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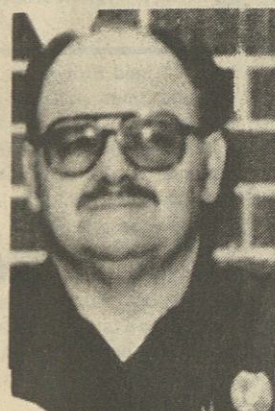

## County - Wide Voting Tuesday

Tuesday, August 4, is Election Day in Mississippi once again. Tishomingo County voters will journey to the polls to mark ballots for the candidates they feel best suited for county and state offices. THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY NEWS urges all readers to exercise their Democratic right by voting.

Voters are to be aware that the voting time has been extended. The precincts will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. in this first Democratic Primary. Three weeks after

Tuesday's election (August 25), the two top vote getters in each race will be pitted against one another, unless one of them receives a clear majority of votes. Winners in state offices will then be slated against Republican opponents in the November elections. Names of Independent Candidates will also appear on the November ballot.

Voters who will be out-of-town during the August 4th Primary are reminded that noon Saturday, August 1st, is the deadline to vote an absentee ballot in person at the

Circuit Clerk's office. Only those absentee ballots that are mailed in and received in the Circuit Clerk's office, postmarked no later than Monday's (August 3) mail will be put in boxes to be tabulated. Anyone wishing to vote by absentee ballot should contact the Circuit Clerk's office for more information.

However, those who haven't already registered to vote need not apply. All county citizens who register at the present time will be ineligible to vote in either the August 4th Primary or Run-off Elec-

tion. New voters will qualify to vote in the November General election.

Our readers are encouraged to pay special attention to our voting machine article and also the related article regarding cross-over voting. Voters do have a choice in voting either the Democratic or Republican ticket during this primary.

## Voting Procedures Given For Next Week's Primary Election

The Tishomingo County Democratic Executive Committee would like for everyone to be aware of the new voting procedures for the upcoming Democratic Primary. We will be using the new ballot counters for this election. As you can see by the sample ballot (page 10), just connect the broken arrow with a line adjacent to the name of the candidate of your

choice.

After completing your ballot, you will place it into the machine and it will be automatically tabulated. Please do not fold the ballots.

There will not be a machine at every precinct. If you vote where there is no machine, simply place your ballot into the ballot box and they will be taken to the machine after the polls close.

The machines will be located at the largest precinct of each district. These precincts are North Iuka, West Burnsville, East Iuka, Tishomingo, and Belmont.

Also, under the new Election Reform laws, everyone who works at the polls must be certified. Every poll worker is required to attend a seminar prior to the election. If you have any problem at all, the poll workers will be able to help you. If you make a mistake on your ballot, please do not hesitate to ask for another one. Please refrain from wearing caps, t-shirts, etc. with the names of candidates on them to the polls. Under the new law (Mississippi Code #23-15-895) if you do so, you will not be

able to vote.

We realize there will probably be some confusion, but with everyone's cooperation and patience, the election will be easier and the results known much, much earlier than in the past.

A reminder, the Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. next Tuesday, August 4th.

### Notice Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Assoc. Members

In order for the Midway Pleasant Hill Water Association to meet its Debt Service (Loans) payments incurred by previous Boards of Directors of the Association, and upon a DIRECTIVE issued by Farmers Home Administration, the present Board of Directors regrets to inform you that water rates must be increased as follows:

\*First 3,000 gals. \$12.50 Minimum.

\*Each 1,000 gals. above the first 3,000 gals. minimum will cost \$2.00 per thousand.

The Board of Directors discussed this problem among themselves and with Farmers Home Administration during the past year concerning rate increases. This is the only choice we have in order to avoid the Association's being placed in Receivership and managed by an outside Agency. If this

should happen, we were informed that Minimum Water Bills could go as high as \$25.00. The Debt Service of the Association must be met on a monthly basis. Folks, the present Board inherited the problem. We did not make it.

To be successful in paying off the Loans against the Association, each member must pay his full water bill, and, pay on time.

The Board of Directors regrets having to take this action but have no other choice in the matter. We earnestly request your help so that the Association can be maintained by you as members, and, the Board who works in the best interest of the Association.

## Crossover Voting Forbidden Tuesday

Anyone who votes in the August 4 Republican primary will not be permitted to vote in the Democratic runoff on August 25, State Democratic Party Chair Steve Patterson announced.

Poll workers at the August 25 Democratic second primary runoff will be instructed to challenge the ballot of anyone who is listed as having voted in the Republican primary.

State law provides that no person may participate in a primary unless he or she intends to support the nominations made in that primary. Therefore, no voter may participate in the election of nominees for more than one party.

Anyone who attempts to vote in both primaries on August 4 will be guilty of a misdemeanor under state law.

