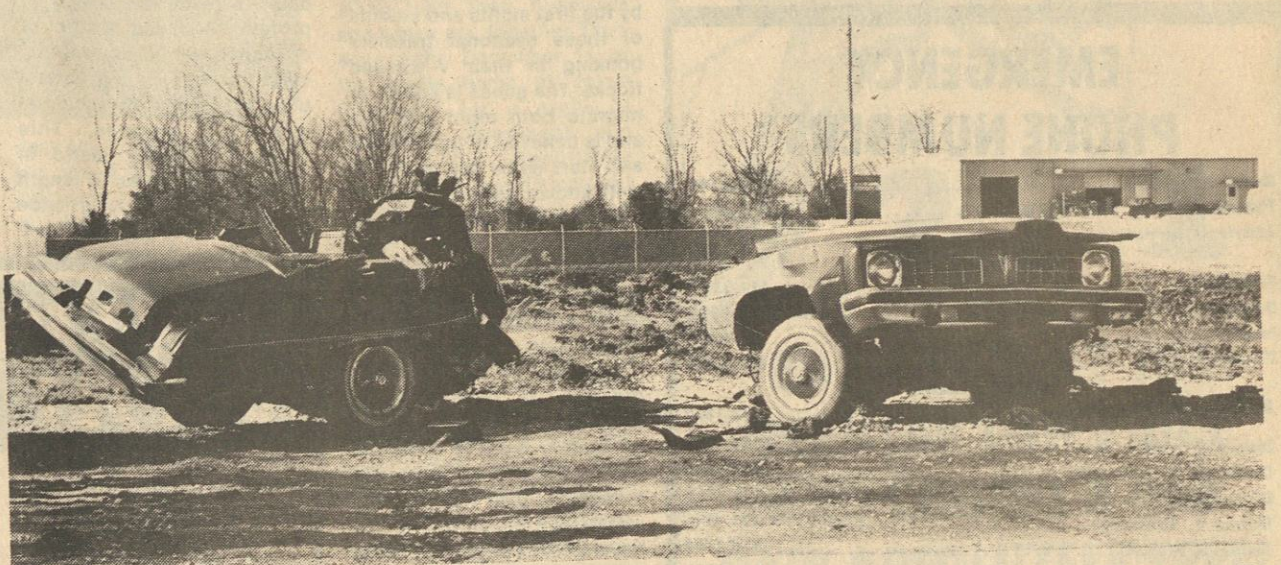

The vehicle in which two Tishomingo young men were traveling was torn apart after leaving the road and crashing

into a tree. Glenn Dale Southward, 24, and Jimmy Earl Luster, 21, were both killed instantly according to Alabama State Trooper

report. The wreck occurred Saturday, January 10, about 7:15 a.m. on the Allsboro Road about a mile south of U.S. 72 in the edge of Colbert

County, Alabama. The wreckage of the 1975 Pontiac was towed to Muscle Shoals. Joint funeral services were held Wednesday for the victims.

Two County Men Killed In One Vehicle Crash

Two young black Tishomingo men were killed instantly in a one car crash Saturday morning about one mile south of U.S. 72 on Allsboro Road in Colbert County, Alabama. The pair were identified as Jimmy Earl Luster, 21, of Route 1, Tishomingo and Glenn Dale Southward, 24, of Route 2, Tishomingo.

Information obtained from the Alabama State Troopers Office indicated the accident to have occurred around 7:15 a.m. when the driver, Jimmy

Earl Luster, apparently lost control of the vehicle, ran off the road and crashed into a cedar tree, literally wrapping the car around it.

The wreckage of the 1975 model Pontiac had to be pulled off the tree before the penned in bodies of young Luster and Southward could be freed. Colbert County coroner, Jessie York pronounced both victims dead at the accident scene.

Other events surrounding the accident are being investigated spokesman Of-

ficer White said; however, he was not at liberty to discuss such. It was stated that the car had apparently been purchased recently by Glenn Southward.

Alabama Trooper Frank Williams worked the accident.

Joint funeral services were conducted Wednesday, January 14, at 11:00 a.m. for Jimmy Earl Luster and Glenn Southward at Saint Peter Missionary Baptist Church No. 2 in the Carter's Branch Community. Rev. Harold Brock officiated. Thompson and Sons Funeral Home of Tusculum, Alabama, was in charge of the Luster service; Deaton Funeral Home of Belmont was in charge of the Southward service. Burial was in the Carter's Branch Cemetery.

Jimmy Earl Luster was a native of Colbert County, Alabama, and resided in Tishomingo where he had attended Tishomingo High School and was a member of Carter's Branch Church of Christ.

