Annual Flu Immunizations Available At Local Health Office

"Shots are not just for kids," affirmed State Health Officer Dr. Alton B. Cobb. "Adults need immunizations, too." County health departments statewide will start the annual immunization effort for influenza September 1. This year, health officials also recommend pneumococcal vaccine. Recipients will pay \$5.00 per shot to help cover the cost of the vaccine and its administration.

The Tishomingo County Health Department has scheduled flu shots to be given in Iuka on Thursday, September 3, and Friday, September 4, between 1 and 4 p.m. each day. In addition, flu shots will be given Tuesday, September 8, from 1-4 p.m. Flu shots will be given at the Belmont Clinic Tuesday, September 15, 9-11:30 a.m., then from 1-3 p.m. This year's influenza vaccine provides protection against the current prevalent strains of flu: A/Taiwan/1/86, A/Leningrad/360/86, and B/Ann Arbor/1/86. The nurse can give the pneumococcal vaccine at the same time.

"Influenza poses particular problems for the very people who are least able to cope with the disease, such as the elderly or those with chronic heart or lung diseases," the State Health Officer said. "The influenza virus can cause major epidemics of respiratory disease, as we see nearly every winter, and it causes thousands of excess deaths nationwide among

this population."

The Surgeon General reports that 10 thousand or more deaths have been associated with influenza epidemics in 17 of the years from 1957 to 1984. More than 80 percent of the excess deaths attributed to influenza epidemics occur among persons 65 years of age or older. Attack rates during outbreaks in nursing homes are as high as 60 percent, with fatality rates of 30 percent or higher.

Pneumococcal infections, mainly pneumonia, are important causes of severe illness and death in the same groups. About a half million cases of pneumococcal disease are estimated to occur annually in the United States. The case rate increases with age, and the fatality rate in those 60 years old and older is 25 to 35 percent.

Pneumococcal vaccine is available year-round at county health departments.

Influenza is an acute disease of the respiratory tract spread by person-to-person contact through droplet infection. Symptoms include fever, chills, headache, muscle pain, tiredness, mild sore throat, and inflammation of the nasal passages, cough is often severe and long-lasting. Most patients recover on their own in about seven days.

Pneumococcal bacteria can cause pneumonia and blood infections. People who have chronic heart, lung, kidney, or immune system

problems, and those over age 65 are at highest risk of dying from pneumococcal pneumonia.

Immunizations for these and other vaccine-preventable diseases are available from family physicians or the local county health department. Readers should call in advance to schedule an immunization appointment.

Industrial Recruitment Reviewed At Meeting

Tishomingo County Development Foundation director Mack L. "We are already seeing the results of a commitment made by Del Shields, vice president and general manager of P. S. P. Industries of Milpitas, California, to increase employment at Monotech," Wadkins noted. "P. S. P. is the parent company of Monotech. Employment at Monotech is expected to double by the end of the year," he said.

As a result of the California trip, Mayor Biggs and Wadkins are also working with two other prospects who have expressed a strong interest in locating in this county.

"We are also encouraged by the interest shown in the Bay Springs resort project by some developers we met at

the Titan Capital Corporation Convention," Wadkins stated. Both Mayor Biggs and Wadkins credited Frank King, formerly of Iuka, with making these contacts possible. King is President of Titan Capital Corporation. "Frank King not only set up appointments for us to meet with plant officials, he also provided transportation to get us there," Wadkins stated.

Two Iuka Men Charged In Rape

Two Iuka men have been arrested and remain in jail following the alleged Sunday night kidnapping rape of a 13 year old girl, according to Iuka Police Chief Floyd Whitaker. Both suspects are also charged with the kidnapping of a second 14 year old girl who managed to escape, the Chief said.

According to statements given to Whitaker, the victim

and her friend were in front of her house when the two men came up and forced the pair into a car at gunpoint.

The 14 year old managed to jump out of the vehicle in an area known as Chicken Run Road, the report said and tried to get help. The victim told officials she was then assaulted by one of the subjects while the other held her hands. According to

statements given officials, she was then taken to her home and shoved out of the vehicle.

Authorities arrested a 38 year old white male at his residence early Monday morning. The second subject reportedly ran, but was later arrested around 10 a.m. at his place of employment in Belmont.