### Assertive Behavior

Have you been...  
"Timid about questioning a repairman?"  
"Afraid to express your opinion at a public meeting?"  
"Unable to defend yourself when treated unfairly?"  
"Angry and afterwards asked, "What did that accomplish?"  
Then you need to consider

learning to express yourself with positive, confident, direct statements that reflect your values, needs, wants and rights. This is called assertive behavior or assertiveness. Learning to be more assertive is one form of self-improvement designed to help you be a stronger, more self-sufficient person.

Assertiveness is based upon:  
\*Respect for others and self, and  
\*Changing action that can lead to changed attitudes and feelings, and feelings of self-esteem.  
Assertiveness can help you:  
\*Express yourself freely

\*Handle strong emotions like anger in a positive way,  
\*Solve problems creatively and

\*Achieve a good feeling of being in control of your communications and actions. Non-assertive or passive behavior violates your rights because it fails to express your honest feelings. It allows others to make the choice, while you continue to feel hurt or anxious. It can be expressed non-verbally by the apologetic: "Do whatever you want" or "Oh, I couldn't do that."

Passive behavior can be costly when a pushy clerk persuades you to buy a dress in a hated color. Non-assertive behavior can be frustrating to others who honestly seek your opinions and it can be very harmful in group situations.

Aggressiveness is still another form of behavior and often involves strong language that is used to dominate and control others while minimizing their worth. The parent who says, "Get upstairs and clean your room" or "When I was your age..." is using aggressive verbal behavior.

Aggressive behavior involves personal standing up for one's personal rights yet violates others' rights. It definitely values self above others. It also encourages aggressive reactions from others.

### Mild Chili Sauce

12 red ripe peeled tomatoes  
6 medium onions, chopped  
6 green peppers, chopped  
3 red sweet peppers, chopped  
1 3-inch stick cinnamon  
1 teaspoon whole cloves  
1 teaspoon whole allspice  
1 tablespoon salt  
1 pint cider vinegar, 5% acidity  
1 cup sugar  
To peel tomatoes, dip them in boiling water, then quickly in cold water to loosen skins. Peel.  
Finely chop raw tomatoes,

onions, and peppers. Tie cinnamon, cloves, and allspice into a clean white cloth to make a spice bag. Add spice bag to tomatoes, onions, and peppers, and simmer for 30 to 40 minutes. Remove spice bag. Add salt, vinegar, and sugar to tomato mixture; boil rapidly for 5 minutes.

Pour hot chili sauce into clean, hot pint jars. Seal with properly prepared canning lids. Process in boiling water for 15 minutes. Remove jars, cool and store.

To freeze, cool quickly by lowering container of chili sauce into sink of ice water. Pack sauce into moisture-vapor-proof, rigid containers, leaving 1-inch of head space, and freeze at 0 degrees F or lower. Yield: 2 pints.

## CARING FOR YOUR PET



### Miscellaneous Facts

Upper respiratory infections are the most common health problem seen in cats. An excellent vaccination is available to prevent the worst of the upper respiratory viruses.

Vaccination of cats and dogs against rabies forms an invisible buffer between the wildlife population and the human population. Inoculation of your pet, therefore, protects not only the animal, but you and your family as well.

A cat -- even a small kitten -- has more bones in its body than a human being. A human being has 206 bones; a cat has 230.

Studies indicate that 85 percent of all medical problems in pet birds occur because of improper nutrition. Birds which lack one or more essential nutrient in their diets will eventually become sick -- and by the time the problem is noticed, it may be too late to correct.

Due to certain ecological factors, certain species of animals rarely have rabies. This group includes commercially-raised pets, such as hamsters, gerbils and ferrets, as well as certain wildlife, such as

squirrels, rabbits, chipmunks, opossums, rats and mice.

More than 700 plants have been identified as producing physiologically active or toxic substances in sufficient amounts to cause harmful effects in animals. These plants produce a variety of toxic substances and cause animal reactions ranging from mild nausea to death.

As little as one ounce of anti-freeze, if ingested, may be fatal to a 15-pound dog. Just one-third of an ounce can quickly kill a 10-pound cat.

Although there are some 27 orders of birds recognized, nearly all of our caged birds (pets) come from just three classes -- psittacines (parrot-like), passerines (canary-like) and piciformes (toucan).

"Producers have weeds under control and are scouting and controlling insects," Johnson said.

In Noxubee County, Extension Agent David Kittrell said the county's corn crop looks good and producers are expecting good yields.

"Soybeans are not as thrifty as they should be, but they are still growing," Kittrell said.

Coahoma County Agent Charlie Estess said some producers started irrigating cotton last week, but the biggest crop concern is blast disease in several rice fields.

Walthall County Agent Louis Crawford said producers are harvesting corn silage and for the second year in a row, yields are good.

## Sportsman's License Delayed

The Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation announced today that hunters renewing their Sportsman's License should expect their new license in early September.

"We've changed the Sportsman's License from a paper

material to plastic and we've designed and printed a new Sportsman's License decal," said Joe Stone, Executive Director.

