Board of Directors Election Saturday

An election will be held Saturday, September 13, 1986, to elect five (5) members for positions on the board of directors of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association. One director is to be elected for a three (3) year term for each of the following supervisors' districts: 3rd District, 4th District, and 5th District and the Area-At-Large. One director will be elected from the 1st supervisor's District for a one (1) year term to complete an unexpired term. Members of the Association may vote for one person for each position on the ballot. Each member may vote only once, regardless of the number of memberships owned.

The polling places will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m., so that members may vote. Members may vote at any poll regardless of their place of residence. The polls are as follows: Belmont City Hall, Burnsville City Hall, Iuka Courthouse, Midway School Building, and Tishomingo City Hall.

County Voting To Be Tabulated Electronically

Tishomingo County voters will experience a new, but simple way of casting their ballots in the November General Election. Even during a big election, such as the 1987 county-wide, officials should have the election results available no later than 9 p.m. the same day, said David Bonds, Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee.

Bonds comment came following the county board of supervisors' intention to purchase voting equipment. Sealed bids will be opened October 6, 1986, for the equipment as notice has been given to dealers of the intended purchase by the board. Specifications for such is contained in legal form and began publication today in this issue of The News.

Gerald Parsons, second district supervisor and president of the board, said five machines will be purchased, one per district, and will be placed at the largest voting precinct within the district, during elections. Parsons said he expects the

machines to be available for the upcoming November General Election.

Bonds referred to the machines as automatic tabulation systems and explained that voters will be using a printed ballot. The voter will continue to mark the ballot and then the individual ballots will be fed into the machine which automatically tabulates the votes.

Several advantages of using this particular system was pointed out by Bonds. One advantage will be in the overall savings of money paid out to the usual 246 election holders presently needed to conduct an election. This number should cut back to 125 people. A second plus for the planned system is the time spent in tallying votes will no longer be a long drawn-out affair, but instead will be relatively short with results available within 2 1/2 - 3 hours following poll closings.

Using the third district as an example, where voters either go to the Midway box or the National Guard Armory, where the machine

would be placed due to it's being the more heavily voted, it was explained that at the 6:00 p.m. poll closing the machine could produce a print-out total of votes for the day. Next, the votes cast at the Midway location would be brought to the Armory tabulation system and fed into the machine by election holders. Then both final tapes would be taken to the Circuit Clerk's Office along with the ballots used during the day.

Bonds sees the new system as a more simple way and urges voters not to be uneasy concerning the tabulation system. At least one person from each district will be trained to take care of the machine and will be available during the election day and serving as overseer of the machine. Who or how one would be selected for this job has not been decided.

Parsons said he expects the cost per machine to be approximately \$4,800 each - thus five would total \$24,000. The supervisor said the money would be taken from the county general fund to pay for the voting equipment.

A total savings to the county of \$5,355 should be realized during one given election due to lessening of election holders, Bonds related. With November election, one machine could pay for itself and with next year's county wide elections (including primaries) four machine could be paid off.

Presently, we have 20 precinct which broken up alphabetically result in 41 polling places. By use of the tabulation systems the broken up precincts will be combined. For instance, the four at the Armory will be combined with possibly just six election holders and the man overseeing the machine.

The county plans to house the equipment at the courthouse and upon arrival the systems will be on display for voters to view. Poll holders will be available during election to answer any question voters may ask.

Speaking for the Democratic Election Committee Bonds said "Our supervisors should be commended for taking these steps in modernizing our election procedures".

One Vehicle Crash Claims One Life

A one vehicle accident which occurred Wednesday, September 3, claimed the life of a Golden man and left another in critical condition at the North Mississippi Medical Center.

Jimmy "J.T." Wood, 41, of Route 1, Golden, died when the 18-wheeler he was driving ran off the road about 8 miles south of Belmont on Highway 25. A blowout of a right front tire was believed to be the cause of the mishap.

Steve Horn, 18, of Golden, who was a passenger in the truck was transported from the scene to the North Mississippi Medical Center where he remains in critical condition from injuries sustained in the accident.

Funeral services for Jimmy "J.T." Wood were held at the

Deaton Funeral Home in Belmont with the Revs. Bobby Casteel and Tommy Waddell officiating. Burial was in Burgess Cemetery.

Mr. Wood was a veteran of the Vietnam War, a truck driver, and a construction worker.

Survivors include his wife, Elois Wood of Golden; two sons, Danny Wood and Donnie Wood, both of the home; his mother, Ellie Wood of Belmont; six sisters, Evelyn Burton and Betty Witt, both of Belmont, Patty Collum of Red Bay, Ala., Maxine Mabus of Tremont, Elouise Halstead of Kenosha, Wis., and Glenda Cote of Pensacola, Fla.; three brothers, Eddy Wood of Birmingham, Ala., Leon Wood of Tupelo and David Wood of Red Bay, Ala.