The young girl was

examined at Tishomingo Hospital where the rape was confirmed, Whitaker said. Test results have been sent to the crime lab in Jackson.

Bond has been set at \$10,000 for each of the men charged in the crime by County Attorney Richard Bowen. Both await action to be taken by the Tishomingo County Grand Jury which is scheduled to meet September 9.

Local Unemployment Rate At 15.6 Percent

Tishomingo County's unemployment rate for July decreased. The unemployment statistics for the area were released by Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. This office serves Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo counties.

The July unemployment rate for Tishomingo County was 15.6 percent, 2.3 percentage points below the June rate of 17.9 percent and 2.4 percentage points below the rate recorded for July, 1986 - 18.0 percent.

The county's unemployment rate remains 5.9 percentage points above the state average of 9.7 percent. It is 9.5 percent above the national rate of 6.1 percent.

Smith noted that the civilian labor force for the county for July was 7,060, compared to 7,030 in June and 7,740 in July, 1986.

The number employed in

creased 190 to 5,960. June's figure was 5,770 while one year ago 6,350 had jobs.

Smith also noted that manufacturing employment registered 2,400 at mid-July, compared to 2,280 in June and 2,800 in July, one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment, estimated to be 2,570, experienced a slight increase of 50 from last month and 10 from one year ago.

way and retard it in others. This can also be achieved by thinning, pruning, cutting, releasing, and harvesting.

The first step to managing a woodland is to evaluate what is already there, and then to decide what you want there in the future. This is not a simple decision. The more you understand and appreciate a woodlot, the more difficult it is to direct it toward a single use, such as income or recreation.

No matter how supremely sure a woodland owner you may be, if the decision was made without the consultation of a government or private forester, you are more likely to go wrong. Even if your goal is simply to sit in the shade, a forester's advice is a bargain, given the cost of educating yourself. A forester can study soil maps, topography, and exposure and tell you which trees are best suited to the site. At a glance a forester can judge what stage of regeneration the woods are in. A forester can estimate living volume wood per acre, the growth rate, and the sustained yield that can be expected. A forester can suggest harvesting techniques, markets for your pulpwood, timber or firewood, and where to position access roads as well as how to make wildlife-habitat improvement. When the plan for your woodlot becomes more specific, a forester can help find government subsidies for erosion-control efforts, regeneration, and timber stand improvement.

For Gourmets
On A Calorie Shoestring
Trying to trim a few extra pounds? Have your low-calorie meals become dull and boring?

Get your meal off to a bright and appetizing start by trying some of the following ideas:

- *Create mini-fruit kabobs by alternating pieces of fruit and small cheese cubes
- *Have an assortment of

raw vegetables, such as green pepper rings, carrot and celery sticks, snow peas, cucumber and zucchini slices, and broccoli and cauliflower florets, with a lot of fat cottage cheese or bean dip.

*For a hot beverage, heat a combination of pineapple and grapefruit juice with a stick of cinnamon and cloves.

*Coffee and tea are popular beverages. Spice up your steamy cup with cinnamon and cloves instead of sugar and cream.

*For a treat, try cooking fruits such as apples, pears, peaches, and berries in a small amount of water and cinnamon. Serve as a hot or cold compote.

*Stuff celery with vegetable-cottage cheese salad.

*Arrange clusters of green and red grapes, fresh and canned fruit and melon balls in a lettuce lined platter.

*Start the meal with a fruit or vegetable juice combo. Try cranberry with orange juice, grape with apple, or even tomato with pineapple juice.

Although some people might disagree, beginning a diet is not the same thing as starting a prison sentence. Here are 10 Tips to help in winning the battle of the bulge:

1. Plan your meals and snacks ahead of time. Haphazard eating is often high-calorie eating.
2. Write your shopping list when you are not hungry, and go grocery shopping on a full stomach. Only buy what is on your list.
3. Cut back on high-calorie snack foods. If buying them is a must for the rest of the family, store them out of sight.
4. Eat at only one or two locations in your home such as the kitchen or dining room table. While eating, do not read or watch television; instead concentrate on what you are eating. You will enjoy the meal much more and eat less.
5. Allow yourself only one moderate serving. Try portioning out your food before bringing it to the table.
6. Use a smaller dinner plate than usual to make your portion look larger. We eat with our eyes.
7. Eat slowly so you will feel full. Savor and enjoy every bite of food. Try putting

