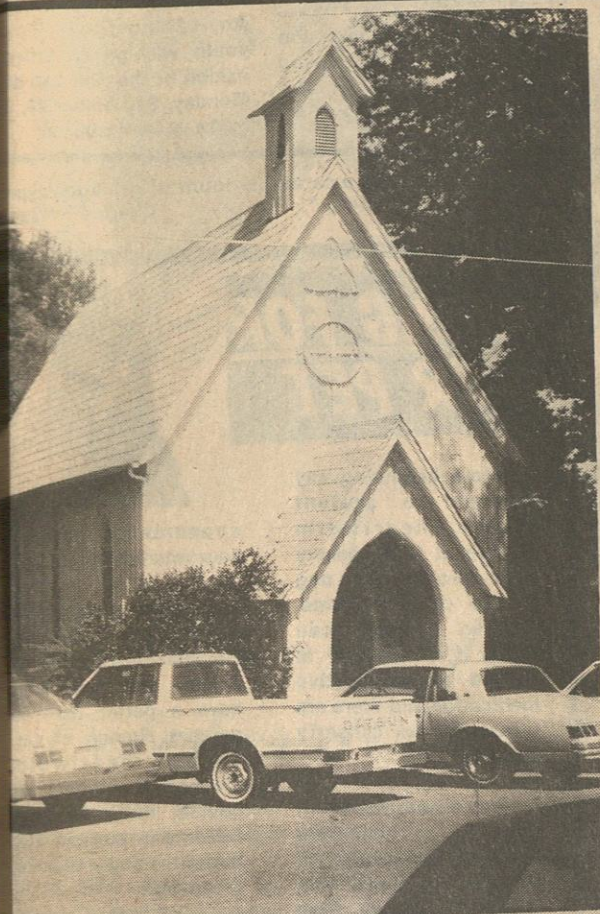

I.H.S. Guidance Dept. Offers ACT Assessment

As the new school year begins, Iuka High School's juniors and seniors should give some thought to participation in the ACT Assessment Program. More than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation are preparing to participate in the ACT Assessment Program. The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

The guidance office recommends that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program during

the junior year or early in the senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for post-secondary education and careers.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the Assessment from Mrs. Linda Barnett, Guidance Counselor at I.H.S. ACT also provides free copies of the booklet, Preparing for the ACT Assessment, which contains information about getting ready for the examination, plus a complete practice test. The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$10.50. Late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10.00 late handling fee. For 1986-87, ACT has established this test date schedule:

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies, and natural sciences. The Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. It focuses on interests, academic and nonacademic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement,

student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors, and the institutions and agencies the student selects.

The ACT Assessment is a major service of The American College Testing Program, which has national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa.

Bonds Awarded Hwy. 366 Contract

A contract to overlay approximately 5.610 miles of Mississippi Highway 366 in Tishomingo County has been awarded to William Russell Bonds Construction Company of Burnsville by the Mississippi State Highway Commission, according to Zack Stewart, Northern District Highway Commissioner.

Bonds Construction Company was the low bidder and received the award at a contract cost of \$212,584.14.

Stewart said the project is located between Mississippi Highway 25 and the Alabama State Line.

The commissioner said he is pleased funds have been

allotted for this much-needed project. Its completion will provide the citizens of Tishomingo County with a smoother travelling surface and will improve the appearance of the highway. Stewart encourages all motorists to exercise caution while driving through the project limits.

The completion date is March 31, 1987.

New Ownership Of Firm Made Possible By Grant

Iuka Receives \$315,000 To Help Prentiss Manufacturing Purchase Iuka Shirt Co.

Iuka Mayor John H. Biggs announced today that the Iuka Shirt Company will soon be operating under the new ownership of Prentiss Manufacturing Company.

The announcement came following a notice received by Mayor Biggs Tuesday that the City of Iuka's application for a Community Development Block Grant in the amount of \$315,000 had been approved. The Governor's office notified him via phone conversation of the decision.

According to Mayor Biggs the grant will be loaned to the Prentiss Manufacturing Company which will purchase the assets (land, building, equipment) of the Iuka Shirt Company which has been operating with a minimum crew of approximately ten people for the past several weeks.

"Prentiss Manufacturing

Company will close the purchase of the land, building and equipment within the next several days and will begin hiring employees immediately. The company is an old established, high quality product manufacturer headquartered in Booneville, MS, and we look forward to having them in the City and in Tishomingo County," said Bill Flynn, Director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation.

