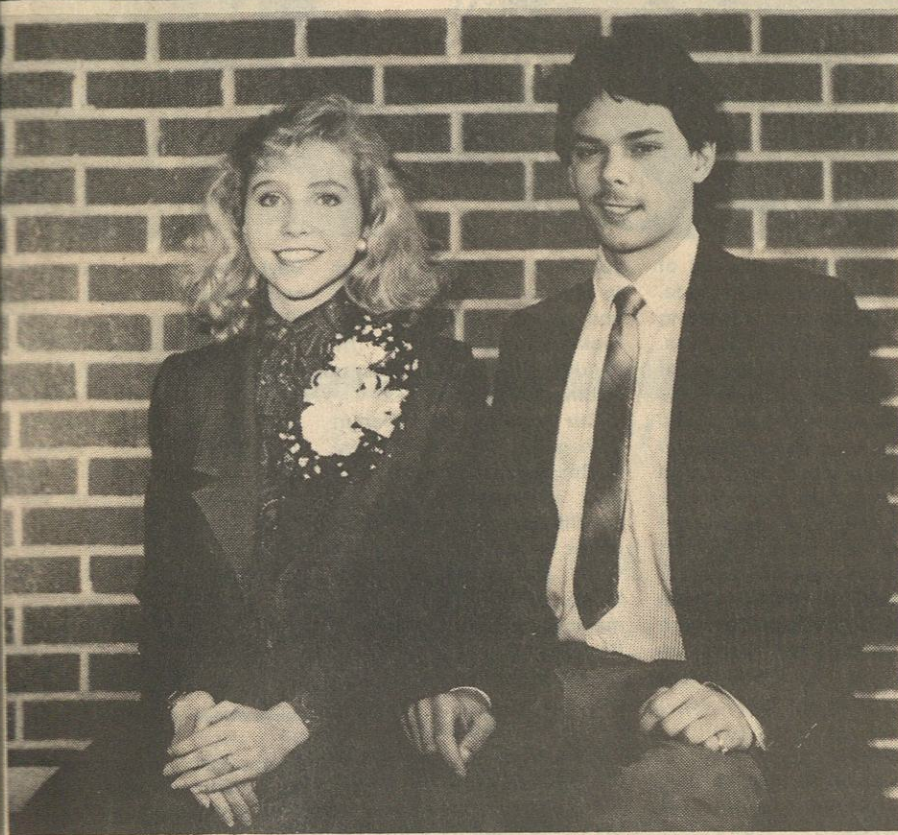

Chief and Miss Iuka High School were revealed Friday, January 30, in an assembly program held in Howard Auditorium. Students representing grades 7-12 gathered with faculty and administration members, parents, and friends. At this annual occasion, Senior Who's Who, Senior Superlatives, and Hall of Fame winners were also announced.

Chief and Miss I.H.S. were elected from among five girls and five boys who maintained the highest averages during their high school careers. Students in grades nine through twelve voted to select the two.

Marian Heather Gaines was named Miss Iuka High School 1986-87. She is the lovely daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Gaines. And her beauty has been apparent to judges of the high school beauty reviews throughout her high school years. She was selected Most Beautiful her Freshman year; 3rd alternate, Sophomore; 4th alternate, Junior; and placed 1st alternate her Senior year.

Heather has excelled academically as she has maintained membership in the Beta Club grades 9-12, and served as president of the Junior High Beta as a Freshman, and as treasurer this year. One Arrested In Break-In

Gary Underwood, 25, of Golden, has been arrested and charged with the breaking and entering of a truck and trailer belonging to M & W Sales Company of Golden on December 6, 1986.

According to Chief Deputy Mike Kemp the truck was reportedly broken into, ransacked, and a CB radio and a Fuzz Buster was taken.

Underwood was arrested Saturday, January 31, and charged with breaking and entering of the M & W Sales equipment, Kemp said. He was released after posting a \$2,000.00 grand jury bond.

Investigation Continues

Investigation continues into the disappearance and death of Gerald Wayne Newcomb, 44, of Iuka.

Newcomb was reportedly last seen by his wife around 6 p.m. Saturday, January 24, when he left to go jogging. Newcomb's body was found Monday, January 26, by a passing motorist 100 yards off an Itawamba County road near Fulton with a gunshot wound to the head.

Both Itawamba and Tishomingo County law officials are working closely in the murder investigation. According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Bob Payne several leads are now being checked out.

Payne said there was no apparent connection between Newcomb's death and the January 24 murder of Raybon Rainey, a Corinth resident who was found stabbed and shot to death near Dennis.

