B'ville's Water Supply Improved

Following an October inspection the Town of Burnsville received notification that the operation of the water treatment plant has improved dramatically since last year. Environmental engineer, David H. Mitchell said Mayor Bobby Johnson and superintendent Jerrel Keele were to be congratulated for their interest in properly operating and maintaining the water supply.

Mitchell did state, however, that it is imperative that the Town continue closely

monitoring the operation of this water treatment plant or the problems with excessive iron will quickly return.

The following recommendations were made as a result of the recent inspection:

1. Always take routine bacteriological samples early in the month. This will allow the Town time to respond if problems occur.

2. Routinely monitor the chlorine residual to assure that at least 0.5 mg/l is maintained at the ends of the distribution system.

Iuka Man Charged With Larceny

Bobby Lomax, 30, of Eastport Road, has been charged with larceny in connection with the theft of a chain saw from the caretaker's shop at Eastport Development.

According to deputy Bobby Flynt, Lomax had recently been staying and doing odd jobs for Jim Feltman, the caretaker and whose home the shop is connected to.

Lomax was arrested following the recovery of the saw from a local pawn shop around 7 p.m. Sunday. Flynt said the register slip had Lomax's name signed to it. The saw valued at \$127 was

returned to Feltman.

Lomax was released after posting a \$1,000 bond. He awaits action of grand jury.

Investigation continues, Flynt said, into a separate break-in at a seasonal cabin at Eastport. The deputy said the sheriff's office was alerted when the alarm system was activated around 1:30 a.m. Sunday. The front door of the dwelling was broken, he said, but nothing was reported to have been missing. The alarm probably frightened the intruder(s) away, he reasoned.

Whitten Reseated In Tuesday's Race

U.S. Representative Jamie Whitten was re-elected to his 24th term as 1st District Congressman, defeating first time Republican candidate Larry Cobb 46,005 to 24,590 with 84 percent of the precincts reporting at presstime.

Tishomingo County voters joined electors state wide handing Whitten 2,115 votes to Cobb's 665. (unofficial figures) The nation's senior congressional member credits his past record for his re-election.

Voters state wide approved all five amendments listed on Tuesday's ballot with Tishomingo County showing the following figures:

Amendment No. 1
Education Fund, 2057 yes; 345 no

Approved giving constitutional protection to an educational trust fund made up of oil and gas revenues.

Amendment No. 2
Retirement Syst., 2177 yes; 354 no

Approved protecting retirement benefits accumulated by public employees and Highway Safety Patrol personnel. Under the change, retirement money collected from the employees could not be diverted to any other use.

Amendment No. 3
Gov. Succession, 1843 yes; 608 no

Overwhelmingly approved - making Mississippi one of the last states to allow governors to serve back-to-back terms.

Amendment No. 4
Treas. Succession, 1408 yes; 936 no

Approved to allow the state treasurer to serve successive terms.

Amendment No. 5
16th Sec. Reform, 1546 yes; 715 no

Approved extending the maximum lease term for 16th Section lands which are owned by the counties for the benefit of public schools from 25 years to 40 years.

Statement of Policy - Electric Power Association Subscribers

To the Consumer-Members of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association

During the past several months many of our members have made requests for trees or limbs to be cut or trimmed. As of this date we have a backlog of approximately 100 requests. This backlog has accumulated because of our efforts to trim the main distribution lines to prevent and reduce the length of power outages caused by limbs and trees falling on or across the lines. Our primary goal is to provide reliable service at affordable rates. This can only be accomplished by keeping rights-of-way clear.

We would ask that you understand when we cut limbs or trees on our easements that this reduces the chances for power outages caused by a windstorm, rotting limbs or trees, or accumulating ice during the winter. An outage not only affects your personal

convenience and protection of property from freezing, but in some cases can be a matter of life and death for someone in your household or someone farther out on the line.

In order to eliminate misunderstanding, we present the following:

STATEMENT OF POLICY
Right-Of-Way
Maintenance Procedures

1. All new and existing distribution lines shall be patrolled on a routine basis to determine the existence of any trees, limbs, or other structures which pose a danger.

2. Foremen will establish communications, when possible, with property owners prior to beginning trimming.

3. Trees should be cut to the stump when permitted and possible. Trimming should be as close to the trunk as possible; a minimum of 25' from centerline should be

maintained.

4. Requests from property owners for trimming of services will be scheduled when trimming crews are performing other work in the area. Trees or limbs that pose an immediate danger can be cut by the customer after the service has been taken down by a service crew. The service will be put back up during business hours at no charge.

5. Trimmings will be removed from areas that have been cleared or are maintained as lawn or pasture by the customer. In wooded

areas, trimmings will be laid inside the power line easement.

