## Gambling Devices Seized In Raids

Two Alcorn County men have been arrested and charged with operation of gambling devices following

an early morning raid on two Burnsville businesses. Confiscated in the raid were fourteen video poker machines,

and \$500-\$600 in quarters that were found lying around the machines, according to Sheriff Bob Payne. This

amount does not include the money that is in the machines, he said.

Kenny Graham, 39, of Corinth, and Dewey L. Bain, 64, of Route 1, Rienzi, were arrested Saturday, May 16, at Burnsville One Stop and the SOS Service Station, respectively. Both businesses are located on Highway 72 within 100 yards of each other. A third raid at Q-Mart in Iuka failed to turn up any machines; however, there had reportedly been machines at this establishment the day before, stated Payne.

Payne said the businesses had been under surveillance for about two weeks. He said undercover personnel was used and had received payoffs at the three businesses after playing on the machines on Wednesday, May 13.

Sheriff Payne said all fourteen machines were presently stored at the county Jail pending the outcome of a June 5th Justice Court hearing date set in Tishomingo County before Robert Arnold. If the judge rules the defendants guilty, the machines are subject to confiscation by the county, Payne said.

Both men have been released on \$1,000 bond each. The charges against the two are misdemeanors, the sheriff said.

June 5, hearing date has been set for both men in Tishomingo County Justice Court.



Poker Machines Confiscated

Fourteen video poker machines were seized and two individuals were arrested in an early Saturday morning raid of two Burnsville businesses. According to Sheriff Bob Payne, officials

invaded the establishments between midnight and 1:00 a.m. on Saturday, May 16, following a two week surveillance. Five to six hundred dollars in quarters were found lying beside the machines, Payne said, and the machines appeared to be full of money,

but they have not been opened so the money has not been counted. The confiscated machines are being stored at the Tishomingo County Jail where they will remain until after a Justice Court hearing that has been set for June 5th.

