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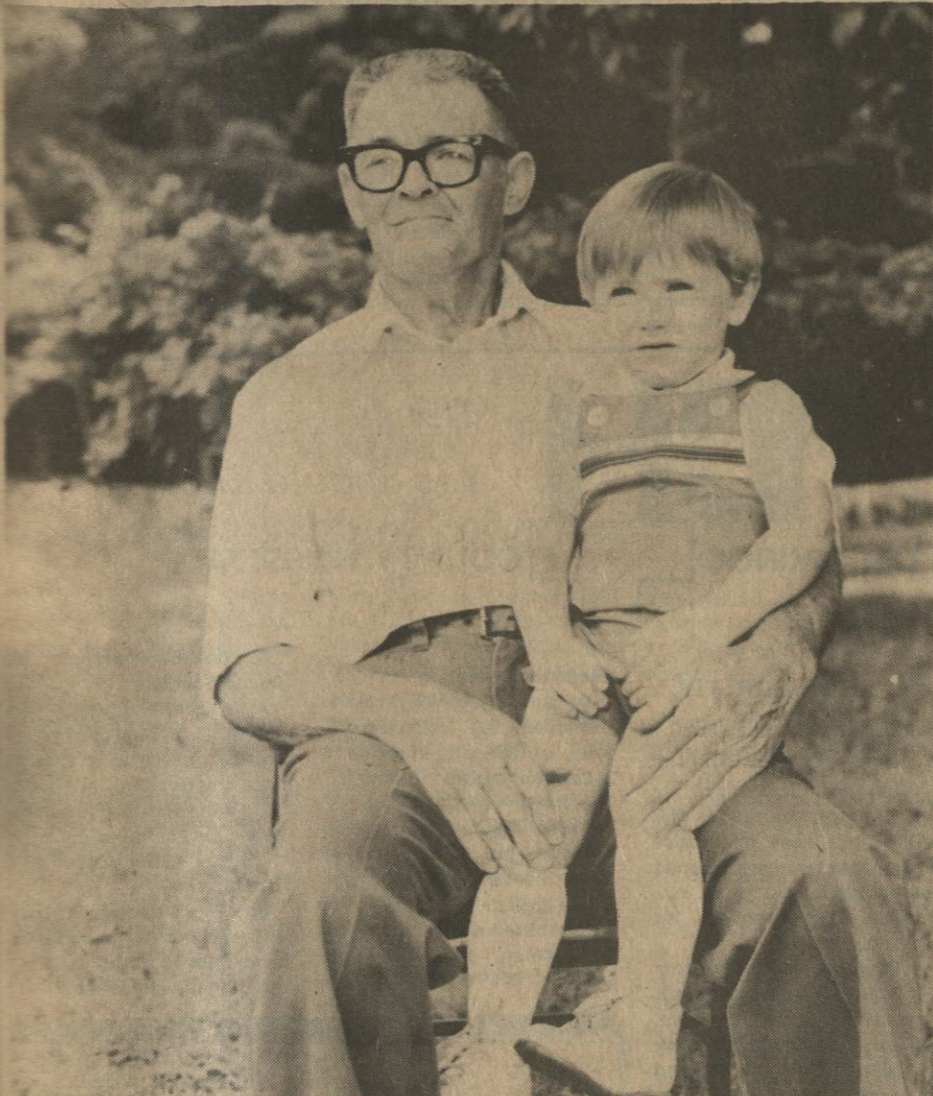

75th Anniversary At New Liberty

June 18-22, the New Liberty Baptist Church of Route 1, Glen, Mississippi, Tishomingo County, will be celebrating its 75th Anniversary with all former living pastors participating.

The Church was organized in 1911 with eleven Charter members. For several years, this group and others who joined, met in the two-room Holloway School building. The Chapel Hill Methodist Church graciously allowed the Church to use their building for revival meetings. Around 1922, the first building was constructed on land donated by Mr. Charlie Benick. In 1942 the Church was relocated in a more favorable location with much of the materials from the first building being used. Again the land was donated, this time by Mrs. Lou Thompson. The Church now occupies a new building, occupied in June 1985, on this same location with some additional land being given by Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Kennedy.