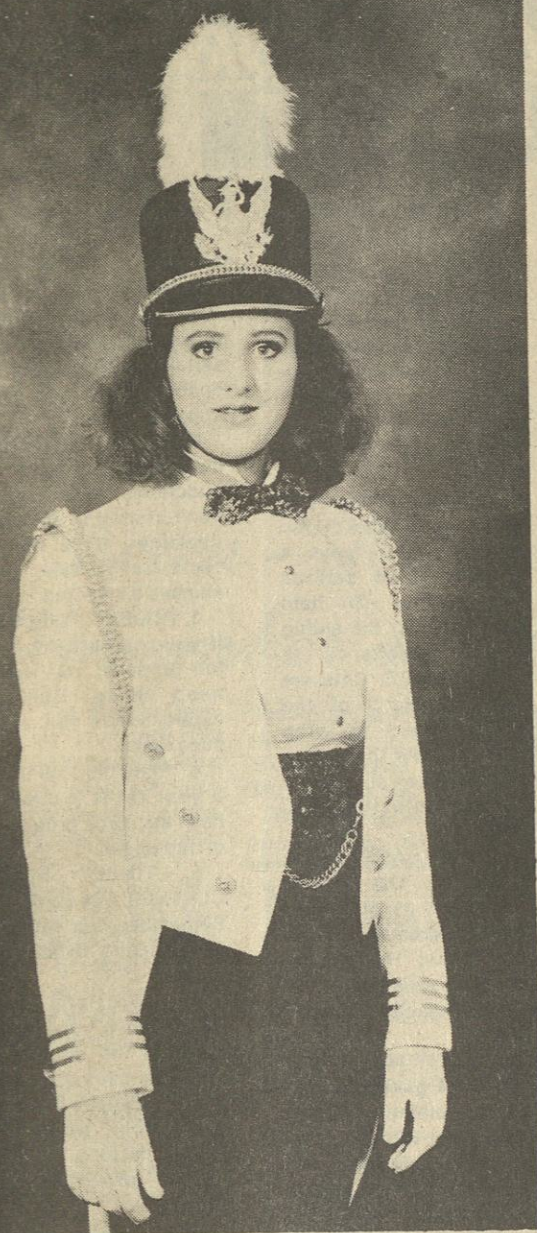

Q: Will there be a new flu vaccine this year?
U.S. PREPARES NEW INFLUENZA VACCINE FOR COMING SEASON
At least 10,000 deaths occurred in each of the eighteen influenza epidemics from 1957 to 1985. Approximately 80-80% of the deaths due to pneumonia or influenza occurred in persons 65 years of age or older.

Because of a change in strains of type B influenza viruses, a new influenza vaccine is being produced for the upcoming 1986-87 season. The highest priority of immunization is the two groups at greatest risk of influenza-related complications. (1) Adults and children with chronic cardiovascular or pulmonary disorders and (2) Residents of nursing home and chronic care facilities. Among the general population, persons who provide essential services may wish to reduce their chances of acquiring influenza infections through vaccination. As a general rule, we suggest that influenza immunizations be initiated in October or November.

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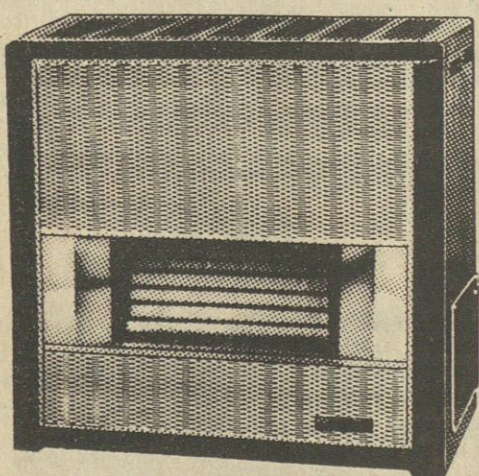

DANGERS OF SMOKELESS TOBACCO
Q. Is smokeless tobacco safe?

A. While smokeless (chewing) tobacco may not cause the lung cancer and cardiac problems associated with smoking tobacco, it does cause an increase in cancer of the mouth and should not be considered safe.

IODINE AND RADIATION

Q. I was advised to put iodine in fruit juice and give it to my children to protect them against radiation from the nuclear accident in Russia. Is this good advice?

