

Higher Electric Rates For Local Customers

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) has informed TVA that it does not intend to pay part of its May power bill. Officials at DOE have told TVA that DOE will reduce its payments by 10 percent a month until its \$42 million-a-month payment is cut in half. DOE's action has forced TVA to take legal action to enforce the minimum bill provision of its contract. During the period that DOE is not paying its bill, TVA must continue to pay its operating costs;

therefore, the shortfall in revenues caused by DOE's failure to pay must be shifted to all other TVA power consumers. Based on preliminary figures, a rate increase of approximately 6% to other TVA consumers will be necessary.

DOE's contract requires TVA to make available 4,485 megawatts of power for uranium enrichment facilities at Paducah, Kentucky, and Oak Ridge, Tennessee. TVA developed its power generating capacity accor-

dingly. DOE's energy requirement is roughly equivalent to 4 large generating units for which TVA has incurred capital costs and operating expenses. Due to a decrease in demand for enriched uranium, DOE no longer needs the amount of energy for which it contracted.

According to Manager Robert Grisham, Tishomingo County Electric Power Association consumers will experience the increase in rates due to DOE's failure to

abide by the terms of its contract with TVA. Recent efforts to prevent increases in operating costs have helped mitigate inflationary expenses to the association. Details of the rate increase are being developed by the TVA staff. The Board of Directors of TCEPA will be reviewing financial data along with these details at their monthly meeting to see what options are available to relieve consumers from the full impact of this rate increase.

Burnsville Woman Injured In Wreck

A Burnsville woman remains in very critical condition at North Mississippi Medical Center as the results of injuries sustained in an automobile wreck which occurred last Thursday about one mile east of Booneville. The accident occurred at 8:45

p.m. on Mississippi 30.

Nelta (Mrs. James) Dailey was reported to have been returning from picking up her son, Craig who had been attending basketball camp at Northeast Mississippi Junior College at the time of the accident. Craig, 17, has been released from the hospital after being treated for a dislocated hip.

Complete details concerning the wreck are unclear, but a spokesman reported that a Prentiss County woman fell from the back of a pickup truck and the Dailey vehicle and another vehicle, driven by Gilbert Patton of Booneville, collided as they swerved to miss the body. Patton reportedly received cuts and bruises and was taken to Booneville Memorial Hospital. The victim identified as Betty Jane Cole was not struck by either vehicle, but apparently died as a result of the fall, reports said.

Ms. Cupples Receives Highest Honor In Memphis

Janet Cummings Cupples, formerly of Burnsville, was presented the Award of Merit by Memphis Mayor Richard C. Hackett. This award is the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a citizen of Memphis. Ms. Cupples founded a project in a Memphis inter-city school to encourage students to strive for higher academics, community involvement, and to Say No To Drugs. The program has been named the "Janet C. Cupples Citizenship Awards." It was attended by Memphis Mayor Richard C. Hackett, Mr. Steve Parker, Assistant to United States District Attorney, and Lt. Walter Crews, Memphis Police Department, along with other city leaders.

On May 5, 1987, Ms. Cupples was made an Honorary Member of The Memphis City Council for her work as Chair of Ethnic Outreach for Neighborhood, a city-wide festival that was attended by 14,000 people. In April, 1987, Janet received the Outstanding Female Participant award from Neighborhood Watch, Inc. Memphis for her work in crime prevention organizations. Janet founded and serves as Chair of The Memphis Women's Committee On Crime, President of Eagle Watch Association, Advisory Board Member of Business Department of Sheffield Vocational-Technical Center, and Second Vice President of the National Organization For Women Memphis.

Janet is listed in the Marquis Who's Who of American Women 1987, Who's Who in The South and Southwest, and was selected this month to the Who's Who of Emerging Leaders in America for 1988.

Stewart Proposes Highway Change

A plan proposed by Northern District Highway Commissioner Zack Stewart this week would accelerate 4-lane construction of Mississippi Highway 25 in Itawamba and Tishomingo Counties.