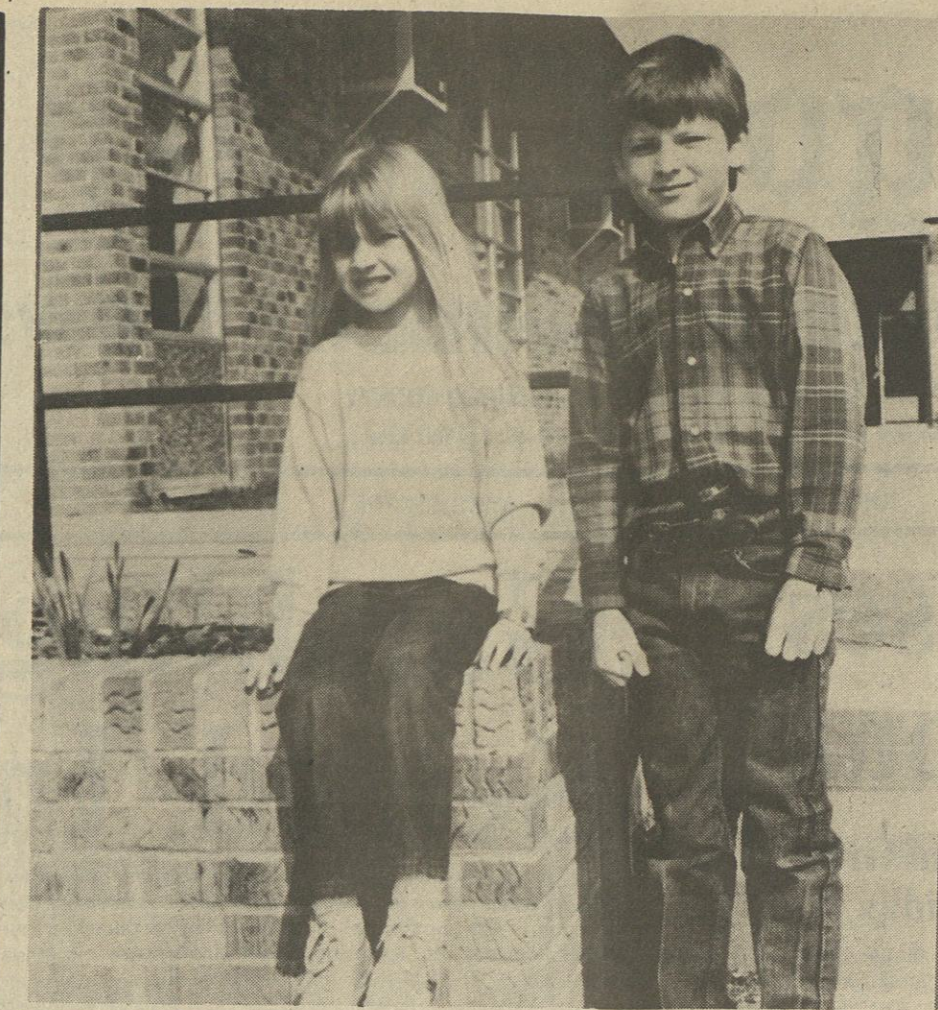
### USDA Celebrates 125th Birthday

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is celebrating its 125th birthday May 15, according to Elmer A. South, Vice-Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The theme, "Serving

Agriculture, Serving America," emphasizes the role USDA played in providing a wide range of services throughout its 125-year history.

USDA was established May 15, 1862, when President Abraham Lincoln signed a law establishing "a Department of Agriculture...to acquire and to diffuse among the people of the United States useful information on subjects connected with agriculture in the most general and comprehensive sense of the word." Lincoln also dubbed it "the People's

### Department."

"When the Department was established, most people were farmers," said South, "and USDA programs were primarily for farmers." Now, farm families and workers represent a smaller share of America's population, but USDA still has a very wide range of responsibilities through which it serves the nation. These include protecting our soil, forest, and other natural resources; protecting public health by safeguarding our food supply; conducting domestic and international marketing programs; and providing income supports, food and nutrition programs, and research and education.

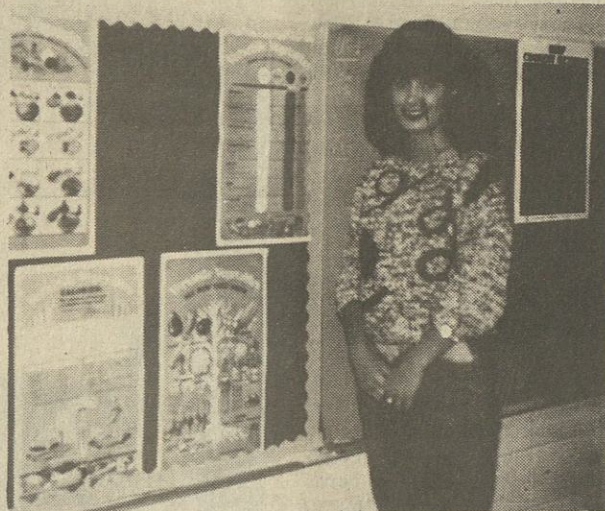
"These activities serve not only American agriculture but all Americans," South said. A unique aspect of the U.S. Department of Agriculture is the way its localized in grass roots America. In about 3,000 counties in the 50 States there are USDA offices, offering the services of USDA agencies including the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service, and Farmers' Home Administration.

"USDA has stayed in touch with the needs of Americans," South said. Even though most Americans no longer live on farms, agriculture and its related industries still represent the largest sector of our economy and USDA continues to respond to President Lincoln's charge to be "the people's department," he said.

## CARING FOR YOUR PET



### Mites Are Mighty Mean!

While fleas and ticks are the most common external parasites attacking cats and dogs, mites also pose a serious health problem for these animals.

Mites are small, eight-legged creatures that frequently cause mange and serious ear infections.