The first Sunday School was organized January 8, 1939, with 108 members. The Church began full time services, with the exception of 4th Sunday, which was reserved for many years as Chapel Hill preaching day, on August 23, 1942.

Over the past 75 years the Church has had eleven pastors and one assistant pastor. The early pastors were C.A. Deloach, W.L. Norman, A.L. Spencer, J.E. Bowland, M.C. Roland, and C.C. Perry. Bro. Perry who retired from the pastorate in 1965 served the Church a total of 39 years. The last few years of his pastorate, he was assisted by Bro. Horace Credille.

The Charter members of the Church were Mr. and Mrs. Walter Marlar, J.T. and Alice Hall, Garvin Hall, Pearl Hall, Mollie Hall, L.E. and A.R. Frost, George and Ella Marlar. These members who were inspired to begin this work for the Lord have all gone to accept their heavenly reward.

The celebration will begin on June 18 with Bro.

Talmadge White of Shady Grove Baptist Church, June 19 with Bro. Eddie Hamilton of First Church, Carthage, Mississippi; June 20 with Bro. Jimmy Bryant of South Sumnerville Church, Sumnerville, Georgia; June 21 with Bro. Raybon Richardson of Biggersville Baptist Church, Biggersville, Mississippi, and Sunday, June 22, all day services with Pastor T.E. Nethery in charge. Grace Bible Baptist Church Singers of Iuka and Harmony Hill Singers of Burnsville will sing in the afternoon.

A warm welcome is extended to all to attend these services. Evening services will begin at 7:30 p.m.

County School Bus Driver Training School

The first School Bus Driver Training School for the Tishomingo County Schools has been scheduled to begin Thursday, June 19-20, 1986, at 8:00 a.m. at the Belmont School.

Under the present regulations each regular and substitute driver must hold a valid bus drivers certificate from the Mississippi State Department of Education to be eligible to drive a school bus for the public schools.

Experienced drivers will be required to complete the first day only for a one year renewal certificate.

Each class will be limited to a maximum of 20 drivers. Each driver must hold a valid driver's license, a renewal receipt, or a permit to enroll in the course.

Anyone wishing to enroll in the course but unable to attend this class may attend one of the other schools to be announced at a later date.

Anyone may take the course but taking the course does not assure one of a bus route.

Bonds Low Bidder In Iuka Street Contract

Sealed bids for the construction of overlay of streets were opened in Iuka last Thursday with the contract being awarded to the William Russell Bonds Company of Burnsville.

Bonds was lowest bidder for the project with \$43,328.00. Frederick's Construction Company of Highway 25 South was second lowest bidder at \$43,856.50.

A description of the contract documents included a variety of items including: ditch clean out, linear grading, mixing, shaping and compaction, prime coat, asphalt cement, cover aggregate, seal aggregate and bituminous surface course.

The contract was awarded as an entire job with no individual items to be let for separate work.

Work began Tuesday on the project.

Industrial Expansion In Tishomingo County

The Mississippi Department of Economic Development reports that industrial announcements in Mississippi for the months of January-April 1986 will result in the creation of 4,407 new jobs with a total capital investment of \$178,246,900. Twenty-three new industries announced Mississippi plant locations, adding 1,859 new jobs at an investment of

\$27,279,000. Forty-two existing industry expansions will provide 2,548 with a capital investment of \$150,967,900.

Tishomingo County led the northeast corner of the state in industrial expansions and job creations during the first four months of 1986. Three industrial expansions and one new industry are expected to help create 234 new

jobs in Tishomingo County according to the report released by the MDED. The report did not indicate the dollar investment by the industries.

In Tishomingo County, new job creation was recorded as follows:

*Halsen Products, Belmont, (Specialty Chemicals) 34 new jobs created as part of an expansion.

*Metal Enterprises, Inc., Belmont, (Satellite dishes) 30 new jobs created as part of an expansion.

Rainbow Apparel Co., Burnsville, (T-shirts) 50 jobs created as new industry.

*Zinnia Furniture Corporation, Belmont, (Furniture) 120 jobs created as part of an expansion.

T.C.D.F. Faces Critical Period

In the monthly board meeting of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation, Chairman David Bonds presented to the T.C.D.F. Board members, members of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, town mayors and boards of aldermen, a major problem facing them. The problem is how to come up with enough money to continue to operate.

