Ms. Shelia Curtis Appointed Area Mental Health Worker

Ms. Shelia Curtis, has been appointed to the position of Mental Health Worker at the Timber Hills Mental Health Services in Iuka. Ms. Curtis was selected to fill the vacancy left when Eugene Annison resigned in January.

Ms. Curtis is the daughter of Mrs. Mildred Curtis and the late Mr. Bart Curtis. Her grandparents are the late Mr. and Mrs. John B. Stormont and the late Mr. and Mrs. Tom Curtis. She graduated from Iuka High School and

attended Northeast Mississippi Junior College and the University of North Alabama.

After completing school she worked as a social worker at the State Welfare Department in the Northeast MS area. She was employed by the Northeast Mississippi Emergency Shelter for Children in Corinth and at the time she received her Master Degree in Counseling.

The emergency shelter in Corinth serves eleven counties caring for delinquent

children and children who suffer from abuse and neglect. The shelter has space available for ten children. After 30 days at the center, the children are placed by court order in foster homes or in group homes.

Shelia has been employed at Timber Hills for two months, as a Mental Health Worker working in general counseling. This includes counseling in general mental illness, chronic mental illness, and serious emotional problems, that a person might otherwise have to go to the state hospital to receive. She also counsels persons with emotional behavior problems, family conflict, problems in parenting and coping with stress. She sees 12 or 15 people per day, some in group therapy and others individually. She is responsible for recreational

and social activity group therapy, and works in after hours emergency counseling. Once a month a psychiatrist and psychologist come in to counsel further with those who need their services.

Timber Hills is located on Whitehouse Road and is open 5 days a week. Office hours are 8:00 a.m. until 4:45 p.m. The agency provides other services which include a program for the mentally retarded, a program for drug and alcohol abuse, and other services.

If you need the service provided by the center you can call for an appointment or drop by the center. Referrals are accepted from other agencies, doctors, schools, and hospitals. The number to call for an appointment is 423-3332. For after hours counseling you may call 1-286-9209, this is a toll free number.



NEMJC To Graduate 335 On May 16th

Northeast Junior College will graduate 335 students and honor four retiring instructors whose combined tenure at NEMJC totals 123 years in the Thirty-Eighth Annual Commencement Ceremonies.

Richard Bowen Enters Judge Race



Former Assistant District Attorney Richard D. Bowen of Iuka has announced his candidacy for Chancery Judge of the First Chancery Court District, Post 1, in the June 3 Democratic Primary Election.

The district serves Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Tishomingo, and Union Counties. "When I resigned from the District Attorney's Office in April, I had served almost seven years as Assistant District Attorney. During that time, I prosecuted serious felony cases over a seven county area," Bowen stated.

"I believe my extensive experience, especially in the courtroom, would be an asset serving as Chancery Judge," he added.

"If elected Chancery Judge, I intend to be available to everyone with business before the Court in an effort to reduce delays that are so common in our court system today," Bowen stated.

"My chief concern, will be to provide speedy, fair and impartial justice to everyone, regardless of race, sex, or social standing," Bowen stressed.

cases involving ownership and use of land, estate matters, and domestic relations cases, including divorce, child custody, support, and related matters.

"These matters require a sense of dedication and the ability to use good judgment and common sense in the application of the law," Bowen points out.

"I have studied diligently to keep abreast of current developments in the law during my eleven and one-half years of practice," he said, "and I feel my educational background, hard work and experience qualify me for the duties of Chancery Judge."

Bowen, 35, is a graduate of Mississippi State University and the University of Mississippi Law School. He has been a member of the Mississippi State Bar Association since 1974.

In 1985, Bowen was named Chief Assistant District Attorney and served in that position until his resignation last month.

He is a former staff attorney for the University of Mississippi Law Center.

Bowen presently serves as Tishomingo County Prosecuting Attorney.

He is currently Vice-President of the Mississippi Prosecutors Association. Recently Bowen was named to the State Foster Care Review Board of Northeast Mississippi, which reviews Welfare Department care placements for foster children.

Bowen is married to the former Vicki Jordan of Corinth. He is the son of Mrs. and Mrs. J.D. Bowen of Mathiston.

