Skeletal Remains Identified

Authorities have identified the skeletal remains found near Burnsville July 21 as those of Eddie Robert DiFranco. The remains were discovered by a passerby in the area near the wreckage of a stolen pickup truck.

DiFranco, whose age was given as either 22 or 23, was reportedly last seen May 10 when he left his brother's residence in Decatur, Alabama. It's believed he was headed back to Los Angeles, CA.

The vehicle was reportedly stolen from a Santa Ana, CA, resident April 15.

Additional studies are scheduled in order to determine the cause of DiFranco's death.

The meeting will begin with a barbecue pork supper. After the meal there will be a demonstration on selecting breeding gilts and a class of market hogs for the members to judge. This part of the program will be handled by Mark Crenshaw, Area Extension Swine Specialist from Pontotoc.

The speaking part of the program will include Wayne Feed Co. representative Johnny Franklin, Ken Banks and Dr. Donald T. Barnes, who will discuss Feeder Finance and Herd Health.

All persons interested in the swine industry are invited to this meeting.

Mabus Leads County Ticket

Ivey - Dobbs In Run-off For Sheriff

Approximately 55.46% of qualified electors in Tishomingo County exercised their voting privileges in Tuesday's First Democratic Primary according to unofficial Wednesday morning figures.

Tishomingo County joined hands with voters across Mississippi in placing Ray Mabus as front runner in the state's top job position for governor. With 90.8% of the state-wide precincts reporting Mabus stood at 266,167 or 38.2%. Mike Sturdivant received 109,580 for a 15.7% total. Mabus and Sturdivant will apparently face each other in the August 25 Democratic runoff - then go to the November General to face the Republican nominee.

In Tishomingo County unopposed Lt. Gov. Brad Dye received 6,332 votes. Dick Molpus led the ticket for Sec. of State with 5,391 votes over opposing Roy Jordan, 1,110 and Steve Turney at 523 votes.

One of the more interesting state races was that of Attorney General. Mike Moore took

the lead locally with 3,687 votes as compared to Dale Danks who showed 2,515. With 85.8% state-wide precincts reporting Moore continued to hold the lead.

Other state office results and district candidates votes are shown on pages 4 and 5 of this edition compliments of Iuka Guaranty Bank.

In one of the most heated races on the local county level, voters selected Marcus Ivey with 1,536 votes and gave Richard Dobbs 1,414 votes as their choice candidates for the sheriff's office. Ivey and Dobbs will square off in the August 25 runoff with the winner to face Independent sheriff's candidate Mike Kemp in the November 4 General Election.

Voters reelected Chancery Clerk Hayden Ables, Tax Assessor/Collector Horace Ledgewood, and County Coroner Dale White. Wayne Lambert was unopposed for County Surveyor and received 5,786 votes.

Of the six candidates vying for election to the office of Circuit Court Clerk,

Ruth Page Dawson led the totals with 2,098 votes. Gerald Parsons placed second with 1,830. Dawson and Parsons will face each other in the August 25 runoff with the winner being challenged in November by independent candidate Dale D. Tapp.

District one supervisor Lyonel "Cotton" Wade will be challenged by Frank Williams Jr. in the August 25 primary. Wade received 723 votes to his opponent's 614 total.

Ricky A. Cummings received the larger number of votes for second district supervisor from among seven candidates; however, Bobby H. Johnson ran second in the race placing the two on the August 25 runoff. Cummings received 564 votes to Johnson's 455.

Third district voters decided to re-elect incumbent Eleanor W. McKee as supervisor as well as fourth district voters with M.R. Whitehead.

Fifth district voters will choose between incumbent supervisor Leon Cook and opponent Vance Credille in the August 25 runoff. Cook received 700 votes to

Credille's 393 votes. This position showed two other candidates in the race; Donald Cleveland, 198 and Charles Higginbottom with 143.

James R. (J.R.) Blakney and James J. (Jim) Kirk will face in the August 25 runoff for Northend Justice Court Judge. Blakney tallied 1,755 votes to Kirk's 1,644.

