way the first six months of 1986 has surpassed the total amount shipped last year, according to an announcement today by the Tennessee- January, 1985. Tombigbee Waterway **Development Authority.**

For the period of January 1 cumulative total of all shipments on the Tenn-Tom is 1.853.171 tons. A total of 1.7 million tons moved over the

Tonnage moved on the waterway last year, the initial Tennessee-Tombigbee Water- year of operation. During the same six-month period in 1985, the total stood at 567,000 tons. The waterway opened to navigation in

Coal, crushed rock, fuel, wood and grain made up the largest movements during June 30, 1986, the the first six months of 1986. Other commodities shipped on Tenn-Tom included ammonia, caustic soda, gypsum, fertilizer, salt, iron ore,

cement. chemicals, creosote, asphalt, and bentonite.

To move the 1.8 million tons on the Tenn-Tom required the use of 316 tows composed of 1.137 loaded barges. The products were shipped to and from most states in the Eastern and **Midwestern United States** and to and from many far flung foreign countries. The start of shipping on the new waterway comes at a time when water transportation indeclining world wide economic conditions. The steady increase in traffic on the waterway is attributed in large measure to domestic usage despite earlier predictions that most shipments would be coal for export.

In light of all the negative economic factors afflicting waterway transportation systems in the United States and other nations of the world, this steady and solid growth of tonnage on the Tenn-Tom portends a good terest continue to suffer from future for the waterway.

Pack cucumbers in 4 hot, sterilized pint jars. Place 1 onion, 1 clove garlic and 1 tsp mustard seed in each jar. Pour boiling vinegar over cucumbers, filling to within 1/4-inch from the top. Adjust lids.

Process in boiling water 10 minutes. Start to count processing time when water in the canner returns to boiling.

Remove jars. Cool on wire racks 12 to 24 hours. Check jars for airtight seal. Yield: 4 pints.

The Drug Crisis

By Congressman Trent Lott 5th District, Mississippi

Last month two promising young athletes lost their lives to cocaine overdoses. Nothing more poignantly illustrates the tragedy of the illegal drug problem than the useless deaths of sports figures whose lives have been dedicated to the proper training of their bodies to achieve their full performance potential.

In the aftermath of these losses, the bottom line is clear. We cannot fight an effective drug war on one front. We cannot be successful against drugs through a series of ad hoc actions aimed just at responding to each new drug problem as it comes along. We must have a comprehensive strategy to attack illicit drug production and trafficking abroad and reduce demand at home, as well as improve domestic enforcement and interdiction.

I recently had the opportunity to discuss the need for such a strategy with Elliott Abrams, the Assistant Secretary of State for Inter-American Affairs. That is the division within the State Department responsible for monitoring Western Hemisphere countries, including South America, Mexico and the Caribbean Islands.

There is no question in my mind that there are some countries that with the tacit approval of their governments are poisoning our society with their production of narcotic crops and the smuggling of these drugs into the United States.

We are not putting enough pressure on some of our allies in South America -- Peru and Colombia in particular -to halt drug trafficking. For instance, in return for providing foreign assistance to Peru to support its law enforcement network, Peru committed to the U.S. to take a specific number of narcotic crop acres out of production. Peru took the money, all right, but kept almost all its crops.

If countries like Peru are going to continue to condone the illegal drug industry within their borders and the

poisoning of our citizens -particularly our young people -- we must take direct, strong, immediate action including cutting off all foreign aid.

But the news is not all bad. We are convincing some countries to cooperate in destroying narcotics crops and jailing drug growers.

Ironically, one sign of the success of our efforts to interdict drugs in the Caribbean is the shift by drug traffickers to Mexico as a route into the U.S., particularly for cocaine smuggling.

One undeniable aspect of the drug crisis which cannot be overlooked is the demand and consumption in our own country. Latin and South American countries are selling drugs in the U.S. because our citizens are buying them.

Part of the problem is eradicating the plants on the ground in the countries where they are being grown. We have the technology to do that from the air, but the hard part is getting the needed cooperation from the countries involved. Part of the problem is intercepting the traffickers bringing the drugs into our country. And, part is our responsibility here in our own society to try to stop the demand.

That means guidance in the home, better education and strict enforcement of drug laws within our schools and stiffer laws with mandatory penalties and jail sentences.

During hearings last May, the Select Committee on Narcotics asked federal law enforcement officials whether they could do a better job in reducing the availability of drugs in this country if their resources were doubled but if no reduction occurred in illicit drug production abroad or demand here at home. Not one of the agencies represented said yes.

It is evident that we will never be successful until we commit ourselves to a more comprehensive strategy that attacks the drug problem simultaneously on all fronts.



ASCS Farm News USDA ANNOUNCES SIGN-UP FOR 1987 CONSERVATION

RESERVE PROGRAM Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng announced recently that signup for the 1987 Conservation Reserve Program will take place August 4-15, at Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county offices. According to Lyng, farmers

may volunteer highly erodible cropland for entry into the Conservation Reserve Program, under a provision of the Food Security Act of 1985

"We are pleased with the response from farmers during the 1986 signup," said Lyng. "Now that producers are aware of the other provisions of the Act, such as sodbuster and conservation compliance, we expect even more interest by producers in the Conservation Reserve Program this year."

Producers wishing to put land into the program are eligible for cost-share payments of up to 50 percent of the eligible costs to establish a cover crop. The annual rental payments are for 10 years.

The total amount of rental payments for any fiscal year may not exceed \$50,000, or its equivalent if in-kind payments are made.

Lyng said producers will be allowed to harvest their 1986 crop before the contract becomes effective, if necessary.

Land that is designated may not be grazed after the Commodity Credit Corporation approves the contract.





Conservation Notes No-Tillage Planting

Soil

"No-tillage planting reduces erosion, sediment, labor, and the fuel needed to grow crops," according to Don Jones, district conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, assisting the Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District. To be effective in preventing erosion and reducing sediment, no-tillage must be teamed up with a cover crop residue or dead grass and

weeds. A residue cover is important to break up raindrop impact, the force of falling rain-

Good nutrition at every age is important in maintaining health and preventing disease. The unique problems of the elderly, however, sometimes make good nutrition difficult to achieve.

Well chosen vitamin-mineral supplements may help correct existing health problems that are related to dietary deficiencies. Future problems may be avoided by taking supplements before one experiences changes in health.
