TVA Files Lawsuit To Recover Full Payment From DOE

TVA has filed a lawsuit in the United States District Court in Knoxville against the Department of Energy (DOE) seeking an injunction against DOE to prohibit DOE from reducing its monthly payments to TVA under its two power contracts.

Last week, DOE announced that it planned to reduce its monthly payments to TVA by 10 percent a month until they are only about 50 percent of current payments. At current rates, a withholding of 50 percent would amount to more than \$21 million each

month or more than \$250 million per year. If DOE withholds 50 percent of the amounts payable, TVA would have no choice but to increase overall power rates by 6 percent or more to recover the difference.

"We're asking the court to make DOE live up to its contractual responsibilities, just like any other power customer," said TVA Chairman C.H. Dean, Jr. "There is absolutely no reason for DOE to expect TVA ratepayers to pick up the bill. It would be unfair, in my opinion, if the

people of the Tennessee Valley had to pay because the Department of Energy won't."

The TVA-DOE contracts call for TVA to supply up to 4,485,000 kilowatts of capacity for DOE uranium enrichment facilities at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and Paducah, Kentucky -- an amount equivalent to the output of five large nuclear reactors. TVA has invested billions of dollars preparing to meet DOE's power needs.

To ensure the financial soundness of the power system and protect the interests of all ratepayers, TVA

requires large power users to sign long-term contracts which provide for minimum monthly payments to recover costs of building the power plants and other electric power facilities to serve those large loads. Because TVA must incur such costs to be ready to make the power available, the minimum payments must be made regardless of whether a customer chooses to use the power it has asked for. DOE agreed to such arrangements in its contract and now refuses to pay.

County Unemployment Rises To 18.5 Percent For Mid-May

Unemployment in Tishomingo County edged up slightly at mid-May according to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. Smith noted that recent statistics indicated a slight increase in the number unemployed representing 18.5 percent of the civilian labor force, compared to 18.2 percent in April and 15.3 percent in May, 1986.

The labor force for the county rose to 7,040, 100 above the previous estimate but 530 below the estimate for May, one year ago. The number of Tishomingo County residents employed rose to 5,740, compared to 5,680 in April and

6,410 in May, 1986. Manufacturing employment for the county stood at 2,250, slightly below the previous estimate and approximately 500 below the estimate for May, one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment, estimated to be 2,600, edged up slightly at mid-month experiencing a small decline from one year ago.

Smith also commented that the civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo rose to 60,770 at mid-May, some 370 over the April figure. However, a sub-

stantial loss of 2,680 was experienced from one year ago. Unemployment in the six-county area declined slightly at mid-month. There was an estimated 6,260 individuals unemployed, or 10.3 percent of the civilian labor force. This compares to 11.0 percent in April and 13.5 percent in May, 1986. The number of area residents employed

climbed to 54,510, compared to 53,770 last month and 54,910 one year ago.

Manufacturing employment in the six-county area was estimated to be 17,560, some 40 above the previous estimate but 530 below the figure for one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment experienced a rise of 120 from April and 210 over May, 1986.

Farmer's Market Now Open In Iuka

The Iuka Farmer's Fresh Vegetable Market is now open in Jay Bird Park in downtown Iuka.

According to Wm. M. Hopper, County Agent, the market will be open on Tuesdays and Fridays of each week throughout the summer.

All producers in the county are welcome to sell their homegrown vegetables, berries, and fruits at this market, and those of you who

did not grow a garden are invited to come by and look over the fresh produce and buy whatever you need. It would be best to come early in the morning and select your produce while it is still fresh and the selection at its best.

The following rules have been developed for the market to operate by:

1. Sellers will be restricted to produce grown by them in the local area.

2. No fee will be charged to sellers.

3. Prices will be determined by the individual seller.

4. Producers will sell only field fresh vegetables and fruits of good quality and will use correct weights or measurements.

5. Each seller will be required to maintain his area in a neat, clean and orderly manner during the hours of the sale and to leave the area in like manner.

No loud profanity or intoxicating beverages will be permitted in the market area.

How To Avoid Too Much Fat, Saturated Fat And Cholesterol

People in Tishomingo County who are health conscious or weight conscious, may be concerned about the amount of fat in their diet. Diets high in fats have been associated with the leading cause of death in the United States -- heart disease. Fat, whether it is saturated or unsaturated, contains twice as many calories by weight as protein or carbohydrates. Because fat is the most concentrated source of calories, eating too much fat can contribute to weight problems.

The third guideline in the Dietary Guidelines for Americans is to "avoid too much fat, saturated fat and

cholesterol." The problem that confronts many people is how to translate this recommendation into a shopping list and menu for themselves and their families.

In general, this means eating more fruits, vegetables, cereal grains and starches, which have less fat and no cholesterol. This also means choosing vegetable oils such as safflower, sunflower, corn and soybean oils that have higher levels of polyunsaturated acids.