Southend Justice Court Judge candidates who will compete in the August 25 election will be Willie Joe Sparks and incumbent J.W. Southard. Sparks led the ticket with 1,328 votes over Southard's 1,220 votes.

In the constable races incumbent Tim Blivins will face Allen (Troy) Hendrix in the August runoff. Blivins reported 1,656 votes with Hendrix showing 794. Four other candidates competed for the position.

Harmon Davis was chosen constable southend. He received 2,219 votes over Johnny Welch's 908 votes.

County Unemployment Stands At 18 Percent

Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, announced today that statistics just released indicated a slight decline in unemployment in Tishomingo County. Unemployment was estimated to be 18.0 percent of the civilian labor force, or 1,250 individuals, compared to 18.5 percent in May and 16.9 percent in June, 1986. The number of county residents employed declined at mid-month to reach 5,690, 90 below the previous estimate and 680 below the estimate for June, one year ago. The civilian labor force for the county also dropped, registering a

loss of 150 from last month and 730 from one year ago. Manufacturing employment in the county stood at 2,240, 40 below the May figure and 500 below June, one year ago. Individuals employed in nonmanufacturing jobs were estimated to be 2,520, approximately 80 below the previous figure and 140 below the June, 1986, figure.

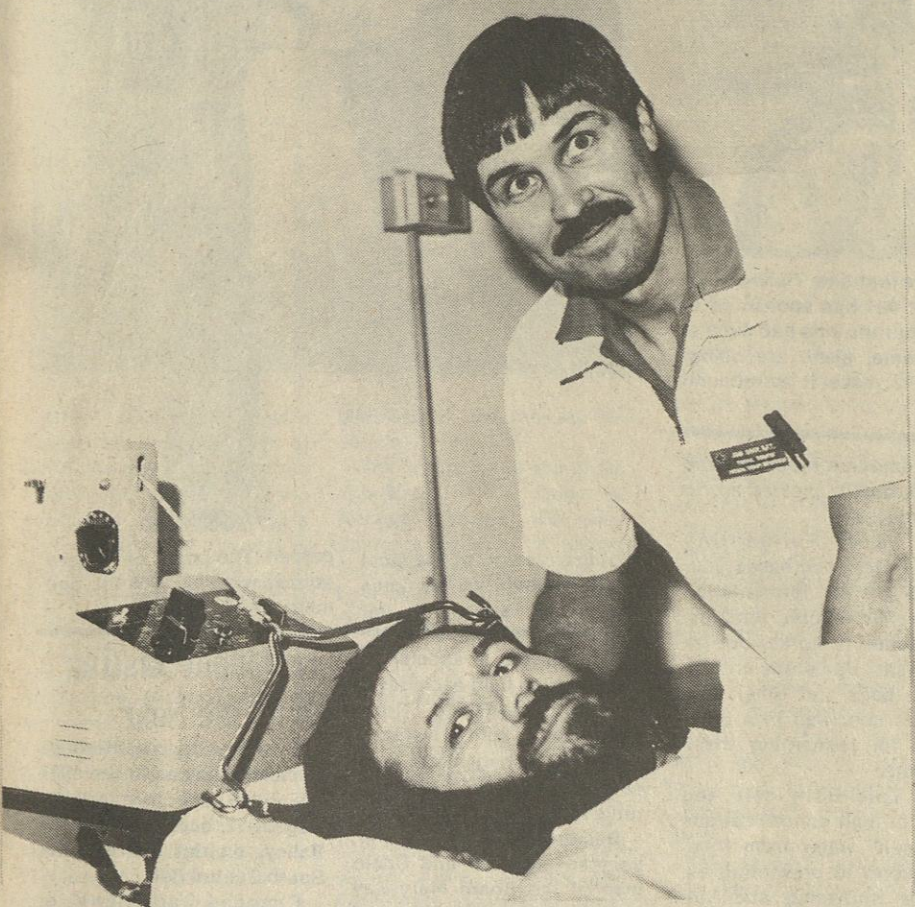
Voting procedures in Tuesday's Democratic Primary were carried out smoothly in the county thanks to the efficiency of

Surplus Food Distribution

The Tishomingo County Welfare Department announced today that U.S. Department of Agriculture Surplus Commodities will be distributed, Wednesday, August 19, 1987, beginning at 8:00 a.m.