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substitute)
½ cup skim milk
1 pound ground turkey
¾ cup rolled oats
1 onion, peeled and finely chopped
½ cup shredded extra-sharp American or Cheddar cheese
3 Tablespoons catsup (optional)

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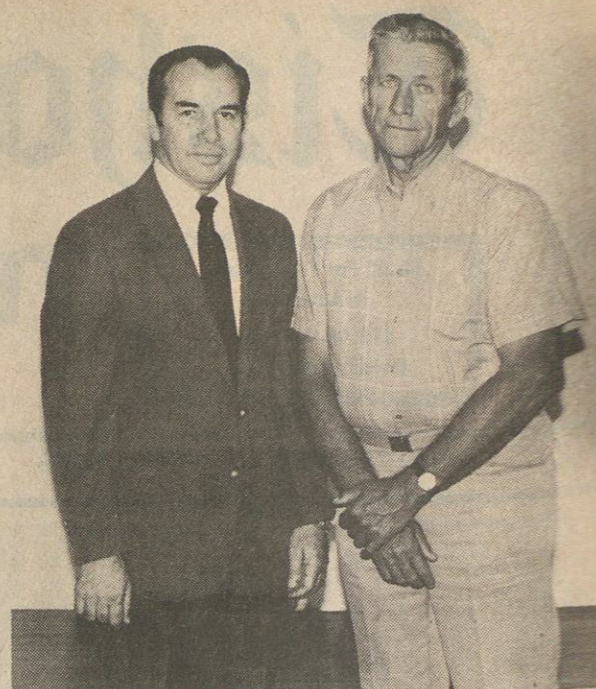
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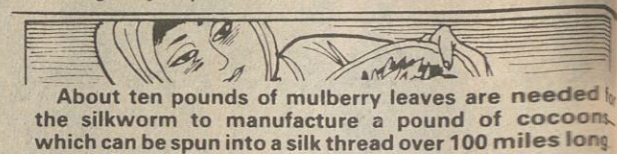

Questions and Answers Regarding Periodontal Disease

What is periodontal disease?

It is a chronic inflammatory disease that affects the gum tissue, ligaments and bone around the teeth. It causes weakening and ultimate destruction of these tissues which protect and support the teeth and hold them in place. *Pyorrhea* is an older, outdated term for this disease.

How does periodontal disease start?

It starts with gum inflammation. If the problem is not corrected the inflammation gradually extends below the gum line. Now the fibers connecting each tooth to its bony socket are affected. As time goes on, the bone will also become involved as the inflammation extends deeper into the fiber area.

What causes periodontal disease?

Bacterial plaque! Plaque, simply defined, is an organized colony of bacteria which causes inflammation and ultimately the breakdown of the gum tissue and bone. Of course, there are also other causative factors which contribute to periodontal breakdown. Examples are missing teeth, food impactions, poor occlusion, etc. Bacterial plaque, however, is the primary cause of periodontal disease.

Can it be controlled?

Yes, except in the most advanced cases or in situations where the patient refuses to accept responsibility for proper home care.

But, Doctor,

I brush all the time!

We do not wish to imply that patients do not brush. But brushing cleans only the cheek, tongue, and biting surfaces of the teeth.

Periodontal disease starts and does its greatest damage between the teeth. How the patient cleans is most important particularly in the between the teeth areas where the toothbrush cannot reach.

What, exactly, is plaque?

Plaque is a sticky, transparent substance which clings to the teeth. Once removed, it reforms again in 24 hours. In this substance live an enormous number of micro-organisms. Because most of the bacteria live in protected areas which are inaccessible to conventional toothbrushing, they pose a constant threat to the teeth and gum tissue.

As the bacterial elements organize to form plaque (every 24 hours) they produce toxic acids which can ultimately destroy the holding fibers and the supporting bone.

What are the symptoms of periodontal disease?

1. Bleeding gums.
2. Excessive formation of calculus deposits.
3. Drifting or shifting of any teeth - including fanning of the front teeth.
4. Loosening of any teeth.
5. Any swelling in the gingival (gum) area, possibly indicating the presence of an abscess.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



If An Animal Bites...

