Comprehensive Highway Plan Becomes A Reality

A long hard battle which began last summer to develop a comprehensive highway plan became a reality. Last Wednesday, March 11, the Senate voted 38 to 11 to override the Governor's veto of the highway bill. Northeast Mississippi, which had been previously left out when 4-lane highways were being planned, will be the first to receive 4-lane highways. The first contract is to be let under the new bill is expected to be Highway #72 from Burnsville to Glen.

contract before the others can be started. Rep. Wadkins stated that we intend to make sure Northeast Mississippi does not get left out this time.

The lack of 4-lane highways in Northeast Mississippi has recently cost Tishomingo County two factories and Alcorn County one factory. The new 4-lane system should be a big plus in attracting industries to Tishomingo

County as well as surrounding counties within the next 6 years. Highway #72 is scheduled to be 4-laned into Desoto County and tie in with I 55. Highway #45 is scheduled to be 4-laned to Starkville when it will connect with Highway #25, which will be 4-laned to Jackson.

The completed 4-lane system will not only attract industry to our area, but it will help make travel much safer.

Belmont Man Charged With Weekend Murder

A Sunday night shooting in the south-end of the county resulted in the death of James Robert Collum of Belmont, sheriff Bob Payne said. The body of the 52 year old automobile repairman was found by the sheriff around 7:30 p.m. lying beneath a tree on Rock Creek Road north of Belmont.

Charles Milford Ivey, 43, of Belmont, has been charged with murder in the happening, Payne said. Ivey was jailed, and released Tuesday after a \$25,000 bail was posted.

According to the sheriff, he was at his home in Belmont

when he was notified to answer a call on Rock Creek Road. Upon his arrival, he stated two unoccupied vehicles with both motors running were parked in the road within 100 yards of each other. Investigating the area, the sheriff discovered the body of the deceased. Multiple wounds, apparent gunshot, were reported on the body of the victim, to both arms, the head and chest area.

The sheriff identified one of the parked vehicles as to belonging to Barbara Ivey; the other belonged to Milford

Ivey. Sheriff Payne then talked with Ms. Ivey, who was at a residence near the shooting scene and immediately located Mr. Ivey, who was also at a separate residence in the same vicinity. Both were taken in for questioning and murder charges were subsequently leveled against Milford Ivey.

Statements given to the sheriff by Ms. Ivey indicated that the victim, who was her uncle, was traveling with her in her vehicle on Rock Creek Road when they met the accused. Mr. Ivey was identified by the sheriff as her ex-

husband. Ms. Ivey reportedly told the sheriff that Mr. Collum was going with her to pick up her 10 year old daughter who was staying with Doty Matthews. Details surrounding the altercation among the people are still being clarified, the sheriff said. However, two .357 magnum firearms were retrieved from the scene of the crime and along with other evidence will be sent to the state crime lab.

Sheriff Payne witnessed an autopsy performed at Magnolia Hospital in Corinth Monday by Deputy State

Medical Examiner, Dr. Thomas McLees and said results indicated the victim died as a result of gunshot wounds.

James Robert Collum, 52, died Sunday, March 15, in Tishomingo County. He was an auto and fender repairman for 20 years and was employed by Belmont Body Craft.

Services were Wednesday, March 18, at Deaton Funeral Home Chapel in Red Bay with the Rev. Leonard McDowell officiating. Burial was in Berry Cemetery in Franklin County, Alabama.

Survivors include three sisters, Louise Collins of Russellville, Ala., Geneva Flowers and Carolyn Johnston, both of Globe, Ariz.; two brothers, George Collum of Guntown and Joe Collum of Belmont.



It's Started
Preparation of the site proposed for the construction of two buildings near the

courthouse is well underway. Heavy equipment operators were leveling the ground Monday after clearing away

trees and undergrowth making ready for construction crews. Scenery in the area is expected to change fast, weather permitting, as

contracts have been let by the Board of Supervisors for the construction of a mental health facility and a rescue squad building.