A. No, it is very bad advice. Your advisor confused iodine with iodide. Iodine solutions, which can be bought in the

drugstore without a prescription, are poisonous when taken internally. Iodide is a form of potassium iodide, sometimes distributed to populations exposed to high levels of radioiodine, in order to protect the thyroid gland where iodine concentrates. The use of iodide for this purpose is of limited use and also carries some hazard: many people are allergic to this drug. It is not advisable to take iodide as a protective measure except possibly when radioiodine levels in food and milk are very high. Even then, a preferable strategy is to avoid such contaminated food.

A Well-Planned Wardrobe Doesn't Have To Cost A Fortune

No matter how much you spend or where you shop, think about hidden costs when you buy clothes.

Paying cash or paying the balance due on a revolving charge before the end of the month avoids credit charges. The 1 1/2 percent finance charge on credit accounts doesn't sound like much, but 1 1/2 percent per month on the unpaid balance turns out to be 18 percent interest per year.

Layaway plans may help you save, but the store gets the benefit of any interest on your money. If you fail to make a payment, they keep your money and the item. With self-discipline, you could put your money in a savings account, and the interest would be yours.

On costly items, take time to calculate the estimated cost per wearing. Think about how many times you'll wear the garment each week and

for how many weeks per year; then divide the cost by that number to get the cost per wearing. You'll be surprised. A winter coat might cost \$100.00. If it's worn every day for five months of the year, it would cost about 66 cents per wearing. A party dress might cost \$60. If it's worn only two times a year, the cost per wearing would be \$30. On the other, a pair of jeans might sell for \$12 and be worn once a week all year long. The cost per wearing would be 23 cents.

Remember to think about the cost of care and upkeep--both in terms of time and money. "Dry clean only" items cost you every time they are cleaned. Home laundry isn't free either, but it costs less than professional care.

In order to get the maximum value from your limited dollars, you may need to do a better job of planning your clothing expenditures.

*Analyze carefully the clothing you already have.

*Estimate your clothing needs.

*Make a realistic but flexible spending plan for clothes.

Evaluate Your Present Wardrobe

Once a year, take everything out of your closets and drawers. Try everything on. Sort everything into three piles:

*Clothes that fit and look good. Put these clothes back into your closets and drawers.

*Clothes that fit and look good but need to be cleaned, altered or mended. Put these clothes back into your closets and drawers after they have been fixed. If you won't get around to it, pay someone to do it for you.

*Clothes that are worn-out, out-dated, or do not fit. Give these clothes away. (Rule of Thumb: If you haven't worn a garment in the last two years, get rid of it.)

Get Organized

Organize your closet. With today's hectic schedules and lifestyles, it is hard to find time to keep closets in order. If you will take just a few minutes once a month to straighten closets and drawers, it will save you time in the long run.

A. You can call 1-800-4-CANCER, a national toll-free number maintained by the National Cancer Institute. They have access to a computer data base, nicknamed PDQ, which contains a listing of hundreds of experimental cancer treatment programs throughout the country. They can give you the names and numbers of researchers for particular types of cancers, new treatments such as interferon, criteria for acceptance for studies, and even limit the computer search to a particular area of the city or country. Knowing your exact diagnosis and having it at hand speeds up the time needed for an answer. There is no charge for this service.

Soil Conservation Notes

Tall fescue, a cool season throughout most areas of Mississippi. However, because of high temperatures and less water-holding capacity in the sandy soils of South Mississippi, good performance as a forage crop occurs only in the central and northern parts of the state. Mississippi beef producers have had good results from fescue, but it is not a good choice for grazing milk cows. Adding a clover does improve the quality of a fescue pasture.

Fescue begins new growth in late August or early September and continues growing through the succeeding months, maturing a seed crop in late May or June. When the seed are mature, the plant will go into dormancy until fall when the summer temperatures are cool and rainfall excessive, fescue can be grazed all year. However, continuous summer grazing will reduce the stand.

Sow twenty to thirty pounds per acre of a high germinating seed between September 1 and November 1. Some producers have tried to establish fescue by seeding in the spring but it is not highly successful. Increasing the seeding rate over thirty pounds in an effort to by-pass good seedbed preparation is a mistake. Fescue seeded for a grazing crop needs a legume over-seeded or interseeded.

The best combination with fescue for North Mississippi is either Regal white clover (3 lbs. per acre) or Kenland red clover (6 to 8 lbs. per acre) or a combination of these two. In addition to supplying nitrogen for the grass, the clover adds quality to the forage. After seeding the clover, use a cultipacker or similar tool to cover the seed lightly and firm the soil.

The first growth of both fescue and clover provides good quality forage. You should cross-reference your fescue pasture so you can practice rotational grazing.

Three pastures are needed for adequate rotational grazing. The ideal stage to graze a fescue-clover mixture is to turn on at a six-inch height and take off when grazed down to three inches high. This is, of course, not always possible but having three or more pastures will greatly benefit the grazing procedure, since three is usually an excess of growth in the spring.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



Cats Are Smart, But....

