Explosion Destroys Burnsville Home



Mattress and Cover Found In Top Of Tree Following Explosion.

An early evening explosion destroyed the home of Mrs. Imogene Thrasher, leaving behind a leveled wreckage of rubble and strewn debris. Mrs. Thrasher, who lived alone, was not at home when the explosion occurred.

According to a next door neighbor, the accident happened between 6:30 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. Tuesday night. He reported seeing a white flash and hearing a loud blast causing everything hanging on the walls of his house to fall. A neighbor across the street reported several

broken windows.

The approximately 40' x 54' frame house was located just across the railroad tracks on Jefferson Street and was the old homeplace of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Spoon.

According to authorities, the disaster was caused from an accumulation of gas underneath the house that resulted from an outside gas line that had corroded and broken. Due to the tremendous force of the explosion, very little fire damage was done. Officials say no injuries were reported and no foul play was suspected.

Federal Judge Rules On Election Suit

In July, 1987, a cease action suit was filed in Federal Court, styled Charles Moore, for himself and all others similarly situated, versus Londee Kent, Noma Holland, Barbara Price, J. L. Hopkins and Vera Bostick as Tishomingo County Election Commissioners.

Both plaintiff and defendants appeared in open court in Greenville, Mississippi. At this time a preliminary injunction was issued enforcing the name of County Superintendent of Education from being placed on the ballot for both the August Primary and the November General Election.

On November 5, 1987, the Tishomingo County Election Commissioners received an order signed by Judge L. T. Senter, Jr., on October 28, 1987, which states that "residents of the Iuka Municipal Separate School District be permanently enjoined from voting for County Superintendent of Education."

"Further, the Tishomingo County Election Commissioners are directed to formulate a method and/or plan so that future elections for Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education may be held and that in said elections residents of the Iuka Municipal Separate

School District may not vote.

The Tishomingo County Election Commissioners shall implement the above mentioned method and/or plan within 30 days of this Order."

Barbara Price, chairperson for Tishomingo County Election Commission states that the public will be kept informed of further developments pending legal advice and assistance from the office of the Attorney General and Judge L. T. Senter, Jr. A plan and date for the election will be set within the next few days.

The order issued by Federal Judge L. T. Senter, Jr. states:

IT IS THEREFORE, ORDERED, as follows:

1. The enforcement and implementation of 37-5-61, Miss. Code of 1972, is permanently enjoined insofar as it allows residents of the Iuka Municipal Separate School District to vote in elections for the Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education, and the residents of the Iuka Municipal Separate School District are hereby declared ineligible to vote for the Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education.

2. The Board of Election Commissioners of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, are directed to

formulate a method and/or plan so that future elections for the Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education may be held and that in said elections residents of the Iuka Municipal Separate School District may not vote.

3. The Board of Election Commissioners of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall implement the above mentioned method and/or plan within thirty (30) days of this order. For this years election, the Board of Election Commissioners shall designate a day for the primary election for the office of County Superintendent of Education. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes at the primary election, a run off election shall be held within two (2) weeks. If both political parties field a candidate, the final election will be held two (2) weeks thereafter. If only one political party fields a candidate, the winner of the primary or run off election shall be certified as the Superintendent of Education.

4. All future elections for Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education, with the exception of this years election, which shall be conducted as provided by the laws of the State of Mississippi, except that residents of the Iuka Municipal Separate School District shall not vote in elections for County Superintendent of Education.

5. With the entry of this Permanent Injunction, it would appear to the Court that all matters in the instant litigation are resolved.

ORDERED, this 28th day of October, 1987.

Tishomingo County. Those candidates who have heretofore qualified shall be permitted to run as well as those individuals who are qualified under the laws of the State of Mississippi and who qualify at least two (2) weeks prior to the primary elections.

4. All future elections for Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education, with the exception of this years election, which shall be conducted as provided by the laws of the State of Mississippi, except that residents of the Iuka Municipal Separate School District shall not vote in elections for County Superintendent of Education.

5. With the entry of this Permanent Injunction, it would appear to the Court that all matters in the instant litigation are resolved.

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

THE MIDDLE-AGE SPREAD ISN'T DUE TO AGE

It's all part of getting older. Your metabolism slows down and your weight picks up. You have to exercise twice as hard

as a young person to lose half the excess fat, right?

Wrong.

Researchers at the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging are debunking that myth. They found that the time people devote to aerobic exercise, not middle age, determines the fat level, said physiologist Carol N. Meredith at the center located at Tufts University in Boston.

