Bill Wheeler Announces For State Representative, Dist. 19



Bill Wheeler is seeking to serve as Itawamba and Tishomingo counties District 19 State Representative.

Wheeler, a life-long resident of District 19, grew up in Tishomingo County. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Wheeler and the nephew of Cason and Herschel Wheeler. Wheeler has one brother, John.

Wheeler is the 1987 president of South Tishomingo Methodist Men's organization and a lay leader for the Golden United Methodist Church.

He is a participant in the 1987 class of Leadership Itawamba, and in 1985 was listed among the Outstanding Young Men of America. As a youth, Wheeler earned his Eagle Scout badge, the highest rank in Boy Scouting. Later, Wheeler became an Assistant Scoutmaster for Boy Scouts of America.

He is now an instructor of American national, state, and local government at Itawamba Junior College in Fulton.

He is currently coordinating an Economic Development Conference for Itawamba Junior College and the Mississippi Committee for the Humanities.

Wheeler graduated from Northwest Alabama Junior College where he served as student body president and was named valedictorian. He is an honor graduate of Millsaps College in Jackson, earning a B.A. in history and earning awards for leadership and scholarship. While at Millsaps, Wheeler was elected to an unprecedented two terms as student body president.

Wheeler graduated this past year from George Washington University in Washington, D.C., where he received his master's in history and public policy with a specialty in state and local governments.

While in Washington, Wheeler taught American history and served as an aide to United States Senator

Howell Heflin. In 1984, he served as a research assistant to former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Wilburn Cohen.

Wheeler has served on the Tishomingo County Democratic Executive Committee since 1980 and the Mississippi State Democratic Executive Committee since 1984. He was a delegate to the Mississippi Democratic state convention in 1980 and 1984. Wheeler has also worked in numerous local and national campaigns.

Wheeler released the following statement:

"My experience gives me a unique insight into the problem facing northeast Mississippi - the depressed agriculture economy, the demand for more and better jobs, and most importantly, the crucial need for better roads.

"As a candidate for the Mississippi House, I want to focus on the importance of guaranteeing the 19th District its fair share of the Mississippi state budget. In education, in transportation, and in critical programs serving our senior citizens, Itawamba and Tishomingo Counties lag far behind the rest of Mississippi. I believe this cannot and should not continue.

"I want to play an even more active role in political and community activities as your representative. I ask for your support in my efforts."

Schnadig Corporation To Locate In Belmont

Mississippi Department of Economic Development Executive Director Jerry McDonald today announced that Schnadig Corporation of Chicago, Illinois, will locate a plant in Belmont in Tishomingo County.

Schnadig Corporation manufactures upholstered living room furniture sold under the brand names "International" and "Karpen" to retail furniture and major chain department stores.

Production is scheduled to begin in two months in a leased facility. Within a year they plan to be in their new 200,000 square foot building in the Belmont Industrial Park with 230 employees. There are plans for Phase II which will include an additional 200,000 square feet and an additional 200 employees.

"We are very happy to be locating a facility in Mississippi. The state offers excellent incentives and is

very supportive to locating companies," said Andi Dzelme, senior vice president of Operations and Finance. "We chose Belmont because of its proximity to one of America's furniture manufacturing centers and because of the tremendous support from the community."

"Initial contact with Schnadig by the Department was begun in September 1983, when MDED Senior Industrial Developer Tom Sanders contacted and visited the company," said Jerry McDonald. "While the Department has been working with Schnadig since 1983 showing them six industrial sites in the State, it was a total team effort by MDED, the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, Bill Flynn and the Tishomingo County Development Foundation, and Belmont city leaders that brought the plant to Belmont."

Summer Program In Accounting Offered

Mrs. Barbara T. McNeil of Burnsville will offer a course in the fundamentals of accounting beginning June 1. The accounting course will focus on the complete accounting cycle with emphasis on financial statements and payroll systems. The study of sales tax, partnerships, corporations, and other aspects of accounting will be covered in an advanced course to be offered at a later date.