"The Development Foundation is the only county wide organization that is devoting full time to getting businesses or industry to locate in Tishomingo County and provide more jobs. The towns of the county benefit as do the businesses in the towns, and if they feel that what we are doing is getting results, then everyone needs to get behind the organization and fund it," stated Gene Jourdan, Chairman of the Development Authority. According to James Tennyson, Treasurer of the Development Foundation, there are now 107 members of the Foundation that have paid membership dues, but there are almost the same number who have not joined or paid their 1986 dues.

"If we could get the businesses and individuals that should know that they benefit when a new job comes to the county to join and make their dues payment, we would not have this cash flow problem. We started with a grant from TVA to get the Foundation in operation, but that money was for the first two years and has been used. We have to get local support and have to some extent, and the towns and the county are going to look at the situation and see what else they can do, so the businesses that depend on the Tishomingo County for their livelihood need to get behind us."

"An all out effort will be made in the next two weeks with personal contacts being made to get those members who haven't renewed or paid 1986 dues to get them in, and I ask that each one of you make a personal contact when we leave here," asked David Bonds, Chairman. In the meantime, the Mayor and Boards of Aldermen of each of the towns was asked to bring up at their next meeting, the question of putting funding into the Development Foundation. The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors will also meet with Foundation Directors to discuss how the county can more support, based on the legal allowances that can be used for economic development. "We welcome ideas and suggestions of how we can solve this funding problem, but we welcome more, the membership contributions of anyone who has not made their 1986 dues payment," said Chairman Bonds. "If we are to get out of this critical situation, we need to get full support of every business, individual and potential user of the Foundations job creation and recruiting efforts."

A report of the results of the Development Foundation's recruiting efforts was presented to the members present, and approximately 680 new jobs were announced since 1982.

This is based on start-up or expansion of new businesses which include Screw Machine Products, Sun Aire Products, Golden Sales and Kaydee Metals in Belmont; Monotech of MS, Shelton Trucking and Mid-South Drapery in Iuka; Toltec, Inc. and Post Welding Supply of Burnsville. The prospects being worked with presently include a pulp manufacturer, a steel fabricating plant, an industrial fastener manufacturer and a kiln drying/planning operation.

"In order to keep this work going on, we need a viable operation with funds to know if we can go ahead with plans to attract industry to our county," concluded Gerald Parsons, Board of Supervisors President.

This year's cash scholarship awards awarded by the Miss Mississippi Pageant will be in excess of \$33,000.00. Additionally, the University of Southern

Mississippi, University of Mississippi, Mississippi State University, Delta State University, William Carey College, Mississippi College, Itawamba Junior College, Northwestern Mississippi Junior College, and Mississippi University for Women will offer several thousand dollars in scholarships to Miss Mississippi contestants this year. 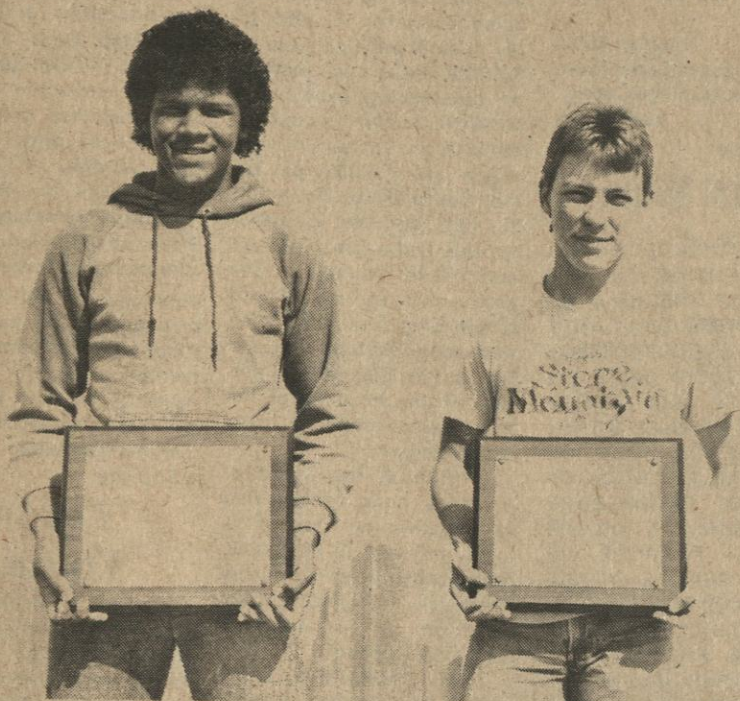

management are just a few of the many life skills learned by Tishomingo County 4-H youth.

