### Information For The Registered Voters Of Tishomingo County

Several of you have called requesting information concerning the Democratic election process. Such questions as:

- (1) How can I get on the Tishomingo County Democratic Executive Committee?
- (2) When and what is the precinct caucus?
- (3) Where are the precinct caucuses held?
- (4) Who goes to the county, district and state conventions?
- (5) Where are these meetings held, etc.?

I will try to answer some of your questions as best as I can.

Here is a brief outline of the steps to be taken.

**Step 1 — Precinct Caucus** - To be held at each precinct in the county. There will be someone at each precinct to conduct these meetings. The precinct caucus will be held this coming Saturday, February 27, 1988 at 10:00 a.m. at the precinct where you go to vote. Each precinct is allowed a certain number of delegates and you will be told how many delegates and alternates your precinct is allowed at the meeting.

The delegates or alternates elected at the precinct meeting will represent their precinct at the Tishomingo County Democratic Convention.

**Step 2 — Tishomingo County Democratic Convention** - Held March 5, 1988, at the Tishomingo County Courthouse at 10:00 a.m.

The County Convention will be those who have been elected delegates or alternates at the precinct meeting. At the county convention all the precinct delegates will group together by supervisors districts, such as (example) all the precinct delegates from the 1st District will group together, 2nd District group together, 3rd District group together, etc.

From these District groups will be elected 6 members from each district to represent their district on the Tishomingo County Democratic Executive Committee, a total of 30 members.

This committee will meet from 7 to 28 days from the date of the county convention to elect officers to serve for the next 4 years. Also, at the county convention, delegates will be elected to go to the District and State Conventions.

As you can see, the first step is to go to your precinct caucus.

I would like to encourage as many of you as possible to take part in this democratic process.

I hope this brief outline above will be of some help to you and if you have further questions or I can be of help to any of you, please call on me anytime.

Remember, the first step will be Saturday, February 27 at 10:00 a.m. at your polling place. Try to be there.

### County Child Find Plan Announced

The Tishomingo County School District is participating in an ongoing statewide effort to identify, locate, and evaluate children through the age of twenty-one who are physically, mentally, communicatively and/or emotionally handicapped. Early identification of children in need of special education experiences is most important to each child. Furthermore, this information gathered from contacts with parents and other agencies will be used to help determine present and future program needs as progress is made toward the goal of providing a free appropriate public education to all handicapped children.

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by this agency and will be provided to other agencies only in accordance with the Family Rights and Privacy Act and EHA-B. As a parent, you are guaranteed the right to inspect any such information about your child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to any unauthorized person without informed consent. If you have questions regarding the collection, maintenance and use of data about your child, please contact Betty Barnes, Child Find Director for the Tishomingo County School District by calling 423-6061 or 423-7471 or writing to her at the following address: Superintendent's Office, Tishomingo County Courthouse Iuka, MS 38852.

The Child Find Director implements child identification, location and evaluation of children, birth through twenty-one, who are handicapped, regardless of the severity of their handicaps, and who are in need of special education and/or related services. The Child Find Director works with the local Headstart, Welfare, Health and Mental Health agencies, as well as

local education agencies, physicians and other individuals to identify and locate children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services.

Once a referral is made, it is the responsibility of the Child Find Director to insure that the Referral-to-Placement procedures are followed. The director works with Local Survey Committees at each school to implement this procedure. The following activities briefly describe the procedures.

Prior to evaluation, a copy of the Parent Information Pamphlet and Procedural Safeguards are given to parents. District personnel explain the Parent Information Pamphlet to parents and insure that they understand the Procedural Safeguards.

After parental consent for testing is obtained, a non-discriminatory evaluation is conducted. Students are evaluated in all areas related to the suspected disability by qualified personnel.

Parents are notified when a student is ruled eligible for a special education program. An Individual Educational Plan is developed for the student before the student is placed. Parents must sign permission for placement. Parents, teacher and students participate in this process. All students receiving special education services are reassessed at least once a year and reevaluated at least once every three years.

We now have twelve special education classes in our district which serve students who have physical, mental, communicative and/or emotional handicaps. It is the goal of the Tishomingo County School District to provide free appropriate education to all handicapped children through age twenty-one by the year 2000.

## Special Election March 1 In Iuka

A special election will be held Tuesday, March 1, in the City of Iuka to fill a vacant post on the Iuka Board of Aldermen.

The vacant seat was created at the January 1, resignation of John Castleberry, after a Supreme Court ruling stating that an

officer or employee of a bank doing business with the city cannot serve in this capacity.

The polls will be located in the Iuka City Hall and will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

The following is a list of candidates who have qualified: Ted Castleberry, Marvin Lester Baker, James

Alvin Bonds, Larry P. O'Brian, Steve Grisham, and Bobby Welch.

If no one candidate receives a majority vote at the election, the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall have their name placed on the ballot for an election to be held one week thereafter.

## Precinct Meetings To Be February 27th

The process for delegate selection in the Democratic Party begins Saturday, February 27. Chairman David Bonds of the Tishomingo County Executive Committee has called for a Democratic precinct meeting to be held at each precinct at 10 a.m.