Major Furniture Manufacturer Selectes Belmont As New Site

Tishomingo County Development Foundation Executive Director Bill Flynn released a prepared statement which said that he had been notified that a "Major" upholstered furniture and manufacturer had decided to locate a 200,000 square foot manufacturing plant in the Belmont Industrial Park. According to Flynn, the company accepted an offer by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors to build and finance a plant building on a site to be provided by the City of Belmont. In a meeting which was held on January 19, 1987, the needs of the company and how they might be met, was discussed by the members of the Board of Supervisors, Earl Alexander, Mayor of Belmont, several local businessmen, representatives of the County and State Vocational-technical training and Mr. Flynn. It was learned that the company had planned a Phase I construction project which would employ about 240-255 people with a later Phase II

construction plan which would add about 200 more people. This could give a total employment a full capacity 400-450 people.

The plant building is to be built in the Belmont Industrial Park on approximately 27 acres of land which the Mayor and Board of Aldermen purchased several years ago for just this type of opportunity. The City will provide the site with the necessary utilities and the Board of Supervisors will build the plant to the company's specifications.

An announcement is expected to be made in the near future by the company along with the MS Department of Economic Development. Tom Sanders, Economic Development Senior Representative brought this company to visit Tishomingo County as they toured the State looking for a site. Company officials wanted to locate in Northeast Mississippi and they looked at several other towns in the area, but the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors working with the City of

Belmont made an excellent offer to build and finance a plant for them. President Gerald Parsons; 1st District Supervisor, Lionel Wade; 3rd District Supervisor, D.W. McKee; 4th District Supervisor, M.R. Whitehead; and 5th District Supervisor, Leon Cook are enthusiastic about the opportunity to assist with and support the company in an effort to help provide jobs for people in the county who need work, and to begin to put the in-lieu economic development fund to work.

"The willingness of the Belmont Mayor and Board of Aldermen to provide a site at no cost was also a major factor since they have spent thousands of dollars to develop the Key Community quality industrial park. This is the type of incentive that is required to be competitive in the recruiting of new industry, and they were prepared," Flynn said.

"The addition of approximately 240-255 jobs in

Tishomingo County will result in an annual payroll of about \$3,500,000; if you use the turnover number 7 times, which is about the number of times a dollar is spent in a local economy, this will have an impact of about \$21,000,000 in the economy. This is what we have been needing in the county and with the help of the elected officials and members of the Development Foundation including Chairman David Bonds, TCEDA Chairman Gene Jourdan, Ted Day and several businessmen, school officials, and state agencies representatives, we have been successful in obtaining a member of the top four national manufacturer's of quality upholstered furniture as a new business member in Tishomingo County. We look forward to a continued successful effort to assist this firm and others who are interested in a location in Northeast Mississippi," Flynn said.

Iuka Man Found Dead In Home

The death of Lee M. Cross, 54, of Hwy. 72 east of Iuka, was the result of a self inflicted gunshot wound, said Sheriff Bob Payne.

Sheriff Payne said the body of Mr. Cross was found Tuesday morning lying on the bed in his compact travel trailer. He said a .20 gauge shotgun was beside him and that a detailed hand written 'last will' note was found nearby and was signed by the deceased.

The sheriff said a neighbor, Charles Malone, had last saw Mr. Cross when he came to his house Monday night around 10 p.m. At that time Cross had asked Malone if he would take him to a Savannah doctor on Tuesday. When Malone was unable to get him to answer the door at the appointed time, he notified the sheriff's office.

Sheriff Payne said all doors to the mobile home were securely locked from inside and that he had to break in the back door in order to enter the dwelling.

Mr. Cross was a sign painter, he had done numerous lettering jobs in and around Iuka. He apparently traveled around wherever his work

was needed. The sheriff said no family members were known of, but the name of a friend who was mentioned as his best friend in the written note had been contacted.

Surplus Food Distribution

The Tishomingo County Welfare Department announced today that U.S. Department of Agriculture Surplus Commodities will be distributed, Wednesday, February 18, 1987, beginning at 8:00 a.m. The following items will be distributed to eligible households: 1 cheese, 1 butter, 1 milk, 1 rice, and 1 flour.

Those households who receive food stamps by mail will have vouchers enclosed with their February food stamps. Food stamp recipients who pick up their stamps will get their vouchers with their February allotment. All other certified households (self declared income) will have their vouchers mailed on February 5, 1987, therefore, it will not be necessary for these households to come to the Welfare Office to pick up their vouchers. Households

that do not receive a voucher by mail will need to come to the office to have their certification updated. Anyone wishing to make an application may apply after February 6. Eligibility is based on income.