"I began to work with Mr. James Bethay, President of Prentiss Manufacturing Company, approximately two years ago, and have found him and his staff to be good business men with an excellent reputation. They are concerned about the personnel that they employ and will provide improved conditions for work at the former Iuka Shirt plant. They have plans to add paved

parking, improved air conditioning and repaint the building. It is anticipated that employment will be in the range of 225 or more people in the near future."

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka approved the submission of the CDBG application in June of 1986 and have followed closely the review of the application during the past months. "This makes the second economic development grant to be submitted by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, with both being approved, the first in 1985 and now this one in 1986. We are very pleased that the Governor's Office of Federal-State Programs under the direction of Beverly Hogan, and the Department of Community Development Block Grants,

under the Direction of Jeanie Smith, has worked with us to try and provide jobs for people in Iuka and Tishomingo County," said Mayor Biggs.

Mr. James Bethay, President of Prentiss Manufacturing Company said, "We are anxious to begin work in the plant in Iuka, and appreciate the help that we have received from Mr. Bill Flynn with the Tishomingo County Development Foundation and Mayor John Biggs and the Board of Aldermen, John Castleberry, Leroy Dean, Cecil Phifer, David Yarbrough, and L.T. Robinson. We hope to be in Iuka and Tishomingo County for a long time; we know that there are many experienced, good workers there, with which we can produce a quality product for our customers nationwide."

One Charged In Death Of Coed

Authorities released the name of a suspect, arrested and charged with the October beating death of Northeast Mississippi Junior College coed, Stacey Dianne Pannell.

Stephanie Lynn Alexander, 21, of Hernando, was arrested Thursday night on campus and was charged Saturday night in the October 8 slaying of Miss Pannell, said District Attorney John Young.

Miss Alexander has been a member of the Tiger marching band for three previous years as well as this term, officials said. She was also a suitemate to Miss Pannell at the time of the murder.

No motive for the slaying of the 18-year-old Ripley native was given by Young. Evidence will be presented to the Prentiss County Grand Jury next week during its regular session, he said.

The body of Miss Pannell was reportedly discovered by her roommate, Amy Wheeler, around 2:30 a.m. October 8, as she returned to the dormitory room the two girls shared, according to criminal investigator Steve Williams. Miss Pannell was last seen at 12:35 a.m. according to reports.

An autopsy report showed that Miss Pannell died from several very severe blows to the left of her head with a blunt instrument. The autopsy was conducted by state medical examiner, Dr. Thomas Bennett.

Major Walter Tucker, a

spokesman for the Mississippi Highway Patrol, said that in all probability the murder weapon was a wooden rifle such as those used in the college rifle team.

Miss Pannell was a member of the college rifle team. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wicki Pannell of Ripley.

If the Grand jury should return an indictment the earliest probable date for a trial will be in February, Young said. Miss Alexander's bail was set in Prentiss County at \$100,000. It was not revealed where Miss Alexander was being held other than that it was not in Prentiss County.

An \$8,000 reward for information leading to a conviction has been offered by residents in Miss Pannell's Tippah County hometown. Whether anyone would be entitled to the reward was unknown.

During the 11-month investigation, hundreds of interviews were conducted, evidence processed and a psychological profile of a composite killer was used. The profile played a part in the arrest of Miss Alexander, according to the district attorney. Miss Alexander had been questioned earlier in the year, but was not a suspect until recently and now is the only suspect.

No additional arrests are expected in the case, said Steve Williams.

Dr. Ian Malcolm Joins Hospital Staff

Dr. Ian Malcolm has been named as Director of Radiology at the Tishomingo County Hospital. He and his partner, Dr. Norman Rahn, practice together in Muscle Shoals, Ala., and will alternate weekly at the local

medical facility. Dr. Malcolm is a native of New Zealand and completed his medical education with the Australian Medical Board. He is a U.S. Citizen and came to Birmingham in 1977 on a fellowship to teach residents

in X-ray and chest radiology. He served at the University of Alabama as instructor in 1978 and was made an assistant professor in radiology in 1979 on the U.A.B. staff. He was then recruited by Shoals Humana Hospital and expan-

ded his practice taking on Dr. Rahn as a partner. Dr. Malcolm and his wife make their home in Killen, Ala., with their four-year-old daughter, Elizabeth.

