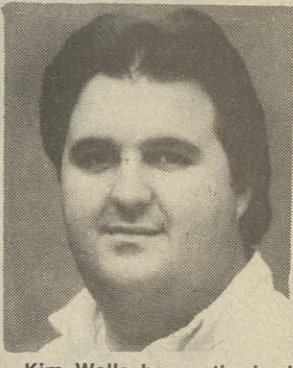
Certainly by now you have discovered once they start using drugs they will do what they have to do to get it.

## Decomposed Body Found Near B'ville

The skeletal remains of a body believed to be that of a white male was discovered Tuesday afternoon, July 21, near Meeks Grocery on Highway 72 about 1 mile west of Burnsville.

Unconfirmed reports indicate the body was found after a passerby noticed a

wrecked 1986 Toyota pickup that appeared to have ran off the road and flipped over. Officials were notified and the body was found about 50 yards from the wreck.

Authorities have found that the vehicle was reported stolen by a Santa Ana, California, resident on April

15. California authorities have been notified and asked to check missing person reports since the theft.

According to Tishomingo County coroner, the victim was wearing tennis shoes, jeans, and what appeared to be a shirt. A wallet containing drivers license was found and has been sent to Jackson for

possible re-construction. There was no money in the wallet.

Investigators at this time are treating the case as a motor vehicle accident; however, all possibilities will be checked out. The remains have been sent to Jackson for an autopsy and possible identification.

## Elderly Iuka Man Dies In Two Vehicle Crash



One Dies In Crash

One life was lost in a week-end accident that occurred just west of Iuka on Highway 72 Saturday morning. George

Vandiver, driver of a 1975 green and white Ford pickup was apparently attempting to cross the highway when struck by a west bound car.

Passengers in the car also sustained injuries in the mishap and were carried to Tishomingo Hospital and later transferred to North Mississippi Medical Center.

George Vandiver, 76, Iuka, died Saturday morning, July 18, 1987, as a result of injuries received in a two car collision that occurred on Highway 72, west of Iuka. Also injured in the mishap were Betty Depriest, 53, Lillie Logan, 10 months, Vickie Logan, 30, and Jason Rinks, 12, all of Thomason, Georgia.

Reports indicate that Mr. Vandiver, traveling alone, was attempting to cross Highway 72 from Mt. Gilead Road and was struck by the 1977 brown Pontiac, which was traveling west on the new 4-lane.

The victims were transported to Tishomingo Hospital by ambulance. Mr. Vandiver died en route. Depriest, both Logans, and Rinks were treated at the Tishomingo Hospital for head wounds and was then transferred to the North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo.

Mr. Vandiver was a retired railroad worker and a member of Bethel Missionary Baptist Church.

Funeral services were Monday, July 20, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. David Gregg officiating. Burial was in Mount Gilead Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Lucille Vandiver of Iuka; one daughter, Shirley Williams of Iuka; four sons, Lucian Vandiver of Kingwood, Texas, Jimmie Vandiver of Humble, Texas, Dale Vandiver of Nashville, Tenn., and Gorman Vandiver of Iuka; four sisters, Audie Twitty and Mary Whitfield, both of Iuka, Oley McNair and Euda Lewis, both of Corinth; 10 grandchildren.

## Garan, Inc. To Open Garment Plant In Iuka

Garan, Inc. will open a sewing plant in Iuka August 17. The plant will be located in the old Western Auto building next door to First American National Bank and will employ 40 to 50 people.

The two year contract for the building was signed Tuesday, July 21, and officials will begin moving in equipment Wednesday morning. The machines should all be placed by the first week of August, according to Roger Leggett, Manufacturing Manager.

Applications were taken Friday and Saturday, July 17 and 18, in order to satisfy

Garan's need for sufficient labor. There was tremendous response with some 300+ applicants. Initial employees will be hired from these applicants including hopefully a local supervisor. Screening and interviewing of potential employees will begin within the next two weeks. Pay rate will be incentive based.

The Iuka plant will manufacture boys size 8-18 knit shirts. Production of 2,000 dozen shirts per week is expected.

