Mystery Surrounds Death & Disappearance Of Jogger

The body of an Iuka man missing since Saturday, January 24, was found Monday, January 26, by a passing

motorist on a county road near Fulton in Itawamba County.

The body of Gerald Wayne Newcomb, 44, of Iuka, was discovered between 2 and 3 p.m. just off Highway 25 approximately 15 miles South of the Tishomingo County line.

Newcomb was reportedly last seen by his wife around 6 p.m. on Saturday when he left their home, on Hwy. 72 East, to go jogging down Seago Road to Harmony Road, as was his daily routine.

Family members became concerned when he did not return within 45 minutes to an hour, which was customary.

Chief Deputy Mike Kemp said authorities were notified at 9 p.m. that Newcomb was

missing and search parties of law officials, friends, relatives, rescue squad members, and others searched the wooded area surrounding the jogger's route. The search continued all day Sunday as people on horse back and all terrain vehicles joined the search.

Monday afternoon the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department was notified by Itawamba officials that a body matching Newcomb's description had been found.

According to authorities Newcomb's body was found face down about 100 yards off an Itawamba County road on an old logging road, with an apparent gunshot wound to the head.

An autopsy was performed in Tupelo Tuesday. The results were unavailable at press deadline.

No leads into the crime have been released; however, local law authorities are fully cooperating with Itawamba County officials in the investigation of the murder. Law officials have said robbery was apparently not a motive since the victim had reportedly left his wallet at home.

Mr. Newcomb was a diesel mechanic, a Mason, a Scottish Rites, and a Shriner.

Funeral services were today Thursday, January 29, at Cutshall Funeral Home

Chapel with T.E. Davis and Ellent Roy Bennett officiating. Burial in Mount Moriah Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Patricia Scruggs Newcomb of Iuka; three daughters, Trese Carlisle of Corinth, and Keshia Newcomb and Kacie Newcomb, both of Iuka; two stepdaughters, Angie Wadkins of Corinth and Lynette Barnes of Iuka; one stepson, Aubrey Harwell of Warner Robins, Ga.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Owen Newcomb of Corinth; two sisters, Brenda Kennedy and Diane Smith, both of Muscle Shoals, Ala.; one brother, Greg Newcomb of Starkville; one step-granddaughter.

Sentences Handed Down In Circuit Court Action

The January term of Tishomingo County Circuit Court concluded Friday, January 23. Sentences were handed down to ten defendants by Judge Frank Russell.

Larry Garrison, 33, Route 2 Iuka, was sentenced to 12 years in prison, eight years suspended, after he pleaded guilty to aggravated assault in connection with the October 28, 1985, shooting of his two-year-old nephew, Derrick Goins.

Jeff Puckett, 25, Route 2 Iuka, six years in Parchman, enrolled in the Regimeted Inmate Discipline Program. Puckett pleaded guilty to burglary and larceny of a dwelling. He was ordered to make restitution of \$1,567 to State Farm Insurance and an undetermined amount to the victim.

The charge against Puckett's co-defendant David Hannon, 34, of Iuka was continued.

Billy Ray Brown, 19, Route 1, Box 30, Iuka, was sentenced to two years in prison under the RID program after pleading guilty to check forgery. Sentencing was deferred on an accessory after the fact of burglary and larceny pending good behavior.

George Brown was sentenced to two four-year prison terms, to run concurrently on one count of check forgery and one count of burglary and larceny.

Two joint counts against Billy Ray Brown and George Brown of uttering a forged instrument were retired to the files.

Anthony Gilley, Tishomingo, was sentenced to five years, five years suspended and two years of supervised probation, for burglary of a dwelling. He was ordered to undergo drug and alcohol rehabilitation.

Harold Aldridge, 53, Route 1 Iuka, pleaded guilty on sale of marijuana, but acceptance of the plea was withheld pending successful completion of a two-year supervised probation period. He was fined \$300.00, and ordered to make \$35 restitution to the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics.

