Steady Increase In Waterway Traffic

Tonnage moved on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway the first six months of 1986 has surpassed the total amount shipped last year, according to an announcement today by the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority.

For the period of January 1 through June 30, 1986, the cumulative total of all shipments on the Tenn-Tom is 1,853,171 tons. A total of 1.7 million tons moved over the

waterway last year, the initial year of operation. During the same six-month period in 1985, the total stood at 567,000 tons. The waterway opened to navigation in January, 1985.

Coal, crushed rock, fuel, wood and grain made up the largest movements during the first six months of 1986. Other commodities shipped on Tenn-Tom included ammonia, caustic soda, gypsum, fertilizer, salt, iron ore,

machinery, cement, chemicals, creosote, asphalt, and bentonite.

To move the 1.8 million tons on the Tenn-Tom required the use of 316 tows composed of 1,137 loaded barges. The products were shipped to and from most states in the Eastern and Midwestern United States and to and from many far flung foreign countries. The start of shipping on the new waterway comes at a time when water transportation interest continue to suffer from

declining world wide economic conditions. The steady increase in traffic on the waterway is attributed in large measure to domestic usage despite earlier predictions that most shipments would be coal for export.

In light of all the negative economic factors afflicting waterway transportation systems in the United States and other nations of the world, this steady and solid growth of tonnage on the Tenn-Tom portends a good future for the waterway.

Iuka All Stars In District Play

Iuka's 11 and 12 year old All-Stars advanced to the District Tournament now in progress in Amory after winning the sub-district competition here last week.

Monday night the Iuka team in their first game defeated Macon after five innings of play with a 15-0 score. Winning pitcher for Iuka was Shaune Holiday.

This was the first game played on Amory's city little league ball field and Shaune Holiday of Iuka hit the first homerun out of the park.

In Tuesday night action, Iuka met the Amory All-Stars on their home turf and went on to defeat them with a 10-6 lead. Ronald Jones was the winning pitcher.

Iuka was scheduled to play Aberdeen Wednesday night. The outcome of that game was unavailable due to press deadline.

The district tournament is a double elimination competition.

The Iuka All-Stars are coached by Jimmy McVay, Stan Dexter, and Milt Holiday.

W. S. Brown & Co. Burglarized Friday

The W.S. Brown & Company on South Fulton Street was burglarized Friday, July 18, after the store closed at 5:00 p.m. The burglary was discovered when the business opened at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday morning, July 19.

had beaten the steel screen off the back door, broke the glass out and unlocked the door to gain entry. An undetermined amount of change was taken from the cash register, and 35 to 50 pieces of costume jewelry.

No arrests have been made as the investigation continues.

Residential Burglary Guns/Jewelry Stolen

Sunday early evening thieves burglarized the Snowdown residence of Benny and Wanda Shackleford, looting away valuable guns and jewelry.

It's believed the break-in occurred around 7:30 p.m., Mrs. Shackleford said, noting that the family had been gone from home for about 1 1/2 hours when they returned and discovered the vandalism.

Six guns, listed as rifles and shotguns were reported to have been taken along with an undetermined amount of jewelry, which included gold necklaces, rings, watches, bracelets and costume jewelry items.

It appeared the culprits

used a sharp instrument, possible a screwdriver, on the door off the carport side of the house to enter the dwelling.

From all indications, care was taken by the intruders not to "mess up" the home, Mrs. Shackleford said, explaining that only a few drawers were left open and that nothing was actually strewn about as often is reported during break-ins.

Mike Kemp and Benny Parrish, deputies with the county sheriff's office, and Tim Bivins, 3rd district constable, investigated the matter.

At presstime, no progress in solving the crime had been reported.

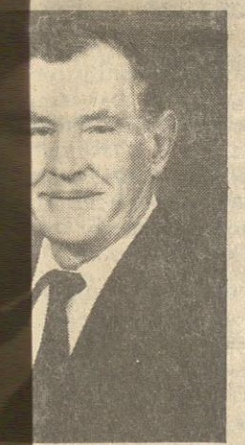
VBS Activities Planned Iuka Church Of Christ

State Unemployment Rate At 12.6 Percent

The June jobless rate for Mississippi increased seasonally to 12.6 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director, Thomas H. Dyson. This was an increase of one and two tenths percentage points from one month ago when the rate was 11.4 percent. The June 1985 unemployment rate was a lower 10.6 percent.