Meredith said that it is generally assumed that, as

people get older, something changes biologically to cause them to add fat and lose physical fitness and that exercise can't alter this trend. However, studies indicate otherwise.

To distinguish between the effects of aging and decreased physical activity, Meredith and colleagues compared the fitness level and exercise habits of 12 very active men -- half in their twenties and half in their fifties. All had been running, cycling or rowing for at least two years.

It was found that their fat level had nothing to do with their age -- only with the amount of time they spent exercising.

For example, one 54-year-old man who ran 14 hours a week had the same percent body fat as a 29-year old who also trained 14 hours a week.

As a group, however, the middle-aged man had 77 percent more body fat than the young men "because they exercised fewer hours -- 7 1/2 hours per week compared with 12 1/2 for the younger men," said Meredith. "Time is the most important factor."

Fortunately, there appears to be a limit. After 12 hours per week, she said, fat reduction was less marked.

To be aerobic, exercise must be sustained more than 20 minutes at a time and involve large groups of muscles, as in running, brisk walking, cycling, rowing and swimming. Weight lifting, which targets specific muscle groups, is not aerobic.

Meredith said that aging itself seems to reduce voluntary movement. Scientists have noted this in animals and in primitive societies where sedentary jobs and "too little time" are not factors. But the reason for this age-related inertia is unknown.

All but one of the subjects in this study started exercising regularly during adolescence. "It's possible," said Meredith, "that a habit of vigorous exercise is easier to maintain if it is initiated at an early age."

Dear Dr. Scott:

I hear so much on the TV about PMS. I think I may be bothered some with this, but I don't understand a lot about it. Would you explain in your column?

Premenstrual syndrome or PMS is a collection of symptoms that usually occur within five days of a woman beginning her period. Almost

all women have some symptoms before their period begins but PMS designates that percentage of women whose symptoms are severe enough to interfere with their day-to-day life.

Most women tend to have one or more of the following symptoms: depression, irritability, emotional instability, edema, breast soreness and/or headaches.

Many studies have been done on treating PMS but so far no drugs have been proven to be very effective when compared to a sugar pill. If the PMS is severe enough the menstrual cycle may be completely suppressed by medication or the ovaries can be removed. Otherwise counseling has been shown to be very helpful in helping the woman to adjust to her problem.

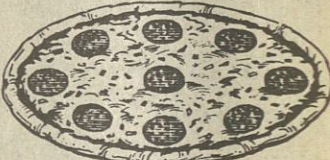

FUS - A DEADLY SYNDROME

A variety of urinary problems, commonly known as the Feline Urinary Syndrome (FUS), is the most serious single health problem of felines in Tennessee.

The exact cause of FUS in cats has not been determined. It remains the subject of extensive research and scientific speculation.

Many bacteria-and more recently, viruses-have been isolated from various cases of FUS. In addition, such things as metabolic imbalance, neglected infections elsewhere in the body and contamination of the reproductive organs have been linked to FUS. However, to date, none of these has proven to be the single cause for this syndrome. Further studies may show that there is no single cause, but a combination of factors that lead to the disease.

FUS is seen in cats of all ages. Male cats appear to be more prone than females. This may be due to the fact that the signs are more dramatic and readily identifiable in the male so more male cats with FUS are seen by veterinarians.

Recent research indicates that the disease is contagious and spread from cat-to-cat by contact. And there is some evidence to show that the disease is more prevalent in the colder months.

One of the first signs of FUS that an owner is likely to notice is when a housebroken cat suddenly changes its habits and urinates in a bathtub, on the floor or in a sink. Other symptoms include: frequent urination in small quantities, straining to urinate, traces of blood in the urine, listlessness and poor appetite.

Veterinarians warn that frequently straining

to urinate is mistaken for constipation. Laxatives can kill a cat whose urethral passage is blocked by causing spasms which can burst the distended bladder. A veterinarian should, therefore, be contacted before giving the animal a laxative.

Once the urethra becomes blocked, coma, convulsions and death frequently occur within 48 hours. The cat will suffer great pain from the time the blockage begins until the coma sets in.

If your feline shows any of the symptoms of FUS, contact your veterinarian immediately. By the time the signs are noticed, the disease may have reached a critical stage and time is of utmost importance.

Antibiotics, forced feeding and fluid therapy may be used to treat the disease. Surgery may be recommended.

Following treatment, special medication to keep the cat's urine acid as well as vitamins and special diets will be necessary to maintain the animal's health.

