Elderly Lady Dies In Home

The body of an elderly Dennis woman was recovered from the fire caused

ruins of her home Tuesday morning. Mrs. Gertrude Turner, 81, had lived alone in the large country frame home which was quickly reduced to

ashes and scattered rubbish as responding firemen battled the wind fanned blaze, smoke, and heat. No foul play was suspected in the mid-

morning disaster, Sheriff Payne said. An inquest conducted by J.W. Southward concluded that Mrs. Turner's death was due to the fire.

Elderly Dennis Lady Dies In Home Fire

A mid-morning house fire claimed the life of a Dennis woman, Mrs. Gertrude Turner, Tuesday, April 15. Fire units from Golden 5th

District and Belmont responded to the alert and recovered Mrs. Turner's body from the destroyed structure of the frame home, but too late. The house was located about six

miles West of Highway 25 on Red Bud Road. N.R. Rouse, a neighbor who lives just across the road from the Turner residence, said he was notified of the fire around 9:30 a.m. when Dwight Ruple who was making a lumber delivery in the area came to his house after he spotted the blaze.

Rouse, who was well acquainted with Mrs. Turner and knew that she was in serious danger rushed over to the burning house along with Ruple. The two attempted everything possible to enter the house to rescue Mrs. Turner. All efforts made by the men were futile. The blaze, heat and smoke was just too intense.

Sheriff Payne who viewed the scene said no foul play was suspected in the unfortunate event. J.W. Southward conducted a coroner's inquest at the scene and reported the ruling to be that Mrs. Turner's death was due to accidental burning.

Based on information given by Mr. Rouse, it was learned that Mrs. Turner was thought to be 81 years old. She visited regularly in the Rouse home and had last been there Monday around dusk. Mr. Rouse said Mrs. Turner was a healthy woman who would get out and walk to visit neighbors, oft times walking

County To Receive \$17 Million In Tax

The TVA in-lieu tax bill has been approved by the legislature, after a seven year battle. The measure settles the distribution of the im-

pounded TVA Tax alternative payment and will return millions of dollars to Northeast Mississippi. Representative Mack Wadkins reports that Tishomingo County is to

receive \$17 million dollars, \$4.5 million dollars will go to Yellow Creek Port, \$5 million will go into the county general budget, \$2.5 million will go into the educational trust fund and \$5 million will be placed in the bank somewhere in the county and can be used only for industrial development. The principal in the

education fund can never be spent, the interest that accumulates will be used for Tishomingo County only, and will be distributed to schools based on average daily attendance, according to Mr. Wadkins. This money will be available in October of this year. Next year Tishomingo County will get \$1.25 million

Findings By The Circuit Court

Two Iuka men entered guilty pleas Monday, April 14, in Tishomingo County Court. In case #3205 State of Mississippi Vs. Robert Day was charged with two counts of writing bad checks to Oakwood Manufacturing Company of Belmont. Day pleaded guilty to one count of false pretense. Sentencing was deferred until the September term of court as Day wishes to make restitution.

Larry Garrison pleaded guilty on 2 charges, one of DUI and driving while his license was suspended for an earlier DUI. Judge Frank Russell sentenced Garrison to 30 days in the county jail and fined him \$500 and the cost of the court. The second sentence was to stay 48 hours in jail and pay a \$250 fine and court cost was

suspended pending good behavior after serving the 30 days and upon his release. Roger Dale Russell, 30, of Corinth was arraigned by the Tishomingo County Grand Jury on two indictments of burglary and larceny. He was charged in connection with the January 8, break-in at Marlin-Moore Chevrolet and K & R Furniture Company. He is charged with stealing a 1972 pick-up, auto parts, accessories from Marlin-Moore, three microwave ovens, and three television sets from the furniture store. Russell pleaded not guilty and the case was continued until the September term of court.

Richard Pride of Cherokee was arraigned by the Grand Jury on an indictment of possession of more than an ounce of marijuana with in-

tent to sell. In other court action Monday Ralph Carnes, 65, of Counce, Tennessee, charged with possession of cocaine was continued until the next term of court due to his being incarcerated in a Shelby County jail after pleading guilty to a federal charge of sale of cocaine and is awaiting sentencing. Federal authorities refuse to release him until he is sentenced there. He will then be turned over to Tishomingo County for disposition of charges here. Tishomingo County took a judgement on his bond, but expect to have him for trial in September.

Rape Suspect Arrested

According to Richard Bowen, Assistant District Attorney, Joel E. Harris, 22, of Golden was arrested Thursday, April 10, by Lee County officials and charged with the attempted rape of a Tupelo woman.

Bowen further stated that Harris has been linked with an alleged rape of a 20-year-old Dennis woman in Tishomingo County on October 30, 1985.

Lee County officials received calls from several residents in the neighborhood where the alleged rape attempt occurred after they had read the news account in the April 9th, edition of the Tupelo Daily Journal. The Dennis woman's husband also read the article and recognized the description of his wife's alleged attacker and notified the Lee County Sheriff's Department. The matter is still under investigation. Harris is scheduled to appear in Justice Court April 24.

