## Unemployment Rate Declines In County

Statistics released today by the Mississippi State Employment Service indicated a continued decline in the rate of unemployment in Tishomingo County at mid-May. Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, stated that the rate of unemployment had declined to 15.5 percent at mid-May, compared to 15.6 percent in April and 21.2 percent in May, 1985. The civilian labor force rose to 7,340, 10 percent above the previous estimate of 6,660. The number of unemployed persons stood at 1,140, 220 below the estimate for May, 1985.

Smith also stated that the civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo counties continued to rise at mid-May. An estimated 61,170 in April and 61,730 in May, 1985. The number of area residents unemployed climbed to 8,210 at mid-month, 80 above the previous estimate but 1,220 below the figure for May, one year ago. The rate of unemployment stood at 13.4 percent for the second month. One year ago it was estimated to be 15.3 percent. Area individuals employed stood at 52,960, 420 above the previous estimate and 660 above that for one year ago. The monthly rise was found primarily in Agricultural employment with the yearly increase noted in Non-agricultural Wage and Salaried workers.

Manufacturing employment in the six-county area climbed to 17,380 at mid-May, representing an increase of 100 from last month and 470 over one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment also increased at mid-month to 21,540, compared to 21,460 last month and 21,410 in May, 1985.

## State Jobless Rate Rises To 11.5%

The May jobless rate for Mississippi experienced a rise to 11.5 percent, according to the Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director, Robertson. This was an increase of five-tenths of a percentage point from one year ago when the rate was 11 percent. The May 1985 unemployment rate was a record 9.7 percent. The number of residence unemployed stood at 1,030,600, a labor force of 1,164,100. Persons employed in agricultural jobs registered a 10 seasonal increase and persons employed in non-agricultural jobs remained constant at 988,100. There were also 13,300 more persons employed than were

counted in May 1985. These increases were experienced in spite of the expanding numbers of unemployed individuals in oil and oil related businesses.

Manufacturing establishments provided 222,300 jobs, which represented the eleventh consecutive month of employment above 220,000. Nonmanufacturing jobs were estimated at 630,400, an increase of 1,600 from one month ago and 10,500 from May 1985.

There were 129,874 claims filed in May 1986 compared to 137,667 in April and 117,708 one year ago. There were 6,655 placements made from 8,771 openings received in Employment Service Local Offices.

## Farmers' Markets To Open

## Belmont Ordinance Prohibits Pool Hall Game Rooms

At the June 3rd, regular meeting of Belmont Mayor Earl Alexander and Board of Aldermen, an ordinance was duly passed and adopted which prohibits a game room or pool hall to be open on Sundays in Belmont.

The ordinance states, "It shall be unlawful for any person, individual, partnership or corporation to open or operate a Pool Hall or Game Room from 12:00 o'clock Midnight Saturday Night until 12:00 o'clock Midnight Sunday night."

The term "Game Room" shall be defined as any business establishment which has two or more video or two or more other game machines for use by the public.

Any person(s) violating the provisions of the ordinance are subject to be punished by fine not to exceed one hundred dollars or by imprisonment not to exceed thirty days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

# One Dead Following Shooting Near Iuka

A Thursday shooting involving two Iuka men has left one dead, the second facing murder charges.

Dead is James A. Johnson, more commonly known as "Goob", 22, of Oldham Road. Curtis W. Robertson, 25, also of Iuka, has been formally charged with murder by Tishomingo Sheriff Bob Payne in connection with the matter.

Another man, Ricky McCoy, of Belmont, who may be implicated in the case is under investigation, Payne said. No charges had been made against McCoy at press time, but were still pending, the sheriff stated.

The shooting occurred at Milligan's Spur service station on Highway 25 north about 5:30 p.m. Thursday, June 19.

According to Sheriff Bob Payne, the incident began as the two men apparently argued, then Johnson pulled

a bumper jack from his pickup and Robertson removed a gun from his vehicle and allegedly began firing. Johnson was pronounced dead on the scene.

Sheriff Payne reported he received the call from the dispatcher at 5:30 p.m. Upon his arrival at the scene the body, the bumper jack, and 15 or 16 spent shells were lying on the ground, but no weapon was found. Mr. Robertson had not left the scene and was awaiting the arrival of law officials.

The sheriff said a 9mm weapon was found later the same evening on the Chicken Run Road north of Iuka, and is believed to be the gun used in the shooting. The matter concerning the disappearance of the weapon from the crime scene is being further investigated, he said. There were possibly other witnesses, Payne said, but at press time none had been contacted or

questioned.

An autopsy was performed in Corinth by Dr. McLees with Dale White, County Coroner attending. White stated the findings indicate that Johnson's body received two glancing blows to the left leg; one projectile entered the back of the left hand, exiting through the thumb, the others in the chest and back area. According to White, death occurred when a projectile entered the heart lodging in the right pulmonary artery. The body was hit a total of eight times with six entry and five exit wounds. The evidence and findings have been sent to the crime lab in Jackson, White said.

Robertson was taken into custody by Sheriff Payne and released late Sunday after posting a \$20,000 bond. A preliminary hearing has been set for August 2.

Funeral services for James A. "Goob" Johnson were held

Friday, June 20, 1986, at the Cutshall Funeral Home in Iuka with Rev. Perry Murphy officiating. Burial was in Mt. Evergreen Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Linda Johnson of Iuka; one son, Jamie Dale Johnson of Iuka; his father, Alvie Johnson of Iuka; his mother, Rita McBrayer of Gadsden, Ala.; his stepmother, Libbie Johnson of Iuka; two brothers, Pete Johnson of Iuka and Johnny Johnson of Gadsden; one stepbrother, Chris James of Dallas, Texas; one step-sister, Yvette James of Iuka; his grandmother, Nellie Johnson of Iuka.