Veterinarians frequently are contacted by persons in great fear and near panic. A member of their family has been bitten by a dog - or other animal.

The bite may be from a strange dog - or from a "friend." Either way, it's a painful experience.

If bitten, remember not to panic. Make positive identification of the animal, if possible. Note details. Enlist the aid of witnesses in getting an accurate description.

Color, markings, size Breed, sex, collar and tag, where the animal came from and where it went are all important. Making a positive identification may make the difference as to whether the right animal is confined or not.

If possible, without the danger of further biting, get the animal confined until help can be secured. The animal should be confined for 10 days. If the dog or cat

is alright at the end of 10 days, there is no danger of rabies transmission at the time of the bite. If the animal dies before 10 days are up, the head should be examined for rabies.

If bitten by a wild animal, it may be necessary to destroy the animal. Do not destroy the head or damage it. The head should be taken to the veterinarian or to the health department immediately.

Timberline

When working with landowners, we often stress the importance of growing the proper species of trees on the proper sites. We especially emphasize that upland sites should be converted from low-quality hardwood to pine. On these sites, pines

generally grow well and tend to be worth more than lower-quality hardwoods.

People are often justifiably concerned about the effect this stand conversion will have on wildlife, especially the gray squirrel. We at the Forestry Commission like squirrels and other animals as well as anyone, and we are not about to make management recommendations that make them an endangered species.

We recommend converting

upland sites to pine. By this I mean the upper slopes and tops of ridges and hills. Stream bottoms, and lower slopes will grow good-quality hardwood and can be very expensive to convert to pine. Hardwoods are generally the proper species for this type of site and are highly desirable for the gray squirrel as well as other wildlife.

By following a timber management plan landowners may increase their

timber income and at the same time make the forest more attractive to a wider variety of wildlife. Some animals that do not make extensive use of open hardwood forests are attracted to the bushy conditions that exist in young pine plantations. Examples of these animals are cottontail rabbits, bobwhite quail, many songbirds, and to some extent, whitetailed deer.

Wildlife biologists tell us that many animals are attracted

to the areas where the different types of stands meet. This area is called the "edge effect." The system of forest management described here will produce much of this edge effect.

One of the many things landowners may do to improve wildlife habitat is to establish supplemental feeding areas or "food plots". Small open areas can be planted with vetch or lespedeza, and firelanes, woods roads

and utility rights of way can be planted with a green cover crop such as wheat, oats or fescue. This will help control erosion and also improve the effectiveness for fire control as well as supply food for animals.

Another useful technique to encourage wildlife is to maintain natural food and den trees. This can be accomplished by leaving a few of the more active den trees while deadening hardwood trees to prepare the site for

planting pine. Landowners should not leave too many den trees as the shade will stunt the growth of the pine seedlings. Two or three suitable den trees an acre are sufficient.

Probably the most important thing for wildlife is proper stand maintenance. Thinning pine stands followed by a correctly carried out prescribed burn will encourage the growth of grass and foodbearing

shrubs. Good management is often wildlife management. It is possible to increase timber income and make wildlife more attractive by planning.

Twin Magnolias To Be Open To Public

Iuka, Mississippi, often called "The Fisherman's Paradise", possesses an unusual charm for visitors. There are attractions for fishermen, hunters, vacationers and historians. September 19 and 20th, 1987, starting at 8:00 a. m., Iuka's colorful past will be spotlighted with the festivities planned for the Battle of Iuka Re-enactment. One addition to the festivities will be Iuka's historic tour.

The walking/driving tour will showcase over 40 sites of interest and will be free to the public. A Historic Tour brochure, containing the sites' location and their history, will be available at the old Tishomingo County Courthouse or the Registration Center at the Tishomingo County Fairgrounds. Iuka's landmarks add color, beauty, and interest to the town; and we know the tour will be enjoyed by all.

