## County Receives \$19,071

Tishomingo County has received \$19,071 in federal funds for "payments in lieu of taxes" for fiscal year 1986, Congressman Jamie Whitten has announced.

The Department of Interior funds, which are distributed to local governments to help offset the loss of income from non-taxable federal property such as National Forests, are payment for 26,476 acres of federal lands located within the County.

Congressman Whitten, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee which provides funds for the program, said that the payment helps the local governments make up for the loss of revenues that tax-exempt federal property causes.

## Ducks Unlimited Sets Annual Banquet Date

The Tishomingo County Chapter of Ducks Unlimited has announced that its 5th annual banquet will be held at Tishomingo State Park, on October 16 at 7:00 P.M. Chapter Chairman, Harold Lomenick feels the fund-raising function should be marked on the calendar by anyone who is interested in the future of North America's waterfowl.

"The Ducks Unlimited success story," said Lomenick, "is really starting to spread around. Banquets much like

our chapter event held throughout the country last year contributed towards Ducks Unlimited's national fund-raising effort which raised \$55 million during 1985 alone. But what's even more important to realize," said Lomenick, "is that this national fund-raising total must increase this year if the North American waterfowl habitat race is to be won."

DU's sportsmen/conservationists founders discovered through surveys conducted forty-nine years

ago that seventy percent of North America's waterfowl production occurs in Canada. They figured out back in 1937 what holds true today. Since Federal duck stamp dollars cannot be spent beyond U.S. borders, sportsmen funds earmarked for waterfowl conservation are not getting to the places where the great percentages of production takes place. But through Ducks Unlimited's efforts, over \$300 million has been raised in the U.S. since 1937. And 70c out of every one of those dollars goes directly to Canada to reserve some 3.25 million acres of prime habitat encompassing over 2,895 wetland projects.

The only problem in all this is that biologists estimate millions of additional acres of habitat must be reserved in order to stabilize North America's waterfowl population. When you consider that habitat today is diminishing due to agricultural and development pressures, and that DU is the only nonprofit conservation organization involved in the Canadian waterfowl habitat

race, you can begin to see the significance attached to the organization's fund-raising events.

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## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### MICROWAVING VEGETABLES MADE EASY

Microwave ovens are time-savers for busy Mississippians. Used to their optimum, they can save time and energy as well as preserve the natural color and nutritional value of the vegetable.

Vegetables cook quickly in the microwave. However, like other foods, the cooking time for vegetables will vary depending on the size, shape,

temperature and texture of the food. Microwave cooking charts provide a range of cooking times. For best results, always begin with the shortest time and then add additional time until the vegetable reaches the desired doneness.

One of the exciting features of cooking vegetables quickly is the effect on the color and texture. Special procedures for preparing vegetables for microwave cooking are not necessary but the following tips will help assure properly-cooked vegetables.

\*Prepare vegetables to be cooked as you would for conventional cooking, but don't add salt. Salt dries out the surface.

\*Arrange the toughest,

thickest part of the vegetable toward the outside of the dish for faster cooking. For example place broccoli stalks toward the outside with the tender heads toward the center. Arrange them in a circle for more even cooking.

\*Pierce the skin of vegetables such as squash, white potatoes and sweet potatoes before cooking to allow steam to escape during cooking to prevent bursting.

\*Cook vegetables in covered dishes for quicker cooking. Use a glass lid or plastic wrap. Pierce wrap or fold it back along one edge before cooking begins. Be very careful when removing the covers to avoid a steam burn.

\*Only small amounts of water are needed to cook vegetables, unless a recipe states to add more water. Two to four tablespoons of water are usually sufficient for one to two pounds of vegetables.

\*Vegetables can be cooked and served in any microwave-proof serving dish.

It is not necessary to defrost frozen vegetables

before cooking. Simply break apart the large frozen block as it begins to thaw.