He is a member of the Church of Christ.

Only ONE LICENSE TAG may be issued to a qualified veteran at a cost to him of \$1.00 annually. A current letter of certification from the V.A. must be presented with each annual renewal of the license tag. Only autos and pick-up trucks may operate with a D.A.V. tag.

Troublesome Pasture Weeds

Weeds in permanent pastures cause low forage production since a weed takes the same amount of nutrients, light and water as forage plants. It is necessary to control weeds in your pasture to grow quality forage.

A thick, healthy sod of pasture grass or legumes is basic to a good pasture weed control program. Weed control through competition involves good grazing management, proper lime applications and adequate soil fertility.

Desirable forage plants will not produce well with low fertility and will usually result in a thin sod that allows more weed problems.

Even when you use the best management, competition will not control all

weeds. Mowing or clipping along with chemical weed control are a part of good fertility and grazing management.

Clipping will kill many annual broadleaf weeds if you cut them below the growing point. Clipping does not usually kill perennial weeds, but it does reduce seed production and gives desirable forage crops a growth advantage over the weeds. A pasture clipper plus chemicals gives the best weed control.

Weed control chemicals will selectively remove most troublesome weeds from pasture. There are some exceptions, however, such as with legumes.

When using herbicides be sure to follow instructions carefully to avoid accidents. By properly applying the herbicides you can kill most weeds and maximize pasture

The Agony Of Fleas

Fleas are perhaps the most familiar type of external parasite known today.

And every cat and dog will tell you (if only they could talk) that the only good flea is a dead one.

These pests are well-known for the discomfort they cause pets with their biting. But fleas also pose a serious threat to your pet's health.

In addition to discomfort, fleas-either by their number or your pet's sensitivity to them-may cause severe skin irritation or "hot spots".

A flea feeds by sucking the blood of its host and may cause anemia, especially among young puppies and kittens or badly debilitated adult animals.

The flea is the intermediate host for the most common species of dog and cat tapeworms. When an adult flea is nipped and eaten by its dog or cat host, a tapeworm may develop in the intestine of the animal.

Finally, if a dog or cat is not available, a flea will feed on humans. Usually, this happens only in severe household infestations or when the animal is away from the premises for several weeks. When it does happen, however, many bites can occur quickly and cause severe itching.

But fleas can be controlled and/or prevented. A number of effective products currently are available to control fleas. All of them, however, are

not intended for use on all animals so your veterinarian should be contacted regarding the best product to use on your pet or in its environment.

Products such as flea fogging devices, dichlorvos fly strips, flea powders and similar insecticides are effective ways to rid your pet's environment of fleas. For controlling fleas on the animals, dips, shampoos, sprays, powders, lotions, flea collars and oral medication are all effective.

Fleas, however, are not easy to get rid of-or to control. Treatments must be repeated periodically to ensure that the animal and the environment remain free of fleas.

Remember that few fleas will ever die of starvation. They can survive up to 125 days-and sometimes, even longer-without a host animal. When there is a host available, they can live up to two years on the same animal.

Additionally, fleas multiply very quickly. An adult female can lay hundreds of eggs that seem to survive and hatch anywhere and everywhere.

Living Better By Walking

The loudest argument in the world for regular exercise is but a whisper when compared to the actual experience of being fit! Nevertheless, an inevitable curiosity bubbles up to the surface when people feel their bodies doing things they haven't done for years and with an ease they thought no longer possible.

Too few people realize that walking can be equally as effective in cardiovascular conditioning as jogging. Walking is, in fact, a type of aerobic exercise. Walking is actually a variety of exercises that stimulate heart and lung activity for a period sufficiently long to produce beneficial changes in the body. Central to these changes is a stronger heart, pumping more blood with less strain. And the way to make that happen is through AEROBIC EXERCISE (walking) which develops the vital heart muscle.

