Two Arrests In Mobile Home Break-In

Fay and Judy Hardin, both late 30's, of Tishomingo have been released on bond after several charges were placed against them by Sheriff Bob Payne in connection with the January 23 break-in of a mobile home, 3 miles west of Tishomingo, belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Mathis. According to Payne's report everything had been taken from the trailer except the refrigerator and stove. Also implicated were three juveniles who have been released in the custody of their parents, Payne said.

The stolen merchandise was allegedly taken by car and hauled from the trailer to a yard sale in Crump, Tennessee, and sold. None of the merchandise has been recovered. Mr. and Mrs. Mathis were said to be working out of town at the time their home was burglarized.

Faye Hardin was charged with breaking and entering, accessory to contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and transporting minors across a state line, Payne said. He has been released on an \$8,000 bond.

Judy Hardin has been charged with accessory to breaking and entering, accessory to contributing to the delinquency of a minor and accessory to transporting minors across a state line the sheriff reported. She was released after posting a \$5,000 bond.

Raceway Burglary Remains Unsolved

Raceway Mini Mart in Burnsville was hit by burglars between midnight and 4:05 a.m. Monday, owner Gimece Timbes said. Although a complete inventory had not been made, it was stated that items obviously missing included cash from the cash register, a Video Cassette Recorder, cigarettes, stereo, and radio.

Evidence from the scene indicated the intruder(s) entered the business through a ceiling vent and dropped into the store, Mrs. Timbes said, after trying to break locks on both the front and side doors. A coat and shirt were found in the attic.

Film taken from a security monitoring device inside the store has been sent to the crime lab in Jackson and is expected to aid authorities in identification of those responsible for the crime.

Mrs. Timbes and her husband Bill have been in business at Raceway for about a year.

Deputy W.C. Mayhall is working the investigation.

Grand Jury Report Names 26 True Bills

Following the April active session of the Tishomingo County Grand Jury and the examination of 19 witnesses, twenty-six true bills (indictments) were returned. A partial list of those indicted follows with remaining indictments expected to be made public by next publication date. They are as follows:

Comes now the Grand Jury of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, being duly called into session on the 24th day of March, 1987, for the April, 1987, Term of the Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, and submits this Partial Report.

We were in Active Session for 3 days, on the dates of March 24, 25, and 26, 1987. We examined 19 witnesses, and are returning herewith into Open Court 26 True Bills.

We also examined the Tishomingo County Courthouse and the County Jail and submit herewith our findings and recommendations.

We found that there is a lack of adequate seating outside of the Courtroom for witnesses. We noticed that many of the witnesses scheduled to testify before

this Grand Jury had to sit on the floor while they waited their time to testify. Therefore, we recommend that more seats and/or benches be placed in the hall outside the Courtroom entrance. We further recommend that a Directory of all offices in the building be placed near the front and rear entrances to the Courthouse listing all offices and their locations, and that all individual offices be clearly marked by signs placed in the hallway.

We found that the Community Action Office needs more space for storing clothing and other donated items. We also noticed the County Forestry Office is overcrowded, and the County Food Stamp Office needs repainting. Further, we recommend that a fire escape be built for the Co-Operative Extension Office and that fire extinguishers be placed in the Co-Operative Extension Office break room.

We found that there is a lack of proper ventilation in the County Jail. We noticed

that the inmates toilets, sinks, and showers did not work, and we recommend that these be repaired. We also noticed that the electric doors within the jail and the heating system were in need of repair, and we recommend that these be repaired. Further, we were informed that the washing machine is off balance and floods the floor of the jail if someone does not sit on the lid while the machine is in use, and we recommend that this machine also be repaired. We were informed that the prisoners were fed twice a day, and it is our recommendation that this practice cease and the prisoners be fed three times a day.

Now having submitted this Partial Report, we ask to be discharged subject to recall at a later time as circumstances may require upon further Order of this Court.

Stolen Guns Recovered

A number of stolen guns have been recovered by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Iuka Police Department. According to Sheriff Bob Payne the guns were allegedly among the items taken in a recent county burglar ring that was broken up last week by officials with the arrest of Billy Wayne Holland and Donnie Eckles.

Billy Wayne Holland, 24, Iuka, and Donnie Eckles, 33, Westwood Circle, Iuka, were arrested Tuesday, March 31, after reportedly breaking into the home of Opal Thompson. Also, arrested were three juveniles believed to be involved in the burglaries.

Seven guns were picked up Wednesday, April 1, from the Muscle Shoals Police Department, two shotguns were picked up from a Tishomingo residence, several were turned in by locals who suspected they possibly had purchased stolen guns, and several guns were found at Eckles Westwood Circle residence, Payne reported.