4-H programs work with parents and families to teach these life skills. A family allowance is one important way children can put to use the skills they learn through 4-H.

Many families start allowances when children have a regular need for money, such as buying lunch at school. Other considerations might be children's ability to go to the store by themselves or to recognize coins and count simple change. Allowances are often given to preschool children twice a week, to school-age children once a week and to teens on a monthly basis.

Once started, allowances should be given regularly and not withdrawn for disciplinary reasons. However, sometimes a financial emergency may arise which makes it impossible to pay allowances. Parents can turn such situations into opportunities for children to learn about the realities of money problems by explaining the circumstances for stopping or decreasing allowance.

Families also need to determine how changes in the amount of allowance will be determined. Some families add to the amount each year after discussing expense needs with the child. Other families agree to increase the amount up to a certain age and then gradually decrease the amount to encourage the older teen to take responsibility for earning money.

If a family chooses this latter method, it is important that parents explain the possibility of future allowance decreases several years before they occur to prepare the child.

Regardless of the method chosen, children and parents must work together to make an allowance a valuable experience. Periodic family

Blight In Fruit Trees

Mississippi's crop of apples and pears may be sharply cut this fall because of an epidemic of fire blight in trees throughout the state. Some trees are so severely blighted they will have to be destroyed.

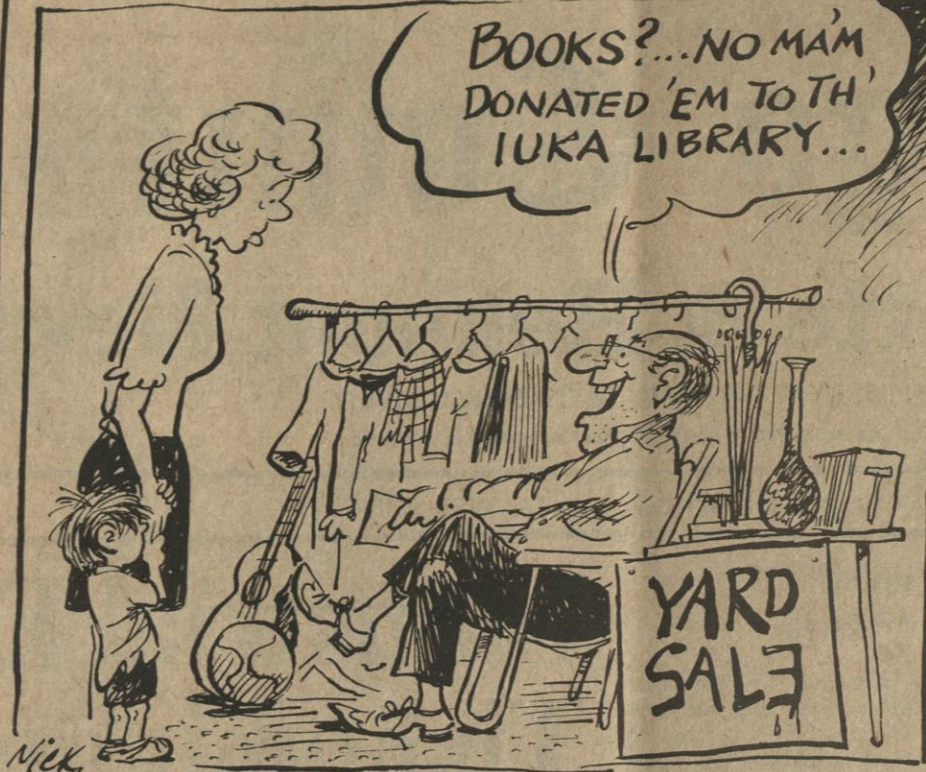
The blight usually begins in the open blossom in the spring, but the infection can continue throughout the summer and as long as there are actively growing shoot tips and spurs. The highly susceptible varieties are Golden Delicious, Yodi, Jonathan, Stayman and Rome. Although the varieties Einshlemer, Granny Smith and Yates are reported to have good tolerance to fire blight, they are also heavily infested this year.

