation, pine needles and  
hardwood leaves continue to  
dry out rapidly.

Bright said 156 wildfires  
were suppressed on Monday,  
February 24. That brought the  
total for February up to 1,053  
fires, burning nearly 13,000  
acres. Since July 1, 1985, the  
start of the fiscal year, 3,700  
fires have blackened about  
39,000 acres.

"Of course, even one wild-  
fire is one too many as far as  
we are concerned," the  
State's new forestry fire chief  
relates, "but things haven't  
gone all that bad for us so far  
this fiscal year. We are still  
doing better than the 5-year  
average to this point.

Bright took the helm of the  
Forestry Commission's  
Forest Protection Division  
earlier this year upon the  
retirement of former Protec-  
tion Chief Tom Hardage.

As in previous years, March  
is proclaimed as Forest Fire  
Prevention Month in  
Mississippi. The Commission  
is asking landowners and the  
traveling public to be extra  
careful and cooperate in  
reporting uncontrolled fires  
quickly to the nearest fire  
tower or law enforcement  
agency.

Necessary outdoor spring  
burning should be attempted  
only after securing a burning  
permit by calling the county  
fire tower at 423-5951.

Permits are issued only  
during periods of relatively  
low fire danger and air  
pollution conditions.

### CARING FOR YOUR PET

#### Cats Are Neat

Domestic cats are very tidy animals. They appreciate a clean environment as much as they do their own personal cleanliness. Therefore, cat owners should provide their pets with clean dishes, fresh water and fresh food daily.

In addition, the cat's litter box should be cleaned once a day. This provides an added benefit of permitting the owner to monitor one aspect of the cat's health on a regular basis.

In choosing a proper diet for a cat, every owner should buy a reputable brand of food and avoid budget labels which may be nutritionally inadequate despite the claims on the label.

After a kitten has been weaned, it should drink only fresh water. Most cats become intolerant of or allergic to milk as adults. Milk in their diet may produce vomiting and moderate diarrhea.

A regular program of routine vaccinations also should be established for your cat. Felines need vaccinations against rabies, feline panleukopenia, feline viral rhinotracheitis (FVR), feline calicivirus (FCV) and feline pneumonitis. Hopefully, in the near future, a vaccine will become



available against feline leukemia virus -- the most deadly infectious disease of this species.

Many cats develop a condition called Feline Urologic Syndrome (FUS) at some time in their lives. Both male and female cats are affected. If not detected and treated early, this condition frequently proves fatal.

Upper respiratory infections are another frequent health problem for cats. The most serious of these FVR and FCV can be prevented through vaccination.

Your cat should receive a regular health checkup from your local veterinarian annually. Early detection of a condition can frequently make the difference in your cat's future.

### Hobby Made Good For Burnsville Graduate

The following story appeared in The South Reporter, Holly Springs, MS, about a home town boy that made it big in the tire business. Bill Hale, known to his hometown

friends as Delton Hale, graduated from Burnsville High School in 1964.

Five years ago when Bill Hale decided to go into the tire business in Byhalia "as a hobby," he just wanted to make a little "side money".

While driving a bus for Greyhound down Highway 78 every week, he passed a vacant building and thought it would be a good place for a

little business.

In August 1981, he started Byhalia Tire and Battery.

Six months ago Bill quit his bus driving job and is today a wholesale tire distributor for all of North Mississippi and West Tennessee.

"It was really discouraging the first year," he said. "Everybody said there wasn't anybody here and they would all go to Memphis to buy their tires anyway."

"But I had pledged myself to one year and I had the money to pay the rent for that first year," he said.

"After the first year, I decided to plow back any profit I made into advertising," he said.

"That's when my business really started picking up." Hale said that through advertising and word-of-mouth, people began to find out that his prices were as good as Memphis.

"As the business picked up, we began to get better deals by buying in volume," he said. "My prices now are actually cheaper than they were five years ago."

Two years ago, Bill opened two more stores in Corinth and in Tupelo and further expanded his buying power.

In July this year, the president of Dean Tire and Rubber Company offered Bill the distributorship for north Mississippi and West Tennessee.

In December Bill added a

8,000 square foot building to accommodate his wholesale business which sells an average of 1,000 tires per week.

The Dean tire line is manufactured by Cooper in Tupelo.

He handles about five truck loads of tires per month and currently has about 10,000 tires in his inventory.

The growth of his business has required him to computerize with Nell McKee as the computer operator and bookkeeper.

While growing into a wholesale operation, Byhalia Tire and Battery continues to improve his retail outlet with five drive-through bays for tire mounting and balancing on the latest computerized equipment.

Through his advertising program, he draws customers from Collierville, Olive Branch, Hernando, Ashland and New Albany as well as all of Marshall County. He even has Memphis customers.

He has plans for adding another 4,000 square feet in the next two years.

Bill Hale's hobby turned into a full-time business and now he drives for his hobby.

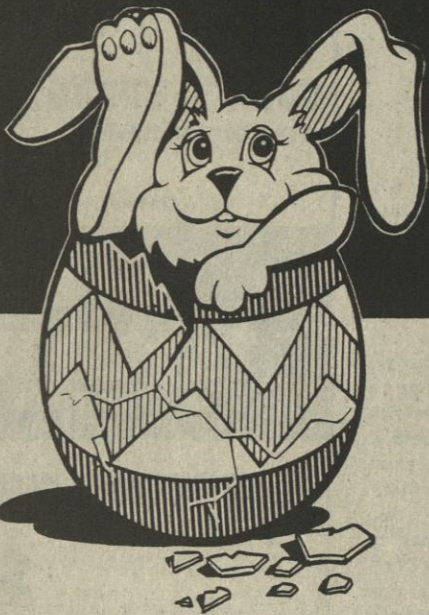

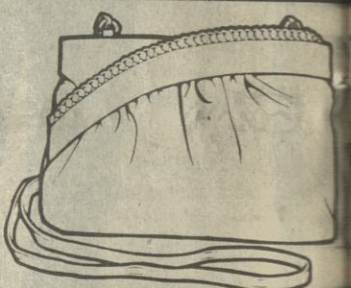

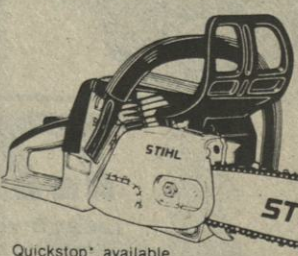

Question: I rent my home. Last year I installed storm doors and windows in the home. Are there any tax

benefits available to me?

Answer: You may claim the credit for energy conservation expenditures you make for your principal residence regardless of whether you rent or own. Qualified expenditures include insulation, storm or thermal windows or doors, weather stripping or caulking, and certain fuel-saving furnace devices. The credit on these items is 15% of the cost up to \$2,000 and is not available on new construction. Solar, wind, and geothermal equipment is eligible for a credit of 40% of the cost up to \$10,000 of the cost. 1985 is the last year you may claim this credit.