The newest member of the hospital staff states that he is looking forward to his new position and working with the radiology department here. "I am impressed with the stability of the department," he said, noting that the five member team had each been here over four years. "This shows that we have a good team working well together," he said. Dr. Malcolm also mentioned that he had briefly helped cover at the local hospital previously for a period of about two months and he is happy to return as Director of Radiology.

Dr. Malcolm stressed the importance for the people in the community to realize "We have an up-to-date service in the radiology department of the hospital." He fully intends "to intergrade well with the other physicians in the hospital." The radiology department has a service to do and patients will be treated with courtesy at all times. He sees the field of radiology and medicine as

changing all the time and believes that he and his staff of technicians are capable of responding to those changes.

Basically at Tishomingo County Hospital all the conventional X-ray procedures are carried out including nuclear medicine and ultrasound. The mobile C-T scanner is available three days a week at the hospital. All procedures requested by the physicians will be handled as in the past with a continual up-grading.

Those presently working as X-ray technicians at the hospital include head technician Elmer Hunt, Grover Jackson, Glenda Sanderson, Donna Hudson, and Jerry Parsons.

In welcoming Dr. Malcolm to the staff, hospital administrator Bill Rutledge said, "We are indeed fortunate to have someone with Dr. Ian's qualifications to be Director of Radiology at our hospital. He is certified in radiology and nuclear medicine and licensed in Alabama and Mississippi."

Q. What should I, as a parent, do if I suspect my child is using crack? Are there any signs to look for?

A. Warning signs associated with crack abuse are similar to those of any kind of drug abuse. Here is a list published in an issue of Good Housekeeping for signs to look for:

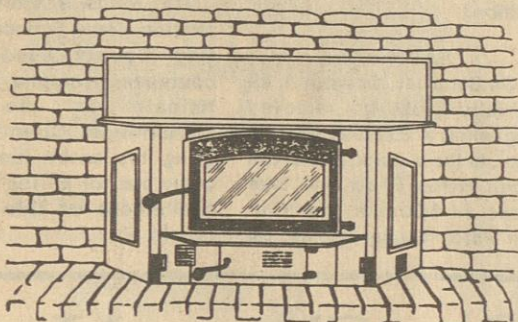
- *Academic or behavioral problems in school.
- *Loss of interest in customary activities.
- *A new set of friends.

- *Erratic mood swings.
- *Memory problems.
- *Chronic coughing, often with black phlegm.

What you should do as a parent if you find that your child is using crack, is to get him or her professional help. Because crack is such an addictive drug, your child will need to get help from a drug treatment center. There is a 24-hour 1-800-COCAINE helpline available to help you find a treatment center in your area or you can call the Bureau's toll free number, 1-800-222-7646, and we will assist you in any way we can.

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IRREPLACEABLE LOSS.....
Each year, Mississippi farmers lose more and more of their investments through erosion. Loss of topsoil also increases production costs through reduced yield, lost fertilizer and nutrients, and lost organic matter. Farmers in Mississippi have an opportunity in 1986 to be involved

in a new program to reduce soil erosion and improve water quality. The new program, called Conservation Reserve, may take about 600 thousand acres of highly erodible land out of crop production in Mississippi. Farmers with eligible land enrolled in the program will receive cost-share assistance

for the establishment of grass, wildlife plantings or trees. Individual farmers can enroll eroding cropland into this program for a period of ten years, and receive annual payments based on their approved bids. Zucchini Bread

2 c. zucchini squash (grated)
3 eggs, beaten until foamy
3/4 c. cooking oil
2 1/2 c. sugar
1 c. chopped pecans or peanuts
3 c. sifted flour
1 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. nutmeg
Pinch allspice

Sift together flour, soda, salt, and spices. Combine zucchini, eggs, cooking oil and sugar in large mixing bowl. Add one-half dry ingredients. Mix only until blended. Add remaining dry ingredients, stirring until smooth. Add chopped pecans or peanuts (may be chopped in blender). Pour into 2 well-greased and floured 8-inch loaf pans. Bake at 350° F. for 40-45 minutes or until done. Let stand 10 minutes. Remove from pan to cool. Yield: 2 loaves.