Misrepresentation of need, or sale, or exchange of USDA commodities, is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance Program is available to all eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap.

Those receiving the surplus foods are requested to bring a paper sack for their convenience in carrying the items.

If you send after your commodities by someone else be sure and put their name on the back of your voucher, date, and sign it. Also, sign the voucher on the front of it.

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Making The Most By Proper Landuse

There may be no room for error this spring for Tishomingo County farmers. Net returns may be slim for many farmers due to high cost of production. By keeping crops such as soybeans, cotton, and corn on land suitable for these

crops will help to increase net income.

As farmers go to the fields this spring, one thing that will be in their minds will be to get all land possible into crop production. Sometimes this purpose makes farmers lose sight of one important fact -- is the land suitable for cropland?

Tishomingo County is blessed with some of the best

cropland in Mississippi. Flat and gently sloping land comprises the best suited fields for crops. These fields are more likely to have deep rich soil, plenty of moisture and organic matter. The fields with steeper slopes lose these important features. Many of our fields that exceed 8% slope (8 feet fall per 100 feet) are best suited for grassland or woodland, but not best suited for cropland. What is the reasoning behind this?

The fields with steep slopes, 8% or greater, have excessive runoff; therefore, they are subject to severe erosion. These fields have very shallow soils with poor permeability. Some fields have eroded from past row-cropping to the point that profits have eroded away also.

Defeating your purpose could be the term to use when row crops are grown on the steep or severely eroded fields. These type fields do not respond well to row crop production. Before plowing that hillside this spring, think for a minute and decide for yourself: Is it really beneficial for me to row-crop this field or am I defeating my purpose?

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Diet Cautions

Obesity is harmful to your health and may shorten your life. It increases the risk of high blood pressure, diabetes, heart disease, and many other medical problems.

But whether you have five pounds to lose or 20, there's only one way to do it: use up more calories than you take in. This means selecting foods containing fewer calories than you normally eat or increasing your physical activity -- preferably both.

Here are some diet cautions to avoid:

DIET FADS. Be suspicious of diet gimmicks and fad diets that promise quick and easy weight loss. They can be dangerous. Diets that encourage little or no eating, that promote heavy eating of one kind of food, or that are very low in calories can all cause health problems. Nutritionally balanced diets promote good health.

DON'T BE A YO-YO! Many people who have a weight problem lose weight, regain it, then lose and regain again. Their weight goes up and down like a yo-yo. Repeatedly losing and regaining weight may increase your risk of heart disease. So once you've lost weight, put yourself on a maintenance program and keep that weight off for good.

YOU CAN'T BE TOO THIN. OR CAN YOU? Being overweight is not advisable -- but neither is being much below the "desirable" weight for your height. Going overboard in trying to lose weight can

cause health problems.

Anorexia nervosa and bulimia are serious eating disorders. Their victims usually think they look fat (even though they may be thin) and have an abnormal fear of being fat. Common traits of persons suffering from these disorders are bizarre eating habits, refusal to eat, binging or gorging followed by vomiting, abuse of laxatives and diuretics and an extreme urge to exercise.

These practices can result in starvation and other serious health problems.

Lazy Meat Loaf

1 egg, beaten
1 small onion, chopped fine
1 c. oatmeal
2/3 c. tomato juice
1 lb. ground beef
Salt and pepper to taste
Preheat oven to 350°. Mix egg and onion; add oatmeal, tomato juice, beef, salt, and pepper. Mix by hand, and press the mixture into a baking pan. Bake for 45 minutes, or until done.

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Vaccinations play an essential role in the control of a variety of infectious diseases -- both in animals and in humans.

In fact, since Dr. Edward Jenner first developed a vaccination to provide protection against smallpox in 1796, many diseases have been virtually "wiped out" or completely eliminated due to this process.

And in more recent years, vaccinations and vaccines -- the word comes from the Latin word for cow, vacca -- have become more and more important in veterinary medicine as a means for protecting animals.

One of the more notable examples of the use of vaccinations is that used to protect animals, primarily dogs and cats, against rabies. Widespread use of the vaccine in this country has aided in the control of rabies among humans (as well as cats and dogs) since the vaccination of cats and dogs establishes an invisible barrier between the human population and the wildlife population, where rabies runs rampant.

But rabies is just one of the many diseases against which animals can now receive routine protection.

