Flynn Resigns, Search Begins For Director

Bill Flynn resigned as executive director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation February 13. Flynn had served in this position since November 1983. Reports indicate an official search for Flynn's replacement is underway. The TCDF office remains staffed by a secretary with board members filling in when needed. Gregg Pharr of Belmont reported. Pharr was recently elected chairman of the industrial and economic

development organization. Flynn said his decision to leave the county came about as the result of an offer of better financial opportunities. He has accepted a similar position in Crossett County, Arkansas. "There is no problem with the local group or Tishomingo County; the opportunity to achieve a significant increase in income does not come that often and with two children in college, this is something that I feel will be better for my family and me," Flynn said.

Community Action Provides Services

The Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency is providing a range of services to low income households through the community services block grant. The community services block grant is administered in the state of Mississippi by the office of energy and community services, office of federal-state programs. Among the first services available in 1987 will be a limited number of smoke alarms for households using a high risk heat source such as fireplaces and open flame heaters. During the spring NMCAA will distribute gardening supplies to 50 Tishomingo County families who have home gardens. All households must meet federal guidelines of 100% of poverty level in order to qualify for services. Special

consideration will be given to qualified families who did not receive any assistance under the community services block grant during 1986. NMCAA will also have available ongoing programs for transportation, health screening and information and referral services throughout 1987. New Evidence Uncovered In Johnson Murder Case

County law officials feel confident that an arrest is forthcoming in the January 1984 shooting death of Webb and Jewell Johnson of Iuka. Sheriff Bob Payne said Tuesday that more progress was made during last week's trip to Texas by himself, Iuka policeman Ricky Cornelson and state investigator C.B. Wright, than had been during the lapsed three year period since the brutal murder of the elderly couple. The sheriff said authorities

here were notified by Texas officials that they had reason to believe a male suspect held in custody there had knowledge of, and had been involved in, the murder of the Johnsons. Investigation revealed the information had been reported to Texas officials through an unidentified telephone caller. Sheriff Payne said he, Cornelson and Wright witnessed lie detector tests as they were administered to both the jailed suspect and

the other subject involved in making the anonymous call. Although the names of those questioned in Texas are being withheld by local officials, it was said neither of them were originally from Tishomingo County, but that both had at one point in time been in the county. The jailed suspect was being held on charges of auto theft and breaking and entering, and the second man questioned was arraigned in federal court on charges of counterfeit money involvement, the

sheriff said. During the interview, names were brought up and are currently being investigated by local and state officials as well as Alabama authorities. The sheriff said one other subject is still being sought in Texas for questioning. Sheriff Payne commented that information put together as a result of the Texas trip has revealed good leads into the Johnson case. The bodies of Webb John-

son, 62, and his wife, Jewell, 64, were discovered Saturday, January 28, 1984. Relatives reported last seeing the couple alive on Wednesday three days prior to the discovery of the bodies. Evidence found in the home indicated the couple had been shot and that they apparently knew their assailant(s) and were relaxed in their living room drinking coffee and smoking cigarettes when the double homicide occurred.

New Leads In Boothe Murder

Sheriff Bob Payne said Tuesday that a suspect in custody locally on grand larceny charges was being questioned in connection with the February 1984 beating death of Wilbur B. "Bill" Boothe. Sheriff Payne said names given by the subject were being investigated. The body of the 71-year-old Shady Grove Community resident was discovered February 18 in the kitchen floor of his home. Robbery was assumed to be the motive for the death and since there was no evidence of forced entry into the residence, Sheriff Payne stated "the victim apparently knew his attacker(s) and was calm and relaxed at the kitchen table" when this murder took place.

Reward Offered In Recent Thefts Throughout County

A rampant rash of burglaries in Tishomingo County during the month of February has netted thieves an assorted amount of money and merchandise. Police investigations thus far have failed to turn up any substantial leads and a special appeal is being made to county citizens for assistance. Chief Deputy Mike Kemp said Monday that a reward is being offered in hopes of encouraging public cooperation. The amount of the reward was undisclosed, but Kemp said in order to qualify for it the information given must lead to the arrest and conviction of subjects involved in the recent burglaries.

Kemp stressed that informants would not be asked to give their names and that all information would be kept in absolute confidence.