Any registered voter of the precinct may attend and participate. Each participant must declare that he or she is a member of the Democratic Party of the State of

Mississippi and is not affiliated with any other political party.

Delegates will be elected to represent the precinct at the Democratic County Convention. Two delegates and two alternates will be selected for each 100 democratic votes cast by the precinct in the 1987 gubernatorial election. Each precinct's delegation shall have equal numbers of men and women and shall reflect the racial composition

of the Democratic electorate of the precinct. Any active Democrat may be chosen as a delegate whether or not he or she is present at the precinct meeting.

The February 27 Precinct Meeting is a preliminary to the County Convention on March 5, where delegates and alternates to the Congressional District Convention and State Convention are elected as well as delegates to the National Convention.

## Proposed Nursing Home Beds At Local Hospital

The 1988 State Health Plan projects a need for 2,191 additional nursing home beds in Mississippi by 1990. Recommendation "8" of the 1988 State Health Plan status, "...permit distinct part extended care units in six hospitals to be licensed for nursing home care, provided that the criteria and standards of the 1988 State Health Plan are met".

Legislation including this provision has been introduced in Senate Bill 2303 and House Bill 507.

and House Bill 507.

Tishomingo Hospital is one of the six hospitals which would be allowed to use 36 beds as nursing home beds. If this legislation is passed, it would permit the hospital to utilize unused space, create additional jobs, and better serve our community.

## Pre-Registration At Head Start Centers

Mississippi Action for Progress, Inc. will pre-register children at your local Head Start Center:

February 16 - March 11, 1988  
7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

March 7 - March 8, 1988  
7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Children registered at this time will be screened by your local county council for recommendation of enrollment when centers re-open in September, 1988.

The eligibility criteria for enrollment are children ages 3 and 4 years with family income below poverty and/or on welfare. Parents with children in this age group, who are Medicaid/EPSTD recipients and/or who have a

handicapping condition, are strongly encouraged to register their children. Handicapped children are defined as those who are mentally retarded, hard of hearing, deaf, speech impaired, visually handicapped, seriously emotionally disturbed, crippled, or other health impaired children who by reason thereof require special education and related services.

Parents desiring to pre-register their children are asked to go to the closest center within their community for registration. Parents are asked to carry a certified copy of their child's birth certificate, Medicaid card (if on welfare), immunization card and proof of income, such as W-2 form, or income tax return.

## Schizophrenia

Schizophrenia is a frustrating, mystifying, crippling, and often terrifying mental disorder. We are still not certain what causes it. Bit by bit scientists are finding evidence that schizophrenics retreat into a world of inner voices and visions because their brains are overly sensitive to everyday stimuli. A wash in a sea of sights, smells, and sounds, they cannot distinguish noise from news. They can't tune out the environmental noise that would drive anyone crazy.

Paranoia is often a part of schizophrenia. Fears of persecution, of being followed are part of the pattern. Hearing voices or seeing things that aren't true is a sign of the illness. Dramatic changes in behavior and performance at work or school; inability to make decisions; abusive behavior toward others, can indicate problems. Remote withdrawn behavior, loss of interest in the family, play, or work, may mean a person is retreating from the world. Prolonged, severe feelings of uneasiness or fear, without clear cause is also a symptom of schizophrenia. A single symptom or isolated event isn't necessarily a sign of schizophrenia or any mental illness. But, a continuing pattern of unusual or extreme behavior may mean professional help is needed.

Families of persons with mental illness are generally cooperative when informed and educated as to realistic and workable approaches to the illness. The education, although essential when the ill family member lives with his/her natural family, is also extremely useful even when the ill member is not in the home. Research is supporting the idea that most persons with schizophrenia do better living somewhere other than home. The disease process can result in family members' loss of patient with the victim, which creates more stress and a vicious cycle occurs.

## 4-H Communicates

In an earlier column, I told you a little about the 4-H Conservation Field Day and the Shooting Sports Contest. This week I would like to explain the Wildlife Judging Contest.

The Wildlife Judging Contest consists of four sections. The first section involves On-Site Management Recommendations. The 4-H'er will look at a site or slides and match Wildlife Management Practices needed to create the optimal habitat for ten species. For

example, the site may require controlled burning at 3-year intervals to improve the area for deer and turkey. Or the same area may need clear-cut timber management to encourage quail to live there. A pond may need a diversion ditch to help bass and bluegills to thrive.

The second section of the contest involves judging aerial photographs of wildlife habitat for its suitability for the 10 different species. The 4-H'ers will also give oral reasons to support their placings of the photographs.

The third section determines how much a 4-H'er knows about the food of different species. They will be shown sample food items and asked to match these items to the species which may include that item in its diet. For example, a persimmon would be included in the diet for turkey, deer, squirrel, and many other wildlife species which eat fruit.

The fourth section of the contest is for senior 4-H'ers only (14-18 years old). This part consists of making a Wildlife Management Recommendation on the habitat site. The plan will be based on a given species and the objectives of the landowner for the site.