## Star Gazing Bonanza Planned For June 28

Tishomingo Elementary School students, their families and friends are invited to view planets and stars through two giant telescopes under the direction of Doug Fleury, Science Consultant from Corinth.

Doug has built these telescopes and has planned one of his famous "star gatherings" for Saturday night, June 28, beginning about 8:30.

The telescopes will be set up on Mr. Harvey Honeycutt's Longhorn Ranch just south of Midway on the east side of Highway 25. Parking space

will be along the highway and the adjacent graveled road-side.

Some of the heavenly bodies expected to be visible through the telescopes are at least three planets, including Saturn with her rings, which is beautiful at this time. Summer Constellations, Nebulae, star clusters, earth satellites, Meteors, and possibly deep space galaxies, are expected to be viewed. The star Antares, a rival to Mars in redness is on the agenda, as well as green and yellow stars. If your interest holds you can view rising

Mars between 10:15 and 10:30.

You may want to bring binoculars and a blanket to find out how to turn your backyard into an observatory. Also needed will be insect repellent, lawn chairs or blankets to sit on and perhaps a flashlight.

If you can see the evening star halfway up in the western sky the nightwatch will be held, however, should a cloudy sky prohibit the meeting, it will need to be rescheduled a month later.

## Mayor Shook Resigns, Hallmark Sworn In

James R. Hallmark has been sworn in as Mayor of Golden following the resignation of Dr. Raymond U. Shook. The new mayor will join the present Board of Aldermen which includes: Hollis Long, Addis Stanphill, Charles Parker, Noonan Patterson and W.E. Moore. Eddie Brown serves as Town Clerk.

Mr. Hallmark and his wife, Virginia moved to Golden in 1981. They had previously lived in Chicago, Illinois, for twenty-eight years. He had retired from the A & P Tea Company. The couples' five children all have families of their own.

Dr. Shook has served the town of Golden as Mayor for seventeen years and stepped down from office in order to take life a little easier, it was said.

He started his chiropractic practice in 1948 in Golden and immediately began to recognize the need for im-

provements in the town and ways in which he could help. Some accomplishments he was instrumental in initiating include: a town park, which is still in use at the same spot after approximately 35 years; converting his personal office into a post office; helping attract and opening a branch bank; construction of a new city hall; paved all streets and obtained railroad crossing lights.

Golden was reincorporated in 1967, 60 years sequent to the 1907 incorporation.

When the school was consolidated with Belmont, the Golden Civic Club was formed and the old school property was rented for a dollar a year. Bill Martin later began to use the property for Winfield Mfg. Company.

A Volunteer Fire Department was established, weekly garbage pickup began and an estimated thirty-five new street lights added,

during Dr. Shook's administration.

Reflecting on his service, Dr. Shook concluded, "We were all determined to make Golden a better place to live. There are many more projects to complete and Mayor Hallmark along with the Board of Aldermen have my best wishes."

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

If you are contemplating a major remodeling project, you should be aware of sales schemes and gimmicks.

In a demonstration home scheme, the person selling the home improvement will tell you that if your home can be used as a demonstration home, you will receive discounts or cash payments for each person who sees the demonstration home and also purchases the home improvement.

It is misleading when you are led to believe that you can easily pay for an inexpensive purchase merely by showing

the home to other owners who would also buy the improvement.

Bait-and-switch advertising is a scheme in which a seller advertises a product or service at an attractive price. After you have been baited into responding to the ad, the seller then attempts to switch you to a higher-priced item.

Beware of the knock-on-the-door salesman who claims your house needs new roofing or siding or other repairs and attempts to sign you up for this job on the spot.

Often, this is what is known as a fly-by-night company which comes into town, has the homeowner sign a contract, takes a down payment, may do some work and then leaves town. The homeowner then cannot locate the company to get unfinished work done or faulty work corrected.

Be wary of lifetime guarantees. If goods or services are

guaranteed for life, it pays to find out if this is for the life of the product, the homeowner, the home or the seller.

All product information should be read carefully. A homeowner should remember that a guarantee is no better than the person or company making it.

A written warranty on a product must be designated as "Full Warranty" or as "Limited Warranty". Read the warranty carefully and know what the warranty is before deciding to purchase.

If advertising practices of a company appear deceptive, do not deal with that company. A company that is deceptive when advertising is likely to be deceptive in other ways.

Take adequate time to make a decision before undertaking a remodeling project. A rushed remodeling project is an unwise remodeling project.

### Fried Cabbage With Noodles

- 1 cup dry noodles
- 3 cups finely-chopped cabbage
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- ¼ teaspoon caraway seeds
- ½ teaspoon onion powder

Cook noodles according to package directions, omitting salt. Stir-fry chopped cabbage in margarine over

medium heat until cabbage is tender but still crisp, about 5-8 minutes. Add drained noodles, caraway seeds and onion powder. Stir together gently. Makes 6 servings. Calories: 130 per serving.

## Motor Vehicle Inspection Increase

Effective July 1, 1986, motor vehicle owners and operators will pay \$5 to have their vehicles inspected.

James L. Roberts Jr., commissioner of public safety, said the measure

authorizing the increase was passed during the 1986 Session of the Mississippi Legislature and is the first inspection fee increase since 1972.

The Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol oversees the issuance of motor vehicle inspection stickers at approximately 1,300 inspection stations throughout the state and enforces guidelines governing the program, Roberts said.

Major Alton Rodgers, director of the Driver Services Bureau of the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol, said the increase from \$2.50 to \$5 allows the inspection station owner/operator to retain \$3 with the remaining \$2 going into the state's general fund.

Prior to the increase, \$2 went to the inspection station with \$.50 going into the state's general fund.