Contracts Awarded..... Construction Underway

Two contracts in excess of \$100,000 were let recently by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

A contract was let February 2 for the construction of a metal building to house the Timber Hills Mental Health offices. The contract in the amount of \$113,500 was awarded to Armstrong Con-

struction Co. of Booneville.

A second contract in the amount of \$19,800 was awarded March 2 to Strickland Construction Co. of Golden for the construction of a building to be used to store rescue equipment and to serve as a meeting place for volunteer members of the squad.

Ground work has already begun on property adjoining the courthouse and jail facility, clearing and preparing the site for the two buildings. The county-owned tract of land located on Highway 25 is comprised of approximately fifteen acres less right-of-way privileges sold for the construction of the new four lane, MS 25 bypass. Equipment and manpower from the five districts in the county are involved in the beginning phases of the project.

Plans call for the construction of a 50 X 110 foot metal building to be used as the mental health service to be situated approximately 100 feet west of the jail. The strip of property south of the back courthouse parking lot and behind the jail is being landscaped and will also serve as the site for the rescue squad building.

The mental health agency currently leases a building owned by P.O. Beard located near the Iuka Elementary School.

The need for a meeting

house for volunteer rescue members has been evident for some time as well as a storage building for their equipment.

County General Funds are being used to finance the proposal. The project is expected to be completed within 1 1/2 months pending favorable weather conditions.

City Sales Tax Collections

Deputy Bobby Flynt said Yow was traveling north in a 1976 Ford LTD when he apparently lost control of the vehicle, running off the left side of the highway and turning over. Mr. Yow was thrown from the vehicle which then overturned on top of him, Flynt said.

Yow was taken by ambulance to Tishomingo Hospital where he was treated for head and chest injuries then transferred to Humana ER in guarded condition at 1:30 a.m.

How To Stop Water Leaks

Water leaks account for between 5 and 10 percent of all residential water consumption. Most of the leakage is due to worn out faucet washers and faulty toilet tank valves.

A leaking faucet of one drop per second can waste seven gallons per day. A

steady drip will waste 20 gallons per day.

Faucet leaks are easy to see and normally easy to repair. Installing a new washer will usually correct the leak. If the faucet begins leaking after the washer is changed, it may be necessary to replace the valve set.

A more serious type of leak that occurs in toilet tanks can waste up to 200 gallons of water a day. A simple way to check for a toilet leak is to

remove the tank cover and place food coloring in the tank. This should be done when the toilet will not be used for several hours. If the color seeps into the bowl, the flush ball needs to be replaced. The average life of a flush ball is seven years. As it becomes older the possibility of a leak increases greatly.

If the toilet tank continues to make noise after the flush and fill cycle is completed, the problem is usually caused by the flush ball not fitting properly into its valve seat. The problem may be caused by a bent or corroded guide wire. A replacement for the flush ball is available that uses a flapper assembly eliminating the need for the guide wire.

Two other common causes for loss of water are easily detected. If the water level in the flush tank is above the overflow tube, water will continually run out. This problem occurs because the float is set too high or the ball cock is leaking.

The water level in the tank should always be at least one-half to one inch below the overflow tube to avoid leakage. If the ball cock is leaking, water may run directly into the overflow through the refill tube. Lowering the float or repairing the leak in the ball cock will prevent these losses.

Another reason for water running out of the tank continually is a defective float. If the float leaks, it will not rise high enough to shut the water off after the tank refills and water will overflow into the bowl.

Test the float by taking it off and shaking it. If you hear water inside, replace it.

After the faucets and the toilets have been checked for leaks, there is one more thing that can be done to be positive there are no other leaks. The water meter should be read both before and after a period of several hours when no water is being used in the house.

An ideal time would be overnight particularly if the family is warned in advance not to run water during the night. If the meter reads exactly the same in the morning

as it did the night before, there is no leak.

