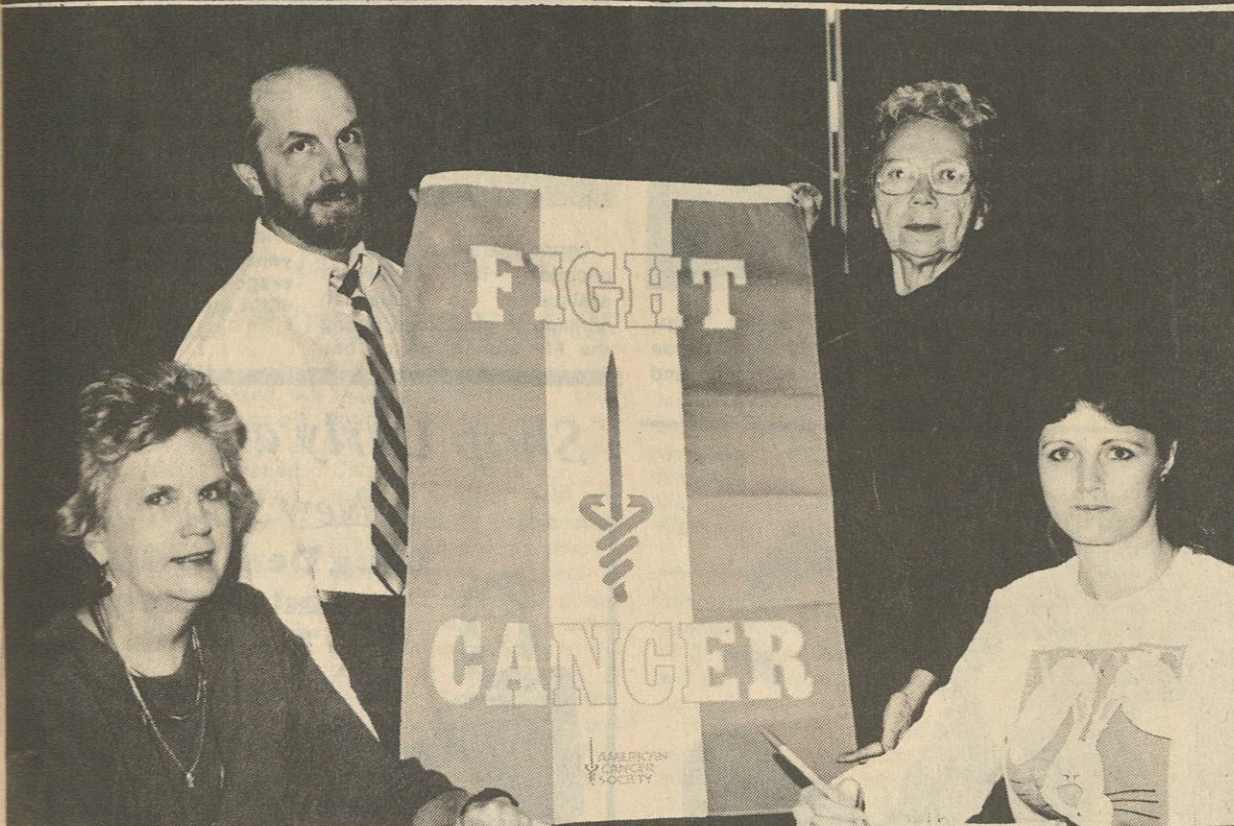

Woman Charged In Shoplifting Case

Debbie Barrett, 29, of Booneville has been apprehended and charged with shoplifting from the local Otasco store, reports Iuka Police Chief Floyd Whitaker.

On Friday, November 13, a salesclerk from Otasco notified the Iuka Police Department reporting the theft of a Marlin 30-30 rifle.

A woman allegedly came into the store and wrapped the gun in a coat, the clerk stated. When the salesclerk tried to stop her, she ran from the store, got into a blue 1979 Thunderbird and fled. The clerk was also able to obtain a

Prentiss County license plate number. From this information arrest warrants were issued and sent out over NCIC to Prentiss and Alcorn counties and the Booneville Police Department.

According to Chief Whitaker, he searched in the Booneville area until after 10 p.m., but was unable to locate the suspect.

On Monday, November 16, the Alcorn County Sheriff's Department notified the Tishomingo County authorities that they had the suspect in custody. She was returned to Tishomingo

County by Chief Whitaker.

In her deposition, Whitaker said, she told him that the gun had been hidden in the woods along Highway 4 near Dennis. A search of the area by Whitaker and Officer Jim Barnes of the Wildlife Commission, failed to turn up the gun. The search was abandoned due to darkness but was resumed on the morning of November 17 when the gun was found.

Barrett was charged with shoplifting, but was released on an appearance bond and turned back over to Alcorn

authorities where she was wanted for questioning. She will appear in City Court in Iuka on Monday.

Officers assisting Chief Whitaker were Robert Till, Ricky Cornelison and Wheeler Carson of the Iuka Police Department along with Royce Howie, Doug Epps and Jim Barnes of the Mississippi Wildlife Commission.

Whitaker urges merchants to report anyone acting suspicious to the authorities rather than try to apprehend them. He said this type of crime is frequent during the holiday season.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

SWEET POTATOES FOR ALL SEASONS

With today's interest in nutrition, diet, and physical fitness, consumers want to know about the foods they are eating. They want to know how they fit into a nutritious diet.

The sweet potato is an excellent choice to include in a nutritious diet. A rich source of vitamin A, it also provides worthwhile quantities of vitamin C and small amounts of other vitamins and minerals. Sweet potatoes also provide fiber to the diet.