Place of residence employment stood at 1,023,600 in a labor force of 1,170,500. Persons employed in agricultural jobs posted a 6,800 seasonal decrease and persons employed in nonagricultural jobs decreased to 906,100. There were also 6,800 more persons employed than were counted

in June 1985. This increase was experienced in spite of the continuing troubles experienced by the oil industry and seasonal decreases in agriculture and education.

Manufacturing establishments provided 222,700 jobs, which represented the twelfth consecutive month of employment above 220,000. Nonmanufacturing jobs were estimated at 625,300, a decrease of 5,100 from one month ago but a 9,600 increase from June 1985.

There were 141,564 claims filed in June 1986 compared to 129,814 in May and 115,423 one year ago. There were 13,069 placements made from 15,316 openings received in Employment Service Local Offices.

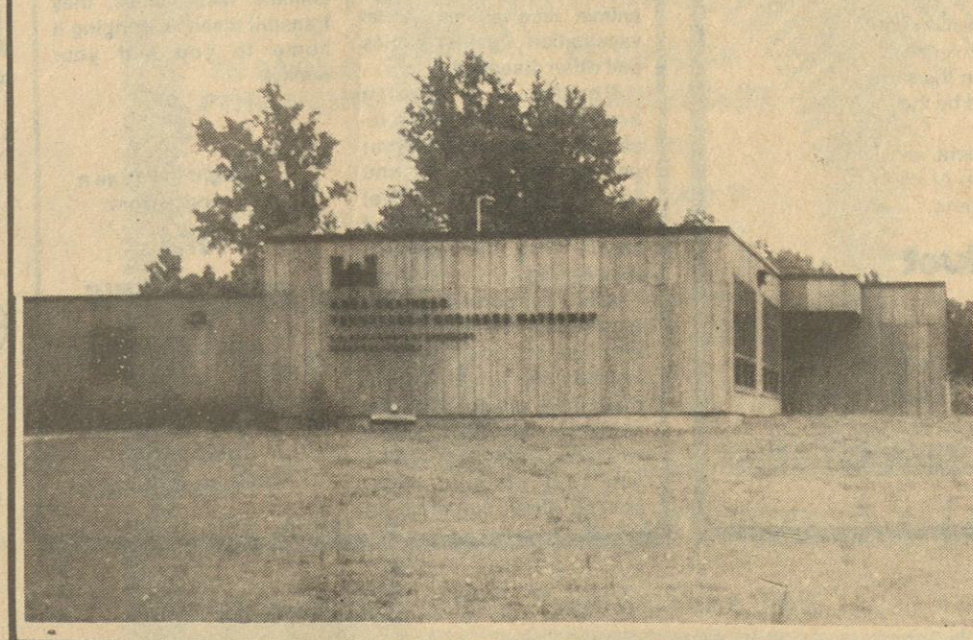
Notice to Tishomingo High School Alumni

Public Auction Of Corps Office Building

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ASCS Farm News

Participants Idle About
815 Cropland Acres

For the 1986 acreage limitation programs, Tishomingo County farmers will take out of production and devote to an acreage conservation reserve (ACR), 815.0 acres. The ACR total includes about 540 wheat acres, about 100 feed grain acres and about 175 cotton acres, according to Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Producers who enroll in the 1986 farm programs contracted to reduce their base acreage plantings by at least 20 percent for feed grains, 25 percent for wheat and upland cotton, and 35 percent for rice.

In addition to controlling excess crops and maintaining a better balance between supply and demand, Bridges said the diverted acreage means a huge savings of soil and water resources on these acres. "Farmers agree to cover their idled acres with annual, biennial or perennial grasses, legumes and small grains to protect the ACR from wind and water erosion." Residue from minimum-till or no-till practices also serve as a protec-

