"Spring Forward" To Daylight Time Sunday



We 'spring forward' an hour to resume daylight-saving time Sunday, April 5. Under a bill signed by President Reagan, last July, the time change will occur on the first Sunday in April instead of the last Sunday, which has been the change over date since 1966. The switch back to standard remains the same - the last Sunday in October. For seven months this gives most of us an extra hour of sunshine after a day's work. Remember to set your clocks and watches forward one hour before going to bed Saturday night and arrive on time for Sunday school.

Town Of Tishomingo New Water Rates

Tishomingo new water rates will be effective on this month's billing. The minimum bill will be \$8.00. The sewer rates will remain the same as in the past. This is for residential customers. Business customers with large meters will be a different rate.

No Bond Set In Drug Arrest

Richard Pride, 52, Cherokee, Alabama, remained in custody Wednesday with no bond set following his arrest by local

law officials in relation to unlawful drug dealings.

Iuka Police Chief Floyd Whitaker said, Pride was arrested late Tuesday during an apparent staged 'set up' involving himself, representatives of the sheriff's office, and agents from the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics.

Pride has been charged with possession of several ounces of marijuana with intent to sell and possession of a concealed weapon, Whitaker said. In addition, a Ford Escort car which Pride was driving has been impounded, he said.

Burglary Ring Stopped By Local Law Officials

Four subjects have been arrested in what local officials suspect to be a county wide burglary ring. Other arrests are expected to be made as the investigation continues.

Billy Wayne Holland, 24, Iuka, was arrested Tuesday, March 31, after eluding law officials for more than 5 hours, according to Iuka Police Chief Floyd Whitaker.

The suspect allegedly picked the lock on the front door of the home of Mrs. Opal Thompson and made off with a 19 inch black and white TV and a radio.

According to Deputy Mayhall, Mrs. Thompson was awakened by a noise, and thinking it to be her husband went to investigate. She reported calling out and surprising the suspect who ran from the house carrying the TV. Mrs. Thompson gave a full description of the suspect and the car to officials.

Mayhall said that he and Sheriff Bob Payne stopped and arrested the suspect near Bishop Bottom. When they asked to look in the trunk of the car, the suspect jumped into the car and fled. Later the Sheriff's department received

a phone call reporting that someone had left a TV set and radio near the Walker-Switch railroad tracks in Burnsville. The car and person matched the suspect's description. Mayhall said the suspect then reportedly returned to the railroad track, in another vehicle, and allegedly moved the stolen merchandise to another location.

Acting on a tip the suspect was apprehended in the edge of Alabama by Police Chief Floyd Whitaker late Tuesday afternoon.

Holland has been charged with burglary, no drivers

license, reckless driving, resisting arrest, failure to stop for blue lights, and speeding. He is in custody. No bond has been set.

Also, arrested were three juveniles believed to be involved, along with Holland and others, in burglaries scattered throughout the county. The trio are in custody with no bond set.

The stolen TV and radio have been recovered along with guns and other merchandise reportedly taken in other robberies. More items are expected to be retrieved by the Sheriff's department, Mayhall said.

Battle of Shiloh To Be Staged During Anniversary Week-end

The scene is set for the 125th anniversary recreation of the "Battle of Shiloh" April 3-5 to be staged by the Shiloh Re-enactment Assn., Inc., on private land just outside the park in Southwest Tennessee. And over 30,000 spectators are expected!

This spectacular once in a lifetime event, to be held Sunday, April 5, from 1:30 p.m., will create the first day's action from the Confederate surprise attack on the Union lines, to the fierce fighting towards the river landing, and culminating in the all-out assault around the sunken road nicknamed the "Hornet's Nest".

Spectator viewing, public parking and admission areas will be well marked. Admission is \$3 adult and \$2 children.

The site, located in a rural area of woods and fields, will be as it was during the original battle. Trails, troop water supplies and roads to the area have been constructed. Soldiers from 45 states as well as Canada, Australia, West Germany, and England have registered. Many of these troops are veteran "extras" of the ABC TV movie "North and South". The battle will be one of the biggest re-enactments staged since the Civil War itself and the cannon will be the most ever collected at a single recreation.

The association is renovating the old hotel at Shaws Crossroads located at Highways 22 and 142, a few miles from Shiloh. The 80 year old structure, renamed the Shiloh Inn, will be used as headquarters for troop registration, tourist information and ticket sales.