Commissioner Stewart asked the State Highway Department staff to pursue authorization from the Appalachian Regional Commission to change the proposed route on Corridor V now planned to go northeast from Fairview in Itawamba County to intersect with Alabama 24 at Red Bay. He asked that the route be allowed to follow present Highway 25 to the Belmont-Golden area and then build an intersecting road from Highway 25 to Alabama 24 at Red Bay. This would allow more highway construction to be financed by ARC funds.

"This would speed up 4-laning an important highway in Mississippi 25 and would serve more of the motoring

public," Commissioner Stewart said.

He pointed out that in order to intersect from Fairview to Alabama 24 at Red Bay, a brand new highway of several miles would have to be constructed.

"Highway 25 needs re-habilitating," Mr. Stewart said. "It is crooked, dangerous and highly used. It's important to the development of the Tennessee."

Corridor V projects currently underway include a paving contract from Fulton to Clay and a grading and draining contract of approximately seven miles along Mississippi 6 in Pontotoc County, from Mississippi 15 to west of Pontotoc.

When completed, Corridor V will provide a 4-lane highway from Batesville to Chattanooga; all construction with federal funds through the ARC Corridor Program.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Father: Family Leader

Fathers are so vitally important to the strength and stability of the family. A child views his father as possessing all the traits that are desirable and right in a male. Fortunately is the child whose father is so strong and confident within himself that he is willing to share family power and dominance with each family member.


Power in strong families is shared power. This means that family decisions and rules are made with the input of each person. It should not be necessary for the father to always try to dictate orders. This becomes an impossible and frustrating task. Each family member should be allowed to express opinions,

generate ideas and make suggestions. The family still needs a leader, but no one person should make all the decisions.

This type of power-sharing gives freedom to every member by allowing each individual to express himself. And, this sharing has many positive results: (a) feelings of trust and cooperation develop; (b) the cohesiveness of the family becomes stronger; and (c) a greater number of solutions are offered and therefore contribute to more effective decision-making.

Sharing power is important since every family is made up of a variety of personalities, each playing an important part in the life of the family. Therefore, it is essential that all members develop a strong positive attitude about themselves, and about each member of the family.

Feelings of self-worth is a crucial factor in what happens inside people as well as between people. The family system is no exception. Being accepted by others helps develop a person's self-

concept and generates feelings of being important, loved and appreciated. There is no place where being appreciated and accepted is more important than in the family.

Every family should recognize the individual accomplishments of each member. Simple statements such as "thank you for helping me, you did a nice job!" can convey appreciation for each member's efforts. This type of recognition helps set up a pleasant environment in which mutual respect can grow. Without being given respect, family members have little reason to try to improve their relationships with each other.

The best way of leading a family is by example.

*Require new employees to complete a verification form from the INS certifying eligibility for employment.

*Examine documentation given you by new employees, and record this information on the verification form for such employees.

*If requested, present the verification form for inspection by the INS or the U.S. Department of Labor.

Cool Season Forages

Fescue, our cool season perennial, may be somewhat dormant or slowed in growth now and going into late summer.

Never apply nitrogen during the hot summer months where thick stands of fescue are desired. This is especially true of fungus-free fescue. Nitrogen fertilizer may be used this summer on old fungus-infested fescue containing common bermudagrass and dallisgrass to increase growth of summer grasses.

Nitrogen combined with adequate moisture may harm the cool season grasses during the hot weather months. But, this same combination will promote growth

in warm season grasses.

Control Ticks

With such a mild winter behind us, we're going to have a heavy population of ticks to contend with this summer. Please note the American dog tick is a carrier of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, so protect yourself and your pet.

You can control ticks inside your house with diazinon, dursban or dichlorvos. Around the house and outside houses use sevin, malathion or methoxychlor.

USDA Implements 0/92 Provision

Some producers in the 1987 acreage reduction program may be eligible for deficiency payments on 92 percent of their enrolled acreage although none of it is planted to wheat or other program crops.

A provision of the Farm Disaster Assistance Act, known as the 0/92 provision, is available to:

*all eligible winter wheat producers;

*all producers who operate farms with program crop acreage bases subject to flooding on 50 percent of such crop's permitted acreage during the normal planting season because of levee damage that occurred in 1986.