Headquarters for the sewing plants is Starkville. The Iuka location will be a satellite plant from the

Adamsville, Tennessee plant. Garan has operated in Mississippi for over 30 years with plants also located in Tennessee, Alabama, Kentucky, Louisiana, and Arkansas.

Mr. Leggett said that they have been made to feel at home and are looking forward to becoming a part of our community, and expressed appreciation for the cooperation and efficient manner in which all the transactions were handled.

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## Chatting With Your Home Economist

Choose Melon For  
Nutritious Light Eating

Cantaloupe and honeydew season is here. This is the best time of the year to get the best quality melon at the lowest price.

According to the Texas Fresh Promotional Board, a recent survey revealed that melons were among the top choices for favorite fruits. Besides being tasty, melons are healthy food choices.

One-fourth of a cantaloupe contains 100 percent of the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance of vitamin A and 100 percent of the USRDA for vitamin C. One-fifth of a honeydew has 150 percent of the USRDA for vitamin C. Both melons are high in potassium, low in calories and sodium and contain no fat or cholesterol.

Cantaloupe are small round melons about the size of a large grapefruit. The flesh inside is bright orange and very sweet.

When shopping for a ripe cantaloupe look for one that

is "full slip" meaning that it has been pulled from the stem mature. If the fruit is not mature only part of the stem pulls off and leads to a "half slip" fruit.

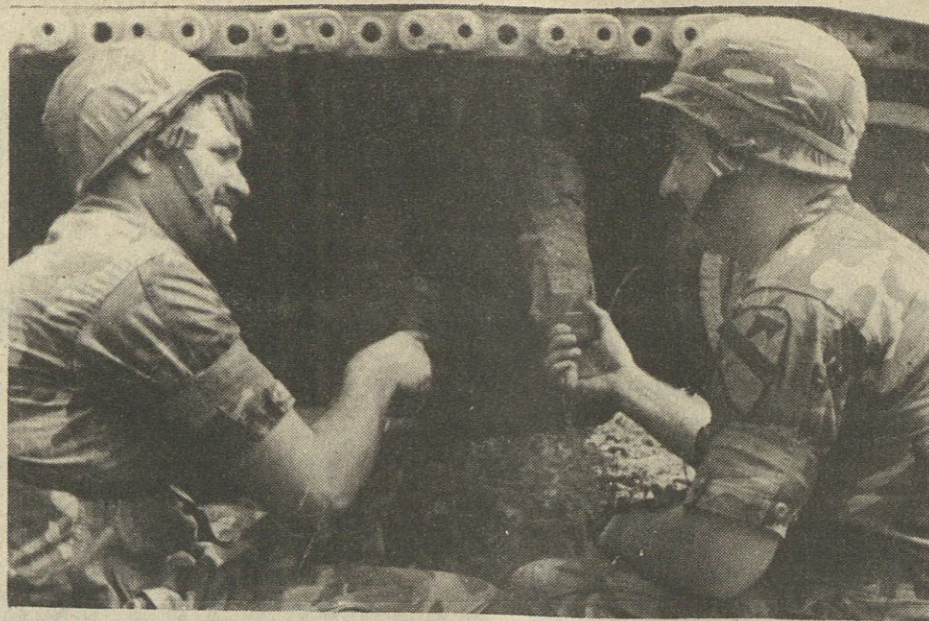
The netting on the outside should be deep golden over a creamy yellow background. The melon should give off a sweet musky aroma and may yield slightly to pressure at the blossom end (opposite the stem end).

Honeydews are generally much larger than cantaloupe with a normal melon weighing between five and seven pounds. They have a smooth, velvety texture and a creamy white or yellow rind. The flesh is greenish and also very sweet.

Ready-to-eat honeydews are white to creamy white on the outside; their surface feels waxy and their blossom end is springy under moderate pressure. Inside the flesh should be almost white with a narrow rim of light green just under the rind. The flesh should be soft but not mushy.

If the melon appears too firm do not refrigerate until it reaches desired softness. This may take two to three days.