The information and skills learned through this contest are of particular value in Tishomingo County. Many of our young people live in areas where some wildlife species thrive. Knowing how to produce a successful habitat for a particular species teaches wildlife conser-

vation, thus insuring the future generations will have access to an abundance of wildlife. If you would like to join 4-H or would like more information on the 4-H Wildlife Judging Contest call 423-3616.

Last year several 4-H'ers produced Wildlife Food Plots on vacant land. The food plots were planted in lespedeza, soybeans, and cowpeas. The seeds were broadcast over the prepared land. After the plants grew the 4-H'ers identified the animal tracks found on the plot and made notes on the types of wildlife seen. At the end of the growing season the Food Plots were judged and records were submitted on the state level.

### SIGNS OF HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE

You're probably aware of the dangers of high blood pressure to your health, how it can sometimes lead to heart disease or stroke if not properly controlled. You may not be aware that signs of this serious condition can also become evident during an eye examination.

High blood pressure causes a narrowing of the retinal arteries. There may also be a change in proportion between the width of the arteries and that of the veins, or indentation of the veins by arteries which lie across them. Or there may be small areas of hemorrhage, swelling,

accumulated fluid or atrophy in the retina, or a slight swelling of the optic nerve. There are many other signs of high blood pressure that your eye doctor can detect during an examination. With medical treatment, blood pressure can be reduced, along with the symptoms and the threat of more serious consequences.

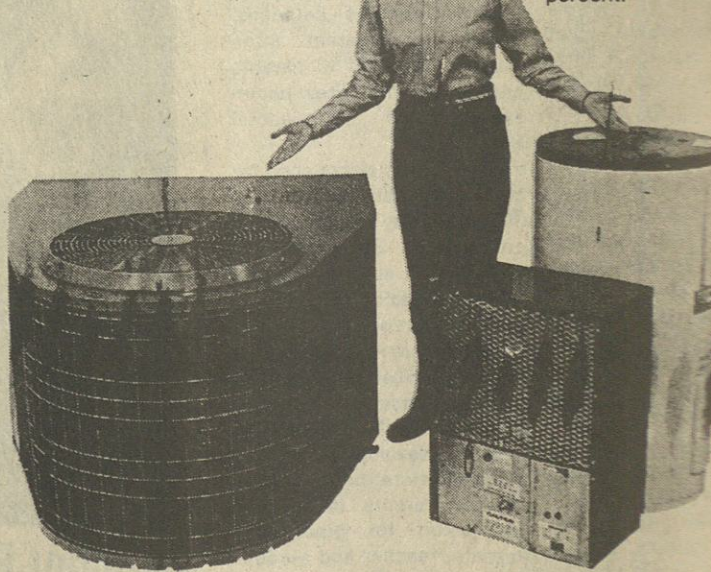
Having regular eye examinations not only helps to correct problems that interfere with your vision, it can also help identify other health problems that need treatment.

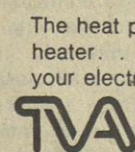
## Two ways to save on your electric bills

### WILDLIFE/FORESTRY MANAGEMENT SHORT COURSE

I would like to call to your attention a Forestry/Wildlife management Short Course, which will be conducted in March.

This course will involve landowners from Tishomingo, Prentiss and Alcorn counties. The course will be held at the Alcorn County Extension Office in Corinth, beginning at 7:00 p.m., March 3rd, and continuing each Tuesday night in March from 7:00 until 9:00 p.m.

This is a basic course on how forest landowners and sportsmen can increase timber resource and at the same time improve the quality and quantity of deer and turkey habitat. Topics to be covered include habitat management, biology and economics of wildlife and forestry.

This course is limited to 30 participants and will cost \$20.00 per person, which will pay for a reference notebook and refreshments at each session.

## ASCS News

0/92 Signup February 16 To March 11 Only

The 1988 Wheat and Feed Grain Program contains an optional acreage diversion program known as 0/92. The maximum acreage for deficiency payments under this program is 92 percent of the permitted acreages. Deficiency payment notes on the CU acres will not be less than the projected rates of \$1.53 per bushel for wheat, \$1.10 for corn, \$1.08 for sorghum. Measures may be taken to limit the amount of acres idled under the 0/92 provision. Producers may apply to participate in the 0/92 program from February 16th through March 11th.

Farm Program Signup February 16 to April 15

The signup for the cotton, wheat and feed grain program will be February 16 through April 15, 1988. To be eligible for price support loans and deficiency payments farmers must reduce the base acres by at least:

- 1- 27.5 percent for wheat
- 2- 20 percent for corn and sorghum, with optional 10% diversion
- 3- 5 percent for oats
- 4- 12.5 percent for upland cotton

