T.C.E.P.A. To Offer Satellite Programming

Through membership in the National Rural Telecommunications Cooperative, Tishomingo County Electric Power Association will be able to offer to satellite dish owners a television programming package which will include news, information, and entertainment channels currently scrambled and scheduled for scrambling.

The National Rural Telecommunications Cooperative (NRTC) has successfully completed the initial phase of negotiations and has announced a package of scrambled programming to be offered to rural dish owners through the nation's rural utilities systems.

NRTC's program package,

called Rural TV, will be available to rural residents beginning this summer and includes a basic selection of programs plus optional programming priced above the basic. The following channels, which are now scrambled, are included in the basic package: superstations WPIX (New York), WGN (Chicago), KTVT (Dallas) and WOR (New York), and Cable News Network and Headline News. NRTC will also offer the following optional tiers of programming and premium services to its members for their consumer/subscribers: Prime Time 24 with three network affiliate channels-WABC-TV (New York), ABC, WBBM-TV (Chicago) CBS, WXIA-TV (Atlanta) NBC, and Request Television - a pay-per-view premium movie service. The benefits of the Travel Channel will also be offered to rural utility systems through the NRTC package.

NRTC has also signed contracts with other programmers which have not yet scrambled their signals. Those channels included in NRTC's basic package are: The Nostalgia Channel, Country Music Television, The Learning Channel, Hlt Video USA, The Nashville Network, and Home Sports Entertainment.

"We are pleased to announce the NRTC package,"

said NRTC's CEO, Bob Phillips. "This package will be offered as a convenient, affordable monthly service for rural home satellite dish owners."

"NRTC's package is only the beginning of a broader program package. We offer stability to rural dish owners through contracts with channels that are not yet scrambled. And we continue to negotiate with other programmers not currently in the NRTC package. We welcome the opportunity to work with them for the benefit of rural Americans," he said. Phillips added that NRTC's ultimate goal is to deliver a package that meets the programming and pricing demands of rural Americans.

General Manager Robert Grisham explains, "Tishomingo County Electric Power Association is proud and excited to be able to provide this service to its consumer/members. This kind of commitment to enhance the lifestyle of rural citizens is based on the very philosophy that led to the creation of rural electric cooperatives in the late '30's and early '40's all across America."

"At this time, all details have not been worked out concerning the total package and monthly cost," adds Grisham. "When final decisions are made, our members will be notified."

The sheriff said that he has received numerous telephone calls inquiring about him supporting various candidates who are seeking election to the position that he now holds and in fact asking if he is going to be the deputy. He said the calls are coming from all over the county.

"I am NOT politicking for nobody and I'm positively not gonna be a deputy no matter who's elected," he said. "Why would I want to be vice president after being president?" he quipped.

Matthew Dooley was admitted to the hospital and treated for abrasions on both arms, lacerations on the left ear, and chest and back pain. He is reportedly in stable condition.

Miss Angela Marcella Brumley, 17, died Sunday, May 24, 1987, as the result of an automobile accident. She was a 10th grade student in Collierville, Tennessee.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



Wage War On External Parasites

External parasites, such as fleas, ticks, lice and mites, can cause your favorite pet extreme discomfort. They also pose a serious threat to your pet's health.

The presence of parasites can cause serious skin disorders and even disease. If you find your pet scratching frequently, or if you discover bald spots or inflamed skin, your pet may be playing host to one or more of the non-paying boarders.

While there are many products on the market which are sold to combat these parasites, getting rid of them is no easy job. The only road to success in overcoming external parasites is paved with patience and persistence.

Not all products sold to control these pests are good for all species. Some products that are excellent for dogs are toxic for cats. And some products, while excellent for older animals, are not recommended for kittens and puppies.

The best person to advise you about whether a particular product is safe for your pet is your family veterinarian. He

knows your pet and your pet's health history.

Any time there is a serious infestation of any type of external parasite, your veterinarian should be consulted. By the time it becomes apparent to you that there's a problem, your pet may have a dangerous infection.

Remember that external parasites are found virtually everywhere. Their presence is not a disgrace. Nor is it a reflection one's living habits.

However, allowing these pests to remain and multiply is a cause for concern. They can infest your home and cause discomfort not only to your pet, but to your family and guests as well.