President Reagan Designates Farm Safety Week

President Ronald Reagan has proclaimed the week of September 21 through 27 as the 43rd annual National Farm Safety Week, co-sponsored by the National Safety Council (NSC) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

In his proclamation, the President said: "Our remarkable agricultural system has enabled our Nation to make great strides in efforts to conquer hunger and to meet the food and fiber needs of our people as well as countless others around the world. But we cannot afford to let up in the battle against accidental injuries and illnesses that take an unduly high toll of those whose toll is responsible for this abundance."

Each year, many thousands of farm and ranch residents and workers are seriously or fatally injured at work, in the home, during recreation, and in traffic accidents. Agricultural work accidents resulted in about 1,600 deaths and 170,000 disabling injuries last year, according to preliminary NSC statistics.

Although much has been accomplished over the years to make farm life safer and healthier, President Reagan said much more remains to be done. Everyone in the agricultural community should make renewed efforts to be informed about potential hazards and take steps to minimize those dangers. This includes the conscientious use of mechanical safeguards like protective equipment and safety belts.

"The president's message emphasizes the need for us to continue our work to reduce the number and severity of accidental injuries and work-related accidents that are so costly to our farming families and our Nation," Howard R. Bridges, chairman of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

Before beginning any program to prevent canine heartworm disease, it is necessary to be sure that your dog is free of heartworms. Serious illness can result if the animal is placed on preventive medication and there are heartworms already present.

The noseprints of dogs are as distinctive as the fingerprints of people. In fact, the Canadian Kennel Club requires noseprints on every dog in the registry. Noseprints are made up of a unique pattern of lines or dots that can be readily identified.

Most psittacine (parrot-like) birds molt over several months, while birds in the passerine group (canary-like or "soft billed" birds) molt more quickly and heavily.

All warm-blooded mammals -- including humans -- can be infected by and spread rabies. Once symptoms of rabies appear, there is no known cure. The disease is almost always fatal.

Early diagnosis of an illness -- when it is easier and less costly to cure -- is a major step in preventing a serious health problem. Become a trained observer. If there's a change in your animal's disposition, weight, eating habits or

A recent study by the American Animal Hospital Association indicates that most dogs have a better than 50 percent chance of surviving heartworm disease if treated. Of course, the earlier the treatment begins, the better the dog's chance of survival.

A cat's purr does originate in the throat. The sound begins in the blood system. It is the result of a vibratory motion that arises from the wall of one of the major blood vessels in the chest area. The vibrations are readily transmitted to the upper air passages.

Lester Dexter Logging With "Dick & Duke"

Working from sun-up 'til sun down alongside a couple of horses may not sound so glamorous, but it's the kind of life Lester Dexter enjoys and one he takes pride in.

"It's hard work and it's hot work," the Harmony Road resident admits, "And when the weather's real hot it's especially rough on the horses." But, when the temps start climbing, he works his horses single giving one a rest.

Dick and Duke aren't just horses. "They're regular work horses," explains Mr. Dexter. The pair are registered and Belgians are noted for their heavy muscles, which give them a stout appearance. Dick and Duke are five-year-old half brothers who weigh between 1500 - 1600 lbs. Another notable characteristic of the pair is their short tails. Possible the most outstanding feature of these

two though is the fact that their granddaddy is the, world champ pulling horse.

"I bought them back in the Spring from Kenneth Johnson. Robert Skinner brought them in here from up north when they were four months old," said Mr. Dexter.

Mr. Dexter, along with his son, Robert and helper, Steve Lowery, have taken on the task of thinning-out 70 acres of wood for Claude Sanderson, (Louise Sanderson's brother-in-law) a nearby landowner. The men expect to stay busy well throughout the winter months with the project, which was started about a month ago. Both pulp wood and hard wood are being logged out as Dick and Duke are hooked to the stretchers.

"I'll eventually get them to where they can be turned loose without lines," Mr. Dexter said. Even now on oc-

casion he just lets go of the reins and commands the horses to go to the truck and they obey. "This is the first time I've worked them this way," he said, "so they've got to get accustomed to it." The previous owner, Mr. Johnson, just did a little gardening and pulled a wagon with them he said.

The Belgian ranks among the gentlest as well as strongest horses. "They're just like two pet coons," Mr. Dexter said concerning the nature of Dick and Duke. "Some times after working them all day, I just jump a straddle of one and lead the other one on home."

If you have reason to drive out the Harmony Road, take time to stop by and watch Dick and Duke as they learn their trade. Mr. Dexter is mighty proud of his work horses and it's plain to see that the horses have a very caring master.