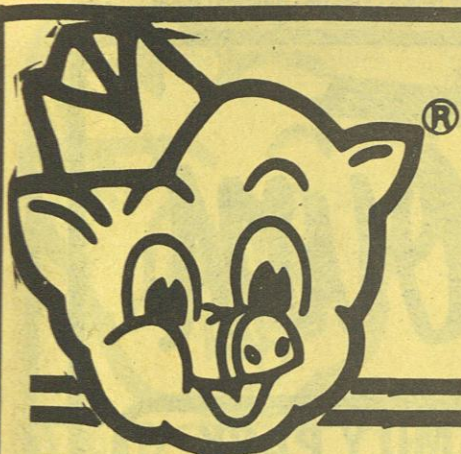
Currently, there is no vaccine available to prevent FUS. However, early diagnosis can prevent needless pain for your animal. And diseases diagnosed early are less costly to treat than more advanced or chronic cases.

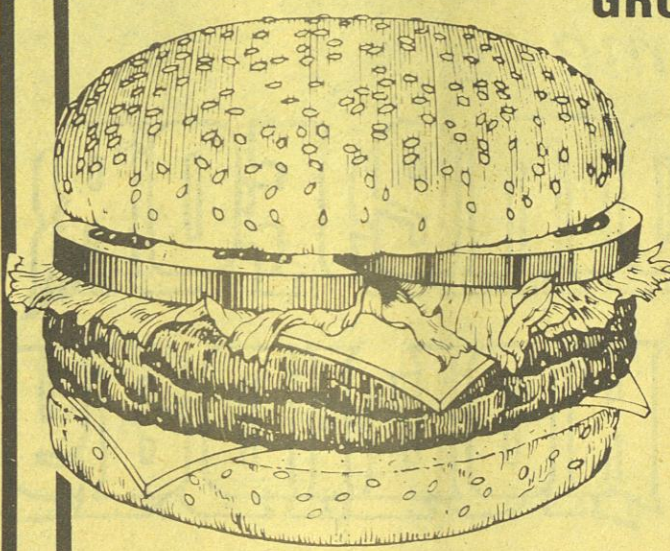
HEAVENLY CASSEROLE

1 10 ounce package frozen French-style green beans
1-10 ounce package frozen baby lima beans
1-10 ounce package frozen small peas
1 large green bell pepper, diced
Place green beans, lima beans, peas and green pepper in just enough boiling salted water to keep them from burning. Cook until thawed and separate with a fork. Drain and cool. Set aside.

1 1/2 cups whipping cream
1 1/2 cups mayonnaise
3/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
Salt and Pepper
1/2 cup bread crumbs, buttered

Whip cream. Combine mayonnaise and cheese; salt and pepper to taste. Then fold in whipped cream. Place vegetables in a greased, 2-quart casserole. Cover with the sauce. Top with bread crumbs and dot with butter. It can be baked at once or kept overnight in the refrigerator. Bake, uncovered, at 325 degrees about 50 minutes or until golden brown. (Canned vegetables may be substituted. If so, saute bell pepper and do not cook vegetables)