U.S. 72 Four-Lane Officially Opened

Northern District Highway Commissioner Zack Stewart and the Mississippi State Highway Department joined with local and county officials from Alcorn and Tishomingo Counties Wednesday, February 18, to officially open U.S. 72 between Burnsville and Iuka. The ceremony was held in Burnsville.

The 5.8 miles stretch of U.S. 72 was a grade, drain, bridge, and pavement project con-

structed by Hill Brothers Construction Company, Inc., of Falkner. The cost of the project was \$9,307,670.

This project was funded through a 1983 "Jobs Bill" which was secured by the efforts of Congressman Jamie L. Whitten in a special appropriation enacted by Congress.

"This is the second project to be opened to traffic on U.S. 72 since 1984," Commissioner Stewart commented. "We are extremely

pleased that this project is now open. It will give the traveling public and industries a much safer route to travel."

In August, 1986, the State Highway Department began another project on U.S. 72 between Corinth and Strickland. Today, that project is continuing to progress leaving only one small stretch of U.S. 72 that is not four-laned and/or under construction between Corinth and the Alabama State

Line. Commissioner Stewart also pointed out that the last stretch not under construction is scheduled to be let to contract in late March if the Federal Highway Bill is passed by Congress.

"Four-laning of U.S. 72 is an excellent example of public support for our highway program because the people of the area continued not to accept 'no' for an answer and a way of financing was found," Mr. Stewart said.

Community Blood Drive Planned For Friday

The Community Blood Drive in Iuka will be held on February 20, at 1:00 - 5:00. The drive is sponsored by Tishomingo Community Hospital in conjunction with United Blood Services to assure that blood will be available for area patients.

Donating blood is safe, simple, and satisfying. The average weight adult has ten to twelve pints of this essential liquid carrying oxygen and nutrients to all body cells. The pint of blood you

give is replaced within four to six weeks after donation; which means that you can safely donate every eight weeks.

Giving blood takes just a few minutes, is virtually painless, and completely safe. You cannot contract any infectious disease by donating blood. All materials used in the donation process

are sterile and disposable ... they are used once, then thrown away.

Every day, more than 30,000 donors are needed to meet the blood needs of our nation. In our region, 75 donors a day are needed to meet the basic needs of the 20 hospitals served by United Blood Service's Tupelo office. Over two-thirds of men and women between the ages of 18 and 65 are eligible to donate; yet fewer than ten percent of these healthy adults take time to donate blood.

"The goal for this blood drive is to sign up at least 50-100 donors," said Ginger Reeder, Donor Resources Specialist for United Blood Services. "We ask those of

you who would like to donate to please go by the Iuka National Guard Armory between the hours of 1:00 - 6:00 p.m. on February 20.

"Donating blood is often not thought about until someone you know needs it. Then, the importance of an adequate, safe blood supply is appreciated," continued Mrs. Reeder. "Your blood donation could help a patient with heart disease, anemia, or cancer. Please help us meet the goal and blood needs of our community."

Murder Suspect Held In County Jail

Paula Cook, 22, of Booneville was transported to the Tishomingo County Jail Friday, Sheriff Bob Payne said. Ms. Cook is one of three suspects who were being held by Cullman, Alabama, authorities on capital murder charges in the January 25 brutal death of a Corinth man.

Ms. Cook, who waived extradition, was released to face prosecution in Mississippi. She will remain incarcerated at the local facility awaiting grand jury action. Sheriff Payne said no bond can be set on charges of capital murder.

Two others charged in the execution style slaying of Rabon Rainey, 38, remain in Cullman. The sheriff said extradition proceedings began Monday for the return of

Jimmy Dale Wardlow, 24. The third suspect, Doyle Lee Hamm, 29, is expected to stay in Alabama where he faces a second capital murder charge in connection with the shooting death of a Cullman motel clerk. This murder occurred later the same day as Rainey's death, January 25. Both Wardlow and Hamm are listed as residents of Booneville.