The two most common types of mange -- demodectic or red mange and sarcoptic or scabies mange -- both are caused by mites. Red mange is the more difficult of the two to treat because the mites live in the follicles -- deep, narrow passages where individual hairs emerge from the skin. Not long ago, it was almost impossible to control red mange. Today, however, medications are available that are effective against this infection.

Cats and dogs infected with red mange typically show bald spots under the eyes, on the forehead and on the front legs. Their skin reddens, and may thicken and wrinkle.

Sarcoptic or scabies mange is identified by an itchy, scaly skin condition, which is not seen in red mange. Scabs caused by the pet's constant scratching are commonly associated with this type of mange.

Scabies mange spread more rapidly than red

mange, and frequently results in loss of hair. The pet's fur often has a musky odor.

While red mange poses no threat to human health, sarcoptic mange does affect humans. It is important, therefore, to determine the type of mange affecting your animal as soon as the condition is discovered.

A number of products are effective in combating mange. A number of these products, while safe for dogs, are toxic for cats. It is important that you contact your veterinarian before treating your pet for mange.

In addition to mange, mites can be a source of serious ear infections. Found most often in cats, ear mites also infect dogs.

An animal can have a serious infection in the ears before showing any outward sign. Owners should inspect their animal's ears frequently for signs of ear mites.

Five Tishomingo County youths will be among the more than 300 young people who will study natural resources at the 32nd annual 4-H Regional Development Conference at Fontana Dam, N.C., June 1-5.

Pat will appear in the Academic All-American Scholar Director, which is published nationally.

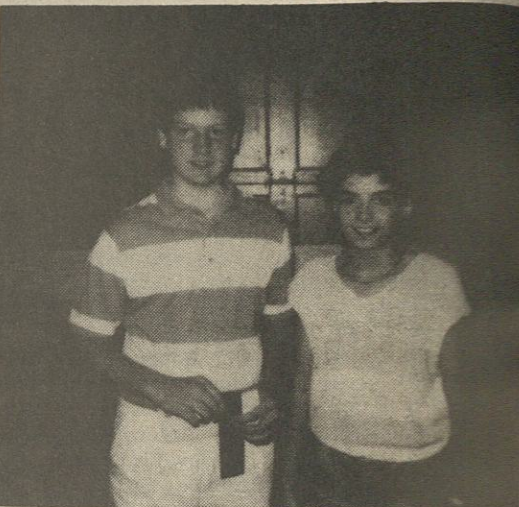

## Dr. Kelly Segars, Sr. Attends Seminar

Dr. Kelly S. Segars, Sr., of The Segars Clinic recently attended a seminar on the risks of elevated cholesterol and heart disease. Classes were held at The Peabody Hotel in Memphis. Dr. Castelani of Harvard University was the principal speaker. Dr. Castelani is the medical director of the famous Framingham heart study which is pretty well considered to be the Bible when it comes to treating elevated cholesterol and heart disease resulting from the effects of elevated cholesterol.

Dr. Castelani stated that a

1% reduction in a person's cholesterol level resulted in a 2% decrease in the likelihood of a heart attack. Part of the lecture was directed towards some of the newer medications and therapies for lowering cholesterol. If one's cholesterol is 200 or above, measures should be taken to reduce it. This may be done by diet and weight loss. If these fail, medication is available.

## Miss Whitehurst Attends Program

Angie Whitehurst, of Iuka, went through astronaut training activities this week, leading to two simulated missions in space at U.S. Space Academy, Level I, at The Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, AL.

The simulated missions used a realistic trainer mockup of the Space Shuttle orbiter, the European Space Agency Spacelab, and a space station. Trainees also used a Mission Control developed especially for Space Academy. During the missions, trainees performed experiments similar to those done by astronauts and scientists in space.

They also used astronaut training simulators in U.S. Space Camp's new \$4.5 million Training Center, which was inspired by NASA's astronaut training facilities.