Recommendations for controlling the blight include pruning blighted limbs and shoots eight to 10 inches below the infection's canker

and destroying the limb. Dip pruning shears and saws in 10 percent Clorox between cuts to prevent spread of the bacteria. During the bloom period next year, tree owners will need to apply streptomycin to trees that are susceptible to the disease to help prevent heavy fire blight infections.

Two important factors have contributed to high levels of fire blight this year. A long period of mild, frost-free weather preceded bloom this year, allowing large bacterial populations to develop and be spread by insects, wind and rain. After and during bloom, the hard freeze also caused injuries that allowed the bacteria free access for infecting the host plants. With the high temperatures this spring, the scattered showers and thunderstorms have been sufficient to spread the blight.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



Camping With Your Pet

Sitting around a campfire seems to bring out the best in all of us—including the family dog. Most dogs enjoy the outdoors as much as the most avid camper.

Fortunately for campers, most outdoor recreational facilities welcome pets. You will, however, want to check with officials at your specific destination before finalizing your camping plans.

Dogs are welcome throughout the 151 national forests, including all those in Tennessee.

National parks, including the Great Smoky Mountains, allow dogs. The animals, however, are not permitted to go along into the wilderness areas.

Officials at both the national parks and national forests ask that dogs be kept on a leash at all times. This is for the animal's safety as well as in consideration of other visitors.

The national parks also request that dogs remain in a tent or camper overnight, and that a little clean-up device be used to keep the campsite clean.

If you plan to visit one of the 38 state parks in Tennessee, you should know that animals are

not allowed in the state's overnight lodging facilities. And dogs in the parks are required to be leashed at campsites.

As a general rule, both public and private campgrounds are very accommodating. Many provide special exercise areas for dogs.

Many campgrounds require licensing and proof of a recent rabies vaccination, so it's a good idea to visit your veterinarian for a check-up prior to taking your dog on a trip.

Be sure and tell your veterinarian where you plan to go so he or she can alert you to potential dangers to your animal's health in that particular area.

After careful planning and consultation with your veterinarian, camping with your pet can be an enjoyable experience.

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An average weight loss of 2 pounds per week is terrific! Don't expect to lose pounds you gained over 2 years in 2 months. It's a set-up for disappointment.

2. Planning Means Control.
If you plan a whole day's meals and snacks in advance, you are less likely to stray and overeat. You will feel—and be—in control.

3. Find New Rewards.
Make a list of the things you enjoy but never seem to have time to do. Then use them to reward yourself when goals are met. Reward yourself often.

4. Discipline, Not Despair.
If you can't live without certain foods, learn to eat them in moderation. Hint: If ice cream is too tempting to keep on hand, walk to the store to buy a single scoop.

5. Make Mealtime a Pleasure In Itself.

Try to eat without the company of television, radio, or telephone. If you always eat while doing something else, eventually that other activity may "remind" you to eat even when you are not really hungry. Set the table, light the candles, and enjoy your meal.

6. Relax a Minute Before You Eat.

Take a moment to think about the meal you are about to eat, then eat it slowly.