Four of the guns have been identified as belonging to Daniel Keel of Crossroads, and Benny Shackleford, of Snowdown. Both homes had previously been burglarized.

Holland is being held in Tishomingo County Jail without bond due to parole violation.

Eckles has been extradited to Lauderdale County, Ala., where he faces similar charges in the Alabama area.

The juveniles have been released to the custody of their parents.

Tishomingo Hospital Offers Swing Bed Program For Periods Of Rehabilitation

For those patients who may need some rehabilitation after an injury, illness, or surgery before leaving the hospital, Tishomingo Hospital has started a Swing Bed program.

Swing Bed is a concept designed for the person who is hospitalized and no longer acutely ill, but needs a few more days or weeks of continuous skilled care. Traditionally the program is more often used by patients who are recovering from hip replacements, hip fractures, strokes, and other similar conditions that require rehabilitative services.

"The Swing Bed program is short-term, long-term care, although that sounds like a contradiction in terms," said Paul J. Ussery, Health Services Consultant who has helped develop the new program at Tishomingo Hospital. "It's a temporary form of skilled nursing care for people who need it." Skilled nursing care is a level of care needed by patients who are not just convalescing but need specific treatment for a particular injury, illness, or surgery. Skilled nursing care is provided by or supervised by a registered, professional nurse.

"The intent of the program is really to help the patient recuperate to the point that he can go home. It's not just a stopping place between the hospital and a nursing home," continued Mr. Ussery. "That's one of the things we really emphasize. The program is not meant for a long length of time. It is designed to provide that extra rehabilitation the patient needs to enable him to return to his home setting."

The major requirement to

participate in the Swing Bed Program is that the patient have a three-day acute care stay, according to guidelines set up by Medicare. The most common length of stay is around 17 to 20 days in a Swing Bed facility.

"We recognized there was an unmet need for this type of service in the community," said Bill Rutledge, Administrator of Tishomingo Hospital. "We have the staff and the facilities to meet this need without an increased financial burden on the hospital."

The Tishomingo Hospital was approved by the State Department of Health for 10 Swing Beds. As the name implies, however, the hospital rooms can be used for the new program or they can "swing" back to use for a regular hospital patient.

The Swing Bed program operates through two hospital committees: an admissions team and an interdisciplinary team. The admissions team, composed of the program director, a nurse, and a health professional from the therapy field, reviews the patient's records to determine if the patient can be rehabilitated. This review is extremely important when a patient is referred to the Swing Bed program from another hospital. A physician has to recommend a patient for admission to the program, but the patient has to qualify through criteria set up by this admissions team.

The interdisciplinary team is composed of personnel from all areas of rehabilitative services-nursing, physical therapy, respiratory therapy, nutritional therapy, speech therapy, and so on. This team meets every week with a

physician to discuss progress of Swing Bed patients and to plan treatment.

"We will also ask family members of patients to participate in planning the rehabilitation with this team so they will understand the goals for the patient," Mr. Rutledge said. "The patient may feel a little insecure about his condition in the home environment after coming out of a controlled healthcare facility. When family members know what to expect they can better cope with the situation and aid in the patient's progress."

The Swing Bed program differs from a regular hospital stay in the way the care is delivered to the patient. Much time is spent by the interdisciplinary team planning treatment, and the social worker also coordinates activities for the patient, so he does not become disoriented or bored during the rehabilitation phase. Also different is the fact that since the patient is no longer acutely ill, the patient's physician only has to check him once a week. In addition to wanting the patient's treatment to be successful, the interdisciplinary team spends a great deal of time in planning because of the emotional aspect of an illness or injury.

"It's a very crucial point, because a serious illness or injury, such as a hip fracture, causes the patient to come to a point where they either resolve to get better or they really take a turn for the worse and begin feeling the illness or injury is the beginning of the end," said Joyce Borden, Swing Bed Co-ordinator.

"The interesting aspect of the Swing Bed program is that many of these programs are taking care of the 'frail' elderly or the elderly ranging from 75 to 90 years of age after illnesses, injuries, or surgery," Ms. Borden related. "That goes along with what we are finding both in our state and nation. The elderly population is growing, but this group of 'frail' senior citizens is growing at about three times the rate of the rest of the elderly population."

"Just looking at the statistics you can see the need for healthcare programs like Swing Bed at Tishomingo Hospital. This program is really in line with what's currently known about the older population," she pointed out.

While older adults utilize the Swing Bed program more often than others, all ages of people are candidates for the program. In older adults, Medicare will cover the first 20 days of a Swing Bed stay, and Medicaid or a Medicare supplement will then start on day 21. Those younger patients who might need the program because of illness, injury, or surgery would be covered by their private insurance if it included a skilled nursing care benefit.