Officials at Shiloh National Military Park are gearing up for record crowds expected to visit the Civil War battlefield before and after the April 5 re-enactment of the Battle of Shiloh.

"Although the Park Service has nothing to do with the re-enactment, we're certain that most of those attending the event will want to visit the actual battle site," said Supt. Zeb McKinney.

"And if the predictions are correct, the park could get 20,000 or more visitors during the re-enactment weekend," he said. "Normally, our biggest days are Memorial Day and the Fourth of July, when we draw about 1,200 visitors."

McKinney said the park is taking steps to handle the extra visitation by extending the visitor center hours, setting up temporary information stations at park entrances, making the tour road one-way to keep traffic flowing, and bringing in 21 additional park rangers to handle the anticipated crowds.

"Due to the expected crowding and limited facilities, spectators going to the battle re-enactment will

not be permitted to park within Shiloh National Military Park," McKinney said. "However, our rangers will provide directions to parking areas near the re-enactment site."

He said the park also will have special forms for visitors seeking information on ancestors who fought in the 1862 battle, considered one of the bloodiest in the Civil War's western campaign.

McKinney said the park visitor center will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday of the re-enactment weekend and also will open at 7 a.m. Monday.

Rangers at the temporary information stations will help direct people to the re-enactment location and assist those who want to visit the park. He said all vehicles going into the park will have to enter on Grant Road and exit via Federal Road.

"We will have temporary signs and extra people on hand to help things go as smoothly as possible, but everyone will have to accept the fact that the park will be very crowded," Supt. McKinney said.

The additional park rangers are coming from other National Park Service areas in

the southeast and Memphis State University's ranger training school.

"Visitors should remember that the national military park is sacred ground where 23,000 soldiers were killed or injured in some of the worst fighting of the Civil War," McKinney said. "We hope everyone will respect the park as a national shrine."

He said weapons and metal detectors are not allowed in the park and that rangers will be on the lookout for people who attempt to dig for Civil War artifacts, a violation of

federal law.

McKinney said the only formal ceremony inside the park will be a wreath laying April 4 at 2 p.m. by the Memphis chapter of the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

The national military park, established in 1894, memorializes the two-day battle fought by 100,000 participants, that prepared the way for Gen. U.S. Grant's successful siege of Vicksburg. The park includes an adjoining national cemetery and pre-historic Indian mounds.

Spring Cleaning Tips

The first rule in the annual spring cleaning ritual is to sit down and make a list of what you want to clean. Decide whether you want to clean your carpets; windows, both inside and out; curtains; mattresses or even every piece of upholstery in the home.

Set up a work schedule and make sure it's realistic. Mark

off time on your calendar for this spring cleaning chore.

Next you will need to know what type of equipment is needed to clean your home. Make a complete inventory of what you have available. Decide what type of materials you will need, then draw up an equipment and supply list.

A basic list of cleaning equipment may include: dust pan, wet mop and possibly a dust mop, pails and pans in which to put cleaning

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Shedding

A normal part of a cat's life, this spring-and-fall phenomenon is a factor of the amount of light and dark hours in a day. Veterinarians say that the condition causes some owners to be overly concerned when clumps and wisps of hair begin to roll along the edges of the kitchen floor or when the furniture is covered with a fine layer of fur.

Black cats seem to shed more than others. Generally, outdoor cats tend to shed seasonally while indoor pets shed year round. Recommended treatment is simply frequent, regular, thorough brushing and combing to remove loose hair.

Studtail

This malady occurs

most often in intact males, especially Persians, Siamese and Rex. However, Studtail is a misnomer in that it is seen in both neutered males and in intact and sprayed females.

Hair loss, blackheads, scaling, and waxiness on the tail creates a rat-tail appearance. Studtail causes the cat no discomfort. Owners usually seek treatment for cosmetic reasons.

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Vocational Rehabilitation Services Available

Allied Enterprises of Corinth is operated by the State Department of Rehabilitation Services, Vocational Rehabilitation Division. Eligible Tishomingo County persons are provided with vocational evaluation, vocational adjustment training, and job placement through this facility.

The Corinth facility's maximum capacity is 35-40 clients per day. At present, the average daily attendance is only about 45% of that figure. Facility Manager, Michael Byrd feels certain that there are many Tishomingo Countians who could qualify for the services offered by Allied Enterprises.

Eligibility criteria for vocational rehabilitation services: 1. Existence of a medically recognized mental and/or physical disability. 2. The disability imposes a handicap to employment. 3. Existence of a reasonable expectation of employability upon the provision of services.