The Busy Bee Convenience Store located on Highway 25 North at Crossroads was hit by thieves and an estimated \$2,000.00 in merchandise was taken. The robbery occurred sometime after closing time at 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, February 21. The theft was discovered at 5:30 a.m. on Sunday, February 22, when the store opened for business. Entry was gained when the lock on the front

door was removed. Items reported taken were approximately 40 cases of cigarettes, other tobacco products, chains for chain saws, brake fluid, cases of soft drinks, and \$22.00 cash from a cigar box where newspaper money was kept. Mrs. Davis, store owner, told The News that county law officials report they have several pretty good leads; however, no arrests have been made. The incident remains under investigation. Eastport Beach Shows New Signs Of Life

A visit to the Eastport Marina would surprise many people who have not been there recently due to the "newness" surrounding it. The addition of many truckloads of white gravel and dirt fill and the smoothing of once rutted parking areas makes it look fresh and clean. The new owners of the Marina are Kenny Schaper, Tommy Harris, and Joe Estess. Mr. Schaper has a home on the water at the ex-

treme end of the residential area at Eastport. He was previously involved in wholesale poultry. The property was purchased in late 1986 and a program of improvements began with work being done by the Mike Nelson Contracting Company. Slopes have been smoothed, parking areas leveled and filled, and rip-rap placed along the slopes leading down into the water. Dredging has increased the water depth by

several feet. Tim Bivins Concrete Company working with Nelson built a concrete launching ramp which will allow boats to be launched without having to be concerned about running off into the deep water and getting stuck. Work will continue with plans of sowing grass along the slopes and placing a topcoat of crushed stone on all the parking areas. Future improvements include the construction of a

new floating boat slip when weather permits, said Candy Gibbs. Mrs. Gibbs, her husband Rick, and their son operate the Eastport Marina. The addition of approximately 20 new slips will make the marina a more convenient place to put in and keep a boat. The investment by the new owners in excess of \$50,000 will make a real contribution to Tishomingo County and Iuka as it attracts many new boaters.

MD-Media Man: Hear Him, Read Him, Heed Him.....

Plain Talk on Air, in Newsletter, at Clinic

The following feature written by Ron Lovell appeared in the February 18, 1987, weekly publication of Medical Tribune.

Dr. Kelly S. Segars believes in talking straight to his patients about their medical problems. In the process, he tries to educate them and demystify medicine with a candor he considers rare among doctors. "So many of my patients have been to other doctors or specialists and not gotten much information," said the 56-year-old

family physician from Iuka. "All they hear are fancy-sounding medical terms. Some doctors don't know how to get down to earth and talk to people because they're around people all day who talk doctor talk." Starting with one-on-one sessions with his patients, Dr. Segars sets out to explain illnesses and diseases in a way that will not frighten or confuse them. That effort has led to a whole collection of ways to improve patient education. A bimonthly newsletter has a circulation of 2,000; the town of Iuka has a population of 3,000. His education program includes three-minute spots, run twice a day for a week, on one of the two radio stations he

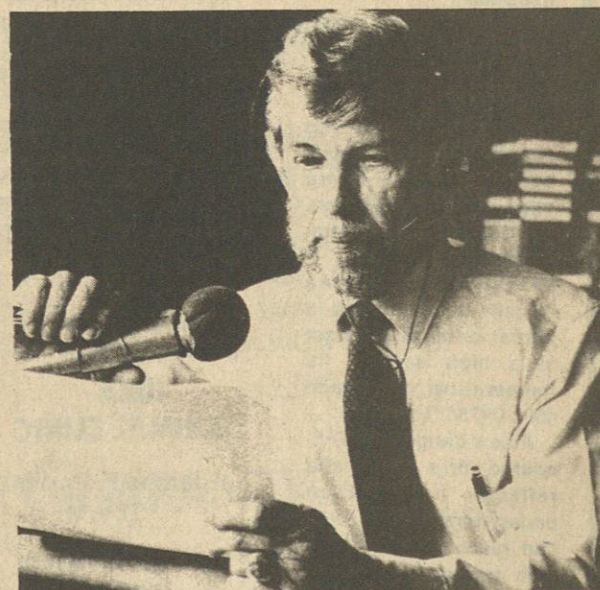
His Source Material

Dr. Segars gets his facts and figures from medical journals and "also Medical Tribune," rewriting and "changing some of the long words into something a patient will understand." Dr. Segars has long been enthusiastic about patient education. After becoming Mississippi's second certified instructor in advanced cardiac support, he helped establish CPR training at the local hospital and at his own clinic, where he practices with his son, an internist. As a result, the percentage of people qualified to perform CPR in his county is among the highest in the United States. He also holds mon-