Ripe melons should be refrigerated. With proper care melons can be refrigerated

for about a week.

Try these simple low-calorie, low-fat desserts or snacks using melon.

\*Melon wedges sprinkled with a touch of lime or lemon juice.

\*Melon balls marinated in gingerale, apple juice or a diet soft drink.

\*A quarter cantaloupe with a scoop of vanilla ice milk inside.

\*Fruit kabobs made with melon cubes and other fresh fruits in season.

### New Scalloped

Potatoes

6 pounds potatoes  
1/4 cup onion, finely chopped  
3 tablespoons flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt or less  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
2 1/2 cups skim milk  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
1/4 teaspoon mustard

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Wash potatoes and remove eyes. Cut potatoes into thin slices. In an oiled 2-quart casserole, arrange potatoes in 4 layers, sprinkle each of the first 3 layers with 1 tablespoon onion, 1 tablespoon flour, 1/8 teaspoon salt and a dash of pepper. Dot each layer with 1 teaspoon butter or margarine. Sprinkle top with remaining onion, salt and pepper. Heat milk just to scalding (bubbles around edge) and pour over potatoes. Cover and bake 30 minutes. Uncover and bake 60 to 70 minutes, until potatoes are tender. Let stand 5 to 10 minutes before serving. Yield 4 to 6 servings.

The secret of these scalloped potatoes is long, slow cooking - well worth the time and effort.

## County Agent Notes

### Tick And Flea Control

Summertime brings out a lot of pests, with ticks and fleas being right at the top of the list. Both of these pests can survive for long periods of time without feeding, and both have a high reproductive rate.

A good selection of materials is available for control of ticks and fleas. You can also choose the formula of application - either an emulsifiable concentrate or a wettable powder.

In controlling infestations, remember to get good coverage of the area to be treated. About 3 to 10 gallons of insecticide per 1,000

square feet of infested area is adequate for control.

During 90-plus degree weather, flea larvae will be deep in grass thatch or in other areas of adequate moisture. If you have a particularly difficult flea problem, you might want to apply insecticide early in the morning or late in the afternoon. The quicker you apply the treatment the better off you will be because hot temperatures and direct sunlight can affect the residual capability of the insecticide.

### Fly Control In Livestock

House flies and stable flies may become major problems in your livestock operations during the warm summer months. The key to fly control is manure management. Manure and other rotting organic matter should be properly disposed so that flies cannot breed in it.

Insecticides are a very important part in controlling flies, too. They can be applied as long residual sprays, short residual aerosols, baits or

mists and as feed-throughs. It is best to use a combination of these different formulations in a fly control program.

### Farm Accidents

If you found someone caught in a farm machine, would you know what to do? Could you stop the engine and then know how to get help?

People living or working on a farm should be aware of possible life-saving tasks. This includes sales representatives, insurance personnel, extension specialists, vocational-agricultural instructors and even visitors to the farm.

If two people find someone in distress, one could go for help while the other assists the victim. A person alone, depending on the situation, probably needs to ease the victim's plight before seeking help.

I hope none of you ever has to face a life-or-death situation, like being entangled in a machine. But just in case, be prepared to know what to do.

### Neuter Your Cat

At this time of year -- more than any other -- there seem to be more and more cat fights. Many felines, especially males, are injured. Some of these injuries lead to serious infections, even death. Unless you plan to breed your cat, the animal should be spayed, neutered or castrated.

While there are few statistics available on the average life span of the cat, those that are available show that the majority of well-cared for cats live to somewhere between 10 and 14 years of age. Many survive into their twenties, and occasionally over 30 years.

Statistics also show that cats that have been spayed or castrated -- especially male cats -- live longer than their uncastrated counterparts. Uncastrated males seldom make it past 10 years of age. Most die from accidents or infected wounds before 6 years of age.

Cat fights are just one of the reasons you should have your feline spayed or neutered.

Thousands of unwanted kittens are born each year in Mississippi. Many of these animals die in accidents or starve when abandoned by irresponsible owners. Others must be destroyed because no one will adopt them. A responsible pet owner can help prevent this from happening by having their feline, whether male or

female, spayed or neutered.