Here are some tips to help in choosing and preparing foods lower in saturated fat and cholesterol:

*Switch from butter or a hydrogenated margarine high in saturated fatty acids to one higher in polyunsaturates. Soft tub margarines made from corn, safflower or sunflower oils are the best choices.

*Use skim or low-fat (1 percent) milk.

*Buy lean grades of meat and trim visible fat. Prepare mixed dishes that combine meat with other foods (vegetable stews or pasta, for

example). Eat organ meats, such as liver, brain and kidney, only occasionally.

Broil, bake or roast meat, fish and poultry instead of pan-frying or deep-fat frying. Basting with wine, broth, lemon or tomato juice will prevent drying and give good flavor.

*Eat more fish, poultry (without skin), and dried peas and beans.

*Substitute low-fat sandwich meats for higher-fat cold cuts, and use low-fat hot dogs instead of regular varieties. Serve sliced turkey breast, low-fat ham, and tuna or chicken salad instead of bologna and other processed sandwich meats.

*Use salad dressings made from oils other than coconut or palm (olive oil, for instance). Use yogurt as a substitute for sour cream.

*Substitute sherbert, ice milk or nonfat frozen yogurt or tofu desserts for ice cream.

*When baking, cut back on cholesterol-laden egg yolks by using only the whites or by discarding every other yolk and substituting a teaspoon of polyunsaturated oil for each discarded yolk.

*Reduce the amount of fat in recipes by a third to a half. If you use commercial cake mixes, for example, buy those to which you add the fat or oil. Use a polyunsaturated oil and reduce the amount by a third, while increasing the water. For example, if the recipe calls for three tablespoons of oil, use only two, but add an extra tablespoon of water.

*Cut down on baked goods made with lard, coconut oil, palm oil or shortening, and those deep fried in fat, such as doughnuts.

*Use low-fat dried milk instead of nondairy creamers for coffee. These creamers are generally high in saturated fats.

*Instead of whipped cream or commercial toppings (which are high in fat, especially saturated fats), make your own with nonfat dried milk, or use a yogurt, tofu or fruit topping.

*Substitute low-fat cheese such as part-skim mozzarella and ricotta in place of regular varieties. Some products are promoted as substitutes for cheese; read the label to see

with this law and abide by it. Last week I gave you some general principles and procedures to follow in hiring employees. I'd like to address two specific areas in this column. The first concerns employees that were hired before November 7, 1986. The new law, called the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, was signed by President Ronald Reagan on November 7, 1986. Here are some points for employers to consider regarding employees hired before the law went into effect.

There is no requirement to verify the status of employees hired before November 7, 1986. You can verify, if you want to, by having them fill out a verification form. If you choose to do so, you must verify for ALL employees.

No sanction penalties can be imposed against you for merely retaining an illegal alien (noncitizen) in your workforce hired before November 7, 1986. The fact that an illegal alien was on your payroll before November 7, 1986, does not give him or her any right to legally remain in the United States.

Unless an illegal alien is legalized or otherwise obtains permission from the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) to remain in the U.S., he or she is subject to arrest and removal.

One question you may now have is what to do regarding employees or applicants known as illegal aliens. Under the new law, certain illegal aliens may apply to the INS

for legal resident status. Aliens who have resided in the U.S. in unlawful status since January 1, 1972, may now apply under the legalization program.

Field workers in perishable agricultural commodities for a 90-day period may apply for legal status under the Special Agricultural Worker (SAW) program. This 90-day period of work must have taken place between May 1, 1985, and May 1, 1986.

If you are an employer, you should advise undocumented aliens that legalization and SAW assistance is available. Also make sure you assist past and present employees who may qualify for these programs by providing them documentation of employment history.

Stinging Pests

Watch out for wasps, yellow jackets and hornets this summer. Their activities are well underway. It is important that you recognize these insects and the types of nests they build.

Yellow jackets build flat paper nests enclosed in paper envelopes. The nest sites are usually in the ground or hidden in other locations. Bald-faced hornets, black and white in color, tend to nest in trees and buildings. Giant hornets may nest in trees, wall voids or in the ground.

Paper wasps build flat, open nests under leaves or sheltered locations. The only effective means of dealing with wasps, yellow jackets and hornets, if they become a problem, is to treat the nests.

Pyrethrin or resmethrin sprays work well when applied directly into the nest. Be sure to treat at night to get all inhabitants of the nest.

Camping With Your Pet

Sitting around a campfire seems to bring out the best in all of us -- including the family dog. Most dogs enjoy the outdoors as much as the most avid camper.

Fortunately for campers, most outdoor recreational facilities welcome pets. You will, however, want to check with officials at your specific destination before finalizing your camping plans.

Dogs are welcome throughout the 151 national forests, including all those in Tennessee.