Survivors include his parents, Otis T. and Ethel Rea Luster; four brothers, Otis T. Luster, Jr., Robert Luster, William Luster, Michael Luster; three sisters, Connie Luster, Diane L. Johnson, Sondra Luster, his paternal

grandmother, Mattie Shelton, all of Tishomingo; five aunts, Emogene Reid of Flint, Mich., Ruby Brock, Tishomingo, Maggie Belle Richardson, Cherokee, Ala., and a special aunt, Nellie Thorne of Cherokee, Ala.; Bertha Mae Allen, Sheffield, Ala.; two uncles, James Southward, Tishomingo, and Joe Davis of Hamilton, Ala.; a special nephew, Michael Luster, Tishomingo; a host of nieces, nephews, relatives, and friends.

Number Of Constables Could Be Reduced

County Constables must qualify for the 1987 elections under the same system as in past elections; however, a new law proposed to change the number of constables in Mississippi counties awaits U.S. Justice Department approval.

The law would change the number of constables in Tishomingo County from five

corresponding to supervisor districts - to two - corresponding to justice court beats.

The bill changing the number of constables was submitted to the Justice Department December 19, and that office has 60 days from receipt of the proposed to issue a ruling. A federal ruling on the issue may not come until mid-February.

Pittman Requests Bell Investigation

Attorney General Ed Pittman has asked the Public Service Commission to investigate the current operating expenses of South Central Bell in hopes of getting customer rates reduced.

Recent income tax changes, coupled with reductions in the number of employees and lower interest rates on debts, may result in substantial savings for the company which should be passed on to ratepayers, Pittman said.

A petition was filed Monday with the PSC seeking the investigation. The petition said the utility rate expert used by the attorney general in state and federal litigation has analyzed changes in the

corporate expenses of the telephone company. His calculations indicate the possibility of an early and timely rate reduction, Pittman said.

The attorney general said he was confident South Central Bell would have eventually considered all these factors on its own in adjusting rates. His request to the PSC was made to insure that any appropriate reduction be made as soon as possible.

Pittman is urging all utility companies operating in Mississippi to make their own investigations to see if reductions in expenses could result in a benefit to their customers as well as to the companies.

Three Youths Charged In Church Burglary

Three male youths have been charged with the January 6 burglary of the Iuka Methodist Church. Police Chief Floyd Whitaker said the trio was apprehended around 10 a.m. the following day.

Jailed were Tommy Glover, 19, and Donnie Davis, 18, both of Iuka. Davis was released Sunday after posting a \$5,000 appearance bond. Glover

remained jailed at press time under a \$5,000 bond. Both await action of the grand jury.

The third suspect, a juvenile, also of Iuka, was released to his mother.

Damage was done as intruders broke glass partitions of the church building's office doors, keys and money were reportedly taken, and the premises left in a ransacked state.