thly first-aid classes at the clinic, in addition to regular instruction in breast self-examination and blood pressure monitoring. The clinic sponsors an annual child-abuse seminar designed for health professionals and educators. Dr. Segars' days in tiny Iuka, an old town in the northeast corner of the state near the site of the Civil War battle of Shiloh, are a blinding blur of activity common to most family physicians. At the hospital by 8:45 a.m., he arrives at the clinic to begin

seeing patients by 8:30. He works through lunch, sees patients all afternoon, and leaves for home by 5:30 or 6 p.m. Besides owning the radio stations, Dr. Segars is president of the First American National Bank, which he helped organize and charter in 1964. He is also president of S & G Cablevision, builder and operator of cable television systems. He lives on a 360-acre farm, on which he raises cattle and soybeans. He also

Q. Violence is dramatized in a lot of the popular television shows like Miami Vice. Is it a big part of the drug scene in Mississippi?

(M.J. Hattiesburg, MS)
A. We are seeing a significant increase in the amount of violators who are armed during drug deals recently in Mississippi than we have seen in the past. Statistics for 1986 reflect that

out of 1,052 persons arrested 116 of those were armed. And of those 116 some were armed with more than one weapon. Many of these T.V. shows serve as role models to many viewers and have contributed to the violence law enforcement officials are seeing nationwide.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



Watched Pot Could Save Your Bird's Life

If you use Teflon or Silverstone, you may be cooking your bird's goose. Nonstick cooking surfaces are coated with polytetrafluoroethylene (PTFE) which, when overheated, produces toxic fumes that can kill birds in a matter of minutes.

PTFE becomes toxic at 280 degrees Centigrade (over 530 degrees Fahrenheit), but is safe under normal cooking conditions. For example, boiling water, frying eggs, and deep frying are all done at safe temperatures. However, if PTFE-coated cookware is left unattended on a burner or in an oven set at a high setting, its temperature can reach 400° C (750°) or more.

A new danger is PTFE-coated drip pans and reflector bowls. Even under normal use, they can reach temperatures high enough to give off toxic fumes.

Birds are more susceptible to airborne

toxins and gases than other animals, and may die before you realize the cookware is burning. There are no specific symptoms, and the only way to tell that a bird has died from PTFE poisoning is to confirm that a PTFE surface was overheated at the time of the bird's death, and that no other toxic gases were present.

PTFE manufacturers are aware of the danger. One manufacturer has withdrawn its PTFE-coated drip pans from the market, and another is considering an alternative surface or a warning label.

Love Letters

Few things will be more important in deciding your children's future than their sense of self-worth. How they feel about themselves will affect whom they choose as friends, how they get along with others, and how well they make use of their abilities - in other words, all aspects of their lives. The strategies described below can strengthen your children's self-worth by letting them know you love and value them.

PAY ATTENTION TO YOUR CHILDREN:

Take time to talk to them, listen to them, and show interest in their activities and interests. Try to find times when you are not hurried or tense and can focus just on them.

EXPRESS YOUR AFFECTION OFTEN THROUGH PHYSICAL CONTACT:

With babies, this means holding and cuddling. As children get older, you can offer hugs, kisses, caresses, an arm over the shoulder, or a pat on the back. Sometimes the right words are hard to find, but a gentle hug says it all.

TREAT YOUR CHILDREN WITH THE SAME RESPECT YOU SHOW ADULTS:

Too often we reserve one set of manners for adults and another for children. We may embarrass our children by scolding or criticizing them in front of others. Or we may get so involved in a conversation we forget their presence. Children are no less sensitive than adults and deserve the same kind of respect.

TELL YOUR CHILDREN THEY ARE APPRECIATED:

Do not wait until they get good grades. Do not limit your praise to their good looks or manners. Let them know you enjoy them and think they are great all the time.