National parks, including the Great Smoky Mountains, allow dogs. The animals, however, are not permitted to go along into the wilderness areas.

Officials at both the national parks and national forests ask that dogs be kept on a leash at all times. This is for the animal's safety as well as in consideration of other visitors.

The national parks also request that dogs remain in a tent or camper overnight, and that a little clean-up device be used to keep the campsite clean.

If you plan to visit one of the 38 state parks in Tennessee, you should know that animals are not allowed in the state's

overnight lodging facilities. And dogs in the parks are required to be leashed at campsites.

As a general rule, both public and private campgrounds are very accommodating. Many provide special exercise areas for dogs.

Many campgrounds require licensing and proof of a recent rabies vaccination, so it's a good idea to visit your veterinarian for a check-up prior to taking your dog on a trip.

Be sure and tell your veterinarian where you plan to go so he or she can alert you to potential dangers to your animal's health in that particular area.

After careful planning and consultation with your veterinarian, camping with your pet can be an enjoyable experience.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir:

In reference to the letter last week regarding hiring practices at J.P. Coleman, I would like to state that I agree with Mr. Robinson. However, I would also like to point out that Mr. Robinson failed to collect all the pertinent facts.

J.P. Coleman (and other state parks) must have temporary employees. Many, but not all, of the unemployed do not wish to interrupt their unemployment benefits by accepting a temporary job. As I have witnessed personally, many unemployed and those on welfare are perfectly happy to stay where they are. Our state has made it too convenient and even enticing to STAY unemployed. I'm sure Coleman would be glad to hire college students but their schedules do not always coincide with that of the park. These "teachers" who work in the summer are the same employees who fill-in during overload weekends, on holidays, special events and any other time they are needed. College students are not always available at these times. And I might mention that out of 15 positions this summer, 9 are filled by college students and one by a high school student. If Mr. Robinson had taken the time to check with the state, he would have discovered that Coleman had been instructed by the state to place an adult at the park entrance because of problems at other park entrances. Also, to be a ranger, one must be 21 years of age - few college students desiring temporary employment are this age. I also completely agree that "it doesn't take a lot of skill" to collect money at the entrance or "ride around the park and collect money from the campers." It is humiliating to say the least, to see our teachers performing such menial jobs. We can thank our marvelous legislature for that!

Mississippi teachers are lowest paid in the nation. A male in Mississippi must seek additional income because he cannot support a family on the meager salary he is forced to accept. It is a

wonder we have any teachers left. I am a teacher and have nearly as many hours of college as a doctor but I do not make 1/2 salary! Teachers are required to return to work every few years to current. Teachers should be well educated - our leaders - but legislators responsible for our state, and I'd bet we check or require them to even a high school diploma. The last great education committee (comprised of legislators) was headed by Buddy Newman who had NO children in schools, and NO ONE on the committee had a degree. ANY COLLEGE HOURS we can find in school administration. If I had college hours in my life, would the state let me teach? Hardly!

Our legislature has too many raising their salary and requiring work from already overworked teachers to consider. I feel this is having a negative effect on the state. We are fast becoming an illiterate nation, a nation of incompetents, of slackers waiting for a handout. Can't we see it is leading?

So, since our teachers cannot collect money, they moonlight to supplement their paltry incomes. Should we commend their initiative?

Now that you have information Mr. Robinson, don't you think you made a mistake in your assessment of J.P. Coleman (who is considered by many to be one of the best, if not THE best, in the state)?

From Frogs & "Horney-Heads" To International Timber Trade

was one of those typical summer days of the mid-1970s in the small rural town of Paden, Mississippi, in Shomingo County. A young boy had just spent the better part of this day down at a little creek near town, chasing crabs, catching horney-head and taking his first chew on tobacco - all the necessary things to do in growing up. As the sun began to set in the west, Mr. Sid, an elderly gentleman, comes out on the back porch to take a dip of water after supper and play a little while. The young boy goes running over to the gentleman's house and sits a seat on the door steps, like so many times before, just as Mr. Sid begins to say "Turkey in the Straw."

Then comes another song, "Orange Blossom Special" and the old gentleman stops to take a dip of snuff. The young boy anxiously waits. He knows it's time for a story. What will the story be about today? ... making moonshine whiskey over in Freedom Hills; fighting game roosters; crappie fishing on the Tennessee River, or sawmilling. "No, not today, Son," the old gentleman says.

"You know they are going to build a waterway down at the canal someday. They been saying for years that the government is going to dig a big ditch down there, big enough to float the Mississippi River Queen." The old gentleman goes on to tell the young boy about the plans for the Tennessee-Tombigbee and expresses his dream to witness such an event, although he instin-

ctively knows his age will probably not allow him to do so.

The young boy goes home and daydreams about the story. How will they dig through the hills? How will the river look? Will water cover the small town he now lives in? Visions of the Mississippi River Queen coming down a river which doesn't exist race through his head.