Selecting Clothing For Handicapped Children

Clothing handicapped children can sometimes be difficult. Specially designed clothes for special needs are difficult to find. Often handicapped children would rather wear ready-made clothing than specially designed clothing because that is what other children wear.

Generally, garments should be comfortable and non-restricting, easy to put on and take off, easy to fasten, easy to maintain and capable of concealing the disability.

Key factors to consider

when selecting clothing for a handicapped child are fabrics, fasteners, functional features and preferences.

Unfortunately, there is no perfect fabric that will meet all the needs of a handicapped child. But there are some fabrics that are better choices than others.

Blends of natural fibers and synthetic fibers are some of the most suitable fabrics for a handicapped child. Polyester and cotton blend fabrics are good fabric choices because these fabrics have three important qualities -- absorbency, durability and easy care.

Fabrics made of 100 percent natural fibers such as cotton or wool provide excellent thermal and absor-

bency qualities, but remember, these fabrics are not easy-care fabrics. One-hundred-percent synthetic fabrics such as nylon, acrylic and polyester are durable and resist wrinkling, but some of these fabrics have poor absorbency and tend to hold body odors. Sometimes antistatic and/or antibacterial finishes are applied to these fabrics to improve their performance.

Fabrics should be carefully considered because heavy garments restrict body movement and require a great deal of energy to put on and take off. Lightweight knit fabrics are a good choice for clothing worn next to the skin because these fabrics are soft. Knit fabrics are usually easier to put on and take off than woven fabric because of their stretch-ability.

Tightly woven fabric such as denim, flannel and corduroy are durable fabrics. These fabrics won't snag or pull easily if worn over braces.

Fasteners are often difficult for any child to learn to use, but some fasteners are easier to use than others. Look for clothes that fasten down the front if the child can dress herself. Look for clothes that fasten down the back or on the shoulder if the child must have assistance in dressing.

Look for clothing with large zippers that are easy to pull up and down. Look for clothing and shoes with hook and loop fasteners. Look for clothing with large flat or concave buttons. Look for buttons with vertical buttonholes. Look for clothing with large hooks and eyes.

Parents report that one of the main problems when selecting clothing for handicapped children relates to fit. The child may be exceptionally slim, chubby or disproportionate. In those cases separate tops and bottoms may relieve the problem.

One of the most practical and economical garments for handicapped children is a

warm-up suit or sweatsuit. Most warm-up suits are available in a variety of styles that make it easier to accommodate a special need.

The child's clothing preferences should not be overlooked because it provides the child with satisfaction, responsibility and, ultimately, independence.

Clothes need to be attractive and similar to clothes of other children because all children need to feel that they fit in with their peer group.

USDA Accepts 953.6 Highly Erodible Acres For CRP

During the February 9-27 sign-up period for USDA's Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), forty Tishomingo County farmers volunteered 979.1 acres of highly erodible cropland for the program. The Agricultural Department accepted bids from 39 farmers who offered 953.6 acres of land, according to David Wilson, County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Acceptable bids averaged \$43.75 per acre.

"Successful bidders will receive a total of \$41,720 in annual rental payments for retiring regular crops and establishing trees or other permanent vegetative cover on these acres," Mr. Wilson said.

Mr. Wilson said this period, combined with the first three, brings the conservation effort thus far to 1,713.9 acres, and annual payments of \$68,556 to Tishomingo County farmers. The CRP is designed to conserve eroding cropland and help adjust the production of surplus agricultural commodities. Land placed in the program will be ineligible for farming for 10 years and must be put into permanent conservation practices.

The program allows each farmer to receive up to \$50,000 per year, based on the bid per acre times the

number of acres accepted under the 10-year contract. Program participants receive up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing permanent vegetative cover on their highly erodible acres. Mr. Wilson said rental payments will be made annually as soon as possible after October 1 to producers with approved contracts. Cost-sharing payments will be made as soon as possible after individual participants report the approved conservation practice is completed, he said.

Farm land signed up in the national CRP to date totals 19,488,587 acres. The next sign-up period will be July 20-31, 1987.

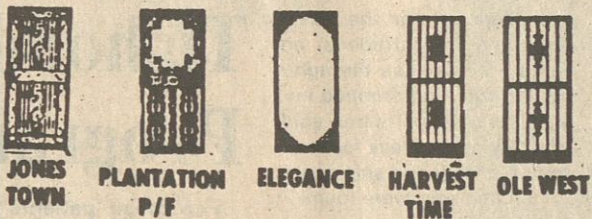

ear and azaleas. And the list goes on and on.

Different parts of different plants are toxic. Sometimes, the leaves may be poisonous. Other times, the bulb. In some cases, it may be the flower of the plant. Keep them away from small children and from curious pets.