"With the inspection station receiving more money the mechanic performing the inspection will be inclined to be more thorough," Rodgers said.

"This will result in more vehicles with faulty or inadequate equipment being denied a sticker. The mechanics are governed by strict guidelines which must be adhered to when they make an inspection," he said.

According to the regulations established for motor vehicle inspection stations, there are 14 areas of review. The main inspection points are brakes and brake

lights, headlights, taillights, steering alignment, tires, windshield wipers, horn, glass, exhaust system, turn signals, shock absorbers and modifications of original equipment.

Authorized inspection stations or mechanics failing to properly inspect these checkpoints can expect disciplinary action to be taken against them by the Motor Vehicle Inspection Branch of the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol.

Automobile operators convicted of violating the inspection law because of an invalid inspection sticker may be fined up to \$100 plus additional assessment fees.

Rodgers said faulty equipment on automobiles is one of the major contributing factors in motor vehicle accidents throughout the nation.

"We believe that with inception of this law in Mississippi in 1981, road and highway travel became safer because of the removal of unsafe and inadequately equipped vehicles," Rodgers said.

The Motor Vehicle Inspection Branch issues approximately 1.5 million stickers annually, according to Rodgers.

Rodgers said the Highway Patrol is urging persons who are dissatisfied with the inspection they receive from an authorized station to report it to the Motor Vehicle Inspection Branch in Jackson at 987-1246.

## Merger Plans Announced

Officials of First Citizens National Bank and Deposit Guaranty National Bank today announced plans for the two banks to merge. First Bank and Deposit Guaranty reported total assets of \$257 million and \$2.8 billion, respectively, as of March 31, 1986.

The joint announcement came from V. E. Berlette, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of First Bank and E. B. Robinson, Jr., Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Deposit Guaranty. Berlette said that "by becoming part of the State's largest banking system, First Bank will be able to expand its range of services to the bank's customers while still keeping its regional flavor. There will be no change in our management or staff as a result of the merger, and we feel that this affiliation will be mutually beneficial to our customers and communities."

Robinson added that "Tupelo and other areas of Northeast Mississippi served by First Bank are extremely important to the economic progress of the State. We intend to continue to provide the customers of First Bank with the quality financial services they have come to expect. We are more than pleased that First Bank has decided to join the Deposit Guaranty family."

Under the agreement, shareholders of First Bank will receive 1,017,000 shares of Deposit Guaranty Corp. common stock in exchange for their 447,596 outstanding shares.

A preliminary agreement has been entered into by both banks and is subject to approval of a final agreement by the Boards of Directors, the shareholders of both institutions, and regulatory authorities. The merger was made possible by legislation authorizing statewide banking which was enacted by the Mississippi Legislature during the 1986 Session.

## Motorists Favor Raising Speed Limit

A nationwide poll revealed recently that a majority of motorists favor a speed limit exceeding the current 55 mph for major rural freeways.

The poll was part of a study conducted by the California Highway Patrol and the California Department of Transportation.

foot pit viper which is poisonous. Tom doesn't like the snake as having rattles and one button. The rattler was crossing the road when Tom took a stick to its head. The Segars Clinic report in this edition of News tells how to recognize poisonous snakes and to do in case of snake bite.

## SEGARS CLINIC REPORT



There are approximately 7,000 reported cases of poisonous snake bites each year. However, only about 10 people die from snake bite each year. There are numerous poisonous snakes in this area and they include the brightly colored coral snakes and the pit vipers, which include rattlesnakes, copperheads and cottonmouths. Pit vipers can usually be distinguished from non-poisonous snakes in that they tend to have a vertical slit in their eye, have a triangular head, and a stubby tail.

Snake bites occur mainly on the hands and feet. Therefore, when one is out in the woods he should be careful where he or she places his hands and should wear protective foot gear.

Snakes will bite only when they feel they are in danger. However, they can bite an hour and a half after they have been killed. This is by a reflex action.

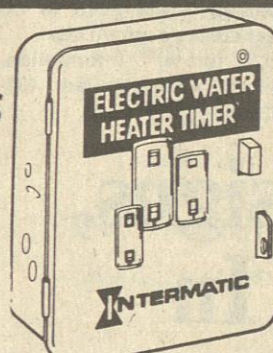
If you are bitten by a snake the most important thing to do is to remain calm. It is extremely unlikely that you will die from a snake bite. You should never use ice to bite, but you should immobilize the limb. Do not recommend people to cut the bite. Incisions into the bite can be helpful, but a lot of time can be lost this way if you are close to a hospital where you should make all the get to the emergency room as soon as possible. It is helpful to kill the snake and bring it to the hospital for identification, but do not take too much time trying to kill the snake. Remember, the first priority is to get to the hospital as soon as possible.

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## CARING FOR YOUR PET



### Avoid Hot Weather Problems

People who own dogs should remember that their pets can suffer the effects of summer heat and humidity just as humans do.

Heatstroke can be a very serious threat to a pet during warm weather. Death can occur in a very short while if an animal suffering from heat stress does not receive proper attention.

Remember, your pet doesn't perspire the way you do. The animal's cooling system is in its lungs. So your dog needs cool air.

Never leave your pet in a parked car when it's warm or humid outside—not even for a "quick errand". A parked car—even one parked in the shade and with the windows left open as much as four inches—can be a death trap for the family pet.

For example, if it's 85 degrees outside, it would take only 32 minutes for the temperature in a closed car to reach 120 degrees. When a dog's temperature rises just a few degrees, severe brain damage or heat stroke can result.

Be sure and provide cool shade and plenty of clean, fresh water for your pet. As the temperatures rise, your animals tend to drink more water.

Make sure your pet doesn't overexert during the hot part of the day.