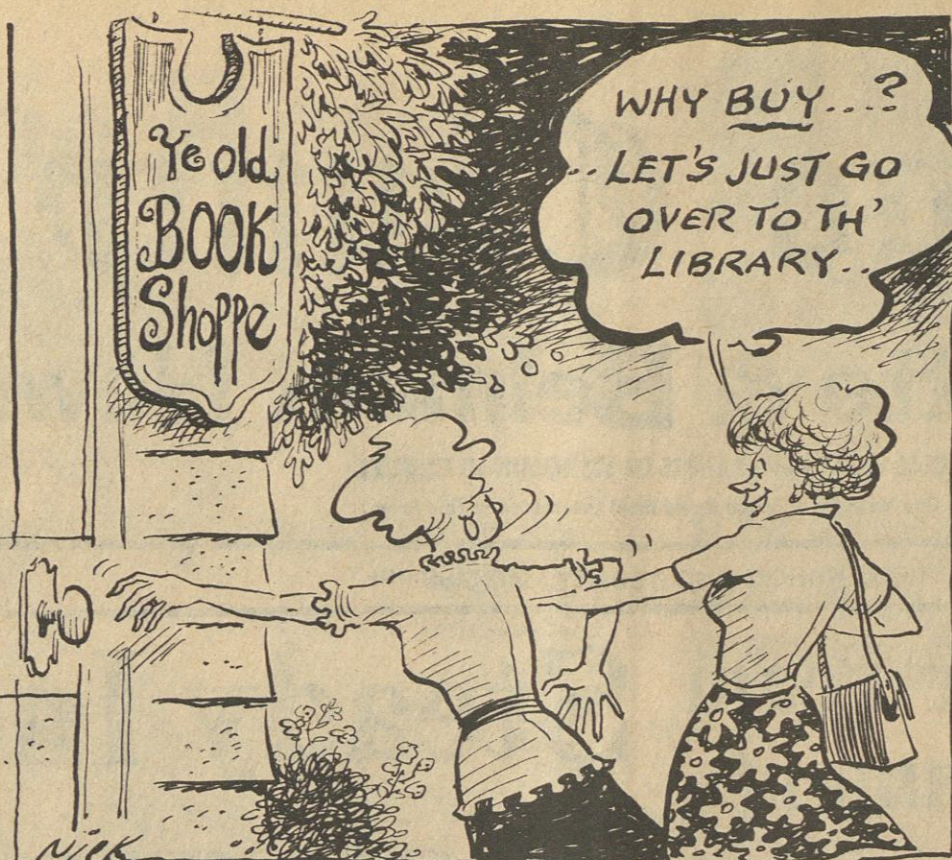
tive cover, he said.

The ACR consists of unpaid acreage reduction acres and diverted acres for which payment is made. "It is eligible land that has been devoted to a small grain or row crop in two of the past three years." Bridges said the diverted acreage also could be land designated as ACR under the previous year's acreage reduction program, or land that was seeded and maintained in a permanent vegetative cover.

To be eligible for farm program benefits such as price support loans and purchases, target price protection and land diversion payments under the wheat and feed grain programs, the ASCS official said producers must maintain the conservation protection established on ACR through the end of the program year. Farmers who fail to meet their ACR requirements will be out of compliance and could lose program benefits.

Do you realize that everything you EAT turns into YOU? It does. You really can't blame your body for being rather choosy about what you feed it! A little more consideration for your body's needs and likes when you eat food will give you a happier, healthier body.

Think about this, too: if you plan and cook meals for other people, you influence the kind of bodies they have. Look at your family. You will see results of your meal planning ability. Do you see signs of a good nutritional background?

*alert, happy facial expression
*straight, strong body framework
*strong, well-developed muscles
*moderate fat padding over bones and muscles (no excess)
*healthy skin color
*bright, clear eyes
*well-formed teeth and gums
*glossy hair

What you place on the table is usually eaten by your family and has a lot to do with their physical well-being and happiness. You want the best for them.

Would you like to be a better meal planner? Here is some help.

ADVANTAGES OF PLANNING AHEAD - What makes a meal look and taste delicious yet be low in cost and easy to prepare? The secret is planning ahead! Well-planned meals win family's compliments, save time and money, and provide nutrients for good health at the same time.

Plans do not always have to be written on paper. However, a file of good recipes, suc-

cessful menus you have used, and grocery shopping lists are written plans which are valuable time and money savers. You may prefer just "thinking" your plans instead of writing them. NUTRITIONAL NEEDS must be considered. Plan to

include the proper number of servings from the Daily Food Guide every day.

FOOD COSTS vary. Plan to buy and use low-cost foods if your budget calls for this. Low-cost foods can be just as nutritious, good tasting, and attractive as high-cost foods.