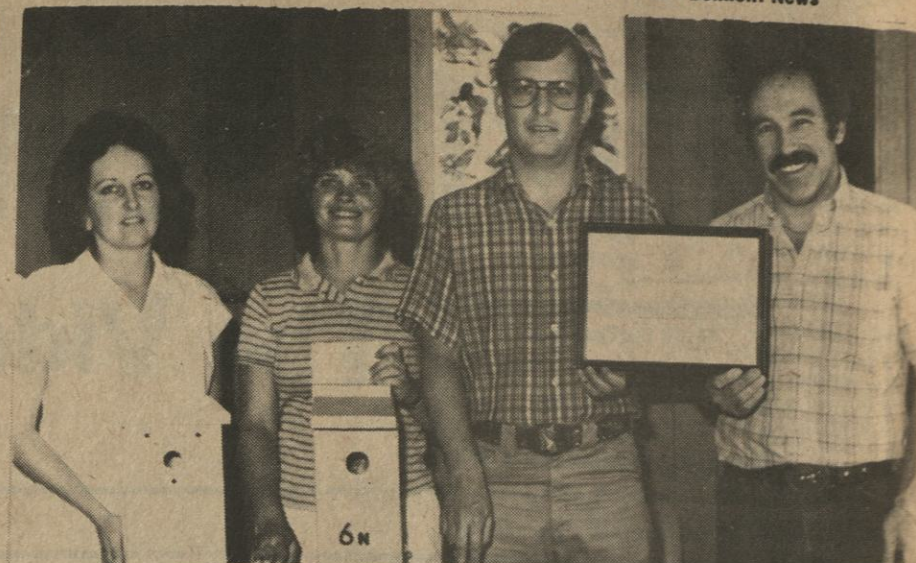

Weight Control

Changing Your Eating Habits For a Lifetime

1. Set Realistic Goals.
An average weight loss of 2 pounds per week is terrific! Don't expect to lose pounds you gained over 2 years in 2 months. It's a set-up for disappointment.

2. Planning Means Control.
If you plan a whole day's meals and snacks in advance, you are less likely to stray and overeat. You will feel—and be—in control.

5. Make Mealtime a Pleasure In Itself.

Try to eat without the company of television, radio, or telephone. If you always eat while doing something else, eventually that other activity may "remind" you to eat even when you are not really hungry. Set the table, light the candles, and enjoy your meal.

6. Relax a Minute Before You Eat.

Take a moment to think about the meal you are about to eat, then eat it slowly.

7. Uninterrupted Eating

Leads to Overeating.

Pause during your meals. Put down the fork between bites, or take sips of water to break your eating "rhythm".

8. Beware of Salad Bars.
Fresh vegetables are good choices, but ladies full of salad dressing can turn them into a high-calorie choice. Try using vinegar or lemon on your salad, or ask if low-calorie dressing is available.

9. Look Carefully at "Low Calorie Specials".

A "dieter's plate" consisting of a beef patty and cottage cheese may contain more calories than a chicken salad sandwich and leave you feeling less satisfied.

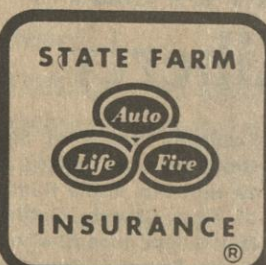

Alligator Turtle

Snapping turtles are heavily built with large heads and limbs which cannot be retracted into the shell. The one pictured is not "the" common snapping turtle, but rather is identified to be an Alligator Snapper by the shell which grows up to nearly 3 ft. long and bear three ridged keels. It was brought by The News late Monday by Kimberly Longoria of Iuka, who reported it to have been picked up

from a road at Mill Creek. The turtle reportedly weighed near 60 lbs. The alligator turtle is restricted to the United States, from Illinois to Texas and east to Florida. The Alligator turtle is one of the largest freshwater turtles and can grow up to 200 lb., larger weights of up to 400 lb. being unconfirmed. Unlike the common snapping turtle the eyes are set on the side of the head and cannot be seen from above. Alligator turtles are very sluggish, walking on

the bottom rather than swimming and, when disturbed in the water, their one idea is to escape. It is only when snapping turtles are found on land that they are aggressive. The alligator turtle lies in wait for its prey, half buried in the mud and camouflaged by the algae growing on its shell. From this concealed position the alligator turtle lures small fishes into its mouth by a most remarkable piece of deception. The tongue is

forked and the two branches are fat and worm-like. The tongue moves its tongue, making the wormlike tips wriggle and this attracts small fishes which are then promptly snapped up. Larger prey, including ducklings are also caught, but by more active hunting, not by means of the lure. The snapping turtles of America are well named and they need to be handled with caution.

Local Mississippi Army National Guardsmen from Company C, 1st Battalion, 198th Armor, recently completed their second phase of New Equipment Training (NET) on the M-1 Abrams Tanks at Camp Shelby, just south of Hattiesburg.