Those households who receive food stamps received your vouchers in July for the August distribution. All other certified households (self declared income) will have their vouchers mailed on August 5, 1987, therefore, it will not be necessary for these households to come to the Welfare Office to pick up their vouchers. Households that do not receive a voucher

by mail will need to come to the office to have their certification updated. Anyone wishing to make an application may apply after August 5. Eligibility is based on income.

Misrepresentation of need, or sale or exchange of USDA commodities, is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance Program is available to all eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap.

Those receiving the surplus foods are requested to bring a paper sack for their convenience in carrying the items.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Pick The Best Process For Pickling

There's nothing like a pickle to separate the experts from the amateurs in home canning. To get your pickles in the expert category, test your knowledge of the essential facts on pickling and fermenting.

TRUE OR FALSE?

1. Ideally, cucumbers, cabbage and beets should be prepared for pickling within 24 hours after harvesting.
2. It is not necessary to use alum or lime to succeed in canning crisp pickles.
3. Canning salt will not discolor or leave a cloudy residue as iodized table salts may.
4. Vinegar used in pickling should have 5 percent acidity.
5. It is wise to cut 1/16 inch slice off each end of fresh

cucumbers to help prevent excessive softening of pickles.

6. It is important to pack pickles so they do not come in contact with the jar lids.

7. Pickling spices should be purchased new each year.

8. Pickling spices now contain the bitter flavors once obtained by adding grape leaves.

9. Large cucumbers are more susceptible to hollow center and softening than small cucumbers.

10. There is no suitable substitute for salt in pickles and sauerkraut.

11. Fermenting pickles and sauerkraut in jars is an acceptable method.

12. Excessive shriveling of pickles may occur because the salt or sugar content is too high, or the salt or sugar content was increased too rapidly.

Pick The Best Process For Pickling (Answers)

1. True-If you delay preparing cucumbers, cabbage and beets into pickled

CARING FOR YOUR PET

Facts

Before beginning any program to prevent canine heartworm disease, it is necessary to be sure that your dog is free of heartworms. Serious illness can result if the animal is placed on preventive medication and there are heartworms already present.

The noseprints of dogs are as distinctive as the fingerprints of people. In fact, the Canadian Kennel Club requires noseprints on every dog in the registry. Noseprints are made up of a unique pattern of lines or dots that can be readily identified.

Most psittacine (parrot-like) birds molt over several months, while birds in the passerine group (canary-like or "soft billed" birds) molt more quickly and heavily.

All warm-blooded mammals -- including humans -- can be infected by and spread rabies. Once symptoms of rabies appear, there is no known cure. The disease is almost always fatal.

Early diagnosis of an illness -- when it is easier and less costly to cure -- is a major step in preventing a serious health problem. Become a trained observer. If there's a change in your animal's disposition,



weight, eating habits or appearance, contact your veterinarian.