If your pet exhibits signs of heat stress—panting, a staring or anxious expression, failure to respond to commands, warm dry skin, extremely high fever, rapid heart beat or collapse—the recommended first aid is to immerse the animal in cool (not cold) water immediately. Spraying the dog with the cool water from the garden hose will help.

Then take the animal to your family veterinarian.

Special care and precautions can make the summer safer and more enjoyable for you and your pet.

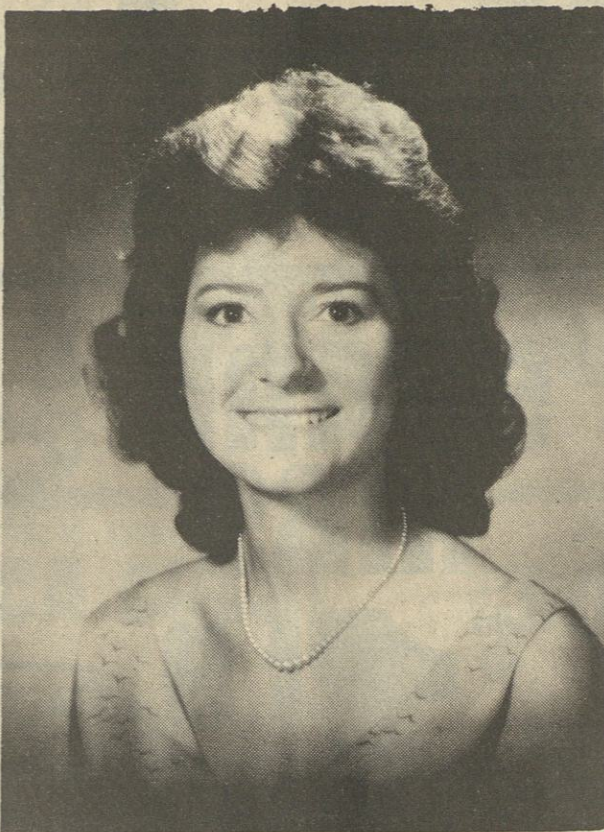

### Narcotics News

Donald Butler, Director Q. I understand the Bureau of Narcotics can seize vehicles that are in some way connected with drugs. Could you explain?

(D.P. Bolton, MS)

A. Vehicles, airplanes, boats, or any type of conveyances which are used or intended for use to transport illegal drugs, or to facilitate the violation of the drug laws, may be seized and forfeited. There are two purposes for the forfeiture laws. First, they attack the mobility of the drug traffickers and make it more risky and costly for them to move and merchandise the illegal drugs. Secondly, the forfeited vehicles may be used as undercover cars or may be sold and the proceeds used in drug enforcement. In these days of governmental budget cuts, the money gotten from the sale of forfeited property helps fund the drug enforcement efforts of our law enforcement agencies.

over them. Scoop them up and carefully put them in the jar. A crumpled up newspaper will give them a place to hide. Also they won't go crazy when you put more crickets in the jar.

They are easy to keep alive. When you are through collecting, put a scrap of cloth over the mouth of the jar. Hold in place with a rubber band. All they'll need for food is a little oatmeal, a slice of apple or a small leaf of lettuce for moisture. Keep the jar out of the sun and in a cool place if possible. Since they don't sing you can bring the jar in the house and they won't keep you awake.

You can turn in your crickets and get registered on Saturday morning from 8:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m., June 28, at Wal-Mart in luka. We will get your name, telephone number, and where you found your crickets. Each entry will be registered. The first family to turn in the rare camel cricket with the orange stripe will get a Peterson Field Guide to the Insects with a presentation to the family from Dr. Hubbell. And the Vidette will take your picture too.

Doug Fleury, a science consultant in Corinth, has been helping Dr. Hubbell on his project for the past three years. Fleury will be at Wal-Mart to help with the cricket registration. He will be available to answer questions about insects.

different from the other kinds because it has an orange stripe down its back. It was first found in Tishomingo County in 1933. Other counties are looking for it. If they find it first, they will be written up in the book and Tishomingo will take second place.

The rare Tishomingo species live in hollow trees near streams. They come out to look for food on the level areas above the streams banks. They especially like flood plains that get cleaned off every spring. In the day time, you can find them in their hiding places. At night, you can find the small ones that live under rocks and in hollow trees. You need a flashlight and a plastic jar with some paper towels stuffed in its mouth. The paper towel makes it easy to get into the jar. Plastic won't break if you drop it. You can make a trail of bait that you can check throughout the evening. Walking down a path or around a "hot" spot, you can scratch a bare spot with the side of your foot, one or two swipes is enough then, put down a pinch of rolled oats or oatmeal. This is very close to the kind of things they eat...only better. Go back over your bait trail and look very carefully with your flashlight. Other things will steal some of the bait, but there will be camel crickets too. Shine the light to the side of the trail. Some crickets will carry off their "meal" to eat somewhere else.

Now comes the tough part. How do you catch them. If you saw the "Karate Kid", you remember when the boy caught the fly with the chopsticks? You have to be as fast as that to catch a camel cricket. They have long feelers. If you do not come up on them quiet they will hop away. Come up on them slowly. When you get arms-length away, come up quickly and lightly cup your hand

until 1:00 p.m., there will be a Camel Cricket turn-in booth at the front of the Wal-Mart in luka. Your live crickets will be logged in. We'll take information about when and where you got them. If you find unusual or even a new species of Camel Cricket, we will get back to you. All the sites where crickets are collected will be given credit.

After the crickets are used by Dr. Hubbell, a complete set of Mississippi Camel Crickets will be given to the Mississippi Entomological Museum at Starkville. Tishomingo County can be the biggest contributor to this collection.