Similar charges against Aldridge's ex-wife, Anita Aldridge, of Florida, was continued.

Gerald McNatt, co-indicted for burglary and larceny of a dwelling with Edward McNatt, was sentenced to five years, suspended. He was fined \$300 and ordered to make restitution of \$1,400.

The case against Edward McNatt was continued.

Janie Brown was sentenced to three years, suspended, three years supervised probation for sale of marijuana, and fined \$500.00.

Robert E. Johnson and Wayne Taylor, both of Tishomingo, were sentenced to seven years each, four years suspended, pending restitution to a burglary victim.

Joey Adams was sentenced to three years, suspended for sale of marijuana. He was fined \$2,500.00 and banished from the First Judicial District for the three year term of his sentence. Another count of sale of marijuana was retired.

The following cases were continued until the April term of court:

Roger Dale Russell, charged with two counts of burglary.

Richard Pride, possession of marijuana with intent to distribute.

Charles Durham, charged with sexual battery.

Billy Blakney, charged with a bad check.

Burnsville Youth Injured In Accident

A nine year old Burnsville boy was transferred to a Tupelo hospital after being struck by a motorist on US 72 in Burnsville late Thursday, January 22.

According to Mississippi Highway Trooper Jerry Boyd, Daniel Paul Thorson sustained injuries from the accident which occurred around 4 p.m. in the vicinity of the Post Office on the state highway.

Boyd said witnesses to the happening reported Thorson and two other children were holding hands when the youngster broke loose and ran to the roadway into the

path of a small Chevrolet van which was driven by Donna Blakney, 29, of Iuka. Ms. Blakney was traveling East on 72, the investigator said.

Trooper Boyd said the youngster apparently had a broken right leg and some head injuries. Family members could not be reached for comment; however, school officials said relatives had reported that his condition was not as serious as first thought.

Young Thorson is the son of Russell and Georgia Thorson. He is a student at Burnsville Elementary, where he enrolled in September '86.

Hamm, Wardlaw, and Cook were captured without resistance Sunday in a trailer park in Cullman, Alabama, as Sheriff Payne, Mississippi Criminal Bureau Investigator David Huggins joined officers from the Cullman Tactical Team, Alabama State Troopers SWAT Team, the Alabama Bureau of Investigation, Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics Agent Ricky Peterson, and the Cullman County Sheriff's Department, in surrounding the mobile home around 6 p.m.

An autopsy was performed on Rainey by Dr. Thomas McLees, Northern Judicial District Medical Examiner at the Magnolia Hospital in Corinth Monday. Tishomingo Medical Examiner Investigator Dale White was present at the autopsy and related the results showed cause of death to be the result of a single gun shot wound to the head. White placed the time of death to be approximately 3 a.m. A laceration wound was evident to the left flank and the victim's feet were tied at the ankles, the examiner

said. Examination revealed the victim's hands had also been tied at one point in time, White stated.

Local reports indicate that Hamm was released from Parchman last August after serving 6 1/2 years of a combined 11-year sentence for burglaries in Alcorn and Prentiss counties. Wardlaw was free under a \$10,000 bond pending trial charged with breaking and entering a Prentiss county marina last October. Ms. Cook was charged recently with check forgery and was released after posting a \$2,000 bond.

Investigation into the Rainey murder and the murder of the Cullman motel desk clerk, Patrick J. Cunningham is continuing.

Sheriff Payne said he is waiting for the Alabama authorities to complete their investigations and release the suspects to the Mississippi authorities.

Capital murder convictions carry the death penalty in Mississippi.

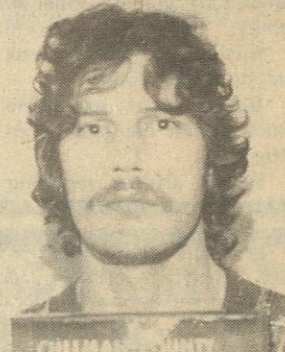

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

Skill In Buying

Today we buy more and more goods and services. Skill in selecting these provides personal and family satisfaction, along with more and better goods and services. Many homemakers possess this skill and use it to add greatly to the family's economic situation.