During the early weeks

of their lives, young animals are protected from many diseases by the immunity received from their mothers -- provided, of course, the mother animal has been adequately protected. But this immunity is short-lived. The young animals must quickly develop their own defenses against disease. Vaccinations are the safest and easiest way to help the animals develop this much-needed immunity.

Today, many infectious diseases can be prevented through a vaccination program. Many of these diseases once proved fatal. They still do to unprotected animals.

Remember, however, that a vaccination can only work if the dog or cat receives the proper dosage -- and the proper booster inoculations as needed.

Don't take a chance. Protect your pet. Establish a regular program of vaccinations.

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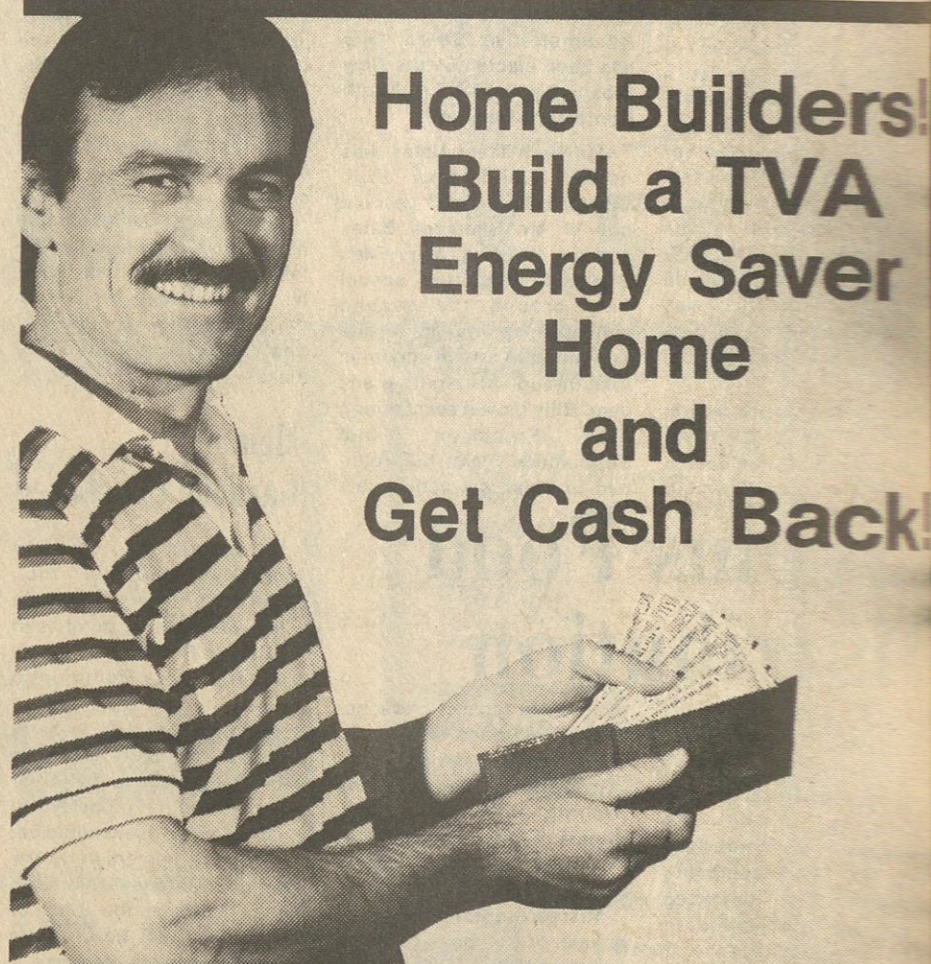

Senior Citizens Art Exhibit

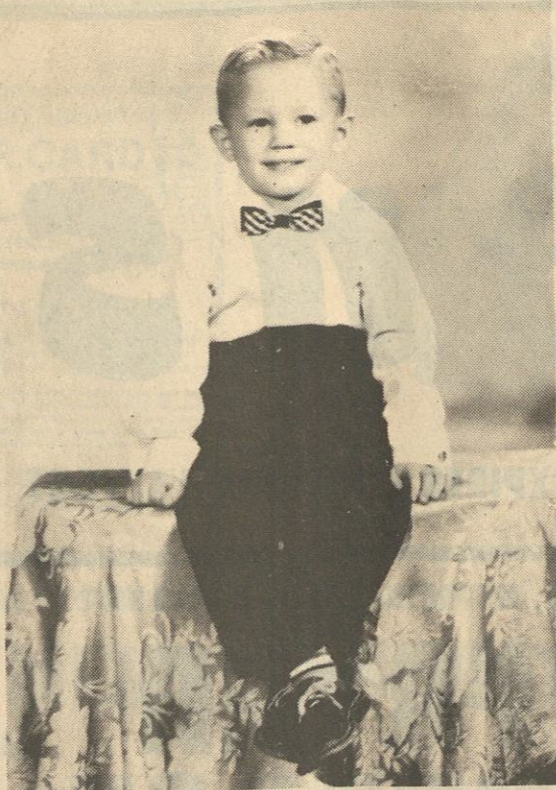
Northeast Mississippi artists 62 years and over are invited to participate in a juried exhibit at the Lee County Library.