Twin Magnolias will be one of the lovely homes featured in this year's tour. Twin Magnolias, home of Mr. and Mrs. Neil Davis, is rich in southern history. It was the home of John M. Stone, who served as a major in the Confederate Army and who became Governor of Mississippi in 1876. At the time of his death in 1900, Governor Stone was president of the Agricultural

and Mechanical College, which is now Mississippi State University. After the Battle of Iuka, many wounded men were brought to this home. General Henry Little of Maryland died of his wounds in the master bedroom and was buried in the rose garden until after the war. Mrs. Celia Coman Fulkerson occupied "Rose Cottage" until her death in 1980 at age 92. "Miss Celia" was a piano teacher and one of Iuka's most colorful citizens. The home was purchased in 1980 by the Davises from James H. Coman, III and renamed "Twin Magnolias" in honor of the two majestic magnolia trees which dominate the front lawns.

Iuka has much for which to be proud. On the morning of September 20, 1862, the morning after the Battle of Iuka after shells struck the Merrill Home and other buildings, Samuel Dewoody tied a bedsheet to a broomhandle and led a group of elderly citizens from the G. P. Hammerly Home. The group marched toward Simmons Hill where they met the advancing Federal troops. The group's plea was "spare our town". This request was apparently honored and the town remained intact. One hundred and twenty-five years later, Iuka will be showcasing that which was spared; her history, charm, and beauty.

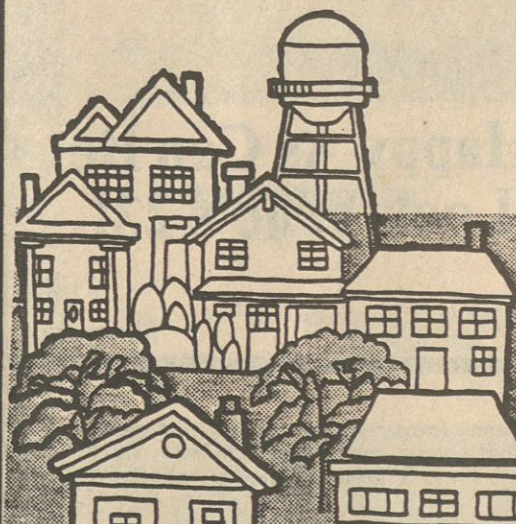

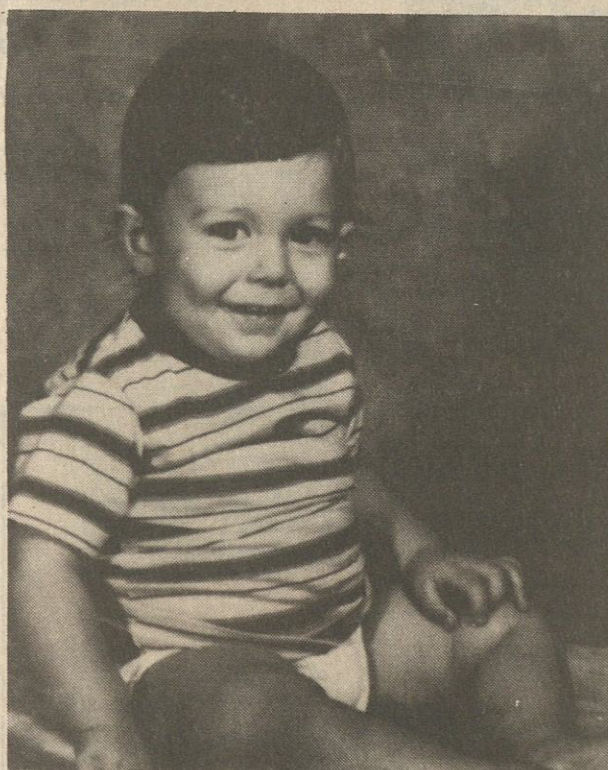

ASCS Farm News

Corn Loan Rate Announced
The loan and purchase rate, for Tishomingo County's 1987-crop corn is \$1.90 per bushel, down 14 cents per bushel from the 1986 rate, according to David Wilson, County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Wilson said for the first time, the rate reflects relative county market prices arrived at by using the same method for determining posted prices used for exchanging commodity certificates. The rate also reflects production and compensation trends and other data. He said the \$1.90 per bushel loan rate is for corn grading U.S. No. 2 or better.

Commodity loan programs are administered by ASCS. Tishomingo County farmers placed about 12,000 bushels of 1986-crop corn under price support loan.

