### Dale Tapp Seeks Office Of Circuit Court Clerk

During the past several weeks, I've enjoyed the opportunity of seeing and speaking with so many of you in the county. I appreciate the support and encouragement which you have given me during my campaign for the office of Circuit Court Clerk.

This is my last opportunity to come to the voters publicly. I ask you to examine closely my opponent's record during his sixteen years in county government. Consider the events which have caused grave concern to many of you. During my campaign, I have presented the voters of Tishomingo County with a review of issues which have affected us all. These are questions which have been brought up by you, the voters, as I have traveled throughout the county. I have attempted to present these in a factual and positive manner.

—Our local hospital, one of the county's largest providers of jobs and a most necessary facility, is now being controlled by people outside our county. No longer do we have a Tishomingo COUNTY Hospital. It's new name is Tishomingo Health Services. Because of this, no longer do hospital employees have Mississippi State Retirement benefits. This security has been lost to them. The employees were faced with the decision of having to freeze their years of service with no hope of having full state retirement benefits without changing jobs or of withdrawing their retirement funds and hoping to find investments to cover their retirement years.

—Our county home, which for years had served as a refuge for those in need of shelter and protection, was closed and finally sold. The tax money to operate the county home was designated for health care. Where is it going now?

—When General Motors was considering locating in Tishomingo County, did they receive encouragement from all our county officials or were they led to believe that we did not have adequate facilities?

—Why are so many of our workers having to go outside Tishomingo County for good paying jobs? Don't we have the potential here?

—Are you satisfied with the way our reappraisal was handled?

IS THIS PROGRESS?

I feel I am qualified and can fulfill the duties of the office in an honest and impartial manner.

I'm concerned about the young drug offenders who come before the courts. I feel the circuit court office can organize and actively participate in a drug awareness program.

I feel we need to have a new voter re-registration. Five percent of recent votes cast were as absentee ballots. Were these people residents who were absent for legitimate reasons or are they no longer legal residents of Tishomingo County?

A large number of voters are elderly with limited transportation. A system needs to be developed to assure these people have a chance to cast their voter.

I would like to prevent the reoccurrence of the still present problem which began during our last election. We

don't need obsolete voting counters. We need and can have modern voting machines which are simple for everyone to operate and which will give an immediate and accurate count at the end of the election.

I apologize for not being able to speak personally with each of you. I am employed full time and have been unable to campaign except at night and on weekends. To the other candidates for this office who ran in the first and second primaries and their supporters, I ask for your vote.

Vote for a young man who has the best interest of Tishomingo County at heart. Vote for someone who will be an honest and dependable worker—someone who's not afraid to speak up for Tishomingo County... someone who will be willing to sit down and talk with you even if it's not an election year. ### Guilty Pleas Made In Federal Court

Two more Tishomingo County residents have pleaded guilty in federal court to mail fraud charges in connection with an insurance fraud scam in Northeast Mississippi.

Steve Rutherford, 29, of Iuka entered a plea agreement pleading guilty to one count of mail fraud in a scheme to collect a phony insurance claim.

Barbara Rye Rutherford, 35, of Iuka pleaded guilty to

one charge of mail fraud in a scheme to defraud Mississippi Farm Bureau Insurance Company.

The charges were a result of an ongoing investigation into which defendants filed fake insurance claims with Mississippi Farm Bureau and received payments from adjuster George Allen Woodhouse.

Unsecured bond as been set for both defendants at \$5,000.00.

### Judge's Election Ruling Appealed

A ruling handed down by Chancery Judge Anthony Farese in the civil lawsuit filed by incumbent First District Supervisor Lyonel "Cotton" Wade challenging the election results has been appealed to the Mississippi Supreme Court.

The lawsuit claims the Tishomingo County Democratic Executive Committee erred on their recount and certification of votes cast in the second primary.

After considering the 53 contested ballots, Judge Farese ruled Frank Williams, Jr., the winner by a two vote margin.

According to Mike Cooke, attorney for the appellee, the

dates the briefs are due in court have been set by Court Administrator Amy Whitten. Brief for the appellant, Mr. Wade, is due Tuesday, November 10 and for the appellee, Mr. Williams on Friday, November 20. Mr. Wade may then file a reply brief which will be due Wednesday, November 25, and a decision could possibly be made within two or three weeks.