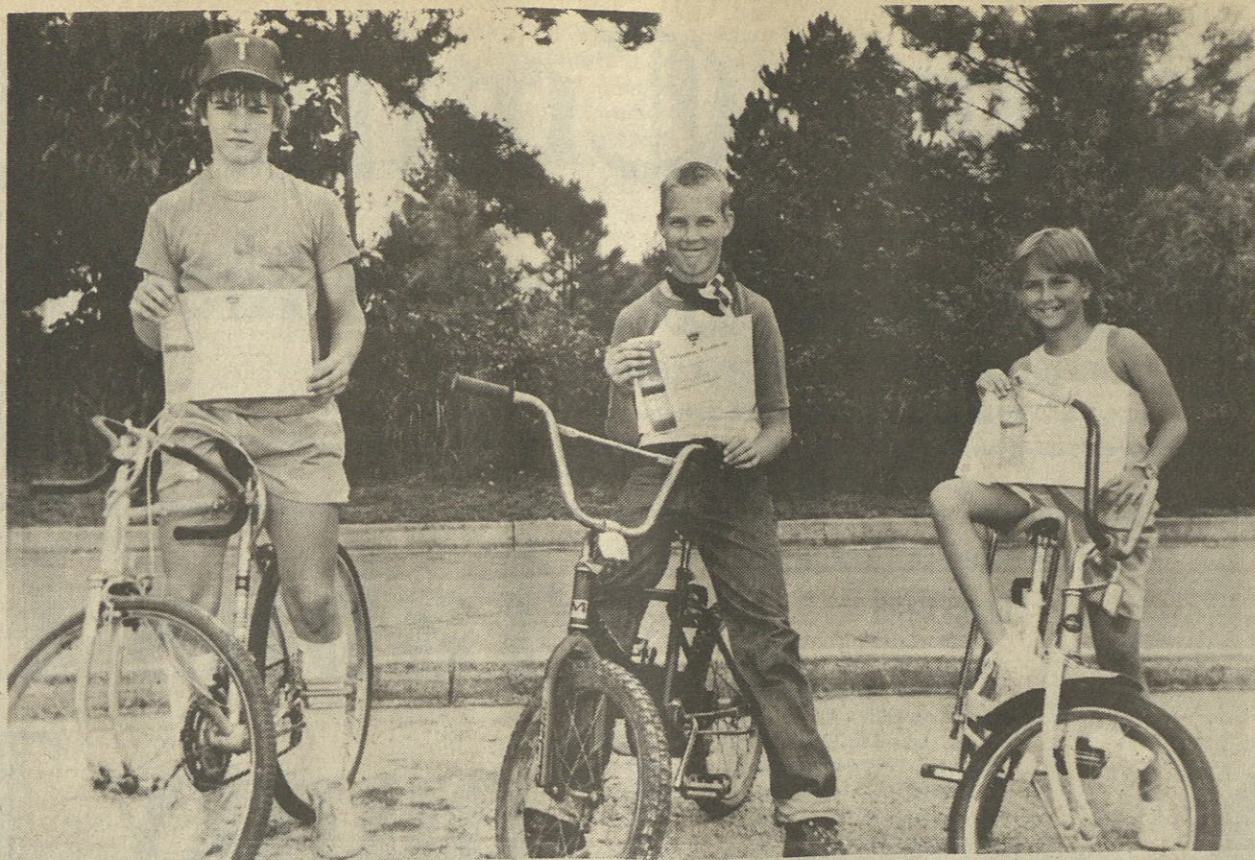
A recent study by the American Animal Hospital Association indicates that most dogs have a better than 95 percent chance of surviving heartworms disease if treated. Of course, the earlier the treatment begins, the better the dog's chances of survival.

A cat's purr does not originate in the throat. The sound begins in the blood system. It is the result of a vibration motion that arises from the wall of one of the major blood vessels in the chest area. These vibrations are readily transmitted to the upper air passages.

Mosquitoes are the only natural agent known to transmit canine heartworm disease. More than 60 different species of mosquitoes are capable of carrying the disease from dog-to-dog.

or fermented products more than 24 hours after harvest, their textures will be softer and their flavor will be less desirable.

2. True-Using a "pickling" variety of cucumbers of the ideal size, preserving right after harvest; and using tested recipes all contribute to obtaining firm pickled products without using lime or alum.

3. True-Canning or pickling salts do not contain additives as do normal free-flowing and iodized salts. The additives in table salts cause clouds and residues. The iodine may slightly inhibit a normal fermentation process. Iodine also reacts with starch to form blue colors.

4. True-All vinegar in pickling should have 5 percent acidity or acetic acid. This is a necessary control to insure that the proper proportions of acid is added to make these low acid vegetables safe. Homemade vinegar, unless tested and adjusted

properly, may vary from 1 to 10 percent acetic acid, and is not recommended for this reason. Salad vinegars may contain from 3 to 4 percent acetic acid and are also unsuitable for using with modern recipes.

5. True-The blossom end of cucumbers sometimes contains enzymes from harmless plant disease infections which cause excessive softening during pickling. Slicing off 1/16 of an inch of the end minimizes this problem.