Think for a moment of your body as if it were a machine. Like any machine, our body and its composite parts require fuel and a catalyst to transform this fuel into energy. What we consume is our fuel; oxygen burns that fuel and converts it to energy. When we are in poor condition, our bodies process fuel inefficiently and, as a result, suffers greater wear and tear. What aerobic exer-

cise (walking) does is to increase our aerobic capacity--the amount of oxygen we can take in and use efficiently. As we build our aerobic capacity, we are developing a conditioned heart capable of pumping oxygen-rich blood to every energy-hungry corner of our bodies. Through cardiovascular conditioning, you can have an "engine" that runs smoothly.

These thoughts on fitness and health were thoroughly discussed about a year ago during the early planning stages that lead to the development of the Gamefield Walking Track located just west of the Tishomingo County Hospital. Although a grant (made possible by the Wells Fargo

Company) provided most of the funds for the track, some local funds were necessary. Through the generosity of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of Iuka, the hospital was able to participate in this program. In addition, hospital employees held two fund-raising projects so that the project of the Gamefield became a reality.

Alcohol and Nutrition

One of my friends is an alcoholic and does not seem to eat properly. What affect is alcohol having on his nutrition?

There are many problems associated with heavy ingestion of alcohol on a chronic basis. One of those problems can be malnutrition. Alcohol in large quantities depresses the appetite and may attack the lining of the stomach. Some nutrients, such as thiamin (vitamin B-1), folic acid, and vitamin B-12 may not be absorbed well from the gastro-intestinal tract. Deficiencies of these vitamins are common in alcoholics.

Alcoholics tend to eat poorly, perhaps because of a direct effect of alcohol on the stomach. Mental and behavioral problems may also be involved, however.

Alcohol alters the metabolism of nutrients. The liver may become impaired in its ability to store some nutrients or activate enzyme systems that are required in normal metabolic activities. Alcoholism and nutritional problems go hand-in-hand.

amount of boiling water for a short period of time, to retain much of its vitamin C. Quick cooking is the secret to both good flavor and high nutritive value.

The amount of vitamin C lost in shredded cabbage depends on the equipment you use to slice the cabbage and the temperature at which you keep the cabbage after shredding. To retain vitamin C, use a sharp knife rather than a saw cutter because the vitamin loss from cabbage increases as the tissues become bruised.

Greatest loss occurs during the first 10 to 15 minutes after the cabbage is cut. But cabbage stored in a refrigerator rather than at room temperature loses little additional vitamin C.

Cabbage sold fresh is of two types. New cabbage still has its outer leaves. Old cabbage comes from storage in other states. Unlike new cabbage, stored cabbage is usually trimmed of its outer wrapper leaves that are rich in food value.

When selecting cabbage, be sure the leaves are firmly attached to the stem. Separation of the leaves from the base indicates overaged cabbage and poor storage conditions. Avoid cabbage with wilted or decayed outer leaves or with leaves turning yellow.

When buying cabbage, keep in mind that one pound of cabbage yields seven to eight one-half cup servings of raw shredded cabbage or four to five one-half cup servings of cooked cabbage.

Since cabbage loses moisture easily, the leaves wilt and will become flabby if left at room temperature. Cover cabbage and store it in the coolest part of your refrigerator. Don't store it longer than five to six weeks.

After cutting a head, wrap it securely in plastic to prevent moisture loss. Cut heads do not keep well. Don't

shred cabbage and then store it. Prepare it as close to serving time as possible to prevent discoloration and loss of vitamins.

Cabbage can be served raw or cooked. Raw it is commonly cut or shredded and served as slaw or in salad combinations with other vegetables such as raw carrots, celery, onions, peppers, or tomatoes. It is also tasty served in salad combinations with fruit such as apples, pineapples and raisins or in gelatin.

Cooked cabbage can be braised, boiled, scalloped or creamed. In combination with other ingredients, it adds a flavorful addition to soups, stews and casseroles.

To retain best flavor, color and nutritive value, cook cabbage in an uncovered pan with just enough water to prevent burning until tender. Also try braising or pan-frying it.

Any type of cabbage you choose or any way you choose to serve it, cabbage adds color and variety and nutritional value to any meal when prepared properly.