## Vote Next Tuesday In General Election

Highlighting the November 3, General Election voting is the Tishomingo County Sheriff's race. Democratic primary winner Richard Dobbs, and Independent candidate Mike Kemp will square off in the final voter count-down.

For the post of Circuit Court Clerk Democratic nominee Gerald C. Parsons will be challenged by Independent Dale Tapp.

In the gubernatorial campaign Democratic nominee, Ray Mabius will vie for the post against Republican nominee, Jack Reed.

Other state-wide contest on the General Election ballot include: Lieutenant Governor with the present Democratic office holder, Brad Dye, being challenged by Republican

nominee, Tom Hamby, and Independent Henry Kirksey.

For Secretary of State, the Democratic nominee Dick Molpus is opposed by Republican Billy Taylor.

For Attorney General Democrat Mike Moore is opposed by Republican Jim Herring.

For State Auditor of Public Accounts, Democrat Pete Johnson is being challenged by Republican Danny Ware.

For State Treasurer, Marshall Bennett, Democrat is opposed by Republican Will Colom.

For Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce Democrat Jim Buck Ross will face Republican Clyde Magee.

For Commissioner of Insurance Democrat George Dale is unopposed.

Zack Stewart, Democrat for Northern District Highway Commissioner unopposed, John R. Young, Democrat, for District Attorney First District unopposed, for State Senator District Four, Democrat Irb Benjamin is unopposed, and for the post of District One House of Representatives Democrat Mack Lloyd Wadkins is unopposed.

Other county and district offices all democrat without opposition on the ballot are Hayden Ables, for Chancery Clerk, Horace E. Ledgewood for Tax Assessor and Collector, Richard D. Bowen for County Prosecuting Attorney, Dale White, County Medical Examiner and Investigator, Frank Williams, Jr., 1st District Supervisor, Ricky A. Cummings, 2nd District

Supervisor, Deleanor W. McKee, 3rd District Supervisor, M. R. Whitehead, 4th District Supervisor, Leon Cook, 5th District Supervisor, James R. (J.R.) Blakney, Justice Court Judge North, Willie Joe Sparks, Justice Court Judge South, Tim Bivins, for Constable North and Harmon Davis, for Constable South.

## Arrests Made Following Recent Burglaries

Three men have been arrested and charged with the burglaries of three residences in the Mingo Community near Tishomingo.

Tim Mattox, 19, of Blue Springs, Phillip Thrasher, 27, of Tupelo, and Jimmy Kenyon, 22, of Tupelo were arrested October 17 on burglary charges after authorities responded to a disturbance call from Tim Mattox's neighbors, reporting Mattox in a drunken state and causing a disturbance.

A Burnsville class ring was found at the Mattox residence and Union County authorities called the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department to inquire about recent burglaries.

Tishomingo County Chief Deputy, W. C. Mayhall, confirmed the October 15 burglaries of the homes of Jimmy Pounders, Dorsie Ivy and Zeth Hill, Jr., all of the Mingo Community.

According to Mayhall, the items recovered by the Union County officials and returned were a 12-gauge Remington shotgun, an AM Soundesign stereo system, a Cannon 35mm camera and a GE VCR belonging to Zeth Hill.

Items belonging to Jimmy Pounders included the Burnsville class ring and some other jewelry, an army rifle and a Browning shotgun.

An antique silver cream pitcher, a set of silverware, and approximately \$20.00 in change were identified as belonging to Dorsie Ivy.

Some \$200.00 in change and paper money was also reportedly stolen from the Ivy residence. The money along with several other items have not been recovered, Mayhall stated.

The three are being held in Tishomingo County Jail with bond set at \$20,000 each, while authorities from Tishomingo, Pontotoc, Lee, Union, Itawamba and Chickasaw counties are investigating the trio in connection with burglaries in those counties.

In other unrelated burglaries in Tishomingo County, Gerry Allen, 23, Tishomingo and Larry Alexander, mid 20's, of Iuka have been arrested and charged with two counts of breaking and entering along with grand larceny in the September 18th burglary of the Earl Garner residence in Tishomingo and the September 22, burglary of the Thomas Walker residence in Iuka.