"We've had a lot of requests to do that, but the changes have caused a delay in shipping the licenses to us. We'll get them back to folks as soon as we receive and process them, probably by early September," said Stone.

According to Stone, hunters who have renewed their Sportsman's License should keep both their renewal stub and cancelled check. Conservation officers can call Jackson Office by radio to check the validity of the license.

"We regret the delay, but we want the best product we can get for Mississippi Spor-

tsmen," said Stone. "We appreciate your patience and cooperation."

The \$25.00 Sportsman's License allows a person fish and to hunt all species as regulated allows holders to hunt bow and arrow and zleloader during special seasons. How state and federal ducks ps are required in add this license.

The Sportsman's License is the only license renewable by mail which duplicates are free of charge.

## TISHOMINGO COUNTY VOTERS

The time is drawing near for you to make an important decision for your next Sheriff. I would like for you to consider Ricky C. Cornelison.

Being well known or having run for office before doesn't make a man a good law enforcement officer.

Good law enforcement officers come from education, proper training, experience and common sense.

If I am called to your house and find one of your family members murdered, I will know what to do. Will a politician know what to do?

Shaking hands and hustling votes doesn't solve crimes!

I have presented many serious felony cases to the Tishomingo County Grand Jury in the past few years. How many have my opponents presented?

I have worked in all areas of the system from the first officer on the scene, to the search warrant, to the arrest warrant, to the preliminary hearing, to the grand jury, to testifying in court.

Can the other candidates make this statement truthfully.

You see the sheriff's job is not just arresting a drunk!

If any part of this system is mishandled then the system doesn't work and the crime goes unpunished.

The Supreme Court lays down the rules a law enforcement officer must follow to make a legal arrest and a legal search. You can't just make them up as you go. If these rules are not followed then the arrest is not valid and anything found in a search is not admissible in court. Without admissible evidence we have no case.

How can a sheriff abide by these rules if he doesn't know what they are?  
Rick Cornelison knows the rules.

\*I have attended the University of Mississippi where I majored in law enforcement.

\*I am the only candidate to successfully complete and graduate from a law enforcement training academy as required by law.

\*I am the only candidate that is qualified in firearms as expert by the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers Training Academy and by the National Rifle Association.

This job is not a four year retirement plan. I want to be your sheriff for 8, 12 or 16 years.

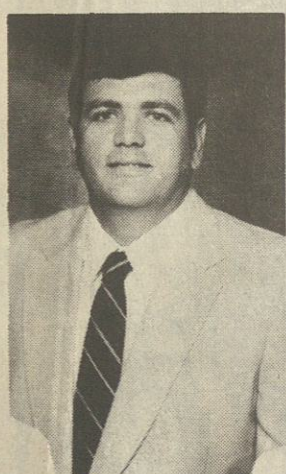

## Mississippian Plays Harmonica

(The following feature was contributed by Mrs. J.A. (Grace) Coker. It appeared in the July 9, 1987, edition of The Independent, located at Rural Hall North Carolina.)

Hands clapped and toes tapped in the Piedmont last week as Alton "Red" Coker played the harmonica (French harp, he calls it) and buck danced his way into the hearts of a oldtime music lovers.

Coker, a resident of Iuka,

Miss., who frequently visits relatives in the Pfafftown area, performed at the Pollirosa. He also appeared at Hometown Opry in Mount Airy and was interviewed as part of a performing artists series to be aired on WFDD public radio.

"I always look forward to going to the Pollirosa when I'm in North Carolina," Coker said. "I missed getting to play with the Old Timer (Ralph

McGee) this time though."

A Pollirosa spokesman said that McGee, an outstanding fiddler who appeared regularly at the restaurant for several years, no longer performs there. Coker performed with Johnny Rierson and the Stokes County Ramblers at the Pollirosa.

A versatile performer whose music ranges from oldtime fiddle tunes and bluegrass to mountain folk music, Coker introduced Robert Sykes and the Surry County Boys with "The Eighth of January" and "Bully of the Town," in Mount Airy.

He opened for Dean Sharpe and the Lee Highway Travelers with a medley of waltzes including "Tennessee Waltz" and "Wednesday Night Waltz," but the set soon turned into playing audience requests for such favorites as "Golden Slippers," "Sally Gooden" and "Leather Britches."

"Those are songs my daddy used to play," a woman in the audience told Coker.

Coker learned to read music as a young person attending community singing schools, but plays harmonica by ear. He said he began playing at age 5 by sneaking an uncle's instrument.

"Aunt Anthem (Seago) would make me wash out my mouth (before playing) and told me not to tell Uncle Will," he recalled. "I'd sit on the front steps with the French harp. The first song I ever played was 'Home Sweet Home.'"

He grew up entertaining at community socials and ice cream suppers in the hill country of Northeast Mississippi.