Mayor Praises Sportsmen In Special Proclamation

"Many species such as wood duck, wild turkey, deer and antelope, which had been reduced to small and scattered populations by the turn of the century, have now been restored to healthy and abundant numbers. In 1900, for example, there were only about 500,000 white-tailed deer in the U.S. Today, there are more than 12,000,000."

In signing the Hunting and Fishing Day proclamation, Mayor Biggs urged all citizens to attend local Hunting and Fishing Day events at Bay Springs Lake, saying, "At a National Hunting and Fishing Day program, people can learn about conservation and how they can join with sportsmen to ensure the wise use and management of our wildlife and natural resources." 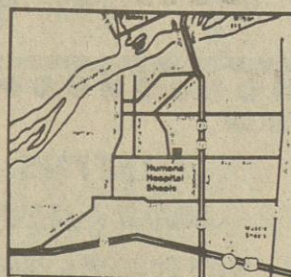

J. R. Woodruff Celebrates 90th Birthday

On Sunday afternoon, August 17, 1986, family and friends of "Daddy" J.R. Woodruff of the Cairo community in Tishomingo County, Miss., gathered at his home to honor him on the occasion of his 90th birthday. The party took place on the spacious lawn of Mr. Woodruff's home, overlooking scenic, gently rolling hills. Approximately 40 guests were present as the party began, and neighbors and relatives continued to drop by during the remainder of the day and into the evening to pay their respects. Rev. Hugh Vines of Salem Christian Church, long-time friend and minister to Mr. Woodruff, opened the celebration by eulogizing Mr. Woodruff's lifetime of service as a valuable citizen, valiant soldier, devoted husband, father, and friend. The next speaker was another special guest, Sgt. G. Gunner, U.S. Marine recruiter, stationed at Corinth, Mississippi, who on behalf of the United States Marine Corps, presented Corporal Woodruff a certificate citing his service to his country during World War II. On the bottom of the certificate were the words, "Once a Marine, always a Marine". As refreshments were

being served, the children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren cut loose approximately 200 balloons, thus allowing them to drift gently up and away. The guests were able to watch the colorful balloons for several minutes until they disappeared eastward. Attached to 90 of the balloons (one for each year of his life) was a card addressed to Mr. Woodruff, with a message requesting the finder to return the card, stating where, when and by whom the balloon had been found. The message also explained that the balloons had been launched as part of a celebration for Mr. J.R. Woodruff on his 90th birthday. Mr. Woodruff joined the U.S. Marine Corps in Memphis, TN, and was sworn in at Paris Island, S.C. on June 9, 1918. He was shipped to France on the U.S.S. Decalb. He remembers well the 13-day trip during which he slept on the deck of the hull of the ship. He participated in one campaign, the Meuse-Argonne Operation. It was there that he fell ill due to exposure caused from lying on frozen ground. He was taken to a military hospital and was still recuperating when armistice was signed. He remained in Germany a short

time after the war was ended, and then shipped home on The George Washington. He was discharged August 13, 1919. Corporal Woodruff received the Good Conduct Medal. He was cited for being an expert rifleman. During World War Two, Mr. Woodruff again served his country in a civilian capacity. Early in the war he enrolled in a welding school in Memphis, TN, and commuted each day by motorcycle from his home in Prentiss County, MS. He felt that his contribution to the war effort would be in the shipbuilding industry; however, his services were needed as an aircraft mechanic. He worked in aircraft factories both in Grenada, MS, and Mobile, AL, reconditioning aircraft brought back from combat and returning them to service. When Mr. Woodruff was growing up, circumstances limited his formal education; however, that did not prevent him from succeeding at any type of work that he attempted. Possessing a keen mind, a gift for remembering facts, and being particularly sharp in mental arithmetic, he educated himself. During his colorful career, Mr. Woodruff has enjoyed a variety of jobs. He did seasonal work in the wheat fields of Kansas; he worked on a river boat on the Mississippi River; he was a street car conductor in Memphis; he has farmed his acreage in Mississippi; he has operated both a sawmill and a grist mill. When jobs were hard for other men to find, Mr. Woodruff was always able to support his family. From his workshop near his home, he provided services to his neighbors as their blacksmith, mechanic and -- occasionally -- coffin-maker. But it was his mechanical ability which was most outstanding. He loves to tell about his first bicycle. When he was a youngster, he had no money to buy a bicycle, so he ordered the various parts from the Sears & Roebuck catalog and assembled his own bicycle! Mr. Woodruff and his late wife, Eula Richardson Woodruff, are parents of the following children: Mrs. Kathryn Williams, Mrs. Louise Padgett, Mrs. Iline Lauderdale, Billy Woodruff, Mrs. Betty Pounders, Tulon, Walton and Wayne Woodruff, Mrs. Quay Harvell, Mrs. Jean Skinner, Mrs. Ann Holt, Mrs.