Feed Grain Program Allows 80 Percent Planting

Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee said farmers who participate in the 1986 feed grain program are allowed to plant and harvest

up to 80 percent of their corn/sorghum and barley/oats acreage bases and be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and land diversion payments. The required acreage reduction will help curtail the burdensome supplies of these commodities.

"All farmers with an established acreage base are eligible to participate in the voluntary program," Bridges said. The 1986 acreage base is the average of the acres planted and considered plan-

ted to feed grains in the last five years.

Producers who plant no more than 80 percent of their feed grain base will be eligible for price support loans at \$1.92 per bushel for corn, \$1.82 for sorghum, \$1.56 for barley and \$99 per bushel for oats. Bridges said target prices for 1986 feed grain crops will be the same as were in effect for 1985 crops.

"Farmers may request 100 percent of their land diversion payments and 40 percent of the projected deficiency payments when they sign up in the program," Bridges said. Land diversion payments will be issued in negotiable payment-in-kind certificates. Seventy-five percent of the advance deficiency payments will be issued in cash and the remainder in certificates, he said.

Deficiency payments are made to farm program participants when the average market price falls below the established target price for a crop. USDA estimates that the per bushel deficiency payment rates will be \$1.03 per bushel for corn, \$.98 for sorghum, \$.95 for barley and \$.45 for oats. According to Bridges, land diversion payments will be made on an acreage equal to 2.5 percent of the crop acreage base at a rate of \$.73 per bushel for corn, \$.65 for sorghum, \$.57 for barley and \$.36 per bushel for oats.

For further details or program applications, feed grain producers may contact the local ASCS office. The sign-up period ends April 25, 1986.

CANCER Q. WHAT IS CANCER?

A. Cancer is a group of many diseases affecting the body's cells. Cells are the tiny building blocks that make up all parts of the body, such as the skin, blood, lungs, and bones. The body is always making new cells. It does that when one cell splits in half and becomes two new cells. This called cell division. If everything is working right, the cells divide over and over again, in an orderly way. And that is how the body grows and repairs itself.

If cells divide without any order, a growth known as a TUMOR builds up. A tumor may be BENIGN (not cancer) or MALIGNANT (cancer). A benign tumor may grow large, but it will not spread to other parts of the body. Often it can be removed and will not come back.

A malignant tumor, or a cancer, can spread to other parts of the body forming new growths. This is called metastasis.

Q. WHAT CAUSES CANCER?

A. Scientists do not fully understand why some people get cancer while others do not. Most experts believe that cancer comes from repeated contact with substances called CARCINOGENS. These materials seem to cause the disorderly cell division that results in a TUMOR. They include tobacco smoke, sunlight, x-rays, and certain chemicals that may be found in air, water, food, drugs, and at work. Scientists also suspect that some people are more likely than others to get cancer. Other causes, as yet unknown, may play a part as well.

Q. HOW CAN I TELL IF I HAVE CANCER?

A. You know your body-how it looks and how it feels-better than anyone else. As a result, you will usually be the first one to notice any changes. Therefore, YOU, are a very important person in the early detection of cancer. Learn the possible signs, or symptoms, of cancer. Be alert to changes in your body.

Symptoms of the most common types of cancer:

*Lung: Cough that won't go away. Shortness of breath.

*Breast: Lump in the breast. Change in breast shape. Discharge from the nipple.

*Large Bowel: (Colon and Rectum) Changes in bowel habits. Bleeding from the rectum. Blood in the bowel

movement.

*Prostate: Difficulty or pain in urinating. Need to urinate often, especially at night.

*Uterus: Unusual bleeding or discharge from the vagina.

*Bladder: Difficulty in urinating. Blood in the urine.

*Lymph System: Swelling or knots, particularly in the neck, armpits, or groin.

*Mouth and Throat: Sore that does not heal. Hoarseness. Difficulty in swallowing.

*Blood: Repeated or continual tiredness. Tendency to bruise and bleed easily. Frequent infection.

*Skin: Sore that does not heal. Change in a wart or mole. Sudden appearance of a mole.

Q. WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I FIND ONE OF THOSE SIGNS?

A. If one of the symptoms lasts more than 2 weeks, you should see a doctor right away. Don't wait for the symptom to become painful. Pain is not usually an early sign of cancer. When you call to make an appointment, be sure to say that you are concerned about cancer.

Q. DOES CIGARETTE SMOKING REALLY CAUSE CANCER?

A. Yes. In the United States, cigarette smoking is associated with at least one out of every five cancer deaths. It has been linked to

cancers of the MOUTH, THROAT, ESOPHAGUS, PANCREAS, and BLADDER. But LUNG cancer is where cigarettes take their greatest toll.