Your **COOKING ABILITY** should be considered when you plan meals. Choose recipes which fit your abilities... you need not be an accomplished gourmet cook to serve well-prepared, delicious meals. French Sour Pickles

2 lb (3-inch) pickling cucumbers
3 tbsp pickling salt
2 qt water
3 cups white vinegar, 5% acidity
4 small white onions peeled
4 small cloves garlic
4 tsp mustard seeds
Wash cucumbers; slice 1/8-inch off each end. Place cucumbers in large bowl. Sprinkle with salt and cover with water. Let stand 24 hours; drain well.

Heat vinegar in medium saucepan to boiling. Pack cucumbers in 4 hot, sterilized pint jars. Place 1 onion, 1 clove garlic and 1 tsp mustard seed in each jar. Pour boiling vinegar over cucumbers, filling to within 1/4-inch from the top. Adjust lids.

Process in boiling water 10 minutes. Start to count processing time when water in the canner returns to boiling.

Remove jars. Cool on wire racks 12 to 24 hours. Check jars for airtight seal. Yield: 4 pints.

And responsible pet owners do not allow their animals to roam freely. Animals that are allowed to roam free create a public nuisance, pollute the environment, damage shrubs and raid garbage cans, spilling their contents on

lawns and driveways. Many times, these "free spirits" become a great expense to the community as well as to their owner.

Additionally, unrestrained pets frequently fall victim to accidental poisoning or injuries by vehicles and wild animals. Many times, they transmit disease, bringing it home to you and your family.

It's Shot Time Again

As the 1986 school session draws near, it's time once again to consider immunizations. The state of Mississippi requires certain vaccines before a child starts first grade. They are listed below.

DPT..... 5 doses
POLIO..... 4 doses
MEASLES..... 1 dose
RUBELLA..... 1 dose

If your child began these vaccines as an infant, you should not have a problem. However, if you missed just one, then you'll have to get that vaccine before he or she can enter school.

Lots of moms have a problem keeping up with when they're supposed to get

these "shots". Here is a schedule you can clip out and keep with your immunization record:

DPT..... 2 months
DPT..... 4 months
DPT..... 6 months
DPT..... 18 months
POLIO..... 5 years
POLIO..... 2 months
POLIO..... 4 months
POLIO..... 6 months
POLIO..... 18 months
MMR..... 15 months

The aroma of charcoal-broiled steaks, barbecued chicken, or hickory-flavored pork chops arising from backyard grills scents the warm evening air as families take to the outdoors to eat.

A whiffing outdoor meal takes planning. Outdoor meals can be just as nutritious and appetizing as those prepared in the kitchen. In fact, they vary little in requirements from other meals.

They should include:

*A leafy, green or yellow vegetable;

*A main dish, such as meat, cheese, fish, or eggs;

*Bread, toast, buns, or biscuits;

*Fruit or other simple dessert and

*A beverage such as milk, coffee, or tea.

Variety is the keynote of meal planning. Remember to plan flavors that go well together, but don't serve too many strong-tasting foods. Keep your meals simple, plan foods that have eye-appeal, and above all have fun yourself. The success of any cookout depends as much on your hospitality as on the goodness of the food you serve.

Outdoor appetites tend to increase as the cooking progresses. To be assured of adequate portions for everyone, thought must be given to the quantity needed for your group.

For steaks and chops, plan on one-half to three-fourths pound of boneless steak per serving-one pound for hearty eaters; bone-in steaks, three-fourths to 1 1/2 pounds per serving; rolled boneless roasts one-half to three-fourths pound per person; bone-in roasts, such as ribs of beef, three-fourths to 1 1/4 pounds per serving; chicken (1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pound size), one-half chicken per serving; beef ribs, one to 1 1/2 pounds per serving and spareribs, 1 1/2 to two pounds per serving. All weights are for uncooked meat.

Beef cuts that are most successfully used for cooking on the grill are porterhouse, T-bone, sirloin, club, rib, fillet, rib eye, and blade or chuck steak. For rotisserie cooking use the rib, rump, eye of round, tenderloin or sirloin tip.

Always cook lamb slowly at a low temperature and according to the cut selected. For grilling choose loin, shoulder, rib or sirloin chops, shoulder or leg for kabobs, ground for patties, or riblets or spareribs. For the rotisserie, the leg, boneless or bone-in, is desirable. Hair Removal Options

There are alternatives to shaving, plucking, bleaching, and waxing unwanted hair. Many women, and a few men, have found that electrolysis creams and lotions quickly and safely remove hair without burning or skin damage.