A camel cricket is a brown, humpback cricket with very long legs and feelers. It doesn't have wings, so it can't make any sounds like its cousins the field and house crickets. These are the crickets that live inside your well house or water turn offs. They come out at night to look for food. They eat little bits of seeds and plant materials. They are very important in helping make rich soil in the forests. The largest species is very common. Some of the smaller ones are scarcer and one or two are rare. One rare one is only found in Mississippi. It has a body about an inch long. It is

In the last 50 years, the specimens he collected in Tishomingo County have gone bad. They have lost their color and can't be used in the new book. This means that Tishomingo County and much of Northeast Mississippi won't be given proper credit for these critters. Everyone can help make sure that Tishomingo County is properly done up in the new book. If we collect live camel crickets, they can be prepared and sent to Dr. Hubbell. He will use them to update the Tishomingo sections of the book.

### Step Tishomingo County On The Map

Early in the 1930's as Pick Dam was being built, an insect scientist came to Tishomingo County and collected Camel Crickets.

In 1935, Dr. Theodore H. Hubbell published an 800 page book on American Camel Crickets. Dr. Hubbell was a Professor and Director of the Museum of Zoology at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor.

Hubbell is now 88 years old and is rewriting his book.

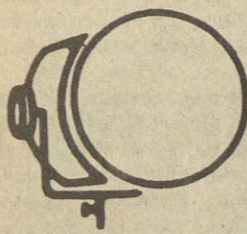

### Wagon Train Heads To Natchez And "Back To America"

It's daylight on the Natchez Trace as members of the wagon train prepare for another day of moving south toward Natchez. Moving at about 4 miles an hour and marking 15 to 24 miles at the end of the day. No, it is not the filming of a movie. It is an authentic wagon train participating in the Back to America celebration and the dedication of the Natchez Trace Parkway's completion to be held in Natchez July 3, 4, and 5.

Dr. James Nelson, a Baldwin veterinarian and wagon enthusiast who organized the train, said he expected as many as 500 participants from Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, Louisiana, and 16 other states and 100 wagons drawn by horses and mules. With wagons leaving while others are joining the train, there will be 50-100 wagons at all times.

The train departed June 8 from Shady Grove, the northern end of the Natchez Trace. At its lead are three replicas of prairie schooners, each representing Mississippi, Alabama, or Tennessee, the three states through which the Natchez Trace is carved. The three schooners were part of 50 state prairie schooners used for the 1976 U.S. Bicentennial wagon train through 13 states from California to Valley Forge, PA.

Dr. Nelson was a participant in the Bicentennial wagon train and during that ride conceived the idea of the Natchez Trace wagon train.

Traveling on the National Parkway that was already an ancient trail in 1540 when Don Hernando de Soto and his Spanish conquistadors came upon it, this wagon train pays tribute to the Natchez Trace as a key route to the opening of the American West.

The wagon train makes camp each night along the Trace. Though some of their camp sites are rather civilized ones, others could be the same ones used by pioneers bound for Texas and by General Andrew Jackson and his troops enroute to the Battle of New Orleans.

Tupelo was the train's stopover on June 15. The group then passed by Houston, Mantee, Mathison and French Camp before reaching Kosciusko to spend June 20 and 21. The train will camp on the banks of the Pearl River near Carthage before arriving at Madison on June 24. June 25-27 will be spent at Jackson encamped at the Fairgrounds. With more stops near Raymond, Utica, Rocky Springs, and Port Gibson, the wagon train will reach the present end of the Trace on July 2.

The wagon train will kick off the Back to America Celebration in Natchez on July 3. Mayor Tony Byrne of Natchez will present the group with a key to the city and honorary citizenship. Following a ribbon cutting

ceremony for the completion of the Trace into Natchez, the wagon train will parade in Liberty Park where the wagons and livestock can be viewed through July 5.

The Back to America Celebration is sponsored by the Natchez Convention and Visitors Commission. Carolyn Denton, Director, said the activities will begin July 3, at 4 p.m. with a free concert presented by the Natchez Community Band and Choir. The concert will include narration and visual effects.

Fourth of July festivities will last from 11 a.m. until 11 p.m. There will be an arts and crafts show, Bar-B-Que wagon rides for children and a square dance demonstration. For adults there will be a home run contest and fireworks display, and a late night street dance will cap off the evening.

More fun and food will be served up on July 5 under the live oaks in Memorial Park in downtown Natchez. Children aged 6-15 will compete for trophies in a skateboard contest. Live music will accompany a seafood jamboree sponsored by the Natchez Restaurant Association. Everyone will be entertained by Association members as they compete in such rites as waiter's race, chef's spaghetti-eating contest and manager's balloon throw.

The Celebration will end July 5 with the finals of the Tri-State Rodeo held that evening.

Mrs. Denton said "We welcome everyone to participate in Back to America." "The celebration is being offered at Natchez hotels and motels and breakfast is available at some of our state antebellum mansions."

Q. Is it true that there is a law allowing the Bureau of Narcotics to seize a person's land? What if they know nothing about drugs being grown or used on the land?

(C.L. Flora, MS)  
A. Yes. In 1985, the Mississippi forfeiture law was amended to allow seizure and forfeiture of everything of value, including land, which is used or intended to be used to facilitate the violation of our drug laws. Thus, land on which marijuana is grown would be forfeitable, as would land or other real property which is used in violation of the drug laws.

The forfeiture laws protect innocent owners of seized property, so if an owner did not know the marijuana was being grown, or that his land was otherwise being used in violation of the drug laws, the owner would not lose his land.