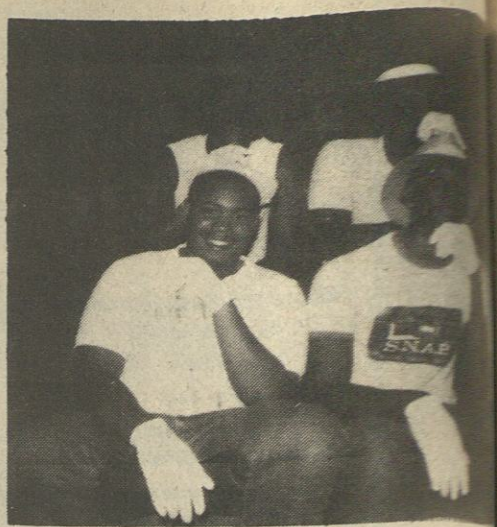
ASCS Announces Deadline For Price Support Loans

Price support loans on 1986 corn, sorghum, cotton and soybeans will be available until June 1, Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

County loan rates are: Corn, \$2.04 per bushel; Sorghum, \$3.27 per cwt.; Cotton, \$5.610 per lb., and Soybeans, \$.83 per bushel. Each loan rate is based on a national average rate which varies from county to county to reflect production and utilization patterns and historical prices received by farmers.

To be eligible for price support loans, South said farmers must comply with the farm program for the commodity. "By complying, farmers also become eligible for deficiency payments and other farm program benefits," he said.

As of May 21, 1987, Tishomingo County farmers had obtained loans on approximately 11,800 bushels of 1986-crop corn. The ASCS price support loan program provides immediate cash for

South said 1986 feed grains and wheat are not eligible for entry into the farmer-owned grain reserve when regular price support loans mature because quantities of these crops currently exceed USDA's upper limits. The USDA limit is 360 million bushels for wheat and about 560 million bushels for feed grains. Farmers can,

however, extend their crop loans an additional month. "Farmers who are interested in obtaining a loan on 1986 corn, sorghum, cotton, and soybeans should apply as soon as possible," ASCS official said.

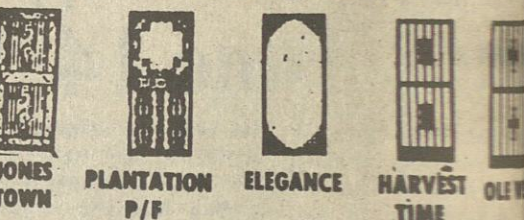
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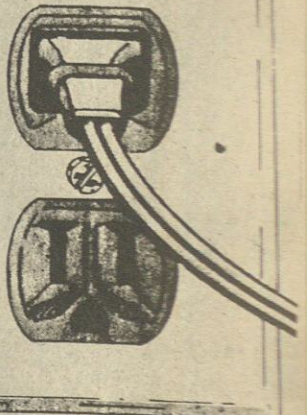

Immigration Reform Topic of Forum

The Mississippi Employment Security Commission, in conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce and JSEC (Job Service Employer Committees) Chapters in North Mississippi is sponsoring a public forum of the Church Street Elementary School in Tupelo on Friday, May 29, 1987, at 2:00 p.m.

The purpose of this forum is to provide information on the new Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 and the impact this legislation will have on employers. This act, which went into effect November 6, 1986, is designed to determine the identity of the individual in employment status and their being authorized to work in the United States. Also scheduled to be outlined is (1)

the assistance the Employment Service can provide and (2) specific responsibilities assigned to the employer.

Effective June 1, 1987, all employers will be required to complete the I-9 form on all new employees and retain this information for a minimum period of three years. Employers with new hires from November 7, 1986, to date will have until September 30, 1987, to complete the required information.

This new legislation will have a large impact on employers as the responsibility for employing an illegal alien will rest with the employer rather than the employee and any monetary penalty will be assessed to the employer.

Packets of instructions and forms will be provided to employers at the meeting. All interested employers in this area are invited and encouraged to attend this most important meeting.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Mr. Biggs,

My sister, Jennie Morris sent me a copy of "The Vidette" April 30th edition with second section saluting Iuka Guaranty Bank for 75 years of successful banking.

The paper brought back several pleasant memories of Iuka. I will mention two and they both relate to the Bank since Mr. J.C. Jourdan, Sr. was one of the founders.

I graduated from Iuka High School in the Spring of 1938 and about the time of graduation or shortly thereafter, Mr. J.C. Jourdan ask my father if I planned to go to college this fall. My father told Mr. Jourdan that "He was sure that I would like to go but that he did not have the money to send me." Mr. Jourdan advised, "If he wants to go and is willing to work his way through I will lend him \$350.00 to help him get started."