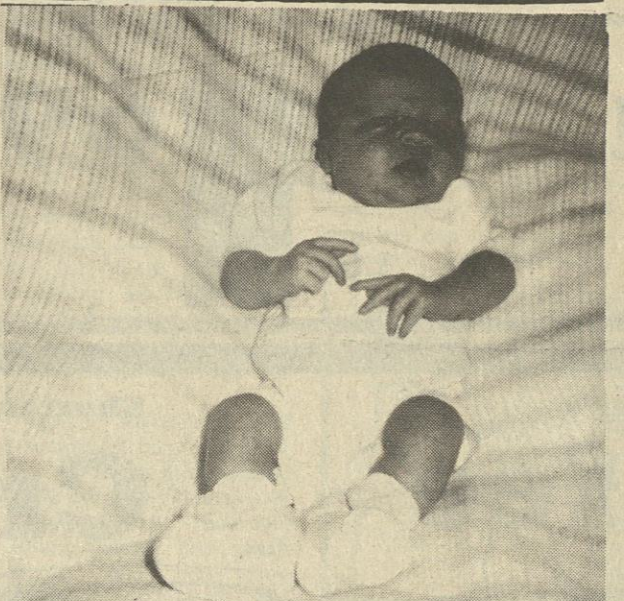
### Leap Year Celebration

### Housekeeping

With the constitutional convention bill headed for a House-Senate conference committee, Mississippi lawmakers have been taking a close look at Governor Ray Mabus' revamped budget plans, Medicaid funding, a landlord-tenant rights bill, and proposed changes in county government.

There was a marked increase in floor action in the House of Representatives last week although much of the work still was concentrated in committees.

House members voted to boost the maximum state funding authorized for Medicaid from \$90 million to \$100 million. Medicaid officials say additional funds are needed because of a projected deficit for the present year and rising costs next year in the health care program.

More than 300,000 needy people across the state are currently eligible for Medicaid-covered services. The program operates on a mixture of federal and state money, with Mississippi getting about \$3.75 in federal matching funds for each \$1 of state money.

House members declined to accept the Senate-passed version of the constitutional convention bill and voted to send the proposal to a six-member conference committee. The conferees will attempt to resolve differences and come up with an acceptable compromise.

Under both versions, a

state referendum would be held in November for voters to decide if a constitutional convention will be held in 1989. However, the Senate bill provides for voters to choose between a convention or the amendment process for revising the 1890 Constitution.

Other differences include the elimination of House-inserted language to preserve an existing requirement that tax increases must have at least a 3/5ths vote for legislative passage.

In addition, the Senate deleted a House provision which backers said was to protect the state's homestead exemption program. Convention delegates would be under no such limitations under the Senate version.

Other floor action in the House included approval of a hotly debated bill to allow gambling on the cruise ship Europa Star and similar vessels while operating off the Mississippi Coast. The measure spells out that gambling activities would not be permitted, however, unless approved by voters in the municipality where the ship's port is located. Backers said the legislation could help pump millions of dollars into the coastal economy and boost the ailing tourism industry.

Opponents questioned the projected economic benefits and argued gambling could bring crime and corruption.

The Governor met with lawmakers to push his education proposals and go over some revised budget requests, based on a recent increase in state revenue

estimates. The Governor's latest proposal calls for a \$210 million increase for education rather than his previous \$198 million, due largely to an increase in the number of teacher units to be funded.

While some features of his financial proposals continue to cause concern, the Governor abandoned a controversial proposal to divert funds from the State Aid Road Program and replace it with a bond issue.

In other legislative highlights last week, a Judiciary "A" Committee approved a proposed residential landlord and tenant rights act for the state; subcommittee hearings were held on several bills, including proposals to raise teacher salaries and to provide for a county-unit system of road management; and a subcommittee rejected bills to establish salaries, instead of fees, for circuit and chancery clerks.

The House voted to raise compensation for court bailiffs from \$15 to \$40 a day, designate August 16 at Elvis Presley Day in the state, and permit municipalities to publish summaries of ordinances and official documents in newspapers, rather than printing the entire document.

## Weekly State Crop Report

### State Soybean Farmers Have Selling Options.....

Mississippi soybean farmers stand a better chance of making money this spring if they will use marketing opportunities to sell 1987 beans

in storage. "We've got good demand and good use of soybeans and soybean products," said Dr. Bob Williams, economist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. "Our outlook for 1988 is much better than it was last year or in 1986."

Soybean stocks (beans in storage) have declined about 140 million bushels this year and could continue to fall through summer. Lower soybean stocks could raise market prices, and farmers could take advantage of the opportunity to sell at higher prices.

Williams said farmers who have soybean stocks should consider selling them before the South American bean crop hits the market in April or after it clears the market in June.

"Brazil and Argentina will have the largest crop they've ever had, and this could pressure prices that are typically weak in March," he said. "As we get closer to the (April) harvest of the South American crop, the chance of our farmers getting a price increase is pretty low."

Farmers who won't sell now will have to wait until June for higher prices. November 1988 futures prices have remained steady at the \$6 to \$6.50 mark for the past four weeks but they

could drop below \$6 when the South American beans are marketed.

In other agricultural news, farming activity was sluggish across the state because of cold weather.

Forage producers are checking their fields and gearing up to apply fertilizer. "I did get a report from one wheat farmer that his wheat was looking pretty good," said Michael H. Reed, Neshoba County agent. "The somewhat milder temperatures we've had have helped wheat and rye grass fields."

Cold weather in Madison County has stopped rye grass from growing and has burned rye leaves, said county agent, Frank Carter.

