Iuka Guaranty Bank To Host Open House

Banking in Iuka had its beginning in the Hyatt Building (adjacent to the Iuka Guaranty Bank structure on the west side). The Bank of Iuka was established in 1889 and an Iuka branch of the Tishomingo Savings Institution was established in 1905 on Fulton Street. Iuka Guaranty Bank was federally chartered March 4, 1912, and operated until 1915 when a state charter was obtained and the name "Iuka Guaranty Bank" was adopted.

The Bank Building, which is now owned by Iuka Guaranty Bank, was completed in 1905. It was built by W.T. Ross and bore his name for many years. A legendary story suggests that Indian

City Limits Expansion Approved By Board

A city limits expansion project for Iuka was approved at the regular May 6th meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen. This expansion will incorporate three main areas surrounding the current corporate boundaries.

The largest block to be incorporated is south of Iuka across from the new U.S. 72 four-lane highway, according to Mayor John Biggs. Two small areas including one on Snowdown Road and another north of town by the Iuka Elementary School will be annexed, he stated.

According to city attorney Richard Clark the petition describing the properties to

be added to the corporate limits should be filed by next week. The judge will then be contacted and a date set for a public hearing on the proposed area for expansion, possibly toward the end of June.

As to how many residents would be affected by the city limit expansion or exactly how many square miles to be added it was not stated.

Water utilities are presently available to these areas and gas and sewage utility services will be provided within a reasonable period of time.

Police and fire protection along with garbage pickup will be provided to the new annexed territory as well.

Protecting Garden Squash

Gardening is in full swing with plants blooming and some beginning to set young fruit. As usual, insects have also been prevalent this spring. Two that seem to be ever-present and hard to control are the squash vine borer and the squash bug. Squash is the only garden plant these insects feed on.

Although some tend to think of these as similar, they are two different insects. The squash vine borer adult is a clearwing moth and in some ways more resembles a wasp than a moth.

The females begin visiting the plants about the time of bloom to feed on nectar. Shortly after they lay eggs along the runners, but generally toward the center of the plant.

After hatching in three to

five days, the young larvae feed for a day or two on the outside of runners, then bore into the plant. Their feeding will hollow out the runner and you may not notice any evidence of their feeding for the first three or four days. After this the leaves along the runner start to wilt from lack of water and nutrients. There will also be green excrement along the runner.

The squash bug is in the same insect group as the stink bug. It is brown to brownish gray and roughly one-half inch long. One of the first indications of squash bugs are their egg masses, usually located at the base of the leaves.

The squash bug adults are very secretive and rarely seen unless you look closely for them. They remain on the under side of the runners or under dirt clods close to the

runners. Adults, and immatures feed by sucking the sap from the plant. Leaves will begin to look wilted and will start yellowing around the edges.

Ideally, controlling these pests should have begun last fall and at planting time this spring. It is too late for this now. Pesticide application is the only thing we can do for control.

You will probably get better

same time they will be pollinating the plants.

Covering the plant with pesticide is important. Don't go down the row spraying over the top of the plants because the large leaves will collect most of your spray. Place the nozzle under the leaves so the runners and the crown of the plant can be sprayed until run-off.

You might also cover the soil next to the runners for any squash bugs hiding. Remember, if you do not kill the small squash vine borer before it enters the vine, you have lost all chances to control. Contact the County Extension office for information on insecticides to use.

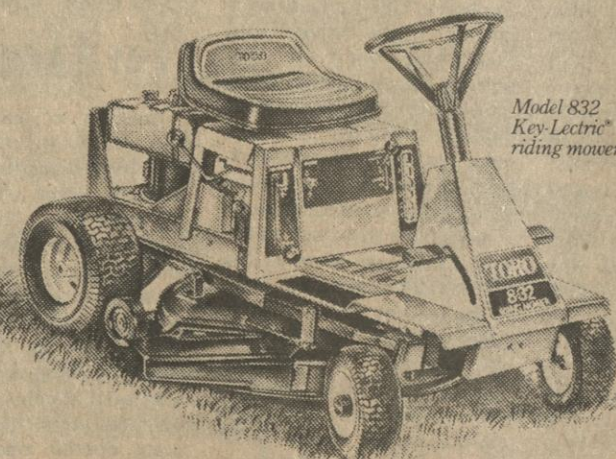

Tacky, Tacky Ticks

Ticks are perhaps the most aggravating external parasite known to attack small animals.