In September I boarded the train there in Iuka with my trunk and \$350.00 and with a change of trains in Corinth and Artesia, I ended up at A & M, now MSU. I probably worked more than I went to school, but I got by. I worked most of the first 2 years from 5 to midnight, or later in a small cafe (10 cents per hour). And the last two years I drove a bus that belonged to the college for 70,000 miles and helped Royal Gober operate a milk store in the dormitory. I paid Mr. Jourdan during the first or second summer and ended up the four years owing \$450.00 to Field Cooperative Association in Jackson.

The second thing took place in 1962. I was living in Portland, Oregon. I had trailed a horse behind an old worn out 1950 Plymouth for 350 into Eastern Oregon near Washington and Idaho border to Elk hunt. The good luck was, I killed an elk but the bad luck was the old car "blew-up." So I managed to get it into the nearest little ranch town and found a Chevrolet dealer who had one pickup truck on hand. So I called Mr. R.A. McRee at the Iuka Bank, explained the circumstances and told him that I needed to borrow \$2,000.00; he said o.k., and told me to send him a note and tell him how I wanted to repay, after I got back home. I then put the dealer on the phone and Mr. McRee told him that my check for \$2,500.00 was good. (I'm still driving that 62 Chevrolet.)

When I got back to Portland, I wrote out a note for \$2,000 to be repaid on or before 24 months, with interest at 6% to be repaid at the note of \$100 per month drawn from my checking account. Mr. McRee took the note and on the lower blank he wrote down \$2,000 and each month he or someone would subtract \$100 and enter a date. I paid off the note after about 10 payments, he sent the note back to me and I have it filed with other important papers that I keep for my scrap book.

In my opinion what this country needs (after a balanced budget and a balance on Surplus of Foreign Trade) is a lot more sound, well-managed home town owned and operated Banks like the Iuka Guaranty.

Constable Training Requirements Adopted

Training requirements for constables have been adopted by the Board on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Training. The action came after the board made proposed requirements available for public comment.

The board, charged by a law passed during the 1986 legislative session to establish constable training requirements, determined that incumbent constables may be required to complete a two-week refresher course at the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers' Training Academy or another approved training academy within one year of the constable's election. Also, newly elected constables may be required to attend the basic law enforcement training course at an approved academy. Individuals failing to meet this requirement would not be eligible to collect constable's fees.

"Each constable's documented record of experience, training and education would be evaluated to determine the individual's

capabilities and training needs," said Oxford Police Chief Billy White, chairman of the board. "Constables who have successfully completed a basic course equivalent to current standards would be eligible for a waiver of the training requirement."

The board also determined that newly elected constables who have completed an acceptable basic course and can provide documentation of adequate law enforcement experience would be eligible for a refresher course.

"All constables participating in the training would be required to achieve an overall academic average of at least 70 percent and a final average qualifying score of at least 75 percent on the prescribed firearms courses," White said.

The appropriate board of supervisors must submit a completed personnel action form for each constable within 30 days of the individual taking the oath of office. Following the next regularly scheduled Board on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Training meeting, the board of supervisors would be advised on the training required, if any, for the constable. The law mandates that the board of supervisors shall be responsible for paying, one time only, the tuition, living and travel expenses incurred by the constable. If the constable does not satisfactorily complete the training, the expenses of any further required training would be the obligation of the constable.

"This training should help in weeding out incompetent individuals and provide counties with constables who are serious law enforcement officers," said Gerald Wayne Jones, president of the Mississippi Constables' Association. "It provides an opportunity for constables to be more highly regarded as professional law enforcement officers."

John Toler, a Jefferson Davis County constable, noted that "this training will help constables to avoid making mistakes such as illegal arrests and unlawful searches and seizures. It also should help constables in being prepared to react to dangerous situations. Everyone who comes in contact with constables likely will benefit from this constable training requirement."