## Stopping Child Porn

I receive mail about everything from AIDS to unemployment. Some of you support my position on issues, while others don't always agree with my stance. But I have found one issue that crosses all barriers.

Every letter I receive about child pornography takes the position that it must be stopped. And rightly so.

I oppose the sexual exploitation of children through

child pornography. Child molestation is among the most heinous crimes in its commission and most tragic in its long-term consequences. Not only is the victim's childhood turned into a nightmare of fear and confusion, but for the rest of the victim's life, that child will almost always bear deep emotional scars. Every example of pornography involving the visual depiction of a child engaging in explicit sexual conduct is a record of the most despicable sexual molestation.

So what can we do about it. Well, many of you have taken the right first step and contacted my office. So what am I doing about it.

I am working to pass legislation that would put the criminals, who are using and abusing our children, out of business and behind bars.

Here is a case where law enforcement needs our help. We must have a law that prohibits the use of computers to advertise, distribute, or receive child pornography. We must prohibit a parent or legal guardian from selling or otherwise transferring custody or control of that minor where that guardian has knowledge that the minor would be used for the production of pornography. As insane as that sounds, it hap-

pens. And finally, we must allow the seizure and forfeiture of profits derived from child pornography. If it is cost prohibitive, organized crime will stay away.

Another concern of mine is what is commonly referred to as "dial-a-porn." It is my understanding that the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has been instructed to enforce measure which would prevent minors from calling these numbers, either by requiring personal identification numbers, access codes or credit cards. This is a good move.

So, in summary, we must update Federal law to take into account new technologies and ways of doing business employed by the pornography industry; and second, we must remove loopholes and weaknesses in the law, which have given child-porn criminals the upper hand for far too long.

We must fight back and we must do it now. Our future is at stake!

## For All The People

This week was filled with committee hearings concerning the Governor's teacher pay plan, the county unit system of road management, and the establishment of salaries, instead of fees, for circuit and chancery clerks.

Other important issues that we discussed this week were the revamped state budget plans, a new rural fire insurance bill, an increase in Medicaid funding, and a landlord-tenant rights bill.

Committees will pass many of these bills in the next few weeks, and the full House will then debate and vote on the measures.

This week, my subcommittee concerned with rural fire protection is holding hearings regarding updating the ISO rating standards as well as a bill that will bring the State Fire Marshal and the State Fire Academy under the Department of Public Safety.

In floor action in the House of Representatives last week, House members voted to boost the maximum state funding authorized for Medicaid from \$90 million to \$100 million. Medicaid officials say additional funds are needed because of a projected deficit for the present year and rising costs next year in the health care program.

More than 300,000 needy people across the state are currently eligible for Medicaid-covered services. The program operates on a mixture of federal and state money, with Mississippi getting about \$3.75 in federal matching funds for each \$1 of state money.

House members declined to accept the Senate-passed

version of the constitutional convention bill and voted to send the proposal to a six-member conference committee. The conferees will attempt to resolve differences and come up with an acceptable compromise.

The Governor met with lawmakers to push his education proposals and go over some revised budget requests, based on a recent increase in state revenue estimates. The Governor's latest proposal calls for a \$210 million increase for education rather than his previous \$198 million, due largely to an increase in the number of teacher units to be funded.

While some features of his financial proposals continue to cause concern, the Governor abandoned a controversial proposal to divert funds from the State Aid Road Program and replace it with a bond issue.

## Schools Can Receive Free Drug Prevention Material

"Be Smart, Stay Smart, Just Say No" will soon become a familiar phrase to thousands of students across Mississippi and Alabama as they recognize April as "Just Say No" Month. For the second year, DREAM, the Drug Research and Education Association in Mississippi, Inc., and The Mobile Partnership for Youth have spearheaded this exciting drug abuse prevention

project in their respective states.

Three different booklets and additional classroom materials were developed by the DREAM staff and are being provided free of charge to participating schools in Mississippi through a grant from the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division of the State Department of Mental Health. The materials are intended for use during April 4-8, 1988, which has been designated as "Just Say No" Week. Activities will culminate on Friday, April 8, with a statewide balloon release at 1:00 p.m. last year, some 60,000 balloons were released, each carrying a special "Say No To Drugs" message.

"We are extremely pleased with the response from principals and school districts this year," said DREAM Special Projects Director, Terrie Ainsworth. "Nearly 400 schools are registered, representing 7,500 classrooms and 200,000 students from grades K-9. This is an increase of 20% over participation from last year." In addition to classroom activities developed for each individual grade, a Community Participation Booklet provides suggestions for making "Just Say No" Week a total community effort.

Many Mississippi towns are finding unique ways to help their children combat drug abuse. In Starkville, local physicians will be wearing a picture of the project's dinosaur logo, "Drugless Douglass" on their lab coats. Statewide, over 200 pediatricians have received information packets about the project. In Yazoo City, the Junior Auxiliary will be assisting teachers by conducting the drug prevention activities with all fourth grade classes.

Some counties and school districts have enrolled every school in their area. Some of these include Cleveland Schools, Pascagoula Schools, Gulfport Schools, Alcorn County, Jones County and Oktibbeha County.