Authorities were tipped off to the pair when someone reported a suspicious car bearing a Tishomingo County

license plate at a pawn shop in Corinth.

Three guns, a .45-caliber black powder rifle, a .45-caliber black powder pistol, and a 20-gauge Winchester shotgun were reportedly taken from the Walker residence. Four guns and a shoulder holster along with other items were reportedly taken from the Garner residence.

### ALLERGIC DERMATITIS

Skin eruptions, broken hairs, loss of hair, abnormally warm skin or plugged pores are symptoms of allergic reactions to foods or environmental substances. Flea bites are the most common cause of allergy but pollen, feathers, dust, eggs and other substances may also act as catalysts. Cats have been known to eat certain foods for over two years before an allergy surfaces to cause trouble. Treatment depends on identifying the offending substance, which can be a costly search.

### CONTACT DERMATITIS

Soaps, detergents, paints, insect sprays or

other irritating chemicals touching your cat's body can cause hair loss, scaling and crusting. Flea collars have been known to cause an allergic reaction, noticeable when hair loss or irritation shows up in the neck area.

## County Agents' Column

### INSECTICIDE CANCELLATION

The insecticide Systox (demeton) will no longer be produced and marketed in the United States, according to its manufacturer, Mobay Chemical. This was a marketing decision made by the company. It was not mandated by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and I think it is important to note this.

The company decided that its current sales projections did not justify the added expense of EPA test requirements. Many of the chemicals once manufactured in the U. S. were taken off the market not because they caused harmful effects in humans or animals but because the company could not afford the cost of more testing.

If you have an existing stock of this chemical, you can use it as far as we know. Make sure you follow label instructions exactly. BLUEBERRY SOIL pH

Many soils in Tishomingo County are acidic and need lime added during preparation for planting. This is not true of blueberry plants. Do not add lime when you prepare your soil for blueberries.

These plants have a fibrous root system and prefer an acidic soil high in organic matter. Add three or four shovels of peatmoss to each planting hole, with a final mixture being about half peat and half native soil.

### WILDLIFE ON TIMBERLAND

The 16.5 million acres of forestland in Mississippi are valuable to us because they can produce timber, recreation, watershed, erosion protection and wildlife.

This is true of Tishomingo County as well. Unfortunately, too many landowners are unaware of the value their forestlands can produce for them. Many people believe that unmanaged, natural forests are best for game.

Because of this belief held by landowners, the average acre of Mississippi forestland produces only 60 percent of its potential in timber. Managed forests not only yield greater amounts of wood products, they can provide high quality habitats for wildlife.

Always consider timber and wildlife management together. Many landowners who have done this receive additional income from hunting leases. Managing forestland for wildlife can be financially rewarding as well as satisfying.

A few weeks ago, I received a harassing and threatening phone call from a supervisor running for Circuit Court Clerk—Gerald Parsons. He was extremely upset because he had heard I was not one of his supporters. According to the Attorney General, I can support any candidate I choose. So, on Monday, Oc-

tober 26, after consulting with the Attorney General's office and the District Attorney's office, I filed charges against Mr. Parsons. Due process of law is often extremely slow—especially so in small, close-knit counties. According to the Justice Court Judge's office, these papers were signed by the Judge on October 27, but as of yet, have not been served.