A castrated male cat becomes more of a 'home body' rather than wandering to seek out females in heat. And they have less of a tendency to fight over females or to defend their territory. Urine spraying is always reduced and frequently eliminated by castration.

In addition, castrated males tend to become better groomed and sleeker in appearance. With proper diet and exercise, they do not tend to become fat and lazy.

Female cats also become better pets when neutered. They seldom develop any of the reproductive system problems associated with age.

There is no definite time to neuter or spay a cat. Generally, the earlier the operation is performed the better. Your veterinarian can best advise you regarding the proper time for the operation based on the cat's general health.

## 4-H Update

### 4-H Food - Nutrition Is Fun

The 4-H food-nutrition project is fun the year round!

Not only is it fun for girls, but also for boys. Did you know that boys are enrolled in this project in Mississippi?

At this time of year, outdoor cookery is one of the favorite parts of the project. How much do you know about building the fire, selecting meats to broil, cooking the meat and testing meat for doneness? To give broiled steaks and hamburgers that extra special taste appeal, follow these suggestions.

Thick steaks and hamburgers will be juicier than thin ones after broiling. Choose steaks at least one and one-half inches thick -- and plump hamburgers at least three-fourths inch thick for outdoor broiling.

Select the correct steak cut. You may choose such cuts as rib, rib-eye, club, T-bone, porterhouse, filet mignon and sirloin. These cuts from the loin section of the animal are suitable for broiling.

Have you tried shish kebabs? Boneless beef cubes cut from sirloin or top round make good shish kebabs. Alternate one and one-half inch beef cubes with green pepper pieces, whole mushrooms, tiny onions and cherry tomatoes on skewers. If you wish to marinate steaks, try a marinade of half

oil and half vinegar or lemon juice with your favorite seasonings. Marinate meat for several hours in the refrigerator before broiling.

Plan ahead so you won't be tempted to start cooking before the fire is ready. Start the fire 30 to 45 minutes before you plan to start broiling the meat. The fire is ready when the coals are covered with fine gray ash. When ready, spread them about one inch apart so that no two coals touch.

Adjust the grill so that meat surface is 6 to 8 inches

from coals. This gives a heat without too much sizzle. If meat gets too raise grill away from heat.

You may tilt the grill slightly to let fat run down grids to one side. This causes dripping fat on the coals, causing smoke and flame.