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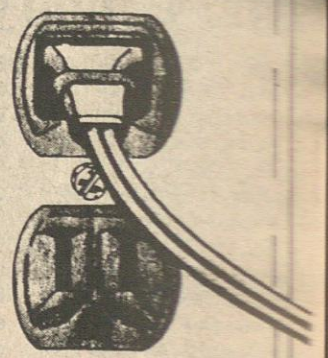

"Each rider gets a lap card at registration," Rogers said. "Every time walkers pass the checkpoint, we initial the card. At the end of the walk, we check and sign it to show that the walker earned what the sponsor pledged." Riders return to sponsors to collect the pledge.

The walkers can still get sponsor/registration forms at Hair N Stuff Family Hair Care Center, Iuka.

Dyed In The Wood

Red maple is one of several tree species whose bark naturally dyes fabrics, according to Georgia-Pacific Corp., a major forest products company.

The bark of red maple produces a dark blue dye, while hemlock bark yields a tan shade. Apple tree bark creates a yellow tint, and black birch bark produces a reddish-brown hue.

Vinegar or strong tea will set the colors in fabrics.

Surplus Food Distribution

The Tishomingo County Welfare Department announced today that U.S. Department of Agriculture Surplus Commodities will be distributed, Wednesday, April 22, 1987, beginning at 8 a.m. The following items will be distributed to eligible households: 1 cheese, 1 butter, 1 honey, 1 rice, and 1 flour.

Those households who receive food stamps by mail will have vouchers enclosed with their April food stamps. Food stamp recipients who pick up their stamps will get their vouchers with their April allotment. All other certified households (self declared income) will have their vouchers mailed on April 8, 1987, therefore, it will not be necessary for these households to come to the Welfare Office to pick up their vouchers. Households that do not receive a voucher by mail will need to come to the office to have their certification updated. Anyone wishing to make an application may apply after April 8. Eligibility is based on income. Misrepresentation of need,

or sale or exchange of USDA commodities, is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance Program is available to all eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap.

Those receiving the surplus foods are requested to bring a paper sack for their convenience in carrying the items.

If you send after your commodities by someone else be sure and put their name on the back of your voucher, date and sign it. Also, sign the voucher on the front of it.

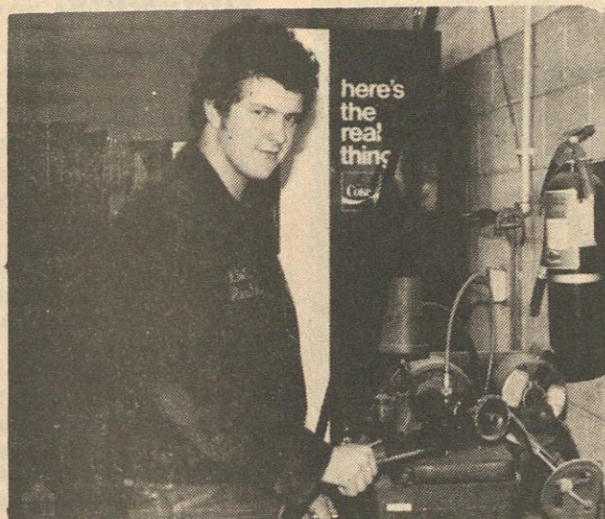

Retirement Project—

Nuclear plant engineer Milton Price pursued and realized

his dream of building a boat following his retirement from TVA. The 25 ft. cruiser "Jackelyn" awaits her maiden

voyage when weather and water conditions are right. Mr. Price gives credit to his

wife, Jean, who has also worked and supported him in this project.

"Jackelyn" Ready For Maiden Voyage

"I guess I've always wanted to build a boat," Milton Price mused. And that he did. A 25 ft. "Motor Sailer" cruiser sets ready in his driveway on Robin Lane awaiting a soon-to-be launching. Named after an only grandchild, "Jackelyn" is ready to sail and whenever Mr. Price gets the right people together, probably "some of my old buddies" and the water level in Pickwick Lake is right, she will make her maiden voyage.

One thing is for sure, Price notes "You just can't jump out with a nail and a hammer and build a boat." However, the 69-year-old retired nuclear plant engineer did compare his selected post retirement project of constructing the 25 ft. cruiser to that of building a home. "The more planning put into it, the more satisfied you're gonna be with it," he said.

The Roberts Adventure 25 Motor Sailer project was conceived as a way to wind down from constructing nuclear plants to a relaxed retirement life style. There were no deadlines, no schedule, and no pressure for completion. The intended purpose has been accomplished.