"The primary purpose of the program is to offer farmers a tool for marketing their grain," Wilson said. Historically, during harvest time, market prices are generally less than what they are during other times of the year, and the loan program provides farmers with an opportunity to take advantage of any possible increase in market prices at a later time.

To qualify for price support loans, the ASCS official said

farmers need only to comply with acreage reduction program provisions.

Funeral Services Held For Harold T. White, Sr.

"We have lost a great Mississippian, a giant of a man who touched the lives of thousands upon thousands of Mississippians and who has left a dynasty that will live on for years," former Governor Bill Waller said memorializing Harold T. White, Sr., during services at First Baptist Church in Booneville, MS, August 28.

White, 63, who had served as president of Northeast Mississippi Community College since 1965, was found dead Wednesday, August 26, in his Jackson hotel room. He had attended a meeting of the Mississippi Junior College Association Tuesday and had stayed overnight to attend the special legislative session called by Governor Allain.

Hinds County Coroner Robert Martin said White died of an apparent heart attack. Lt. Governor Brad Dye, numerous state legislators and other government, business and educational leaders were among the crowd estimated at over 600 at Friday's services.

Former Governor Waller said of White, "He could have been a U.S. ambassador, and could easily have served as Senator or Congressman."

White, he said, was almost as well known in Jackson and Washington as he was in Northeast Mississippi.

The Reverend Joe Cobb, Director of Northeast's Baptist Student Union and Dr. Bill Duncan, pastor of Booneville First Baptist, gave examples of White's great faith.

Duncan compared White to the Biblical Joseph. "Both men rose from humble beginnings to become leaders with great power and influence. Harold White was a natural born leader that God skilled and perfected," Duncan said.

Former Miss Northeast Ladye Love Long of luka sang one of White's favorite hymns "How Great Thou Art" at the services. Northeast music instructors Shirley Taylor and Ray Harris provided piano and organ meditation.

Memorial services were held at Wiggins, Mississippi, First Baptist Church on Saturday. Burial was in the Woodlawn Cemetery in Wiggins.

Campus memorial services

were held Tuesday in Bonner Arnold Coliseum with student government leaders and campus religious organizations taking part.

During White's administration at Northeast, more than 20 educational and auxiliary facilities were constructed and major renovations made to existing buildings. Additional land was purchased to allow for future expansion. Approximately 20 million dollars in excess of the regular budget allocation was expended in the physical program.

In keeping with his philosophy that Northeast exists for the student, White worked diligently to strengthen the college's offerings in an effort to increase enrollment and to make higher education available to every person who sought it. Great advances were made during his administration to reach the non-traditional and disadvantaged students. During his early years, White organized the Division of Community Services and Continuing Education so that off-campus courses and evening classes could be offered to accommodate the students of Northeast Mississippi.

Significant strides were made in the instructional area as well. Many new programs were added during his tenure including the Department of Vocational and Technical Education and developmental and remedial education.

Other significant developments include the formation of the Northeast Development Foundation and the reorganization of the Alumni Association. The now famous Tiger Band was organized under his direction.

One of White's goals for a number of years recently became a reality when the State Board of Trustees for Community and Junior Colleges announced that as of August 1, the Northeast Mississippi Junior College would officially become Northeast Mississippi Community College.

Honored many times, White was the 1980 recipient of the Meritorious Service Award from the Mississippi Personnel and Guidance Association. He was named State Educational Ad-

ministrator of the Year in 1982 by the Mississippi Association of Educational Office Personnel and received the Business and Professional Women's Award

for Recognition for Support. In addition to his numerous listings in professional publications, he was named Phi Theta Kappa Fellow by Phi Theta Kappa National Honor Fraternity for Community and Junior Colleges. White was recipient of the Booneville Junior Auxiliary's Outstanding Citizen of the Year Award for Booneville and Prentiss County in 1986.

The veteran administrator was a past representative for Mississippi to the Appalachian regional Commission in Washington, a member of the Northeast Mississippi Environmental Consortium and past chairman of the Board of Directors of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority.

White held memberships in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges and was past president and member of the Mississippi Junior College Association. He was an active member of the First Baptist Church of Booneville.