The three apparently abducted Rainey from a Florence, Alabama, nightclub the night before his body was found near Dennis. Officials said the victim had been shot once in the head, stabbed in the abdomen and was bound. He was found sitting in the back seat of his wrecked automobile by a passing motorist.

Promotion Retention Policy For Iuka School District

In order to come into compliance with the accreditation standards required by the State Department of Education, the Iuka School District Board recently approved and adopted a Promotion Retention Policy. The policy is based on the Department of Education's guidelines and was brought about specifically to meet the accreditation standards.

The Promotion-Retention Policy becomes effective this year 1987, spring grading period.

IUKA SCHOOL DISTRICT PROMOTION-RETENTION POLICY

Grades 1 & 2	70% Mastery of District's Instructional Management Plan Objectives.
Grade 3	70% Mastery of District's IMP Objectives Plus Minimum Proficiency on the Basic Skills Assessment Program
Grade 4	Same as Grades 1 & 2
Grade 5	Same as Grade 3
Grades 6 & 7	Same as Grades 1 & 2
Grade 8	Same as Grades 3 & 5
Grade 9	Promotion with 70% Mastery of District's IMP Objectives on 3 1/2 units
Grade 10	Promotion with 70% Mastery of District's IMP Objectives on 8 accumulative units
Grade 11	Promotion with 70% Mastery of District's IMP Objectives on 12 1/2 units plus minimum proficiency on BSAP Test

Also, show mastery of 70% of what the teacher provides at all levels.

If the student fails these requirements, the student will be retained.

Achievement test results will be considered for grades for which the state provides testing.

Exceptions to the above promotion-retention policy with regard to age, habitual discipline problems, as well as proficiency/deficiency on BSAP scores, district's IMP objectives and teacher-provided classroom work will be considered on an individual basis.

High school students may choose a college preparatory tract or a general education tract to lead to a diploma. Students who are in the resource program will be awarded a certificate if they complete the resource program tract.

The administrative staff and guidance counselor at Iuka High School are available to meet with civic groups and organizations for discussion of the policy. Dr. Jerry Stone should be contacted.

In addition to the Promotion-Retention Policy, the Mississippi High School Activity Association and the State Board of Education have initiated a no pass no play policy which is in effect and requires students to pass 4 1/2 accumulative units per year to be eligible to participate in extracurricular activities. A total of 18 units or credits are required in order to graduate.

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

Loving Your Children Getting The Message Across

Of course you care about your children. That is why you are reading this. And, like most parents, you probably make many sacrifices to feed, clothe, and educate your children. You may brag about them to anyone who will listen. Perhaps you even carry their pictures around to show off to your friends.

Yes, with few exceptions, all parents love their children. Yet not all children feel loved. Even when their parents love them, some children think that no matter what they do, they are not wanted. Others learn that their parents care about them only when they behave in certain ways. Not

all children are lucky enough to know whatever they say or do, their parents care.

Clearly, being loved is not the same as feeling loved. It is not enough to know you love your children. You have to be sure they know it, too. You have to show them you love them just the way they are, just because they are.

Loving your children, then, is largely a matter of getting the message across.

Hidden Messages

With children, it is often the little things that count. You may have scrimped and saved to buy a bigger and better home. But young children do not know that such acts express your love for them.

Instead, simple, everyday events tell young children whether or not you value

them. Your presence, a smile, a gentle touch and a kind word spell "I love you" to a child.

In the same way, day-to-day happenings can tell children they are not valued very highly. Unintentionally, your words and actions can convey to children that you do not care.

Think about how some of the things you say and do might look from a child point of view:

DO YOU....

...tend to feed, clothe, and bathe your baby hurriedly, never taking advantage of this time to touch, talk, and play?

...only show your affection for your children when they do something that pleases you?