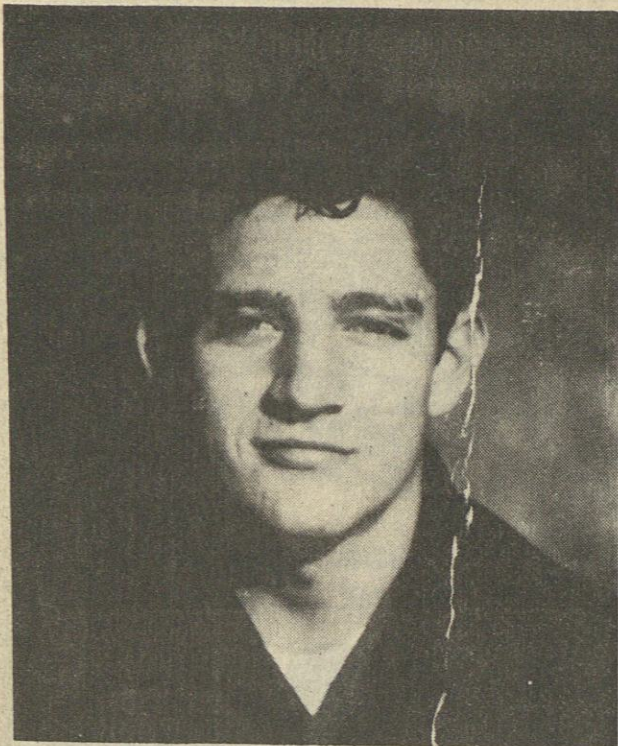

Renovation work has begun on the old Tishomingo County Courthouse. The work is being done through the efforts of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation with funds for the project being provided by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors who is also responsible for the lease of the building to the TCDF. At this time three rooms in the downstairs area are being restored. Two of these rooms will be occupied by the Home Health Agency Association. Other rooms will be restored at a later date. According to Mack Watkins, Director TCDF, the Foundation hopes to eventually open a museum with Civil War and Indian artifacts in what was one the Chancery Clerk's office. No immediate plans have been made for the upstairs; however, long range plans include the upstairs, once the downstairs are completed. The old original part of the building was re-roofed last year. The addition will soon get a new roof and the outside will be painted. Watkins said, he is anxious to see the old building restored and put back to use on a daily basis. For the past 15 years the grounds have been unkept and the building dilapidated. The goal of the TCDF is to

make the old Courthouse a landmark.

### Old Tishomingo County Courthouse

The Old Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka, MS, has played an important role in the lives of people of this area for its 93 year history. The land where the old structure now stands was acquired in 1857 from Lemuel Hubbard, a Tishomingo County landowner.

According to historical account, the Tishomingo County courthouse burned in 1886 and the current structure was erected in 1889. During the interim a front room upstairs over W.J. Hyatt's store house in the town of Iuka was rented for the sum of \$8.33 per month which was designated as the courthouse of Tishomingo County. The sheriff's office provided furniture.

L.M. Weathers, Savannah, Tennessee, was the architect. J.M. Stone, who later became Governor of Mississippi was appointed commissioner to supervise the work in building of the courthouse. J.T.

Weaver was awarded the contract for \$7,785.35. Tishomingo Savings Institution, Corinth, MS, bought bonds - total sum of \$6,000, issued for 8% interest. E.L. Hamnerly was awarded contract to build judge's stand for the sum of \$45.00.

Boards of supervisors named during this historical period were: Lindsey, Wynn, Barnett, May, Marlar, and Brown, Wynn, Cobb, Goddard, and Clark.

The court held its first session in the old Tishomingo County Courthouse in 1889. It was the scene of the famous Annual Gospel Singing Convention from 1917 until 1971. Over the years, hundreds of couples from Tennessee and Alabama came to Iuka to be married due to favorable waiting period laws in Mississippi. It has been the site of much political activity, including speeches by James K. Vardaman and Theodore G. Bilbo.

The old courthouse was vacated in 1971 when a new county structure was built. Since that time the building has remained vacant. When it became known that the courthouse would be vacated, interested members of the community began to organize an effort to preserve the historic structure. It is a visual and pedestrian link from the once nationally famous Mineral Springs Park to the picturesque original commercial center of the village of Iuka and is a major asset to the town.

### 13 - 14 Iuka All Stars Win District Tourney

After a clean sweep in District play the 13 - 14 year-old Iuka All Stars are headed to the Dixie Boys State Tournament in Hattiesburg, MS. This is the second consecutive year for Iuka to be represented in the state tournament. Iuka will play Pascagoula on Saturday, July 25, at 1:00.

In District play last week at the Corinth YMCA field on Monday night Iuka defeated the Baldwin All Stars 22-0. Rich Harrelson pitched the first two innings. He gave up no hits and struck out 4 bat-

ters. Jason Nunley came in in relief for innings three and four. He gave up no runs and allowed one hit. Shaune Holiday pitched the fifth inning. He struck out two and gave up one hit. Bernard Powell pitched the sixth inning. He struck out three and allowed one hit.

Getting hits for Iuka were Casey Murrah; Shaune Holiday; Jason Nunley-2 hits including a homerun; Ronald Jones-2 hits; Bernard Powell-a homerun; Jason Rhear; and Doug Johnson.

Wednesday night's action saw Iuka defeat Corinth 10-0. Jason Nunley was the winning pitcher. He gave up only one hit. # A NEW BEGINNING...