Sue McClough, Mrs. Nadine Walker, and Mrs. Rita Brown. "Daddy" Woodruff enjoys remarkable agility of mind and fair physical health. Occasionally, he visits his 92-year-old brother, Tom Woodruff, who lives in Sattillo, TN. "Uncle" Tom served in the U.S. Navy during World War I. The two brothers are sons of William and Laura Hill Woodruff. There were four other children, now deceased: Victor Woodruff, Mrs. Daisy Woodruff Stanley, Mrs. Verdell Woodruff Coker, and Louis Woodruff.

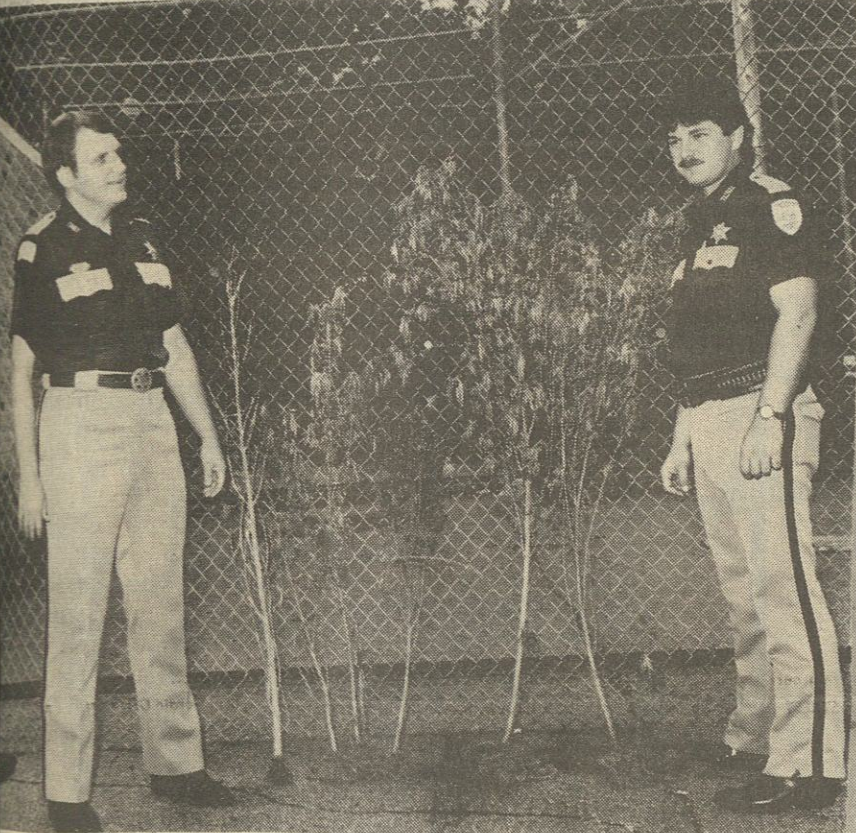


Groundbreaking For Laboratory

Mayor John Biggs was present along with Dr. Scott Segars and Dr. Kelly Segars at the groundbreaking on the new room addition to The Segars Clinic. This addition will house the new diagnostic laboratory. This laboratory will utilize the latest in echocardiography, ultrasonography and Doppler to diagnose lesions of the heart,

heart valves, arteries to the head and neck and arteries to the extremities. It will also house ultrasound equipment that can be used to evaluate the liver, kidneys, uterus, ovaries and any intraabdominal mass. These are the latest in so-called noninvasive techniques, meaning that no dye is injected into the body and no incision is made. A probe of the appropriate size is coated with a

gel and applied to the appropriate area on the body and by the use of high-frequency sound waves similar to radar; images are produced on a television screen and recorded on a video cassette recorder. Nurses, technicians and doctors will be attending appropriate schools at The University of Tennessee School of Medicine in Memphis and at Hahnemann Medical College in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

there and she says students are very interested in the space program.