6. True-Pickles are very acid products. The flat lid used in sealing jars may have invisible scratches in its enamel, and the acids in pickles if they come in contact with the underside of jar lids can cause quick rusting.

7. True-Ideally you should use fresh spices each year. The flavor intensity in spices carried over from past years in less, especially in ground spices. Also, spices con-

taining oil soluble flavors gradually oxidize and become rancid.

8. True-With modern recipes, there is no need to add grape leaves. The pungent and bitter flavors noted from using grape leaves are now contained in pickling spice mixes.

9. True-The ideal size of cucumbers for making most quick pickles is 4 inches or less. Larger firm green cucumbers -- up to 6 inches -- are suitable for long-term cured dills. Soft, yellow or large cucumbers make soft pickles!

10. True-Salt is an essential ingredient in pickles and

exact amounts must be used if safe, quality pickles are to be produced.

11. False-Fermenting foods in jars decreases your control of the fermentation and is a "hit or miss" practice. Sometimes it works, but often it fails. Use stone crocks, plastic bags and other controls as specified in a good recipe for fermenting these products.

12. True-Both salt and sugar in high concentrations will "pull" water from food. The secret to preventing excessive shriveling and softening is to add low levels of salt or sugar initially. Then gradually, add a little more salt until the optimum level is reached -- daily or two to three times each week. Gradual changes result in a final product with firmer texture.

The last date to add listings or make changes in the 1987 telephone directory will be August 12, according to Tom Bailey, district manager for South Central Bell.

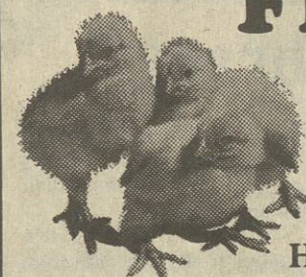
Changes, additions or corrections may be made by calling toll free to the residence or business service centers. Residence customers call 1-557-6500 and business customers, 1-557-6000.

County Agents Notes

Farm Family Stress

We really should be thankful for the things we have because it's almost too easy to lose sight of our blessings. I see many of our farm families in Tishomingo County struggling to cope with the farm crisis, and it's amazing to me how our people here rise above their problems.

There's no doubt, however, that the constant struggle to survive puts much wear and

tear on family members. Dealing with anger, frustration, bitterness and grief is sometimes impossible to handle alone.

Farm families must strengthen their ties and regain their sense of worth before they can begin to live again. The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and Farm Bureau are sponsoring workshops to help farm families recover their self dignity. One workshop has already been held and another one is scheduled for August 28-29 at Lake Tiak O'Khata in Louisville.

The workshop is open to anyone in Mississippi but enrollment is limited. Please come by the Extension office or go by and see Charles Monroe, President of our County Farm Bureau. Applications for the workshop are due August 14. Please let us help you if your family is having problems. We need you too much in Tishomingo County.

Weed Control

Weeds cause untold problems if they are allowed to grow out of control. Left to themselves, weeds can create fire hazards, increase maintenance costs, damage asphalt and spoil the attractiveness of Tishomingo County. Here are some weed control tips.

Kill vegetation and maintain bare grounds by using soil sterilants or repeat applications of foliar treatment. Leave vegetation roots and new growth to reduce erosion. New growth may quickly develop with treatment.

Selectively kill tall weeds and allow bermudagrass or other perennial grasses to remain for cover or beauty. Be selective in killing grasses but keep broadleaves, such as clover, growing.

Doctor Scott, I've been told I have esophagus reflux. I'm not sure I understand what that means. I do know I have lots of heartburn. Could you explain this for me.

What is

gastroesophageal reflux?

When you swallow food, it travels down a tube called the esophagus to the stomach. The lower end of the esophagus -- called the sphincter -- closes to keep the food in the stomach. If the sphincter is not able to remain closed, the stomach contents flow back -- or reflux -- into the esophagus. This backward flow is the condition called gastroesophageal reflux.