Mr. Price came to Iuka in 1978 as project manager to build the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant. He and his wife, Jean (nurse by profession) along with two

daughters in tow, both out of home now, have followed TVA making their home along the way: Corinth, working at Pickwick Dam; lived in Sheffield while at Colbert Steam Plant; moved to Camden, Tennessee, to work at the Johnsonville Steam Plant; moved back to Muscle Shoals 1960; on to Clinton, Tennessee, to the Bull Run Steam Plant; back to Muscle Shoals to work at Brown's Ferry Nuclear Plant 67-78; and finally moved to Iuka as engineer of the Yellow Creek plant in 1978 up until retirement in '82.

About 1½ years from his retirement, TVA began giving lectures on what to expect in retirement, the engineer recalled, and that's when he began to think "What am I gonna do when I retire?" So, as a transition project, he decided to buy plans and construct a sailboat. He took about a year before retirement to study sailboats - the size, types, and materials. He reasoned that it would be virtually impossible for someone who had built a nuclear plant to not be able to follow instructions to build a boat.

With that thought, drawings were bought. Bruce Roberts International designed the boat for amateur construction. The plans provided options for

trailerable shoal draft and deep keel versions plus motor sailer. It could be built with C-flex, basla core, airex or single skin glass or molded ply.

Price chose the C-flex one-off method. C-flex was applied over a male mold constructed from 1½ wide baters. Over the C-flex, laminations of chopped mat, woven roven, additional two layers of chopped mat with leveling applications of resintalcum mixtures. Each lamination was saturated with general purpose resin and then sanded.

The fiberglass products were supplied by Seemann Fiberglass, Inc., of New Orleans, LA. C-flex is a unique fiberglass planking material supplied only by Seemann. The resin used is a general purpose orthophthalic, pre-promoted, wax-free thixotropic polyester.

Starting from bare scratch with only an idea, the only logical thing to do first was to construct a trailer which he began in 1981. Actual work on fabricating the frame for the hull began in February '82. Often working 6-8 hours per day, always at his own speed, progress moved steadily. The hull form was finished in April '82, fiberglass applied and finished up complete with coat of paint by July. Building

an A-frame began in August and by the end of the month it had been turned, ready for the installation of the solid floor.

With 30 years experience in building and construction, it wasn't difficult. But, as is often true with most first time projects, mistakes are made. Mr. Price noted that he did not buy the engine until the deck had been finished, thus making it difficult to install. The engine weighed over 500 lbs; stripped down it weighed about 350 lbs. The one-man operator stayed with the chore at hand and figured out that to get the engine to it's foundation, it would have to pass through the companion way. An A-frame with trolley over the boat was constructed so the engine could be lifted and moved over the companion way then lowered over onto it's foundation. This too, was finished.

The next real problem attacked was the installation of the mast. It was necessary to devise an A-frame and winch rigging device to mount on deck in order to raise and lower the mast. This task, also was accomplished single-handedly. After this came the plumbing, wiring and numerous minor details.

Completed, the Roberts 25 is a sloop carrying 285 square feet of sail with a 20-horsepower auxiliary diesel engine, Mr. Price explains. It is designed for family cruising. No thought of racing was incorporated in it's design. It has sleeping space for five adults, a toilet with shower, galley, and a

main cabin with headroom of six feet plus.

Mr. Price thinks of "Jackelyn" as being a boat which "Has sorta an international flavor". She was constructed from materials ordered from several countries. He related, "The engine came from Holland, the mast from France, the instruments were imported from Japan, and the standing rigging, along with cable terminals, from Britain.

The mast is twenty-eight feet, three inches and when stepped it stands 32 feet above water level. The boom is ten feet long and is controlled by rigging from the cockpit.

Instrumentation consists of engine console with starting and shutdown controls, oil pressure, RPM's, coolant temperature and battery indicator. In addition, there is a fuel level indicator, and fire protection readiness.

A Cybernet Mastermind depth sounder, speedometer, water temperature, and log readout provides the pilot with essential information for safe cruising. A wind direction indicator is mounted atop the mast.

Electrical power is supplied from a 35 amp. alternator and two Vetus 55AH batteries. A twelve-volt lighting system has been installed but as an emergency measure there are two old-time oil lamps. A 15 amp. battery charger keeps batteries charged while boat is docked.

"Jackelyn" is sure to provide many pleasurable hours of cruising for members of the Price family and their friends.