Wal-Mart Scholarship Program Announced

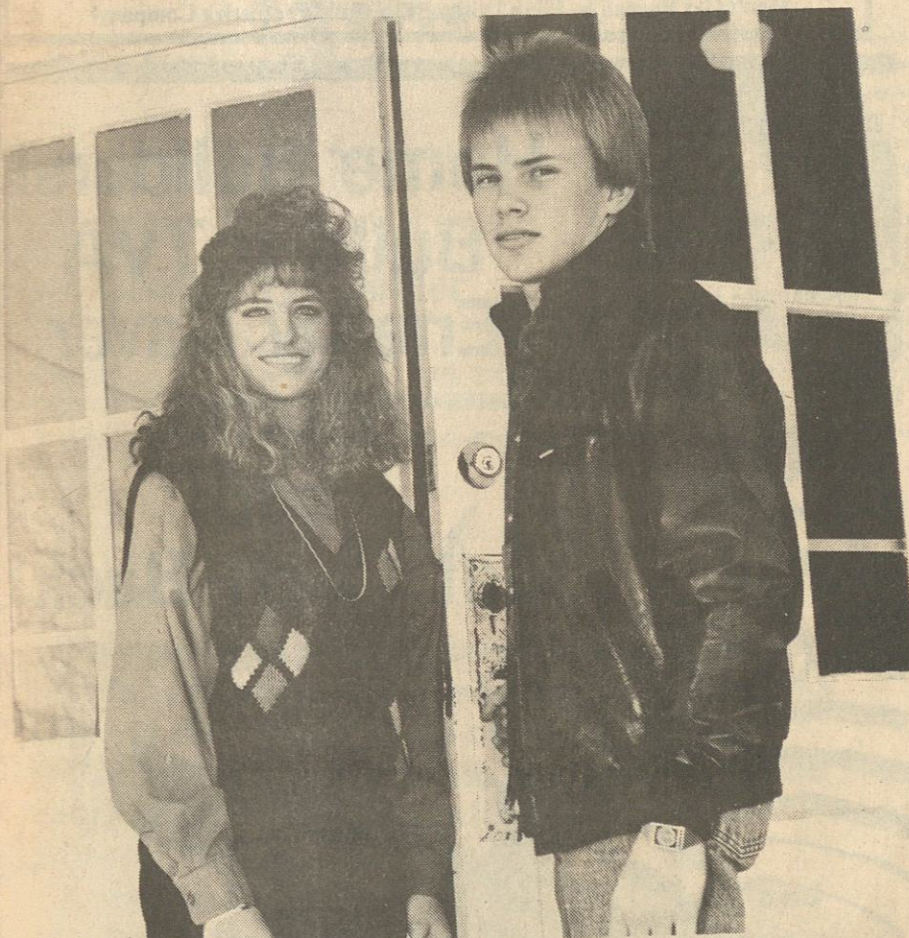

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

Sales

Although sales offer you an opportunity to buy items at reduced prices, they also may encourage you to buy things you do not really need. Remember, a bargain is a bargain only if you need and can afford it.

The best way to avoid spending your shopping dollars foolishly is to shop only when you have a specific item in mind. Avoid shopping to lift your spirits when you are depressed.

When shopping for a specific sale item, it is a good idea to bring a copy of the ad with you -- to verify price, model, size or sale dates. A Federal Trade Commission regulation states that stores should have items at the advertised price readily available during the sale period.

If they are not, ask for a rain check. This will enable you to purchase the item at the sale price when the stock is replenished. Be sure the merchant indicates on the rain check its expiration date and the date the merchandise is expected.

The usual types of sales include:

*Clearance sales, held primarily to remove excess merchandise, include end-of-the-month, pre- or post-inventory and going-out-of-business clearances. Usually a variety of items are reduced.

*Stimulation sales held to encourage buying during slack periods, include reductions on regular merchandise

or special purchase items offered for the sale.

*Seasonal sales, held at the end of the season or sometimes pre-season, include clothing, yard goods, sports equipment, outdoor furniture, gardening equipment and gift items.

*Traditional sales, normally scheduled for certain times each year, are frequently held annually or bi-annually. Reductions may be storewide or cover only certain lines of merchandise -- white goods, furniture, housewares.

The following points may help you take advantage of sales prices:

*Find out the store's return policy for sale merchandise and whether or not they offer rain checks.

*Know the original price of sale items, to be sure of getting a real bargain.

*Examine merchandise carefully, checking sizes, colors, styles and the condition of the goods.

*Try on clothing when possible.

*Inspect seconds and irregulars carefully.

*Consider the costs of repairing damaged merchandise.

*Consider your shopping expenses -- transportation, parking, meals, babysitters -- and the value of your time and energy when shopping for sale items.

*Follow your normal buying habits to avoid excessive spending on sale merchandise.

Jackpot Venison

1 lb. ground venison
2 T. salad oil

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Tenn-Tom Today....

For thousands of years the North American landscape has been blessed with the annual migration of the Canada Goose. Northward migration from the southern wintering grounds starts in March and April progressing north just as fast as the melting snows reveal the grains, roots and nourishing plants that feed these birds known to many as the honker. Wildlife researchers claim that the 35 degree isotherm marks the spring migration of the goose. The Cree Indians marked the arrival of spring by the first sights and sounds of these seasonal travelers honking in their V shaped flocks. The goose is known to migrate both night and day and is believed to use the sun and stars as its sky map. The well known author and conservationist Aldo Leopold observed and wrote "one swallow does not make a summer, but one skein of geese, cleaving the murk of a March thaw, is the spring".

The urge to migrate is as old as life itself and is triggered by the increase in sunlight brought on by longer spring days. This increased sunlight is also rich in ultraviolet rays, essential to the development of young. These rays mobilize lime which is necessary for the birds' eggshells. Ultra-violet rich sunshine also excites the pituitary, thyroid and hypothalamas glands setting the stage for courtship, mating, and successful reproduction. Except for the great horned owl the Canada goose is the first bird to breed in spring and is known to mate for life, unless separated by death. A goose that loses its mate will take another life partner. Possible nest locations are inspected by both the goose (female) and gander (male). The final site selection is made by the female who starts nesting just as soon as the snow and ice is gone from the ancestral breeding grounds. The nest is usually placed on the ground, within a few feet of the water and is constructed of grass, leaves and reeds. The goose lays 5 to 9 eggs in the nest which has been lined with her own warm "goose down". Incubation of the eggs takes just shy of one month. The gander defends the goose and the nest against such predators as: skunks, fox, coyote, crows, and herring gulls. Successful nestings occur from sea level to over 8,000 feet in the Yellowstone plateau of Wyoming. The young goslings are cared for and educated by both parents enabling them to learn valuable survival lessons that will help them to live to a maximum age of thirty.