Refrigerator Rolls

1/2 cup boiling water
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
3/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg, beaten
1 package dry yeast
1/2 cup lukewarm water
3 cups unsifted flour

Pour boiling water over shortening, sugar, and salt. Blend and cool, then add beaten egg. Sprinkle yeast into lukewarm water and stir until dissolved. Combine with egg mixture. Add flour and blend well. Cover and place in refrigerator for at least 4 hours. Will keep about 10 days.

Prepare amount of rolls needed. Roll out dough and cut. Place greased pan and let rise 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Bake at 425 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes. Yields 2 dozen rolls.

Report Fall- Seeded Crops At Sign-Up

Although sign-up time is running out, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is still accepting applications for the 1987 feed grain, wheat, cotton, and rice acreage reduction programs. The sign-up period ends March 30th.

"When farmers sign up for the programs, they may report the acres and intended uses of their wheat, oats, and other fall-seeded crops, and avoid having to make a separate visit to the county office to certify," said David Wilson, an official of the Agency. Small grains which are not reported by May 1, 1987, will be ineligible for

program benefits.

Farm program participants are required to report their actual acres planted for harvest to be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other benefits. Mr. Wilson said farmers who do not sign up for the programs could also benefit by reporting their planted acreage because the report will be used for crop history purposes.

To verify that acreage reports are accurate, ASCS randomly checks farms. The acreage reports are used to determine compliance with farm programs and provide documentation for future programs.

The ASCS official farmers who may be undecided about the acreage reduction programs or who have questions about certifying their fall-seeded crops are encouraged to contact the local ASCS office for more information.

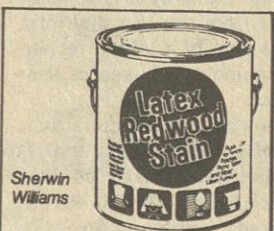

Ringworm

A very common and highly contagious cause of hair loss in a cat is ringworm. Not a worm at all, the condition is caused by a fungus. The face, ears, and legs seem to be the preferred sites for attack. Overcrowded conditions and poor nutrition are thought to be complicating factors. A discolored, circular, expanding border characterizes the malady. Ringworm harms cats by breaking hairs and releasing toxins on the skin. Since the fungus cannot live on the inflamed area, it continues to spread. For light cases, time may be the healer. In severe cases, an oral medication and/or total body rinse might be

prescribed.