"We played for the old-time square dances and get-togethers. Sometimes young people would walk for miles on Sunday to a central place and we'd make music all evening. I've stood in my tracks and played for five

hours at a time."

At 76, the burly, red-haired musician with a ruddy complexion and clear blue eyes said he no longer has the wind for five hours of playing, but does still enjoy making music.

## ASCS Farm News

### 1988 Wheat Loan Rate, Target Price Down

To maintain U.S. wheat competitiveness in domestic and international markets, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reduced the loan rate by five percent for the 1988 crop.

David Wilson, County Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the 1988 Wheat Program offers price support loans at \$2.17 per bushel -- 11 cents less than the 1987 rate -- and target price protection at \$4.29 per bushel, 9 cents less than this year's price.

Recently announced by USDA, the 1988 Wheat Program also contains a 27.5 percent acreage reduction requirement, the same as the 1987 program. "This means that program participants will be required to maintain in acreage conservation reserve, an area equal to 37.93 percent of their planted acres," Wilson said.

He said eligibility for a program payment or loan for a commodity on one farm will not be affected by actions taken with that commodity on another farm. However, to be eligible for wheat program payments and loans on a farm, the acreage planted for harvest on the farm to feed grains, upland cotton and rice cannot exceed the crop acreage bases for these commodities. The program does not contain a marketing loan provision or paid land diversion.

If reserve wheat quantities exceed the upper limit set by USDA when 1988-crop wheat loans mature, Wilson said the crop will not be eligible for entry into the farmer-owned grain reserve.

"The Secretary of Agriculture has the authority to initiate later cost reduction

options for the 1988 Wheat Program," said ASCS official into by a farmer under a program if the producer voluntarily agrees to the change.

## 4-H Youth Take Look At Co-Ops

For the young, summer is usually a time to put away thoughts of classrooms and teachers. But 44 state 4-H youth recently used a bus as their classroom and tour guides as teachers.

The youth, including Tishomingo County 4-H member Theresa Gillis, were all first place winners in various state 4-H competitions. They used four days of their summer vacation to study and tour Mississippi agricultural cooperatives.

The Mississippi 4-H Co-op Tour, organized by the 4-H department of the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and sponsored by the Mississippi Council of Farm Cooperatives (MCFC), offered youth the opportunity to learn firsthand the importance of cooperatives.

Many of these kids were already a part of a cooperative and just didn't know it, said L.L. "Red" Monroe, executive director of the MCFC.

By touring various cooperative facilities and talking to personnel, they understand more about cooperatives and the role of these co-ops in Mississippi agriculture, Monroe said.

The tour originated at Mississippi State University and included stops at MFC Services in Madison, Farm Credit Banks in Jackson, Mississippi Chemical Corp. in Yazoo City, Stapco in Greenwood and Delta Pride Catfish in Indiana.

In addition to the tours, 4-H members also formed their own soft drink cooperative during the week.

Each 4-H member joined the co-op and bought their soft drinks from their own business rather than from soft drink machines and stores.

The group elected a board of directors and hired a

manager and treasurer. The group sold stock in the cooperative for \$1 per share and at the end of the week were able to return 65 cents on every dollar invested.

"Taking part in their own cooperative was one of the most educational parts of the week," said Dr. Charles Sappington, state 4-H program leader. "The cooperative ran into some problems and the board of directors had to solve them, just like in a real cooperative."

In the process, qualifying landowners will be sent a nice "rental" check for the next ten years. The Mississippi Forestry Commission is providing technical assistance for the program.

Application for the CRP must be made at the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office. "A farmer can opt to plant certain grasses instead of

trees on the set-aside lands, but at the end of the 10 years all he'll have is grass, instead of a stand of ten year old trees that will very shortly be of a valuable merchantable size," says State Forester Robert S. "Sid" Moss. "Since the CRP was

initiated in Mississippi a year ago our farmers have signed up for 225,000 acres of tree planting. Ninety-one thousand of those acres have already been planted," said the State Forester.

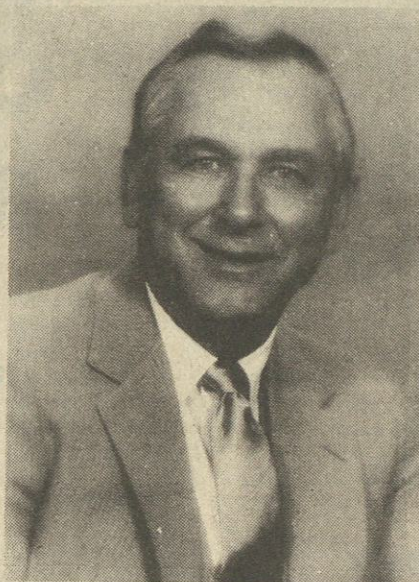
Nationwide, about 1.1 million acres have been con-

verted from erodible cropland to trees under the CRP. Georgia has planted more acres to trees under the program than any other State, with Mississippi coming in second in the Nation.