Soon after the goslings are born the adults molt. This annual loss of flight feathers make both parents flightless. During the next two months both adults and youngsters can not fly and must depend on the security of the open

water to escape predators. Youngsters reach flight stage at about the same time parents regain flight feathers. This unique timing enables the entire family group to fly at the same time. The Canada goose has tactile sensitivity in its bill enabling it to distinguish between mud, rocks and food while feeding on aquatic plants submerged under the surface of the water. As summer progresses, heavy feeding builds excess fat reserves that are needed by the geese to accomplish the arduous autumn ritual known as the fall migration. Research studies have shown that pound for pound this fat delivers twice the energy of protein. Reduced length of daylight and freezing weather conditions spark the natural urge to migrate to ancestral wintering grounds. This migration usually starts in October and varies in length as determined by a wide variety of environmental con-

ditions. Mans historic involvement in the life cycle of the Canada goose has usually been associated with the hunters harvest of this magnificent renewable resource. During the 1930's and 1940's sportsmen and biologists became concerned over the continual decreases in the honker population. One of the major factors contributing to the reduced numbers of geese was the destruction of productive northern breeding habitat. Acre upon acre of prolific waterfowl nesting areas were drained and thus rendered useless for breeding waterfowl. With this loss of available land for nesting, goose populations went steadily downhill. Sportsmen and natural resource agencies knew that if this situation was not reversed the sound of "Goose Music" each fall would turn into a distant echo of yet another species in environmental

distress.

With the establishment of resident populations and protection of nesting and wintering grounds sportsmen and resource agencies have successfully increased Canada goose populations from a low of 76,700 on the Mississippi flyway in 1944 to a flyway population of 662,000 in 1974. This return of the goose population has been a spectacular wildlife management accomplishment rivaling the comeback of the white-tailed deer. The Canada goose now stands as a tribute to what a concerned, caring, and determined group of people can accomplish when a living creature is in desperate need of help.

As the nations primary water resource management agency the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has been extensively involved in the return of the Canada goose. Managing over 11 million acres at 460 water resource projects, the Corps is a strong promoter of modern wildlife management and is directly involved in the management of the Canada goose nation wide.

start to increase in numbers this nesting season. Food plots, nesting structures, and protected areas have been developed for these non-migratory honkers in the hope that all the essentials of year round residency will be provided for these northern visitors, here in the land of Dixie.

Many years ago Aldo Leopold wrote, "A man may not care for golf and still be human, but the man who does not like to see, hunt, photograph, or otherwise outwit birds or animals is hardly normal". A Deadly Syndrome

A variety of urinary problems, commonly known as the Feline Urological Syndrome (FUS), is the most serious single health problem of felines in Tennessee.

The exact cause of FUS in cats has not been determined. It remains the subject of extensive research and scientific speculation.

Many bacteria -- and more recently, viruses -- have been isolated from various cases of FUS. In addition, such things as metabolic imbalance, neglected infections elsewhere in the body and contamination of the reproductive organs have been linked to FUS. However, to date, none of these has proven to be the single cause for this syndrome. Further studies may show that there is no single cause, but a combination of factors that lead to the disease.

FUS is seen in cats of all ages. Male cats appear to be more prone than females. This may be due to the fact that the signs are more dramatic and readily identifiable in the male so more male cats with FUS are seen by veterinarians.

Recent research indicates that the disease is contagious and spread from cat-to-cat by contact. And there is some evidence to show that the disease is more prevalent in the colder months.

One of the first signs of FUS that an owner is likely to notice is when a housebroken cat suddenly changes its habits and urinates in a bathtub, on the floor or in a sink. Other symptoms include: frequent urination in small quantities, straining to urinate, traces of blood in the urine, listlessness and poor appetite.

Veterinarians warn

that frequently straining to urinate is mistaken for constipation. Laxatives can kill a cat whose urethral passage is blocked by causing spasms which can burst the distended bladder. A veterinarian should, therefore, be contacted before giving the animal a laxative.

Once the urethra becomes blocked, coma, convulsions and death frequently occur within 48 hours. The cat will suffer great pain from the time the blockage begins until the coma sets in.

If your feline shows any of the symptoms of FUS, contact your veterinarian immediately. By the time the signs are noticed, the disease may have reached a critical stage and time is of utmost importance.

Antibiotics, forced feeding and fluid therapy to prevent dehydration may be used to treat the disease. Surgery may be recommended. Following treatment, special medication to keep the cat's urine acid as well as vitamins and special diets will be necessary to maintain the animal's health.