The activities were part of Space Academy Level I, which is for young people ages 14-16. Other U.S. Space Camp programs include Space Camp, for youngsters ages 11 to 13. A new Space Academy Level II, for young adults ages 17 to 19, opens in August.

Many of the trainees' activities were at The Space and Rocket Center, which operates the camp and is the visitor's center for NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center. At the museum, trainees experienced simulated space flights, including triple gravity forces similar to those felt by shuttle astronauts during launch.

Trainees also got a first hand look at Pathfinder, NASA's full-scale Space Shuttle orbiter mockup, which was used for testing during the shuttle development program.

Trainees also watched space-oriented films in the Spacedome Theater, which features a state-of-the-art motion picture system that gives the audience the feel of being suspended in space. The trainees saw "Hail Columbia," and "The Dream is Alive," which features film footage shot by astronauts aboard several Space Shuttle missions.

During the five-day program, each trainee was assigned two roles in the space missions: One in Mission Control and a second in "space." The outcome of each mission depended on how well each team member learned his responsibilities and on how well the trainees worked together as a team.

The countdown, launch, flight, and landing were monitored by Mission Control on a multi-screen video system. Once in "orbit," the flight crew conducted experiments, performed simulated space walks, launched a "satellite," and docked with the space station. Each team participated in two missions, with team members exchanging places on each flight, so each trainee could participate in a number of activities.

Space Academy Level I sessions began March 8 and continue through September 4, with two sessions each week. Five-day sessions begin each Friday and Sunday. The Space Academy Level I program costs \$575, with a \$100 discount for youngsters who attend in March, April, and May.

## She Likes 'Fun Learning' Tactic

(The following article was written by Carey Hancock staff writer for the Hendersonville, Tennessee, Times, April 10 edition. Mrs. McPherson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Merl Trimm of Tishomingo.)

Sue McPherson, recent winner of Sumner County's "1987 Teacher of the Year" award in the 9-12 grade division says she didn't grow up wanting to be a teacher, but is now rewarded each day in class for her choice.

The ninth grade physical science teacher at Hawkins Jr. High School explained, "I wanted to be a research scientist. It wasn't until later in college that I decided to go into teaching and now I just love it."

Standing almost five feet tall with high heels on, McPherson said with no pun intended, "You know, you really have to be on your toes as a teacher. There's a great deal more to teaching than just classes and books. I don't

teach from the book. Things are always changing and expanding so fast that a lot of books are outdated by the time they roll off the printing press."

McPherson says she hopes her students think of her as a "fun" teacher. I like to do fun things and promote 'fun-learning'.

And fun-learning is commonplace in McPherson's classes. Just a few weeks ago, McPherson took 40 students on a science trip to Coco Beach, Epot Center and the Kennedy Space Center.

"We really had a tremendous time," she said. "It was a marathon trip ... mass pandemonium. We left Thursday morning at 5 a.m., arrived at 9 a.m. Friday morning and stayed until Sunday. We saw everything there was to see."

"We missed the launch by hours," McPherson said, referring to the launch of the communications satellite that had to be destroyed

shortly after take-off.

"We had a great time at the Kennedy Center," said McPherson. "We saw everything: launch pads, Atlantis, Discovery, other rockets on display, crawlers, the exploration center, dexterity scales where the children could see how much they would weigh on other planets, and just lots of really exciting things."

"The whole trip was just wonderful. Very educational and fun-learning," she said. McPherson attributes her success in teaching to demonstrations and class projects that again exercise "fun-learning. We have lots of demonstrations and guest speakers."

Each year, McPherson hosts several events which demonstrate different aspects of science. Included is an egg drop where students devise a way to drop raw eggs without them breaking; a mousetrap race-for-distance contest where students compete with Knox Doss students in inventing a mousetrap car that will travel the greatest distance; a home-made-ice-cream experiment with "tutti-fruity" ice cream that demonstrates hot and cold and the effect salt has on ice; and a rocket-launch.