## Mississippi's Four-Lane Highway Program 1987



**A New Beginning**  
Northern District Highway Commissioner Zack Stewart, speaking here Thursday at groundbreaking ceremonies signifying the beginning of construction on the first project under Mississippi's historic \$1.6 billion Highway Program, said enactment of the massive effort will do more to remove sectionalism in the state than anything

else in history. "I am pleased that this first project, located in North Mississippi, is also the longest distance from our state capital of any road project now underway," Commissioner Stewart said. "The \$8.2 million, 6.9 mile project, will complete the four-laning of U.S. 72 from Corinth to the Alabama-Mississippi line and will be completed by September 14, 1989." Commissioner Stewart

said that "real progress" in road construction and improvement can be made now because of the enactment of a permanent highway program. Two-thirds of the highways to be constructed under the first phase of the program will be located in the Northern Highway District. Commissioner Stewart also pointed out that another

major four-lane project will begin on July 20 at Winona with the construction of the U.S. 82 Bypass. This is a \$8.6 million project which will be completed by July 31, 1989. Mr. Stewart also announced that 12 miles of new four-lane U.S. 78 from Byhalia to Red Banks in Marshall County will be opened to traffic on Thursday, July 23.

## Groundbreaking On U.S. 72

Ceremonies were held at 10:30 a.m., Thursday, July 16, to commemorate the beginning of the first project awarded under the new \$1.6 billion highway program passed by the 1987 Mississippi Legislature.

This project is for four-lane construction on the last two-lane segment of U.S. Highway 72 connecting Corinth with the Alabama State Line. The ceremonies occurred just west of Burnsville, on U.S. Highway 72 in

Tishomingo County. Mark Ledbetter, co-chairman of Advocating Highways for Economic Advancement and Development (AHEAD), served as master of ceremonies.

Featured speakers at the event included Lt. Gov. Brad Dye; Speaker Pro Tempore Cecil Simmons; Rep. John D. Pennebaker; Rep. Billy McCoy; State Senator Bill Minor; Highway Commissioners Zack Stewart, Northern District, Sam W. Waggoner, Central District, and Bob Joiner, Southern District. Mrs. Diane Dean of luka sang the National Anthem, and Rev. Larry Hawkins, pastor of St. Marks Baptist Church of Corinth, gave the invocation.

The ceremonies were sponsored by the Corinth-Alcorn Area Chamber of Commerce and the Tishomingo County Development Foundation.

The contract for this project was awarded on June 23, 1987, to Ken Excavating Inc. of Cullman, Ala., the low bidder, at a contract cost of \$8,157,306.

Portions of U.S. Highway 72 from Corinth to the Alabama State Line are already completed or in various stages of completion as the result of three previous contracts awarded. The fourth and final contract covers the remaining two-lane section of U.S. Highway 72 between Strickland and Burnsville for a distance of 6.949 miles. Completion of this project will provide motorists with a modern, safe four-lane highway when traveling on U.S. Highway 72 from Corinth to the Alabama State Line.

This project kicks off the beginning of a massive 1,077 mile four-lane construction program that will include all areas of the state.

Funding for the program is being derived from motor fuel taxes, federal aid, contractor's tax, tag fees and the bond retirement fund.

**USDA Announces Resumption Of Commodity Credit Corporation payments have**

resumed, a U.S. Department of Agriculture official announced.

Milton Hertz, executive vice president of USDA's CCC, said resumption of payments has been made possible by President Reagan's signing into law a supplemental appropriation bill on Saturday, July 11, with \$5.5 billion additional funding for CCC. Disbursements had been suspended at the close

of business on May 1, 1987, due to a lack of appropriate funds.

Hertz said that payments have resumed for all CCC activities, including commodity loans and purchase warehouse and production payments, deficiency and diversion payments, dairy support purchases, dairy termination program payments and conservation cost-share payments.

## Groundbreaking Ceremonies Held At Schnadig Plant Site

Ground breaking ceremonies were held Wednesday, July 15, for Schnadig Corporation, a furniture manufacturing plant. The new industry will be located in the Belmont Industrial Park and will employ approximately

450 people when in full operation. The proposed 350,000 + sq. ft. building will be situated on 31 acres of land which was donated by the City of Belmont. Funding will be provided by a \$3.5 million

loan of in lieu tax money by Tishomingo County. The money is to be paid back over a 15 year period at 4% interest. When completed approximately 8 acres will be under roof. The City of Belmont will be responsible

for providing water and sewer.