RESPOND TO YOUR CHILDREN WITH PATIENCE AND UNDERSTANDING:

When your child spills his milk for the third time in a row, or hits his sister over the head with a toy shovel, it is easy to treat him as a criminal. Try, though, to see the child as someone who needs your help in controlling his body and emotions.

RESPECT CHILDREN'S FEELINGS AND ABILITIES:

Because of their size, we

sometimes forget that children are people, too. They have a right to privacy and to feelings of their own. We may have to remind ourselves not to carry children when they can get there on their own or to speak for them when they can do this for themselves.

Main Dish Casserole

1 lb. ground beef
1 medium onion
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can mushroom soup
½ c. uncooked rice
1½ c. water
1 tsp. salt
¼ tsp. pepper

The cream of tartar you use when beating egg whites comes from grapes. It is deposited on the sides of wine casks during the fermentation of grapes into wine.

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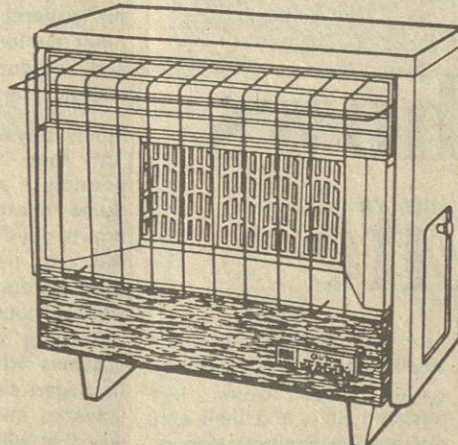
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In Service

Navy Seaman Recruit Gregory S. Robinson, son of Herbert W. and Martha A. Robinson of Route 1, Cherokee, AL, has completed recruit training at Recruit Training Command San Diego.

During Robinson's eight-week training cycle, he studied general military subjects designed to prepare him for further academic and on-the-job training in one of the Navy's 85 basic fields.

Robinson's studies included seamanship, close order drill, Naval history and first aid. Personnel who complete this course of instruction are eligible for three hours of college credit in Physical Education and Hygiene.

He joined the Navy in April 1986.

Tax Refunds Fund Nongame Research

Some \$37,000 is being doled out by the Department of Wildlife Conservation for nongame research, according to an agency spokesman in Jackson.

The money was received recently from the new state income tax donation option that appeared on last year's form.

As of January 1987, just over \$50,000 had been given to the department's Wildlife Heritage program for nongame wildlife.

Those projects funded will be under the direction of scientists and investigators in all sections of Mississippi.

Animals studied ranged from species like the green salamander in northeast Mississippi, to the dusky gopher frog in the long leaf pine section of south Mississippi, to migratory birds on the coastal barrier islands.

Some \$5,000 will go to Jerome Jackson of Mississippi State University to fund a study of the critically endangered red-cockaded woodpecker. This bird is in danger of extinction in Mississippi and the Southeast.

Another \$2,800 will go to F.R. Moore and T.R. Simons to study the utilization of the Gulf Coast barrier islands by migratory birds.

A status survey of the Atlantic sturgeon in the Pascagoula and Pearl River systems will receive some \$3,000. This fish species is endangered in Mississippi.

The state income tax donation option was approved by the state legislature several years ago. It has proven to be an innovative way for citizens to donate a portion or all of their state income tax refund to help nongame wildlife.

serves on boards and committees of everything from the library to the municipal airport.

He finds the time to keep up with his diversity of interests by taking Tuesdays off from his practice, he said, adding humorously: "Also, I don't play golf."

The path to medicine was not straight and narrow. In 1952, upon graduation from Auburn University with a degree in pharmacy, he was sent to Korea as a first lieutenant in the U.S. Army

just as the war ended. "They pulled me out to the border of the DMZ," he recalled, "and told me I was the only doctor. I was seeing patients at the aid station that first day, dispensing aspirin and Alka-Seltzer. I came back and went to medical school." He was graduated from the University of Mississippi Medical School in 1959.

Over his 26 years as a physician, Dr. Segars has seen a gradual change in his practice. This change has even affected the subjects he covers in the patient handouts he prepares for

distribution at the nurses' station in his clinic. Now, they cover only such noncontroversial subjects as dealing with back strain and treating fever in children. This reflects a change in the kinds of patients he sees. "I am gradually doing less and less orthopedics, no ob/gyn," he said. He has even stopped performing tonsillectomies because it would hike the cost of his malpractice insurance -- up 25% a year for the past three years.