A limited number of free classroom materials are still available on a first come, first served basis. ## Good Food Buys

NATIONAL MEAT MONTH  
POINTS OUT BENEFITS

It's "National Meat Month," so let's explore some of the latest facts about meat and health. As we close in on the end of the 1980s -- yes, the turn of the century is just around the corner -- there can't be many issues more fascinating to American consumers than their own health, and the ways they can work to make life healthier, happier... and longer. A balanced diet made up of a variety of wholesome, nutrient dense foods, added to life-style that includes the right amount of exercise, seems more every day to be one of the best ways to go about making life better.

Fortunately, today's food is safer, more wholesome and more nutritious than ever before, especially meat. Why meat? Because the United States livestock and meat industry has been working

overtime for the past three decades or more to improve the nutrient profile of all its products. That's easy enough to see just by looking back to the concept of the "Good, hearty meal" most Americans seemed to share in the 1950s. There had to be oceans of gravy, mountains of potatoes and the biggest, fattest, most heavily marbled roast that the household could afford. And pie a la mode probably followed. Without all that, it simply wasn't a meal. Beef, pork, lamb and veal still are America's favorite foods to put in the corner of the table.

But we're buying and eating a very different kind of red meat these days. Our livestock and meat industry has caught up with consumer demand. In some ways it's a lot like Detroit's retooling to turn out smaller, leaner cars when the public voiced its desire for products like that. Retooling a species is much more complicated, and slower, than retooling a factory. That just makes the changes in the meat we're buying even more startling.

Gone today are short, blocky steers that produced the 1950s beef. Beef animals today are bigger, but genetics research has permitted them to produce about 75 pounds more weight, but at decreased levels of fatness. Hogs used to be raised more for their lard than they are today. When vegetable oils came into the competitive picture, lean pork animals became the most profitable goal for the producer.

Dressed carcass weight is the same as it was 30 years ago, but lean meat per head has increased by about 30 percent. Fat from animal sources in U.S. diets has remained about constant for the past 70 years. In fact, our national fat consumption has increased since 1914 only because our consumption of fat from vegetable sources has tripled.

Like cattle, fed lambs today have about 6 percent less body fat than their counterparts of three decades ago. Veal, of course, long as been leaner, than beef, pork or lamb. This all adds up to leaner meat going into the good supply.

Probably the main reason for today's consumer demand for steamed meat that tastes as good as we've come to expect, but with more lean meat per serving, is the prevalence of health warnings about fat intake. The American Heart Association (AHA), the National Cancer Institute (NCI) and other health organizations have come out strongly in favor of efforts to encourage the public to limit its fat intake.

A number of studies over the years have convinced the leadership of these important national groups that there is something about the fat we eat that contributes to the risk of heart disease and cancer. Being overweight may be a contributor to both of these health problems, most agree, and eating too much of any food can put on extra pounds.

## Science Fair Dates Set

Students entering projects in the 1988 Mississippi regional and state science and engineering fairs will have one new rule to contend with this year -- the preparation of a research plan.

"All students in grades 7 through 12 will be required to submit a research plan along with the registration form and abstract form required of all participants," said Lawrence J. Bellipanni, program executive officer and an assistant professor of science education at the University of Southern Mississippi.

Locations and dates for the fairs have been scheduled, Bellipanni noted. The regional fairs, set for March and April, will precede the state fair planned April 15 at Jackson State University. Winners from the state fair will proceed to the 39th International Science and Engineering Fair May 8-14 at Knoxville, Tenn.

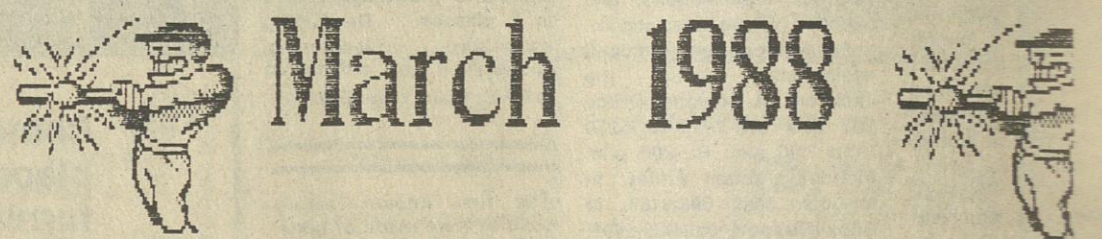

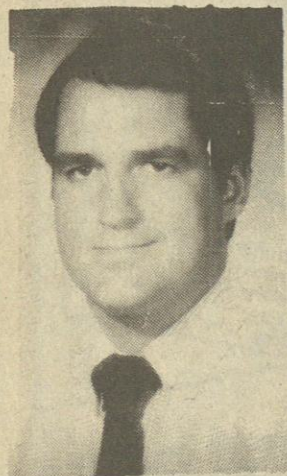

### Check Line 25 On Your 1987 State Income Tax

State Treasurer Marshall Bennett, in response to several citizens' inquiries to his office, says Mississippi residents can contribute to the State's Educational Trust Fund on their 1987 State Income Tax Forms, line 25.