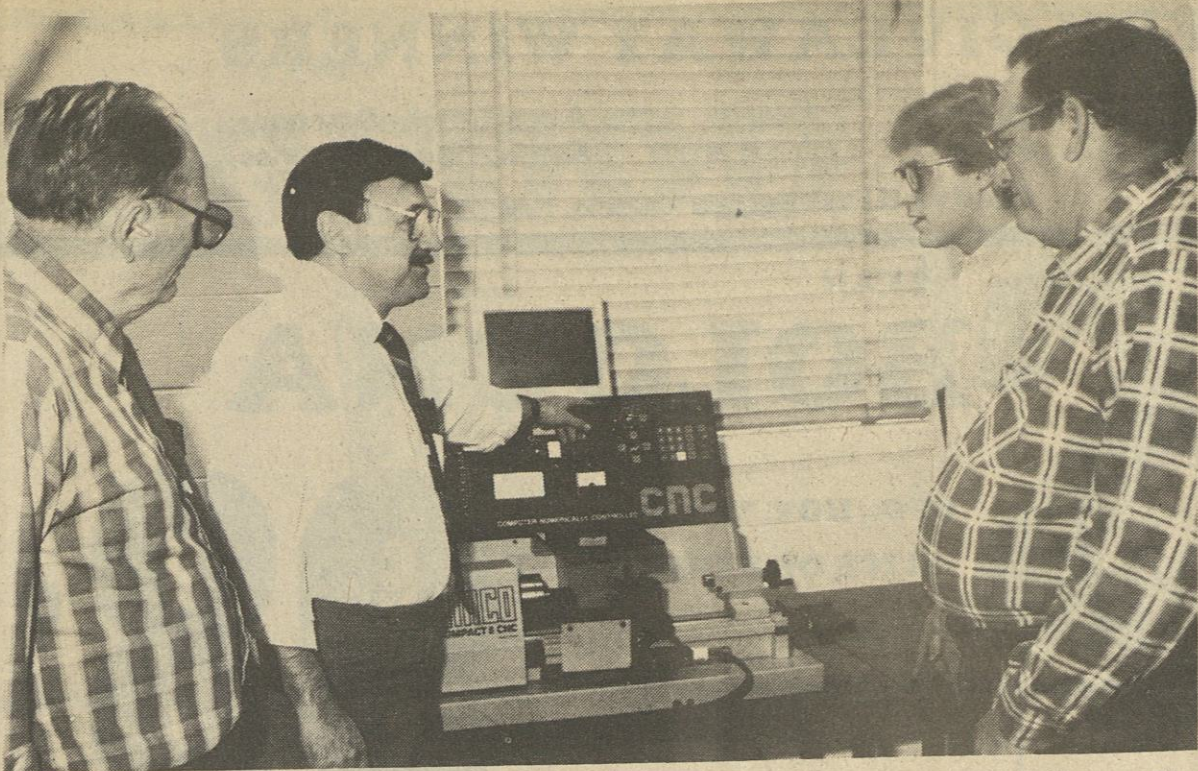

Mississippi Forestry Commission

No more personal checks accepted after July 1, says Forestry Commission

A new policy with regard to payments by check to the State Forestry Commission for services rendered under the Agency's various programs was announced this week by State Forester Robert S. "Sid" Moss.

The new policy simply states that effective July 1, 1986, the Commission won't accept any more personal checks for the purchase of tree seedlings; in payment for timber improvement work done by Commission personnel, etcetera.

According to Moss the policy change was prompted by a change in accounting procedures recommended recently by the Agency's Internal Auditor.

After July 1, the Com-

mission will require that payments to it be made only via money order, cashier's check or certified check.

Moss said the stringent new policy was caused by a "double whammy" affect on the Agency's budget of having to re-process checks and/or not being able to collect on them at all.

"Under the circumstances we are having to squeeze every good, usable dollar we can out of budgeted monies and the increased volume of bouncing checks inherent in the expanded Forest Resource Development Program was causing us significant budgetary problems.

Moss said he felt like most of his Agency's clients would have no real problem with the change in payment method. "They'll have plenty of advance time to get these payments together in the accepted manner," he noted.

Surplus Food Distribution

The Tishomingo County Welfare Department announced today that U.S. Department of Agriculture surplus commodities will be distributed Thursday, June 26, 1986, beginning at 8:00 a.m. The following items will be distributed to eligible households: 2 - 5 pound blocks of cheese, 1 pound of butter, 1 three pound jar of honey and 1 five pound sack of flour.

Those households who receive food stamps by mail will have vouchers enclosed with their June food stamps. Food stamp recipients who pick up their stamps will get their voucher with their June allotment. All other certified households (self declared income) will have their vouchers mailed on June 11, therefore, it will not be necessary for these households to come to the Welfare Office to pick up their vouchers. Households that do not receive a voucher by mail will need to come to the office to have their certification updated. Anyone wishing to make an application may apply after June 13. Eligibility is based on income.

Misrepresentation of need, or sale or exchange of USDA commodities, is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance Program is available to all eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap.

Those receiving the surplus foods are requested to bring a paper sack for their convenience in carrying the items.

Point Of Law

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your legal rights.)

Q. My former husband is several months behind in the payment of child support but he still visits with our children on weekends. Can I prevent him from visiting until he catches up on his support payments?

A. You should not prevent visitation because support payments have not been made. Support and visitation are independent rights. Your former husband has the right to visit whether or not he ever pays child support, and conversely, owes the obligation of support whether or not he ever visits. Refusing

visitation will subject you to contempt of Court. Should your former husband fall as much as three months behind in paying child support, you should contact your lawyer.

Q. I bought a car and financed it through my local bank. Shortly after I bought the car, I lost my job. After missing several payments I let the bank have the car back. Now the bank says I still owe them money. Do I have to pay that money when I don't even have the car?

A. The creditor must sell the car in a commercially acceptable manner. If the car is resold for less than what you owe on the account, you will be charged with the difference. The bank may obtain a judgment against you for the remaining balance of money owed.