Transportation assistance is available. Department of Energy and Transportation van runs to and from facility daily on a fixed route basis, providing transportation to clients from Tishomingo County.

Facility admission criteria: 1. Age 17 or older. 2. Limited by disability. 3. Medically and mentally stable. 4. Able to care for personal needs. 5. Referred by a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor.

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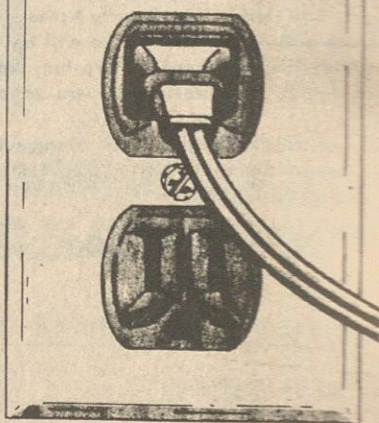

Tishomingo County Students To Begin BSAP Testing

The students of Tishomingo County will be among the thousands of Mississippi school children participating next week in the statewide literacy testing program.

The public schools of Mississippi will administer the Mississippi Basic Skills Assessment Program in Grades 3, 5, 8, and 11, on April 7, 8, and 9, 1987. Results from the test will be used to assess statewide academic progress. In addition, results from the eleventh grade Functional Literacy Exam will be used to determine eligibility for high school diplomas in Mississippi in the 1988-89 school year.

A priority of Mississippi's educational system is helping all students acquire and apply the skills necessary to perform basic reading, writing, and mathematics tasks. The Mississippi Basic Skills Assessment Program (BSAP) provides information on the effectiveness of the state, each district, and each school in achieving this goal. The primary focus of the assessment program is providing meaningful student achievement data from the school, district, and state levels to educators, legislators, parents, citizens, and students.

Basic skills assessment test results released for last year indicated most Northeast Mississippi School Districts did well compared with the state average.

Soil Conservation Notes

Do you enjoy having birds around your home? Most people do. A few simple projects to attract birds to your home can be undertaken by you homemakers. Children may also prove helpful in both planning and implementing a project. You will be rewarded for your efforts by the colorful beauty, songs and activities of a number of birds.

In planning such a project you must consider the needs of birds: food, cover and water. In the Delta area, food and cover are the most limiting factors. A mixture of trees, shrubs, vines and other plants not only provide habitat for birds but also serve to make the yard more attractive. Some of the most colorful berries are highly sought by birds. Trees that provide nesting habitat and cover for birds may also help shade homes during the hot summer.

In order to provide the

variety birds need, you should mix different sizes, shapes and kinds of plants. Variety provides birds with a choice of food and cover. Some birds may feed on seeds and fruits while others will thrive on insects, worms and spiders. In general the more varied the habitat, the greater the number of different birds it will attract.

Additional food may be provided by feeders which may be located for viewing from indoors. Birds will feed readily on cracked corn, commercial feed mixtures and suet.

Watering facilities may also attract birds. Birds may use them for drinking or bathing. A small pool with a trickle of water running is ideal. Rocks or stumps near the watering facility make attractive preening sites after bathing.

Bird houses are another excellent way of attracting birds to a yard. Houses come in all shapes and sizes and may be designed with particular kind of bird in mind. Watching nesting activities and young birds taking their first flight may provide hours of enjoyment. You may even find yourself and your family pulled away from the television set!

For additional information on attracting birds to your home, contact your local Soil Conservation Service office.