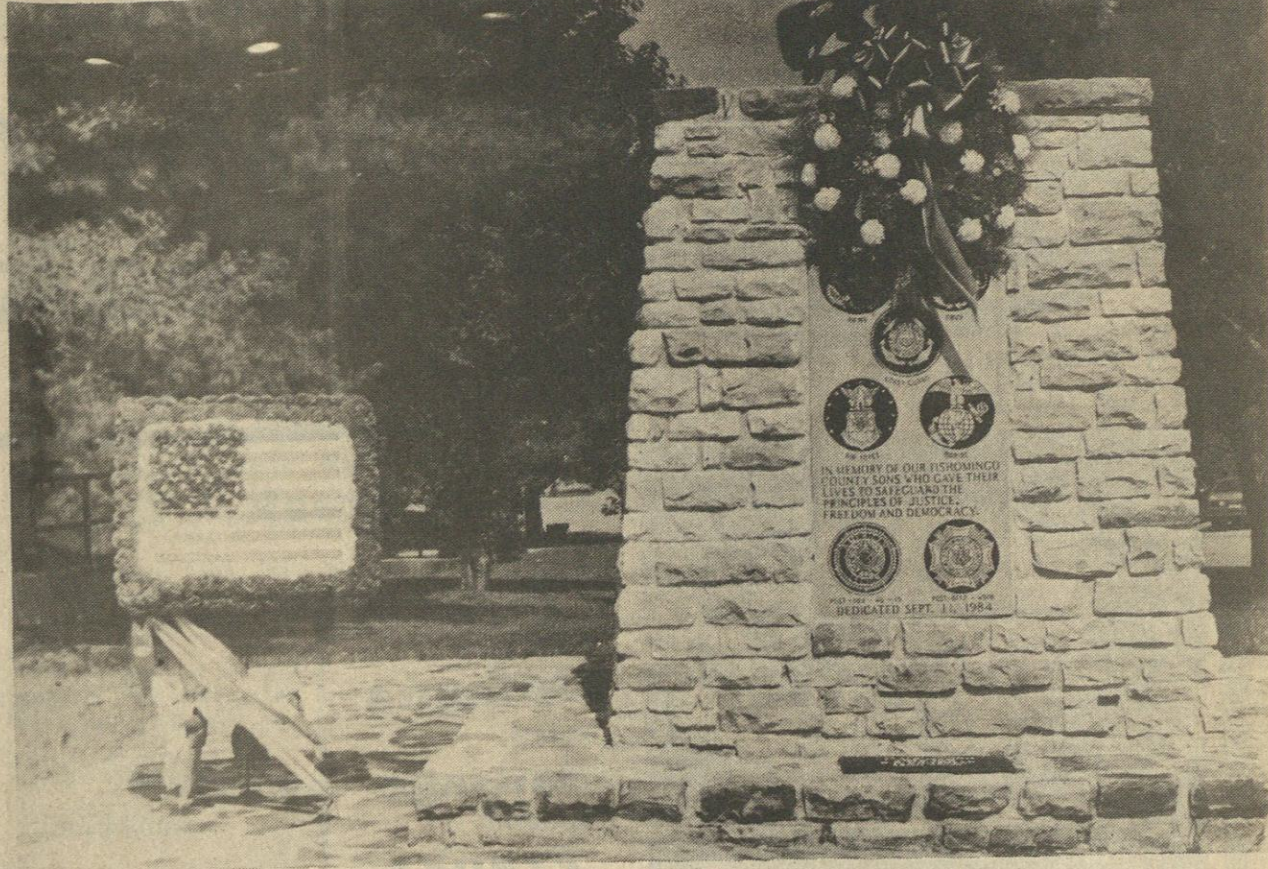
The hostess gave an inspirational devotional using Psalm 35 as her text.

