May 13th Proclaimed County Soil & Water Conservation Day

Tuesday, May 13th, 1986, has been announced as Soil and Water Conservation Day in Tishomingo County. Shown at the proclamation signing are Iuka Mayor, John Biggs; president of the county board of supervisors, Gerald Parsons; Soil Conservation District chairman, W.R. Wimlish; and local Conservationist, Don Jones. The general public is encouraged to attend the celebrations

which will be held on that day; thus becoming acquainted with the various functions of this county service. Activities will get underway with a morning reception to be held at the Soil Conservation Office located at 115 Front Street, Iuka. As the day progresses, Jay Bird Park (directly across from the office) will become the center of activity with live entertainment, demonstrations of

farm equipment, cattle exhibits, and displays by numerous clubs and organizations. Random drawings will be held with prizes which will be furnished

by local merchants and clubs, to go to some lucky winners. Keep this date in mind. More information will be released in the next week's edition of The Vidette.

When Selling A Car, Check State Laws

Anyone selling a car or truck this summer should be aware of a change in state laws governing the way casual vehicle sales are taxed.

Tishomingo County Tax Assessor and Collector Horace Ledgewood said the changes go into effect June 1. He urged anyone planning to sell a vehicle after that date to become familiar with the changes.

The changes deal with the types and ages of vehicles sold between individuals and how they will be taxed.

Beginning June 1, vehicles which are 10 years or newer will be taxed. Presently, the

law allows only those vehicles seven years or newer to be taxed.

Also, vehicles sold between individuals will be taxed at three percent, based on the Uniform Assessment Schedule for Motor Vehicle Ad Valorem Taxes.

These changes basically broaden the coverage of sales and use taxes imposed on the casual sales of certain motor vehicles.

Vehicles purchased by public or non-profit private schools, counties, municipalities, and road, drainage or levee districts will remain exempt from the taxes.

Motorcycle Accident Injures Young Man

Tim Milligan, 25, of Route 4, Iuka, remains in critical condition in the intensive care unit at the Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala., following a motorcycle wreck Sunday. It was reported that he has begun to respond and some surgery is planned.

A family member said that a witness to the mid-afternoon accident reported that young Milligan was traveling east on new Highway 72 near the Pleasant Hill intersection when he apparently lost control of his motorcycle and was thrown free of it. Milligan was said to have been left lying in the middle of the road with the cycle some distance away. The witness, who was unidentified, stayed with the injured youth and sent his

wife to call an ambulance. The cause of the accident was unknown.

Milligan was transported to the Tishomingo County Hospital where he was treated for multiple lacerations, multiple abrasions and contusion of the head. The record showed that he was discharged at 5:10 p.m., the hospital administrator said, and was taken to E.C.M.

Tim is the son of Jackie Milligan of Iuka.

TVA, T.C.E.P.A. To Conduct Research Study

TVA and the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association announced plans today for a new load research program designed to study the changing patterns of electrical use.

Approximately 18 customers of the Tishomingo

County Electric Power Association will be asked to participate in the study. They were selected to represent all types of customers, including homeowners, renters, business owners, and large industries.

"The purpose of the study

is to learn how much electricity our various customers need and when they need it—from hour to hour, day to day, and month to month," said Dicky Sparks, Office Manager. "This information will help us plan our operations to supply elec-

tricity as efficiently as possible."

The Tishomingo County Electric Power Association is one of 100 power distributors in the TVA service area who are taking part in the study. A total of 2,745 electric customers in seven states are being asked to participate.

Participants will receive a special electric meter that records the amount of electricity used at different times of the day. The meter is installed free of charge.

"There is no cost and no inconvenience for the customer. Customers will not be asked to keep records of any kind," Mr. Sparks said.

Mr. Sparks said the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association is now contacting customers who have been selected for the study. Customers with questions about the study should call the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association at 423-3646.

Local Employment Rate On The Rise

Employment in Tishomingo County continued to climb at mid-March. Figures released by the Mississippi State Employment Service revealed that the number of Tishomingo County residents employed rose to 6,170 an increase of 140 from the previous estimate and 430 over the estimate for one year ago. The civilian labor force, estimated to be 7,480, also experienced an increase of 90 from February with a drop of

150 from March, 1985. The number of residents unemployed dropped by 50 from last month with an even larger drop of 580 from one year ago. The rate of unemployment was estimated to be 17.5 percent of the civilian labor force, compared to 18.4 percent in February and 24.8 percent in March, 1985.

Manufacturing employment was estimated to be 2,630, 40 above the estimate for one month ago and 230 above the figure for

one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment in the county was estimated to be 2,700, compared to 2,650 in February and 2,560 in March, 1985.

Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, stated that the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo experienced a rise in the civilian labor force at mid-March. The labor force was estimated to be 60,590, 1,310 above the figure for one month ago but 650 below the figure for March, 1985. There were 9,030 individuals unemployed at mid-month, or 14.9 percent of the civilian labor force. This represents a decline of one-tenth of a percent from last month with a drop of 2.2 percent noted from one year ago. Area residents employed rose to 51,560, compared to 50,360 in February and 50,750 in March, 1985. The monthly increase was found in all categories with Nonagricultural Wage and Salaried workers producing the yearly rise.

slimness, many self-appointed, so-called, "Nutrition advisors" have out-shouted people qualified to give reliable information. Many Tishomingo Countians are conscious of the need to lose weight, but want to do it quickly and painlessly. As a

result, quackery in the field of weight reduction has become a most profitable business.

Here are some questions often asked:

1. Q. Are potatoes and bread fattening?

A. No single food is fattening. All foods have calories in varying amounts. It is the excess calories that contribute to weight gain. Any food can be eaten in excess to cause weight gain.

2. Q. Should you wash rice after cooking to reduce the calories?

A. No. Only a small amount of starch is removed from the rice, and then the B vitamins are lost.

3. Q. Does washing canned or frozen fruit remove the sugar?

A. No. The only thing washed away is the syrup clinging to these fruits. The sugar remains in the canned or frozen fruit as part of the fruit.

4. Q. Are there fewer calories in margarine than in

butter?

A. No. Regular margarine and butter have the same number of calories. They are both 80 percent fat. Diet margarine, however, is half water, so it has half the number of calories as regular margarine and butter. (One teaspoon margarine or butter = 35 calories).

5. Q. Does sugar have fewer calories than starch?

A. No. Weight for weight, sugar and starch have the same number of calories.

6. Q. Do grapefruit, lemon, and vinegar really help dissolve fat?

A. No. There are no magic foods which cause fat to melt or dissolve. Weight is mainly lost through reduction in calories and increased activity.

7. Q. Does dark bread contain fewer calories than white bread?

A. No. They have about the same caloric content.

8. Q. Is it true that high protein foods have no calories?

A. False. One ounce of lean meat, fish, poultry, cheese, and one egg contain approximately 75 calories.

9. Q. Why do adults on reducing diets need milk?

A. Milk is essential for all children and adults unless the physician recommends otherwise. Milk is a good source of protein, calcium, and riboflavin (vitamin B2). In fact, it is practically impossible to meet the riboflavin requirements without milk in the diet. Milk also provides part of the daily allowance for protein. Calcium is needed for maintenance of the bones. The bones are active, live tissue where calcium and other nutrients move in and out of them daily. Some middle-aged and older adults who have gone a long time without milk and other calcium rich foods may develop osteoporosis (brittleness of the bone). This is evidenced by bowing of the back bone, loss of height, and frequent broken bones.

10. Q. Are there certain foods which you must avoid on a reducing diet?

A. It depends on the calories in the diet. After you eat the planned foods (the daily food guide), you can use the remaining calories as desired as long as you stay within the total caloric limit of the diet. Of course, fried and greasy foods, gravies, cream and rich desserts are high in calories. You should omit or limit these high caloric foods.

11. Q. Do gelatin and regular Jello have the same number of calories?

A. No. Gelatin is a protein substance without flavor or sugar. Regular Jello is a trade

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ABC's of RDAs

I am confused about the term "RDA." Is it the same as the Minimum Daily Requirement?

The RDA system to which you refer is an information system provided by the government to assist individuals regarding daily nutritional requirements. RDA stands for recommended daily allowance. In the United States, the National Academy of Sciences establishes the nutrient (vitamin, mineral) RDA levels for males and females from infancy through adulthood. The RDA Committee recommends average daily amounts based on available scientific findings. Every five years or so the Committee meets to reevaluate and update past recommendations.

RDAs are not requirements but, rather, the amounts of nutrients suggested based on average intake of healthy adults.

Minimum daily requirement (MDR) is not the same as the RDA. The MDR represents the lowest level of nutrient intake which will not result in disease. RDA is now more popular than MDR.

Deworming Your Pet

If you suspect that your pet is suffering from internal parasites, be sure and see your veterinarian to determine the exact problem and what to do about it.

All deworming medicines are toxic to some extent. And, like other medications, deworming medicines should be used only as needed and under proper conditions.

Many dog and cat owners have accidentally killed their pets—especially young ones—by indiscriminately worming them. There is no single tablet, capsule or injection that will treat all the types of worms that infest animals. Each of these internal parasites must be treated differently.

Medication that works against roundworms, for example, is not effective against tapeworms. And dosage that is proper for

one animal may be too much or too little for another. Another important consideration is how heavily the animal is infested.