On the other hand, much income can be wasted by poor selection of consumer goods and services. Poor selection can take several forms, such as:

- *Buying articles not needed by the individual or family.
- *Buying poor quality items that do not last long.
- *Buying more expensive articles than the family can afford.
- *Buying articles requiring

excessive time and expense for care, upkeep, installation and operation.

Fortunately, skill in buying can be developed. It can be developed more easily and quickly by following a series of logical steps. Some of these steps you take at home, sometimes long before you actually go shopping. An outline of the steps is given here. Following the steps you see examples of how you might apply them when buying goods and services. Naturally, some of the steps overlap and each large step is made up of a series of smaller ones.

Analyze Goals, Needs and Resources

With definite long- and short-term goals in mind, you can direct the use of your resources toward the things that will help you achieve your goals.

Decide What To Buy

Your first step toward developing skill in buying prepares you to use good

judgment in deciding what you will make, grow or do at home. Now you can better see what you will need to buy this year and later.

Determine Characteristics Desired

When you are thinking of selecting an article or service, you immediately think of certain qualities it should have. You probably start with appearance first for such things as clothing, furnishings and a house. No matter how durable or inexpensive these might be, they might always be a source of annoyance if they are not pleasing to the eye.

Know Quality Features

Quality in general begins with the material out of which an article is made. The material should be suited to the use or purpose of the article. For example, denim, although a durable fabric and well suited for play and work clothes or casual furnishings, would not be suited for formal clothes or furnishings.

Be A Smart Shopper

You take Step 5 at the market place. You already know what you need, what you can buy and what type and quality will suit your purpose. You know who are reliable dealers and so steer clear of those who use "bait" advertising to get people into their stores.

Use and Care For Purchase Properly

Use the purchases according to instructions: care for, store properly and keep in repair. This extends money, time and energy you have to spend. You will have to use unnecessary amounts of all again when you have to buy "extras" that could have been avoided. The longer you use the products you buy, the more money you will have to get and enjoy additional things.

Apple Salad

2 cups diced, unpeeled red apples
1/2 cup bottled French dressing
4 ripe bananas
1 can (11 oz.) mandarin oranges
1/2 cup white seedless grapes
1/2 cup black seedless grapes
1 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup dairy sour cream
Drop diced apples into French dressing. Drain oranges; add with grapes. Toss to be sure fruits are well coated with dressing. Chill; drain. Combine mayonnaise with sour cream, add fruits and toss lightly. Serves 4.

HOT SPICED PINEAPPLE JUICE

1 can (46 oz.) Dole Pineapple Juice
1 cup apple juice
1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
1 cup light rum or 2 teaspoons rum extract
Whole cloves
Lemon slices

Combine pineapple juice, apple juice, sugar and spices in a large saucepan or Dutch oven. Simmer 15 minutes. Pour in rum. Insert cloves into lemon slices; use to garnish mugs. Makes 9 (6 oz.) servings.



Mighty Little Seed

"Strange as it may seem, every tree in Tishomingo County was once a tiny seed", stated Clovis Crane, Commissioner for Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District. He added, "Even the tallest pine or hardwood tree was once just a speck of material".

"Anyone can plant tree seedlings", he remarked, "but not everyone can plant them successfully". He pointed out that in order to achieve the best growth and survival, it was necessary to combine the right species with the right site and to plant them at the right time.

"There are three things necessary for tree seedlings to grow: food, water, and sunlight", remarked Don Jones, of the Soil Conservation Service. He proceeded, "Water is present in the soil with minerals for the seedling root system to absorb. The leaves collect sunlight and gasses which are added to the water and minerals to form food for the plant".