A producer who did not

enroll in the 1987 acreage reduction program for such crops and who has less than 50 percent of the permitted acreage devoted to such a program crop may become eligible for the 0/92 provision by enrolling no later than July 15 at a local office of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Beginning immediately, application to enroll in the 0/92 may be made at the county ASCS office. The sign-up will be limited to those producers who meet the 0/92 eligibility requirements and who have less than 50 percent of the permitted crop acreage devoted to the program crop.

Limited cross compliance requirements will be in effect for the 1987 crops of wheat, feed grains, cotton, and rice. To be eligible for benefits for a participating wheat, feed grain, upland cotton, or rice crop, the acreage planted for harvest (or approved as prevented planting) on a farm in other nonparticipating program commodities, excluding extra-long staple cotton, may not exceed the crop acreage bases of those commodities.

To be eligible for "0/92," producers must have planted less than 50 percent of the permitted acreage to wheat and designate at least 8 percent of the permitted acres as Conserving Use (CU) acres. No deficiency payment will be received on this CU acreage. However, additional eligible CU acres designated will qualify for deficiency payments under the "0/92" provision. The maximum acres for deficiency payments under this provision is 92 percent of the permitted acreage.

Eligible cropland equal to 37.93 percent of the farm's 1987 acres for wheat payment must be devoted to an Acreage Conservation Reserve. Acres for payment will include acres devoted to wheat, plus CU designated as wheat under the "0/92" provision. The ACR acreage must be protected from wind and water erosion throughout the year.

Political Signs Pose Danger

Persons seeking election to political office should be aware that it is illegal to deface public property with campaign posters and stickers, according to John R. Tabb, director of the Mississippi State Highway Department.

"In the past, we have had problems with road signs being covered with political signs. This causes the road sign to lose its meaning and sometimes creates a dangerous situation for the motorist," Tabb said.

Mississippi Code, 1972, Annotated, Section 65-7-23, states:

"Any person defacing, removing, or destroying any sign or guide board erected as provided shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not exceeding five hundred dollars or be imprisoned in the county jail not more than six months or be punished by both such fine and imprisonment."

Natchez Trace Parkway Trail Upgraded

Natchez Trace Parkway Superintendent James L. Bainbridge has announced the re-opening of the newly upgraded Beech Springs Trail at the Tupelo Visitor Center six miles north of Tupelo. The trail has been widened and a hard surface added. The length has been reduced to 3,060 feet and 18 interpretive labels identify and discuss plants and animals. Three benches have been installed

With vacation season approaching, many pet owners wish to take their pet along as they travel.

Planning and preparation in advance can help make the trip more enjoyable and safer for both pet and owner.

First of all, consider whether you pet is comfortable and happy when traveling. Some animals, like some people, function better in familiar surroundings. A car sick, unhappy animal can make a trip miserable for everyone.

Be considerate. Not all friends or relatives welcome pets. The same goes for hotels, motels, parks, and campgrounds. An advance inquiry can help avoid a frustrating misunderstanding.

Following are some additional suggestions that may make travel with your pet more fun and help to avoid unfortunate situations.

1. Be sure your pet is in good health and up-to-date on all vaccinations and free of parasites before beginning any trip. A visit to your veterinarian a couple of weeks in advance will be worthwhile.

2. Have a health certificate available as well as rabies vaccination certificate, especially if traveling to Canada or Mexico.

3. Be sure your pet wears complete identification with home address and phone num-

ber. The license tag should be worn at all times. Keep your pet on a leash to prevent loss or injury.

4. Take your pet's favorite food, toys and dishes. Dry food will be more convenient if your pet is used to it. Plan to feed the main meal at the end of the day, or after you reach your destination.

5. Plan to stop and allow some exercise. Stopping every two hours or so is recommended.

6. Your pet needs fresh water during the journey also, especially if it is hot. As a rule of thumb, if you're thirsty, chances are your pet is too. (But don't allow too much fluid intake or your stops will have to become more frequent.)

7. Cats will travel better and safer in a suitable carrying case.

8. NEVER leave your pet unattended in a parked car. Heat stroke can occur very quickly in a parked car.

9. A bath and grooming in advance may make the trip more pleasant for all.

Don't automatically eliminate your pet from your travel plans. Just plan in advance.