Pets should have periodic checkups to determine whether or not the animal is suffering from an internal parasite infestation. Your family veterinarian can determine the type of parasite(s) present in the animal and, based on the animal's general health, age and size, determine the best treatment.

Porno Magazines Removed

Attorney General Ed Pittman commended the 7-11 convenience store chain for voluntarily taking Playboy, Penthouse, and Forum magazines out of their stores. Southland Corporation, parent group for the 4,500 7-11 stores across the nation, announced last Thursday that the stores would no longer sell those magazines.

"This is the second time in two days we have received good and encouraging news about anti-pornography," Pittman said. Thursday, Federal Judge L.T. Senter issued an order severing parts of Mississippi's anti-pornography statute which had been declared unconstitutional and lifting the two-year old injunction against enforcement of the state law. The order becomes effective May 8.

Pittman said he hoped other stores which sell the magazines would follow 7-11's example. He also en-

couraged law enforcement officials across the state to take a look at their communities and to enforce the anti-pornography law wherever enforcement is needed.

"The legal resources of this office and of the county

attorney and district attorneys' offices are available to advise local law enforcement personnel. If any police department or sheriff's office needs advice on the state law and how to enforce it, all they have to do is pick up the phone."

Conservation Notes

Soil Conservation Service
Grass waterways are natural or manmade watercourses protected against erosion by a grass cover. They serve as safe outlets for terraces, diversions, and contour rows. They may also service as passageways for water that enters your farm from other land.

Good grass waterways are a must in controlling erosion on many farms. If you do not have them or if they fail to work properly, all other parts of the erosion-control system for your field or farm may fail too.

The next time you have a heavy rain, take a good look at the natural drainageways and draws in your fields. Is there erosion in these low places where runoff water collects and flows swiftly downhill? If so, you should consider the need for a grass waterway.

Your first thought may be that you do not want you fields cut up by waterways. But crossing easily waterways with modern machinery is not difficult. Made with gentle sloping slides, waterways can be crossed easily with tractors. Power lifts simplify the job of raising and lowering tools during the crossing. It is better to put up with a small inconvenience

now than to be blocked later by a gully.

Where ever you use a grass waterway you want a dense, vigorous growth of grass that will carry a flow of water without erosion. Also your grass waterway should be established before you install the terraces, diversions, or contour rows that will

discharge into it.

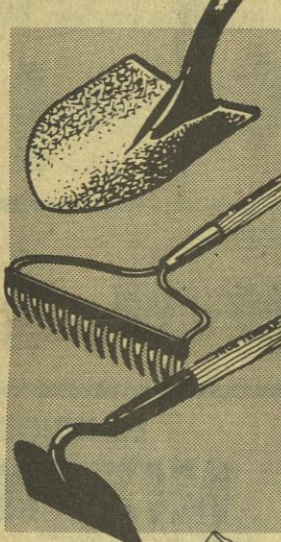

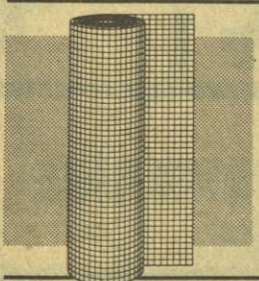

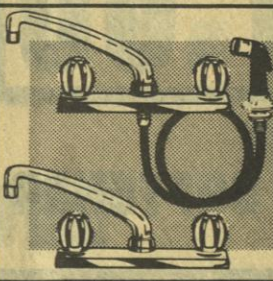

ASCS Farm News

By: Henry L. Knox, County Executive Director Second Conservation Reserve Program Signup Announced

Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service today reported that a second sign-up period for the new USDA Conservation Reserve Program will be held from May 5 through May 16, 1986.

Farmers will be offered the opportunity to bid for a Conservation Reserve Program contract for either the 1986 or the 1987 crop year. Bids may be offered for both years, providing different acreage is involved.

Producers cannot harvest any 1986 crop planted on land to be placed in the program. For contracts which are effective immediately, annual payments will be made beginning October 1, 1986. For contracts which become effective on October 1, 1986 or later, producers will be allowed to harvest their 1986 crop, and no annual payments will be made before October 1, 1987.

In reporting results of the first sign-up ASCS said 75.9 acres of highly erodible cropland on three (3) farms in the county are scheduled for the Conservation Reserve Program. The acreage will be ineligible for farming for 10 years and must be planted to a permanent vegetative cover.

Preliminary figures from the first sign-up summary showed that Tishomingo County farmers bid a total of 231.9 acres from 7 farms. The bids accepted averaged \$31.58 per farm and totaled about \$25,500.