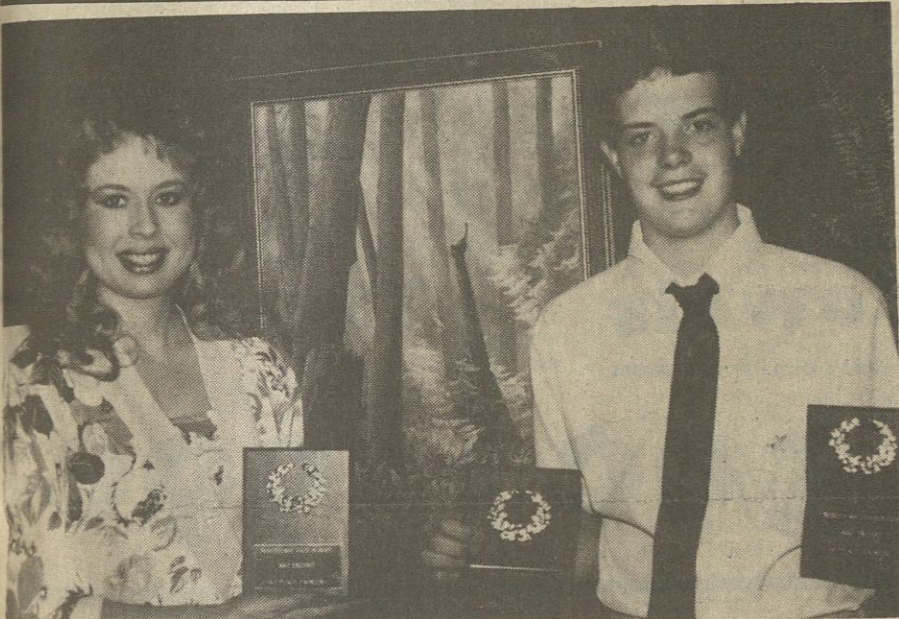

New State Record Bass Caught

Most Mississippi bass fishermen knew one day it would happen, but were never really sure where and when. They knew there was a largemouth bass in some body of water bigger than thirteen pounds, eight ounces.

On May 3, Perry Reed of Ripley caught a fourteen-pound twelve-ounce largemouth from Tippah County Lake to become the new state record holder for that species.

Reed, 22, caught the lunker largemouth on bait casting equipment and ten pound test line with a plastic worm.

The record fish measured over twenty-seven inches long and almost twenty-five inches around.

Tippah County Lake is a 165-acre lake about two miles north of Ripley on state Highway 15. It was impounded by the Soil Conservation Service in 1974.

The lake is managed by the Department of Wildlife Conservation. Facilities there include concession stand, rest rooms, boat ramp, picnic tables, barbecue grills, swimming area, overnight camping area with electrical and water hookups.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Home Maintenance For Springtime

Now is the time that Tishomingo Countians should be inspecting their homes for maintenance and repair needs.

Starting with the roof, the first thing you should inspect for is wind, snow or ice damage. Check to see that the roof shingles are secure, tightly fastened and in good

condition. If any of the shingles are loose, repair with asphalt roofing cement. If they are damaged or missing, replacement will be necessary and may require professional help.

Inspect the flashing around the chimney, in valleys where roofing sections meet, and at intersections between a roof and vertical projections such as plumbing or fan vents, dormers and attached walls. Reflash if the flashing has deteriorated.

If the flashing is in good condition, seal any leaks with a good grade of caulk such as butyl, or aluminized caulk or with asphalt roofing cement.

Next, inspect your masonry chimney for cracks and mortar missing around bricks or blocks. Any patching should be done using a dry mortar such as a stiff but working paste, or masonry cement compound.

Check the gutters and downspouts to be sure that they are securely anchored to the house. Also clean the gutter and downspouts of debris. Notice any areas that need repainting.

If the gutters are galvanized iron or steel, remove the rust with a wire brush, emery cloth and steel wool. Clean with naphtha or other degreasing cleanser and re-cover with paints and primers designed for these surfaces.

Check closely for holes or leaks in gutter troughs or gutter seams. If the leaks are minor, seal with a roofing cement or with a good grade of caulk or sealant. Otherwise, replace the damaged section.

Also check to see that the splash blocks are in good repair. They need to be positioned to direct water at least three feet away from the foundation. If your splash blocks are broken or cracked, they should be replaced.

While outside inspecting your house, also look at any wood, asphalt and asbestos cement siding for damage such as nail pop, cracking, splitting, warping or decay. If warped, realign boards and screws. If the siding is split or damaged, replace the worn sections. If nails have pulled loose, reset the existing nails and add additional nails to secure.

Inspect the house exterior to see that paint is in good condition. If mildew is present, wash the surface with an alkaline cleaning solution such as chlorine bleach. If paint is defective, remove the old paint, then apply a priming coat and repaint. If the paint has failed within two years of application, the cause of failure should be determined before repainting.

Inspect the masonry or brick walls for loose crumbling mortar joints. Repair any mortar immediately to prevent water from seeping through and damaging the walls.

Check all your exterior wood doors, garage doors,

and window and door frames to see that paint or varnish is in good condition. If the paint is chipped or cracked, remove the defective paint. Then apply a priming coat and repaint. If framing members are cracked or rotting, determine the cause. Replace and repaint the damaged areas.