"As our 1987 State income tax returns are being prepared, we have a great opportunity to earmark part or all of our tax refunds directly for education, and get a tax credit on top of it," Bennett said.

The Trust Fund was established exclusively for the improvement of education within the State of Mississippi. The balance today within the fund is nearly \$20 million", Bennett stated.

Bennett said the Trust Fund is also authorized to accept donations over and above the income tax check off. "Contributions can be sent to the Treasurer's Office payable to the Education Trust Fund."

"The Trust Fund principal is protected by the State Constitution, and can never be spent, but the interest earned from the fund is made available for appropriation exclusively for education of school children in Mississippi," Bennett said. This year \$2,000,000 of interest was spent for pilot remedial projects, upgrading vocational education equipment, and the purchase of textbooks.

"Recent public opinion polls show that people believe that Mississippians should have the opportunity for a quality education and a good school system," Bennett stated, "so this is one way we can show our concern and support."

## Are You Ready For That Day?

## Ask Ochsner. . .

Q. I am a 24-year-old woman and I suffer from varicose veins. What causes varicose veins and what is the best form of treatment for them? Mrs. K.L., Baton Rouge, La.

A. As long as man has walked upright, both men and women alike have suffered with varicose veins. Although more common in women because of increased pressure on the legs during pregnancy, men are not immune to this condition.

Dr. Thomas Feagin, an internist at the Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans, says that the return of blood from the legs to the heart is aided by the contraction of muscles in the legs. One-way valves in the veins of the legs help the muscles push the blood along by squeezing it back up the legs. If these valves become deficient due to increased pressure, they may cause some of the blood to overflow into the superficial veins closer to the skin's surface. This makes the vein swell and twist, thus causing the bluish, puffy vein which is the trademark of varicose veins.

There is usually not a lot of pain associated with varicose veins, but prolonged periods of standing or sitting can

cause the legs to ache. Regular leg movements can help alleviate this problem.

In most cases, varicose veins can be treated simply by wearing support stockings. When reclining, elevate the legs, which is not only relaxing, but also helps improve blood flow back to the heart. Exercising regularly by walking or bicycling can also improve blood circulation.

If the ache in the legs is quite severe and is accompanied by a rash, swelling or itching, it may be a sign of superficial phlebitis, which is

the inflammation of a vein usually caused by an infection or an injury. This condition is usually treated at home with anti-inflammatory drugs, bed rest and applying hot compresses. There is a more serious condition called deep vein thrombophlebitis, which requires hospitalization and is treated with anti-coagulant drugs.

Although medical indications for surgery are limited, Dr. Feagin points out that most surgeries are performed for cosmetic purposes.

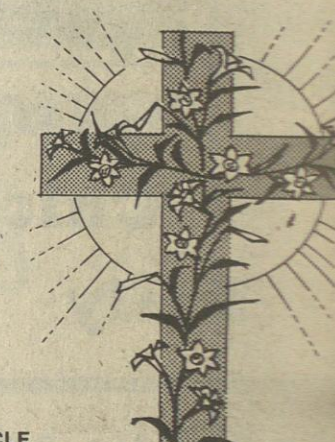

### State Jobless Rate Declined 1.9 % From Jan., 1987

The January jobless rate for Mississippi rose to 10.6 percent according to the Mississippi Employment Security Commission. This rate was one and nine tenths percentage points above one month ago, when the rate stood at 8.7 percent. This was 1.9 percentage points below the 12.5 percent reported January 1987. Continued seasonal decreases in agriculture, wholesale and retail trade and construction work led to the seasonal increase in unemployed from December.

Place of residence employment for January stood at 1,054,300 in a labor force of 1,179,300. There were 5,800 less people employed in January than last month and 49,400 more than January 1987.

Manufacturing establishments provided 232,500 jobs, down slightly from the 232,600 reported in December.

Nonmanufacturing businesses provided 643,000 jobs in January. Manufacturing jobs decreased 100

from one month ago and increased dramatically 10,700 from January 1987. Non-manufacturing provided 9,100 less jobs this month than last month but 22,500 more than last year. This monthly employment of 643,000 represents the largest number of jobs ever supported by nonmanufacturing industries during January. The seasonal decrease in trade of 6,200 represented 68.1 percent and 1,600 decrease in construction represented 17.6 percent of the loss in nonmanufacturing jobs from December.

There were 116,261 claims filed in January 1988 as compared to 100,832 during December and 159,168 one year ago. There were 6,645 job openings received in January compared to 6,189 last month and 6,937 one year ago. Of those received 5,394, 5,597 and 5,499 were filled by local Employment Service Offices.

### Men Turning 26 In 1988 Reach An Important Milestone

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1988 and who have not registered with Selective Service may forfeit their eligibility for some federal programs.

Men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26 this year. The law requires that young men register with Selective Service within 30 days of the day they turn 18. Although tardy registrations are usually accepted, Selective Service does not have the authority to accept

registrations after a man reaches age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man may permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student aid, job training and most federal employment. Likewise, some states require registration for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.