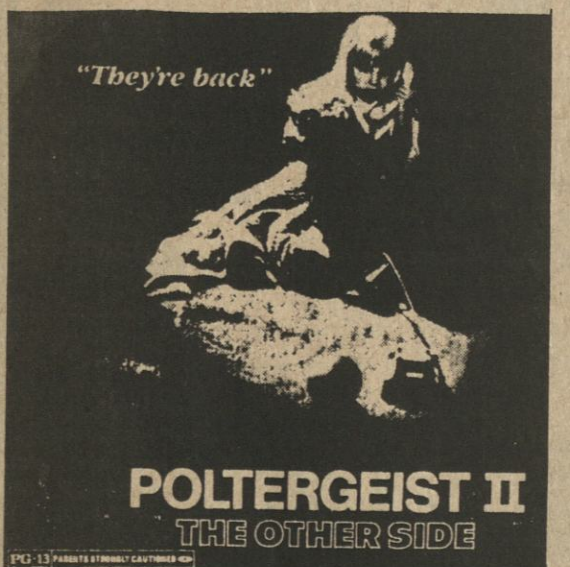

where Miss Annie lived until her death in 1962.

Then later, fire engulfed the house and claimed the life of Alexander (AL) Brown in 1963. Miss Annie will be remembered as a "saint of old". Her kind spirit and love for the Lord has made a lasting impression on her descendants.

Sam Brown and wife, Mary Doss were the parents of two children: Hafford and Clarence of Iuka. Following Mary's

death, Sam married Hattie Booker and their sons are Lonnie Brown of Ripley, MS, and Bobby Brown of Iuka.

Mr. Sam Brown was well known in this area for having operated the fish trap Hollow. Sam Brown and his sons were avid farmers and fishermen. Daddy has related to me many times how they peddled fish all over Northeast Mississippi in a Model-T Ford

and spent many a night at the fish trap during the depression years. My grandmother, Hattie Booker is remembered as a gentle soul who spent many hours laboring for those she loved. I did not know Mary Doss. However, she was the mother of two fine sons who are both still living. Clarence Brown is now 86 years old, and Hafford Brown is 88 years old.

Album "Great Big Yam Potatoes Recorded Some 50 Years Later"

Nearly a half a century has passed and John Brown and the music he played lives on in the heart of folklorists and especially in the hearts of his family and friends. John Alexander Brown (1872-1945) loved his fiddle and often played for family and friends.

Recently, the Library of Congress has chosen the album, "Great Big Yam Potatoes" as one of the best folk albums of the year. The album is the result of investigative work by the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, and it publicizes a group of outstanding musicians who were unknown in their time.

During May and June 1939, two WPA employees drove over dirt and gravel roads to record the music and stories of the songs. Using a mobile sound wagon Abbott L. Ferriss, and folk music specialist Herbert Halpert set up shop on front porches, barns, and in small clubs throughout the state to record ballads, roustabout songs, field hollers, work songs, and blues from the Delta and fiddle music from eastern Mississippi.

John Alexander Brown, a native of Iuka, performed for the WPA employees and in 1984 Tom Rankin produced the project after unearthing

the 1939 WPA recordings and interviews of 11 Mississippi fiddlers. The album includes three of John Brown's fiddle tunes: Dusty Miller, Rats in the Meal Barrel, and Wolves A-Howling. Also, the album cover is a profile of John Brown and his beloved fiddle as he was seated on the front porch of the old homeplace. The Brown's have enjoyed a wealth of musical talent, and the tradition has been passed on to succeeding generations.

Brown Family

Samuel Houston Brown is born in Finger, Tennessee, (McNairy County) in 1874. Sam Houston Brown is probably named after Samuel Houston, the legendary Congressman and Governor of Tennessee. His wife was Betty Pickins, who was born in Dumas, Mississippi. Samuel Houston Brown died in 1909, and his wife, Betty Pickins died in 1881. They were the parents of four children:

John Alexander (1872-1945) married Kathern Annie Campbell (1882-1962). Sam Brown (1874-1958) married Mary Doss (1879-1961) and following her death married Hattie Booker (1882-1962). Annie Brown who married Hunter and then Frank Brown. Nancy (Sis) Brown who married Lee Thorne. All of those present at the Brown Reunion were children

and grandchildren of John Alexander and Sam Brown. Annie and Nancy Brown have no known children.