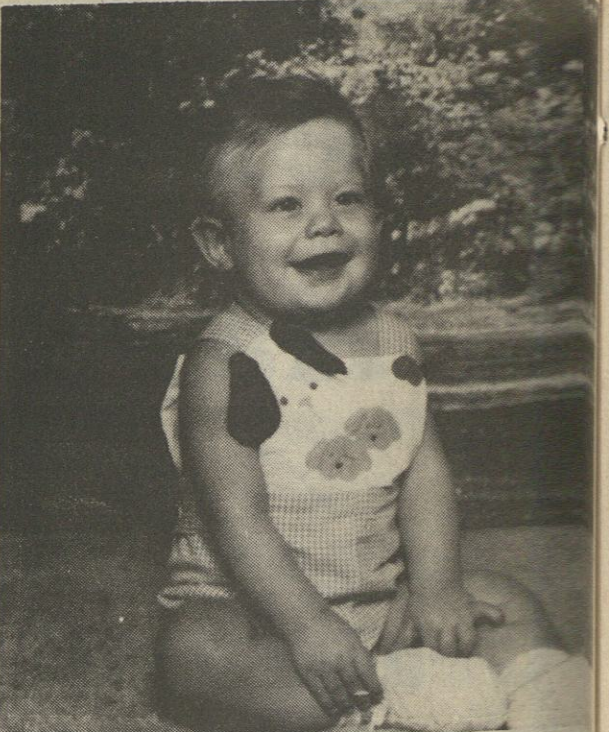


October's Student Of The Month

## Electric Blankets Save Energy, Money

People who enjoy controlled heat while reducing monthly electric bills at the same time, may want to choose an electric blanket.

Only one blanket is needed for each bed, and the blanket can be dial-set for a desired temperature. A person can be warm, sleep comfortably and save energy and money at the same time.

An electric blanket keeps providing warmth even with the room temperature as low as 45 degrees Fahrenheit (7 degrees Centigrade). Some blankets have controls that automatically adjust to temperature changes so people can sleep comfortably for pennies a night.

Fiber content, size, control types, and warranties are important factors to consider when selecting an electric blanket.

\*Fiber Content - Most electric blankets are made from acrylic, polyester, or a blend of these fiber types. Fiber content must be listed on the label.

\*Blanket Sizes - Electric blankets are available in twin, double or full, queen, and king sizes. The heated area is the same in the full and queen size blankets. All electric blankets are about six inches shorter than regular blanket lengths to prevent the possibility of tucking any of the wired portion under the mattress. Snap-fit contour corners permit a closer fit and neater appearance.

\*Warranty - Most electric blankets have five-year warranties. Check the label for this information and save for future reference. Both the blanket and controls should offer a choice of repair or replacement if either becomes defective within a period of time stated in the warranty. Some manufac-

turers require that blankets be returned to them for repair. Others permit local authorized service. Look for the Underwriters' Laboratory (UL) Seal. This indicates that the individual components, as well as the finished blanket, were thoroughly tested to meet safety standards and the fabric shell passed the flammability flame-spread test. Consumer testing groups found blankets bearing this seal do not cause electrical hazards nor do they overheat uncomfortably if used properly.

\*Controls - The temperature control maintains the selected temperature while the blanket is in use. A control may have a click-stop setting, slide selector, or rotary dial with 10 or 11 temperature settings. The control must be lighted in UL listed blankets. A separate on and off switch is desirable. Some controls have bed hangers for convenience.

Choose from solid state or conventional controls. The solid state control used in more expensive blankets is regulated by body temperature. Because a solid state control has no moving parts, it regulates the temperature without the "clicking" sounds of a con-

ventional control. The solid state control has a pre-warm feature that heats the bed, then moves to the selected setting. The full-size electric blankets may have single or dual controls, one for each side of the blanket so that one can be turned off while the other is on. Queen-size and king-size blankets have two independent controls. Follow the manufacturers' instructions for connecting and using the dual controls.

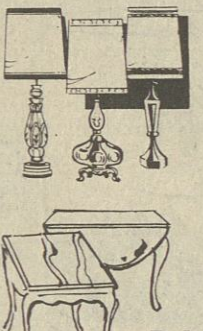
\*Care - With proper use and care, an electric blanket will last several years. The wires used in it are very fine and are stitched in place so they can move without breaking as the blanket moves. Read and carefully follow the manufacturer's instructions for cleaning electric blankets. Most can be machine washed. Avoid dry cleaning because the solvents may corrode the insulation around the wiring. Line-dry electric blankets over parallel clothes lines to distribute the weight. (The above article By A. ### Matters Of Health

PROTECTING CHILDREN'S TEETH AT HALLOWEEN...

How can I protect my children's teeth and the teeth of trick-or-treaters who come to my house at Halloween?

Hidden beneath the fangs of Halloween vampires and monsters are the real teeth of children that may encounter more sugar in one night than at any other time of the year.