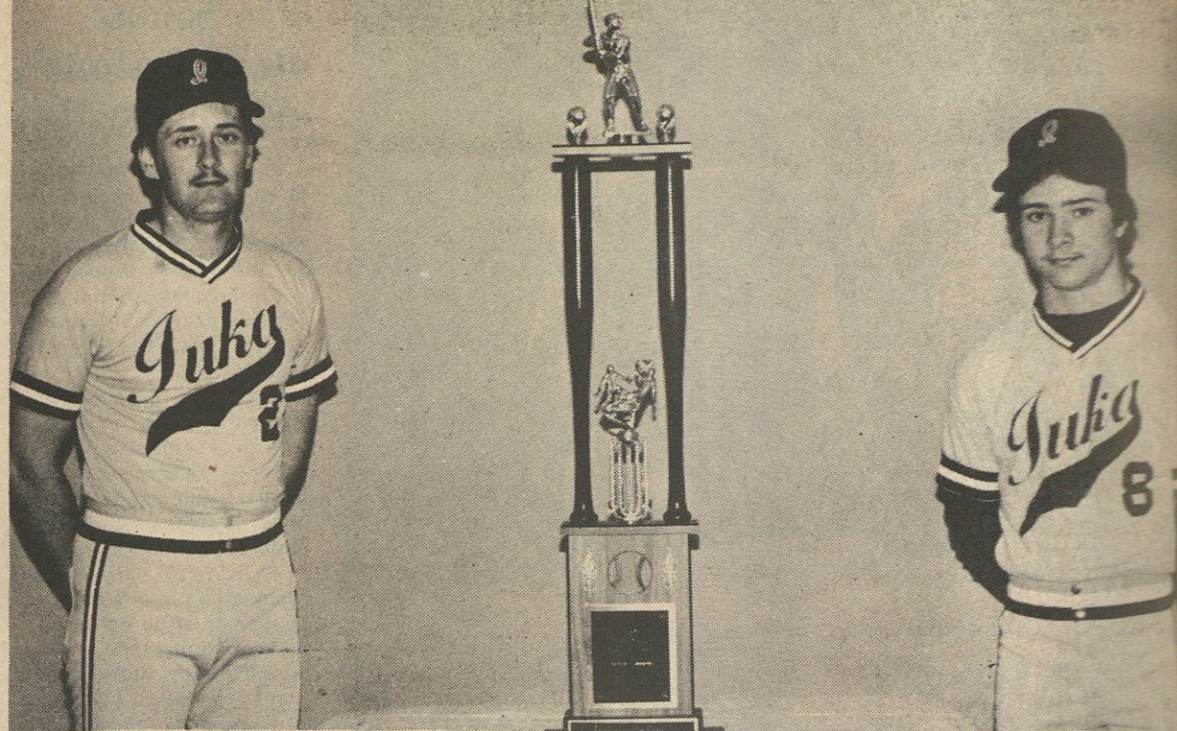

Lakeshore Use Permits

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers owns many tracts of land along the Tennessee-Tombigbee corridor, including miles and miles of shoreline of which the Corps has exclusive ownership rights. Basically anything done on, to, and/or with the Government fee property must be approved by the Corps of Engineers. However, the Corps does not allow any private exclusive use of fee lands on the Tenn-Tom project, therefore it does not issue lakeshore use permits on fee lands located along the Tenn-Tom.

In addition to this fee land, the Corps also purchased certain easement rights along most of the remaining shoreline. Only certain rights pertaining to the land were purchased. One of the rights purchased on all easement lands was the exclusive right to limit and/or restrict modification to and/or construction on said lands. Normally, easement rights were purchased up to 2 feet, up to 4 feet, or up to 6 feet above the normal pool elevation of the respective lake. The easement elevations vary depending on the geographical locations along the shoreline. An imaginary line running parallel with the lake at the constant easement elevation for that respective area would strike the shoreline banks marking the easement boundaries for that particular area. Prior to lake impoundment, the easement boundaries were marked with white paint on randomly spaced trees at about breast height. These trees were struck at the base or ground level by the referenced imaginary easement line. However, due to occasional high waters, white paint similarities with tree trunk colorations, and/or everyday natural weathering of the paint, the easement lines are often hard to find without surveying assistance.

The Corps has jurisdiction to administer the project on all fee lands and to the outward boundaries created by the lake impoundment, with additional jurisdiction on easement properties provided by the purchasing of certain rights on said properties. Any docks, piers, ramps, bulkheads, steps, dredging, etc. that touches the lake at normal pool elevation or protrudes over the water and/or falls within the easement boundaries must be permitted prior to construction or commencement of the activity.

The party requesting a

permit for one or more of the above stated or similar activities should contact the Assistant Resource Manager in charge of the lake in question at least several weeks prior to the immediate need for the proposed activity. A Ranger will meet with the party on the site of the proposed activity to furnish information, advice, applications, instructions, etc., in reference to that particular situation.

Although not a lakeshore use permit matter per se, timber rights and hunting permits warrant some discussion at this point. The Corps purchased most of the timber rights within the easement boundaries, which prohibits timber removal, including underbrushing. Some timber was bought for a number of years with the timber rights reverting back to the landowner after the exhaustion of the required time. Tracts of land vary, so check with the office referenced below prior to harvesting questionable timber.