\*You can cook most vegetables on full power unless a sauce or other ingredients have been added which need a lower power setting.

\*Whole vegetables will require slightly longer

cooking times than cubed or sliced vegetables.

\*For fast cooking, chop or slice the vegetables in evenly-shaped pieces. Very small or very thin pieces may overcook.

\*For more even cooking, stir the vegetables at least once during cooking.

\*Refer to a vegetable cooking chart for suggested

cooking times. Be careful not to overcook vegetables. Additional cooking will take place during standing time. If you won't serve the vegetable immediately, it should be slightly under-cooked. Keep vegetables covered until serving to retain the heat.

\*Home-canned vegetables  
\*There is no time-saving advantage to reheating home-canned vegetables in the microwave. Home-canned vegetables must be boiled 10 to 20 minutes before testing, as a safety measure, whether they are heated conventionally or in the microwave oven.

### SCALLOPED POTATOES PARMESAN

2 cans (11 ounces each) condensed Cheddar cheese soup  
1/2 cup milk  
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
8 cups thinly sliced potatoes  
1 cup thinly sliced onion  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
Paprika

In bowl, blend soup, milk, and Parmesan. In buttered 3-quart shallow baking dish (13x9x2"), arrange alternate layers of potatoes, onion, and sauce. Dot top with butter; sprinkle with paprika. Cover; bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes. Uncover; bake 15 minutes more or until potatoes are tender. Makes about 7 1/2 cups.

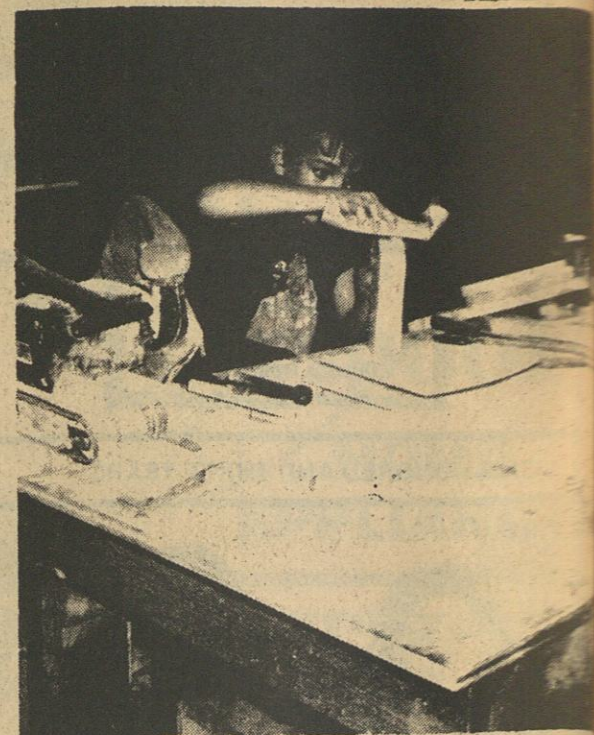
**DON'T SNUB THE SPUD:** Eat the whole thing. If you eagerly devour the tender insides of a baked potato - but not the skin - you're leaving a lot behind. Vitamins are concentrated near the skin, and skin itself provides valuable roughage to aid digestion.

## Surplus Food Distribution

The Tishomingo County Welfare Department announced today that U.S. Department of Agriculture Surplus Commodities will be distributed, Wednesday, October 22, 1986, beginning at 8:00 a.m. The following items will be distributed to eligible households: 2-5 pound blocks of cheese, 1 pound of butter, 1 package of milk and 2-2 lb. bags of rice.

Those households who receive food stamps by mail will have vouchers enclosed with their October food stamps. Food stamp recipients who pick up their stamps will get their vouchers with their October allotment. All other certified households (self declared income) will have their vouchers mailed on October 10, 1986, therefore, it will not be necessary for these households to come to the Welfare Office to pick up their vouchers. Households that do not receive a voucher by mail will need to come to the office to have their certification updated. Anyone wishing to make an application may apply after October 10. Eligibility is based on income.