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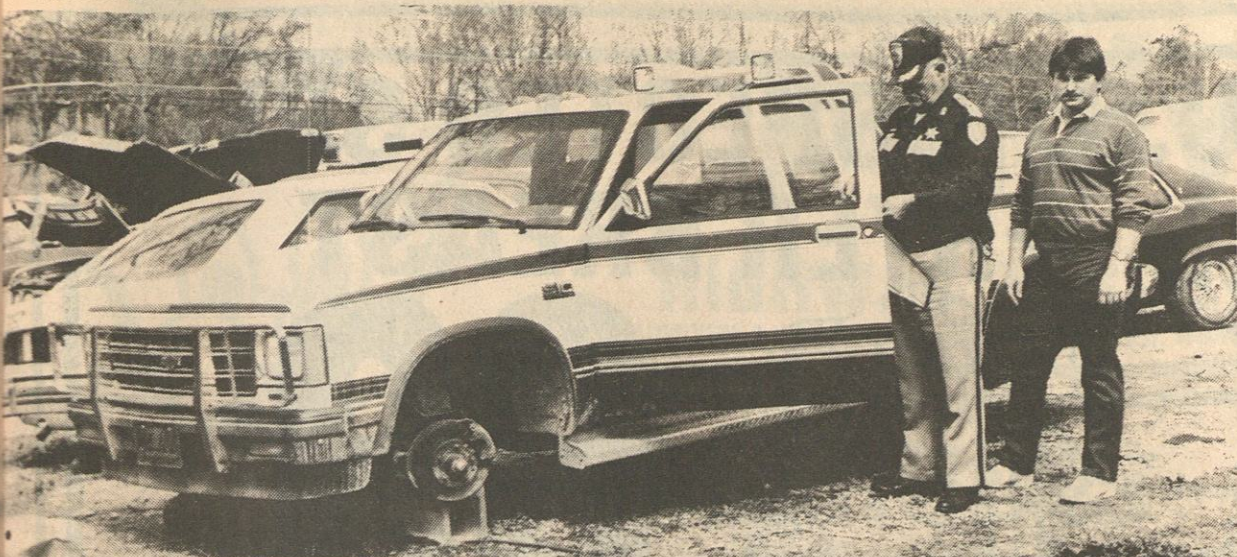
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Stolen Pick-Up Found

Area To Qualify For Federal Construction

Congressman Jamie Whitten stated that the House Appropriations Committee had unanimously approved the Supplemental Appropriations bill Wednesday which was \$1,200,000,000 below the President's request.

Congressman Whitten, Chairman of the 57-Member Committee, said that the bill provides \$5,000,000 to begin work on Highway 6 from Pontotoc to Oxford and Highway 72 from Corinth to the Tennessee line. Both were authorized for construction from the Highway Trust Fund in the Continuing Resolution of last year. "This will get all four highways, including Highways 82 and 302, started which is very important," he said.

Of special interest to our State is the following language:

"The Secretary of the Army shall file a report with the appropriate Committees of the House of Representatives and the Senate within ninety days after a written request is made pursuant to the provisions of subsection (m) of Section 103 of Public Law 99-662 indicating the action taken on the request. In addition, the Secretary of the Army shall file a report with the appropriate Committees of the House of Representatives and the Senate within ninety days after enactment of this Act listing any project or study falling under the provisions of subsection (e) (1) of Section 103 of Public Law 99-662."

"Much of our area will qualify for Federal construction," Congressman Whitten said. "This language requires the Secretary of the Army to affirmatively act on those cases which meet the requirement. Present law authorizes but does not require consideration and a decision on a request for a waiver."

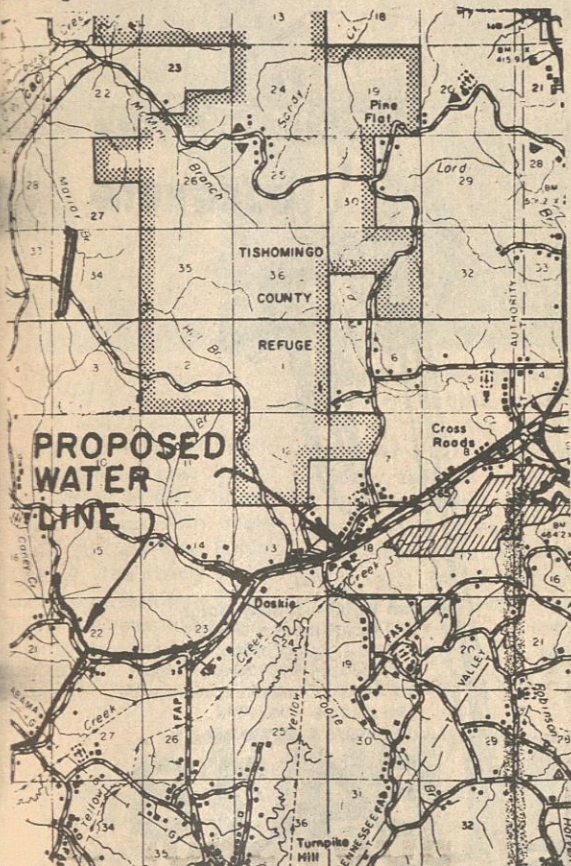

HOUSEKEEPING

A \$1.6 billion general fund budget was approved and legislative action completed last week on several major bills as state lawmakers worked to end the 1987 session.