Shortly after returning to Burnsville, the Richardson's saw a need to help young people. Mr. and Mrs. Richardson were asked to be volunteer leaders of the Burnsville 4-H Club. Mrs. Richardson believed that anything worth doing is worth doing right. She lived the 4-H motto, "To Make The Best Better".

Since moving to Burnsville, Mrs. Richardson tutored many children and adults, but refused to accept pay for these services.

Mrs. Richardson always praised her husband, who stood by her in each activity she participated in giving her whatever help she might need. Their working together made both enjoy their activities more.

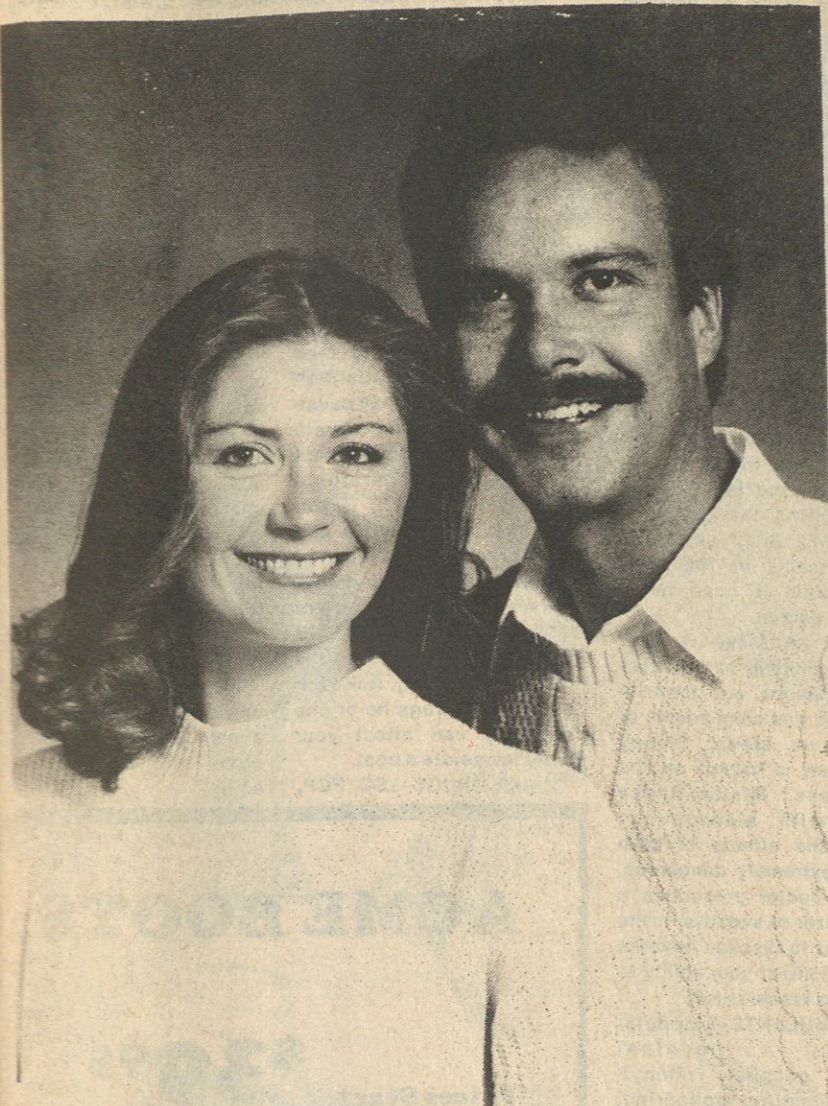

Q. Is it legal for my doctor, or any doctor for that matter, to prescribe amphetamines (diet pills) for weight loss?

A. No! The law expressly prohibits physicians from prescribing amphetamines merely for weight loss. Amphetamines are of the stimulant family and are more commonly known as "uppers". They are generally recognized by the medical community as having very little medical value, except in rare instances. It is documented that the best way to lose weight is by proper dieting and regular exercise - not by drug use.