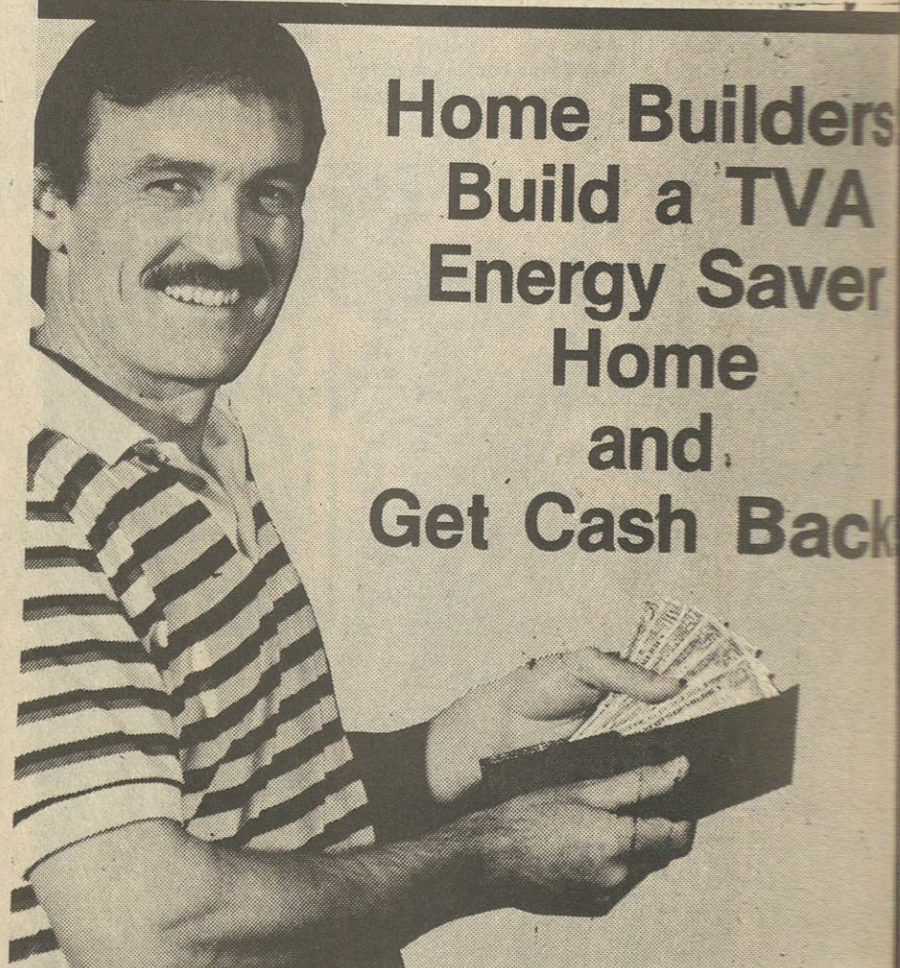

Legislative approval of a major new highway program for Mississippi grabbed most of the attention in the House of Representatives last week as lawmakers prepared to face another important deadline.

The compromise highway bill received a decisive 78-39 vote in the House, easily getting the required 3/5ths majority for passage. However, the possibility of a gubernatorial veto left the ultimate fate of the legislation uncertain as the past week ended.

As approved by the House, the bill called for construction of 1,077 miles of additional four-lane highways throughout the state over the next 14 years at a total estimated cost of \$1.6 billion. The highway segments to be four-laned were designated in the bill, and a three-phase timetable was set for construction, with all contracts to be let by June 30, 1999. Backers maintained the program would reduce traffic fatalities caused by unsafe roads and provide a badly needed boost to the state's economic development.

Most lawmakers agreed on the importance of good highways, but opponents argued the 1,077-mile program was too costly, overly ambitious, and did not adequately meet highway needs in some areas.

Revenue provisions in the bill, a revised version of an earlier House-passed measure, included an increase in the excise tax on motor fuel and removal of the sales tax on motor fuel. In effect, the state tax on motor fuel would be raised 3.6 cents a gallon over the next two years. In addition, the legislation provides for the diversion of several million dollars in federal highway funds to the program, a yearly \$5 increase in the registration fee on motor vehicles, a portion of the road contractor's tax, and use of "wedge" money which will become available as the debt service decreases on some old highway bonds.

Scores of other bills also won House passage last week in a drive to meet a deadline on Thursday of this week for floor action on general bills and constitutional amendments previously passed by the other chamber. The cutoff does not apply to appropriations or revenue bills.

The House gave final approval to a proposed revision in the retirement law for public employees. The measure, which affects public workers at both state and local levels, provides for an increase of about 5 percent in retirement benefits. And it would allow public employees to retire, if they choose, after 25 years of service rather than the present 30 years. Retirement benefits would be adjusted proportionately for those retiring after 25 years.

A special revolving fund would be established and the

State Forestry Commission authorized to contract for production or purchase of tree seedlings under another House-passed measure. The seedlings would be for resale to Mississippi landowners for reforestation purposes.

There was a brisk debate in the House before a bill was approved that would prohibit cities from using their powers of eminent domain to take over utility service in annexed areas unless they get approval from the Public Service Commission. The measure does not apply to water and sewage service.

Other highlights last week included approval of a bill to extend sovereign immunity for state and local governmental units for another year;

authorize district attorneys to hire special assistants to help protect the rights of victims of crimes; establish a Crime Victims' Escrow Account to assist crime victims; reenact a pretrial intervention program which offers an alternative to prison for carefully selected non-violent first offenders; revise a law involving drilling rights of a unit well; upgrade admission requirements at the state's junior colleges; and expand the authority of trial judges to deny bail to persons convicted of certain crimes.