Trees planted on good soil should yield an investment return of 15-25 percent

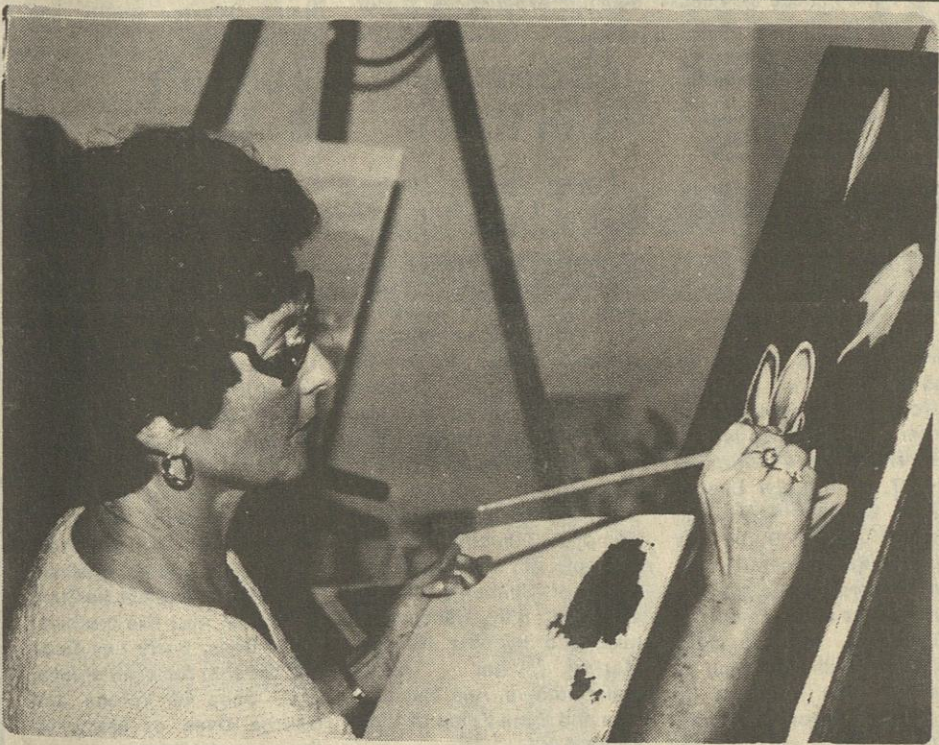
## Railway Completed

## Piney Grove Bid Goes To Tupelo Co.

The Nashville District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has recently awarded a \$2,996,838.72 contract to the Hays Company, Inc. of Tupelo, Mississippi. The contract is for the Piney Grove Public Use Area on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. The work consists of building 137 full service camp sites, a comfort station, three wash houses, a waste water treatment plant, and associated utilities. It will also include 2.5 miles of access roads.

Although boat ramps and comfort stations have been previously constructed, this contract represents the first camping facilities to be constructed on the 7,000 acre Bay Springs Lake within the Divide Cut Section of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. The facilities will be located on the west side of the lake between Highway 4 and Highway 30. Access by county roads are marked north from the Bay Springs Lake Marina on Highway 4 and south from Burton on Highway 30.

The facilities are located on a peninsula into the Bay Springs Lake. Access into the camping area will be controlled and a fee will be charged to camp. The camp sites will have water, electricity, a utility table, a picnic table, a fire pit and a trash container. They are located to provide maximum access and view of the Bay Springs Lake. Wash houses (restrooms with showers) are located within the campsite area for easy access. A playground area for children is also provided.

Two boat ramps have already been constructed. One is within the control access of the campsite, and one is open to the public. A comfort station and parking will be provided at the public boat ramp.

Piney Grove Public Use Area will be expanded by next year to provide a public swimming area with a sand beach and bathhouse, a free camping area, and a picnic area.

## Your Child's First Visit To The Dentist

Why should I take my child to the dentist? The baby teeth are going to fall out anyway.

Your child's first set of teeth, the primary teeth, are of vital importance. Strong, healthy primary teeth help your child chew food more easily, learn to speak, and look attractive. Diseased and broken teeth can affect the child's total health. Also, if a primary tooth is lost too early, the teeth beside it may drift into the empty space, causing the permanent teeth to come in crooked.

At what age should my child first see a dentist?

You should take your child to the dentist before age three. The dentist will examine the child's mouth for tooth decay or other problems. By starting dental visits at an early age, you will help your child build a lifetime of good dental habits.

Is there a best time of the day for my child to see the dentist?

Many dentists like to see young children in the morning, when the children are rested. Morning appointments don't conflict with naptimes or naps. Children usually feel best in the morning and are more cooperative.

How often should my child see the dentist?

How often your child should see a dentist depends on many factors. These include the health of the

child's mouth, the child's eating habits, whether the child drinks fluoridated water, and how clean the child's teeth are kept. After examining your child's mouth, the dentist will be able to tell you how often your child should make dental visits.