The concept of connecting the Tennessee River with the Gulf of Mexico has intrigued man since the eighteenth century. Sieur de Bienville, the founder of Mobile, is said to have been the first person who officially proposed the project when he explained his ideas to King Louis XIV of France. The king didn't show much interest in the idea, and it was not until 1874 that Congress authorized the first

Federal study. In 1972, ninety-eight years and many studies later, construction began on the 234 mile Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. The "Tenn-Tom," as it is commonly called, is divided into three distinct sections depending on the means of construction.

The lower section, called the river section, is 149 miles long and was constructed by dredging a 300-foot-wide by 9-foot deep channel in the Tombigbee River. This section includes the Gainesville Lock and Dam near Gainesville, Alabama; Aliceville Lock and Dam near Pickensville, Alabama; Columbus Lock and Dam near Columbus, Mississippi, and Aberdeen Lock and Dam near Aberdeen, Mississippi.

The middle section, called the canal section, is 46 miles long and is constructed by building a "chain of lakes" canal East of the Tombigbee River. The chain of lakes was created by constructing a levee on the West side of the canal's route and allowing the canal waters to flow naturally to high ground on the East side. Excavation on the East side of the levee provides a channel that is a minimum of 12 feet deep and 300 feet wide. The five locks in the canal section are identified by the letters, A, B, C, D, and E.

The northernmost section of the waterway is called the divide section and is 39 miles in length with a navigation channel 12 feet deep and 280 feet wide. The maximum cut through the natural divide between the Tennessee River and Tombigbee River basins is 175 feet deep and occurs near the Town of Paden, Mississippi. The average depth of cut through the divide is 50 feet. At the actual divide, the width of the cut across its top is 1,500 feet. Bay Springs Lock and Dam is the only navigation feature in the divide cut. The divide required the moving of 150 million yards of earth and rock, or roughly one-half that required for the entire water-

way.

The enormity of the Tenn-Tom project can be partially realized by comparing it with the Panama Canal. It is five times longer than the Panama Canal. The amount of earth removed to build the Tenn-Tom 307 million cubic yards - was 1/4 greater than the amount removed to build the Panama Canal, and the total lift of 341 feet on the Tenn-Tom is more than 3 1/2 times greater than that of the Panama Canal. More than 25 million man hours of labor, some 2.2 million cubic yards of concrete and 33,000 tons of steel went into building the Tenn-Tom.

The Tenn-Tom Waterway was constructed to provide an efficient and economical means of transporting bulk cargo between the inland United States and the Gulf of Mexico. Bulk shipments on the waterway include coal, petroleum, metallic and non-metallic minerals, chemicals, farm products, forest products, ores, metals, and other commodities. Shipments on the waterway are expected to gradually build up to some 40 million tons annually.

The completion of the nation's newest waterway also resulted in 13,000 acres being set aside for public recreation. Additionally, the waterway provides some 44,000 acres of water surface for water sports enthusiasts. Recreational areas provide the public the opportunity to enjoy camping, picnicking, swimming, boating, hunting and fishing, as well as outdoor and water sports. Some are calling these new lakes the fishing mecca of the South (Mr. Sid would flash a wide smile if he could see the slab crappie being caught at Bay Springs these days).

The summers aren't lazy anymore for the young man who used to play at the small creek. He is Brendix Glasgow, County Forester in Shomingo County. Mr. Sid was right, but he never got to see that first barge go down the "Big Ditch" on January 16, 1985, the first commercial tow, the EDDIE WAXLER traveled through Bay Springs lock. The hopes and dreams of many generations finally became a reality. Just as time changed the little boy into a young man, so the small

creek evolved into a major waterway. Everytime Glasgow goes across the bridge spanning the Tenn-Tom at Paden, he says he can almost hear "Turkey in the Straw" playing and visualize the barge in the distance as being the Mississippi River Queen.

The Tenn-Tom has already attracted timber industry along the Waterway. The Weyerhaeuser Company built a multi-million dollar pulp and paper mill complex at Columbus several years ago, then constructed a giant chipping mill at Amory which has been in operation about one year. Chips are shipped by barge and sold on the open market.

A sawmill complex is under construction at Fulton which will utilize pine timber.

There are also strong rumors of a new pulp and paper mill to be constructed at either Amory or Aberdeen.

According to Forestry Commission District Forester George Ayers, the timber industry looks brighter than ever in the Northeast Mississippi area because of

the waterway. He sees prices for local timber rising to some degree and the waterway developing new and better markets.

Murrah was the special guest and she checked our blood pressure.