Drugs And Boating - Why Take The Risk?

Millions of people take drugs every day and most are

unaware that many of these substances affect their operating skills. Alcohol, tranquilizers, marijuana, and a variety of other drugs can affect the mental and physical skills needed for safe boating - even some over-the-counter medicines

can affect operating a boat. The effects of a drug vary significantly from one individual to the next, and even vary in the same individual at different times. The operator's age, sex, weight, emotional state, the amount of drug and when it was taken are all factors which influence the ability to operate a boat safely.

Taking more than one drug at a time is especially dangerous because each one can add to the impact of the other. This is particularly true when one of the drugs is alcohol.

ALCOHOL-Alcohol, a mind-altering drug that works as a sedative, changes the way a person thinks and acts. It affects judgement and coordination, and is a factor in a large percentage of America's boating deaths. Every year hundreds of people die in boating accidents; many more are injured and millions of dollars are spent in property loss or damage. It is well known that alcohol increases the sedative effect of tranquilizers and barbiturates (sleeping pills). Mixing these drugs, on or off the waterways, is extremely hazardous. Even caffeine, a stimulant in coffee and tea, which is supposed to help the drowsy operator stay alert, cannot make a drunk operator sober. Studies show that caffeine does not improve an inebriated subject's

operation of a vehicle. You simply have a wide-awake drunk on your hands.

MARIJUANA-Marijuana is also a mind-altering drug. Its use affects a wide range of skills needed for safe operation; quick thinking and reflexes are slowed, causing operators difficulty in responding to sudden unexpected events. Research clearly indicates that normal levels of operating performance are not regained for at least 4 to 5 hours after smoking a single marijuana cigarette. Drinking alcohol in

combination with smoking marijuana greatly increases the risk of accidents.

TRANQUILIZERS and Other Sedative-Hypnotics- Tranquilizers are central nervous system depressants (drugs which slow down the body) and help relieve tension and anxiety. Major and minor tranquilizers, such as chlorpromazine (thorazine) and diazepam (valium), can have pronounced effects on operating skills.

Studies show that prescribed doses of tranquilizers can affect

operating skills by slowing reaction time, interfering with eye-hand coordination and judgement. Warnings that caution against taking these medications while operating a vehicle are often ignored. Recent research suggests that operating skills are most impaired in the first hour after a tranquilizer is taken.

Flurazepam (Dalmane) is a prescribed sleeping pill. Studies show that the drug accumulates in the body, and the buildup can impair operating skills, even the morning after. Elderly people must be especially careful when driving the day after taking this drug, since the drug remains in the body longer than it does for a younger person.

Other sedative-hypnotic drugs, including barbiturates and quaaludes, are powerful sedatives that calm people or help them sleep. Sleepy people are a hazard on the waterways. Mixing these drugs with alcohol can double the effects of both and is extremely dangerous. If your doctor prescribes a tranquilizer or sedative, make it a point to discuss how the drug will affect your ability to operate a vessel safely.

STIMULANTS-Amphetamines, cocaine, mines, cocaine, phenylpropanolamine, ephedrine, and caffeine (often found in cold tablets and cough syrups) stimulate the central nervous system. Small amounts of these drugs generally make people who are tired feel more alert. However, repeated use of stimulants to combat fatigue will result in loss of coordination. Heavy amphetamine use may keep an individual awake and active for long

stretches of time, but it will also make the operator edgy, less coordinate, and more likely to be involved in an accident.

OVER-THE-COUNTER Drugs- Non-prescription drugs such as cold tablets, cough syrups, allergy remedies, etc., purchased over-the-counter may contain antihistamines, alcohol, codeine, and other compounds that can be especially dangerous for operators. You should read drug labels and pay attention to warnings (e.g., "may cause drowsiness," "do not operate machinery," "caution against engaging in operations requiring alertness"). If you have questions about a particular drug or combination of drugs, check with your doctor or pharmacist. It is important that you understand how YOU PERSONALLY react to the drug you are using. Ask your doctor if the drugs he or she prescribes can affect your ability to operate a boat.

OTHER DRUGS-LSC, PCP, and other hallucinogens distort reality, cause confusion and panic, and can produce severe mental problems resulting in strange and violent behavior. Clearly, these kinds of drugs could severely impair.

EVERY OPERATOR Should Know-Operating a boat requires a combination of thought and motor skills, a great deal of common sense, and a concern for the safety of everyone on the water. Safe operation requires an observant eye, a steady hand, and a clear head. By mixing drugs with boating, you are only asking for trouble.