The stomach contains acid that helps in digesting food. When stomach acid refluxes into the esophagus, it can irritate the lining and cause the burning sensation called heartburn. If it refluxes all the

way into the throat, produces a sour taste in the mouth. Sometimes reflux causes cramps or sharp chest pain. Other times, it produces a feeling of pressure in the chest.

Gastroesophageal reflux is common. About 1 of every 3 persons has this problem daily and about 1 of 3 has it occasionally. For most people gastroesophageal reflux does not interfere with general health. In some people, however, stomach acid refluxes into the esophagus, causing coughing, choking, difficulty breathing, or even pneumonia. Over a long time, scar tissue may build up in the esophagus and make swallowing difficult.

In next week's column we will discuss treatment for gastroesophageal reflux. (Patient Care)

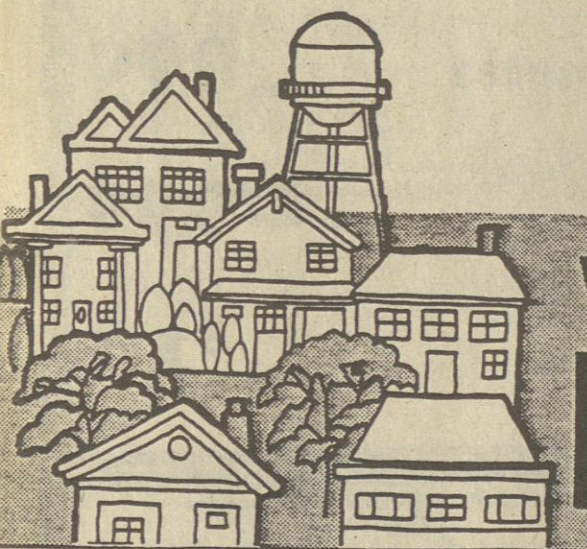

Ask Ochsner

Q. I have donated blood for many years at our local hospital but am now concerned about getting AIDS. Can you get AIDS from donating blood?

B.G., Baton Rouge, La.
A. According to Dr. Shannon Cooper, director of the blood bank at the Ochsner Medical Institutions in New Orleans, LA, the risk of contracting AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome) when giving blood at a blood bank is nonexistent. And the risk of getting the disease following a blood transfusion is very small, he says.

Today only a very small number of people may be exposed to the AIDS virus through blood transfusions and incidences of this are declining every day due to the recent upgrading of the AIDS antibody test. Results of the test, which takes about three hours to perform, can be available in one day, Dr. Cooper says. The test, approved two years ago by the Food and Drug Administration, has undergone extensive analysis and refining.

The first and most important of the screening mechanisms for blood donation is to screen the potential donor "upfront" before contaminated blood

enters the blood bank system. The Ochsner Blood Bank screens every donor by asking a lot of questions, providing reading materials and asking the potential donor not to give blood if they fall in one of the high risk groups.

There are six categories of high risk people - sexually active homosexual or bisexual men, present or past abusers of intravenous drugs, patients with hemophilia and sexual partners of individuals at increased risk of AIDS. Following the screening process and actual donation, the AIDS antibody test is then performed.

Recently, the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta,

recommended that patients who received blood transfusions between 1978 and March 1985, consider testing for exposure to the AIDS virus. Because donated blood was not screened for the AIDS antibody until March 1985, the CDC suggested that some people who received transfusions during that period take tests to see if they had the AIDS antibody. Dr. Cooper says that the CDC officials were basically targeting those people who received multiple transfusions during that period and who lived in areas with large AIDS populations. The CDC, Dr. Cooper says, pointed out this group as having the greatest risk of having

been exposed to the virus through transfusions.

Point Of Law

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your legal rights.)

Q. I have been married for five years. I have two children, ages four and two. My husband beats me a couple of times a week. He tells me that if I leave, he will get my children. I've never worked and I don't have any money. My parents are dead and I have no other family. I want to get out, but what can I do?