Customers who wish to have trees cut that endanger power lines or services should request a form at the main office to authorize the crews to cut such trees. There is no charge for these trimming or cutting services as long as it is to eliminate danger to power lines. We are unable to cut or trim trees that do not endanger power lines without charging for time worked at the actual rate of pay plus appropriate overhead.

County Unemployment Rose In September

The number unemployed in Tishomingo County rose slightly at mid-September. Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, said that statistics just released indicated 1,170 individuals unemployed in the county at mid-month, 30 more than the previous month but 250 less than one year ago. The current rate of unemployment is 15.5 percent, the same rate as for last month. One year ago it stood at 19.1 percent. The number of county residents employed rose to 6,370, compared to 6,020 in August and 6,020 in September, 1985. The civilian labor force also rose at the reporting period by 200 with an annual increase of 100.

Manufacturing employment in the county experienced a very minimal decline at mid-month to reach 2,630 with a yearly increase of 200. Nonmanufacturing employment, estimated to be 2,710, climbed 130 over the month and 50 over one year ago. This large monthly increase was found mostly in Government due to school related workers returning to work.

Smith also noted that in September the estimated total civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo rose 1,650 above August, with a yearly increase of 580. Unemployment showed a decrease of 930 from last month and was 550 less than the same period one year ago. The number of individuals employed increased 2,580, with an annual gain of 1,130. The rate of unemployment dropped 1.9 percentage points

from August and was 1.0 percentage point below the September, 1985, figure.

Total nonagricultural wage and salaried employment showed a monthly gain of 1,550 with an increase of 680 noted from the September, 1985, estimate. Manufacturing employment climbed 220 over the previous month and 850 over the figure for one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment rose by 1,330, mostly in Government and Service and Miscellaneous, but experienced a slight loss from the preceding year.


**Good Eating Habits
Foster Healthy Teeth**
Nearly one-third of Americans older than 45 have no natural teeth. Although 70 percent of adults' tooth loss is due to gum diseases, some teeth are claimed by tooth decay.

To help prevent tooth decay, eat a well-balanced diet. Be aware that plaque bacteria use sugars (including honey and the increasingly used substitutes

for refined white sugar such as corn syrup) to produce acids that can cause tooth decay. The American Dental Association defines plaque as a "sticky, thin, almost invisible film of bacteria and their by-products that form on everyone's teeth".

Since acids can attack the tooth enamel for 20 minutes or longer before they are neutralized, a major factor in cavity development is the frequency of these attacks. Eating sticky foods like raisins and honey, sucking on sugared cough drops or hard candy, and sipping sugared drinks can give the acids more attack time.


Even natural sugars in fruit can lead to decay. Still, fruit is nutritious and people do sometimes want desserts. ADA says the best way to

Letter To The Editor The Future Of Health Care In Tishomingo County

For the past several months there has been a series of rumors circulating in the local community about the future of our hospital. Most of these are pure heresay. From what I have been able to learn it seems that there is a distinct possibility that our hospital will, in the near future, be leased to or managed by, either Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis or North Mississippi Medical Center, Tupelo, both of which are fine institutions.

The history of our local hospital is well known to us but certain facts need to be remembered in all of this.

1. The hospital currently employs between 120-130 people.

2. The payroll amounts to \$1,700,000 - \$1,800,000 annually. As one can see from these figures our hospital is one of the largest employers in this county and makes a very significant contribution to the local economy.

Anybody can see from these figures that it is in all our interests to support the local hospital. No matter who leases or manages our institution, it will not be successful without the support of the entire community.

What will this support mean? It will require the support of the (1) Board of Supervisors, (2) Our City Officials, (3) Board of Trustees, (4) The Entire Medical Staff, (5) The Hospital Administration and Employees, (6) The Local Banks, (7) The Local Business Community, and (8) The Citizens of Tishomingo County.

The Board of Supervisors will have to commit themselves to supporting our ambulance service as well as the hospital. Just like any other essential service, such as the Fire Department, is funded thru local taxation, our County Ambulance Service should be likewise funded in full.

Our Medical Staff will have to work together as a team to make any arrangement successful. This will entail each physician making a 100% commitment to support our local hospital services, both inpatient and outpatient.

I would ask each of you to consider what it means to have a local hospital. It, along with our school system, are the two most attractive features we have as regards attempting to draw the much needed new industries to our area. The possibility of not having an acute care hospital here is too frightening to consider.

In summary I feel we need to help ourselves. We cannot, or should not, expect somebody from Memphis or Tupelo to solve our problems. Rather it should be a team effort of our commitment and their expertise, working together to provide first class medical care to all the citizens of our county.

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CARING FOR YOUR PET



In Case Of An Emergency

What you do in an emergency may save your pet's life. Remember, however, that emergency first aid will not take the place of experienced medical attention. Take your pet to your veterinarian as soon as possible after an accident or if your pet becomes suddenly ill.