"We are in a 'mal-lawyer' crisis, not a malpractice crisis," he said. "There is one

lawyer for every 365 people in the United States versus one lawyer for every 6,000 people in Japan. These people have got to make a living. It costs so much to defend yourself. Also, you have huge awards from juries who seem to have the lackadaisical attitude that the money is not coming out of the doctor's pocket. It's a big problem. We need tort reform."

Housekeeping

Some major changes in insurance laws, a proposed realignment of State Supreme Court districts, and a measure to raise the compulsory school attendance age to 16 are among the scores of bills approved by the Mississippi House of Representatives during the past week.

Overall, more than 130 bills and resolutions were guided to House passage prior to last week's deadline for original floor action on general bills and constitutional amendments. The cutoff did not apply to revenue bills, appropriations, or bills passed earlier by the Senate.

Numerous other measures failed to survive the deadline and died on the House calendar. In some instances, however, similar bills have been passed by the Senate and are still pending in House committees including a con-

troversial measure calling for a state referendum in November on a constitutional convention.

Among the key bills winning House passage was a far-reaching proposal to establish a Mississippi Rural Risk Insurance Underwriting Association. The legislation is an effort to help assure an adequate market for residential fire and extended coverage insurance in rural areas of the state, one of the top issues of the 1987 legislative session.

In addition, the bill would do away with the State Insurance Commission, an appointive three-member board, and transfer most of its duties to the State Commissioner of Insurance, an elected official. The legislation provides that rates for property and casualty insurance in Mississippi would be based on a "file and use" open competition procedure, rather than the prior-approval system now used. The measure was based on recommendations of a special insurance Task Force last year in an attempt to help stabilize rates and give consumers a broader choice in buying property and casualty insurance.

Other insurance bills that cleared the House include a measure to require virtually all motorists in Mississippi to carry at least minimum liability insurance on cars and trucks; help assure that medical malpractice insurance will be available for hospitals and physicians; require insurance firms to provide at least 90 days notice prior to cancellation of liability and fire policies; and establish a windstorm underwriting association for the three coastal counties plus the adjoining counties of George, Stone, and Pearl River.

The Supreme Court districts would be reapportioned

under another House-passed bill in an effort to reduce population differences between the three districts. The same districts apply to the state Highway Commission and Public Service Commission. The bill calls for Atala, Noxubee, and Winston Counties to be moved from the central to northern district; and for Claiborne, Copiah, and Jefferson Counties to be shifted from the southern to central district.

One of the last bills approved prior to the deadline was a measure to raise the compulsory school attendance age to 16 by the school year 1989-1990. The bill was recommended by the State Board of Education.

A proposed constitutional amendment to remove the La Bave trustee from the state College Board was approved by the House, but attempts to overhaul the entire board were unsuccessful. Another controversial proposal to let people vote on establishing a single university system died on the calendar.

The House approved a hotly debated bill to authorize pari-mutuel betting on horse races in Tunica and Jackson Counties if residents of those counties vote in favor of legalized horse-racing. But, a companion revenue bill specifying how the proceeds

would be divided failed to get the 3/5ths majority needed for approval.

A proposal to let people vote on a state lottery failed to survive the deadline. Other casualties included bills dealing with tort reform, a business corporation act, and the landlord-tenant measure.

Other highlights of the past week included approval of bills that would make savings and loan associations eligible to receive a larger share of state and county deposits, placing them on a more equal basis with banks in seeking the deposits; update a num-

ber of laws dealing with such crimes as shoplifting, malicious mischief, child abuse, receiving stolen property, and grand larceny; provide for registration of residential child care facilities by the State Health Department; authorize an increase in fees to support county law libraries; provide for licensing of social workers by the State Health Board; permit counties to establish emergency telephone systems; expand the membership of the Soil and Water Conservation Commission; permit counties to regulate

cable television facilities; set up a program to monitor groundwater pollution.