Cats generally are considered to be fairly intelligent creatures; and yet, they often get themselves into trouble doing some pretty silly things.

Kittens, especially, are adept at hurting themselves.

Eating the wrong thing or things is one of the more common ways a cat gets into serious trouble. You can help guard against the eating of such things as:

1. STRINGS. Cats are especially fond of the strings used to wrap roasts. While these may be tasty, they may cause serious intestinal obstructions.

2. THREADS WITH NEEDLES ON THEM. Cats love to play with moving cords and will often ingest the needle and thread if it is left where the animal can get to it.

3. SHINY METAL OBJECTS. A good example are the metal ties used on poultry to secure the bag of giblets. We assume they have a meaty flavor.

4. FISH HOOKS AND LURES WITH LEADERS ATTACHED. Again, we assume these have a "fishy" flavor.

5. CHRISTMAS TREE TINSSEL. This is a seasonal danger, but a very real one during the holidays.

6. BABY NIPPLES AND SMALL TOYS. When young children are in the house, these always present a danger to pets.

7. WOOL SOCKS. These can result in a plugging of the intestine that requires surgery to correct.

Cats also will eat things that cause stomach irritation. Among the more

frequent irritants ingested are:

1. INSECTS. Many grasshoppers and various beetles seem to challenge the cat's chomping abilities.

2. ANTIFREEZE. Do not drain antifreeze and puddle on the drive. Do not store it in an open container. It is highly toxic to people and animals if ingested.

3. RODENT POISON. If your cat is doing its job properly, you will need these. But be careful where you store such items.

4. ELECTRIC WIRES. If your cat is a chewer, keep the cords protected or unplugged.

5. TOILET BOWL CLEANER. Use carefully. Remember your cat may be drinking from it.

And be careful when you light up your stove in the fall. Make sure your cat knows it is hot. Serious burns occur when an animal decides to jump on its favorite observation post.

Remember also that your cat may jump off a high balcony. Many have done so with disastrous results.

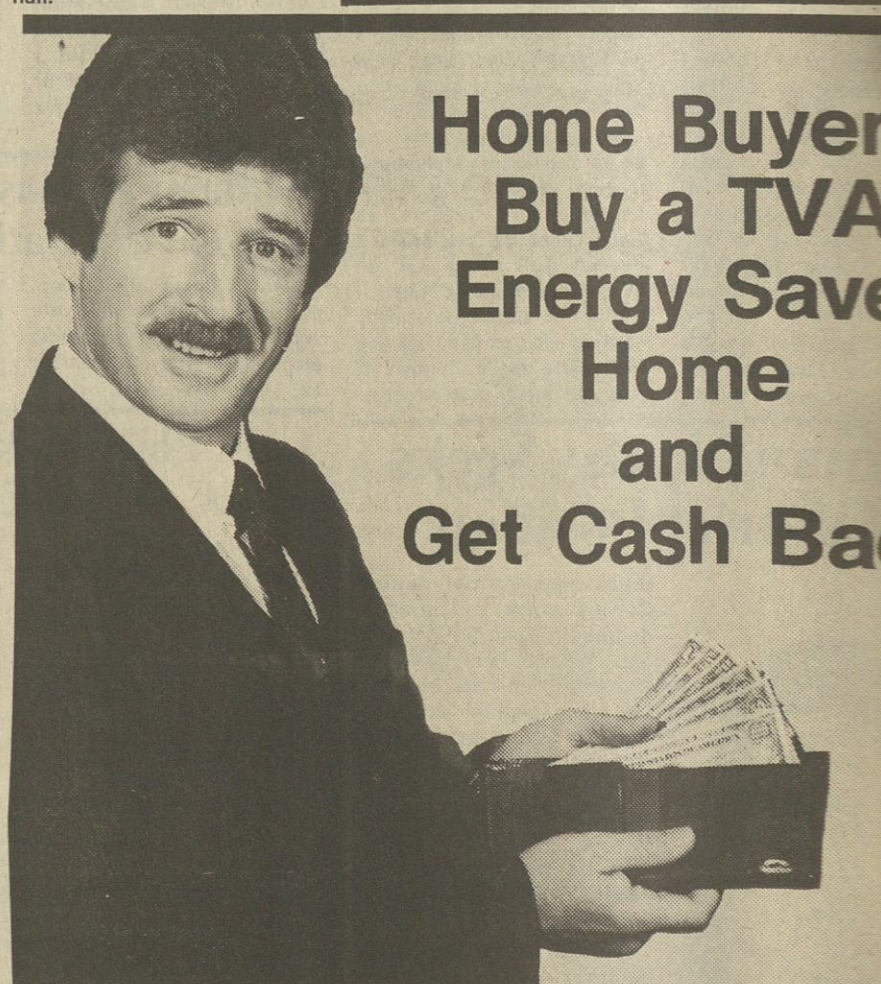

craft must always enter the lock chamber last and exit the lock chamber first. Lock personnel have the authority to depart from the normal order of locking precedence as in his judgement is warranted.