Fortunately, however, many 'treats' are available as alternatives to 'sweets'.

One way to protect the teeth of trick-or-treaters who ring your doorbell is not to give them food at all. Treat them with balloons, stickers, small toys or party favors. You might also hold out a bowl of small change to children over the age of three. Toddlers shouldn't be offered coins because they might swallow them.

Unfortunately, the best types of treats for the teeth, such as fresh fruit or certain home-baked goods, are the ones that many parents warn their children not to accept for safety and hygiene protection. Prepackaged items offer parents the assurance that no one has tampered with their children's "treats".

Pediatric dentists recommend that those who decide to offer prepackaged foods should select items that

aren't sweet or sticky, such as chips, plain cookies, crackers, or crackers with peanut butter or cheese. Peanuts may be given to children older than three. Prepackaged boxes of fruit juice make a refreshing treat that many children enjoy.

Avoid offering chewy candy, such as toffee or caramel, that sticks to the teeth; hard candy that dissolves slowly and stays in the mouth longer; preserved fruits, such as raisins; and granola bars. Surprisingly, a plain chocolate bar may be the least harmful type of candy.

Most pediatric dentists agree that sweets don't need to be unilaterally forbidden in children's diet, and, as long as they brush their teeth thoroughly afterwards, there's no harm in the children eating candy on special occasions such as Halloween. How often children eat sweets is more important than the total amount of sugar they consume.

This year, when your children return home with their Halloween bounty, let them empty it on the kitchen

table and select several treats. Allow them to eat as many items as you want—long as they brush their teeth when they are finished. It's much worse to let them eat small portions of candy all day long.

Many parents of young children believe falsely that they don't have to protect baby teeth since they will replace anyway. However, the health of the primary teeth will affect the health of the permanent teeth. Even before the baby teeth break through the gums, parents should begin routine dental care by

gently cleaning inside the mouth with a soft, damp cloth. Parents can begin brushing their children's teeth when they're between the ages of 12 and 18-months old every evening with a soft brush. Children should be allowed to brush their own teeth, but parents should try to help as well, until the children are old enough to tie their shoes. Before then, the lack of the dexterity to brush their teeth properly.

Bishop said the Tishomingo band legacy goes back to the mid-sixties when Iuka High Director Chester Cox assembled the largest high school band in Northeast Mississippi, with well over 100 members. More recently, all four Tishomingo County bands received superior ratings in the 1984 Northeast Mississippi Mar-

ching Band Contest.

"These programs have produced untold numbers of really talented musicians in the past," Bishop said. "One who comes to mind is Randy Williams of Burnsville. He went on to assist the impressive Memphis State University Band."

"Besides helping us, Tishomingo County students' participation in our band helps them," Bishop said. "Membership in the Tiger Marching Band means more than \$1,000 a year scholarship aid to the student. With the Tishomingo County members we have this year, that means that about \$20,000 in scholarship money is going to Tishomingo County band students."

Bishop said that leadership roles that go to Tishomingo

County students this year include Larena Crum at rifle captain, Renee Marlar at field commander, Connie Ginn at feature twirler and Rod Bates, the tuba section leader.

"We really appreciate the support of Tishomingo County band programs and are hoping that support will continue," Bishop said.

## Hospital Offers Free Scanning of Candy

The Tishomingo Hospital will be offering free scanning of Halloween candy for area Trick-or-Treaters on Saturday, October 31st from 5 p.m. - 10 p.m. at the emergency room.

Radiology technicians will be on hand to examine the candy with a fluoroscopic instrument which will detect any foreign object that may be present. This procedure causes no harmful effects to the candy and is completely safe.

Let's work together to make this Halloween a safe, fun time for our children.

### SAFETY TIPS:

1. Look for costumes, masks, beards and wigs labeled "Flame Resistant." Flimsy materials and outfits with big, baggy sleeves or billowing skirts should be avoided to minimize the risk of contact with candles or other sources of ignition.

2. Make or buy costumes light and bright enough to be clearly visible to motorists. Trick-or-treat costumes should be decorated with reflective tape that affords greater visibility. Children also should carry flashlights to see-and be seen-more easily.

3. Costumes should be short enough to prevent children from tripping and falling. Children should wear well-fitting, sturdy shoes.