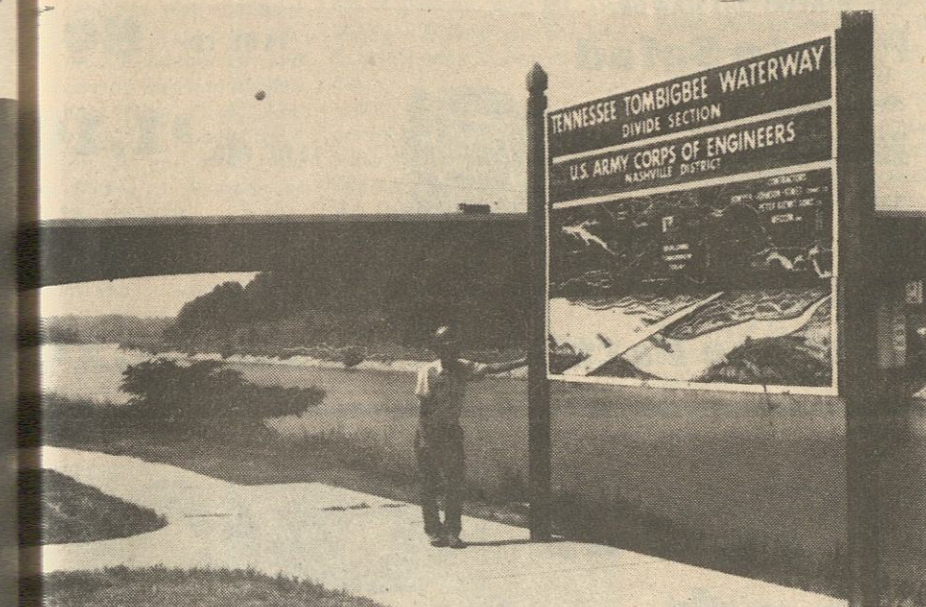
Recreation was a white elephant sale. After refreshments the meeting adjourned to meet in July with Lois Tucker and Quay Rushing.

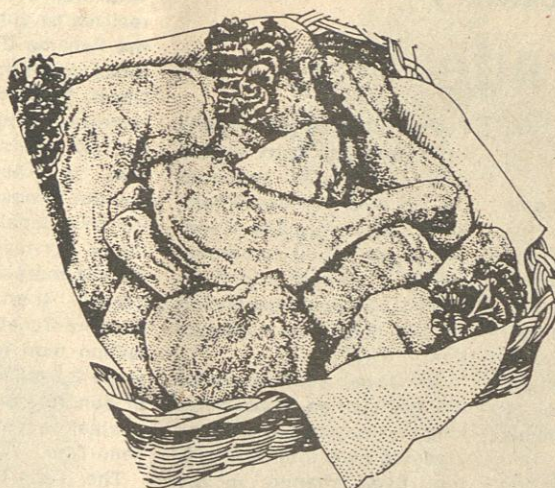

Forestry News

By: Brendix Glasgow, County Forester

The Mississippi Forestry Commission was created by the State Legislature in 1926 when leading citizens became alarmed at the rapid destruction of the forests of the state and the poverty which threatened to follow if this situation was allowed to continue.

The Commission has one major purpose which has been pursued with dedicated vigor for half a century: build the prosperity of the people of Mississippi.

The Commission has been assigned many responsibilities by laws enacted in the Legislature designed to help all Mississippians enjoy a better life through more productive forests and industries. Some of these are:

1. Fire Protection - to prevent forest fires, to extinguish wildfires as swiftly as possible so that damage can

be kept to a minimum.

2. Forest Management - to assist landowners with forest management problems, to encourage better forest management, to encourage landowners that idle and unproductive land needs to be put back into production through one of the cost share programs, (FIP or FRDP).

3. Insect and Disease Control - to advise landowners on insect and disease problems in forest and around the yard, assist landowners during insect and disease epidemics, to conduct systematic surveys, to promote good forest management - a key to insect and disease prevention.

4. Information and Education - keep the public aware of Commission services and activities, to keep the public aware of the value of our forests to all citizens, to work in the schools teaching and demonstrating forest conser-

I'd like to bring all ownerships possible under proper forest management. So my objective is to take the services of the Mississippi Forestry Commission to the landowners.

In Tishomingo County, private landowners own 83% of the total forest land. Most of these owners are not utilizing assistance available to them in developing their forest lands.

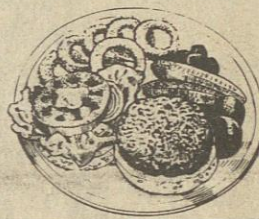

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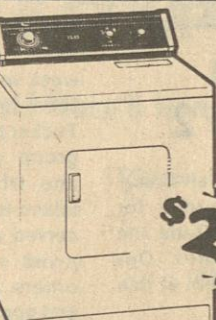