For the weight conscious individual, sweet potatoes can be a real treat. They have a wonderful spicy-sweet flavor and delicious versatility. One baked sweet potato, 5 x 2 inches, contains about 160 calories. But be careful with the margarine, butter or brown sugar. These add extra calories quickly.

Traditionally, sweet potatoes are served at holiday meals, but they can

be enjoyed in many different ways from raw sweet potato sticks with dip to chunks of sweet potatoes in a stew, French-fried sweet potatoes or warm sweet potato muffins. Sweet potatoes can be enjoyed not only during sweet potato season but all year.

Choose sweet potatoes that are firm, smooth, reasonably clean and free from blemishes. Uniform sized potatoes will cook more evenly and thus prevent "pot watching."

Handling sweet potatoes correctly is essential to maintain quality. Handle gently to avoid bruising or breaking the skin, which quickly causes decay. Ideal storage temperature is 55-65 degrees F. Do not put sweet potatoes in the refrigerator. Cold storage leads to injury and an undesirable taste when cooked.

To eliminate loss, cook the entire purchase of sweet potatoes and freeze the excess. This will also allow you to take advantage of good buys during the fall.

Sweet potatoes can be baked, boiled, fried, broiled, microwaved or candied. Before cooking, scrub the skin and trim off any bruised or woody portions.

*To Bake: Place in 350 degrees F oven and bake 45 to 50 minutes or until tender. The baking time will depend

*To Boil: Cook unpeeled sweet potatoes, covered, in a small amount of salted water 20 to 30 minutes or until the desired doneness. For use in salads where cubed or sliced, cook until just barely tender.

*To Charcoal Broil: Wrap medium size sweet potatoes individually in heavy duty aluminum foil. Place on grill, about 5 inches from coals. Cook for about 45 minutes or until tender. To hasten, boil 10 minutes before wrapping in foil and bury in coals.

*To Pan Roast: Boil for 10 minutes. Drain, peel and add to pan one hour before meat is done, basting four to five times.

*To Fry: Pare and cut into lengthwise strips approximately one-half inch thick. Heat oil in deep fryer to 350 degrees F. Add potatoes to cover bottom of skillet; fry five minutes or until brown and tender. Drain.

*To Freeze: Cook sweet potatoes using any method until almost tender. Let stand at room temperature until cool. Peel, cut in halves, slice, or mash. To prevent darkening, dip whole or sliced sweet potatoes for five seconds in a solution of one tablespoon citric acid or one-half cup lemon juice to one quart water. To prevent

darkening of mashed sweet potatoes, mix two tablespoons of orange or lemon juice with each quart sweet potatoes. Pack, leaving on-half inch head space. Seal and freeze.

To protect flavor, vitamin C and natural sugar, cook sweet potatoes in their jacket (skins). The skins will slip off easily after cooking. It is better to cook sweet potatoes quickly and to serve them immediately in order to preserve the vitamin C.

When mashing sweet potatoes, a small amount of milk or fruit juice may be added to enhance the flavor and to make the texture better. The natural goodness can also be accented with a variety of spices, fruits, nuts, and sweeteners.

SWEET POTATO CUSTARD

1/4 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 tsp. grated orange rind
1 1/2 cups milk
2 eggs, beaten
2 1/2 c. finely shredded raw sweet potatoes (shred just before using)
1 Tbls. melted table fat

Add sugar, salt, nutmeg, orange rind, and milk to the

eggs. Mix thoroughly. Add sweet potatoes and fat. Bake in greased custard cups in a pan of hot water at 350° F (moderate oven) about 30 minutes or until set. Six servings.

SWEET POTATO CUSTARD PIE

Pour custard into 9-inch unbaked pastry shell and bake at 425° F (hot oven) for 10 minutes; reduce temperature to 350°, and continue baking for 30 minutes longer.

FORESTRY INCENTIVE PROGRAM (FIP) SIGN-UP

Landowners may make application for cost-share assistance to establish acreage to pine trees during the FIP sign-up period bet-

ween November 16 - December 4, 1987. Cost share rates on approved applications are 50% of cost of the trees to exceed certain limits. Practices available include: --Planting trees --Improving a stand of forest trees --Site preparation for natural regeneration All applications must be for at least 20 acres. Applications for less than 20 acres will be approved under the regular Agricultural Conservation Program. A forest management plan developed by the Mississippi Forestry Commission will also be required. Interested landowners should contact the ASCS office by December 4.

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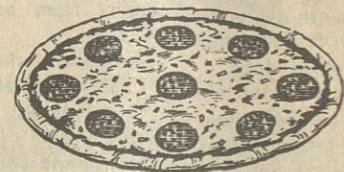

In recent years, however, scientific credence has been given to the value of this special relationship, which is becoming known as the "human/animal bond."

Evidence shows that elderly persons, confined to nursing homes, forget their boredom and problems for a while when feline or canine visitors arrive to distribute a generous portion of affection and acceptance. For a short while, both the humans and animals felt love and gave love in return.

Inmates at the Lima Ohio State Hospital for the criminally insane experienced a significant decrease in violence when allowed to have pets. Gerbils, birds, fish, rabbits and other animals seemed to instill a sense of cooperation and a respect for life

among the inmates.

Juvenile delinquents in California were seemingly taught a new respect for themselves and for authority as they put their dogs through an obedience training program.

At Cheffs Center for the Handicapped in Augusta, Michigan, physically crippled children are helped to have new confidence and hope in themselves when they mount up and go horseback riding.

Research also shows that physical contact with a pet may decrease a person's pulse rate. Even observing a pet at play has been shown to have a calming affect.

Thawing Your Turkey

Nellie R. Horton, Extension Home Economist, states that if you purchase a frozen raw turkey for the holidays, you should be sure to thaw it carefully so it will be safe to eat. You can thaw whole turkeys in either of the following ways. However, turkey parts should be thawed in the refrigerator.