Smoked Pork Chop Skillet

6 smoked pork chops, cut ¾ inch thick
1 tablespoon lard or drippings
3 large onions, cut crosswise in slices ½ to ½ in. thick
Ground pepper
5 medium-sized tart red cooking apples, cored and cut crosswise in slices ½ inch thick
1/8 teaspoon salt

Lightly brown pork chops in lard or drippings in frying-pan, 6 to 8 minutes, turning once. Remove chops and place on absorbent paper. Place onion slices in pan and fry in the drippings, turning occasionally, 6 to 8 minutes or until transparent and sprinkle with salt. Place apple rings on top of onion slices and arrange pork chops on

top. Cover and cook slowly 20 minutes. Sprinkle top of chops with ground black pepper and serve directly from frying-pan, if desired. 6 servings.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Cabbage—A Vegetable For all Seasons

Historians tell us that cabbage is probably the most ancient of vegetables. Cabbage belongs to one of the oldest and largest vegetable families. Included in the family are such well-known relatives as broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower,

collards, kale, kohlrabi and Chinese cabbage.

The market demand is primarily for fresh, green, solid, round heads that weigh from two to 3½ pounds each. Different shapes, colors and types of cabbages are available. Types of fresh cabbage found in the market include domestic, Danish, savory, red and Chinese.

A one-half cup serving of shredded, cooked cabbage yields about 15 calories. Seasoning with butter and margarine or other fats adds calories.

The calorie yield for raw cabbage is also low unless you add a lot of rich dressing. A one-half cup serving of raw

cabbage yields only 12 to 15 calories depending on the variety. A coleslaw with the same amount yields 60 calories, still low in calories compared to many other foods.

Although cabbage adds only a scant number of calories to the diet, it provides a considerable amount of vitamin C. This is particularly true when eaten raw. Vitamin C is easily lost, however, if you keep cabbage too long, allow it to dry out, overcook it or cook it in too much water.

Shred cabbage and cook it immediately in a small

Farms Ineligible For Payments On Non-Program Crops

Producers who plant non-program crops on their permitted acreage are not eligible to earn deficiency payments on these crops, according to Howard R. Bridges, chairman of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The Food Security Improvements Act of 1985 prohibits commodity program payments to any non-program crops planted on the permitted acreage. Bridges said the only exception to the ACT applies to producers who planted a non-program crop on the permitted acreage after December 23, 1985, and before February 26, 1986, or a producer who entered into a contract to plant a non-program crop on this acreage during that time. "To be eligible to earn a deficiency payment under this exception, a producer must obtain the approval of the County ASC Committee." He said producers who

plant at least 50 percent of their permitted acres to a program crop, and devotes the remaining permitted acreage to conservation uses, will be eligible to receive deficiency payments on 92 percent of the permitted acreage. "This is known as the 50/92 program." Non-program crops are all crops except wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, ELS cotton, rice, peanuts, and soybeans. Conservation uses are any uses on cropland ex-

cept program and non-program crops, ELS cotton, soybeans, acreage conservation reserve, land devoted to the Water Bank Program and the Conservation Reserve Program, and prevented planted acreage. "Producers who comply with the 1986 farm programs will be eligible for deficiency payments on the acres planted within the permitted acreage, price support loans, and land diversion payments for wheat and feed grain crops," the ASCS official said.

Conservation Reserve Program Ends

The deadline to sign up for the second Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is Friday, May 16. Check with the Tishomingo County ASCS office for details.

For How Long?

A frequently asked question concerning prescription medicines is "how long should I take it?" Two most important factors that help determine the duration of medicine use relate to the medicine itself and the condition or problem for which the medicine is being used.

If symptoms "come and go," medicines are usually prescribed for only a few days. Fever, acute pain, diarrhea, and the common cold are conditions that fall into this category.

Conditions that require long-term treatment (the so-called *chronic diseases*) include diabetes, high blood pressure, arthritis, heart failure, angina pectoris, and some seizure disorders. For these chronic problems, prescribed medicines are usually taken each day for the duration of one's life.

Infections generally fall into a specific time treatment category. A rather large number of infections will respond to antibiotics and other infection fighters over a short period of time. Penicillin in its various forms, for example, is routinely given by mouth for seven to ten days. Some infections will take longer to treat.