Currently, there is no vaccine available to prevent FUS. However, early diagnosis can prevent needless pain for your animal. And diseases diagnosed early are less costly to treat than more advanced or chronic cases.

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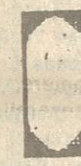

1946 Shows Growth For Iuka

Presenting the growth of Iuka in an interesting program at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club last week, R. R. Hamilton, editor of The Vidette, compiled the following statistics. New homes built by Owen Bullard, Jesse Winston, Douglas Maxwell, Olie Gist, C. L. Pace, Jr., three Dexter homes, Luther Beard and Ward Moser. A new home also on Highway 72 near Ben Busby's place and the Ledbetter home near the substation.

New business houses include Bullard's Country Club (4 business spaces), Randles Grocery, Dexter Lumber office, Herbert Biggs cleaning and pressing; Frozen Foods plant, Sweeney's Kaiser-Frazer display building. County Farm Improvement Association with a large new warehouse and offices. Bill Deaton's bus station, a two-story building with apartments above; Magnolia Garment Factory building, Dick Bonds grocery and Nelson's Mule Barn. 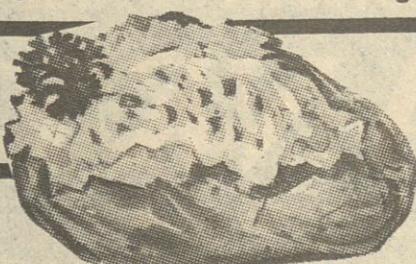

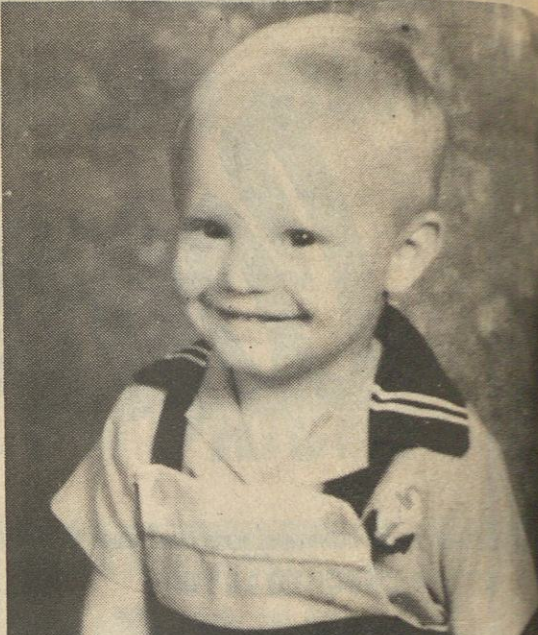

*Many doctors will not take the time to tell you much if you don't ask, so be prepared with a written list of questions.

*Ask the doctor for names of patients who will be willing to talk to you about their surgery.

4-H News

Deer Facts

Wildlife is an exciting and informative 4-H project that many 4-H members in Tishomingo County are active in. Their activities include preparing wildlife food plots, studying wildlife habitats, participating in hunter safety courses and working to preserve existing wildlife species in Mississippi.

One animal that many of our members study is the white-tailed deer commonly found in Mississippi. The 4-H members have uncovered some facts which may be interesting to hunters and ob-

servers.

*The average range of a deer in Mississippi is one square mile, but this range is variable. Some deer move much more than others and ranges in excess of seven or eight miles have been noted.

*Deer are color blind, but they can see well at night and detect very slight movements. White-tails really see the world in shades of gray. They do not see the orange color worn by deer hunters as we do. But an entire jacket of one color is more easily detected than the different colored shades of camouflage.

*Deer weights vary around the state. How much a deer weighs depends on its sex and age, fertility of the soil, size of the deer herd and

other factors.

*The weight (field dressed) of a one and one-half year old buck will generally be between 70 and 100 pounds. Weights of bucks two and one-half years or older are normally between 90 and 130 pounds. Does are smaller than bucks and weigh 20 to 50 pounds less.

*Male deer lose their antlers each year, normally around March or April. There are exceptions. Bucks in the state have been known to shed horns as early as the first week in January. Usually antler growth begins during early spring and is completed around late September or early October when fully hardened and polished antlers appear.

*There are three basic elements needed for good antler development. First, is nutrition. A deer must have enough of the right kinds of food present. For example, some species of honeysuckle or greenbrier should be available on a year round basis for any deer herd. The buck must be old enough to have a well-developed rack. And, if proper genetics are not present in the deer, antler size will be reduced.