McPherson said she believes in giving prizes and extra credit for accomplishments. "I hold great expectations for my students. I demand a lot. I also reward for extra efforts."

Bernie Matta, principal of Hawkins Jr. High School where McPherson teaches, says he feels very lucky to have her working there. "I can say this for sure, I will hate to lose her when I become a middle school."

"Mrs. McPherson is the Department Head for our

science department. She teaches—honors physical science, general physical science and also tutors. Each year she holds a most outstanding science fair. Mrs. McPherson sponsors the Science Club and the Space Program Club.

"She was even one of the 'Teacher In Space' finalists in Tennessee. Things like this show that her record speaks for itself. I give her outstanding ratings."

McPherson says she plans to continue teaching for quite a while. "Teaching has become a prestigious job. People are finding out that we

don't just sit behind a desk and grade papers."

McPherson has spent her past 14 years teaching in Sumner County and has accumulated 17 years of experience. She is a graduate of David Lipscomb College and received her MED from Tennessee State University.

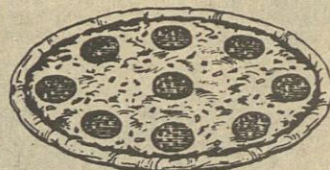

Island.

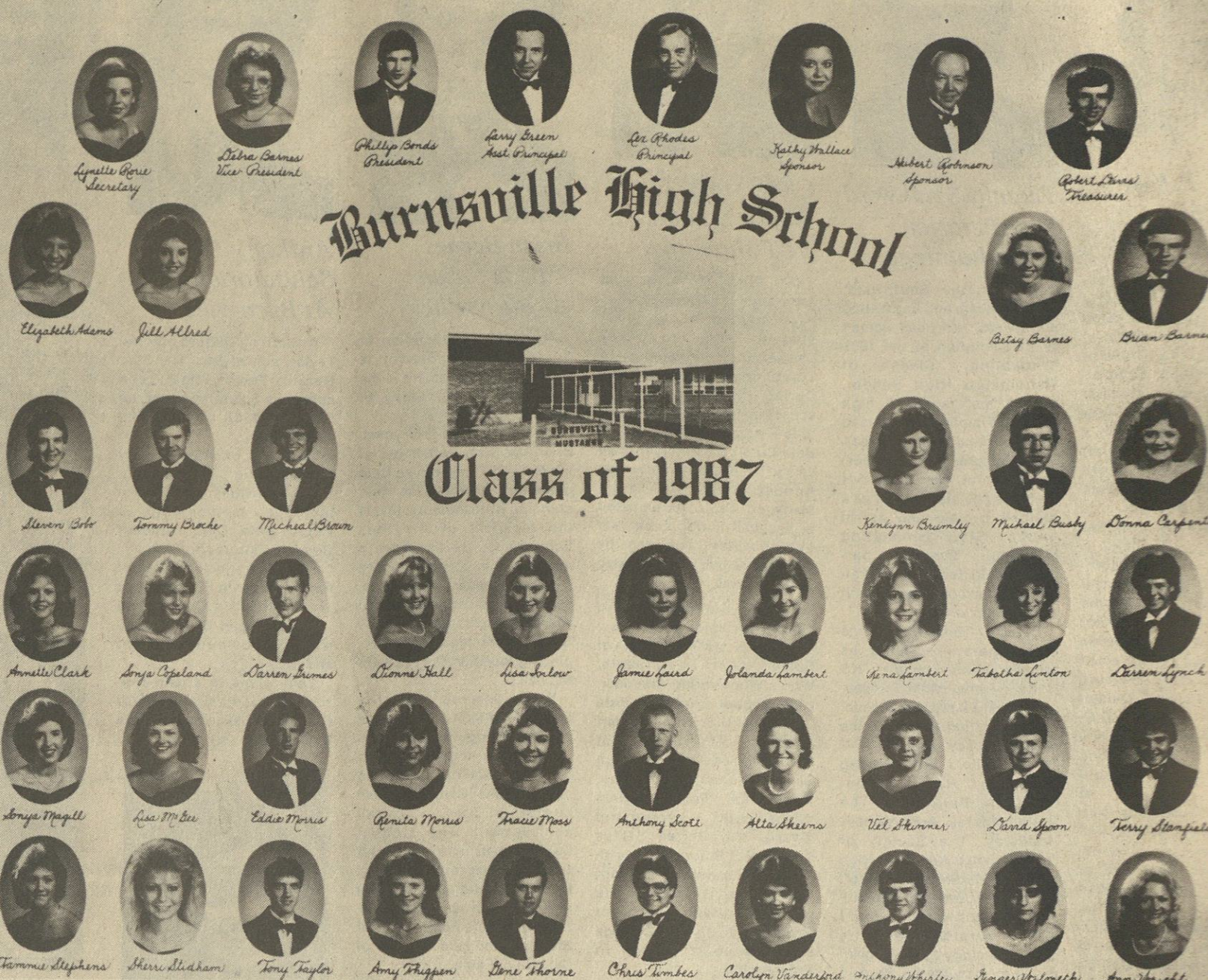

## Spring Planning And Development Meeting

County supervisors and other local officials recently

attended the 1987 Spring Planning and Development District Meetings sponsored by the Mississippi Association of Supervisors. The April 22nd Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District meeting took place at Northeast Junior College in Booneville and was presided over by MAS Executive Committee Chairman J.P. Davis of Prentiss County.

Dr. Bill Coston of the Department of Community Development's Center for Governmental Technology with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service coordinated the educational program, which included a legislative update, an introduction to Mississippi's Center for Technology Transfer and a cost effective alternative to county employee health insurance.

MAS Executive Director Eddie Washington listed the bills which passed the 1987 Session of the Mississippi Legislature affecting county government. He focused on House Bill 1315, a complicated and lengthy legislative package originally introduced to eliminate the costly four-year update that 27 Mississippi counties were to face for the first time this year, which eventually involved many facets of county government and became of major importance to the supervisors, chancery clerks, and tax assessors/collectors.