The Corps did not buy the hunting rights on easement lands, so hunting on said properties is not regulated by the Corps of Engineers. Hunting from a boat in waters

over perpetual flowage easement lands that are accessible by boat is regulated concurrently by the Corps, the respective state and local agencies, and other federal agencies. Perpetual flowage easement lands are lands that are constantly covered by water flowing from and/or within the lake. Said areas are usually accessible by boat, but occasionally circumstances such as siltation may restrict access by boat. If this is the case, access is usually limited to crossing private land. In accordance with the state trespass law, one must obtain the private landowner's permission to cross the private property. Hunting rights for easement lands were not purchased by the Corps, so the Corps does not give permits to hunt in that manner. However, the Corps does have concurrent jurisdiction with other local, state, and federal agencies in all matters of hunting if the hunter is hunting from a boat in the lake.

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that the locations of the distribution lines would impact the 100 year flood plain and prime farmland. It has been determined that there is no practicable alternative to avoiding this impact. The basis of this determination is summarized as follows:

1. There are potential users in the floodplains and farmland area. It is necessary to serve these users and users of the floodplain and prime farmland areas.

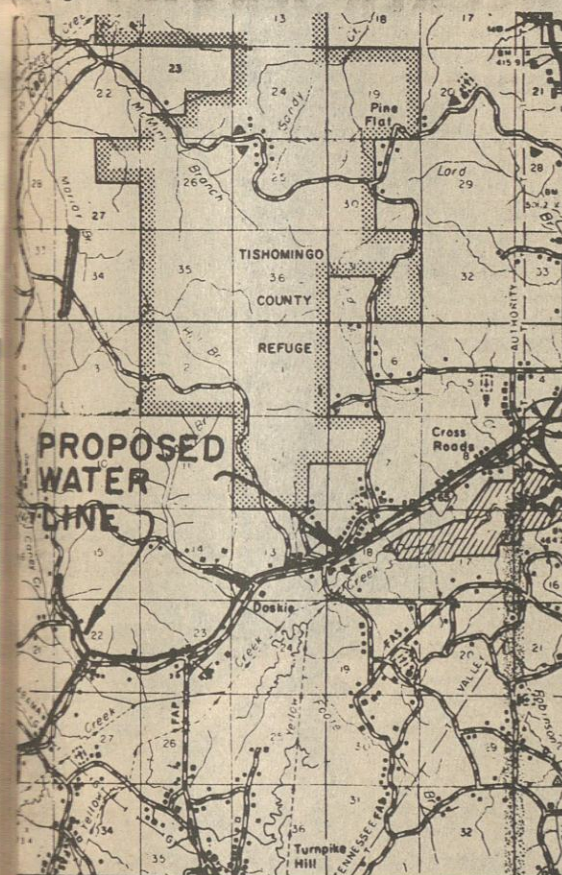
2. All the practical mitigations have been agreed by the applicant.

3. The county does not have any floodplain ordinances.

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and has determined that it will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. Therefore, FmHA will not prepare an Environmental Impact Statement for this proposed action.

Any written comments regarding this determination should be provided within (15) fifteen days of this publication to P.O. Box 237, Booneville, MS 38829. FmHA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this fifteen-day period. USDA Drops Cross Compliance Requirements

To help alleviate the short
supply of oats, USDA recently
removed the limited cross
compliance requirements for
1987-crop oats.

"This means that farm
program participants may
now have an acreage intended
for oats in excess of the
oat acreage base for their
farm without sacrificing their
eligibility for other program
crop benefits," said county
ASCS official David Wilson.

Mr. Wilson said limited
cross compliance continues
to be in effect for all program
crops, including barley;
meaning that the acreages of
other program crops on the
farm may not exceed the crop
acreage bases of those crops.

"There is no change for
farmers who are participating
in the barley and oat program.
The acres intended for barley
and oats for grain is limited to
the permitted acreage for
barley and oats on the farm,"
Mr. Wilson said. Producers
who are not participating in the
barley and oat program, but
are participating in the
program for another crop on
the farm, may have an
acreage intended for oats in
excess of the oat acreage
base, he explained.

"However, in this case, barley
acreages must be limited to
the larger of the barley base,
or the combined barley and
oats base, minus the oat
acreages."

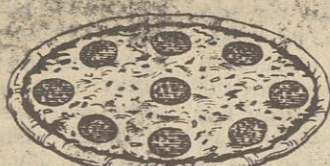