Narcotics News

Q. What happens to drugs that are seized by your agency?

(S.F. McComb, MS)
A. The average case usually entails drugs being sealed and transported to the Crime Lab for analysis. The drugs undergo a series of test performed by a toxicologist. Once analyzed they are moved to secured storage where they remain until called for by a trial court as evidence. Once the case is resolved, the drugs are destroyed by the seizing agency upon authorization of the Director of Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics and witnessed by two agents of the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics (41-29-154).



Alcorn Man To Head Investigation Bureau

David R. Huggins, an 18-year veteran officer, has been named director of the Mississippi Highway Patrol's Criminal Investigation Bureau (CIB).

The position is that of chief investigator for the Highway Patrol and has the rank of major.

Commissioner of Public Safety James L. Roberts Jr., in announcing the promotion, said Huggins fills the position formerly held by Walter Tucker, who resigned from the agency at the end of May to become chief of police in Meridian.

Huggins, 39, is a native of Corinth and resided in Jackson from 1975 until 1980. His appointment is effective June 1.

The CIB, Enforcement Division and Driver Services Bureau are the three major divisions making up the Mississippi Highway Patrol. The bureau is authorized 50 investigators and supervisory personnel who have general police powers to enforce all laws of the State of Mississippi.

As chief investigator, Huggins is charged with overseeing criminal investigations and related functions of the CIB's Records and Identification Branch, gun permit, brands, and polygraph sections, and correctional intelligence and livestock theft divisions.

"This officer is well-known in Mississippi for his tenaciousness in pursuing the criminal element," Roberts said.

"He moved out of the Highway Patrol's uniformed division 12 years ago, and since that time has worked extensively with federal, state, county and municipal officers in the investigation of felony crimes," the commissioner said.

He said Huggins played a significant role in the FBI's operation "Silverado" last year in Mississippi, which resulted in approximately 400 arrests in seven states.

"Maj. Huggins has the reputation of exhausting every possible avenue to see that felony crimes are solved."

"In am grateful we have an officer of his calibre to place in command of such an important part of the criminal justice system in this state," Roberts said.

Huggins was one of two officers tested for the chief investigator's position under Merit Promotion System guidelines.

The newly named major was commissioned into patrol service as a trooper in 1969, assigned to the Tunica area. He served from 1971 until 1975 in the Senatobia area,

and displayed numbers of public notices through the years. A great deal of property damage has been reported as results of the pre-summer storm. Home and automobile

owners continue to report hail damage which occurred mostly within a 2-3 mile radius in Iuka. Vegetable gardens and flower beds appeared to have been "switched." High winds accompanied by large size hail (some reported golf-ball size) and a down pour of rain put on a spectacular show. Power outages were also reported.

In 1976, Huggins was selected to study specialized criminal investigative techniques at Scotland Yard sponsored by the University of London.

A graduate of Biggersville High School, Huggins attended Northeast and Northwest Mississippi junior colleges, the University of Mississippi, and the University of Southern Mississippi.

He served from 1968 until 1974 in the Army National Guard's Howitzer Battalion, 108th Artillery Unit, where he attained the rank of sergeant.

Huggins is a member of the Tennessee-Mississippi Sheriffs and Peace Officers Association, the Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee Investigators Association, and he serves as a member of the Law Enforcement Coordinating Committee (LECC) for the United States Attorney's Office in the Northern District of Mississippi.

Boat Registration Numbers To Change

Changes are coming for Mississippi boatowners.

Effective July 1, 1987, anyone renewing or transferring a boat registration will receive a new boat registration number, according to state conservation officials.

"That means boatowners will have to change the letters and numbers on their boats when they renew or transfer their registration," said Joe Stone, Executive Director of the Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation.

"This new system goes in to affect July 1, but boatowners don't have to change their numbers until their registration is actually renewed," said Stone.

The new numbering system will help avoid duplication of registration numbers, while easing record-keeping, law enforcement, and the recovery of stolen boats.

Once new numbers are issued, a boat will keep the same number as long as it is registered in Mississippi, even if the boat is traded, sold, or transferred.

All boats propelled by

machinery of any type must be registered with the Department of Wildlife Conservation. Owners should look for their new numbers when they receive their registration certificate.