A. There are seven domestic violence shelters in the State of Mississippi which provide safe temporary

shelter, food, clothing, counseling and legal, medical and psychological advocacy. To get custody of your children, your husband would have to prove that you are an unfit mother. The shelters and their phone numbers are: Domestic Abuse Family Shelter, Laurel, MS - 428-8821; Gulf Coast Women's Center, Biloxi, MS - 435-1968; Safe, Inc., Tupelo, MS - 844-9546; Domestic Violence Project, Inc., Oxford, MS - 234-8744; Catholic Charities, Jackson, MS - 355-8634; Care Lodge, Meridian, MS - 693-2892; and Safe Haven, Columbus, MS - 328-0200 or 327-2121.

Q. I am a widow and own my home. When I die I want my son to have it, but when he dies I want it to go to my granddaughter. Is there any way I can do this?

A. Yes. In your will you can devise the home to your son for the period of his lifetime, with a provision that upon his death the remainder will go to your granddaughter. If you do this then, even if your son sells his interest in the house, when he dies the ownership automatically goes to your granddaughter.

LAND RENTALS APPRAISALS

Free or Reduced School Lunches

The State Department of Education and Tishomingo County School District and the Iuka Separate School District today announced the United States Department of Agriculture income guidelines for free and reduced price meals served under the School Lunch, School Breakfast, Food Distribution and Child Care Food Programs. Families with children in any of these facilities, who are unable to pay the full price of the meals are encouraged to apply for benefits.

Applications and instructions for applying, will be sent home with each student during registration or on the first day of school. To apply for the meal benefits, households should fill out the application and return it to the school or center. Additional copies of the application are available at the administration office of each facility.

For the school/center officials to determine eligibility, the household must report income information or provide a food stamp or AFDC case number. If the child receives AFDC payments, or

is a member of a food stamp household, the parent or guardian only has to provide the name of child, food stamp or AFDC case number, and the signature of the parent or guardian. Other applicants must report the total household income and the amount, and the source of income received by each household member. In order for income applicants to be approved, the household must also provide the following on the application: the names of all household members; the social security numbers of all adult household members or an indication that the adult does not have a social security number; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data. The information provided may be verified at any time during the year by school/center or program officials. Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month

or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price or free meals if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown in the income scales. Households may apply for benefits at any time during the year as circumstances change.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for meal benefits for them, the household should contact the school/center for more information.

Each school/center has a copy of the approved free and reduced meal policy. The policy indicates who is responsible for determining eligibility. The determining official is in most instances the principal, the food service supervisor, or the center director. Each school/school district/center has an individual named as the hearing official. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the determining official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to the hearing official. The school/center office or the superintendent's office staff can provide you the name, address and phone number of the hearing official.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S.D.A. no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap.