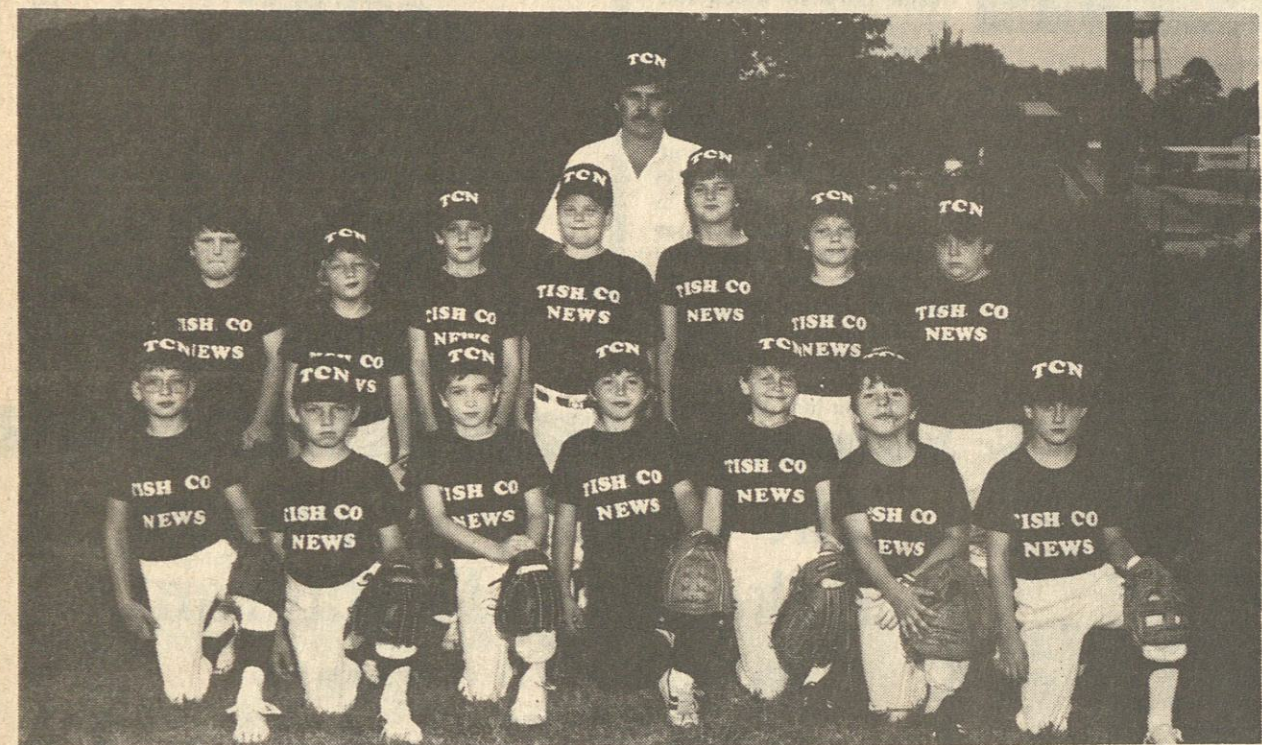

Highway 30 East in the Mingo Community. The congregation invites everyone to come out and sing praises unto the Lord.

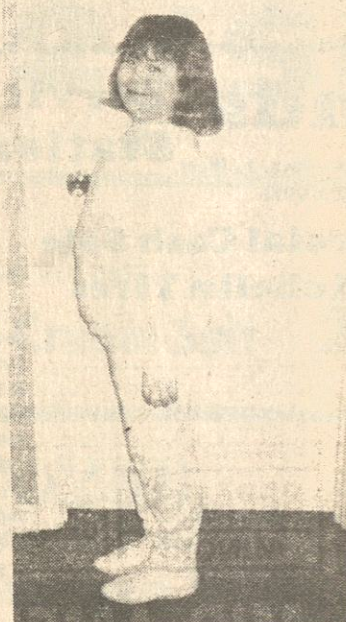

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World War II Veteran Johnny Smith Awarded Bronze Star Medal

Forty-two years after the surrender of Germany marking the end of the Second World War and armed conflict in Europe, the U.S. Army has belatedly awarded a Bronze Star Medal, America's fourth highest military decoration to John McKin Smith for meritorious achievement and commendable action against an armed enemy of the United States on the field of battle. Mr. Smith was a member of M Company of the 2nd Infantry Regiment and participated in battles in both France and Germany in 1945. Mr. Smith's children recently presented him with stored copies of his parent's history books describing the 272nd's activities during the war and other memorabilia of his many days including a plaque displaying the following military medals: The Good Conduct Medal, European-Middle East Campaign Medal with two bronze stars for the Rhineland, Central Europe Campaigns, World War II Victory Medal, and World War II Occupation Medal (Germany).

While gathering these records and mementos, it was determined that the Bronze Star Medal was authorized and had never been issued. Verification was requested and on May 13, 1987, the U.S. Army made it official by sending a certificate from the Adjutant General's office indicating recognition and a Bronze Star Medal engraved with his name.