Pleasure craft desiring passage through a lock shall notify lock personnel by means of radio or by sounding the small boat alarm located on both the upper/lower guidewalls. No vessel shall enter or exit from the lock chamber before being signalled by lock personnel. Navigational signal lights are located on both the upper/lower guidewalls. The green light indicates that the lock is open to approaching vessels. Lock personnel may also direct the approach in/out of the lock chamber by use of an air horn. Three long blasts on the air horn indicates that the lock is ready for use and the vessel may enter. When the lock is not ready for entrance four or more short blasts on horn will be sounded, "this is a danger signal". After lockage is made up/down one long blast indicates the lock is ready for exit and the vessel may cast line off and start exit slowly.

Vessels shall reduce speed to the very minimum (NO WAKE) when entering/exiting the lock chamber and structure, this will help to prevent damage to the lock machinery and minimize chances of causing an accident.

When in the lock chamber, pleasure craft will be required to catch a line by taking the bit of the line (the loose middle section of) line and looping (throwing) it over the floating bit and holding the loose end by hand, or by making line fast in a proper manner to cleat on boat. The line will not be tied-off to the floating bit or the ladders along the lock walls, this prevents the fouling of line in case the floating bit should stick. The signal that the lock is ready for exit is also the signal for turning loose the line. The person catching and or tending the line will be required to wear a personal flotation device (life jacket). All people on a deck outside of hand rails or standing up, and any other person that the

lock personnel consider in danger will be required to wear a life jacket.

Please do not get impatient on busy boating days when traffic through the lock is heavy. The lock personnel are interested in locking you through safely and in your turn. Always allow your self enough time for your trip on days when traffic is heavy.

After lockage is made, a minimum of two hours is required before you can lock back up/down, the exception would be emergencies or locking thru with another boat making lockage.

Teal Season Open Sept. 13th

Mississippi waterfowl hunters will get off their first shots of the season this coming Saturday, September 13 when the state's special nine-day teal season opens. The season closes September 21.

Blue-winged and green-winged teal are some of the earliest waterfowl to migrate through Mississippi on their way south to their wintering grounds.

State conservation officials are reminding hunters that only teal are legal birds during this special season.

Shooting hours are sunrise until sunset. The daily bag limit is four, and the

possession limit is eight, with no possession limit on opening day.

Hunters 16 years of age and older are required to purchase a \$7.50 federal duck stamp. A valid hunting license is also needed. In addition, hunters between 16 and 65 years old must have a \$2 state duck stamp.

As with hunting any federally protected migratory game bird, hunters must have their shotguns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells.

Teal are relatively small birds, and known by hunters for their twisting, turning, high-speed flight across

open, shallow water according to Department Wildlife Conservation biologists.

Hunters may increase shooting chances if they around the shallow edges of lakes, ponds, fields, reservoirs, and rivers.

Teal feed on aquatic in these areas, biologists. Advanced scouting of particular area pays off.

First-time teal hunters usually identify teal looking for the birds in tight, fast-moving flocks. Close range blue-winged are small, dark-brown with a sizeable light-brown on the upper leading of the wings. They respond readily to decoys.

School Bus Traffic Requires Extra Caution

Twice each school day an estimated 5,200 buses are on Mississippi's roads and highways transporting approximately 385,000 students to public schools.

Motorists are being urged by the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol to be especially cautious since this year's cargo will include kindergarten age youngsters.

Leonard Cain, director of the school building and transportation division for the State Department of Education, said, "This is the

first year that all districts are required to provide kindergarten programs. Therefore, the children we are transporting are younger, smaller, and lack the experience and maturity of that of even the first graders."

James L. Roberts Jr., commissioner of public safety, said, "It is essential for the safety of all children that motorists obey laws regulating the rights of way of school buses."

Mississippi's school buses have signal lights both front and rear to warn other drivers. Yellow flashing lights indicate slowing down and red flashing lights with the red arm extended from the bus is the signal for other vehicles to stop while the children enter or exit the bus.

When a school bus displays a stop signal while children are entering or exiting the bus, Mississippi law requires all drivers going in the same or opposite direction to stop.

The law, section 63-3-15, Mississippi Code of 1972, reads:

"The driver of a vehicle upon a street or highway upon meeting or overtaking any school bus which has stopped on the street or highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall come to a complete stop and shall not proceed until the children have crossed the street or highway and the school bus has proceeded in the direction it was going.