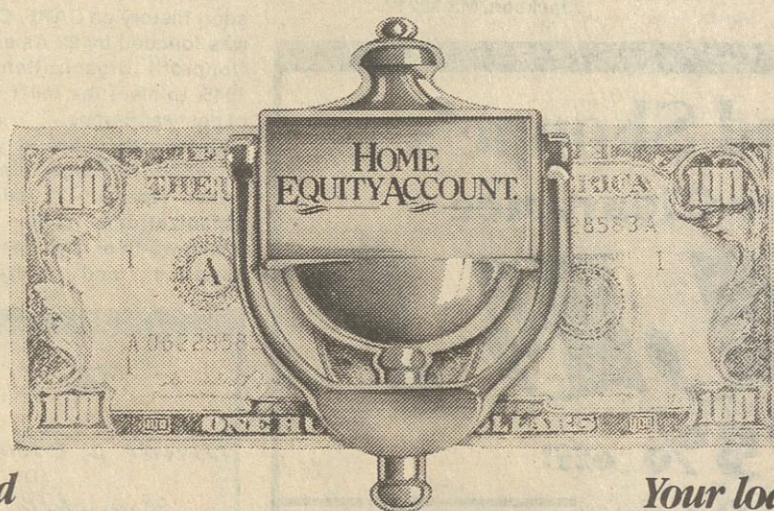

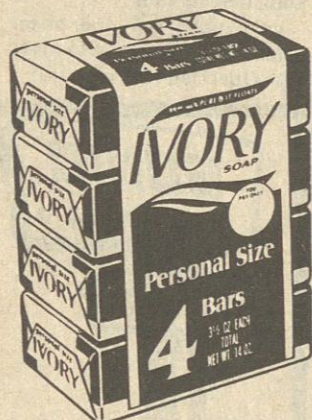

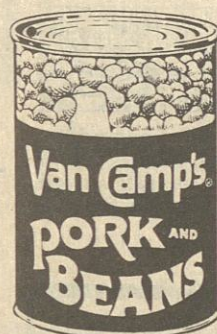

Conservation Reserve Program Sign-Up Announced

Farmers who want to bid to enter their highly erodible cropland into USDA's 10-year Conservation Reserve Program may do so during the program's fourth sign up period from February 9 through February 27.

A one-time, one-year

"bonus" for the 1987 crop was announced which is to be paid in the form of an increased annual rental payment. The bonus payment will be equal to \$2.00 times the farm program payment yield for corn, times the number of acres of corn base designated for enrollment in the CRP. This "bonus" will be payable in the form of generic commodity certificates when a 1987 Conservation Reserve Program contract is accepted. In subsequent years, the annual rental payment will be only that amount specified in the CRP contract.

Since a paid land diversion is in effect under the 1987

Feed Grain Program to restrain further build-up of corn stocks, this rental payment is being offered to encourage highly erodible, excess corn acreage into long-term conservation use. This offer is limited to new CRP contracts effective beginning with the 1987 crop year. It is not retroactive for corn base acreage under CRP contracts already signed. This additional rental payment will be made at the time new 1987 contracts are accepted. It will be charged against the CRP maximum payment limitation and not against other program payments.

Producers who have already enrolled in other 1987 production adjustment programs, and received advance payments in cash and generic certificates may cancel their contracts and enter into the CRP. There will be no penalty, but payments already received must be refunded in cash.

During the signup period, producers will be given the option to enter into a CRP contract beginning with either the 1987 or 1988 crop year.

The CRP is one of the new conservation initiatives contained in the Food Security Act of 1985 designed to

reduce soil erosion. Under the CRP, owners and operators of highly erodible cropland agree to cease production on the highly erodible land for a 10-year period and to devote this land to conservation uses.

Under provisions of a recent amendment to the legislation authorizing CRP, alfalfa and other multi-year grasses and legumes in rotation during the years 1981-1985, as approved by the Secretary, will be considered to be "agricultural commodities" for the purpose of determining eligibility of land to be placed in the CRP.

Not more than 25 percent of the total cropland in a county may be placed in the CRP. The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to waive this limit if there will be no adverse effect on the local

economy. USDA will establish maximum acceptable rental rates after signup ends and bid data is evaluated.

During the first three signup periods, 8,916,185 acres of highly erodible cropland were accepted into the CRP.