In the refrigerator, in the original wrapping or lightly covered with waxed paper if poultry is unwrapped. Place turkey on a tray for easy handling and to catch any drippings. Thaw until pliable.

If cut-up pieces are separated by double pieces of freezer paper, they will thaw more rapidly if placed individually on the tray. Allow time for thawing raw

- 12-20 lbs. 2-3 days

Large pieces (half, quarter, half breast. . 1-2 days
Boneless roasts. . 12-18 hours
In a cool room, in a DOUBLE-WALL PAPER BAG. Place turkey in paper bag. Close bag tightly. Place turkey on a tray for easy handling and to catch any drippings. Thaw in a cool room, 70 F or below until pliable. If these instructions cannot be followed exactly, turkey must be thawed in the refrigerator. A 12- to 24-pound turkey will take 15 to 20 hours to thaw.

Thawing times with either of these methods will be shorter if giblets and neck are not placed in body cavity.

After poultry is thawed, prepare it for cooking in the same way as chilled, unfrozen poultry. Cook poultry promptly after thawing.

Health Fair Today At Tishomingo Hospital

The Tishomingo Hospital will be sponsoring a Health Fair on Thursday, November 19th from 1 - 4 p.m. at the South Wing of the hospital.

Among the activities planned by the Hospital are the following: blood pressure and pulse rate checks and charting of height/weight; blood profiles (for those 18 years and older) which include over 10 tests; pulmonary functions testing; physical therapy demonstrations; drug interaction information; C.T. Scan and other X-Ray displays; CPR demonstrations and home and travel first-aid kit information; and nutritional information with "healthy" refreshments to be served.

Organizations participating in the Health Fair are the Lion's Club who will offer Glaucoma testing and screening for lazy eye and vision acuity; the Home Health Department of the Tishomingo County Health Department who will have a film and literature which focus on meeting health needs in the home; and the American Heart Association who will have many pam-

phlets and information available. All testing and literature is

offered free to the public and everyone is encouraged to attend.

Swing Bed Program At Tishomingo Hospital

Swing bed, a term that has inched into our medical vocabulary, is being heard more and more nowadays. The term refers to an acute care (hospital) room or bed which can "swing" from acute care to extended care and back again to meet patient needs.

Typically, the patient who would benefit from swing bed care is one who is no longer in need of acute care, but who is unable to return to a home environment.

Because of community need for such a service, Tishomingo Hospital began a swing bed program in February of this year. According to Swing Bed Coordinator Joyce Borden, R.N., B.S.N., the hospital has ten

beds designated for those patients referred into the program.

"We rehabilitate a patient as much as his potential will permit," Borden said. "Our goal will ultimately be to help the patient live as independently as possible."

Patients normally remain in the program 20 days or less. They are taught by the Tishomingo Hospital staff to regain such lost skills as walking, feeding themselves, and speaking. A wide range of services is available to swing bed patients. Borden says that nursing care, physical therapy, social services, respiratory therapy, x-rays and lab tests are among the services a patient might

receive.

She also provides therapeutic activities for swing bed patients. "We offer arts and crafts, Bible classes, outside activities, library services, and other activities that a patient might want," she commented.

Entry into the program is via physician referral. The cost of swing bed care is normally less than the cost of acute care. Borden says Medicare will pick up most of the tab for those patients eligible for Medicare. Medicare and commercial insurance also cover swing bed costs. Tishomingo Hospital usually averages three to five swing bed patients daily.

"We try to make the

patient's environment as homelike as possible," Borden said. "We encourage them to dress as they would at home. We ask them to bring some of their things from home, such as their favorite chair, radio or whatever they would like to bring. We make their stay as uninstitutionalized as possible."

Tishomingo Hospital's swing bed program is not solely for the elderly. Younger patients who are in need of this unique medical service may also be referred to the program.

Lice? Don't Panic!

Head lice in the classroom frustrate teachers, embarrass parents, and victimize children.

"Don't panic; just get rid of them!" advises the Mississippi State Department of Health.

Teachers, parents, physicians, nurses, and children can cooperate to control lice infestation.

The first sign of lice is often intense itching in the affected area. Close inspection will reveal whitish eggs or nits, firmly attached to the hair shaft close to the scalp,

or hatched lice and the itchy red mark the louse's saliva causes. Lice prefer the finer hair of the back of the head and behind the ears.

The louse respects no person. People of all social and economic levels can become infested, but lice infestation most readily appears among school children who provide obvious groupings of individuals.

Once lice enter the classroom, they can move easily from one person to another.

Fortunately, safe

medications -- many without prescription -- exist to rid the individual of the lice. Repeat treatments are needed to kill newly hatched insects. Treatment product instructions must be followed carefully.

When a teacher finds a child with head lice, he or she should contact the child's parents. The teacher should tell the parent how to treat the child and have the parent take the child out of class until proof of treatment can be presented for readmittance to the classroom. Readmittance

does not require proof of treatment from the county health department.

Parents should launder wash and/or dry at temperature of at least 130° F. all bed lines and clothing the child had worn for the past several days before discovery. They should also carefully check any other children in the home.

Teachers should warn students that sharing hats, combs, brushes, and other personal articles will lead to further spread of lice infestation. They should stop hanging coats close together.

The Segars Clinic Report



Dear Dr. Scott:

I have a friend who had the balloon procedure for a blockage in his heart. I am curious about how this works and why they don't use it on everybody.

Coronary artery disease can be treated in different ways, depending on its severity and other factors. Daily medication with reduction of risk factors for heart disease is one approach. In other cases, coronary bypass

surgery may be required. Coronary angioplasty (the balloon procedure) is a third treatment method introduced in the late 1970's. Due to frequent successes, the procedure is becoming popular with 120,000 performed in 1986.