Most of the attention in the closing week was on appropriations and adoption of conference reports on general bills previously sent to House-Senate conference committees to resolve differences between the cham-

bers.

More than 135 appropriation bills were approved to fund state agencies, institutions and departments in the coming year. Overall, the allocations from the state's general fund amount to \$1.6 billion for the fiscal year starting July 1, 1987 and include increases for education at all levels, Medicaid and other health-related programs, and other essential needs.

The additional funding was accomplished without a general tax increase although legislators did approve a boost in motor fuel taxes to

help finance a major four-lane road program, one of the top bills of the 1987 session.

The largest appropriation, as usual, was for support of Mississippi's public schools, amounting to \$622 million which includes funds for a \$1,000 salary increase for school teachers. This is the third installment in the \$4,400 teacher pay package authorized in the 1985 session. Other major funding bills involving education included \$40 million for kindergartens, \$155 million for general support of the state's universities and \$56.8 million for junior colleges.

Money was provided to give 5.5 percent salary increases to faculty and staff members at the universities and junior colleges, but it was left to the institutions to determine how to use the funds. The Legislature approved pay raises for state employees amounting to 4 percent or \$75 a month, whichever is greater. This guarantees at least an annual \$900 raise for all workers under the state personnel system. It was the first general pay increase for state employees since the 1985 session.

In addition to the funding

bills, the Legislature approved a compromise plan last week to expand Medicaid eligibility to include pregnant women living at the federal poverty level and their infants. The measure is part of the efforts to reduce the state's high infant mortality rate. The measure also raises the number of Medicaid-covered hospital days for children, provides additional funds for hospitals serving a disproportionate share of low-income patients, and continues a home and community-based services pilot program.

The State Board of Health

was authorized to coordinate planning for a regionalized system of perinatal services. Another bill was approved to establish a school nurse intervention program aimed at helping reduce teen pregnancies and sex-related diseases among young people.

A \$56.6 million bond issue was authorized to finance prison construction, including two 500-man maximum security units at Parchman and a 500-man medium security facility to be located in Greene County.

The stack of other bills winning final approval last week included measures to

create a new program to assist Mississippi farmers; provide for the Department of Natural Resources to monitor groundwater supplies and quality; modernize the state's business laws; extend sovereign immunity to protect governmental units from damage suits for another year; raise the compulsory school attendance age to 16 by the 1989-1990 school year; protect crime victims' rights by providing for district attorneys to hire special assistants to work with crime victims, and creating an escrow account in the state treasury for crime

victims; authorize order blood tests in cases; and extend leases on most of the School lands from years.

It was a week of emotion. Speaker of the House, Newman, announced he would not seek another term after a member of the House since 1948 and Speaker of the House, Representatives in House members expressing sorrow death of the five in the tragic traffic of the University of

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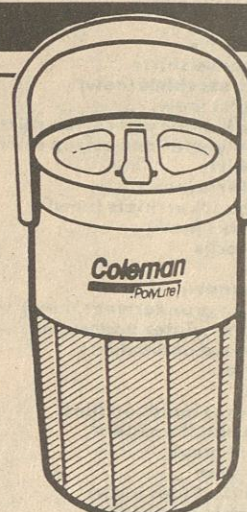
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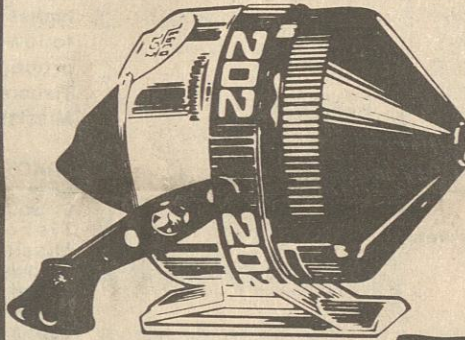