The Schnadig Corporation is a family owned company manufacturing upholstered furniture. The Chicago based company started out in 1952 in a partnership with Sears and Roebuck Company. In 1960 the company bought back Sears interest and became totally family owned. Schnadig now operates plants in six states.

A spokesman for the company said they chose to locate in Mississippi largely due to the efforts of Tom Sanders, of the Mississippi Department of Economic Development.

The company is not yet in operation, but has been in Belmont for the past two months making final preparations. They are located in the building formerly belonging to Golden Sales. They plan to begin an

employee training program next week according to Charles Daniel, Employee Relations Manager for the Belmont plant.

Point Of Law

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some legal rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your rights.)

Q. What are the different types of listing agreements that can be made with a real estate broker?

A. A listing agreement is a legal contract that governs such conditions as the broker's fees, the right of the seller to negotiate on his or her behalf, and terms restricting the rights to sell. An Open Listing Contract is a listing wherein the owner lists the property for sale with one broker, but reserves the right to list the property concurrently with as many additional brokers as desired. The seller will owe a commission only to the broker who actually sells the house. Exclusive agency contracts employ one broker as an agent for the property for a definite period of time, but also allow the owner to sell directly without an obligation to pay a broker's commission. An exclusive right to sell contract appoints one broker as sole agent for a specified period of time and entitles the broker to a commission if a property is sold by any party within the time limits.

Q. What precautions should the buyer take to be sure that title is conveyed to his new property without any problems?

A. The buyer will want to assume a title that is "marketable," that is, free from all indebtedness or limitation on its use. It is up to the buyer to examine the title. This should be done before the purchase is complete through a title search or examination of public records by an attorney, who then issues a certificate indicating the findings or supplies a written title opinion.

We have examined the combined financial statements of the City of Iuka, Mississippi and the combining, individual fund, and account group financial statements as of and for the year ending September 30, 1986 as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We did not observe the taking of the physical inventory of the Gas System as of September 30, 1985, since that date was prior to the time we were engaged as auditors for the City.

The City does not maintain a general fixed assets account group, and accordingly, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group as required to conform with generally accepted ac- counting principles.

In our opinion, except for the omission of financial statements for the general fixed assets account group, and subject to the effects, if any, of valuing the beginning inventory, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the finan- cial position of the City as of September 30, 1986 and results of operations and changes in financial position for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining and individual fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as sup- porting schedules in the table of contents is presented for the purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the City of Iuka. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

In connection with our examination, nothing came to our attention to cause us to believe the City is not in compliance with requirements of the State Department of Audit, as set forth in the Municipal Compliance Questionnaire, except as shown on page 32, "Findings and Recommendations".

In connection with our audit, we also made a study and evaluation of internal control; the report and our findings and recommendations may be found on pages 31 and 32. We did not perform tests of compliance pursuant to the Single Audit Act of 1984, as the City received less than the \$25,000 requirement.