"This section shall be applicable only in the event the school bus shall bear upon the front and rear thereon a plainly visible sign containing

the words "school bus" in letters not less than four (4) inches in height which can be removed or covered when the vehicle is not in use as a school bus."

Cain said more than 10,000 residents in Mississippi were certified as school bus drivers during the summer months.

"This gives us a primary driver and a substitute driver for the more than 5,200 buses that we operate daily. All drivers have been trained and certified," Cain added.

Roberts said two children died during the 1985 school year in separate incidents involving school buses.

"Being a cautious, responsible driver should be the goal of each person behind the wheel. The attention or inattention a person gives school buses could mean the difference in life or death for our children," Roberts said.

"Drivers should reduce speed when meeting or overtaking a school bus and be prepared to stop at any time. Stopping for a school bus may cause drivers to lose a little time," Roberts said. "But what is more important than saving a life?" he asked.

Roberts said that school buses are required to stop at railroad crossings and motorists should use caution when following a bus that is approaching a crossing.

As school begins, boys and girls begin their search for friends and their place in a group. Their satisfaction with school, and sometimes even their success this year, will depend on who becomes a friend and which group they become a part of.

You've often read and heard, "You have to be a friend to have one". That's as true today as when it was first said. A translation of an even older bit of advice says, "Do unto others as you would

have them do unto you." They're both true and they both work-when practiced. To be a friend you include others in your life. You listen and show you're interested, concerned, and paying attention to what he or she is saying. You also let them know you won't discuss with someone else what they've asked you to keep in confidence.

A friend shares ideas, feelings and concerns. A friend shares information that would be helpful to the other person.

Being a friend means accepting another with his or her right to ideas and ways of doing things even if they seem different. It means walking and talking with a person and inviting them to be a part of your plans.

Another way to win friends is to approve of them. Let them know you like things about them or like what they're doing. Look for ways to sincerely praise the other person. For example, "I like the way you handled that situation," or "I like the way you dance."

You can also get to know people better by identifying with them-find things you have in common. You ask questions and give information. You may learn you're both from a small town, like the same recording or television stars or even have common problems. You emphasize the things you have in common and not your differences.

Becoming involved in clubs and school organizations will put you in touch with people who have interests like yours. 4-H is a club which offers unlimited opportunities to meet new people, learn new skills and to travel across the state and nation. It also puts you in touch with adult leaders who care about youth.

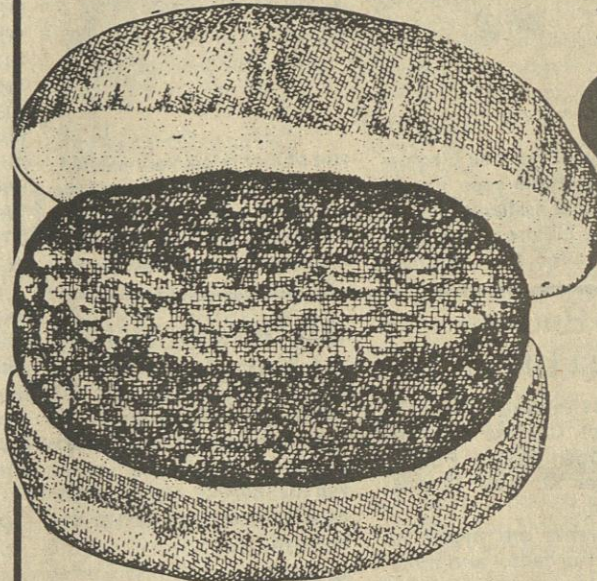

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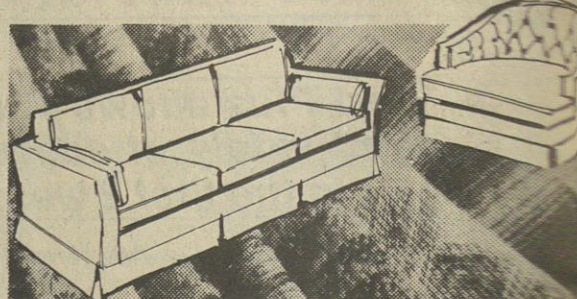

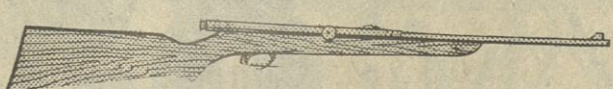

Dr. Goyer Takes Part In National Conference

Corn May Be Placed In Loan Program

The nation's 1986 corn crop is forecast at 8.32 billion bushels, 6 percent less than last year's crop but the second largest crop of record. The total production includes 13,260,000 bushels of Mississippi corn, according to USDA's August crop production report.

Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said corn loans will be available for the 54 county farmers who participated in the 1986 farm programs. The loan rate is \$2.04 per bushel.

To obtain price support loans, farm program participants are required to have suitable storage on their farms or have the use of an approved warehouse. However, because of limited approved storage space, Bridges said farmers under certain conditions, will be allowed to pledge eligible corn storage in any farm storage facility, including on the ground, for a 9-month nonrecourse loan.

Mississippi farmers expect to harvest 13,260,000 acres of corn this year, compared with the total 7,820,000 acres harvested last year and 4,900,000 acres two years ago. The average yield per acre is forecast at 75 bushels, up from last year's 68 bushels.

"These farmers may wish to store their corn crop after harvest to take advantage of future price increases. If so, a price support loan will provide them with operating

cash at this time." He said the stored grain serves as security. Corn loans are available to farmers through May 31, 1987.

Tishomingo Romps Burnsville 39-0

Friday night opened the 1986 football season for the Tishomingo Bulldogs as they met with rival Burnsville Mustangs for not only the opening of the football season, but for the Class 1-A North Division Title.

On the power of a 26-0 first quarter, the Bulldogs came out and never looked back, scoring the first four times they had the ball, the initial drive covered 66 yards in seven plays with Bobby Brock covering the scoring distance of seven yards just three minutes into the game. Before the quarter had ended, quarterback Brad Howie hit flanker Lee Hollingworth with a 13 yard scoring toss. Brock came back to score another on a fourteen yard run and Adam South came over from a yard out for a 26-0 lead.

The first half difference would have been worse, but two penalties brought back two touchdowns for Tishomingo. Coach Herbert said, "He had no idea the game would be like this and his team looked very sharp the first quarter." Anyone having doubt that remained after intermission, Tishomingo erased it quickly.

The Bulldogs blocked two punts setting up two short scoring marches. Brock, running over 150 yards scored on a 8 yard run and then Danny Brock joined in to score with a 34 yard run on the first play in the final period. Behind the defense of Gary Walls, Tim Southward, and Sidney Bennett kept Burnsville to only one first down

till the final drive and the Bulldogs offense delighted the crowd of 1,000 with the team work and quick scoring. Tishomingo will host Blue Mountain Friday night, in what could be a preview of a up-coming state play off match. The Bulldogs will face Vardaman-Blue Mountain winner in the first round of the state play off.

NEMJJC Tigers Take Second Straight Victory

Playing to a full home crowd, the Northeast Tigers scored their second win of the season with a 29-13 defeat of Holmes' Bulldogs

Saturday, September 6. Coach Johnny Plummer's Tigers took command of the game in the first quarter and stubbornly held on to it through the fourth period, where they stretched their lead to 16 points.

Jimmy Barnett of Falkner put Northeast close to their end zone about five minutes into the game with a 14 yard scamper. The Tigers scored 10 seconds later on a 36-yard completion from quarterback Raymond Monica to Preston Bradford. The extra point was good by kicker Rod Coggins of Booneville.

Holmes' Coach Robert Poole, himself a first year head, goaded his team into a touchdown with half-way through the third quarter. John Daddens at quarterback took the ball in from two yards out, and the successful extra point kick cut Northeast's lead to six. But the Tigers' offense exploded with a passing and running combination that resulted in a three-yard touchdown jaunt by Kevin Patterson late in the third quarter, a 31-yard field goal by Coggins and a 64-yard scoring run by Patterson.