Mr. Smith a retired Iuka merchant was reared in Tishomingo County and is an active member of the local VFW Post. Mr. Smith, like so many other Mississippians was proud to serve his country and defend the freedom we enjoy as Americans as we celebrate the Fourth of July.

Waterway Waterfowl

One recent survey revealed 45,000 ducks of every species represented on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. With strong public support and good wildlife management techniques, the Corps of Engineers hopes to greatly increase the population numbers. Here are some interesting facts about the waterfowl that live or migrate along the waterway.

Canada geese marry for life. These monogamous birds go through the courtship and then forget the procedure after a pair bond is formed. Thus, if one mate dies the surviving mate cannot pair again.

Snow geese speedsters. Snow

geese can travel up to 46 kilometers per hour (that's 29 mph) on a long migration flight. When pursued, ducks can fly 90 km/hr or about 59 mph.

Babies favor green. Ducklings and goslings of most species prefer to peck at the color green over any other color. Yellow is the second most preferred color.

Some ducks migrate the wrong way. Winter quarters are not always equator-ward from breeding areas. Some Blue-Winged Teal and Redhead ducks may be stopping on the Tennessee-Tombigbee enroute to the Atlantic coast from their prairie state breeding grounds.

Mother Mallards and infanticide. A lead factor in causing mortality among wild mallard ducks is the defensive attack of females against mallard broods other than their own.

"Mudballing" kills ducks. Gentle rains can turn clay soil into mud that clings to bird's

feet, weighting them down. Ducks often die from exhaustion after flying with large balls of mud on their feet. Mallards and Pintails can acquire one to two pounds of mud on their feet.

Starving Mallards. Wild Mallards can live without food for up to three weeks in cool temperatures. Hens are usually more resistant to starvation than Drakes.

Holding their breath. A Mallard can stay under water for 16 minutes common Loons can stay under for 15 minutes and are found at depths of up to 55 meters. Old squaws often submerge to depths of 10 meters.

Eggs made unsavory. A Shoveler, when suddenly alarmed by a predator, will squirt excrement over its eggs before fleeing. This renders the eggs distasteful to mammalian predators.

Hen/egg conversations. Two days prior to hatching, young Mallard ducks will begin vocalizing, and the hen will respond with frequent clucks. This serves as an early method of imprinting the duckling to the mother. A Woodduck will respond to its mother's call before hatching by increased bill clapping.

Nesting structures. The Corps has constructed and placed over 1100 Woodduck boxes along the waterway. Also, 25 goose nesting platforms were placed on Columbus Lake.

With the Fourth of July just around the bend, people are beginning to make plans for the celebration. When they start making a list of the things they need, the first thing they think of is fireworks. The Corps would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that it is a violation of Title 36 to possess or use fireworks on government property, unless written permission is received from the District Engineer. Anyone caught in violation of Title 36 may face a fine of up to \$500 or 6 months imprisonment. The Corps would like to see everyone come to the Tennessee-Tom-

bigbee Waterway on the Fourth of July and have an enjoyable and safe time. However, please leave the fireworks at home.

Point Of Law

legal rights.)

Q. I entered into an oral agreement with an acquaintance to buy his house and lot for \$50,000. I paid him \$500 as earnest money. He has now informed me that he has changed his mind and refuses to complete the sale. He has also refused to return my earnest money. Can I force him to sell me the house, or at least to return my money?

A. Contracts for the sale of real estate, including a house

and lot, must generally be in writing to be enforceable. Unless your seller has signed some written memorandum setting forth the basic terms of your agreement, you will not be able to force him to sell you the property. You can, however, sue him for the return of your earnest money.