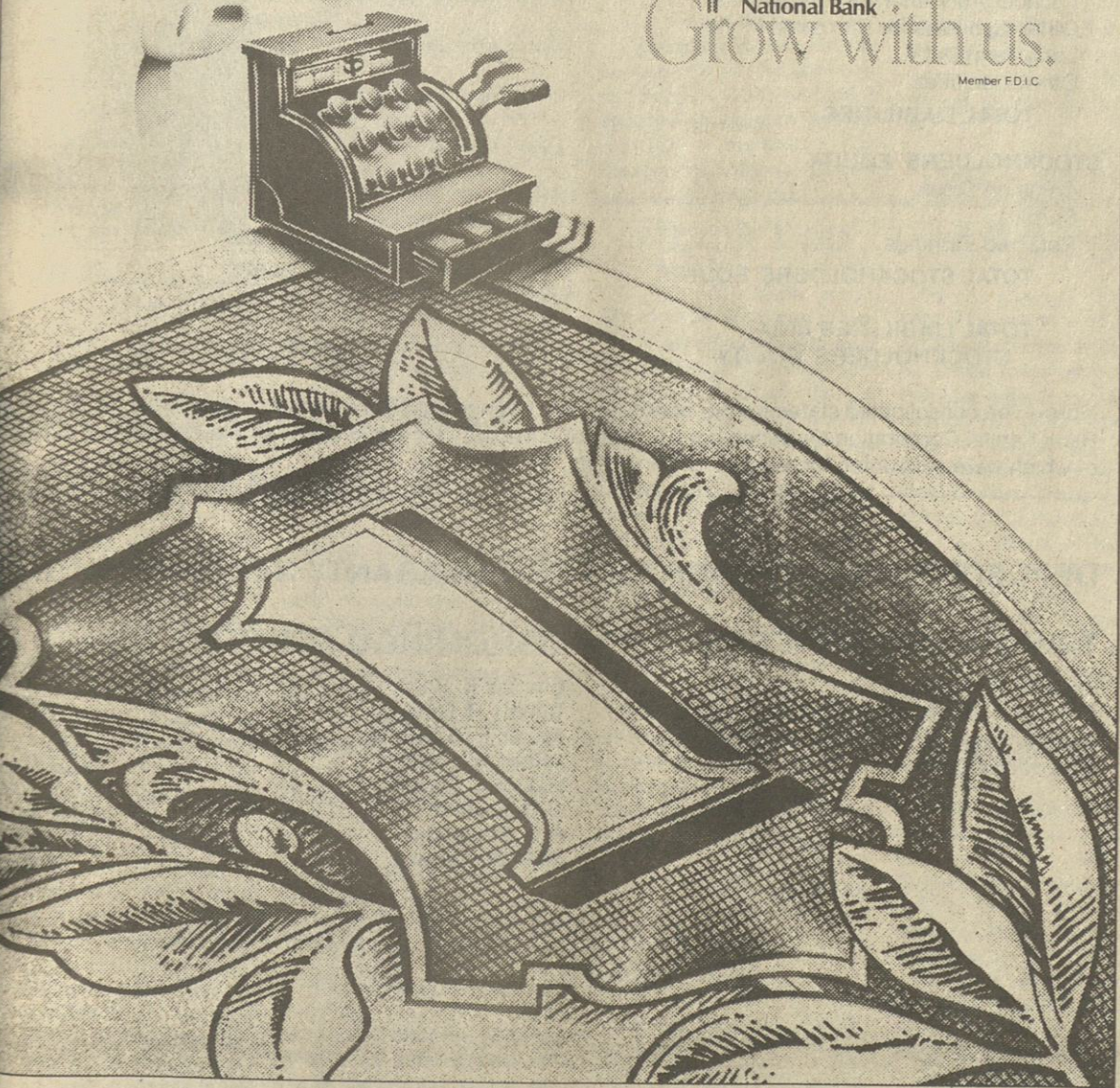

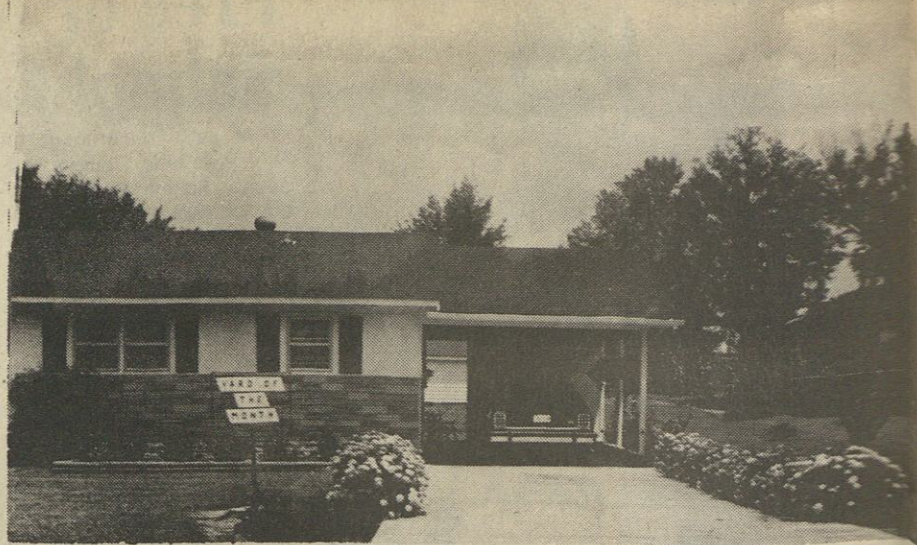