Letter To The Editor

To the Editor:

Senator Irb Benjamin deserves high praise for voting for the bill calling for a constitutional convention. We appreciate his honoring the wishes of the great majority of the people by supporting the bill, which includes a referendum as the first step. The bill passed the Senate by a vote of 43 to 4.

Now the issue is up to the House of Representatives, where it faces tough opposition in the Constitution Committee. If that committee kills the bill, it will be difficult -- but not impossible -- for the full House to have a chance to vote on the convention bill.

No more important and far-reaching issue will be considered in the Legislature this year. The benefits to our state far outweigh any possible risks.

Citizens who believe the old constitution is not adequate and is holding back Mississippi's progress need to call their House members as soon as possible and urge them to vote for the convention bill.

Report From The House----

Mississippi's beleaguered highway system was a focal point for two days of legislative debate in the House of Representatives as state lawmakers completed the fourth week of the 1987 session by narrowly approving a major four-lane road program.

A majority of legislators indicated they agree on the need for additional four-lane highways around the state. But, House members were

sharply at odds over specifics such as size, cost, and how to finance the program.

The House approved a \$1.5 billion construction program recommended by the House Transportation Committee that would mean 1,059 miles of new four-lane roads throughout the state. The measure still faces Senate action where a similar highway bill -- but with different funding provisions -- has been approved. The House and Senate must resolve differences before the legislation can be sent to

the Governor.

The bill needed a 3/5ths majority for passage and was approved 69-46, getting exactly the minimum number of votes required, to climax two days of debate. The measure failed by seven votes the first day it was called up to get the 3/5ths majority, but the House agreed to reconsider the bill the following day. This time it was passed.

The House voted for an revised plan to finance the program that includes a tax increase of about 3.6 cents per gallon on gasoline and 3.3 cents on diesel fuel, but would not require issuance of new longterm highway bonds. An earlier version called for a tax increase of 2 cents per gallon on motor fuel and other revenue features, including issuance of bonds as necessary. The original bill had included a 5-cent increase in motor fuel taxes.

The House rejected attempts to include additional highways or shift construction priorities. An amendment

also was defeated that sought to substitute a bond-financed, 450-mile highway program as proposed by the governor.

Under the plan approved by the House, the construction program would be financed by raising the state excise taxes on motor fuel but removing the current 6 percent sales tax on fuel. This would, in effect, mean an estimated increase of slightly over 3 cents per gallon on fuel. However, some changes in the bill or additional legislation apparently will be needed to carry out the intent of removing the sales tax on fuel since the sales tax portion of the law was not in legislation.

In addition, a portion of the federal highway money received by the state would be earmarked for the new program, along with a portion of the proceeds from the road contractor's tax. Other funding features include a \$5 registration fee on motor vehicles, replacing the present \$5 safety inspection

fee that would be repealed, and use of money that would become available as debt requirements decrease on some old highway bonds.

The House was preparing this week for an upswing in floor action as well as committee work. More than 40 bills covering a variety of topics were approved last week by committees, ranging from a proposed overhaul of the Mississippi Memorial Stadium Commission to a measure raising the compulsory school attendance age to 16 over a three-year period.

Numerous other bills were still being discussed in committee at the start of the current week covering such important issues as insurance, farm problems, education, business laws, and constitutional revision.

In other recent action, the House voted to allow school boards to lease certain 16th Section School Lands for a maximum term of 40 years. The measure would bring state law in line with a constitutional amendment raising the maximum lease from 25 to 40 years on school trust lands classified as industrial, commercial, farm-residential, residential and recreational. It does not involve agriculture and forest lands.

The constitutional amendment was ratified by the people in a state referendum last fall. The House-passed bill contains a requirement that leases include a 10-year rent adjustment provision on industrial and commercial property. Originally, the rent adjustment feature applied to all classes of land covered by the bill but a number of lawmakers felt this could have a negative impact on leasing property for residential use. The bill was amended to exclude residential and farm-residential land from the rent adjustment provision.

In addition, the House approved a number of technical revisions in the comprehensive Mississippi Election Code passed in the 1986 legislative session; made some procedural changes in the law providing for a legislative hearing on proposed rail abandonments in the state; granted authority to the school boards of newly organized school systems to help provide for an orderly transition; and voted to make sure that county jails housing state inmates are covered under the law prohibiting illegal drugs, liquor, and weapons on prison property.

House and Senate members met in a solemn, joint session for a visit by Air Force Major Terence Henricks, a NASA astronaut, marking the anniversary of the space shuttle Challenger tragedy. Henricks was in Mississippi to return a replica of the state flag which had been aboard the ill-fated Challenger.