The law requires that registration numbers be displayed on the boat with letters and numerals at least three inches high and of a contrasting color to the hull.

The fee for a two-year registration is \$2.50.







Stolen Merchandise

Chief Deputy Mayhall inventories merchandise recovered from a rash of burglaries that took place in the county

during the period of June 8-12. An assortment of stolen property was recovered including such items as computers, guns, rods and reels,

appliances, and other household items. Three arrests have been made in connection with these thefts.

Stolen Goods Recovered

A spree of burglaries that began at Burnsville School on Monday night, June 8, were finally brought to a halt by local officials on Friday, June 12, with the arrests of three suspects.

According to Tishomingo Deputy W.C. Mayhall, Michael (Sarge) Voyles, 19, of Route 2, Burnsville; Anthony Scott, 19, of Route 2, Burnsville, and a sixteen year old subject were arrested and charged with grand larceny and breaking and entering.

On Monday, June 8, the Burnsville School was broken into and a VCR and three computer screens were taken. Mayhall said that the trio apparently left the school and moved on to the residence of Eva Richardson at Old Crossroads where they broke out a window in the back of the house to gain entry.

Items reportedly taken from the Richardson home included: two AM/FM clock radios, a copper pot, glassware, toaster, microwave oven, two 22 rifles, stereo, gold pendulum clock, and a man's black leather jacket. Closets and drawers throughout the house had been ransacked.

On Tuesday, June 9, the three were believed to have broken into a shed adjacent to a cabin owned by Richard Gauding at Goat Island. Taken was a Sears battery charger, two rods and reels, a set of welding hoses, and other welding related equipment. Later on the night of June 9, the three allegedly burglarized a boat shed belonging to Bob Brown, taking two boats, 2 life jackets, cutting wires on the boats, and throwing fire extinguishers in the water.

One of the boats was used for joy riding, Mayhall said, but was abandoned for a ski boat which was later left at the Goat Island Marina.

Mayhall alleged the culprits spent Tuesday night until their arrests on Friday breaking into cabins in the Goat Island area where they drank, cooked, and slept, but took nothing other than food and liquor.

All the merchandise has

been recovered by officials except two life jackets. Some of the stolen items were found in a vacant house trailer in Burnsville, some had been sold or traded in Alcorn County, and the liquor was recovered from the area around the lake.

Scott has been released on a \$10,000 grand jury bond. Voyles is being held pending the posting of a \$10,000 grand jury bond. The juvenile is being held for juvenile court which is set for Friday, June 26.

Incorporated areas and fire districts are rated from one to ten with tenth class paying the highest property insurance premiums. Jackson, which has the best insurance rating in the state, is classified as third class.

Burnsville Native, Pete Pyle, Focus Of Collector's Album

Burnsville, Mississippi native, Pete Pyle, singer, songwriter, and former Grand Ole Opry performer, has recently been the focus of a best German record label to has taken many of his 1950 recordings and consolidated them into a collector's album.

The album entitled "Pete Pyle and the Mississippi Hey Boys" includes original recordings done by Pyle from 1940 to 1950 and is presently being distributed throughout all English

speaking nations of the world on the Cattle Record label. Of the 15 songs included on the album are favorites such as "Little Blue Eyed Blond Good-bye," and "Think Twice" (a duet with Pete's wife, the late Naomi Pyle).

Among the musicians playing on the different recordings along with Pete are Edward Crowe, Chet Atkins, Texas Troubadours, Turner Brothers, and the original Oak Ridge Boys.

Pete began his music career at the age of 19 when

he sang on radio shows in Memphis, TN. He went on to receive a record contract from RCA on their Blue Bird label and later moved to Nashville where he auditioned and was hired to perform on the Grand Ole Opry.

Throughout his career, Pete played with such greats as Bill Monroe and the Blue Grass Boys, PeeWee King and the Golden West Cowboys, Ernest Tubbs, and many others.

Pete, who is now retired and presently living in Nashville, TN, is recognized in the Country Music Hall of Fame and is still highly respected by people in the country music industry. He still attends many of the country music events held in the Nashville area such as the annual Country Music Fan Fair and is a member of the Old Timers of the Opry Associates.