In this procedure, a tiny balloon is inserted into an obstructed blood vessel that supplies the heart with blood (a coronary artery) and then inflated to unclog the vessel. This presses the plaque against the wall of the artery and causes the artery to stretch slightly. The result frequently is a better, more open channel for blood flow with relief of the patient's symptoms, such as chest pain.

The decision to perform angioplasty is based on the location of the artery and the amount of blockage present. Many people who have this procedure are able to avoid open heart surgery. Some, however, may eventually

Pilot Club Honors District Governors

Point Of Law

Q: I've hesitated to call a lawyer because I heard they are so expensive. What do lawyers charge?

A: First, you should know that not all lawyers charge the same prices. Ask around. But don't just ask for price. Some attorneys are particularly good at certain areas of the law...maybe your problem falls within this area.

Probably the most basic ingredient in the fee is the amount of time spent on a particular problem. Since a lawyer is rarely confronted with two legal situations which are exactly alike, the fee will depend upon favors involved.

If you would like to know more details about lawyers and fees, write the Mississippi State Bar and ask for a free pamphlet on the subject. The address is P.O. Box 2168, Jackson, MS 39205.

Q: Aren't there times when non-lawyers can practice law?

A: Sure. Every citizen has the right to represent himself in court. But before one can become a lawyer and represent another (or give legal advice), he or she must meet the standards laid down by the Supreme Court for admission to the Bar. These standards are for the protection of persons seeking a lawyer.

While someone who is not a lawyer may have great knowledge about one subject, it is impossible for that person to be familiar with the whole body of law even in that particular field.

Laws and their interpretations are constantly changing; a non-lawyer cannot know the possible legal consequences or hazards. This is why a license to practice law is granted exclusively to trained experts.

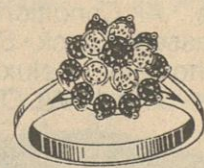

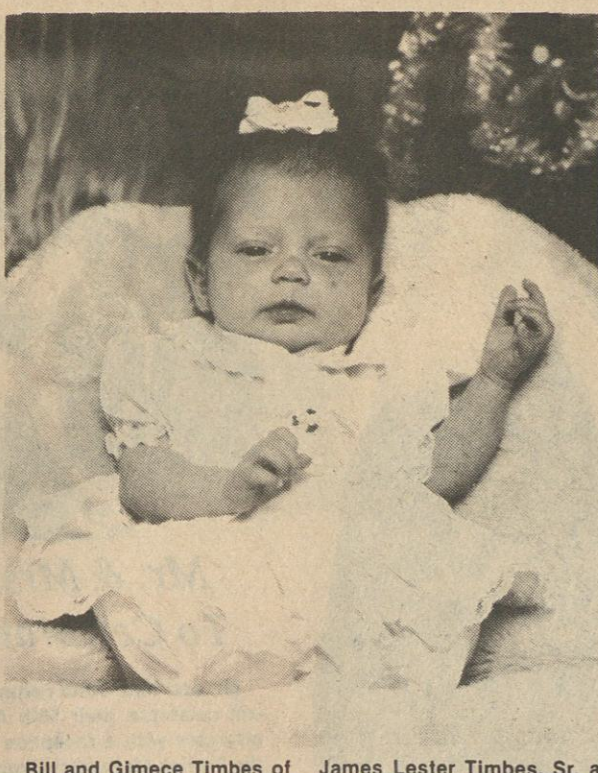

STARTING A CHAIN SAW

Cold weather is making its presence known to us in Tishomingo County, and I can tell by the woodcutting activity going on that many of you are preparing for winter. Those of you who use chain saws know they help get the job done quickly.
Don't get in a hurry and dispense with safety, however. One of the most common mistakes a person can make is to start the saw the wrong way. This leads to inefficiency, and perhaps a regrettable accident.
Follow this procedure when starting a chain saw: Place the saw on the ground. Get a good footing and hold the saw down on the ground with one hand. Pull the crank with the other hand.
A saw that is maintained and tuned starts easily. If you're on a ladder or in a tree, don't start the saw there since you may not be able to stay balanced.

FARM BUSINESS MANAGEMENT
A farm business management seminar will be held in Greenville, December 3-4, to help Mississippi farm families with business problems. Good production practices are being followed by some of our farm families but they fail to apply sound management principles in their operations.
This has caused some farm families to have severe financial problems. While the seminar won't solve all problems, it can help people find answers and become better managers.
The seminar is sponsored by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and the Delta Farm and Family Financial Management Center. I will be getting more information on the program soon.

WINTER GRAZING UPDATE
Our cool season grazing situation in Tishomingo County does not look good at this time. Severe dry weather in early fall hindered our soil preparation and delayed our planting. Many young plants have been lost because they haven't had enough moisture. You can do several things

Point Of Law

Q: What are some of the legal rights and responsibilities granted when a person turns eighteen?

A: When a person turns eighteen, he or she is eligible to vote and can register for local, state and federal elections. At this age, young people have the right to make contracts, such as a lease agreement or credit purchase. However, if they fail to meet the terms of that contract, they can be sued. Another right -- and responsibility -- is to own and to control their own property and to control the money they earn.

Q: What are my rights if arrested?

A: You have the right to an attorney to be present during all questioning. Before your statement is admissible as evidence at trial, the officer

must show that any statement resulting from questioning was obtained after you had intelligently, knowingly and voluntarily waived your right to remain silent. Whether you are questioned or not, you may telephone an attorney, relative or friend to notify him

of your arrest.