ASCS Farm News

Disaster Payment Program Opens Jan. 12

Farmers who lost more than 50 percent of their crop production in 1986 because of drought may apply for the Disaster Payment Program starting January 12th at the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Program applications may be filed through January 30, 1987.

The 1986 Disaster Payment Program compensates eligible producers in disaster-affected counties for production losses on program and nonprogram crops, according to county ASCS official Howard R. Bridges. For the 1986 Disaster Program, program crops are wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton, rice, peanuts, soybeans, sugarcane, and sugar beets. Non-program crops are tobacco, extra long staple cotton and commercial crops.

To apply for assistance on a wheat, feed grain, upland cotton and rice crop, Bridges said farmers must have participated in the acreage reduction program for the crop. For assistance on other crops, the acreage for disaster payments is limited to the 1985 acreage of the crop. "Producers who apply for disaster assistance must furnish to the ASCS office 1986 acreage and crop production reports, and, under certain conditions, provide evidence of their actual yields for 1983, 1984, or

1985 for all crops except wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, cotton, rice, peanuts and certain kinds of tobacco," Bridges said.

Point Of Law

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some legal rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your rights.)

Q. Does the law protect a worker who is fired or disciplined for trying to promote better working or safety conditions?

A. Yes, in certain circumstances. While there is no state law in Mississippi that would prevent an employer from discharging or disciplining any worker who did this, the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB), a Federal agency may be willing to do so. The commonly-held notion that the NLRB only protects the rights of unionized workers, or those trying to unionize, is wrong. Some common examples of protected concerted activities are: (a) lodging complaints about safety or other workplace conditions; (b) protesting the actions of supervisors, including the discharge or discipline of fellow workers; (c) protesting salary, benefits or production policies.

A worker may file, and the NLRB will consider, an "unfair labor practice charge" as long as three conditions are met: (a) the employer is sub-

ject to NLRB jurisdiction (government employers are excluded, as well as those subject to the Railway Labor Act, and the NLRB has dollars volume limits which exclude smaller employers - e.g., retail businesses doing less than \$500,000 annual gross volume of business); (b) the employee is covered by the National Labor Relations Act (farm workers, domestic servants, children and spouses of employers, supervisors, managers, and persons working for employers not covered by the NLRA are the most common exclusions);

and, (c) the charge is filed within six months of the alleged unfair labor practice.

If the NLRB determines, after investigation, that the charge has merit and if a voluntary settlement is not reached, an unfair labor practice complaint will be filed against the employer by the NLRB Regional Director's Office. This will be followed by an administrative "trial" in which the employer is the defendant and attorneys from the Regional Director's Office, represent the employees' interests.

If the unfair labor practice

charge is sustained, the employers may be required to employ the discharged worker and pay back wages.

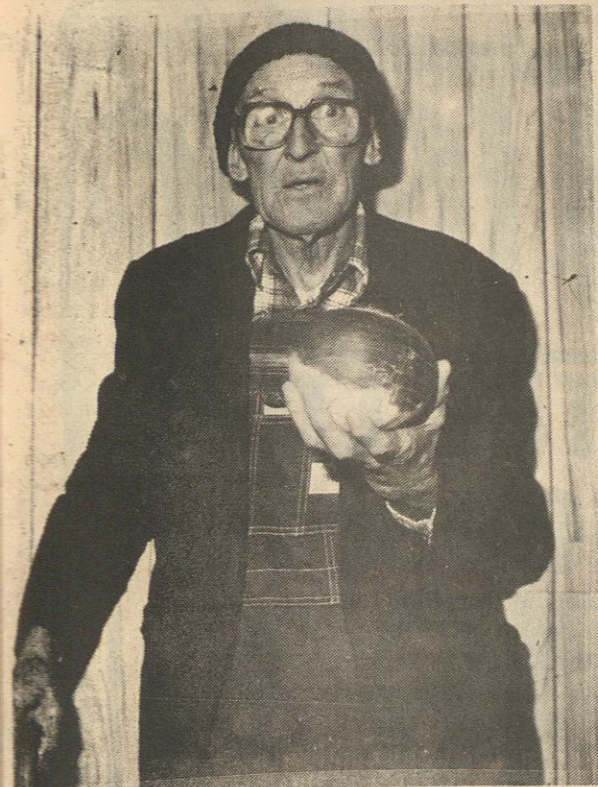

Just what is a woman?

Students Publish Analysis Of Strange Creature London, July 19 (UPI)

Q. What are the long-term effects of smoking marijuana?

(S.A. Biloxi, MS)

A. There are numerous medical and scientific studies documenting the damage that marijuana has on the body. Research continues on the effects of marijuana. Some of the harmful effects that have been documented are:

HEART. Marijuana use increases the heart rate as much as 50% and cause chest pains and very low blood pressure in people with heart problems.