The most common reason for emergency attention is when an animal is hit by an automobile. If a dog is hit, it is always frightened and generally in pain. Be very careful in the way you handle the animal.

In an accident case, there are three important steps you should follow: (1) Protect yourself from being bitten. Wrap a cloth around the animal's mouth and tie it behind the ears. (2) Be careful and prevent the animal from running off. Most pets will try to hide when badly hurt. (3) Prevent further shock to the animal by careful handling. Keep the pet warm and quiet.

If a leg is broken, do not try to apply a splint. A splint improperly applied may do more harm than good. Instead, carefully slide the animal onto a rug, heavy blanket or board and take it to the veterinarian at once. Try to keep the animal immobilized.

If there is heavy bleeding, apply pressure directly over the wound after covering it with clean gauze or cloth.

To help prevent infection of a cut or wound, keep it clean and healthy by covering with a moist clean cloth. Keep the cloth moist. Never put strong antiseptics or ointments on wounds. If you do, it may be difficult for the veterinarian

to close the wound by suturing.

If poisoning is suspected, the animal must be taken to the veterinarian at once. Every minute counts. If possible take along the container so the exact poison can be determined. This makes administering the proper antidote easier and quicker.

When a dog or cat continually claws at its mouth, use extreme care. It may indicate rabies or a foreign object, such as a piece of bone or stick, caught in the teeth. Gently remove the object if you can see it.

If the object has been swallowed and is lodged in the throat, it may be necessary for your veterinarian to administer anesthesia or sedation so that it can be safely extracted from the esophagus.

Red, inflamed or blistered skin may be caused by a burn. To relieve the pain, apply cool, wet packs to the damaged area. Do not use grease or ointment. Extensive burns require professional treatment as soon as possible.

Use common sense to keep your pet out of emergency situations. But when they do occur, be ready to help with first aid treatment.

ASCS Farm News

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, on October 1, began accepting applications for the 1987 wheat acreage reduction program. The sign-up period ends March 30, 1987.

Farmers who participate in the program will be eligible to receive price support loans at \$2.28 per bushel and target price protection at \$4.38 per bushel, according to Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASCS Office.

Despite the smallest wheat harvest in seven years, USDA predicts a record 4.03-billion-bushel-supply of wheat will be available during 1986-87. Increased stocks and the expected near-record Hard Red Spring wheat crop will overshadow reduced Hard Red Winter wheat output, resulting in 3 billion bushels of bread wheat. In an effort to reduce planted acreage, production, and total supplies to a level more in line with demand, Bridges said the 1987 wheat program contains a 27.5 percent acreage reduction requirement.

"The program requires farmers to limit their 1987 wheat planted to no more than 72.5 percent of their wheat acreage base," Bridges said. Program participants also must maintain in acreage conservation reserve an area equal to 37.93 percent of their planted acres.

He said to be eligible for loans, purchases and payments on wheat, the acreage planted for harvest on a farm to other program commodities may not exceed their respective crop acreage base. Producers who plant at least 50 percent of the permitted acreage to wheat and maintain the remaining permitted acreage in conserving uses will be eligible for deficiency payments of 92 percent of the permitted acreage, the same as in 1986.

To apply for the 1987 Wheat Program, or obtain additional program information, farmers may contact the Tishomingo County ASCS Office.

Should You Defer Earnings?

In the recent past, many taxpayers chose to "defer compensation" -- less money now, more money after

retirement when, it was assumed, they would be in a lower tax bracket. Does it still make sense, given the new, lower tax rates which may or may not continue?

The main advantage is that the deferred compensation earns interest on the entire pre-tax amount; many companies pay as much as 10 to 12 percent interest on that money. It won't be as beneficial at lower tax rates, but the taxpayer still gets to invest more that way.

However, the new law does limit how much a company can pay from a funded pension plan to an employee who retires before 65. Many companies will get around this by paying out of unfunded pension plans, but this money is chancier; it's not guaranteed by the government and is subject to mergers, acquisitions and bankruptcies.

Stock options don't look so good if capital gains lose their tax preferential treatment. Look for changes there.

Limited Fall Turkey Season

Fall either-sex turkey season will open for all of Bolivar County and lands west of the main Mississippi River levee in Coahoma, DeSoto, Issaquena, Tunica, Washington and Warren Counties November 8 - November 16 and again December 6 - December 14, 1986. Davis Island, King's Point and Brown's Point in Warren County will also be

open. Fall seasons have been closed for two years in these areas which have traditionally had high density turkey populations. Flooding of the Mississippi River for two years caused poor nesting success. Good hatches in 1985 and 1986 have allowed populations to recover, making way for the re-statement of fall turkey seasons.

DWC law enforcement officials stress that these are the only legal fall turkey hunting areas. Hunters are allowed a total of two turkeys of either-sex per season, not to exceed three per license year. The current license year also includes the 1987 spring gobblers-only season.

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



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
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