Men who smoke die from lung cancer 10 times more often than those who don't smoke. And since more and more women have been smoking cigarettes, lung cancer is no longer only a man's disease.

The risk of getting lung cancer from cigarettes increases with the number you smoke, how long you have been smoking, and how deeply you inhale. High-tar cigarettes-such as those without filters-are more dangerous than low-tar cigarettes. That is, unless you misuse the low-tar cigarettes by smoking more of them, inhaling them more deeply, or smoking them down to the butt. But don't kid yourself. Switching to a low-tar cigarette won't eliminate your risk to cancer or the other health problems, such as heart disease and high blood pressure, associated with smoking. You are not safe until you quit smoking completely.

Q. WHY IS EARLY DETECTION SO IMPORTANT?

A. Cancer is very often curable if it is discovered early.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



The Family Pet Needs Dental Care

Oral hygiene is just as important for the family pet as it is for the human members of the family.

While dogs and cats do not often develop caries or cavities which trouble so many human patients, they do experience many other diseases of the teeth and gums.

One of the most common tooth problems facing today's house pet is bacterial plaque.

Bacteria in the mouth combine with substances in the saliva to produce a hard, cement-like deposit which builds up on the teeth at the point where the teeth emerge from the gum. As this plaque increases in volume, it irritates the gum and may cause it to recede from the base of the tooth, leaving a pocket where bacteria can grow and damage the bone supporting the tooth.

Left untreated, the plaque may cause the tooth to become loosened and eventually fall out.

Bacteria growing on the plaque also may produce halitosis or bad breath. The normal, healthy dog's mouth

should be free of any offensive odors. Any bad smell, lasting for a significant length of time, is a good sign the family veterinarian should be consulted.

The plaque, which gives an unsightly, dark brown stain to the teeth, can only be removed by mechanical means such as the dentist uses to clean your teeth. Many veterinarians today are using ultra-sonic units to clean the teeth of pets.

In addition to plaque, there are several other infections that can lead to loss of your pet's teeth if not treated.

A healthy mouth and teeth are important to your family pet's long life and make him more desirable to have around the house.

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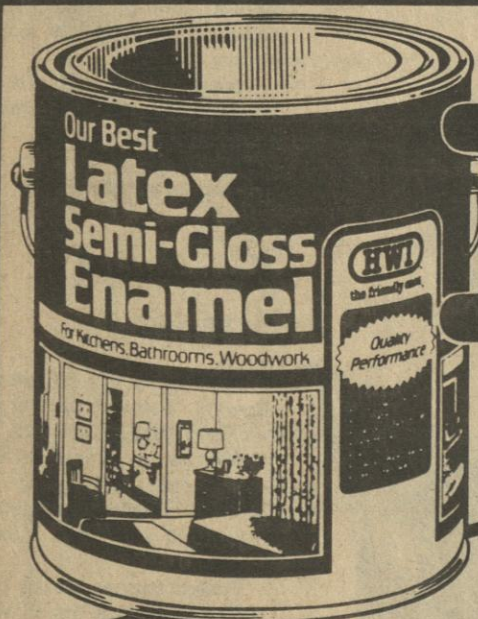
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Bonds - Rice Vows Planned For April 20th

Surplus Food Distribution

The Tishomingo County Welfare Department announced today that U.S. Department of Agriculture surplus commodities will be distributed Thursday, April 24, 1986, beginning at 8:00 a.m. The following items will be distributed to eligible households: one five pound block of cheese, one-one pound butter, one-three pound jar honey, and two-two pound bags of rice.

Those households who receive food stamps by mail

will have vouchers enclosed with their April food stamps. Food stamp recipients who pick up their stamps will get their voucher with their April allotment. All other certified households (self declared income) will have their vouchers mailed on April 10, therefore, it will not be necessary for these households to come to the Welfare Office to pick up their vouchers. Households that do not receive a voucher by mail will need to come to the office to have their certification updated. Anyone wishing to make an application may apply after April 11. Eligibility is based on income.

Misrepresentation of need, or sale or exchange of USDA commodities, is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance Program is available to all eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap. Those receiving the surplus foods are requested to bring a paper sack for their convenience in carrying the items.

Dean added that food stamps, by law, can be used only to buy food or garden seed and plants to be used to produce food.

Applicants must be out of school six months before making application for the GED test or the class of which they were a member has graduated. Minimum age for testing is 17. Applicant must be a resident of Mississippi at least thirty days prior to testing.

The GED Test Battery consists of five tests, each measuring the skills considered to be the major outcome of a high school education. They include Writing, Social Studies, Science, Reading and Mathematics. Cost of the test is \$12.00; if retesting is necessary on any part, the cost is \$3.00 per retest.

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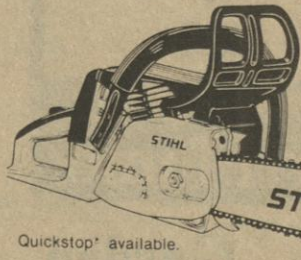