4. Hats and scarfs should be tied securely to prevent them from slipping over children's eyes.

5. Apply a natural mask of cosmetics rather than have a child wear a loose fitting mask which might restrict breathing or obscure vision. If a mask is used, make sure it fits securely and has eyeholes large enough to allow full vision.

6. Swords, knives, and similar costume accessories should be of soft or flexible material.

7. Smaller children should always be accompanied by an older responsible child or adult. Use the sidewalk rather than walk in the street, and caution children to WALK, not run, from house to house. They should also be cautioned against running out from between parked cars, or across lawns and yards where ornaments, furniture, or clotheslines present dangers.

8. Children should go only to homes where residents have outside lights on as a sign of welcome. Children should never enter homes or apartments unless they are accompanied by an adult.

9. Those expecting trick-or-treaters should remove anything that could be an obstacle from steps, lawns, and porches. Candlelit jack-o'-lanterns should be kept away from landings and doorsteps where costumes could brush against the flame. Indoor jack-o'-lanterns should be kept away from curtains, decorations, or other furnishings that could be

10. Warn children not to eat any of their treats before they get home. Examine all treats carefully for evidence of tampering.

Saturday, October 31, been set for trick-or-treaters in Iuka by Police Chief Floyd Whitaker. Both motorists and pedestrians are urged to drive and walk with extra caution on "spooks night out!"

Anyone caught throwing eggs or anything that could cause damage or harm, or other destructive acts of mischief will be prosecuted, Whitaker said.

The following list of common sense tips are provided to help you and your children have a safe and enjoyable Halloween.

Limit driving speed to 15 miles per hour in residential

neighborhoods between the hours of 5 and 9 p.m. Watch for children darting out from between parked cars, and use extra caution when pulling in or out of driveways. Use headlights as soon as it's dusk. Come to a complete stop when making a right turn on red, after determining that there are no costumed creatures in the crosswalk who might be unaware of your presence.

Trick or treat early, while it is still daylight. Have a parent or older child go with youngsters. Stay in your own neighborhood. Don't criss-cross the street when going house to house. Cross the street only at corners. Parents should inspect all food given children. Throw away candy and food not commercially wrapped or if wrapper has been tampered with. If food appears tampered with, contact police. Costumes should keep children warm and dry, be short enough to avoid tripping, and include reflective tape. Masks should have large eye holes, allowing

full vision, to prevent falls and other injuries. Use flashlights, not candles to light pumpkins.

### Ask Ochsner

Q: My husband snores very loudly, which keeps me awake at night. But now, his snoring is so loud, he wakes himself up. We are both literally exhausted. Is there anything we can do about this so we can get a good night's sleep?

A: Your husband might be suffering from a significant nasal obstruction or from a condition called sleep apnea. The person with sleep apnea is usually male, 30 to 60 years old and, in the majority of cases, overweight, says Dr. Brent Butcher, an ear nose and throat specialist at the Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans.

The relaxed excess tissue at the back of the throat, which is characteristic of sleep apnea, intermittently blocks the breathing passages and prevents a person from receiving adequate oxygen. The person literally may go without breathing for as long as two minutes.

To determine whether a chronic snorer is really a sleep apnea victim, a patient's respiratory effort, heart rate, blood oxygen levels and body movements are monitored. This procedure is usually carried out in a hospital setting, but admitting the person to an inpatient "sleep lab" puts the patient in an unfamiliar environment, which may

prevent him from relaxing to the point that the sleep apnea will manifest itself.

Physicians now have at their disposal a small and simple device called a Vitalog Sleep Monitor. This monitor causes no discomfort and does not interfere with the patient's ability to fall asleep in his familiar surroundings. This monitor reads the appropriate body functions through small leads attached to skin electrodes and chest belts. The following morning, the patient brings in the monitor, and the data is fed

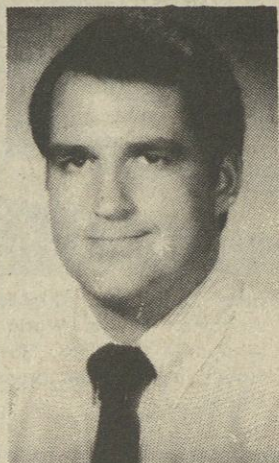
into a personal computer programmed to provide a read-out of results.