## Things You Should Know

### TISHOMINGO COUNTY HOSPITAL

According to recent national and state surveys, there is considerable cause for alarm about teenage drug abuse. Findings from surveys sponsored by the National Institute of Drug Abuse (NIDA) from 1975 to 1984 revealed that 54.9% of high school seniors had tried marijuana. Nearly 30% used marijuana; and six percent of those smoked daily. Two-thirds of senior students drank alcohol occasionally and over five percent drank some alcohol daily.

Although rates of marijuana use have leveled off in the last seven years, the use of cocaine has increased. One of every seven high school seniors has tried cocaine. Trends are towards earlier drug use, often in junior high school. In fact, according to a recently released California statewide survey, a major increase in drug use occurs between the seventh and ninth grades. By the 11th grade, more students are likely to be smoking marijuana than tobacco cigarettes. There is also a growing number of polydrug abusers, including most daily marijuana smokers, who will use whatever drugs are available.

**WHAT CAN PARENTS DO?** There is no simple solution to the problem of teenage drug abuse. The evidence suggests that parents who are authoritative rather than permissive or extremely rigid are most effective. There is no substitute for a close relationship between parent and adolescent. Teenagers need to feel that parents are willing to listen and take children's needs into consideration.

It is also important for parents to know their teenagers' friends. Teenagers who use drugs tend to have friends who share the same attitudes about drugs. Since peer pressure is such a powerful influence in the lives of teenagers, parents need to know where their children go and with whom. Communication with other parents can help to ensure that parties and other activities are supervised, that other parents share your at-

titudes about drugs, and that general rules about curfew are agreed upon.

#### WHAT IF YOU SUSPECT DRUG ABUSE?

If you think your child or teenager has tried marijuana or other illegal or legal drugs, such as alcohol, try to remain calm. Anger and emotional outbursts can only interfere with your ability to communicate. Because drug abuse is such an emotional issue, you may find yourself unable to control your feelings. If this is the case, consider bringing in a third party, such as a licensed therapist or counselor, whose advice and counsel both you and your teenager will respect.

Parents should be especially concerned when children have a history of rebellious behavior or school problems. Teenagers who use drugs tend to have lower self-esteem, be more depressed and more alienated. (See our chart, "Clues to Possible Drug Use.") In fact, some teenagers become regular users in order to cope with depression, anxiety and other problems.

A teenager using drugs must be confronted. Often the school or other authorities may bring a child's drug use to the parent's attention. Parents may feel naturally defensive in such a situation. However, parents who excuse or minimize behavior, or who blame and attack the accusing authorities, usually do their teenagers a disservice. Schools are usually fair in these serious accusations; while parents have every reason to want to believe their child is not using drugs.

Parents need not feel guilty or ashamed because of their teenagers' drug use. Because peer pressure is so strong for teenagers, even children whose parents have set a good example of moderation can be caught up in drug abuse.

Your most helpful tool in dealing with a teenager's drug use will be information. The National Clearinghouse for Drug Abuse Information has many free pamphlets (see chart for a list of titles). NIDA

also has free pamphlets for the public. If the teenager's drug abuse is new, treatment may be easier. However, if a child is a daily user of marijuana, cocaine, amphetamines or alcohol, a treatment program will most likely be required to break the cycle.

#### TREATMENTS: WHAT WORKS?

Many kinds of drug treatment programs currently exist. None has been clearly established as the most effective. Most successful programs involve the family and use peer groups. Self-help groups modeled after Alcoholics Anonymous are popular and appear to be valuable. While lay counselors, including former drug abusers and peer counselors, can be quite effective, programs should have some professionally trained and licensed supervisory staff. There are now many licensed social workers, psychologists, psychiatrists and physicians who specialize in treating drug abuse.

If parents decide to enter their child in a treatment program, they should make sure it is not sponsored by a religion or cult which is contrary to their values. To be really successful, a treatment program must expect abstinence. Inpatient programs should provide outpatient follow-up. Existing programs in your community can be located through your family physician, local medical society or community mental health department.

#### PREVENTION WITH COMMUNICATION AND EDUCATION

The real key to halting drug abuse among teenagers is to prevent its start. Parents can begin an ongoing dialogue about drug use with their children prior to adolescence. Television programs, movies, music and newspaper stories offer many opportunities to begin discussions. Parents should be clear with their children about their beliefs and expectations regarding drug use.

There are many arguments against drug use. Drugs are illegal, expensive and

unhealthy. Teenagers should be informed about the health effects of marijuana, which include chronic respiratory infections, possible harmful effects on pregnancy, delivery and reproductive system and exposure to carcinogens. (One marijuana cigarette may contain as much tar as 16 tobacco cigarettes.)

Efforts by parents to increase awareness should include the involvement of other parents, the PTA, school teachers and counselors, the clergy, police departments and members of other agencies. Encouraging alternative recreational activity is most valuable. Schools are now developing drug education programs for grammar and junior high schools. These programs do not focus exclusively on the dangers of drug use. They also teach responsible decision making and how to say "NO."

This is followed by depression, fatigue and irritability as the drug wears off. Inflammation of nostrils is associated with chronic snorting of cocaine. Paranoia and hallucinations can occur.

\*SEDATIVE-HYPNOTICS: Sleepiness, drunken appearance with slurred speech, poor coordination, giddiness, irritability, hostility.

\*PCP: Bizarre behavior, muteness, odd or frozen posture, hallucinations, aggressive behavior, numbness, amnesia.

## Train Children To Eat Well

All parents know they can lead a preschooler to the table, but they can't make that child eat. Chances are, if you are reading this article, you are one of the many parents who is concerned about the way your child eats.

As a guideline for portion size, the American Dietetic Association advises one tablespoon of every food served for each year of age, but this varies from child to child, and even from day to day.