"The students really enjoy learning about space and NASA operations," McPherson said. "They have lots of questions about all the things we did at Kennedy this summer."

McPherson returned to Hendersonville with a huge stack of lesson plans which she and the other 22 teachers who participated in NEWMAST compiled.

"The other teachers who were there were very inventive," McPherson said.

Some of the lesson plans they wrote include calculus, figuring rocket trajectories, triangular heights of objects, pressure temperature

relationships of gas, cryogenic materials and researching topics.

McPherson, who has had a keen interest in the space program since it's inception, says she looks forward to someday returning to KSC.

"When and if they do launch again, I will be sent a V.I.P. pass to the next launch," she said.

McPherson said that she and the other teachers who attended this summer's NEWMAST program will have a reunion next summer when they return to Kennedy Space Center to share with the 1987 class what they have done with the lessons they learned at the 1986 class.

"We had to work," McPherson said with a mile-wide smile. "But it was worth it."

Segars Clinic Report



Dear Dr. Scott,

I have had problems sleeping for a long time. Could you please tell me why in one of your columns?

Dear Reader,

Sleep disorders are very common in the elderly with about 50% of those age 60 affected. People usually complain of difficulty going to sleep, or of going to sleep but awakening 2 hours later and being unable to return to sleep. Difficulty initiating sleep is true insomnia and that is most often seen in the elderly, while problems with maintaining sleep can often be a sign of depression and is seen in all ages.

The need for sleep declines as we grow older, but there are also conditions associated with age that interfere with sleep. These include: arthritis, Alzheimer's disease, emphysema, and heart failure. Correcting or improving these conditions will often improve the quality of one's sleep.

In one study the second leading cause of sleep disturbances in the elderly

was caused by PMS (periodic movements in sleep). This is characterized by uncontrolled movements of the legs that cause brief arousals from sleep. These people complain of awakening in the night for no reason at all. Associated often with this is the restless leg syndrome. Other things that may interrupt sleep include medications, menopause, sleeping in an unfamiliar location and of course daytime naps.

Treatment is to correct any of the conditions mentioned above and to try the following hints:

1. Sleep in the same room.
2. Develop a regular bedtime.
3. Adjust total sleep time to fit your needs.
4. Avoid routine daytime naps.
5. Plan regular exercise daily.
6. Sleep in a cool room.
7. Avoid heavy meals within 2 hours of bedtime.
8. Take no more than one alcoholic drink after dinner.
9. Avoid stimulants within 8 hours of bedtime. (coffee, tea,

cokes, etc.)

10. For poor sleep onset do not stay in bed awake for more than 30 minutes.
11. For troublesome thoughts disturbing sleep, write them down and try to think of simpler less troubling matters.
12. Accept an occasional sleepless night.
13. Use sleep medications only rarely and never for more than 4 days out of a week.
14. Unless you are unable to stay awake do not alter your daily activities because you feel tired.

Savvy From Susan

For years I was totally confused when I tried to read and understand some of the ingredients listed on the boxes of the cosmetics. They could have been written in Greek so far as I was concerned.

I began to look for information about what the ingredients were and what purpose they served in producing a more beautiful skin. I discovered there was very little information for the layman, but I was fortunate to be associated with some cosmetic manufacturers.

My research has been very beneficial to me, and I am happy to pass the information to my readers with the hope that cosmetics will not seem like such mysterious concoctions.

Cosmetics are basically made up of very simple

ingredients but they can rarely be recognized by their chemical names listed on the box.

Vitamin A is labeled retinol, Vitamin E is labeled tocopherol, Vitamin D is ergocalciferol, and Vitamin C is ascorbic acid.

If skin products are to be effective they must be able to penetrate deep into the layers of the skin, and to accomplish this they must contain both water and a vegetable or an animal oil. When looking for a good moisturizer always be certain that the first ingredient listed is water. In addition to water and oil the remaining ingredients in the product will depend upon the purpose of the cosmetic.

I have listed some skin problems with a few ingredients that might be included in the corrective cosmetic for that problem.

DRY SKIN
In addition to water and oil the product may contain: Vitamin A, Vitamin E, niacin, cetyl alcohol, wheat germ, lecithin, or urea to name only a few.

OILY SKIN
In addition to water and oil, amino acids, menthol, eucalyptus, hops, thyme, rosemary, etc may be present.