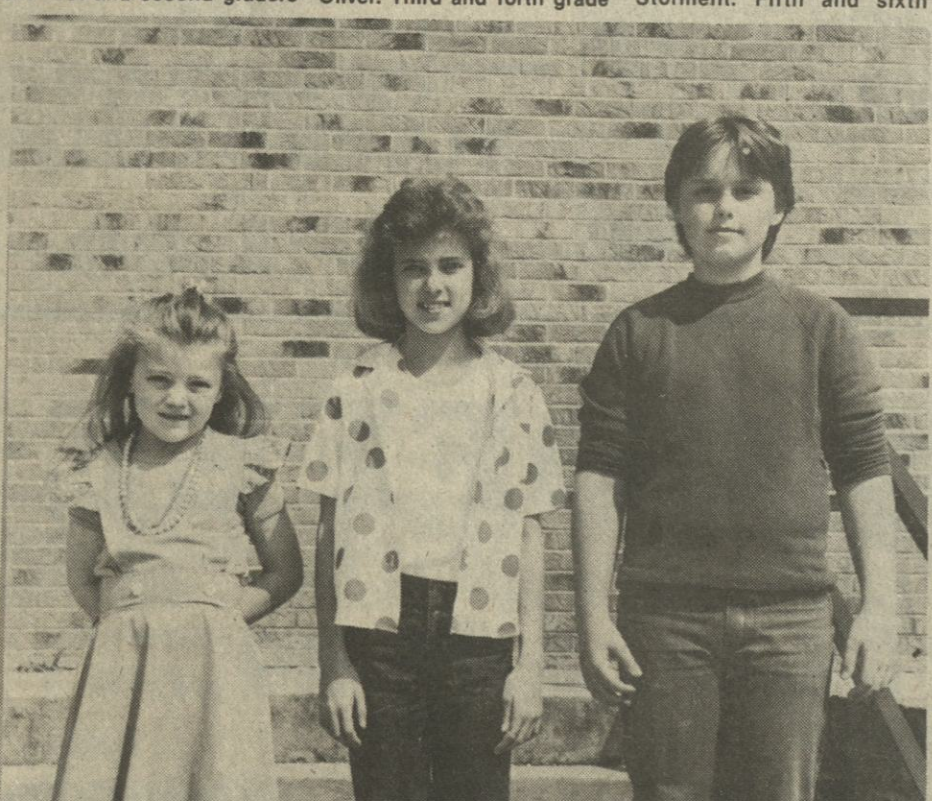

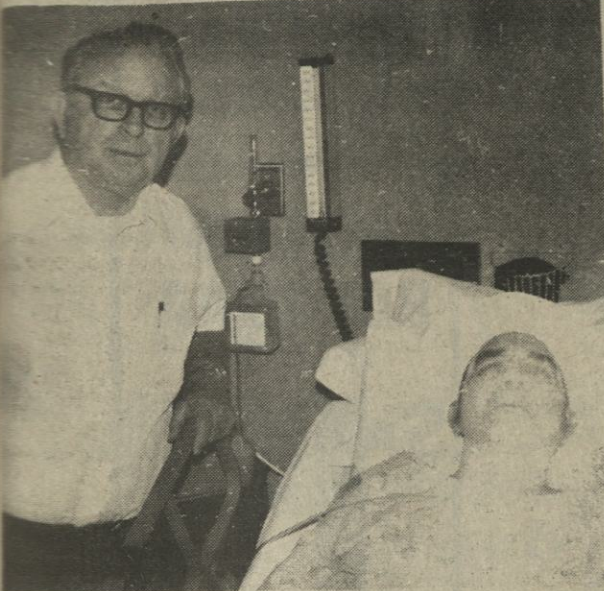

Point Of Law

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some legal rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about

your rights.)

Q. What are the different types of listing agreements that can be made with a real estate broker?

A. A listing agreement is a legal contract that governs such conditions as the broker's fees, the right of the seller to negotiate on his or her behalf, and terms restricting the rights to sell. An OPEN LISTING CONTRACT is a listing wherein the owner lists the property for sale with one broker, but reserves the right to list the property concurrently with as many additional brokers as desired. The seller will owe a commission only to the broker who actually sells the house. EXCLUSIVE AGENCY CONTRACTS employ one broker as an agent for the property for a definite period of time, but also allow the owner to sell directly without an obligation to pay a broker's

commission. An EXCLUSIVE RIGHT TO SELL CONTRACT appoints one broker as sole agent for a specified period of time and entitles the broker to a commission if a property is sold by any party within the time limits.

Q. What precautions should the buyer take to be sure that title is conveyed to his new property without any problems?

A. The buyer will want to assume a title that is "marketable," that is, free from all indebtedness or limitation on its use. It is up to the buyer to examine the title. This should be done before the purchase is complete through a title search or examination of public records by an attorney, who then issues a certificate indicating the findings or supplies a written title opinion.