Five proposed constitutional amendments were approved involving some old sections on corporation charters, stockholder rights, and bail restrictions. But a con-

troversial proposal to hold a referendum this fall on a constitutional convention was rejected by the Constitution Committee. A minority report was filed to keep the legislation alive, sending the bill to the bottom of the lengthy House calendar.

Minority reports also were filed on two bills dealing with tort reform which died in the Judiciary "A" Committee. Other legislation that failed to survive a committee deadline last week included a proposed constitutional amendment on conflicts of interest for public officials.

The site, located in a rural area of woods and fields, will be as it was during the original battle. Trails, troop water supplies and roads to the area have been constructed. Soldiers from 45 states as well as Canada, Australia, West Germany and England have registered. Many of these troops are veteran 'extras' of the ABC TV movie "North and South". The battle will be one of the biggest re-enactments staged since the Civil War itself and the

cannon will be the most ever collected at a single recreation. West Point Military Academy will critique the battle scenario for historical correctness and military strategy and will send an on site observer. Pyro-technical experts are arranging fireworks, ground charge explosions, aerial bursts and much, much more! The association is also renovating the old hotel at Shaws Crossroads located at Tennessee Highways 22 and 142, a few miles from Shiloh. The 80 year old structure, renamed the Shiloh Inn, will be used April 3-5 as headquarters for troop registration, tourist information and ticket sales.

Over 30,000 spectators from 22 states are expected.

Point Of Law

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your legal rights.)

Q. My husband and I were divorced three years ago and I was given custody of our six-year-old son. Since then my husband has remarried and has been promoted twice in his job. His income has increased substantially and he now wants custody of our child. Will the court change custody because my ex-husband can better provide for the child?

A. No. The court will only change custody when there has been a material change in circumstances which adversely affect the child. Here the circumstances of the father have changed but the change

does not adversely affect the child. Custody will remain with the mother.

Q. After two months of marriage, my wife left me and returned to her native country in South America. I do not know her address, and I have not heard from her since she left. It is now three years later, and I wish to remarry. Is it possible for me to get a divorce?

A. You will need to file a complaint for divorce against your wife and publish a summons in the newspaper. After the notice has run three times, and you have allowed

sufficient time for her to answer your complaint, the facts that you have stated indicate that you should be able to obtain a divorce by default on the grounds of desertion.

Turkey Season Opens March 21

This year Mississippi's wild turkey season opens Saturday, March 21, and extends through April 6. The second season opens April 8 and closes May 1.

The bag limit is one gobbler per day, two per season, but not more than three per license year, according to officials at the Department of Wildlife in Jackson.

Hunting turkeys over bait and/or with dogs, live decoys, or electrically operated calling devices is prohibited.

"We want to remind turkey hunters that all birds bagged must have one complete leg and foot attached naturally to the body or parts thereof prior to being transported," executive director Joe Stone said.

"I've been talking with some of our field people recently, and they tell me that the upcoming season should be another good one. Some people, especially in a number of spots in south Mississippi, are just seeing turkeys everywhere."

Stone indicated that Mississippi turkey hunters should have another good year. He said that much of our exceptional hunting is the results of proper wildlife management in past years and the cooperation of landowners in our restocking efforts all across the state.

The following counties have either all or a portion of their area closed to spring gobbler-only hunting: Adams, Alcorn, Benton, Chickasaw, Hinds, Humphreys, Itawamba, Lee, Madison, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Quitman, Tallahatchie, Tippah, Tishomingo, and Union.

For detailed information about these counties and which areas are closed, consult the brochure, "Digest of Mississippi Game Laws," available free from the Department of Wildlife Conservation, P.O. Box 451, Jackson, MS 39205, or call 961-5300.

Conservation enforcement officers in the above counties will be glad to assist in pointing out closed areas.