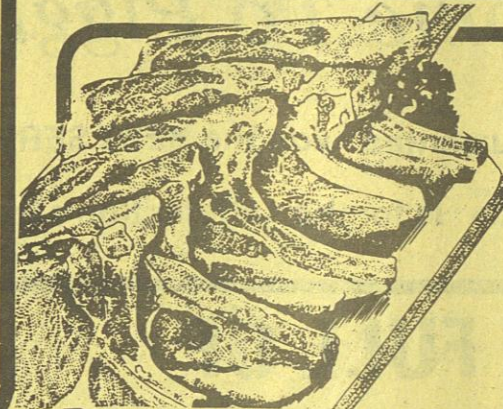

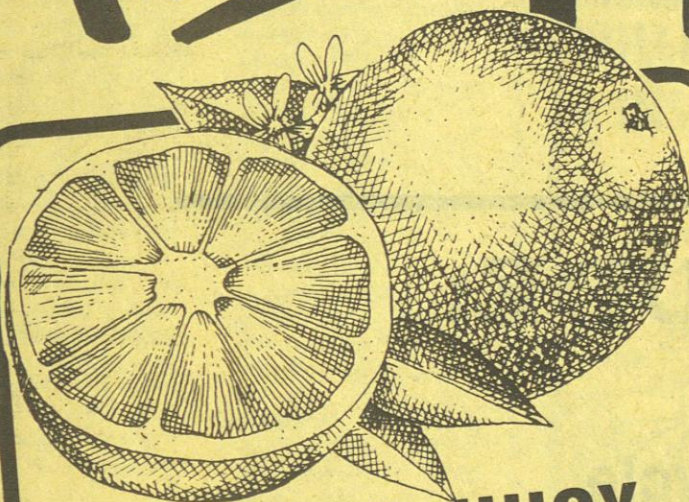

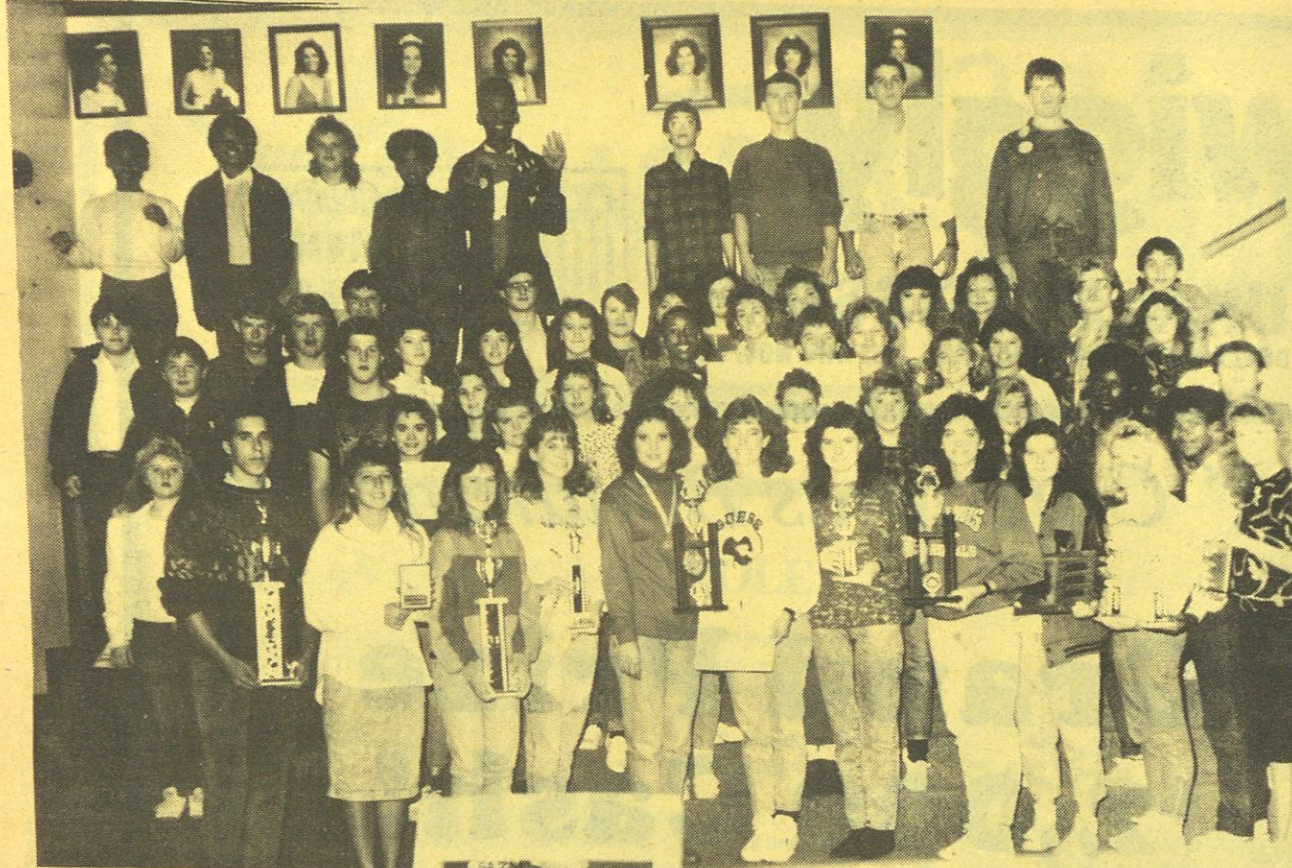

Your County Agents Notes

THE LAW OF AVERAGES
A typical news story on agriculture may read like this: Mississippi farmers will average 23 bushels an acre on their soybean crop this year. Another one may say: Catfish farmers averaging 65 cents at the pond bank.

Numbers are an important communication tool. They help us grasp concepts and ideas. They are not, however, the gospel truth. I think we sometimes place too much emphasis on what I call "the law of averages." We get "23 bushels" fixed in our minds, and we assume that every farmer in Tishomingo County who grows soybeans is yielding that number of bushels per acre.