If you are always in a hurry, your child might be learning not that you are busy, but that he or she is not important. If you only express your love under certain conditions, your child may be learning that you love him - IF he obeys or IF he does not wet the bed or IF he does not make any mistakes. And if children receive many such messages, they may begin to think that you are not very glad to have them.

Successful Signals

Children who feel unloved act very differently from those who feel loved. They spend lots of time trying to reassure themselves and other people of their worth. They are very cautious about trying new things, for failure hurts them deeply.

Children who know they are loved, on the other hand, do not have to waste time proving their worth. They are not afraid to try out their wings. They know that even if they fail, they can still count on your love and respect.

Be sure your children feel secure about your love for them:

*Look at what your words and actions could be telling your children about themselves.

*Find ways to show your children that no matter what, you love them.

This does not mean that if you ever get angry or frustrated with your children they are ruined forever. Children do not need perfect parents. Ordinary people will do. If the overall climate you

create is one of love and respect, you children will learn they are valued --

-- just the way they are --
-- just because they are --
-- no ifs, ands, or buts.

Housekeeping

Floor action was expected to take priority this week in the Mississippi House of Representatives as lawmakers, moving into the second month of the 1987 session, tackled a moun-

tainous stack of bills.

More than 200 bills and resolutions were approved last week by House committees and sent to the bulging calendar for consideration by the full House. The deadline for floor action on most of these measures is Thursday, February 12.

Among the numerous bills awaiting floor action at the end of the past week were several measures aimed at helping cope with rural fire insurance problems, a series of proposed amendments to the State Constitution, a compulsory auto liability insurance proposal, a plan to reapportion the state's three Supreme Court districts, and a proposed residential landlord-tenant act.

A number of other bills failed to survive last week's deadline for committee action on general bills and constitutional amendments. Several motions were filed under a new House rule to withdraw bills from committees if committees took no action on the measures. In some instances, bills failed to clear House or Senate committees but remained viable since similar bills were

pending in the other chamber.

Several controversial proposals were approved by House committees and were awaiting floor action at the close of the past week, including proposed constitutional amendments dealing with a state lottery and a reorganization of the state's system of higher education. A bill calling for a referendum on a constitutional convention was defeated in committee but reached the House calendar on a minority report.

While most of last week's attention was on committee work, several important measures won House approval and were sent along to the Senate.

The House approved some revisions in a student assessment testing program established under the 1982 Education Reform Act. Basically, the bill would give education officials more flexibility in deciding the grades in which to administer the tests. At present, the law specifies the tests shall be given in grades 3, 4, 8, and 11.

Recommended by the state Department of Education, the bill still would require students to pass a literacy test to get their diploma. It would allow students to receive a Certificate of Attendance, instead of a diploma, if they fail the literacy test but meet other graduation requirements. Along with other provisions, an amendment was inserted to ensure that students are given a literacy test prior to the 9th grade.

A proposal to reorganize the Mississippi Memorial Stadium Commission also was approved by the House last week. Backers said the bill was part of efforts to resolve problems at the 62,500-seat stadium and make sure it is used to the fullest extent possible. The restructured commission would consist of five members appointed by the governor with the initial appointments for staggered terms. There would be one member from each Supreme Court District, one from the state at large, and one from Hinds County where the stadium is located. Other provisions include a requirement that concession sales at the stadium be audited.

An amendment was approved to permit Jackson State University to receive one-half of the profits from concession sales at the stadium on games when JSU is the home team.

Other bills approved recently by the House would allow grain dealers and grain warehousemen to provide irrevocable letters of credit, in lieu of surety bond, in seeking a license; direct the Board of Education to establish screening program for students with abnormal spinal curvature; designate the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Bridge in Itawamba County in honor of the late

Congressman John Rankin; permit Boards of Supervisors in counties with two judicial districts to operate only one jail in the county; clarify labeling requirements for light wine; and revise a state law dealing with oil field unitization by reducing the required approval rate of royalty and working interest owners to 75 percent for compulsory fieldwide unitization.