A widower, White's survivors include three sons, Harold T. White, Jr., of Jackson, James Malcolm White of Jackson and Bradford Carlisle White of Franklin, Tennessee; one brother, James White of Wiggins and 2 granddaughters.

A memorial scholarship has been established in memory of President White by his family.

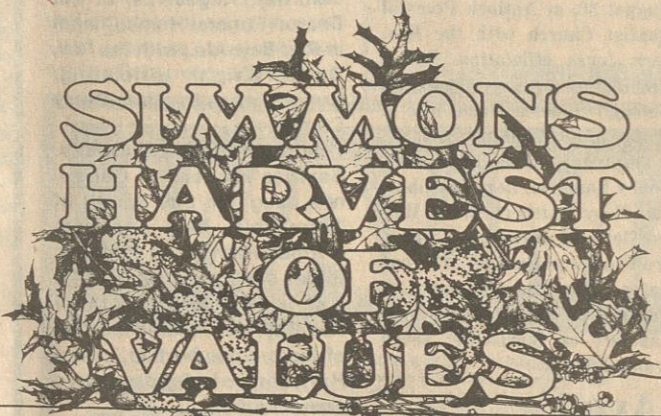

ty, with no possession limit permitted on the opening day of any season.

Hunters should know that they must have their guns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells. They will need a valid hunting license in their possession before going afield.

More Questions And Answers About Asthma And Asthma Medication

Will I have to take asthma medication?

Yes. Taking proper medication is the second step in preventing asthma attacks. The goal of asthma therapy is to allow you to go about your day-to-day activities without fear of having an asthma attack. Your doctor will measure the success of asthma therapy by how many days of work or school you miss because of asthma symptoms and by whether you are able to be as physically active as you want to be. Asthma symptoms should not prevent you from playing on the company softball team, taking an aerobics class, playing soccer, hiking, or doing anything else that you want to do. Remember, though, that your doctor can only give you prescriptions and directions—he or she cannot take the medication for you!

My doctor prescribed several medicines. Why do I have to take all of them?

As stated above, several different things occur in your airways when you have an asthma attack. One drug usually cannot prevent all of these events, so you may

have to take two or more medicines. Each medicine plays a different role in preventing attacks.

I took the asthma medications my doctor prescribed, and now my symptoms are gone. Do I have to continue taking the medications?

Yes. To prevent asthma attacks, you must take all the medications your doctor prescribes even when you feel well.

I am taking all the medicines my doctor prescribed and I have not had any asthma attacks, but I feel jumpy and my heart races. Could the asthma medicines cause these sensations?

Yes. Tell your doctor if you have any side effects you think are caused by your medication. These unusual feelings are generally harmless, but since they are unpleasant, your doctor will probably be able to reduce the dosage or switch medications. In this way, you will still be able to prevent asthma attacks without having these unpleasant feelings.

my doctor's instructions. What went wrong?

Occasionally, you may have an asthma attack even though you followed your doctor's instructions carefully. Sometimes your airways will become more sensitive to triggers, and this overcomes the effect of the medicines. This may happen when you have a cold or when

pollen levels get very high. Certain other medicines may make the asthma medications less effective, so tell your doctor if you start taking any other drug. Also tell your doctor if you stop smoking, because he or she may have to change the dose of some asthma medicines.

What should I do if I have an asthma attack?

Your doctor will give you precise instructions about what to do if you have an attack. He or she will tell you which of your medicines to

take and how much to take. About 4,000 people die of asthma in the United States each year. Most, if not all, of these deaths are avoidable. Most people who die during asthma attacks do so because they try too hard to manage the attack themselves. If you cannot quickly bring an attack under control after following your doctor's instructions, get medical help immediately. Never underestimate the severity of an attack.

Iuka School Child Find Program

The Iuka School District is participating in a "Child Find" program for handicapped children. The program seeks to offer equal opportunities to children from birth through the age of 21 who may be handicapped. Hand-

capped children include those with developmental delays, mental retardation, emotional handicaps, hearing impairments, language or speech impairments, physical handicaps, visual impairments or specific learn-

ing disabilities.