In most cases, treatment directed at relieving nasal obstruction or in reducing the size of soft tissue of the palate will markedly improve the snoring and sleep apnea. Just the knowledge that the condition is medically recognized and treatable can go a long way toward reducing the chronic anxiety it causes both the snorer and his or her family, Dr. Butcher concludes.

### Aspartame Aids In Weight Loss

Aspartame, also known as NutraSweet, facilitates weight loss, according to a new study by Dr. George Blackburn and his research team at The Harvard Medical School.

The weight loss shown in this recently completed study refutes speculation that use of aspartame might lead to weight gain. This study is the first assessment of aspartame involving people on diets in real-life situations.

"This study provides firm evidence that there is no increase in appetite and no consequent gain in weight by the subjects from aspartame," said Blackburn.

Blackburn, a work-renowned expert on obesity, conducted a 12-week study with 59 obese men and women. He compared weight loss and measures of general well-being, such as hunger, craving for sweets and energy levels, in obese individuals with and without the use of aspartame combined with a balanced low-calorie diet.

"This study indicates that aspartame is a valuable adjunct to a comprehensive program of balanced diet, exercise, and behavior modifications for losing

weight," said Blackburn.

Aspartame, commonly sold under the brand name NutraSweet, is used in diet drinks and other foods as a low-calorie sweetener.

In this study, the subjects receiving aspartame had favorable responses, i.e. perceptions of increased energy level, well-being and activity level.

In the past, there have been allegations that aspartame consumption has been under-reported to the FDA. This study provides independent confirmation of the data reported to the FDA with

regard to average consumption. The amounts used by the diet group on aspartame-containing products are far below the FDA's allowable daily intake.

The other members of the Harvard research team working on this study include Beatrice Kanders, Ed. D., R.D. D., Phil Lavin, Ph. D., Isaac Greenberg, Ph. D., and Marilyn Kowalchuk, M.S., R.D. Dr. Blackburn's findings will be presented at the annual meeting of The North American Association for the Study of Obesity on Thursday, October 15, 1987, in Cambridge, Mass.

### County Agents Column

**CHECKING PECANS**  
If you happen to be standing under your pecan tree, watch out! Pecans will be falling during the next few weeks in Tishomingo County. Gather them quickly.

Leaving pecans on the ground exposes them to rain and dampness. Storing damp pecans can lead to rancid off-flavors. It is important to pick up the pecans and allow them to air-dry indoors on paper. If you dry your pecans before you store them, you reduce spoilage caused by internal moisture.

You can keep your shelled pecans in the refrigerator for several weeks and they'll be fine. If you plan to store the pecans over a long period of time then your safest bet would be to freeze them (and perhaps make them into a delicious pecan pie for Thanksgiving dinner). Many pecan varieties are highly susceptible to the "scab" fungus which causes dark spots on the shucks and decay on the meat. Throw away any pecans which have these symptoms and you'll cut down on your diseases and insect problems. If you don't know if your pecans are diseased, come by the county Extension Office and we'll check them for you.

**RECORD COTTON CROP**  
Mississippi is expected to produce about 1.7 million bales of cotton, a 43 percent rise over last year. That comes out to 410,000 more bales we hope to produce in 1987.

Our cotton farmers will probably average about 749 pounds of lint per acre, and if they do, it will be the fourth highest average lint yield of the decade. Average lint yield for the United States this year is expected to be 640 pounds, the highest on record if harvested.

The U.S. should produce about 13.34 million bales, about 3.6 million bales above the 1986 crop. With such a good outlook expected, cotton may still be king, or at least in the king's court.

**MOVING HOUSE PLANTS**  
Many homeowners in Tishomingo County will soon be taking their potted plants inside for the winter. Plants and pots should be cleaned before the move is made; otherwise, you introduce undesirable pests into your home.

Check your pots for sowbugs, centipedes and millipedes. Check plants for aphids, scales, mealy bugs and spider mites. You can spray your plants with an approved insecticide, such as malathion, before you bring them in.