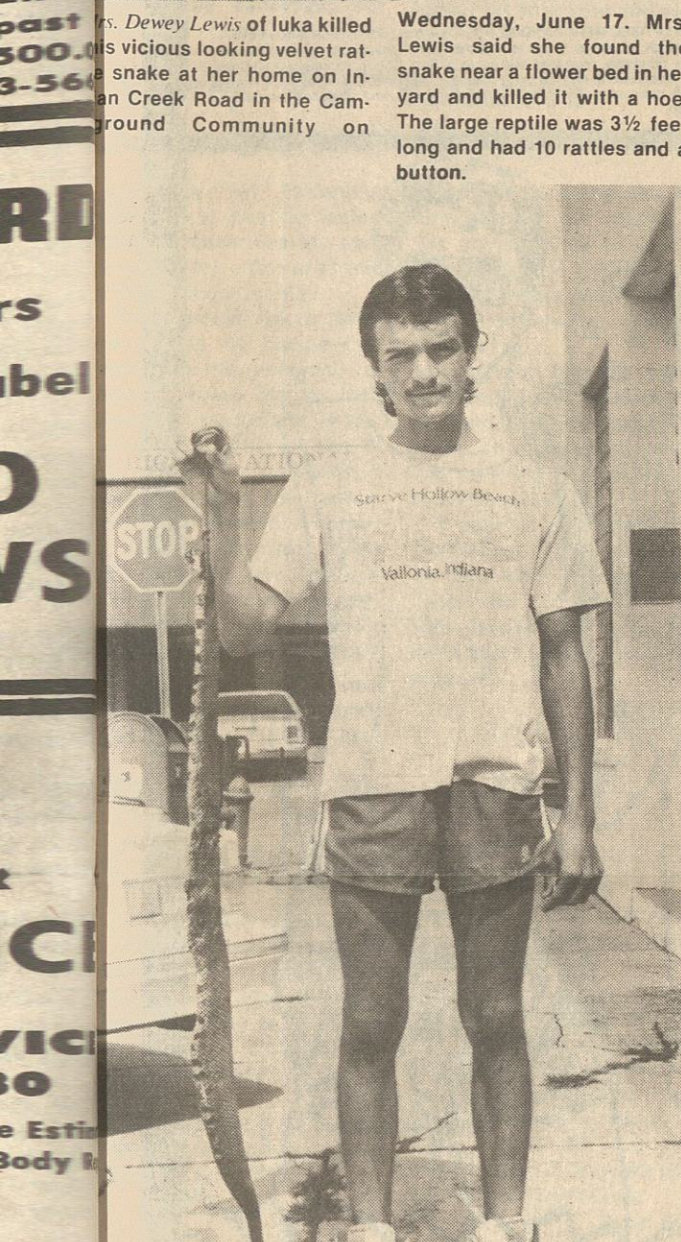

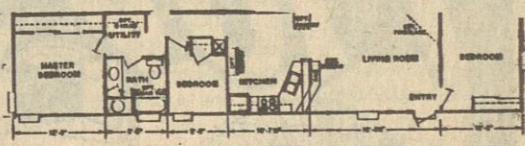

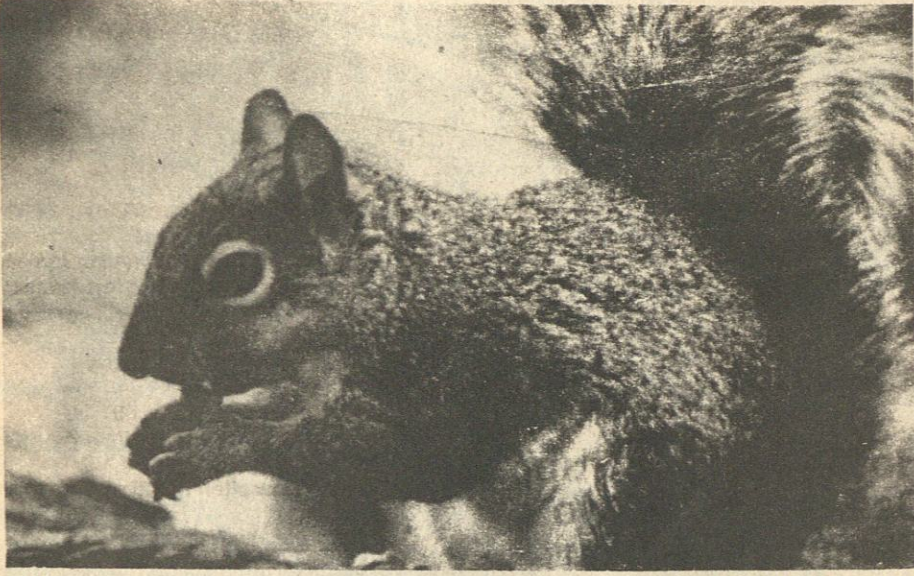

Soil Conservation

Wildlife, like mankind, must have food, shelter, clean water, and pure air to survive. A world without wildlife would be a sad place

in which to live.

No pictures of nature or wildlife can be substituted for the experience of walking in the woods and see the scampering of rabbits or squirrels before us. It is difficult to even think what our country would be like without wildlife.

We could not take our sons hunting. Neither could we sit on a hilltop and enjoy listening to the hounds as they chase a fox along the hill side. Wildlife furnish food, enjoyment and recreation for mankind.

The Tishomingo County

and Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners share this concern of the importance of wildlife to our well being. Good wildlife management is one of their goals in good resource management for the county.

The District, with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service, encourages land owners to plan and manage areas for wildlife food and cover. Planning assistance is given by the Soil Conservation Service for such practices as - leaving a few acorn or nut bearing trees per acre to provide food for squirrels and deer; planting turn rows, ditch banks and small corners in bi-color or some other lespedeza, or reseeded soybeans for quail and song birds; browntop millet for quail and dove food; or planting field borders in fescue, ryegrass or oats for rabbits and deer food. Firebreaks in timber lands or electric power lines are also

good areas that can be established in wildlife food plants.

For more information on wildlife food planting, contact the local Soil Conservation Service at 115 Front Street.