Marijuana is a powerful mind-altering drug. After smoking marijuana, a person's ability to learn, concen-

trate, and react is slowed down. For example some people become very talkative, while others become very quiet. Others become giddy and laugh about things that they usually would not find funny. Marijuana affects everyone in different ways.

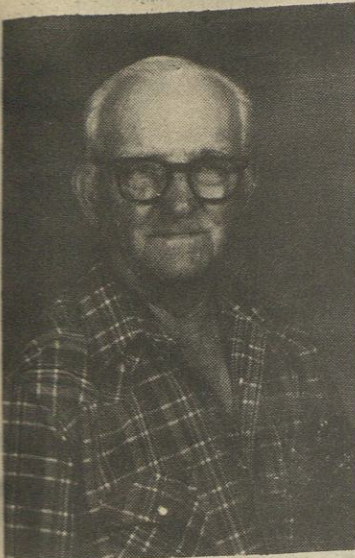

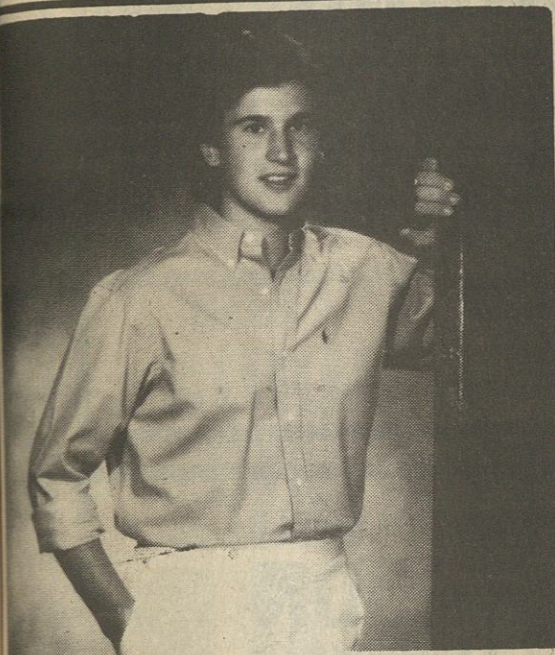


Deatons To Celebrate 50th Wedding Anniversary

(Stop Needless Automobile Peril) Composition Contest and was conducted with the purpose of providing an opportunity for young drivers to become aware of the life-saving value of seat belts.

The award presented to the winner was sponsored by the First American National Bank in Iuka. Phillip is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Bonds of Burnsville. He is a 1987 graduate of Burnsville High School.

Seat Belts Really Save Lives

Do you know that in the next years of normal driving, it is almost a certainty that you will be involved in a motor vehicle accident serious enough to injure or even kill you? You're taking a tremendous risk every time you get into an automobile unless you are also taking action to protect yourself.

Right now, the simplest and most effective protection against possible injury or death in motor vehicle accidents is a fastened safety belt. Most cars on the road today are equipped with a safety belt, but few are performing the simple act of fastening those belts. The result is that far too many people are being injured or killed needlessly.

Safety belts DO make a difference. Did you know that approximately 35,000 people die in cars, light trucks, and

vans equipped with safety belts? It is a proven fact that almost 50 percent (17,000) of these people could be saved if they wore safety belts. Have you ever heard people say, "Well, I only need to wear a safety belt when I go on long trips or when I'm traveling at a high speed?" Well, statistics have proven this myth to be false. Eighty percent of deaths and serious injuries occur in cars traveling under 40 miles per hour and 75 percent of deaths and injuries occur less than 25 miles from your home. Also three out of four crashes happen within 25 miles of your home.

Traveling unbelted in the rear seat of a car will not prevent second collisions or person-to-person collisions in the event of a crash. A common cause of death and injury to children in automobiles is being crushed by adults who are not wearing safety belts. In fact, one out of four serious injuries to passengers is caused by occupants being thrown into each other. Another common myth is, "I don't need a safety belt; in case of accident, I can brace myself with my hands." At 35 miles per hour, the force of impact on you and your passengers is brutal. There is no way your arms and legs can brace you against that kind of collision. The speed and force at just 10 miles per hour is equivalent to the force of catching a 200 pound bag of cement from a first story window.

Obviously, the safety belt problem is serious. It's a real life-and-death issue. No one can escape facing the problem because accidents don't always happen to "someone else." It only requires a few precious

seconds to buckle your safety belt. So let's get smart, America! Buckle up, and encourage others to do the same. After all, seat belts REALLY DO save lives.