A number of bills involving the state's correctional system were approved, including a measure to require that offenders who are 21 and

younger are committed separately from older inmates. In addition, the measure would reenact the Community Sentencing Act for violent first offenders, expand a joint state work program for offenders authorized in 1983 to limited basis.

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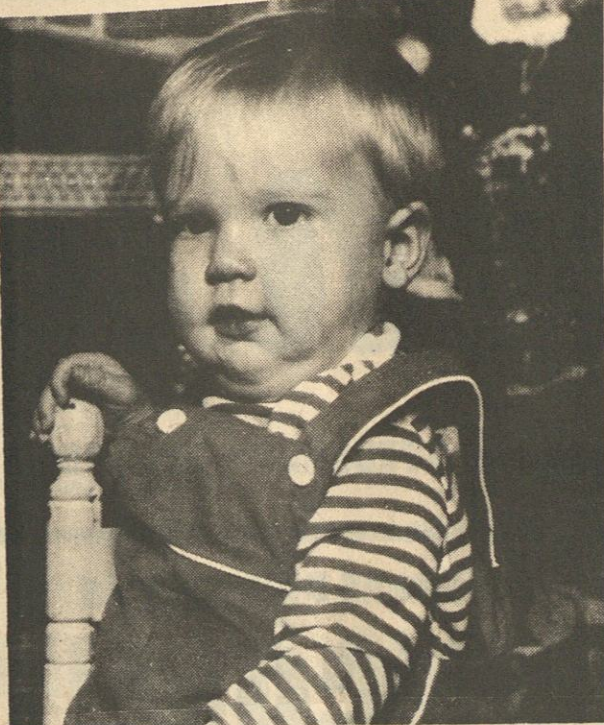
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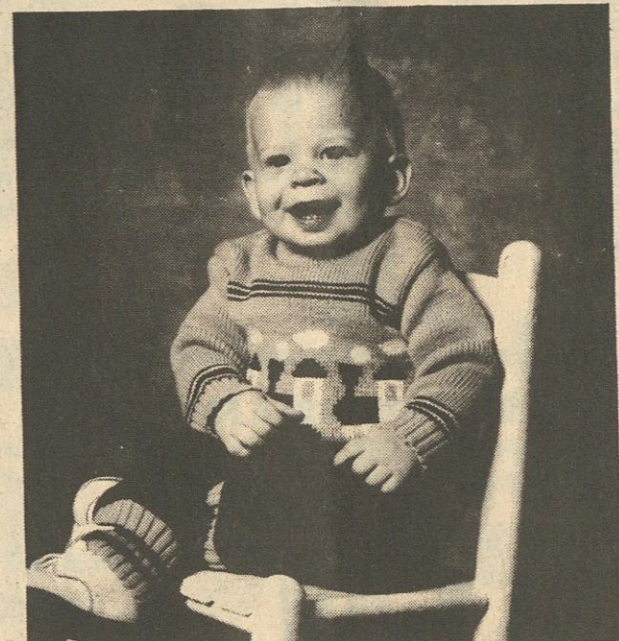

Genealogical Society Meeting

The Natchez Trace Genealogical Society met at 2:00 p.m. at the First Independent Methodist Church in Florence, Alabama, on February 8, 1987. Mrs. Marie Gorman, President, presided at the meeting. Mr. Graham Edwards, pastor, gave the invocation. New members and guests were introduced and made welcome.