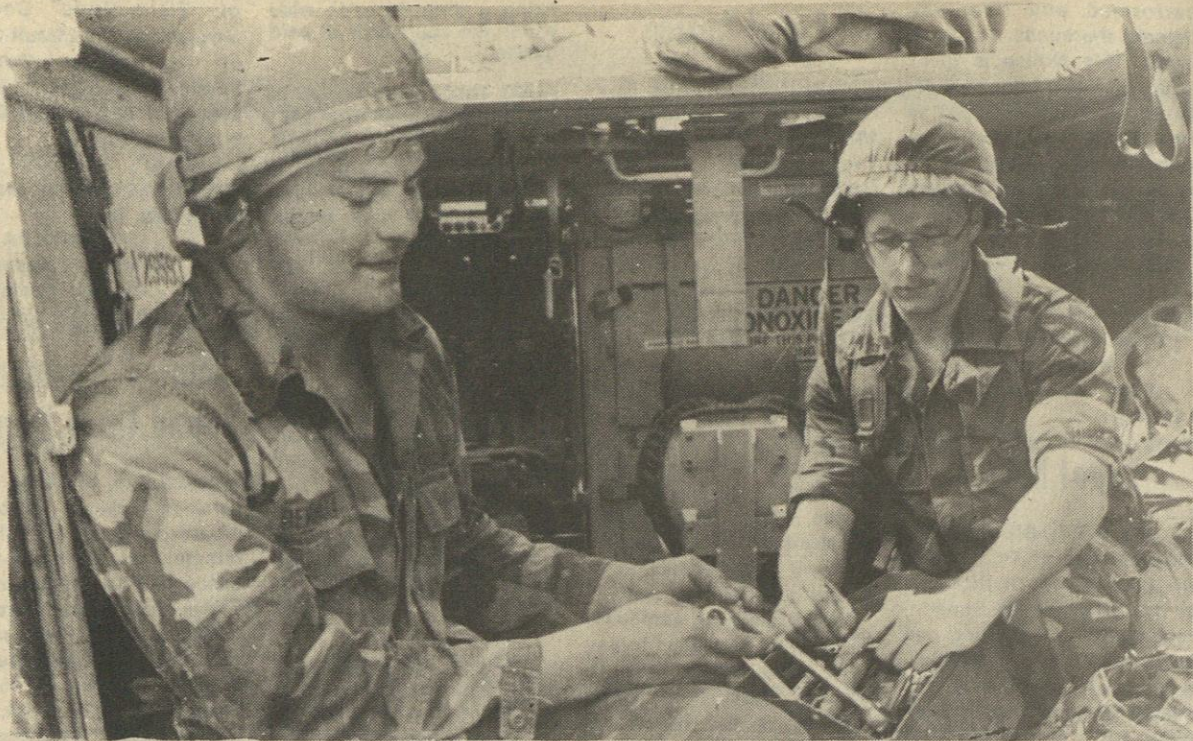
FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Purchase orders are not being used as required by the State. We recommend the purchase order system be implemen- ted to conform to State requirements.
2. Interfund receivables and payables have been carried forward from year to year. We recommend these old balances be paid so that the financial statements may correctly reflect current interfund receivables and payables.
3. Property tax assessments increased more than 10% from the previous year, due to county reappraisal. The excess of \$13,681.00 should be deposited to an escrow account. Current year property tax levies should be reduced by this amount. We recommend the City follow these procedures pursuant to State requirements as set forth in Code Sections 27-39-320 through 27-39-329.

With all the intense summer heat and garden work right now, I've become concerned about heat stroke and what to do for it. Would you please answer this in your next column?

### UNDERSTANDING HEAT DISORDERS

Anyone who works or exercises too hard in hot, muggy

weather can develop a heat disorder: heat cramps, heat exhaustion, or heat stroke. This is especially likely to happen to joggers or other athletes or people doing hard physical work.

Heat cramps or muscle spasms in the stomach, arms or legs occur when a person sweats a great deal and doesn't drink enough salty liquid to replace what's lost.

Heat exhaustion usually occurs when a patient exercises strenuously in hot, humid weather and doesn't replace body salt and water lost by sweating.

Heat stroke is a life-threatening emergency. When exposure to heat and humidity causes the body temperature to rise to 105-110° the person collapses with heat stroke. He loses consciousness and his skin becomes red hot and dry

because the body longer produce General treatment for heat disorder is to get person out of the heat, him all the water he can with a teaspoon of salt to each glass of water or some liquid that has salt such as Gatorade, have person rest and avoid activity for the next three days. For the with heat exhaustion, medical emergency. He be removed to a cool place conscious given the water, if unconscious his clothing and sponge down with cool or cold and seek medical attention immediately.

To prevent heat drink plenty of water on summer days, don't overwork yourself, wear colored clothing and working or exercising feel even mild symptoms heat syndrome.