Many of the men who have still not registered may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some may even have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the Armed Forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been institutionalized or incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized they were required to register within 30 days if released prior to age 26.

For those men born in 1962 who have registered, 1988 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law should there be a return to the draft. Nearly 20 million men, age 18 through 25 have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstituted in 1980. These men comprise over 98 percent of those required to register.

Men who have not yet registered should do so at any post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to 5 years in jail, or both.

### GED Testing Program Available

The General Educational Development (GED) is a test to enable adults who have not completed a formal program of high school study to earn an equivalency of the high school diploma, which is issued by the State Department of Education. This will help individuals further their education beyond high school, get a better job, enter military service or simply for self-satisfaction.

Applicants must be out of school six months before making application for the GED tests or the class of which they were a member has graduated. Minimum age for testing is 17. Applicant

must be a resident of Mississippi at least thirty days prior to testing.

The GED Tests Battery consists of five test, each measuring the skills considered to be the major outcome of a high school education. They include Writing, Social Studies, Science, Interpreting Literature and the Arts, and Mathematics. Cost of the test is \$15.00. If retesting is necessary on any part, the cost is \$4.00 per retest.

## Dishing It Out

By Congressman Trent Lott  
MISSISSIPPI

Many of us will spend this next week watching the Olympics on television. Night after night, we will gather around the set and cheer for the home team. But how are we able to do this.

Through sophisticated satellite technology, ABC and local affiliates are able to bring the U.S. Hockey Team into our living rooms live and in color. But not all of us will witness the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat.

While most of us rely on local television stations to get our news, sports, and entertainment, others, especially those in our rural areas, must rely on satellite dishes. But as most satellite dish owners will tell you, receiving satellite transmissions is becoming increasingly difficult. More and more signals are being scrambled; jumbled up so

rural residents are left in the dark. This must stop.

I am joining with more than 100 of my colleagues in an effort to alleviate this growing problem. I am co-sponsoring a bill in the House of Representatives, H.R. 1885, the "Satellite Television Fair Marketing Act of 1987."

This bill would require those who scramble satellite services intended for private viewing to make it available to satellite dish owners. If these companies sell their programming, the bill would require that they also establish reasonable business criteria so others may qualify to distribute their transmissions.

The bill would further give the Federal Communications Commission authority to establish uniform standards for scrambling and initiate rulemaking to facilitate the provision of network television signals outside the range of broadcast station signals. The FCC would also

be charged with investigating the pricing and distribution terms of businesses selling satellite programming to home satellite antenna owners. This would help determine whether the marketplace is developing in a competitive fashion.

The Senate is working on a similar bill and that is encouraging. It is time to send a signal of our own, a clear unscrambled signal to those programmers who scramble their transmissions.

We must let them know that satellite dish owners should no longer be relegated to the status of second class citizens by the mere fact of their geographic situation. Let the fairness game begin!

## Matters Of Health

### STEAKHOUSE SYNDROME

I sometimes experience an alarming difficulty in swallowing steak, which seem to become "stuck" in my chest. Are these recurring incidents purely coincidental?

Occasional difficulty in swallowing steak or other meats shouldn't necessarily be chalked up to mere coincidence. Physicians have learned that certain adults are more prone than others to suffer from "steakhouse syndrome," a condition that occurs in people who develop a ring, called a Schatzki ring, at the lower end of the esophagus.

There are two separate tubes that extend from the neck and down through the center of the chest: the shorter one—the trachea—connects to the lungs and is used for breathing; the longer one—the esophagus—connects to the stomach and is used for swallowing. "Steakhouse syndrome," which makes it difficult for food to pass through to the stomach, differs from choking because it involves the esophagus, rather than the trachea.

If a piece of food or another object enters the trachea by mistake and become lodged there, the breathing can

become partially or wholly obstructed and the victim may start to choke-to gag and turn blue. If left unrescued by the Heimlich maneuver or other first-aid procedures, a choking victim may die.

Unlike choking, steakhouse syndrome is not a life-threatening situation. The constriction that results from the syndrome occurs in the chest, rather than the throat, and no gagging sensation results. The episode usually happens at a party or a restaurant, where the victim incompletely chews his food—usually meat—while socializing and drinking alcohol.

Incidence of the syndrome may be frightening and painful, but it doesn't lead to choking. In fact, victims of steakhouse syndrome aren't helped by any of the first-aid procedures used for choking victims. The best remedy is to remain calm and to try to wash down the food with water or another non-alcoholic liquid. If this fails, one should go to the nearest hospital emergency room, where the food will be dislodged by a physician.

How can one prevent future episodes of steakhouse syndrome? One way is to pass up steak and other tough, chewy meats. If a person eats steak or other meats, he or she should take small bites and chew each morsel thoroughly

before swallowing. Eat slowly, don't laugh or talk with food in the mouth and don't drink alcohol excessively before eating.

If a person experiences recurrent swallowing problems, he or she may be a candidate for a simple procedure in which the esophagus is dilated and the Schatzki ring is stretched. In most cases, this procedure is permanently successful, though occasionally it must be repeated in some people.