THE FAST FOOD GENERATION

Eating fast food has become a way of life for many people, especially teenagers. There are more than 300 fast food chains and nearly 65,000 outlets with annual sales of \$25 billion. Fast food franchises such as McDonalds, Burger King, Hardees, Wendy's and dozens of others are the largest single source of food other than grocery stores.

Fast food has been called junk food, but this is not necessarily true. If you choose carefully from fast food restaurant menus, nutritious food is available. But if you eat fast food often you should pay special attention to insure food nutrition.

The suggestions listed below can help you to make wise choices from fast food sources and still maintain a balanced diet.

A meal of a special hamburger, fries and a shake provides enough calories to last a 150 pound male half a day. Most of the calories come from fat and sugar in

these meals, making a balanced diet during the rest of the day difficult. The meal provides plenty of protein but is low in nutrients supplied by foods such as whole grains and vegetables.

The 300 to 400 calories in a shake are almost completely empty. Some shakes are not made with milk, although some do have milk solids as an ingredient. A shake made from whole milk and real ice cream does have some nutritional value, but such a dessert is not to be found at the large franchises.

A salad bar can help considerably in obtaining balanced nutrition. Some franchises are responding to pressure from those concerned about nutrition by providing salad bars.

When eating any brand of fried chicken, you can safely guess that the more breading and deep frying, the more fat and oil there will be in what you eat. The extra coating gives the oil more surface area to stick.

The typical chicken dinner has a better nutritional balance than the hamburger meal because it adds potatoes that are not fried and a salad. But a large number of people find the mashed potatoes the least appealing part of the meal.

The key to salvaging decent nutrition at any fast food franchise is care in your selection. At chicken outlets you have more choice than most. You could select poorly and choose chicken, fries, a shake and a dessert. That would be about 1500 calories - enough to almost insure a day of too many calories and not enough nutrition.

Or you could select chicken, cole slaw, a vegetable like corn or mushrooms and a drink like tea, coffee or water and have only about 800 calories and a balance of foods.

Three slices of pizza, like the other fast foods, provides plenty of protein and not as many calories as many believe. For example, a serving of one-half of a 10 inch crust pizza will have between 430 and 520 calories, depending on the exact ingredients. Half of a pizza actually has a bit fewer calories than a special hamburger.

The fat content of the pizza is lower than in chicken or hamburgers. And cheese from the dairy group, meat

topping, crust from the bread group and perhaps vegetable toppings gives pizza a variety of nutrients.

If a fast food lunch provides half the calories you need in a day but only 20 percent of the needed vitamins and minerals, you can see the problem. Obtaining the other 80 percent of the nutrients will probably give too many calories.

Fast foods are high in fat and oil and low in fiber content. There is increasing evidence that fiber or "roughage" from vegetables and grains is important in a balanced diet and that modern diets provide too little.

Another general problem of

fast food restaurants is the high salt content of the foods - even without adding salt from a shaker.

Avoid shakes and desserts as part of your meal. They provide only empty calories and make a balanced diet very unlikely. Instead try the ultimate fast food desert - fresh fruit. But you'll have to bring your own.

In continued celebration of National Family Bread Baking Month here is another bread recipe which would be easy for children to help make:

3 1/2 c. Biscuit Mix
2 1/2 c. (10 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1 1/4 c. milk

Combine Biscuit Mix and cheese. Combine eggs and milk. Add liquid to cheese mixture, mixing just enough

to moisten cheese mixture. Pour into a greased and floured 9 x 5 x 3-inch loafpan. Bake at 350° for 55 minutes. Yield: 1 loaf.

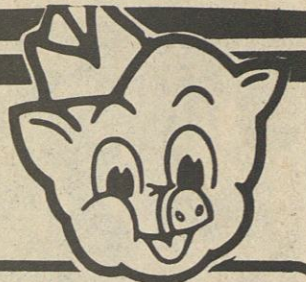

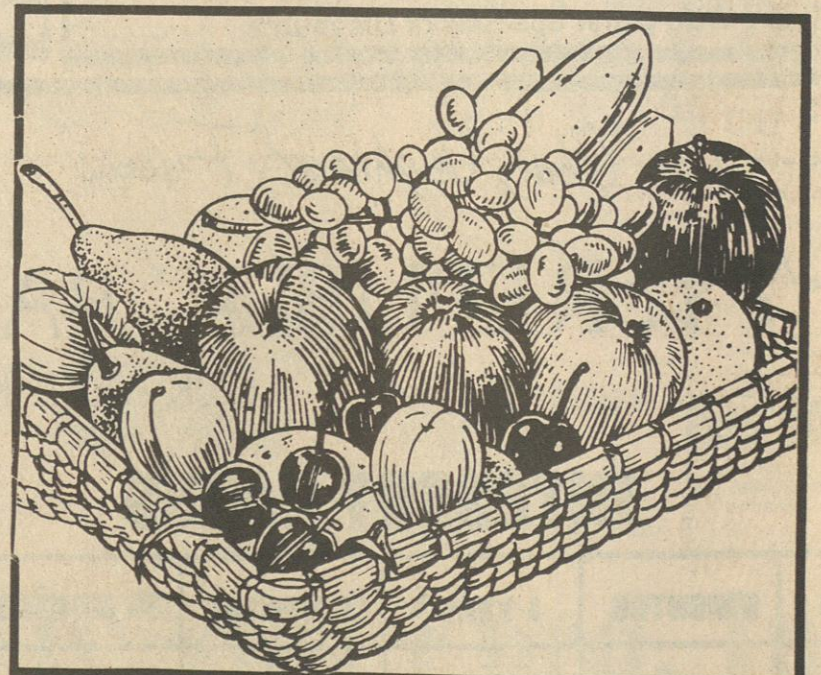
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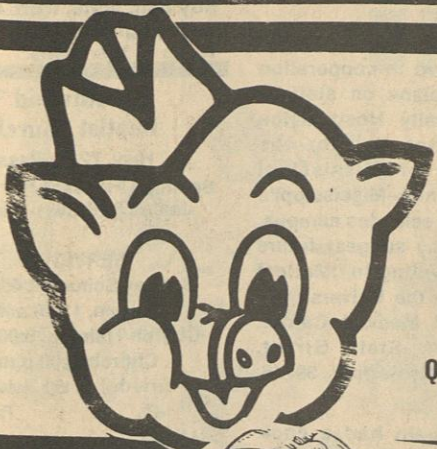

Osteoporosis Afflicts Us All

Calcium loss begins early in life, much earlier than is commonly thought.