LUNGS. Repeated inhalation of smoke into the lungs causes inflammation and affects pulmonary functions. One study on long-term use found that smoking five marijuana joints a week was more harmful than almost six packs of cigarettes a week.

IMMUNE SYSTEM. Some studies suggest that heavy marijuana smoking affects the white cell formation, hindering the body's ability to fight infection.

As the saying goes, "not one study gives marijuana a clean bill of health".

Report From The House----

Budget problems and highways were among the big issues as the 1987 legislative session got off to a relatively brisk start last week.

There was limited floor action in the Mississippi House of Representatives during the initial week of the 90-day session. But numerous committee meetings were held as legislators began the painstaking task of digging through the massive stack of bills awaiting consideration.

There is general agreement that one of the toughest jobs facing the 1987 session will be to find a way to deal with the state's tight money situation. A proposed \$1.547 billion general fund budget has been recommended by the Joint Legislative Budget Committee for the coming year. While this represents an increase of \$41 million over the present fiscal year, it still is substantially less than the funding sought by most agencies and departments.

Copies of the official budget recommendations were placed on the desks of all legislators shortly before the opening gavels were rapped January 6 in the House and Senate. The 665-page volume includes the detailed budget proposals submitted by the Legislative Budget Committee and the Governor's Office.

A special briefing on the state's financial outlook was given later to a joint House-Senate session by State Economist Ed Ranck and other fiscal specialists.

The state's highway system was the chief topic to a joint meeting last week of the Transportation Committee and Ways and Means Committee. These are the two committees assigned to study the bill which, if enacted, would provide for four-laning of 1,059 miles of highway throughout the state. The \$1.5 billion program would be financed under the proposal by an increase of 5 cents per gallon in state fuel taxes.

The highways legislation was prepared following a series of meetings around the state last year on highway needs and how to deal with them. The chairmen of both study committees indicated they hoped to move quickly on the measure. A public hearing was planned for Tuesday (January 13) this week on the bill.

The House Education Committee began work last week with a briefing by officials from the State Education Department on proposed legislation for the coming year. Early meetings also were called by a number of other committees including Appropriations, Constitution, County Affairs, Fees and Salaries, Public Utilities, and Penitentiary.

A written motion proposing a number of House rule changes was filed on the first day of the session, setting the stage for consideration of these and other proposals dealing with rules as the first week drew to an end last Friday. And a resolution was

adopted inviting the Governor to appear before a joint session this week to present his 1987 proposals.

Other highlights of the opening week included approval of an appropriation bill to defray legislative expenses, introduction of more than 350 bills and resolutions, and a "first" for the Mississippi House. The opening prayer of the session was given by the Rev. Ann Stevenson of St. James Episcopal Church in Jackson, marking the first time in the memory of lawmakers a woman had given the prayer to open the session.

The Midway Rural Community Development Club met with members of the Springhill Methodist Church for a Christmas Carol Sing. The program was held at the church educational building on December 22, at 6 p.m.

Rev. Mainers opened the meeting with a prayer. Rev. Tommy Purvis gave a very inspiring devotion based on the birth of Christ and meaning of the beautiful Christmas Story. The youth from the church gave a short Christmas program. Following the children's program the group sang Christmas Carols, accompanied by Mrs. Barbara Pardue at the piano.

Christmas refreshments were served at the conclusion of the program.

The Midway RCDC will meet at the Community Center on January 25, at 6 p.m. The purpose of this meeting will be to plan the 1987 club program.

Hard, head green cabbage is the unsophisticated member of its family, but holds an edge over other types.
Other types of cabbage (Savoy, Nappa, Bok Choy and the red hard, head type) are more exciting than green cabbage because they're used in unusual salads and stir-fried dishes. They also have a place in the average family's varied diet, but they're more expensive and more perishable than more ordinary cabbage. Year-round availability of hard, head cabbage -- at a relatively economical price -- has contributed to its popularity. Versatility and ease of preparation are other points in favor of cabbage.

In fresh form, cabbage is most always lower-priced and higher-yielding than other members of its vegetable family, which includes broccoli, brussels sprouts and cauliflower. Average yield of a pound of cabbage is eight half-cup servings of shredded fresh cabbage or four to five

equal-size servings of cooked cabbage.

To keep the crisp texture and vitamin C content of fresh cabbage, protect it at three points: In storage, during preparation and at serving time. Even in the fresh vegetable compartment of frost-free refrigerators, cabbage needs the added protection of a plastic bag. Wrapping cabbage heads in a moist towel also helps to prevent changes in texture and food value during refrigeration.