With depilatories, the hair is essentially dissolved by a chemical that breaks apart molecules in the hair. After five to 15 minutes of application, hair can be wiped or rubbed from the skin. Hair is removed beneath the hairline, and when it begins to grow back, it does not have bristly ends.

Most products available commercially contain chemicals called thioglycolates. According to the American Pharmaceutical Association (in their publication, "Handbook of Prescription Drugs"), such products seldom cause skin reactions. The small amount of irritation that may occur can be relieved promptly by application of dilute hydrocortisone cream.

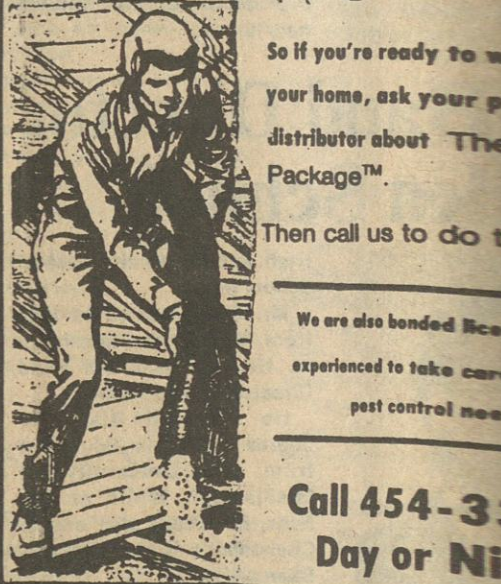

Savvy From Susan

There are three basic steps to proper skin care that should certainly be done once a day, but if you really want to be good to your face do all three twice daily.

Cleanse

If you insist on soap and water and will not use a cleansing cream then at least buy a good face soap with a molarity in it. The chemical ingredients in the deodorant body soaps used in the bath are much too damaging to the delicate tissues, especially around the eyes and throat area.

Cleanse morning and night, but especially at night, because if this is ignored your face will age quickly. The "day old" foundation, chemicals from the atmosphere, and all the oils secreted by your skin during the day will be ground deep into your pores as your face is pressed against the pillow.

If you tend to have dry skin I strongly advise you to get a good cleanser and use it religiously instead of soap, which will dry your skin.

Moisturize

Moisturizers should always be applied to perfectly clean skin. Let me explain the difference between a

moisturizer and a night cream. A moisturizer should contain 50 percent to 60 percent water, and 20 percent to 30 percent oil, but the most important ingredient makes up the remaining 100 percent.

This is the hydrating agent (an ingredient which draws water from its surroundings). The night cream, on the other hand, is to seal the moisture below the skin's surface and to protect the outer layer of your skin.

A good molarity draws moisture from the air and from the intercellular spaces. It holds the moisture and makes your skin plump and moist, but if this is not sealed with a night cream it will evaporate.

Protect

There is really no excuse for us not to protect our skin, because a good night protectant does not necessarily have to be expensive. It should neither be absorbed nor evaporate. Mineral oil or vaseline will serve the purpose.

Remember, skin care is the first and most important step to a more beautiful you, so - cleanse, moisturize, protect.

9. It is a quick-sale product; like fast food.

10. The Bureau's statistics reflect 29 cases that involved "crack" so far this year.

11. It is the number one drug problem in major cities throughout the United States.

Corps Warns About Building On Lakeshore

If you own or rent a piece of property on an Army Corps Engineers lake and are thinking of maybe building a little dock or clearing up to the water's edge? The answer in most cases won't do it without a permit writing!"

It is not that the Corps is just use of its lakes for recreation. It's just that, at on most of the newer lakes, the Government has land around the lake's and this land is managed in the interest of the general public.

Each lake-and there are 27 in the Corps Mobile District-is managed according to a policy which defines what can and what cannot be done on that particular lake. Policies are local implementation of Federal regulations. Additionally, the Federal environmental and navigation laws require a Corps permit for building on a navigable way or wetland.

These laws and regulations are based on what is best for the general public around its lakes the Corps is the referee.

Defining what is in the best public interest can be sticky. In many cases this has led the Corps to form local citizens advisory groups and hold public hearings on controversial permit applications.

One problem the Corps often runs into is a landowner who wants to mow down to the water's edge and many even put in terraces and flower beds on public property. These alterations have been ruled as not in the public interest because clearing land can lead to erosion problems and it also removes the natural environmental habitat.

So, before you build anything on a Corps lake contact that lake's resource manager. If you don't know where the resource manager has his office a quick call to the Mobile District's Natural Resources Management Branch in Mobile at (205) 690-2596 will produce the information.