Osteoporosis, a condition now attributed to calcium deficiency, decreases bone mass, causing bones to become weak, porous and more susceptible to fracture. The disease occurs when the breakdown of bone is greater than bone formation. The breakdown of bone in osteoporosis is the reason for the loss of skeletal mass and height in the elderly. Though the disease is thought to occur as people grow older, it strikes an estimated 20 million people a year in the U.S., and many of these are not elderly. Women are twice as likely to be affected as men by the disease.

Compact bone, which includes bones of the arms, hands, legs and toes, begins deteriorating around the age of 50. The loss of this compact, or cortical, bone is greater in women, presumably due to menopause and the ensuing loss of estrogen. The other bone type, trabecular bone, which makes up the spine and pelvis, begins decomposing earlier-in some cases as early as 30 years of age. No reason for this loss is known because it occurs many years before the onset of menopause and, in addition, is found in men.

With age, the loss of bone is a result of several factors. One reason is the role of weightbearing exercise in the maintenance of skeletal mass. Weightlessness in space has proven that resistance to the force of gravity is essential in maintaining a normal equilibrium between bone resorption, or loss, and bone formation. Therefore, modest increases in weightbearing exercise, such as walking, should be incorporated into one's daily schedule.

As mentioned above, after menopause women have an accelerated rate of bone loss. Women who have a smaller bone mass and presumable, a higher than normal level of bone loss, are most likely to succumb to spinal fractures. On the other hand, hip fractures appear to affect both men and women and do not seem to be a result of advanced bone loss, which indicates "normal" bone loss may place all people at risk during the aging process.

For protection against the inevitable process of bone loss, adequate amounts of calcium should be included in the diet throughout life. Dairy products supply the richest source of calcium, though

fish cooked with bones, dark green leafy vegetables, legumes, nuts, and whole grain cereals are good sources, also. The equivalent of two to three cups of skim or low fat milk daily will supply the amount of calcium needed for most adult men and premenopause women (pregnancy, lactation and rapid growth requires more calcium). Postmenopausal women should increase their calcium intake if they have not experienced kidney stones.

Calcium intake equivalent to 800 mg to 1500 mg daily may not always be achieved through dietary means, but inexpensive, palatable calcium supplements are available in tablet form. Calcium supplements in the form of bone meal or "dolomite" should be avoided because both may contain lead. In addition the amount of available mineral calcium in various calcium compounds varies extensively. Some people, especially those who are unable to go outdoors often, or those who live in northern climates, also may require a vitamin D supplement that in excess can be dangerous. A physician should be consulted about the use of supplemental vitamins and minerals.

Beyond dietary considerations and adequate exercise, other factors can contribute to deteriorating bone loss and the potential for spinal fractures and other bone breaks. A smoker who stops, will probably decrease his or her risk of developing osteoporosis. Cigarette smoking constitutes an independent risk factor for the disease in both men and women. Studies also show that women who smoke enter menopause several years earlier than nonsmokers. Large doses of the vitamins A and D can directly accelerate

bone loss and should be avoided.

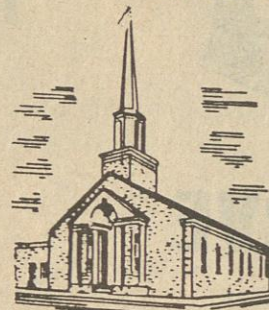

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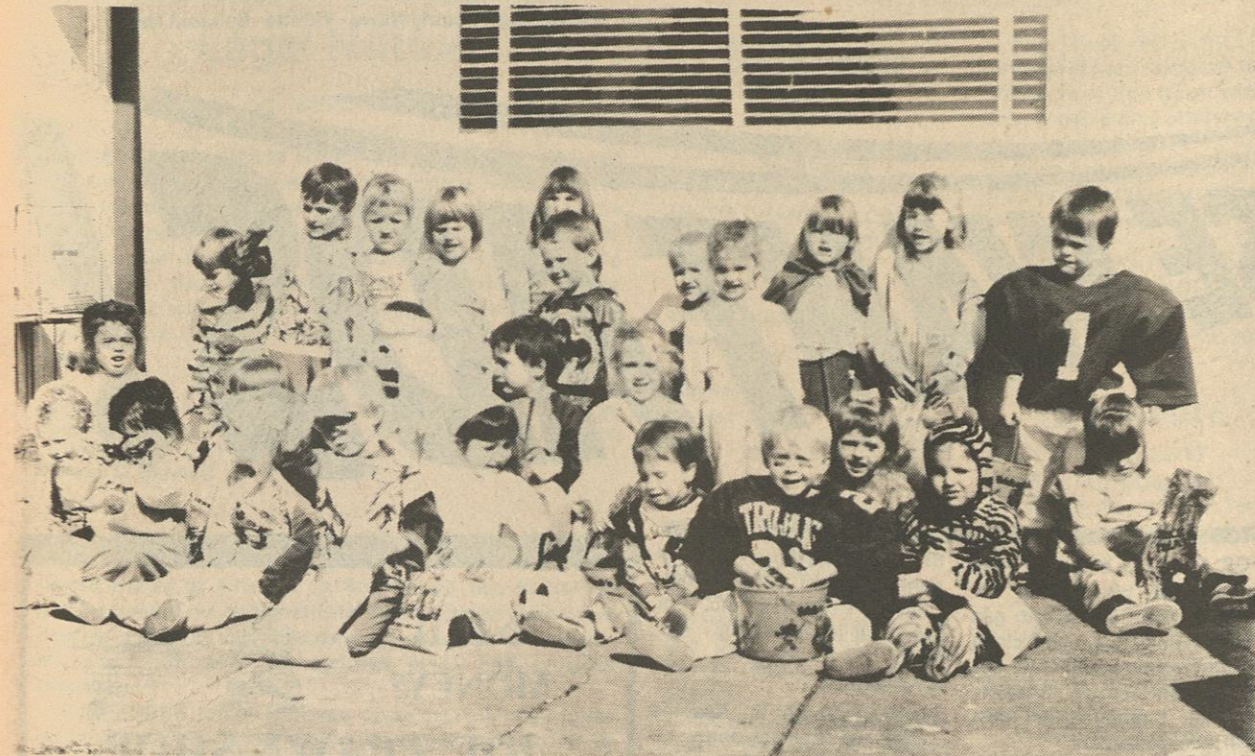