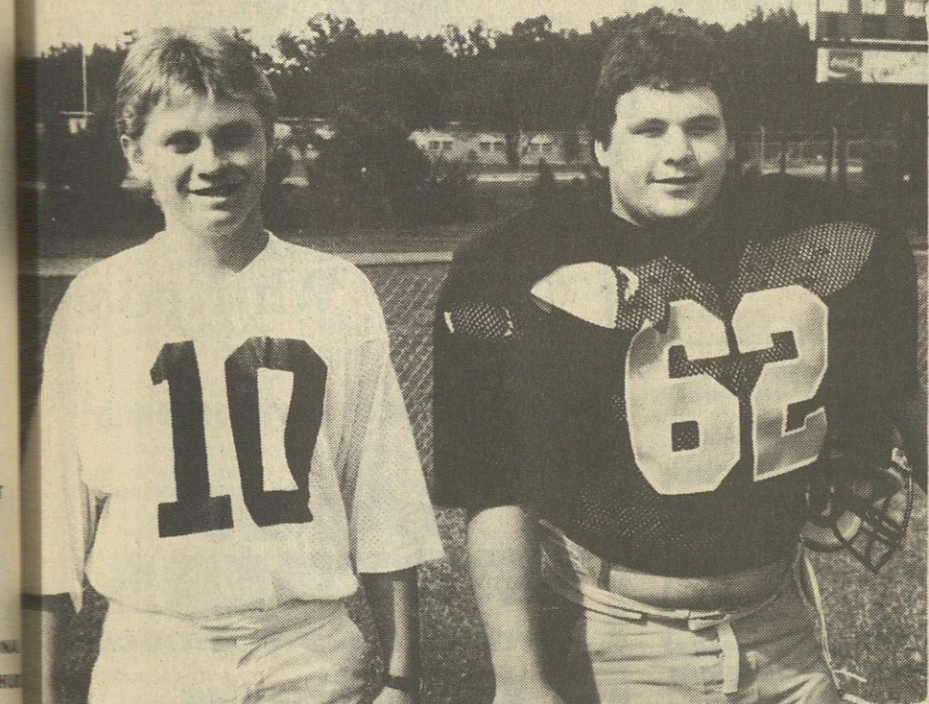
42nd Anniversary Scheduled

The American military glider pilots who during World War II crash-landed their huge "flying coffins" behind German lines in Holland will observe the 42nd anniversary of that mission, code-named "Operation Market-Garden" September 17-30.

Luka's William M. "Bill" Curtis was one of the 23 Mississippians who participated in this mission. Relatively few Americans today are familiar with the daring exploits of the nation's former military glider pilots who, with the paratroopers, spearheaded all of the major Allied invasions.

The small and elite group of glider pilots, who also flew their engine-less aircraft on the invasions in Normandy, France, Holland, Wesel, Germany, Bastogne, Belgium and missions in Luzon in the Philippines and Burma in the China-Burma-India theater, are painfully aware of their identity problem. "The public is quick to recognize the role of the infantrymen, paratroopers, fighter and bomber crews, sailors and Marines and this recognition is richly deserved," commented Lee G. Hampson of Modesto, California, national chairman of The National World War II Glider Pilots Association. "However," he added, "they either haven't heard about the glider pilots or they are not able to visualize our unusual and hazardous assignments."

In the 1944 Holland mission American glider pilots flew their flimsy, unarmed, highly-vulnerable 15-place gliders 300 feet behind the C-47 tow planes, dangling on a one inch diameter nylon rope. The fabric covered CG-4A gliders, loaded with infantrymen, highly-explosive ammunition, gasoline and TNT, were flown at tree-top level through a murderous barrage of heavy flak to be crash-landed in tiny fields, flooded with water and planted with big anti-glider poles and deadly land mines. "It was like flying a stick of dynamite through the gates of Hell," one glider pilot recalled. "Operation Market-Garden" was the most crucial mission of the war. American gliders carried in 465 trailers, 710 jeeps, 2,856 tons of ammunition, gasoline, explosives and glider infantrymen. It involved 35,000 paratroopers and glider-borne infantry, twice the number used in the D-Day operation into Normandy. A total of 2,596 gliders were towed off

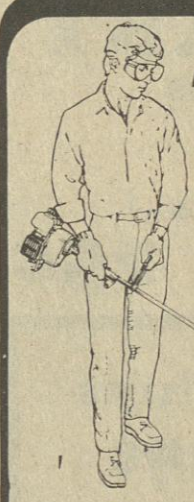

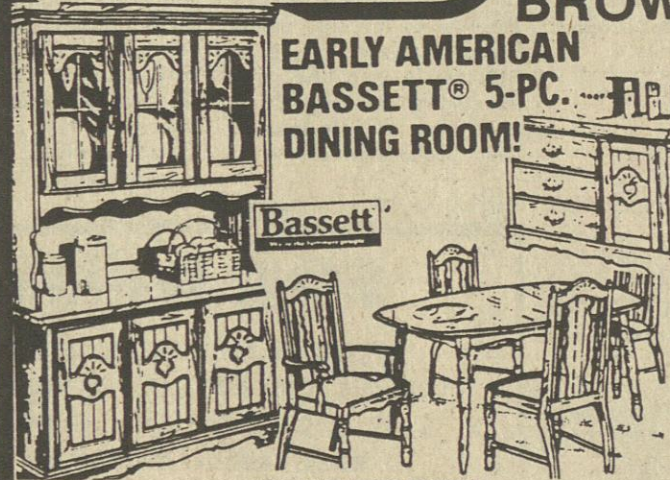

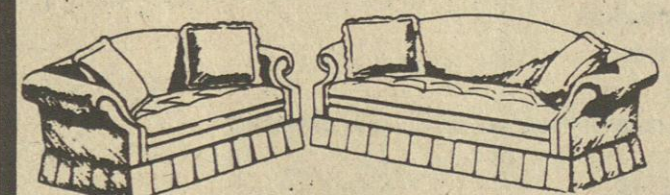