"A tree grows in three

ways: up, down, and around", commented Brendix Glasgow, County Forester for the Mississippi Forestry Commission. He continued,

"When a tree adds height, it is growing from the tips of the branches. The tree roots grow by adding more roots and going deeper into the ground. The third way a tree grows is by putting on more layers around the trunk itself. Always remember, the trunk or main body of the tree never grows upward". He added, "If you drive a nail into the trunk of a young tree, it will always remain in the same place. This is because a tree only grows from the outer part".

It was pointed out that the size of our forests have been greatly reduced, with only half of our original forest area still remaining. Much of the land that once was forest area, has become farm land and sites for cities, factories, airports, and roads. However, some of the land became barren waste because of forest fires, and poor timber management practices.

Clovis Crane remarked, "For a long time, few people thought of treating our forests with care because it was believed that they would last forever". He continued,

"Finally, landowners realized that the forest fires, insuring future growth through the sustained yield method, and by planting seedlings in barren areas".

"Let's be glad that we have learned to develop a good program of forest use and care", stated Clovis Crane. "Remember our forest are one of the gifts of nature which can be renewed. Other things like minerals, oil, sulfur, and salt will not grow back", commented Clovis. "This is not true with trees. Our forests will continue to give us products of value forever if we continue to take care of them", stated Clovis Crane.

Quality Soybean May Be In Short Supply This Spring

Farmers should have plenty of high quality rice and cotton seed for the 1987 crop, but the soybean seed situation will be close.

Because of rains starting in October, the late maturing varieties of soybean seed could be in short supply, according to R.C. Milner, executive secretary of the Mississippi Seed Improvement Association.

Milner discussed the 1987 seed situation at the annual convention of the Mississippi Seedsmen's Association in Biloxi January 11-13. About 150 seed industry representatives attended the event.

"Most rice and cotton seed were harvested before the fall rains started," Milner said. "Supplies of these crops are

adequate and germination is excellent.

"If farmers are willing to plant soybean varieties that are available, there should be enough seed for the 1987 crop," Milner added. "While early season soybean varieties are good, late season varieties may be in short supply and of lower quality," he said.

Milner said all 56 samples of rice seed tested have germinated 90 percent or better. While this is only a small fraction of the rice seed expected to be tested, Milner expects the high quality trend to continue.

Of the 224 samples of cotton seed tested, about 85 percent germinated 80 percent or better. These samples represent more than six thousand tons of cotton seed.

Because of rains during soybean harvest the past several years, Milner believes farmers will shift from late to early season varieties of soybeans.

"I see a reduction of farmer-saved seed this year," Milner said. "There is also a considerable amount of seed moving out of Mississippi into other states and some early maturing soybean varieties moving into Mississippi."

In other agriculture news last week, agriculture agents with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service reported wet fields and pastures throughout most of the state stalled most field work.

In central Mississippi, Atlanta County Agent Thomas Swoope said the only farming

activities in the county last week were feeding livestock and preparing 1987 budgets.

Lauderdale County Agent Bobby Sims said producers need to apply nitrogen after grazing but fields have been too wet.

Sims also said producers are looking for alternate crops.

In North Mississippi, Itawamba County Agent Jimmy K. Luther said soil moisture is hurting county's wheat crop.

Clay County Agent Kimbrough said the only farming activities the week will allow is feeding livestock or moving hay.

In the Delta, Quitman County Agent Steve Swoope said some soybean producers are still trying to harvest the remainder of crops.

In Perry County in Mississippi, County Agent Roger D. Jones said continuous rains kept producers from planting their intended wheat crop. Some wheat in the county was planted as late as January 1.

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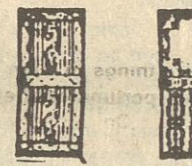
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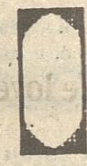
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Rabies kills!

That's the simple fact. It kills animals and it kills humans. Once symptoms of the disease appear, it is almost always fatal. There is no known cure for animals or for humans.

And the incidents of rabies among domestic animals -- cats and dogs -- in Tennessee are increasing. In 1983, the state confirmed two cases of feline rabies -- the first since 1976. And the eight cases of canine rabies confirmed in the state in 1983 were the most reported here since 1980.