Special Assistance Attorney General Pat Flynn was also on hand to discuss this year's victims' rights legislation. Beginning in July of this year, each District Attorney's region will have a Victim's Coordinator to take the victim of crime through the often confusing legal investigation system and the conviction process.

Guest speaker Harvey Johnson, Jr., director of the Center for Technology Transfer, explained the services offered by the federally funded center administered by the Mississippi State Highway Department and the Federal Highway Administration. The center was established in September 1985 to provide solutions to rural transportation problems and offers training sessions, short courses, workshops plus a library with over 1,000 pieces including computer software and videos of special interest to supervisors, road crews and county engineers.

Also on the educational agenda was Bill Saint Sing of Diversified Services, Inc. Diversified Services, Inc. was previously selected by the Mississippi Association of Supervisors as the third party administrator for a statewide group health care program designed specifically for county officials and employees. Saint Sing discussed the beneficial aspects of the program, which allows each county to insure according to its own budget by taking as much or as little risk as desired.

State Aid Engineer William Stevenson attended the Planning and Development District Meetings to remind those assembled that no contracts can be let during the last six months of a supervisor's term unless the State Aid Department approves to project before July 1. He also gave a reminder that each county Board of Supervisors must vote on the unit system by July and send a copy of the vote reflecting each board member's vote to Stevenson, or their county will not receive any State Aid funds. MAS committee members were voted upon at the

meetings and will be ratified at the MAS Annual Convention, August 26-30. Newly elected committee members from the Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District are Alcorn County Supervisor James Newcomb, Executive Committee; Tippah County