Any person or agency with knowledge of a handicapped child not receiving educational services should contact the district's child find person, Jerry W. Harrelson, Program Developer, Special Ed Services, Iuka High School, 507 W. Quitman, Iuka, MS 38852, or phone 423-3206. The duties of the child find officer include coordinating the search for handicapped children,

compiling a listing of those found and supervising the evaluation placement and providing of free and appropriate public education.

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by the school district and will be provided to other agencies only in accord with the Family Rights and Privacy Act. Parents are guaranteed the right to inspect any information about their child and to challenge

its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to any unauthorized person without the parent's consent.

When a child is referred, the Local Survey Committee will gather information which enables them to determine whether the child needs additional evaluation and observation. This information will include vision and hearing screening results, a teacher narrative, and/or available information obtained from parents or agencies. The Local Survey Committee will meet to review this information and make one of three decisions. Either the child will remain in regular education, suggestions for a specific instructional intervention will be given the principal, or the child will be referred for a Comprehensive Assessment. After a Comprehensive Assessment has been conducted, the Local Survey Committee will decide whether the child is handicapped. If it is felt that the child is handicapped the Local Survey Committee will submit its recommendations along with the necessary documentation to a Regional Screening Team. If the Regional Screening Team decides that the child is eligible for a class for the handicapped an Individualized Educational Plan will be developed, parental permission for placement will be obtained and the child will be placed in an appropriate class within 30 days after the eligibility ruling.

Your assistance in helping the Iuka School District locate children birth through 21 who may be handicapped will be greatly appreciated.

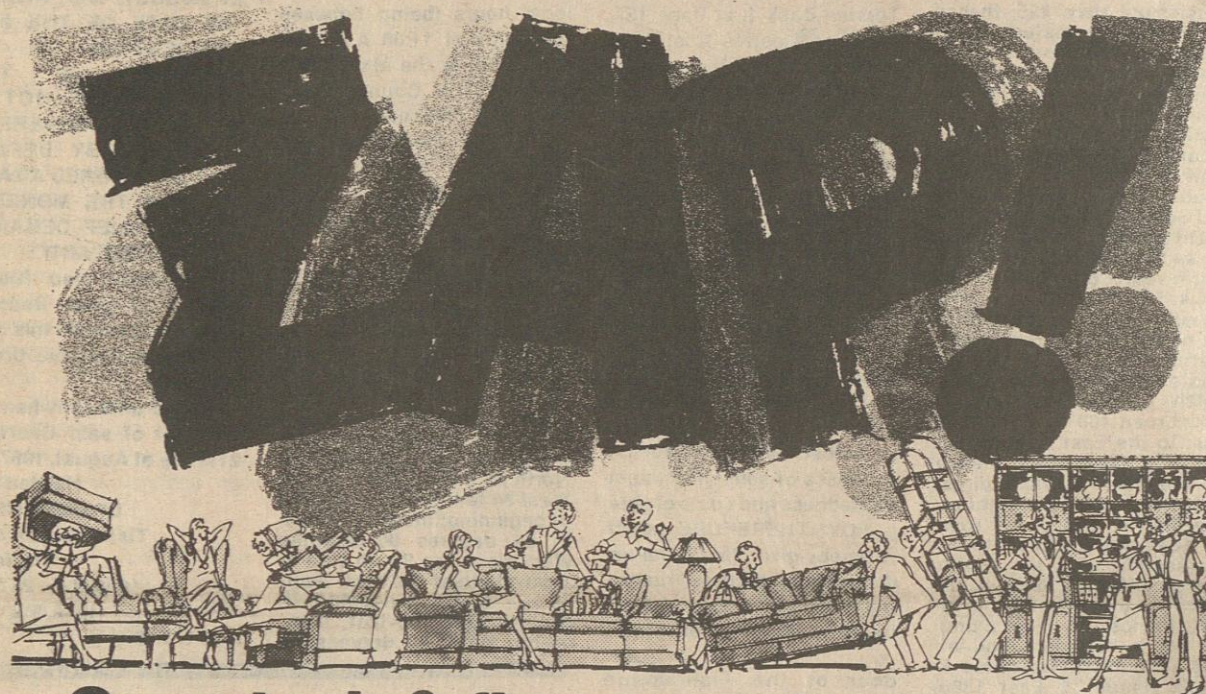