Misrepresentation of need, or sale or exchange of USDA commodities, is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance

## CARING FOR YOUR PET

### CANINE WINTER TIPS

Though you may not look forward to the approaching cold weather, winter can be a wonderland for the family dog.

Many canines actually were bred to withstand the inclement temperatures of northern climates. To a Samoyed, Husky, Saint Bernard or Newfoundland, a romp on a winter morning is right up their alley.

But a dog need not be bred for cold to enjoy the outdoors during the winter months. Even short-haired and mixed breeds enjoy a run on a chilly day, as any dog owner who has romped through a snowdrift with his pet can tell you.

To get the most out of winter, the number one rule of thumb is "treat your dog as you would yourself."

For instance, just as you enjoy skating, sledding and other winter sports, your dog enjoys chasing snowballs and taking brisk walks.

Let neither of you wants to be left out in the cold for long periods of time, unprotected from wind and chills.

Let your short-haired hounddog tag along while you shovel the walks - but make sure he follows you back inside when you're finished.

While you're brushing off your coat, do the same for your dog. Otherwise, his body heat will melt the snow and make him wet and chilled to the bone. Pay

special attention to the paws and chest area. Special care should be taken when walking on snow-covered sidewalks. Because they have not yet developed thick, adult coats, younger dogs should be protected with a sweater. Older dogs, who are prone to arthritis, also should be "dressed" for the outdoors.

Dryness is another concern for humans and animals alike in the winter months. Occasionally brush your dog's coat to draw out natural oils. Dogs usually should not be given soap and-water baths during the winter, as they wash out these protective body oils.

Keep these simple tips in mind, and consult your veterinarian if your dog shows any signs of a cold. With a few precautions, your dog can enjoy the outdoors during the winter months.

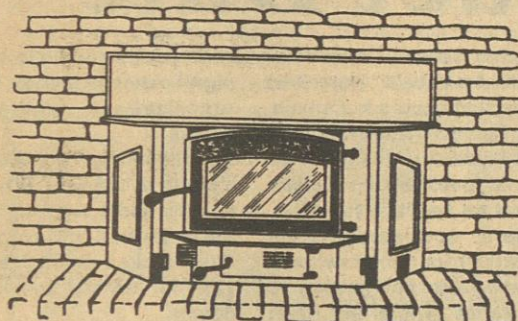

#### ASCS FARM NEWS

Upland cotton program participants who agree to forego price support loans on their 1986-crop production will be eligible for a loan deficiency payment. Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the loan deficiency payment rate will be equal to the difference between the loan rate and the loan repayment rate.

"The repayment rate for a 1986 cotton loan is 80 percent of the basic loan rate for each quality of cotton," Bridges said.

He said 50 percent of the payment will be made in cash and 50 percent in commodity certificates redeemable in cotton. Cash payments are subject to Gramm-Rudman reductions.

Cotton loan deficiency

payments will be made on a quantity of upland cotton equal to the amount of cotton eligible for loan, but not to exceed a quantity determined by multiplying the individual farm program acreage by the farm program payment yield.

The ASCS official said cotton loan deficiency payments may be requested by the producer or the producer's designee - if an acceptable power of attorney is on file in the county ASCS office. The request must be filed before sale of the cotton by the producer.

Approximately 42 farms in Tishomingo County are enrolled in the 1986 Upland Cotton Program.

# County Unemployment Down In Mid-August

Unemployment in Tishomingo County was down slightly at mid-August. According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, an estimated 1,130 individuals were unemployed at mid-month, or 15.5 percent of the civilian labor force. This unemployment rate compares to 17.8 percent in July

and 21.8 percent in August, 1985. A total of 6,150 county residents were employed, 190 less than the previous estimate but 300 more than the estimate for August, one year ago. This represents a total of 7,280 individuals in the labor force at mid-August, compared to 7,710 in July and 7,470 in August, 1985.

