

County To Receive 7 Million In Tax education fund can never be

The TVA in-lieu tax bill has been approved by the legislature, after a seven year battle. The measure settles the distribution of the impounded TVA Tax alternative payment and will return millions of dollars to Northeast Mississippi.

Representative Mack Wadkins reports that Tishomingo County is to

receive \$17 million dollars. spent, the interest that ac-\$4.5 million dollars will go to cumulates will be used for Yellow Creek Port, \$5 million will go into the county general budget, \$2.5 million will go into the educational trust fund and \$5 million will be placed in the bank somewhere in the county and can be used only for industrial development.

Charlie Williams who handled the bill on the house floor referred to this money as a "gold mine" for Tishomingo County. He said citizens would never, never, ever have to pay anymore taxes. Rep. Mack L. Wadkins said he disagrees with that statement in that it will not eliminate taxes, however, the taxpayers should see a significant reduction in their taxes.

Rape Suspect Arrested

According to Richard Bowen, Assistant District Attorney, Joel E. Harris, 22, of Golden was arrested Thursday, April 10, by Lee County officials and charged with the attempted rape of a Tupelo woman.

Bowen further stated that Harris has been linked with an alleged rape of a 20-yearold Dennis woman in Tishomingo County on October 30, 1985.

Lee County officials received calls from several residents in the neighborhood where the alleged rape attempt occurred after they had read the news account in the April 9th, edition of the Tupelo Daily Journal

The Dennis woman's husband also read the article and recognized the description of his wife's alleged attacker and notified the Lee County Sheriff's Department. The matter is still under in-

vestigation. Harris is scheduled to appear in **Justice Court April 24.**



Producers who plant no. more than 80 percent of their feed grain base will be eligible for price support loans at \$1.92 per bushel for corn, \$1.82 for sorghum, \$1.56 for barley and \$.99 per bushel for oats. percent of their land diversion payments and 40 percent of the projected deficiency payments when they sign up in the program," Bridges said. Land diversion payments will be issued in negotiable 4-H, and Keith Broadway, payment-in-kind certificates. Seventy-five percent of the advance deficiency payments will be issued in cash and the remainder in certificates, he

Q. WHAT IS CANCER? A. Cancer is a group of many diseases affecting the body's cells. Cells are the tiny building blocks that make up all parts of the body, such as the skin, blood, lungs, and bones. The body is always making new cells. It does that when one cell splits in half and becomes two new cells. This called cell division. If everything is working right, the cells divide over and over again, in an orderly way. And that is how the body grows and repairs itself.

A malignant tumor, or a cancer, can spread to other parts of the body forming new growths. This is call metastasis.

Q. WHAT CAUSES CAN-CER?

A. Scientists do not fully understand why some people get cancer while others do not. Most experts believe that cancer comes from repeated contact with substances called CARCINOGENS. These materials seem to cause the disorderly cell division that results in a TUMOR. They include tobacco smoke, sunlight, x-rays, and certain chemicals that may be found in air, water, food, drugs, and at work. Scientists also suspect that some people are more likely than others to get cancer. Other causes, as yet unknown, muy play a part as well.

Q. HOW CAN I TELL IF I HAVE CANCER?

A. You know your bodyhow it looks and how it feelsbetter than anyone else. As a result, you will usually be the first one to notice any changes. Therefore, YOU, are a very important person in the early detection of cancer. Learn the possible signs, or symptoms, of cancer. Be alert to changes in your body.

The risk of getting lung cancer from cigarettes increases with the number you smoke, how long you have been smoking, and how deeply you inhale. High-tar cigarettes--such as those without filters,--are more dangerous than low-tar cigarettes. That is, unless you misuse the low-tar cigarettes by smoking more of them, inhaling them more deeply, or smoking them down to the butt. But don't kid yourself. Switching to a low-tar cigarette won't eliminate you risk to cancer or the other health problems, such as heart disease and high blood pressure, associated with smoking. You are not safe until you quit smoking completely.



Bacteria in the mouth combine with substances in the saliva to produce a hard, cementlike deposit which builds up on the teeth at the point where the teeth emerge from the gum. Parents are guaranteed the right to inspect any information about their child and

to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is to any forbidden unauthorized person without the parent's consent. When a child is referred,

the Local Survey Committee will gather information which enables them to determine whether the child needs additional evaluation and observation. This information will include vision and hearing screening results, a teacher narrative and/or available information obtained from parents or agencies. The Local Survey Committee will meet to review this information and make one of three decisions. Either the child will remain in regular education, suggestions for a specific instructional inter-

vention will be given the principal or the child will be referred for a Comprehensive Assessment. After a Comprehensive Assessment has

been conducted, the Local Survey Committee will decide whether the child is handicapped. If it is felt that the child is handicapped, the Local Survey Committee will submit its recommendations along with the necessary documentation to a Regional Screening Team. If the **Regional Screening Team** decides that a child is eligible for a class for the handicapped, an Individualized Educational Plan will be developed, parental permission for placement will be obtained and the child will be placed in an appropriate class within thirty days after the eligibility ruling.

Your assistance in helping the Tishomingo County School District locate children birth through twentyone who may be handicapped will be greatly appreciated.