ACNE OR PIMPLES
When you are purchasing a product for acne it is best if it contains, no amino or fatty acids. Usually Vitamin D (ergocalciferol), resorcinol, boric acid, camphor, or the extract from fennel, pine needles or salicylic acid will be present in some combination. These ingredients tend to have a drying effect, and rid the skin of excess oil which causes the pimples.

The following article which appeared in the August 25, 1986, edition of The News-Examiner, Gallatin, Tenn., is being shared with our readers courtesy of Mr. and Mrs. Merle Trimm of Tishomingo, parents of Mrs. McPherson.

As schools cross the country resume classes this fall, thousands of 7th through 12th grade students will be able to draw on the knowledge of teachers with "inside experience" in the space program, thanks to summer education workshops held at NASA centers around the nation.

Sue McPherson, who has been teaching for 13 years at Hawkins Junior High School in Hendersonville, attended one such program this summer.

McPherson spent two weeks at the NASA Educational Workshop for Mathematics and Science Teachers (NEWMAST) which was held at the John F. Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

The aim of the NEWMAST program is to improve mathematics and science curricula in the nation's schools by giving teachers direct exposure to the people and facilities in the high-tech field of aerospace. The participating teachers worked closely with NASA education personnel and with each other to develop aerospace teaching techniques, and gained valuable insight into career opportunities in science and technology for their students.

The two week workshop followed an agenda packed with activities in the world of "high-tech". An in-depth review of Kennedy Space Center's programs was given through daily tours and presentations by key personnel from a number of NASA projects.

The 23 teachers who attended the workshop took detailed notes at nearly every

presentation to augment the printed handouts and teaching aids which were distributed. In addition to the teachers becoming students again during the formal presentations, they had the opportunity to become "kids" again.

They experienced the Exploration Station, a hands-on facility for kids located at Spaceport USA. Cheers and laughter abounded as they launched their model rockets, some doubting theirs would ever get off the ground.

To say the least, McPherson was amazed and thrilled by her experience. When she applied for the program, McPherson thought she would be going to Marshal Center, but ended up getting to go to Kennedy.

While at Kennedy Space Center McPherson toured the Shuttle landing field, learned how NASA scientists determined the causes of the Delta and Challenger failures and met KSC director Dick Smith.

"They could analyze a penny with a spec of dust on it and tell you exactly what was in that spec of dust," said McPherson of the NASA scientists.

McPherson said the teachers were taken up on the shuttle launching platform where they walked in the footsteps of the astronauts.

"It was kind of scary because you could see down through the grid to the bottom of the platform," McPherson said.

The teachers also saw "the crawler," a two million pound vehicle which is used to move the shuttles around, the whole fleet of shuttles, Columbia, Atlantis and Discovery, and Galileo, a new satellite which will be used to study Jupiter.

McPherson said being allowed to see Galileo was quite an honor because very few people have seen the satellite.

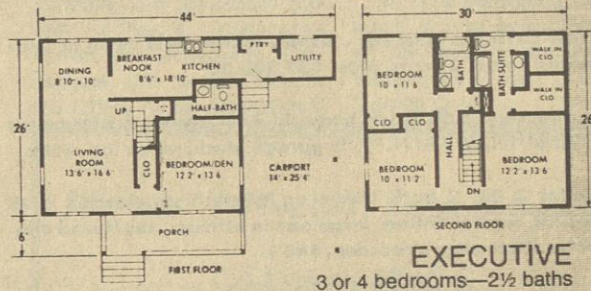
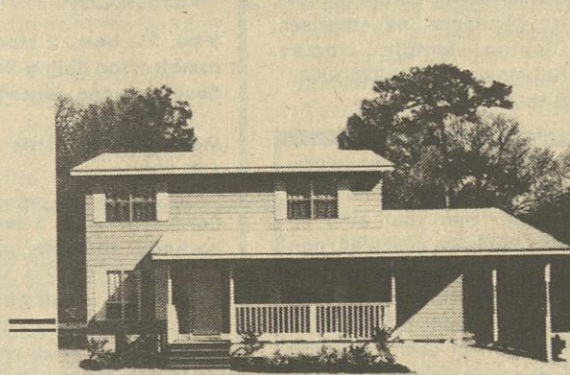
"Galileo was just beautiful," said McPherson. McPherson takes her students in the science club to Huntsville, AL, every year to tour the Space Museum