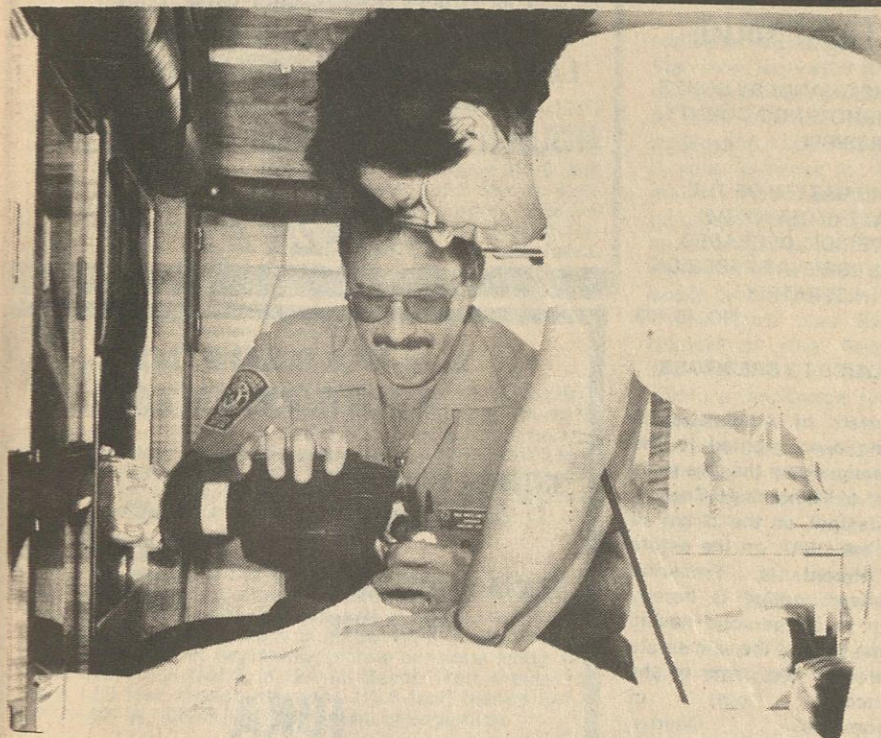

Emergency Services At Tishomingo Hospital

It can happen anytime—a lawn mower slings a rock as a jogger runs past; a teenager leaves the highway at high speed; a toddler drinks a colorful, but toxic cleaning solution; an elderly man is stricken with a heart attack at home. Medical emergencies can and do occur any time of the day or night—they know no age boundaries. It is comforting to know that competent emergency medical help is available.

Tishomingo Hospital operates a fully staffed and equipped Emergency Services Department and Ambulance Service. During the week, Monday through Friday, local physicians cover the emergency department from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. All other hours are covered contractually with physicians physically at the hospital.

The hospital has four ambulances available for use in emergencies. According to Ambulance Service Supervisor Dale White, Intermediate Paramedic, three ambulances are available at the hospital, while the fourth one is located in neighboring Belmont. The Belmont ambulance is staffed by Belmont Emergency Services and is equipped and maintained by

Tishomingo Hospital.

White says the hospital makes approximately 140-150 ambulance runs monthly, answering calls which range from life-threatening situations to routine patient transports. In addition to White, the department is staffed with eight Emergency Medical Technicians (two of whom are also Licensed Practical Nurses), five ambulance drivers who are First Aid and Emergency Medical Response trained, and one Intermediate Emergency Medical Technician.

According to White, Tishomingo Hospital goes beyond providing the community with emergency medical services. "We offer CPR classes to any group who would like to learn CPR," he said. The department is well-qualified to teach CPR. Four of the EMT staff are certified CPR instructors, with three of them being multimedia first aid instructors as well. The group also provides community first aid classes for groups who would like such training. "Our instructors cover a wide range of first aid subjects," White said, "from splinting and heat or cold exposure, to bandaging and treating simple

cuts." Any organization that would like to learn CPR or first aid may call Dale White at 423-4063.

The department is planning to offer a Hazardous and Toxic Materials Handling seminar this fall. White says the proposed workshop is directed toward area industry. Other area hospitals are being invited to attend.

White says the Emergency Services Department keeps current with in-service training sessions bimonthly. "We stay abreast of the latest techniques regarding a number of subjects," he commented. "Our training covers such things as snake bites, handling hazardous materials, CPR, and water rescue."