But rabies can be prevented!

A current vaccination can protect your cat and dog against rabies and help form an invisible barrier that protects your family as well. One inoculation, therefore, helps protect you, your family, your friends and your pets.

The first symptoms of rabies are not usually observed until the disease has reached an advanced stage. Once the signs are observed, the animal may live for as long as a week, then become comatose and die.

Any animal acting strangely -- whether it's the family pet or an unknown animal -- should be approached with extreme caution. Such animals should be reported to your public health department.

One of the major signs of rabies in any animal is a departure from normal habits. The animal will

either become unnaturally withdrawn or unusually affectionate. An animal that is primarily nocturnal will be seen during the day rather than at dusk or night.

Then comes the roving period when the animal will wander far afield and bite anything in its path. It is during this period that the animal appears to be frothing at the mouth -- the familiar symbol of a "mad" or rabid animal.

The animal then will return to its home to die. Amid familiar surroundings, the animal seeks an isolated place to suffer its final paroxysms, lapse into a paralytic state and die.

In some types of rabies, the roving period is omitted and paralysis, usually of the lower jaw, is one of the first recognizable symptoms.

In either case, a slow, painful death is the final outcome.

Don't take a chance with your pet's life -- or with your life. Make sure your cats and dogs have a current rabies vaccination.

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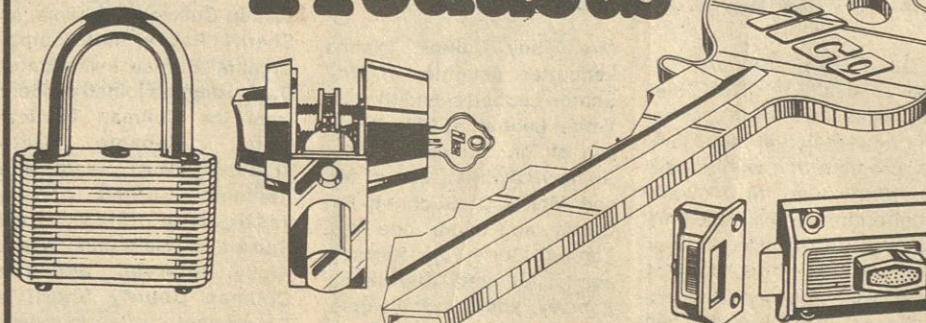
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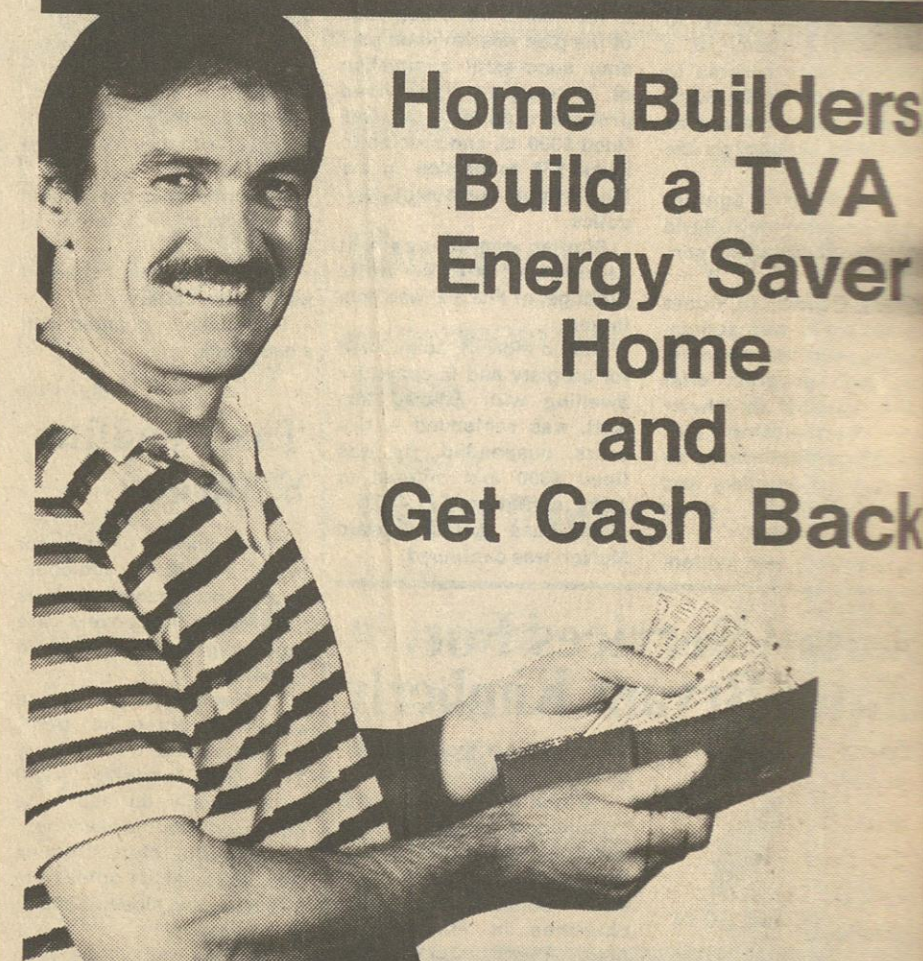