Manufacturing em-

ployment in the county rose by a minimal 10 to reach 2,630 while nonmanufacturing jobs declined by 140. Yearly comparisons revealed an increase of 210 in manufacturing jobs with a loss of 70 in non-manufacturing jobs.

Smith also commented that the labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo was estimated to be 60,450 at mid-August, 1,480 below the estimate for last month and 520 below the figure for August, 1985. There were 8,800 individuals unemployed representing 14.6 percent of the labor force. One month ago 14.9 percent were unem-

ployed in the six-county area with 15.7 percent unemployed one year ago. The number of area individuals employed stood at 51,650, compared to 46,480 in July and 45,010 in August, 1985.

Manufacturing employment in the six-county area rose slightly at mid-month to reach 17,420, compare to 17,400 one month ago and 17,010 in August, one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment experienced a loss at the reporting period. An estimated 20,230 individuals were employed in nonmanufacturing jobs, 720 below the previous estimate and 260 below that of one year ago.

## Timberline

By Brendix Glasgow,

In this second of a series of four articles we're taking a detailed look at the Southern Pine Beetle, using information gleaned from the book *The Southern Pine Beetle*, published by the U.S. Forest Service.

Many landowners ask, "Why are Southern Pine Beetles worse some years than others, and why do they hit some places, but not others?"

There are several reasons: one is that the insect comes and goes in cycles. For several years, the population will increase. The population of predators of the beetles (and there are many) will also increase. But the beetles are very productive, and it takes awhile for the predators to catch up to them. When they do, they will decimate the beetles and the numbers of both predators and prey will suddenly fall.

The Southern Pine Beetles may climb to epidemic levels in an area for a year or two before nature finally achieves a balance.

If conditions are just right, the epidemic can be especially bad.

What are these conditions? Basically, it's trees under stress. Stress is anything that slows down the growth of the trees. It may be climatic factors, such as super-abundant rainfall (which often causes problems in the poorly drained lowlands near the Gulf Coast), or drought, which more often affects other sections of the State. Storms and even lightning strikes are important. Forty percent of the beetle spots have lightning-struck trees, but only one percent of random plots in non-attacked stands have them.

It may take the stress-causing factor from two to twelve months to affect the trees. We can't do much about this, but we can do something about the next factor, which is just as serious: poor management.

Poorly managed stand -- those that are overcrowded, overmature or diseased -- grow slowly, and become stressed.

There are two theories about why beetles attack these stressed trees.

We do know that beetles communicate by odor, and some researchers suspect that stressed trees have a different smell, thereby attracting the beetles.

Another is that the female beetles land at random, and attempt to bore through the bark. A vigorously growing tree has such a strong resin flow that they are "Pitched

out" (washed out by the resin). This explains why longleaf and slash pines are seldom attacked: they produce much more resin than Loblolly and shortleaf pines.

When a female beetle bores into a tree a "pitch tube", which looks like a small yellowish-white crawfish mound, is formed at the point of entrance.

For some reason, females arrive first. Then males are lured by their odor. Males don't bore into the bark, but enter through the holes previously made by the females.

The insects construct tunnels under the bark of trees. There they feed and breed. The insects' tunneling and feeding, along with blue-stain fungi they introduce, kills the tree.

The males produce an odor that is repulsive to other beetles. For a while, the female "attractant" scent is overpowering, and more beetles are attracted. As more males arrive, their odor begins to dominate and additional insects are repelled, and instead go to another nearby stressed tree and colonize it.

The beetles are poor flyers, and can't live long in the open, so it's important that they have another acceptable tree fairly close by.

Important points to remember are these: the insects are always in pine forests, but they can't kill trees unless they are able to mass-attack them, and stressed trees make it easier. "So what", you may ask, "can I do about it?"