Shiloh Park, Entrance Fees

Collection of entrance fees at Shiloh National Military Park began February 17, 1987, announced Superintendent Zab V. McKinney. "Individuals visiting any part of the park for recreational purposes are required to pay \$1.00 at the Visitor Center. Those who enter the park to travel to their homes or for business purposes will not be charged."

Individuals who use the park frequently may wish to purchase an annual passport for \$10.00. The annual passport will admit the purchaser and members of his immediate family for one year from date of purchase. The Golden Eagle Passport which costs \$25.00 is available and will cover entrance fees to all National Parks for one calen-

dar year. Under the current regulations, educational groups, scouts hiking the history trails, children under 12, qualified handicapped, and individuals 62 years of age or older will not be charged. A Golden Age Passport is issued free of charge to all applicants who are 62 years of age or older. This Passport may be obtained at the park visitor center by presenting proof of age. A Golden Access Passport is available without charge to qualified disabled individuals who present proof of disability when application for the passport is made. Golden Age and Golden Access Passports provide free admission to all National Parks.

Increase In State Unemployment

The January jobless rate for Mississippi was 12.7 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director, Thomas H. Dyson. This represents an increase of one percentage point from one month ago when the rate was 11.7 percent. The January 1986 unemployment rate stood at 11.1 percent, one and six tenths the percentage points below this year. The large yearly increase was because of depressed oil, agriculture, and contract construction.

Place of residence employment for January was 999,700 in a labor force of 1,145,600.

Manufacturing establishments provided 219,400 jobs. Nonmanufacturing business provided 626,900 jobs in January. Manufacturing jobs decreased 2,400 from one month ago and 4,500 from January 1986. Nonmanufacturing provided 6,800 more jobs this year than one year ago. The monthly decrease of 11,100 was caused by decreases in all nonmanufacturing except Government which remained constant.

There were 159,168 claims filed in January 1987 as compared to 170,007 during December and 148,836 one year ago. There were 6,937 job openings in January 1987. Of these openings, 5,499 were filled by Employment Service local offices.

"Doctors recognize the value of today's medical assistants," Roberson said. "A medical assistant has to be a receptionist, traffic controller, medical technician, bookkeeper ... she or he is valuable in the front office as well as in the examination room."

Roberson said graduates also receive welcome support from the local professional organization, the Northeast Mississippi Society of Medical Assistants. The organization, which is part of a larger national group, helps lend insight into the profession and give input from the front lines to upgrade the level of instruction in the classroom.

"We stay in touch with practicing assistants and doctors constantly getting and using feedback," Roberson said. "Any way we can improve instruction, we try to accommodate."

In the auto body repair business, Lindsey said a student's success depends almost solely upon his skills.

"We do everything from installing glass and lights to working with plastic fillers and fiberglass. If you have to do it to make a car look right again, we learn it," Lindsey said. "If a student comes in here and applies himself for the full two-year program, he should have no problem doing what he needs to be successful in the business."

Whether it be working for an established body shop, a dealership or opening a business, the need for "good body men" is there.

"Since the price of cars has gone up so much, it takes a lot more to total one," Lindsey said. "So now, a car can have five or six thousand dollars in damage and still be considered repairable. People are also hanging onto their own cars longer and keeping them fixed. Either way, it means more business for body men. Just look at the papers. Their full of ads wanting them."

three notes behind. A man from the finance company came to my house and told me I had not choice but to give him the car. What are my rights?

A. You have a right to refuse to relinquish possession of your car unless there is a court order requiring you to do so. If the finance company does take you to court and you are found to be in the wrong and that you owe the three notes, then you may be responsible for court costs and possibly the finance company's attorney's fees. In either event, you should contact your attorney before you relinquish possession of your property.

Q. My insurance agent told me that I have \$10,000.00 in

"uninsured motorist coverage". What does that term mean?

A. Mississippi law requires every automobile liability insurance policy to contain a clause which will pay the insured for bodily injury or death from the owner and operator of an uninsured motor vehicle unless you, the insured, specifically state in writing that you do not want uninsured motorist coverage. Uninsured motorist coverage protects you from a negligent driver of an automobile who does not have an automobile liability insurance. You should also know that you have a right to purchase uninsured motorist coverage up to the same amount as your automobile liability.

Corps Of Engineers Asks Helps In Stopping Vandalism

Nine kids, almost all under the age of 18, go into a bathroom and tear down two stall doors and tear up the trash cans.