Report From The House---

The first big deadline of the 1987 legislative session has passed and members of the Mississippi House of Representatives concentrated this week on hundreds of bills and resolutions introduced over the past month.

Most of the attention has been on committee work so far, which is customary during the early stages of a session since it gives legislators an opportunity to study the issues, hold public hearings, and determine which legislation they believe should be sent to the full House for consideration.

Floor action in the House in the past week included passage of bills to help deal with bad check problems in the state, and to provide for the nonpartisan election of judges. In addition, a number of other measures won House approval and were sent to the Senate.

More than 1,000 bills and resolutions have been introduced in the House since the session began, covering a wide range of topics including education, highways, constitutional revision, and economic development. The deadline expired last week for introduction of general bills and constitutional amendments. The next deadline is February 5, the last day for

House and Senate committees to report bills and constitutional amendments in their own chamber.

The deadlines are part of the timetable for processing legislation, established by the joint rules of the House and Senate, in an effort to see that bills are handled in a timely and orderly manner. Last week's cutoff did not apply to appropriations or revenue bills or local and private measures. These bills are covered by a separate timetable.

The House gave overwhelming approval to the bill that would authorize district attorneys to assist retailers and private citizens in the recovery of money from people accused of writing bad checks.

The measure, recommended by the Judiciary "A" Committee, sets up a procedure for collecting restitution, and allows a service charge for processing complaints with the charge to be paid by the bad-check writer. The legislation is aimed at chronic bad-check writers rather than average citizens who may have a check bounce one time or another due to innocent mistake. An identical bill was passed by the House last year but failed to clear the Senate. It was approved this year by the House with no debate and no dissenting votes.

In my opinion, the bad-

check measure is badly needed and can go a long way toward discouraging issuance of bad checks. I am proud to have introduced the bill in the House and hope the Senate will join the House in enacting it into law.

Another House-passed bill would set up a non-partisan system of electing judges in Mississippi, removing party politics from the election of candidates for such judicial posts as the State Supreme Court, Circuit Court, Chancellor, County Court and Family Court.

The House voted to extend a present law giving a greater degree of flexibility to trial judges in handling certain types of first-offender criminal cases. The law, originally passed in 1983, expires July 1, 1987, unless the Legislature votes to keep it on the books. It applies to

cases in which the accused pleads guilty and the state does not involve violent crime against another person. The judge has the discretion to order the law to order payment of restitution to victims of crime, to levy fines, and to order the accused to perform up to six months of public service work.