That's easier than having to tear down an expensive dock or barbecue grill or watch a carefully tended yard return to nature.

Garments should allow body heat to escape. Choose clothes that permit perspiration to be absorbed. When fibers absorb perspiration, it evaporates and the wearer will feel cooler. Some fibers are more absorbent than others. Cotton, linen, ramie and rayon would be good choices in the summer.

Other fibers such as nylon or polyester are not absorbent unless they have a special finish added to them. Check the label.

How a fabric is constructed is important. Fabrics need to "breathe". A fabric can breathe only if it has air spaces. Open weaves and open knits allow for ventilation. Smooth textures are cooler than rough ones. Shiny fabrics are cooler than dull ones.

Color is related to comfort in hot weather. If playing outside, choose white or light colors. These colors reflect the sun's rays and the wearer will feel cooler.

Cool colors will promote a psychological feeling of coolness because they remind people of water, trees

and shadows. Cool colors are blues, greens, and purples.

How a garment is designed is important. For example, air circulates better when garments have large necks, armholes and legs. Skirts and blouses worn outside pants instead of tucking them inside, are cooler. Skirts and dresses are cooler than slacks and shirts. Sleeveless garments are cooler than long sleeved garments. Garments that fit too tightly will be hot;

USDA ANNOUNCES SIGN-UP FOR 1987 CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng announced recently that sign-up for the 1987 Conservation Reserve Program will take place August 4-15, at Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county offices. According to Lyng, farmers may volunteer highly erodible cropland for entry into the Conservation Reserve Program, under a provision of the Food Security Act of 1985.

"We are pleased with the response from farmers during the 1986 sign-up," said Lyng. "Now that producers are aware of the other provisions of the Act, such as sodbuster and conservation compliance, we expect even more interest by producers in the Conservation Reserve Program this year."

Producers wishing to put land into the program are eligible for cost-share payments of up to 50 percent of the eligible costs to establish a cover crop. The annual rental payments are for 10 years.

The total amount of rental payments for any fiscal year may not exceed \$50,000, or its equivalent if in-kind payments are made.

Lyng said producers will be allowed to harvest their 1986 crop before the contract becomes effective, if necessary.

Land that is designated may not be grazed after the Commodity Credit Corporation approves the contract.

Soil Conservation Notes No-Tillage Planting

"No-tillage planting reduces erosion, sediment, labor, and the fuel needed to grow crops," according to Don Jones, district conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, assisting the Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District. To be effective in preventing erosion and reducing sediment, no-tillage must be teamed up with a cover crop residue or dead grass and weeds.

A residue cover is important to break up raindrop impact, the force of falling rain-

drops dislodges soil and starts the erosion process. When raindrops fall on bare soil, they detach soil, and as water moves down into the soil, the fine soil particles plug up soil pores. In 20 to 30 minutes the soil surface becomes sealed, which increases the amount of erosion and reduces the water available to crops during critical growth periods. Practically all the rain that falls after this initial period runs off the fields.

No-till is a form of minimum tillage where a crop is planted directly in the previous year's crop residue and where weeds are controlled with narrow rows and

herbicides. No-till can reduce the amount of diesel fuel required for cultivation to less than one gallon per acre. In contrast, conventional seedbed preparation and cultivation require over five gallons of diesel fuel per acre.

Corn, grain sorghum, and soybeans can be grown by using no-till in fields that are not infested with johnsongrass, bermudagrass, or other perennials.

Yields of no-tillage crops should average about the same as conventionally-tilled crops if a good job of weed control is done.

Don emphasizes that no-

tillage may not be a cure, but it certainly has a lot to offer. Farmers trying a tillage will have fields with unconventional look, more dollars.

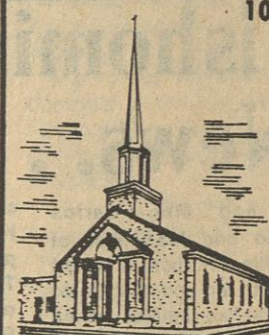

Vitamins and the Elderly

Good nutrition at every age is important in maintaining health and preventing disease. The unique problems of the elderly, however, sometimes make good nutrition difficult to achieve.

Poor appetite, denture problems, and difficult living arrangements may result in poor nutrition. Even when the elderly do eat properly, vital nutrients—vitamins and minerals—may be lost. For example, geriatric specialists now believe that some nutrients, such as vitamin B₁₂, are poorly absorbed as one ages.