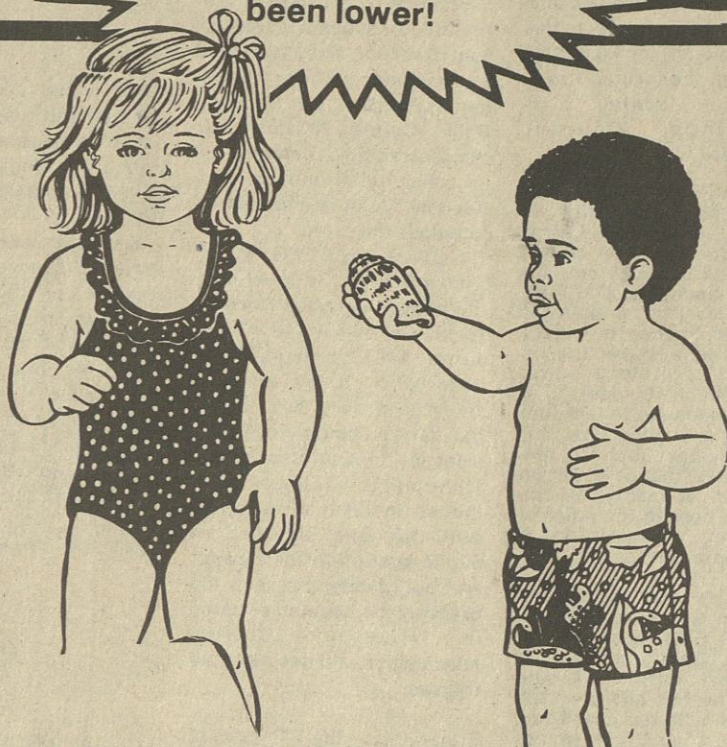

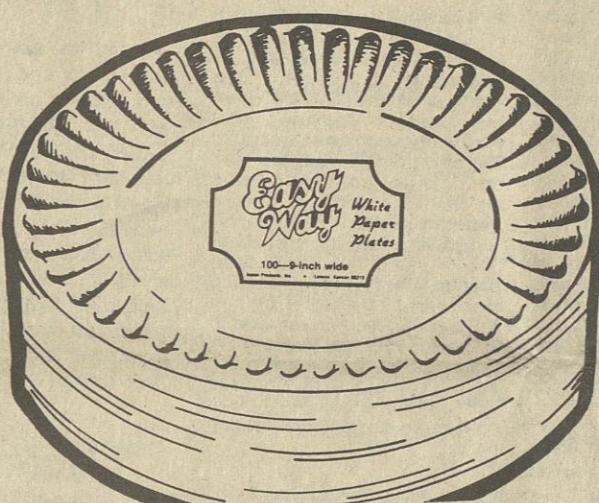

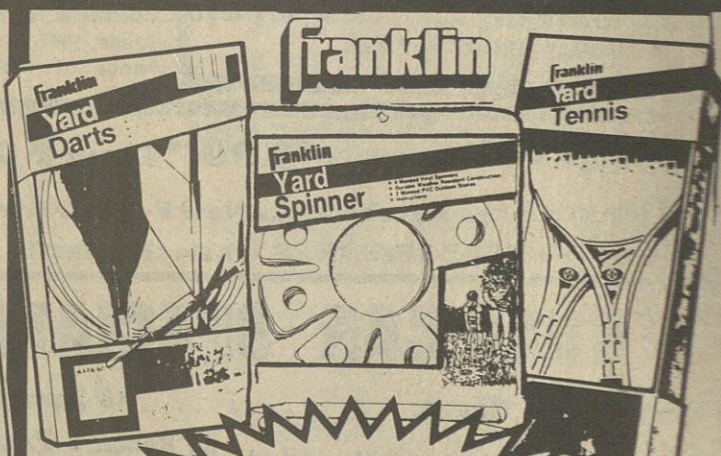