These small, ugly parasites firmly attach themselves to your pet and gorge themselves on the animal's blood. Animals are likely to acquire ticks anytime they get into shrubbery, undergrowth or high grass.

While ticks are more likely to be found on dogs, they are often found on cats as well. Both cats and dogs should be examined frequently for ticks.

Most often, ticks are found in the neck area, between the toes, in the ears and in the fold of the body between legs and torso. They may appear to be a small wart or seed.

Other than discomfort, ticks pose two basic threats to your pet's health. First of all, frequent scratching to get rid of a tick may break the skin and lead to a serious bacterial infection. Secondly, ticks—because of their blood sucking—lower an animal's resistance to disease and transmit infections from animal-to-animal.

In addition, ticks pose a threat to human health. They are known to transmit Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, a frequently fatal disease

to humans.

Many of the programs currently available for flea control are designed to help control ticks as well. Remember, however, that the program must be ongoing in order to be effective. Not all products used to prevent ticks are safe for all animals. The best person to advise you concerning safe products for your pet is your veterinarian.

Like many other external parasites that threaten small animals, ticks are experts at survival. They can go without food for as long as two years.

The female lays her eggs—as many as 3,000 of them—virtually anywhere. Therefore, your pet has only to roam outside the protected environment of your home to pick up new ticks.

Be on the alert. Protect your pet. Guard against ticks.

4-H Records A Key To Success

4-H records may be the key to success for a 4-H member. Record books help you to set goals, assume responsibility for keeping accurate information and see your progress as an active 4-H member. The 4-H record book is the deciding factor in winning a \$1,000 to \$1,500 scholarship or a trip to National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

To have a winning record book, you must choose to include information that is factual, well organized, and ac-

curate.

Judges review record books carefully to evaluate growth and development in all areas of 4-H participation and community activity. The record should illustrate the basic character of commitment and dedication.

A properly and neatly kept record book can mean a great deal in many other areas than just winning awards. It helps to evaluate your self and defines places for self-improvement. It also gives proof that all those long hours that were put into project work were well worth the time and effort. Records books will be due in the county 4-H office on June 27.

4-H Horse Project

The 4-H horse project offers much more than just the opportunity to participate in horse shows. If you do not own a horse, you may participate in other activities such as judging, visual presentation, record keeping, and public speaking contests.

To participate in horse shows, you don't have to have a high-priced, purebred animal to learn the skills associated with the program. Any kind of horse can show, but you must own the horse.

All 4-H horse project mem-

bers can enter district competition July 11 and 12, at Louisville, MS. You are eligible to enter halter classes in which competition is based on conformation of the animal in classes based on breed, sex, and age. The top three or four animals in each class get to compete in the state horse show to be held in Jackson, July 17 and 18.

You can also enter the district contest in the area of performance. You are judged on how well you ride your animal and how well the animal responds to your

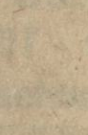
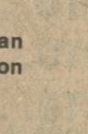

Understanding Heat Disorders

Anyone who works or exercises too hard in hot, muggy weather can develop a heat disorder: heat cramps, heat exhaustion, or heat stroke. This is especially likely to happen to joggers or other athletes or people doing hard physical work.

Heat cramps or muscle spasms in the stomach, arms or legs occur when a person sweats a great deal and doesn't drink enough salty liquid to replace what's lost.

Heat exhaustion usually occurs when a patient exercises strenuously in hot, humid weather and doesn't replace body salt and water lost by sweating.