Mrs. Ann Gregath of Cullman, Alabama, presented the program. She is the author and publisher of thirty-two books of her own, and editor and publisher of many others. She has conducted research throughout our country and a number of foreign countries. She was the organizing President of the North Alabama Genealogical Society, and has served as Alabama State Chairman of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

Mrs. Gregath has more than 25 years in the field of genealogy and has developed a unique method of teaching which allows the student to record his research in the form of a manuscript in progress which enables many of her students to publish books immediately upon finishing her class. Primarily, her method traces a person or family in ten year segments of time using the U.S. Census Records. In conjunction, pertinent Military and Land Records are also consulted. This procedure establishes the migratory pattern for the family. From these records information is gathered which is recorded on the Family Record Sheets, the Historical Data Sheet, and the Reference Record. Pictures of people and places and maps of migration can be added. Mrs. Gregath presently teaches classes in the continuing education department at Wallace State Community College, Hanceville, Alabama. Wallace State Community College is the only Alabama college to offer course work in genealogy. Family History courses offered by Wallace State are: Beginning Family History and Genealogy, Researching Historic Sites, State Archives Research,

Report From The Senate

When the midnight hour came Thursday, February 5, 213 Senate bills were still alive in the legislative process, having been approved by their proper committees before the deadline passed. The Senate now has one short week to take action on these bills in order for them to be sent on to the House of Representatives for consideration.

The following is a listing of just a few bills which are on the agenda for consideration by the full Senate:

*A bill to increase the amount of insurance premium taxes going into the fund for support of rural fire departments from \$1.5 million to \$4 million. This is not a tax increase; it simply diverts more of the taxes already being paid into this fund for distribution to rural fire departments which qualify.

*A bill requiring the State Board of Education to adopt

rules to simplify and reduce the number and length of written reports required from school districts and teachers.

*A proposed amendment to the Constitution which would allow you, the voters, to decide if county and circuit court judges should be able to deny bail before an accused person's trial for crimes other than capital offenses. The Attorney General's office, which is supporting the bill, said that it is aimed at keeping drug dealers off the street. Opponents argue that a person is innocent until proven guilty and bail should not be denied before a trial.

*A bill to do away with the mandate passed last year to dispose of state parks which cost the state fund more than \$2 per visitor. Proponents argue that state parks were not originally established to be profit-makers, and some of the parks in question are the only recreational sites available in some areas.

*A bill to require a reduction in insurance premiums for drivers 65 years and older who pass a motor vehicle accident prevention course approved by the Department of Safety.

*A bill to change the manner in which county board of education members are elected. Members would serve four-year terms with three members elected at one election and two during another election year.

*A bill to convert student loans to interest-free scholarships if the recipients teach in the public schools of the state for a specified period of time.

*A bill to expand the Medicaid Program to cover pregnant women living at the poverty level; to increase from 15 to 30 the number of hospital days covered by Medicaid for children under age five; and to raise the reimbursement rates for Medicaid-covered deliveries. The intent of this bill is to help reduce the state's infant mortality rate and the indigent care problem.

*A bill to allow left turns on red at intersections of one-way streets.

*A bill to require that certain law enforcement officials be notified upon the escape of a prisoner from the state penitentiary.

Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Corn, sorghum, cotton, and soybean loans are available until May 31.

Bridges said many farmers use the commodity loan program to obtain interim operating capital or hold their grain for future delivery. As of February 17, 1987, local producers had obtained federal price support loans on more than 14,669 bushels of their 1986 grain crops.

County loan rates per bushel are: wheat \$2.38, oats \$1.08, corn \$2.04, sorghum \$3.27, and soybeans \$4.83. Regular loans have a nine-month maturity date with variable monthly interest rates.

"Farmers who participate in the acreage reduction programs will be eligible for price support loans and other benefits on their 1987 wheat,

feed grains, cotton, and rice," said Bridges. Applications for 1987 programs may be filed through March 30.

Bridges said 1986 wheat and feed grains are not eligible for the farmer-owner grain reserve. Quantities in the reserve currently exceed the upper limits of 360 million bushels for wheat and about 560 million bushels for feed grains.

In most cases producers satisfy their loan obligations by repaying the money before the loan matures or by forfeiting the crop to the Commodity Credit Corporation if prices at loan maturity are below the loan rate.

Farmers interested in obtaining a loan on their 1986 small grain crops should contact the Tishomingo County ASCS Office before March 31.