In other action, bills approved by the House make sure that operators towing and auto storage companies are repaid by insurance companies when hauling wrecked vehicles; require small children (12 and under) to wear flotation devices moving motorboats; and designate the Reception Classification Center at a new Rankin County Correctional Facility in honor of late Representative Robert Anderson of Wesson.

Superstitions

FEVERS

To exorcise yellow fever: Place about two inches of water in a tub. Stand an axe head on its nose in the water and balance three black horse hairs and a white one on the edge of the axe. Sprinkle a small amount of red pepper on the horse hairs and carefully push the tub under the bed - the contents must not be disturbed. Then scatter a handful of corn meal in the form of a cross in front of the patient's bed and wet this cross thoroughly with rum from molasses.

Chinaberries strung and placed about the baby's neck will absorb and prevent fever.

For fever, wrap the head completely in leaves from the Palma Christi, (castor oil plant).

For a high fever: Obtain a pigeon which has never flown out of the cage, cut him open and lay him on the 'mole' of the patient's head. The fresh blood of the pigeon will draw the fever.

To cure the fever take a thread with 3 knots, rub the sick person with the untied threads, throw 2 of the knots in the fire saying, "I put the fever and the sickness on top of the fire" and then tie the third knot around the patient's neck, but so as not to be seen.

To cure a person of fever lace an agate stone on the forehead of the sufferer.

Chairman of the Foundation as well as the Chairman of the Tishomingo County Economic Development Authority, the President of the Board of Supervisors and the Mayors of the six incorporated municipalities in the county. Other members who are serving are James Grisham, 1st District; Gene Jourdan, 3rd District; Ted Day, 4th District; David Bonds, 2nd District; Gerald Parsons, 2nd District and President of Board of Supervisors; Mayor Bobby Johnson, Burnsville; Mayor Bertha Tidwell, Tishomingo; Mayor John H. Biggs, luka; Mayor Earl Lindsey, Paden; Mayor Earl Alexander, Belmont and Mayor James Hallmark, Golden.

The Treasurer, James Tennyson, gave the financial report and noted that there were 126 members who paid dues in 1986; he requested that each member try and get another business or individual to "invest" in the Foundation in order to keep it financially sound. He also reported that the towns in the county as well as the Board of Supervisors had increased their investment in the organization which was a big

help, providing monthly funds for operation of the office. The Executive Director of the Foundation, Bill Flynn, then gave a report of activities that were underway as far as recruiting new businesses to the county. He said that the State Economic Development Department had been working with the local Foundation and elected officials and had been successful in obtaining a Community Development Block Grant loan for a mobile home company to build a plant in the Belmont Industrial Park; that the Board of Supervisors and Mayor of Belmont had made a proposal to a major furniture company considering a plant in Belmont; that a wood products company had made application for CDBG funds in cooperation with the County, with plans to build a plant in the Tishomingo area if the funding was approved; and a medium size garment manufacturer was looking at a site in the Burnsville area. The Burnsville area is still under consideration as a possible site for a steel smelting plant, with a visit by representatives during the past week, as well as a paper company looking at the county by helicopter. "We have a number of prospects and if we get a third of them, it will mean several hundred new jobs in the county. We have a goal of at least 200 new jobs a year and have been successful in the past year with the Prentiss Manufacturing Co. buying out the plant of luka Shirt, with a number of new jobs coming there along with the completion of Shelton Trucking's terminal, and now the Belmont Mobile Homes project has been approved." There were several questions and some suggestions made by the members with several individuals saying that they were willing to serve on

committees which are to be set up to work with the areas of: Education and Vocational Training, Tourism and Recreation Promotion, Industrial and Business Relation, Internal Affairs, Agriculture and Forestry Promotion and Government Relations. (Chairman David Bonds said that these committees would be open to anyone who wanted to help and volunteers were welcome; while it would be welcomed, there was no requirement that someone wanting to serve had to be a member.) TCDF Annual Membership Meeting

The Tishomingo County Development Foundation held its 1987 Annual Membership meeting on Tuesday, January 20, 1987, with the members present voting on and approving several changes in the by-laws of the organization. The Chairman of the Foundation, David

Tenn-Tom Today

U.S. Army Corps Of Engineers Property Identification

It has become very apparent that a large portion of the visiting public, especially those requesting hunting permits, are not aware of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers property identification, and markings on the Tenn-Tom Waterway. It is very important to always know who's property you are located on, especially when hunting. In most instances once caught ignorance will be no excuse. To better assist the public, I will describe what to look for when identifying Corps property on the Tenn-Tom Waterway.