Taking your child to the dentist regularly can prevent serious dental disease. Preventive services are less costly than the fillings, crowns, and other treatments that your child may need if the teeth are neglected. Regular dental visits can save time, money, and your child's teeth.

What will happen during my child's first dental visit?

The dentist will examine the child's mouth, clean the teeth, and see if anything else needs to be done. He or she will discuss with you how the child should get the fluoride needed for strong teeth. You will also learn how to clean the child's teeth and how diet and eating habits affect dental health. When necessary, the dentist will take X-rays of your child's teeth to see how the facial bones and teeth are developing and to find any hidden decay.

What should I tell my child about seeing the dentist?

Tell your child that the dentist is a friendly doctor who will help the child stay healthy. Talk about the visit in a positive matter-of-fact way, as you would any im-

portant new experience. A visit to the dentist should be a delightful adventure to your child.

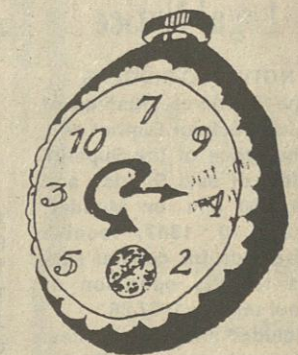

**Business Suffered Defeat**

Business in the state suffered two defeats in recent days when labor-backed legislation survived votes in Congress.

And, three members of the

state's congressional delegation sided with labor and against business on the controversial issues.

One measure, eliminating double-breasting in the construction industry, was approved by the House of Representatives. The other, requiring notification of plant

closings, was tied to the 1987 trade bill and passed the Senate.

The two issues are part of a six-issue package backed by labor that could interfere with the rights of business. The other labor bills are mandated employer-paid health care for employees, mandated parental leave of up to 18 weeks for employees, wages determined on the basis of comparable worth, and an increase in the minimum wage of at least up to \$4.50 per hour from the present \$3.35 per hour.

The Mississippi Economic Council, the state's largest business organization, has urged defeat of the proposals.

"These measures could significantly increase the cost of doing business and interfere with the right of business to manage its own affairs," said Bob Pittman, president of MEC.

The construction anti-double-breasting legislation provides that if a company has one affiliate with union labor, union membership would be required for workers in all affiliates.

State business leaders say the proposal interferes with Mississippi's right-to-work law.

Two members of the state delegation voted in favor of the union-backed proposal, while three voted against it. Democrats Wayne Dowdy and

Mike Espy sided with labor, while Democrats Jamie Whitten, G.V. "Sonny" Mon-

On the plant closing legislation, which requires business owners to give employees 60 days advance notice of plant relocations and closings, Republican Senator Thad Cochran voted against the bill and Democrat Senator John Stennis voted in favor of it.

Stennis had earlier told MEC he would oppose all of the labor bills because the Senate did not have time to consider the issues.