Heat stroke is a life-threatening emergency. When exposure to heat and humidity causes the body temperature to rise to 105-110° the person collapses with heat stroke. He loses consciousness and his skin becomes red hot and dry because the body can no

longer produce sweat. General treatment for any heat disorder is to get the person out of the heat, give him all the water he can drink with a teaspoon of salt added to each glass of water or give some liquid that has salt in it such as Gatorade, have the person rest and avoid heavy activity for the next two or three days. For the person with heat exhaustion, this is a medical emergency. He is to be removed to a cool place, if conscious given the salted water, if unconscious remove his clothing and sponge him down with cool or cold water and seek medical attention immediately.

To prevent heat disorders drink plenty of water on hot summer days, don't push or overwork yourself, wear light-colored clothing and stop working or exercising if you feel even mild symptoms of a heat syndrome.

Diuretics First

Control of high blood pressure helps prevent strokes, kidney disease, and heart attacks. The first nondrug measures generally used include the restriction of salt in the diet, moderate exercise and weight reduction in those who are overweight. If nondrug measures do not provide adequate control, medicines may be used.

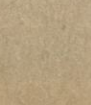
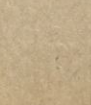
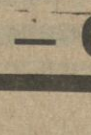
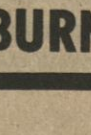
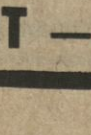
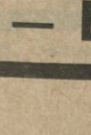
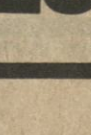
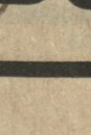
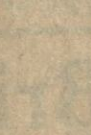
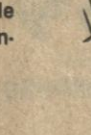
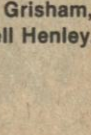
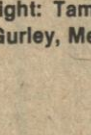
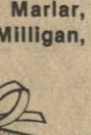
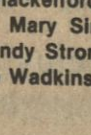
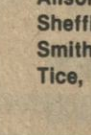
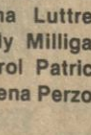
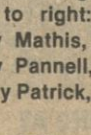
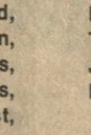
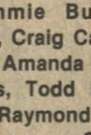
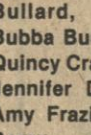
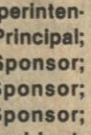
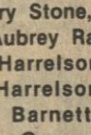
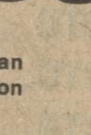
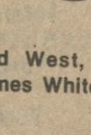
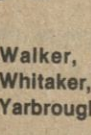
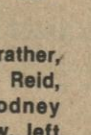
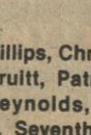
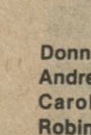
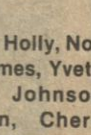
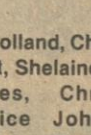
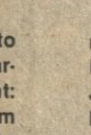
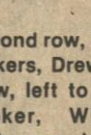
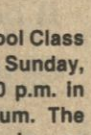
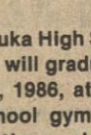
Diuretics ("water pills") are the mainstay of drug therapy in high blood pressure. Almost 40 percent of hypertensives will respond to diuretics and need only take this one medicine type. Diuretics increase sodium excretion from the body by blocking sodium reabsorption at the kidney. As sodium leaves the body, so does some of the water in the blood stream. The loss of water helps lower the blood pressure. Diuretics also lower blood pressure by other mechanisms that are not completely understood.

Many physicians look for a drop in blood pressure after three weeks of diuretic therapy. If the decrease is not adequate, other medicines may be added such as those which inhibit the actions of the nervous system or those which relax the blood vessels. These drugs seem to work best if the diuretics are continued.

Selecting Beef For Microwave Cookery

Many people don't use their microwave ovens to cook beef or other meats because they are afraid the meat will be tough or overcooked. Beef does very well, however, when cooked following basic instructions for the tenderness or type of cut.

Use these tips when selecting beef for microwaving.

*Choose beef with even marbling or fat cover for more even cooking.

*Choose roasts that are even in shape and thickness.

*Avoid cuts with bone on just one side of the meat.

*Consider buying lean ground beef rather than regular ground beef.

*Lean ground chuck will shrink less and accumulate less fat on the surface of the food than regular ground beef.