Many signs and symptoms of vitamin deficiencies are subtle. Others may be interpreted as health problems rather than vitamin deficiencies. The difficulty adapting to darkness that some elderly persons experience may be related to low vitamin A levels. Deficiencies of the B vitamins can cause a red, painful tongue and cracks at the edges of the mouth. Mental or behavioral changes such as depression have also been attributed to lack of B vitamins in the diet.

Thinning Practices In Southern Pines

The management of pine forest in the southern United States has intensified on some ownerships as timber resource value has increased and the need for sustained production has become evident. The practice of thinning to improve growth rates has received increased attention as forest management has accelerated during the past 30 years.

The principles of forest management are not greatly different from those affecting other agricultural crops. Trees, like other crops, require light, water, nutrients, space, and protection from insects and diseases. The major difference is the length of time required to reach maturity. The growth potential of a tree is determined genetically, but actual growth is determined largely by the environment. Numerous environmental factors affect growth; of these, water, nutrients, and light intensity are most easily manipulated.

In the South, the decision to thin or not is based primarily on product objectives. If pulpwood is the sole objective, the value of thinning is questionable. When sawlogs or multiple products are desired, thinnings should be an integral part of southern pine stand management.

The timing of the first thinning should consider management objectives, operability, site quality, stand density, future thinning, and rotation length. Once management objectives are determined, other thinning variables are readily defined. It is generally accepted that

the first thinning should be delayed until revenue received from the trees removed will pay the cost of the operation. First thinnings should be made just prior to overcrowding, reduced diameter growth, and heavy mortality. The beginning of suppression-caused mortality in 4- to 5-inch diameter trees serves as a good signal for a first thinning in most stands. Generally, this occurs between 18 and 20 years for average density and site conditions.

Thinning methods of the southern pines include:

SELECTIVE METHODS
Trees to be removed are marked individually, based primarily on their position in the crown canopy.

MECHANICAL METHODS
Trees are removed strictly on the basis of spacing with little or no regard to crown position.

MECHANICAL PLUS SELECTIVE METHOD In this technique, the stand is first thinned mechanically, usually by rows, and then selectively within the leave rows.

The beneficial effects of thinning is to increase economic gain. The gain may be achieved by offsetting the expense of carrying establishment cost to rotation age, increasing the value of the product, and increasing stand utilization. Across the South, the value of sawlogs is two to seven times that of an equal pulpwood volume. The landowner, whose only return on the raw

material is the stumpage value, should be particularly aware of this differential when setting long-range management goals. Although thinning is primarily aimed at improving the value of the residual stem, other benefits now being recognized are risk reduction for insect infestation and disease.

Iuka Lions News

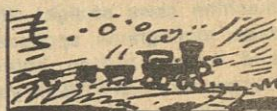
Several items of business interest were discussed and disposed of. Our attendance was great, only 5 members absent. This meeting was the last of the month, July 15, 1986.

Contributions to The Lions Sight Foundation totalling \$513.00.

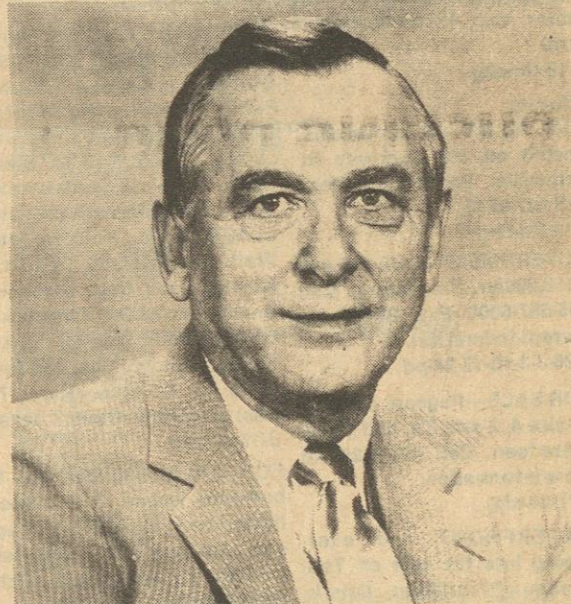

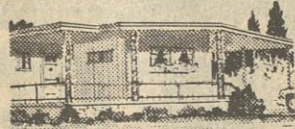