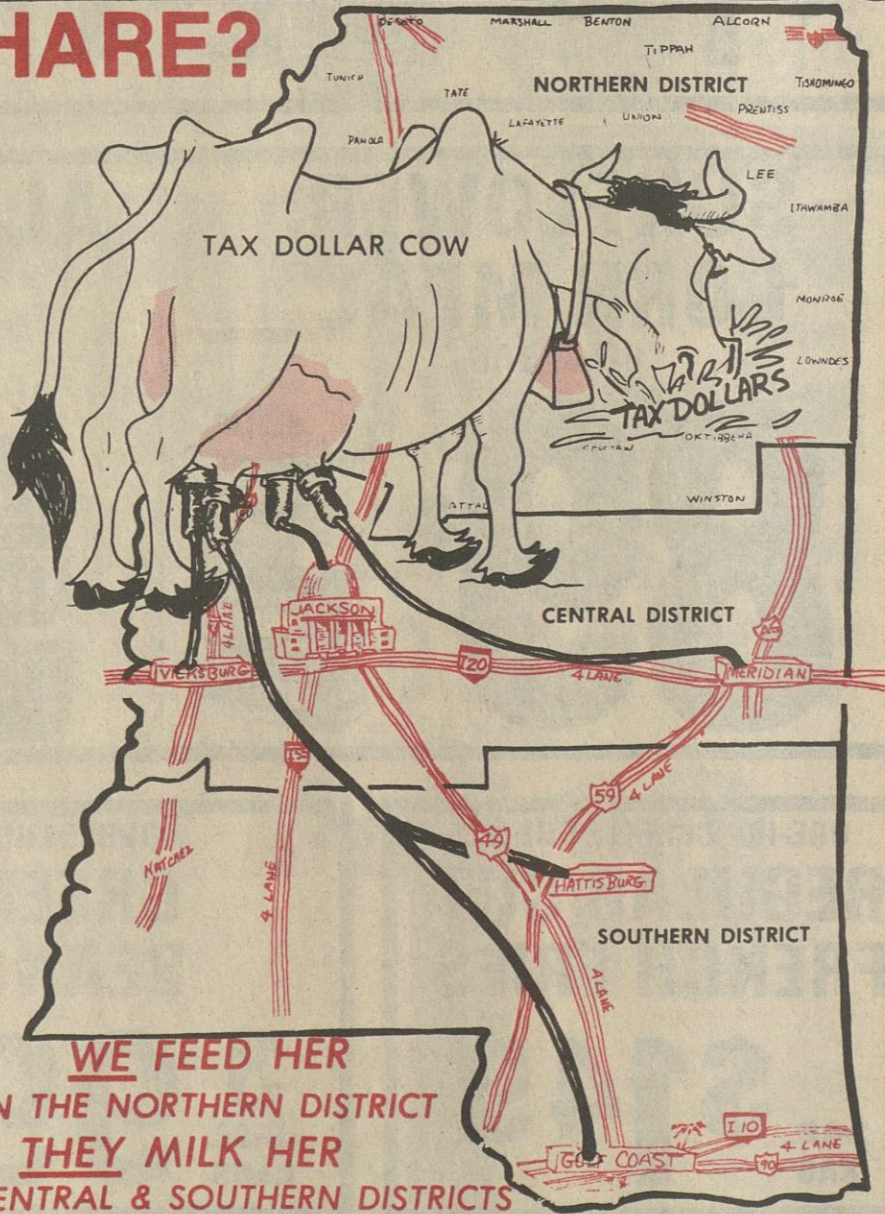

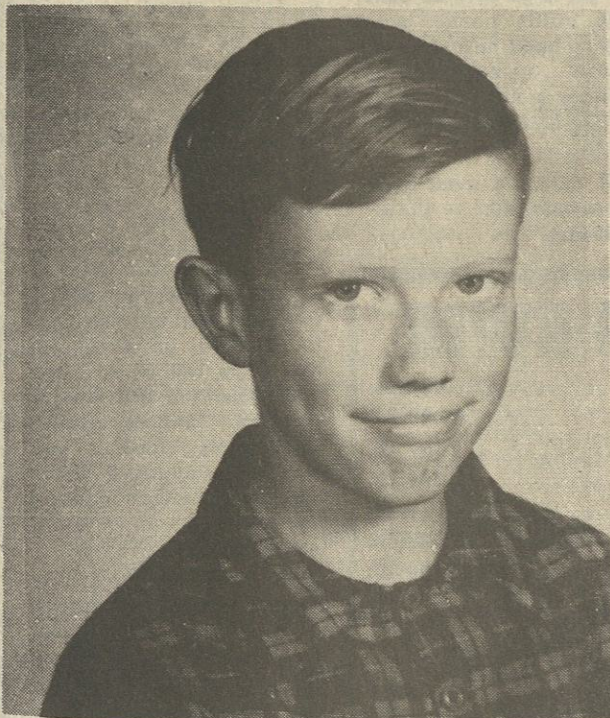

### Name Change

August 1 The Northeast Mississippi Junior College will officially become Northeast Mississippi Community College, by action of the State Board of Trustees for Community and Junior Colleges on July 17.

The Northeast Board of Trustees first voted in the name change at their May meeting, and reaffirmed their decision at their July meeting to be submitted to the State Board.

"I am pleased that your board has taken this action to use the community college name to reflect the comprehensive curricula and

community-based nature of your institution," said Dr. George V. Moody, Executive Director of the State Board, in a letter to Northeast President Harold T. White advising him of the Board's decision.

According to President White, the initial purpose of the Northeast Mississippi

Junior College was "to provide the first two years of the baccalaureate program, but that is no longer true. The school now plays a vital role in training employees of local businesses and industries." "We plan to make an orderly transition," White said, "with no significant cost involved."