Children should eat only enough to satisfy their hunger. Remove food or let the preschooler leave the table when he begins to play with the food, becomes restless, or sends signals of "no more."

When they are four or five years old, children may be more interested in play activities than in eating, and appetite may wane. If the child is developing and growing normally and is eating a variety of healthful foods, the child isn't starving.

Avoid nagging, forcing and bribing. Appetite typically resumes at the child's next growth spurt.

Dieting can be dangerous during the early years. Parents of overweight children should talk to a doctor about a program to help control additional gain until height catches up to weight.

Feed children on a regular schedule with enough time between meals to build up an appetite. This means no "pacifier snacks" while standing in line at the supermarket or food for a picky eater half an hour after lunch.

Younger children often need five small meals a day because their stomachs have limited capacity. Plan nutritious snacks as part of the daily meal schedule.

Children don't need specific foods, they need specific nutrients, like vitamin A, calcium and iron. There are many food sources of each nutrient. Try a wedge of cantaloupe in place of sweet potatoes. Milk rejected? Offer cheese and yogurt.

Liver lovers get bonus amounts of iron, but tots and their families may prefer getting their iron from ground beef and fortified cereals.

The key is variety. Offer different kinds of healthful foods and children will learn to enjoy many of them.

It isn't unusual for a preschooler to insist on a certain food or combination of foods. Allow this for a few days. If parents complain about the food jag, the longer it is likely to last.

Even though other foods may not be accepted, continue to make them available, just in case the child decides it's time for a change.

When whole categories of food are rejected for more than two weeks, ask a pediatrician or registered dietitian to evaluate the child's diet.

Don't say sweets are bad and then turn around and offer them as special treats. On the other hand, totally forbidding sweets makes them overly intriguing later when there is access to "sweet treats" outside the home.

What parents buy and serve at home is their choice. If parents don't want their children to eat certain foods, they shouldn't have those foods readily available. This can avoid potential psychological warfare with children.

Most cereals have some sweeteners added (sucrose, sugar, corn syrup, honey, molasses). Major manufacturers now show the amount of sucrose and other sugars on the label of ready-to-eat cereals.

Control sugar intake by buying cereals that have six grams or less of sucrose per serving. Add little or no additional sugar at the table. Vitamin-fortified cereals without excessive sugar are a good breakfast choice.

The milk that is usually eaten with cereal helps prevent tooth decay by "washing" sugar off the teeth.

Give preschoolers milk, fruit juices or water, instead of less nutritious drinks. Soft drinks and sweetened fruit drinks can quickly become favorite beverages and displace more nutritious food choices. Save this battle until adolescence!

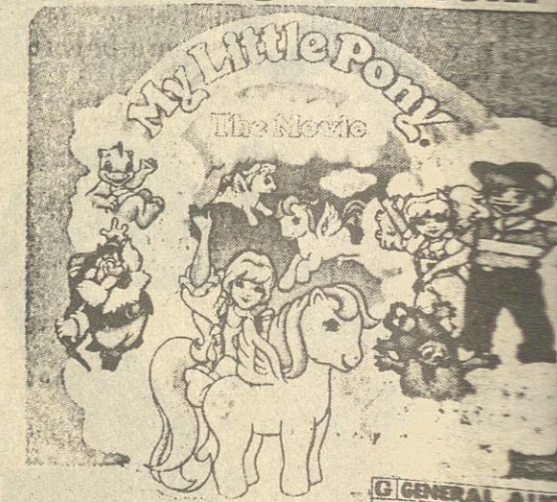

## Lakeshore Management On The Tenn-Tom

The Corps of Engineers has designed a Lakeshore Management Program to not only provide protection and management of the Tenn-Tom shoreline, but also to maintain an acceptable fish and wildlife habitat, to maintain the natural environmental conditions of the project, and to promote safe, healthful use of the shoreline by all persons. All easement lands and waters along the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway have been designated as limited areas for both private and commercial development; however, all fee lands and waters are closed to private recreational development.

If you intend to place only fixed or floating structures (such as floating boat docks, floating bathhouses, ski jumps-ski courses, irrigation pumps, rip-rap, bulkheads, courtesy docks, swim platforms, boatramps, etc.) on the Tenn-Tom easement lands or certain sections of the old river channel, please contact the Resource Managers Office first to obtain a Lakeshore Use Permit. 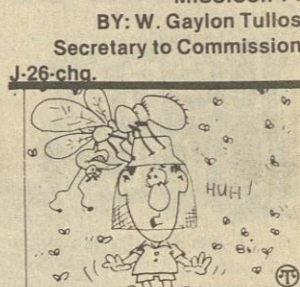

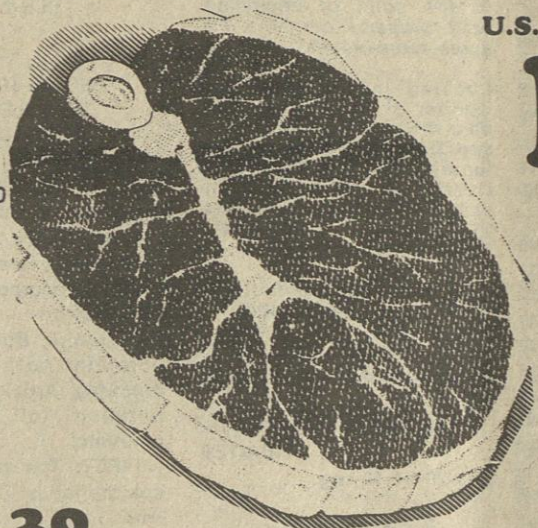

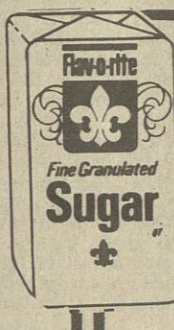