*"Stew meat" is more lean than chuck and will tend to be tough.

*Follow the oven manufacturer's suggestions for cooking various cuts or shapes of meat. For example, it may be necessary to rotate meatballs during cooking, or to rearrange the pieces for more even cooking.

*Consider using a ring shape for meatloaves and other meat mixtures instead of the traditional loaf shape. The meat will cook more quickly and more evenly when in a ring shape or in-

Hints For Microwave Poultry

Whole chickens, chicken pieces or turkeys cook beautifully in the microwave. The meat is juicy, tender and well-cooked.

Chicken pieces cook quickly. The arrangements of the pieces is important during cooking. Place thick parts to the outside of the dish. Put thin parts in the center. You may need to rearrange the pieces during cooking. Coating and sauces add flavor and a pleasing color.

The cooking time for whole turkeys or fryers is considerably shorter than in conventional cooking. The skin will turn an attractive brown, but does not become crispy. The breast and area beneath the wing may take longer to cook. It may be necessary to shield the legs and wings to prevent overcooking. To test for doneness of the breast area, pierce the meat under the wing. The juices should run clear, not red, when done. The leg should rotate and move freely at the joint.

Ducks brown nicely because of the high fat content in the skin. However, because of this fat, the pan will need to be drained several times during the cooking.

Cornish hens microwave well, but do not brown because of the short cooking time. A browning agent or sauce may be added to improve the color.

Refer to your owner's manual or standard microwave cookbook for specific poultry cooking directions.

1 broiler-fryer chicken, cut in parts
1 1/4 teaspoons salt, divided
3/8 teaspoon pepper, divided
2 cups water
2 large baking potatoes, baked

1 cup grated Parmesan cheese

COMMITTED TO THE IDEA!

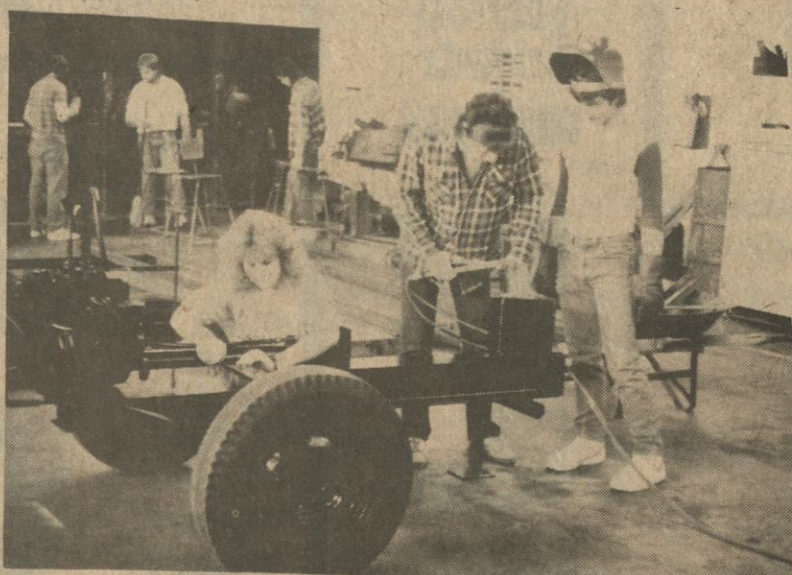

Diabetes and Mineral Deficiency

Can diabetes be caused by a deficiency of vitamins or minerals?

Animal experiments suggest that the mineral chromium may be involved, to some extent, in the development of diabetes.

The hormone insulin is lacking in diabetes. Either the insulin present in the body lacks effectiveness or the hormone is missing or in low levels. Chromium appears to work closely with insulin to help the body store the important sugar glucose, and then to use glucose for energy. Low chromium levels have been linked to the adult-onset type diabetes in humans.

Because many of the foods we eat are highly refined, many nutrition authorities are concerned that we are not getting enough of the mineral chromium in the foods we eat. Refining also removes other trace minerals that are necessary for a variety of body functions. Brewer's yeast is a rich source of chromium. The mineral is also found in some vitamin/mineral supplements.