John Alexander and Kathern Annie were the parents of 13 children: Althalee Layton, William (Bill), Mary Lou Goode, Charlie, Andrew (Al), Alexander (Alex), John Henry, Robert Fulton, Elizabeth Lewis, Noel, Owen, Lila Mae, and Lewis Ford.

John Alexander Brown was renowned in this area and across the state for his "fiddle playing". Recently, a collection of his fiddle tunes were recorded in an album entitled "Great Big Yam Potatoes" which was produced by the Mississippi Department of Archives and History. 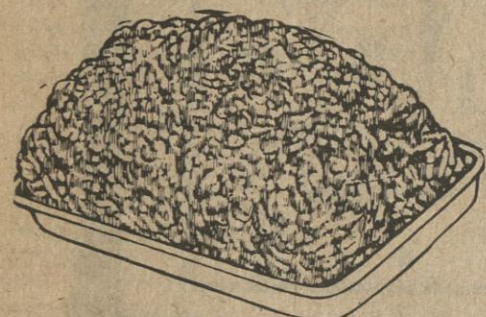

book. If it's of interest to you, it's of interest to others. Don't wait on additional information, cite sources and publish what you have written.

There are many different ways to publish material. When publishing, you may want to consider hiring someone to provide assistance. Some publishers provide an editor to guide you, point out mistakes and

proof-reading of your material. Mrs. Warren stated things to consider when publishing include binding, distribution, market area, advertising, and illustration. She emphasized picture reproduction was very expensive, but line drawings could be used instead to reduce cost.

Another important aspect of publishing is to know exactly what the publisher will

provide. She stressed a need for a contract to spell out the services to be provided. A contract could answer the questions about editing, indexing, and overruns. Mrs. Warren stressed indexing an "absolute must". Overruns should be kept small.

She said a little book was very good for recording family cemeteries. Cemetery information cannot be found in print in the public

depositories. Mrs. Warren suggested: binding a book, copies for gifts and family members, place copies in libraries, sell at an affordable price, postage paid. Generally, to set a price double the cost and add sufficient postage. A good rule to sell is on consignment which means discounting about 20%. She stated always be sure you own what you publish.

Now A Classic.

Do you know what a Model A Ford is?
Do you have a Model A Ford?

The Model A Fords are now in the ranks of Classic Automobiles. More than 4½ million were produced. The first one appeared November 1, 1927, and the last one came off the assembly line in August of 1931. Today though but in the 40 year age bracket, one completely restored has been known to sell for \$3,000.

Recently, in the Southern part of California a meet of

Model A's drew some 160 owners with their various restored Models, it was a

great day of reminiscing and exchanging of pleasantries among the owners, some of whom came attired in the styles of the period. Political buttons for Al Smith and Herbert Hoover were even displayed on some of the mens lapels.

Never was there a car more eagerly awaited by America, than the Model A. Nor one that proved to be more dependable and economical to own. After producing the Model T for 19 years, Henry Ford's son, Edsel convinced his father it was time for a new model. Before the A was seen by buyers, 400,000 orders were received for it. Once seen and driven the Ford Agency actually had customers standing in line to place their orders for it.

The standard business coupe sold for \$495.00. The roadster slightly less, both were available with or without the rumble seat. There were two sport coupe models, one with a stationary top and one, the convertible coupe, was canvas top that folded down and the standard sedan.

Although black was still available for body color after the years of the black Model T colors were favored. There was dark blue, a medium blue shade, green, yellow, and maroon.

A beige color canvas was

used for the tops on the sport models. The radiators were chrome, spare tires were mounted on the back of the car or at the right side behind the front fender.

Even though 1929 was the year of the stock market crash there were more "A's" sold that year than any of the four years of its production. The buying trend continued in 1930 with one and ¼ million sold that year, but by 1931 automobile sales were down, optimism was poor and times were hard. Ford production had dropped one half. General Motors were preparing to introduce free-wheeling a more powerful

engine and synchromesh transmissions.

By the middle of the year Plymouth was out selling Ford: the "A" production ended in August.

Free wheeling and 4 wheel brakes had become "Musts" for the car owner. Once these features were available but there are few former owners that won't tell you, "I never had a better car than my Model A".