The Tishomingo Hospital Emergency Staff has received considerable recognition for its work and expertise. At the National EMT Convention held in Biloxi in May of this year, White was selected the EMT Administrator of the Year for Mississippi, and Edna Barnes, LPN/EMT, was selected as EMT of the Year. White also received the Outstanding Achievement Award from the Tishomingo County Red Cross Chapter for his work in instructing Red Cross

classes, and Billie Lewis, LPN/EMT, was recognized by the county Red Cross chapter for teaching the most CPR and first aid classes in 1986.

No matter what the emergency is, it is a comfort to know that emergency medical help is only a phone call away.

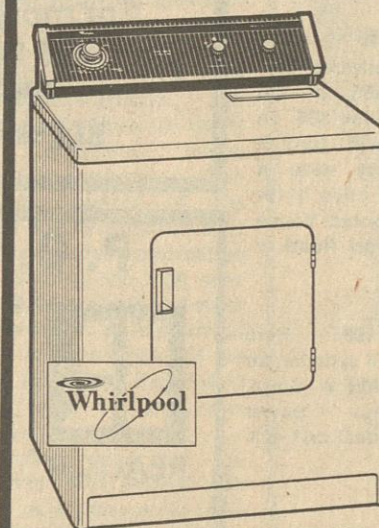

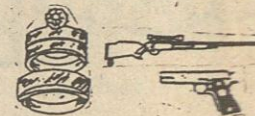

The term "navigation" basically means to determine a ship or boat's course and to control the vessel to maintain that direction in order to reach a certain destination. As simple as that may sound, navigation in unfamiliar seas, waterways, and adverse weather conditions can often cause serious concern for the captain of a vessel.

It becomes absolutely necessary for all pilots or captains to familiarize themselves with a certain amount of knowledge relative to "Rules of the Road" which are applicable to waterway systems. Every licensed driver of an automobile knows there are specific rules and regulations that apply while driving. There are also rules and guidelines pertaining to navigation of which a captain of a vessel should be knowledgeable.

Navigation rules are quite complex when compared to those of highway driving. There are two major categories of navigation rules, International and Inland. According to Coast Guard definition, "Inland Waters" means "the navigable waters of the United States shoreward of the navigational demarcation lines dividing the high seas from harbors, rivers and other inland waters of the United States and the waters of the Great Lakes on the United States side of the International Boundary."

Knowing some of the following rules dealing with inland waters may prove to be beneficial for local boaters. Understanding the meaning of buoys and other markers is often helpful. Waterway

systems have channel buoys that mark the main navigation route. In most cases these buoys or markers are red and green. A red buoy always indicates the left (port) side of a channel and the green indicates the right (starboard) side. One simple way to determine direction of travel is to remember "Red on your right returning", which means that red buoy will always be on your right as your return from the largest body of water. Remember that main channel markers may be a combination of floating buoys of different shapes and sizes and on stationary day markers on pilings or trees, but the colors will always be red and green.

Other colored buoys may also be encountered but they have separate, specific meanings. A white buoy with a red band around the top

this buoy. Another important marker to be aware of is the "Diver's Down" flag. A solid red flag with a diagonal white slash warns boaters to stay clear of the area and exercise caution because divers are in the water.

Buoys that have a white background and orange symbols with black letters are uniform regulatory markers. An orange symbol in the shape of a diamond means "danger". This buoy warns of immediate danger. For example these buoys are placed above and below dams. The Boats Keep Out" buoy also has an orange diamond symbol with a cross on it. This buoy warns of visible and invisible dangers such as swimming areas, waterfalls, submerged lines, rocks and other obstructions. An orange circle symbol is used for controlled areas such as a "Slow No Wake" zone near a boat ramp. Orange square symbols are information markers which tell the skipper non-regulatory messages such as directions, places, food, fuel and repair.

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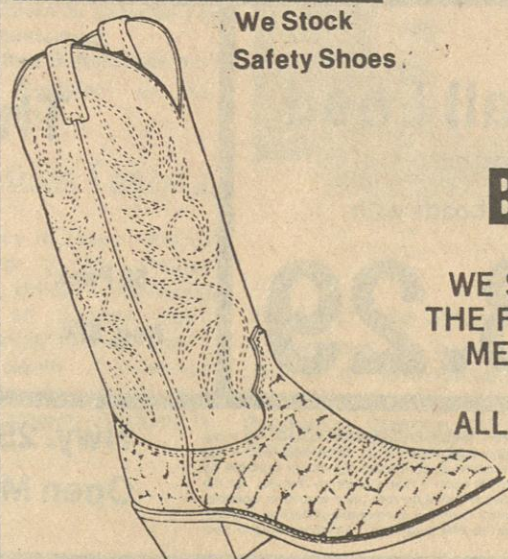

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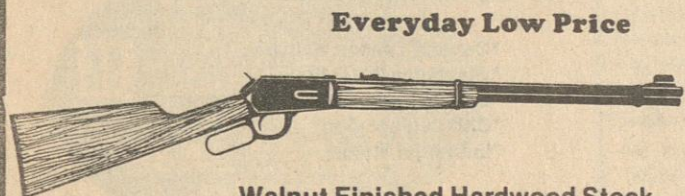


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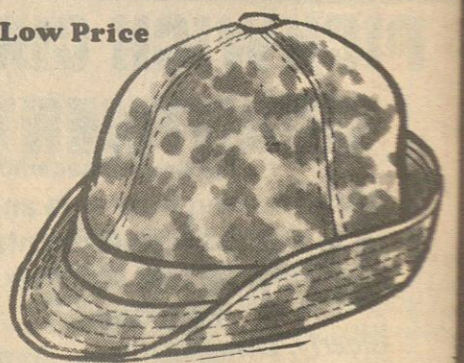
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