Someone pours gasoline around a workshop at a boat dock and then sets it on fire.

Someone drives a contractor's bulldozer out into the lake.

Others break out light fixtures either in bathrooms or on the roads.

A couple at a campsite spot a tree, chop it down, and use the wood for a fire.

Others throw cherry bombs, rolls of toilet paper, or clothing into the commodes.

Someone runs over signs or guardrails.

Others drive trucks into walls.

Two young boys spray-paint signs, bathroom walls, and bridges.

Someone breaks the sinks in the restroom.

Others break into cars and steal radios, tape players, and speakers.

Others slam picnic tables with sledgehammers.

Why do people destroy public property?

"There are many reasons: to acquire money or property, to gain publicity or draw attention, or to get revenge against someone or something," said Ron Rains, chief of the Natural Resources Management Branch.

"Others might not have reasons. They just did it because they didn't have the proper supervision, they became bored, or they didn't think it would hurt anyone," Rains added.

These incidents, which have all occurred over a period of years at the Corps' recreation areas, show that vandalism is a costly crime.

Just this year, from January to August 1986, the Nashville District's ten projects along the Cumberland River suffered approximately \$40,000 worth of property damage. This figure does not include the cost of buying new materials, of repairing the damage, of installing new fixtures -- or the cost of the time it takes rangers or police officers to report or investigate individual acts of vandalism.

"These acts cause us to spend a lot of time dealing with vandalism, time that could be better spent helping the visiting public. It is the taxpayer who ultimately suffers," Rains said.

"We would like to have no vandalism, and we have initiated several management actions over the past few years that have helped reduce the number and seriousness of the incidents. These actions include using gate attendants at certain areas, contracting with local law enforcement authorities for increased patrols of recreation areas, prohibiting alcohol at certain areas, and closing some areas at night," Rains said.

A few years ago the sheriff's department found that seven high school students were painting a bridge that went across a dam. Their parents were told what their children had been doing. Officers from the sheriff's department also went to area schools and talked with other students about the harm done by vandalism. The high school students had the choice either to go to court or to clean off the bridge with steel brushes -- they chose to clean

the bridge. The bridge was not bothered for about three years after that.

"Anyone who suspects that vandalism is taking place at a Corps' recreation area should call either the nearest

resource manager's office, the police department, or the sheriff's department," Rains said. "We need everyone's help in stopping these destructive acts of vandalism."

Help Stop Vandalism On The Tenn-Tom

If you came home and found that your home had been broken into and some irresponsible person had painted obscene messages on your walls or had smashed your furniture, you would be very upset and want this person caught and punished. If one of your neighbors saw this person, you would expect them to call the authorities immediately. Well the same type of activities are happening regularly at your Public Use Areas on the Tenn-Tom Waterway.

During 1986 on the Tenn-Tom Waterway, vandalism occurred at an average rate of 10 times per month. Some of this vandalism was minor, costing less than \$25.00 for repairs; while at other times, it cost as much as \$8,000.00 to repair. Since these areas belong to all of the people, it is a crime that affects us all. If you pay taxes, you pay for vandalism. Vandals are stealing your tax dollars and destroying the park and recreational facilities built for your enjoyment.

Some of the most frequent types of vandalism are writing on walls, tearing down petitions in restrooms, shooting signs, driving over signs, driving on the grass, painting the outside of buildings, starting fires and spinning a car around in gravel parking areas. While some of this may seem trivial, they all add up. Take for example spinning a car