Thin! Begin thinning plantations at age 10-15. Remove poorly formed, stunted, and diseased trees. Be sure your trees have plenty of room to grow.

Search your pine stands periodically for lightning-struck trees. Cut them down before the needles begin to turn. Don't worry about getting them out of the woods,

once they're on the ground, the Southern Pine Beetles won't attack them.

In next week's column, we'll see what to do once the beetles strike.

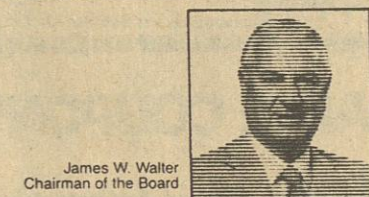

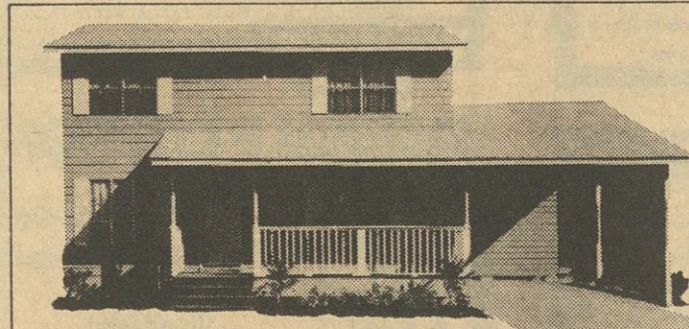

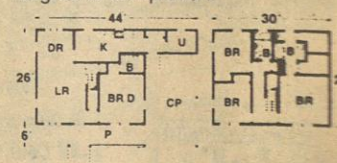

For years hypoglycemia has been a popular diagnosis in the lay press. However, true hypoglycemia is rarely seen and in fact, I have only seen it in one patient that wasn't a diabetic. The causes of hypoglycemia are usually broken down into two categories: (1) Hypoglycemia,

facilitate the transfer of glucose out of the bloodstream and into the cells so it may be used for energy. When there is too much insulin in the bloodstream, as when occurs in this tumor or when a diabetic takes too much insulin, then the sugar may fall perilously low. This may also occur with alcohol and in people who have had part or all of their stomach removed.

True hypoglycemia is rare and the symptoms are often very vague. If a patient presents with these symptoms or the conditions described above exist and a few simple tests are negative, efforts should be directed towards ruling out other types of diseases rather than focusing on therapy for hypoglycemia even though the patient may be convinced they have hypoglycemia.

occurring during the fasting state and (2) a reactive hypoglycemia that is seen soon after eating. The most common cause of hypoglycemia occurs when a diabetic takes two much medicine or does not follow the appropriate diet. Certain medications may also cause the blood sugar to be too low as does alcohol ingestion, adrenal or pituitary insufficiency, liver disease and large tumors which require significant amounts of glucose. These conditions usually cause hypoglycemia after the patient has gone a significant period without eating.

In reactive hypoglycemia the body will respond too vigorously to an elevation of the glucose, subsequently causing the glucose to drop too low. A classic example of this is a very rare tumor of the pancreas which, when stimulated by a meal, pours out too large amounts of insulin into the bloodstream. The function of insulin is to

## TISHOMINGO COUNTY SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT 1986

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners would like to present their annual report of activities to the people of Tishomingo County. They sponsored many activities during fiscal year 1986. Among the most significant accomplishments were:

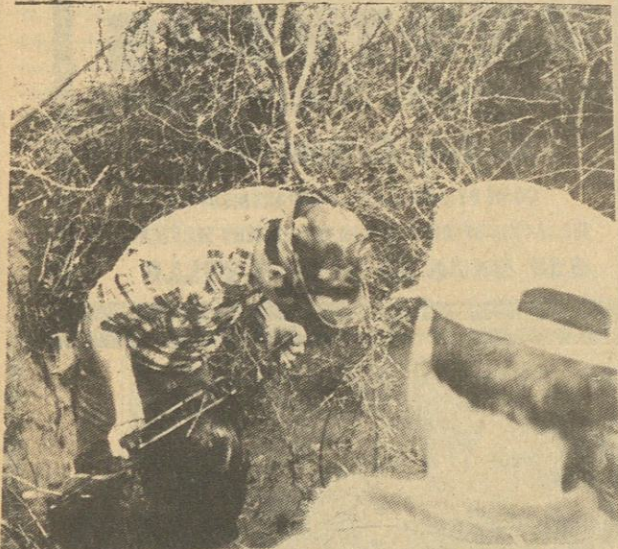
1. They developed and successfully completed an annual work plan for 1986.
2. Sponsored a beaver trapping seminar and demonstration, participated in tree planting week and worked with the Mississippi Forestry Commission and Westvac Timber Company to set up a demonstration sight along Highway 25 near Dennis. Also there were over 1600 Tishomingo County school children who received trees to be planted.
3. Sponsored a forestry seminar and tour, approximately 35 people from Tishomingo County attended the tour to Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Mill at Counce, Tennessee.
4. The District Commissioners supported the Cripple Creek Watershed.
5. Along with the Moormans Feed Company, they helped sponsor a pasture tour and study on the farm of J.A. Tucker. They also sponsored a fish pond management seminar and tour.
6. The commissioners were supported by the Iuka Mayor and Board of Supervisors in proclaiming May 13, Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation Day. This day resulted in more than 300 people attending the day long affairs in Jaybird Park.
7. They have completed an outdoor classroom at Tishomingo County Elementary School. Approximately 50 different trees and wildflowers have been named there. The classroom also has an amphitheater from which wildlife can be observed.
8. A membership drive was conducted and thirty-three people and businesses paid dues.
9. The commissioners supported the area Soil and Water Conservation District meeting by attending state and local meetings and paying state and national dues.
10. They won the Area IV outstanding No-Till award for Tishomingo County.
11. They worked closely with the Soil Conservation Service and the ASCS office in bringing more than 750 acres of highly erodible land under the conservation plan and having it placed in the Conservation Reserve Program.
12. Along with the Soil Conservation Service and the local people the district worked very closely to see that the Sunshine Bluebird Trail was completed through Tishomingo County, a distance of thirty-two miles from the Tennessee state line to the Itawamba County line. This resulted in a certificate of appreciation from the North American Bluebird Society.
13. A request was made to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for fifty acres of the Quasi public land around Bay Springs Lake to be used for wildlife tours, woodland tours and school groups.
14. Sponsored a poster contest between county schools. Also a photo contest between boy and girl scouts with prize money going to the winner.

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District is supported financially through an annual appropriation from the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors. We greatly appreciate their support because without it we could not carry on an active conservation program.

Finally we would like to express our appreciation to those landowners of Tishomingo County, who were concerned enough about the welfare of the natural resources of our county, to have applied conservation practices to their land throughout the year.

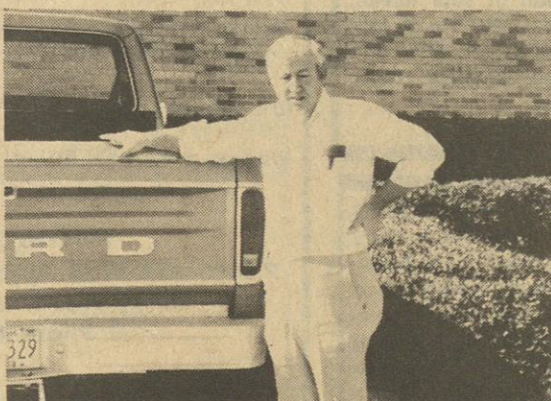
A Beaver Trapping Demonstration and Seminar was sponsored by the Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District, 43 people were in attendance.