Different terminology is applied to Corps property, depending primarily upon its main purpose and use. Many of you have probably heard the terms "fee property, flowage easement land and spoil areas," but you may not be quite sure of their meanings.

Fee property is the actual land bought and owned by the Corps. All fee property located on the Tenn-Tom is marked in red paint, normally found on trees or posts located on the Corps' boundary line. There will be two red stripes marked on various trees located 50 to 60 feet apart, and at each turn or corner of the boundary line, three trees will be painted

with three stripes with a monument usually located on the ground and in the center of the marked trees. A monument will usually consist of a three-inch diameter copper plate enclosed in cement with a location number, etc., engraved in the plate.

Flowage easement land is property that the Corps does not own, but has bought the right to flood if the situation ever arose where the river would rise above the normal pool stage. This land will be marked in white paint applying the same technique used for marking the fee lands. The Corps does not have authority to allow at any time hunting on flowage easement lands.

Spoil areas are tracts of property located along the waterway. They are referred to as spoil areas because they consist of waste material, such as gravel, silt, and sand removed from the river bed during dredging operations.

One distinguishable feature of a spoil area is each one contains a dike shaped in a circle form. Some spoil areas are located within fee property, while others are located on flowage easement land, and they will be marked in accordance to their location. Some spoil areas located on fee property may be closed to hunting for safety purposes.

An important point to always remember when venturing into the unknown is if there are any doubts you may have about the area, or any questions, take the time to obtain the necessary information. There are Corps of

Engineers offices located along the Tenn-Tom Waterway with personnel specializing in answering any questions you may have concerning Corps property. To be well informed will almost always assure you of having a most rewarding and pleasurable experience when visiting all Corps projects located on the Tenn-Tom Waterway.

Q. I will be graduating from college in May of this year with a bachelor degree in criminal justice. I am interested in finding out what qualifications are required for an agent position with your agency?

(J.C. Jackson, MS)

A. The qualifications that are to be met for employment as an agent with Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics can be found in Section 41-29-107 of the Mississippi Code. They are as follows:

"Candidates for employment must be between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-six years at the time of appointment.

"Such candidates must have completed two years of collegiate study or can substitute for such educational requirements law enforcement experience at the rate of two years experience for each year of collegiate study.

"Candidates must be citizens of Mississippi and of the United States.

"Candidates must be of

"good moral character".

In addition applicants for employment are subjected to strenuous testing and thorough background investigation prior to their selection, and upon being hired intensive training will be given.

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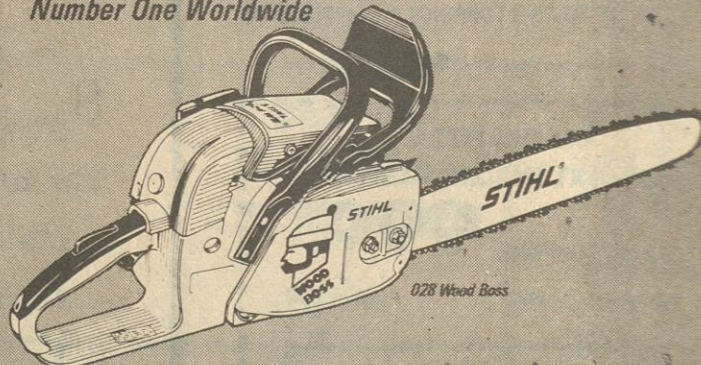