Soil Conservation Notes
The need for developing the land within the Tishomingo County Soil and

Water Conservation District for forestry products is one of the greatest needs from an agricultural standpoint. All farm owners are not conscious of the economic possibilities that may be derived from the development of idle acres to the production of forestry products. There are thousands of acres in Tishomingo County that should be planted to timber. There are several programs to help land owners plant trees. The newest of these is the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) where by sloping cropland, is rented to the government for a period of ten years, they would then pay 65% of cost of planting trees. Then landowners would then draw annual rental on these acres. A majority of the farms in

Tishomingo County have land which is unsuitable for crops other than forestry products. If this land were utilized for timber production the income per farm would greatly increase. With the population of our County increasing yearly the need of pulpwood will also greatly increase. Especially when we consider anyone who goes to a food store buys items that are packaged by paper products: bread, meats, poultry products, milk, ice cream, and vegetables are just a few of the many products requiring pulpwood. From the stand point of economics the huge pulpwood mill located at Counce Tennessee, is a major consumer of forest products in the form of pulpwood. Foresters estimate that a well

managed forest will produce annually one cord of pulpwood. If each acre of potential timberland was producing one cord of pulpwood, this would mean the landowners of Tishomingo County would have thousands of dollars which could exceed the value of soybeans and milo production. The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District encourages each landowner to consider the new Conservation Reserve Program. 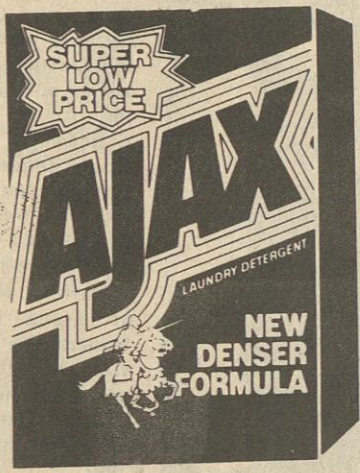
North Crossroads 4-H Club News

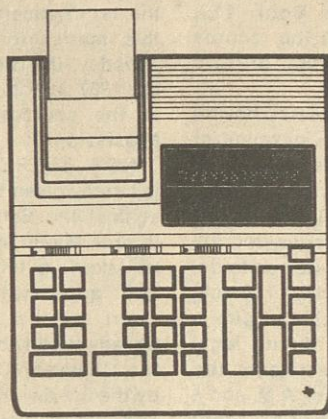

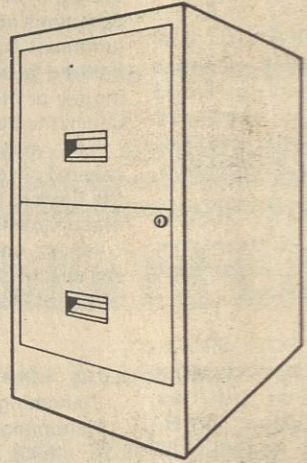

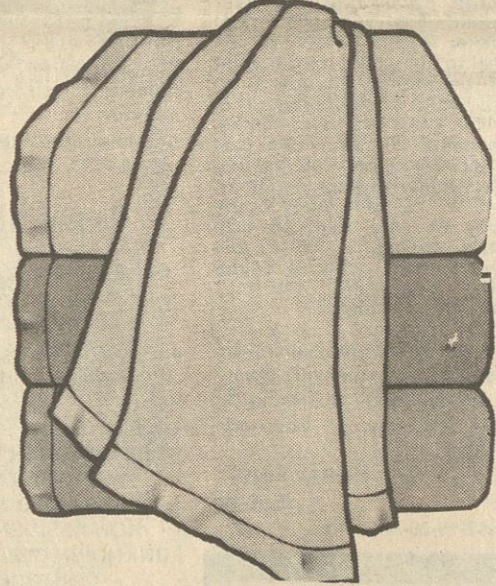