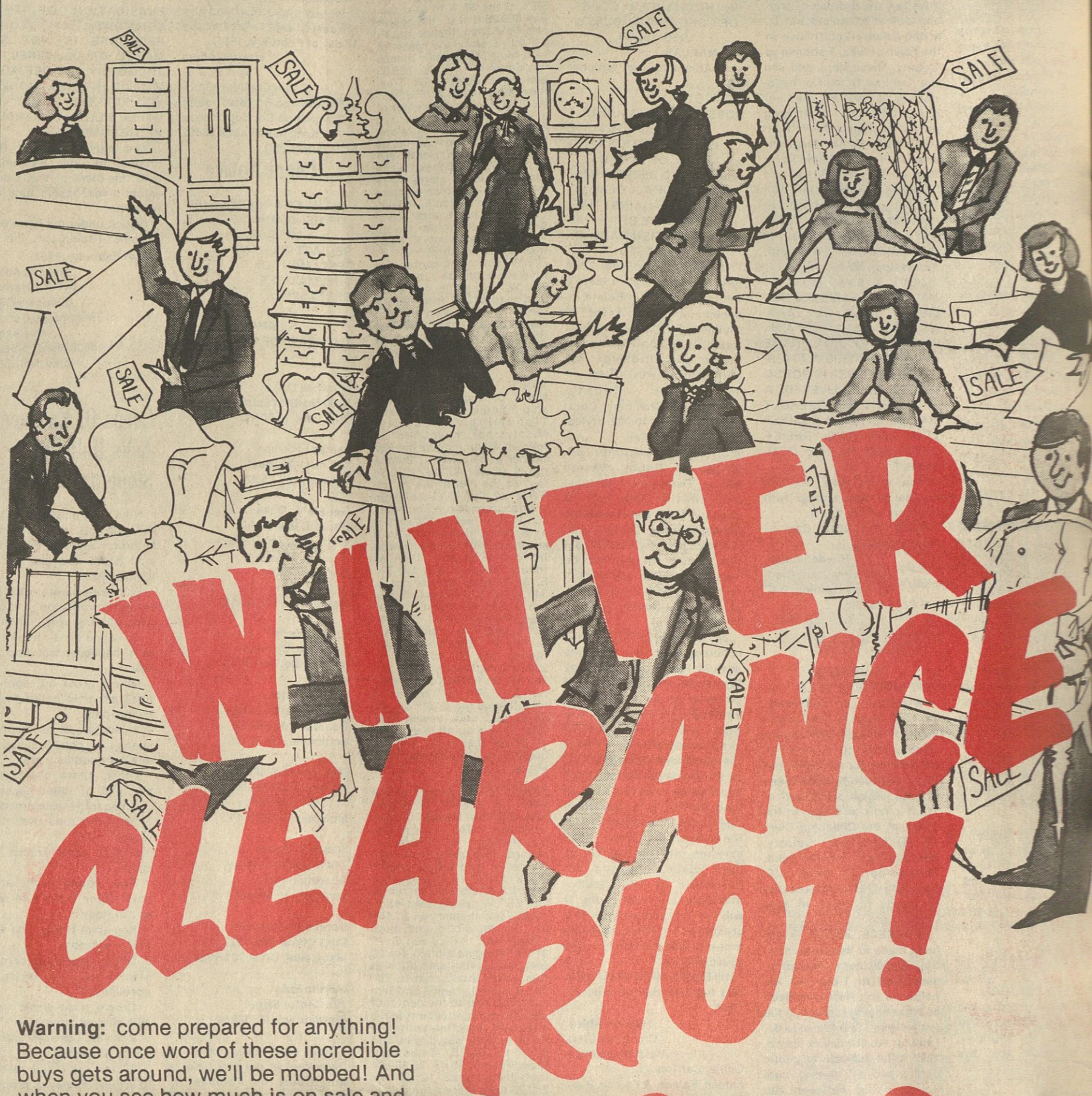
around on the gravel parking areas (cutting donuts as some may call it), this requires a motor grader to level the area, costing on the average approximately \$125.00 for repairs; and if the damage is bad enough, it may require that an area be closed until repairs can be finished. Signs are very expensive items. Some of the signs on the waterway cost as much as \$300.00 to replace. So as you can see, these small items can add up.

During the calendar year 1986 over \$20,000.00 was spent to repair damage done by vandals on the Tenn-Tom Waterway. This is an unnecessary cost to you, the taxpayer, and a bad reflection on our community. It is time that it ceased and you can help. If you see someone vandalizing an area, first be aware of your own safety; don't confront the individual or individuals. Second, get a general description and tag number if possible. Third, call your local police, Sheriff's office, or the nearest Corps of Engineers office. You may be asked to sign an affidavit or appear in court as a witness, but in most cases just a tag number is enough.

If you know of someone vandalizing an area report it. Remember the parks belong to all of us and we want to be able to use them. As tax dollars grow smaller and the new wears off, the project funds may not be available to repair future vandalism.