This is simply not the case. We have some farmers who have terrific yields and others who have disappointing yields. It's important to remember this, particularly if you read that farmers are getting better yields but you have friends who are not.

I hope I haven't confused the issue here. When we bat around numbers and averages, let's put them in the proper perspective. Then

we'll have a true picture of agriculture in Mississippi.

For those of you who grow cotton or are connected to the cotton industry in the state, you might want to make plans to attend the 1988 Beltwide Cotton Production Conference, Jan. 4-7, in New Orleans. I have been sent registration information and a copy of the program. Please come by the Tishomingo County Extension Office if you are interested in going.

The conference is sponsored by the National Cotton Council and The Cotton Foundation.

WHEAT PLANTING

Wheat planting time is now upon us. Hessian flies haven't been a major problem across the state and so far, pose no threat to our crop. If you don't have a list of wheat varieties resistant to these pests, come by the county Extension Office.

FRUIT TREE CARE

Our fruit trees in Tishomingo County are going dormant and dropping leaves for the winter. Don't let the leaves pile up on the ground. Clean up diseased or shriveled fruit that has dropped and rake leaves to rid the area of a primary disease

Point Of Law

Q. I'm really miffed. Perhaps I shouldn't be, but I just called the town clerk to find out when the next city council meeting was so I could take my civics class to see local government in action. She said that because a student group last year had littered the hall, the council had voted not to permit student groups to attend meetings. Can they do that?

A. Absolutely not. If they have a grievance against litterers, they can address it. But a foundation of Mississippi and American law is that government business be conducted in public. With the exception of executive sessions for personnel discussions and other matters, all public commissions and boards are required to open their meetings to any and all who wish to attend.

Q. My sister says she's going to write her own will in longhand and that it will be valid in Mississippi. I told her she's making a mistake. Who's right?

A. In a sense, you both are. Mississippi law allows a person to write, in their own hand and on plain paper, a valid last will and testament so long as it is properly signed at the end. This type of will doesn't even require witnesses to sign. In that sense, she's right. The sense

in which you are right is borne out by a long history of judicial decisions which shows courts high suspicious of handwritten, unwitnessed wills; probably

because of the ease or chance of fakery. The prudent thing for her to do would be to find a competent attorney to draft the will in accordance with her wishes, inform her of any legal obstacles which might block fulfillment of those wishes, and see that the will is signed and witnessed in the manner prescribed by law. She should also know that estate taxation laws are changing continually and that tax savings an attorney might alert her to may well exceed the attorney's drafting fee.

those written on checks.

Fill out a deposit slip for the amount of money used to open the account. After the deposit is processed, the account holder receives a receipt for the deposit and some checks with the personal banking account number. You can select the type and design of the check. You should select the type easiest for you.

One a checking account has been opened, it is ready to be used. The account should be used with care and caution. For protection, try to get into the habit of filling out the check record or stub before writing a check. This is a very important record to know exactly how much money is on deposit with the bank. You should also keep the total up-to-date. There is a service charge when you write checks over the amount of the balance.

When writing a check, always write in ink -- never use pencil. Do not cross out or change any part of the check and make sure figures and words agree. If an error is made, tear up the check or mark VOID in large letters across the face of the check.

Each month the bank usually sends a statement showing what has happened to the account since the last statement. A beginning balance will be shown. Checks written, which has been cashed, will be recorded,

as well as any deposits made. In addition, an amount will be shown for service charges. (Service charges are fees paid to the bank for processing the checking account.) Finally, the balance in the checking account will be noted.

When a bank statement is received, the account owner needs to balance the checkbook.

To balance a checkbook: *Write down the current balance in the account as shown on the statement.

*Add any deposits not shown on the statement.

*Subtract any checks which have been written but which have not cleared the bank.

*Subtract the amount of the service charge.

*The amount left should be the same as the current balance shown in your checkbook.

Setting up and using a checking account skillfully can be a rewarding experience. It can help add to independence for teens, as well as help develop good money management skills for adult years. Practice responsible money management techniques by using a checking account with care and caution.

SETTING UP AND USING A CHECKING ACCOUNT

A teenager with money from allowances, hand outs, or part-time employment may want to think about setting up a checking account.

Setting up a checking ac-

count is easy. There are three basic types of checking accounts: personal or individual, joint and company or business. The local banks have special account options for students. When you ask to open a checking account, be sure to ask about these accounts. They can save you money on the service charge.

After selecting the type of account wanted, the youth will need to sign a signature card. This card is kept on file at the bank and may be used to compare signatures with