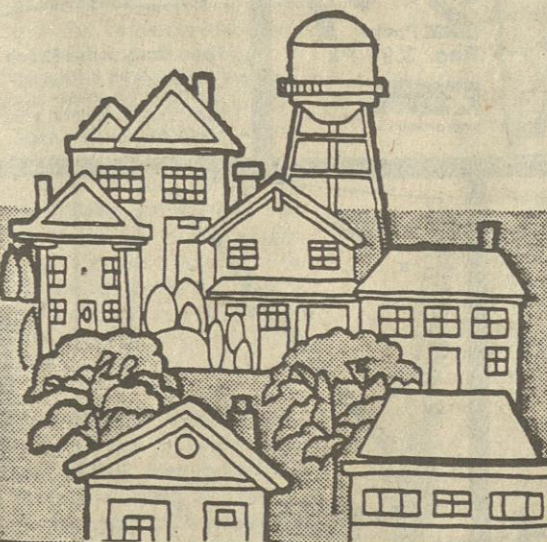

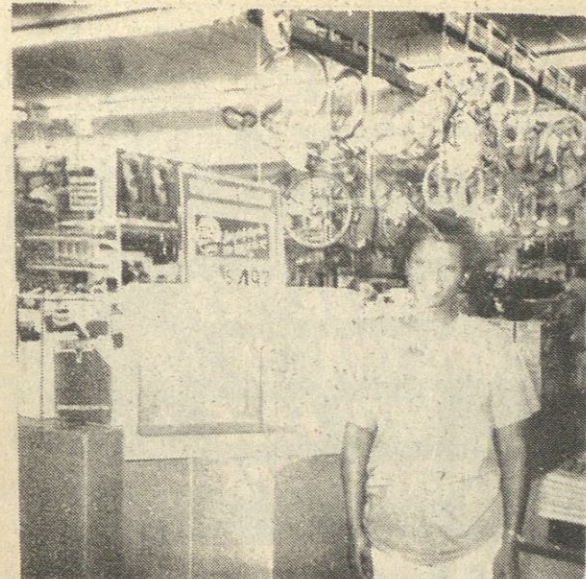

### Quality Education Helps Business

Mississippi is a good place to do business, but improved education and health care would significantly increase the state's attractiveness to those looking for a place to locate.

The relationship between quality of life factors -- such as education and health care -- and economic success is an important one. The latest manufacturing climate survey published by the Grant Thornton Company proves that importance.

Mississippi continued to score high on a number of factors measuring the business climate of the 48 contiguous states, but the quality of health care and education hurt the state's overall ranking.

The state's overall ranking was 12th, including first place spots in unemployment com-

pensation net worth, average workers' compensation insurance payments, annual average hourly manufacturing wages, and manhours lost due to work stoppages. The state also ranked in the top five in debt growth versus personal income growth, and transportation quality.

But Mississippi ranked last in the quality of health care available and 44th in quality of education. The other lowest scores were in available competent workforce, 45th, and trend toward unionization, 41st.

The consulting firm added quality of life factors to the survey this year because those factors contribute to the economic well-being of a state. Four quality of life factors were among 21 overall factors used in the ratings.

The firm said quality of life factors "can determine whether a region is perceived as a good or bad place to do business. In particular, there is a growing concern about

education; manufacturers said it was the sixth most important factor in the survey."

Mississippi leaders took a big step in improving the state's education system by passing education reforms. Now, Mississippians must continue to speak up for implementation of these reforms, as well as improvements in other areas, so that the state will be the most attractive one in the nation for industrial prospects.

### Renewal Decals Increased

Confusion concerning the motor vehicle inspection laws, and the price of license plate and boat registration decals has surfaced recently, according to Lt. Thomas Macon, director of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Branch of the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol.

Macon said his office is

receiving telephone calls from people who think that motor vehicle inspections are no longer mandatory and if they are, the price has been increased.

He said that annual motor vehicle inspections are mandatory and they are \$5.

"The last legislative change in the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law, which was effective July 1, 1986, increased the price of inspection stickers from \$2.50 to \$5. That law has been in effect for more than a year," Macon said.

According to the State Tax Commission, effective July 1, 1987, renewal decals for a vehicle license plate increased from \$3.75 to \$8.75 for decals expiring on or after July 1, 1987. The \$5 difference is earmarked for the highway construction fund.

Since June 30, 1987, motorists purchasing and registering a vehicle for the first time with the State Tax Commission pay \$10 more for

the metal license plate. Five dollars of the increase goes into the highway construction fund.

The Department of Wildlife Conservation stated that the price of boat registration decals remained at \$2.50 but a new boat numbering system went into effect July 1, 1987. Boat owners registering boats for the first time or re-registering boats will be issued new numbers. Boat registration decals are valid for two years.

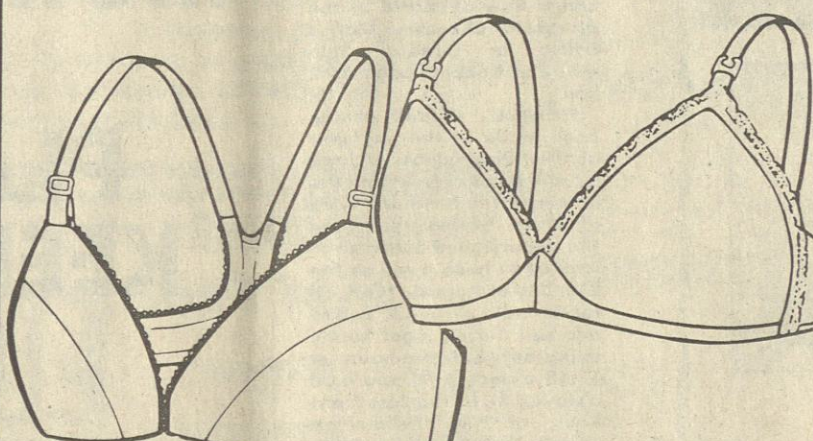