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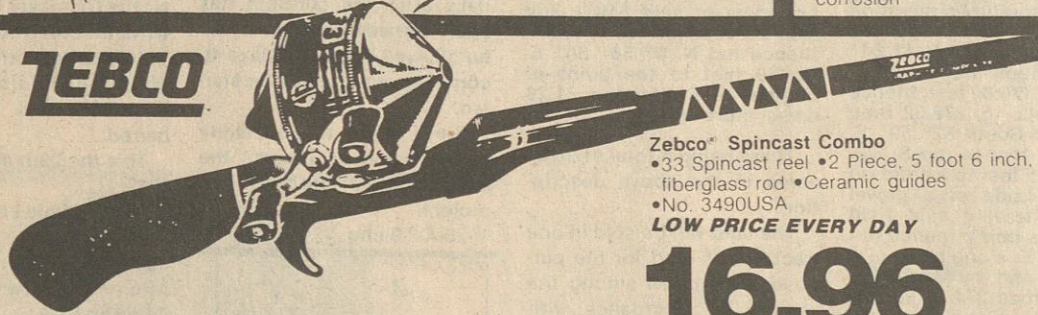
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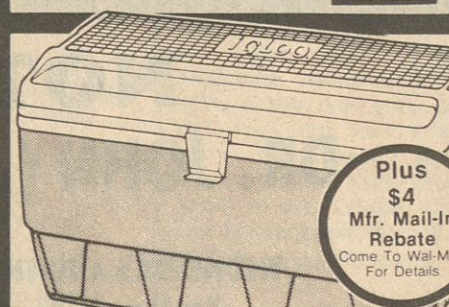
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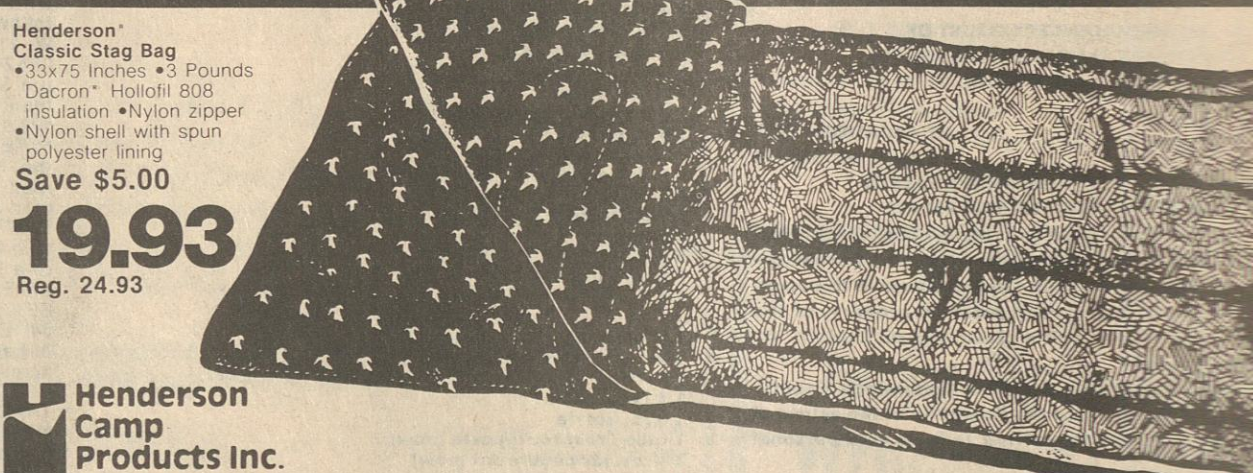


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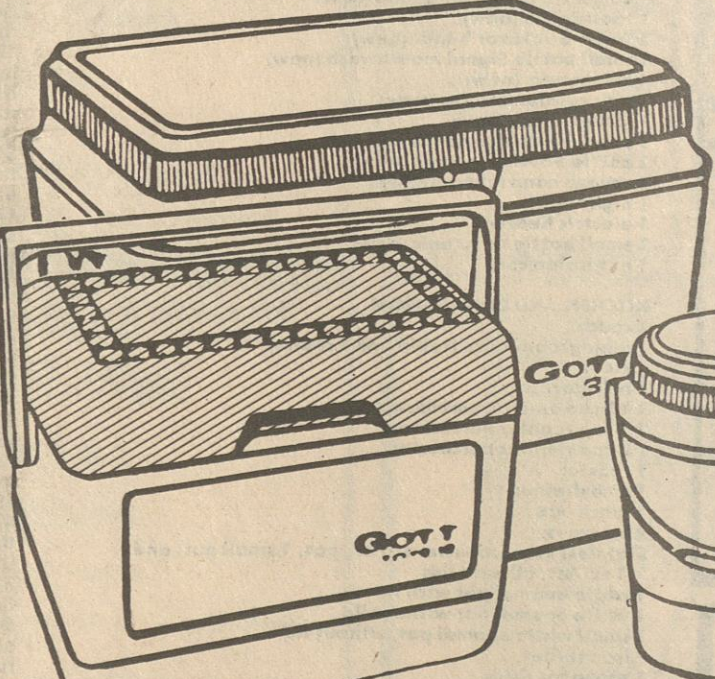


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