It's now considered best to

cook cabbage in a heavy covered pan because this method reduces cooking time and reduces the amount of water added before cooking. Baking soda does more harm than good in that it destroys much of cabbage's vitamin C content.

Shredded hard, head cabbage may be pan-fried or stir-fried (cooked quickly in a small amount of fat) though these cookery methods are more often used for loose-leaved Chinese types such as Nappa and Bok Choy.

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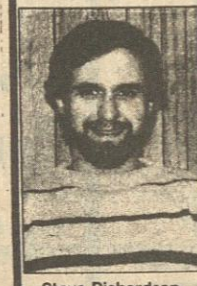

Report From The Senate

The first week of the 1987 Legislative Session saw action on several pieces of major legislation by Senate committees and by the full Senate.

The Senate Finance Committee, of which I am a member, passed a comprehensive highway construction bill Thursday and the full Senate may take action on this next week if the bill also passes the Senate Highways and Transportation Committee. This bill would pave 1,054 miles of four-lane highways throughout the state. The construction would be funded for the most part by an increase in the gasoline tax of five cents per gallon over a ten-year period. The bill requires the contracts on all the segments of the 12 highways designated to be let by

the end of the ten-year period. A set of criteria involving traffic count, safety, and economic development determine which road segments are to be built first, second, or third. Included in the plan are the four-laning of U.S. 45 from the Tennessee line to the Alabama line near State Line and U.S. 72 from the Tennessee line near Mt. Pleasant extending southeasterly through Alcorn and Tishomingo Counties to the Alabama line southeast of luka.

I believe that this program will put in place a highway system that would serve this state for the next 50 to 60 years, and I am optimistic that a highway construction program will be enacted this year. I think we all realize that an adequate highway system is one of the most crucial

items in getting industry to locate in Mississippi, and a safe four-lane system is desperately needed to reduce our highway fatality rate which is the highest in the nation.

Also expected for consideration early in the Session is a bill written by Senator Howard Dyer before his death and introduced in the Senate in his memory. This bill, which I am co-sponsoring, provides for a referendum by the people in the November general election on whether or not to have a constitutional convention to frame a new state Constitution. I think most everyone agrees that our Constitution has some outdated sections and needs changes. This bill will allow you, the voters, to decide whether to continue to amend the present Constitution or have a convention to write a new document. If the convention route is chosen, this bill provides for the convention to consist of 122 delegates elected from the present House of Representatives districts in a

special election on June 21, 1988. Persons interested in being a delegate would qualify as a candidate by filing a petition signed by 50 qualified electors 60 days prior to the election. The convention would convene on July 29, 1988, and would be required to complete its work by December 1, 1988. Delegates would be paid the same per diem, mileage and expenses paid to legislators attending a special session. The new Constitution would be submitted to the Governor who must call for an election at the next regularly scheduled election, or sooner if he chooses, in order for the people to vote on the new constitution. A majority vote would be required after which the document would have to be cleared by the U.S. Justice Department under the provisions of the Voting Rights Act.

I am very pleased that the Senate passed my bill which would reduce the size of the Legislature. Effective with the 1995 election, the Senate would have 42 members as compared to the current 52

and the House of Representatives would have 84 as compared to its current 122. The intent of my bill is to save the taxpayers some \$1 million per year. There are 36 states which have smaller Legislatures than Mississippi and I feel we could operate just as effectively with a smaller Legislature. The bill is now in the hands of the House of Representatives where it died last year.

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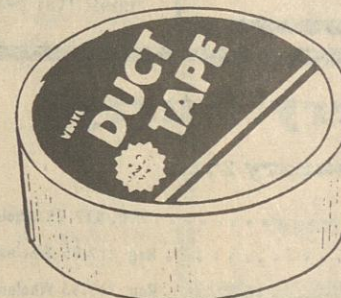
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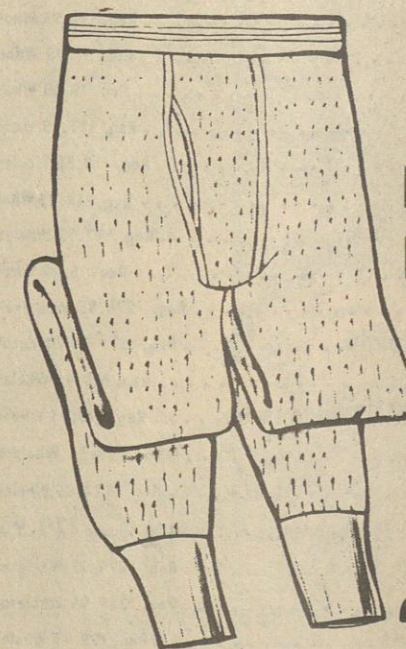


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
