Mobile Home Destroyed By Fire

The home of Ms Gladys Jones, on Pleasant Hill Road, was completely destroyed by fire Wednesday when a trash fire got out of control. Ms Jones who lived alone was burning trash in her yard and the wind scattered the fire to a nearby patch of grass. From here the fire spread rapidly to the areas surrounding her home. The Iuka Fire Department was called along with the Mississippi Forestry Commission who plowed fire lanes enabling them to bring the fire under control but not in time to save the home or any of the contents.

Dixie Youth Registration

The Iuka Dixie Youth will have its registration for the upcoming season March 19 and March 26 at the Iuka City Hall between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon.

Anyone who will be seven (7) years old before August 1, 1988 and after, will have to register one of these two dates to be eligible to play. Each person is asked to bring

a copy of their birth certificate, unless it was turned in last year, and their current address and telephone number.

The fees for this year are \$10.00 per person for the Minor League (7-8-9), and \$13.00 per person for the Dixie Youth (10-11-12). The fee will have to be paid when you register.

Marvin Baker Elected Alderman - City of Iuka

Marvin Lester Baker was elected to the post of Alderman in Iuka following Tuesday's special run-off election. Baker received 290

votes while his opponent Ted Castleberry trailed behind with 246. Mr. Baker will be sworn in on Wednesday, March 9.

Whitten Announces Disaster Declaration

Congressman Jamie Whitten announced today that several counties in north Mississippi have been included in a disaster declaration by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Congressman Whitten said the declaration was the result of reduced crop yields from August 1 to October 31, 1987 as a result of severe drought and high temperatures.

Farmers Home Administration will make low interest emergency loans available to farmers in the

area covered by the disaster declaration.

The three primary counties in north Mississippi were Benton, Tallahatchie and Tishomingo. Contiguous counties also covered were Alcorn, Chickasaw, Itawamba, Marshall, Monroe, Panola, Prentiss, Quitman, Tippah, Union, Webster, and Yalobusha.

Under regulations of the 1985 Farm Bill, farmers are not eligible for the emergency loans if crop insurance was available in the county and they did not purchase it.

Communication System Allows Direct Dial To Patients

The Northern Telecom Communication System installed at Tishomingo Hospital allows quicker access to outside phone lines, and incorporates such modern features as call forwarding, conference calls, call waiting, etc.

But perhaps the most convenient aspect of the system is its ability to allow direct dial to patient rooms from outside callers. This is accomplished by dialing 40 plus the room number. (For

example: If you were trying to call the patient in room 21 you would simply dial 423-4021; if you were trying to call room 33, you would dial 423-4033, and so on). This allows callers to by-pass the hospital operator and speak directly with the patient.

Other features of the communication system include: 1) the "Nurse Call" whereby voice communication is permitted between nursing stations and all patient rooms, and 2) the paging system which allows paging isolated areas or throughout the hospital.

The installation of the communication system is only one of the many steps Tishomingo Hospital is taking towards its commitment to provide high quality patient care.

Iuka Man Killed In Accident At Yellow Creek Plant Site



William "Bill" Dallas Wigginton, Jr., 35 of Iuka was killed Thursday, March 3, about 4:15 p.m. as a result of an accident at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Site. A family spokesman said Wigginton was killed when about 3,600 pounds of steel fell on him.

Mr. Wigginton was employed by a private company under contract with the Tennessee Valley Authority to dismantle the mothballed nuclear plant site.

The victim was using a cutting torch to cut pieces of steel 4-5 inches thick, 2 1/2 inches wide, and 3 1/2 feet long when the accident occurred.

According to Dale White, Tishomingo County Medical Examiner-Investigator after a preliminary investigation at the scene the body was taken to the Tishomingo County Morgue for extensive examination and the death was ruled accidental.

Bill Wigginton was a graduate of Mississippi State University with a master's

degree and taught agriculture in Enterprise for four years. He was a member of Old Bethel Methodist Church and a welder.

Services were Saturday, March 5, at Old Bethel Methodist Church with the Rev. Waid Wilkes, the Rev. Dale Blackman and the Rev. Earl McAnally officiating. Burial was in the Old Bethel Cemetery. Deaton Funeral

Home of Belmont was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include his wife, Frances Wigginton of Iuka; one stepson, Robert Dewayne Hill of Iuka; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Dallas Wigginton Sr. of Golden; one sister, Peggy Montgomery of Golden; one niece, Mitzi Montgomery; and one nephew, Mike Montgomery.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

In the past one of the solutions to achieving affordable housing has been for individuals to purchase a smaller home. Many families and singles now consider the options of smaller lots, more compact home, mobile home and multi-family units including condominiums and townhouses. Many of these newly designed homes contain under 1,200 square feet.

Adapting to smaller space is indeed a challenge, but it does not mean the situation has to be unpleasant. Small

dwellings can be very comfortable and can offer as much livability as some large dwellings. Psychologically, some people prefer a smaller space because they feel it projects a feeling of closeness and warmth. Someone once said, "Small rooms or dwellings set the mind in the right path, larger ones cause it to go astray."

The key to small-space living is organization. Well-designed storage, structured work habits and an efficient use of floor space help make the best use of available space.

Families living in smaller dwellings will find themselves facing many challenges. One of these is

that of developing a respect for the people with which they live. Living closely in a confined space can cause many conflicts. Each person in the home needs a personalized space of their own no matter how small it may be. The corner of one room may be sufficient. There should also be conscious effort made to have many activity areas so that all family activities do not take place in the same location.

Another major challenge is that of mastering the art of storage. When an extra room is available in a house, it tends to serve as a catch-all. It is easy to get into the habit of piling objects in a room and shutting the door. Small space living does not allow for such disorganization. Families must make the best use of the storage space they have by organizing storage to the point where everything has a place. Each family member needs to use wall space to its best advantage by organizing closets and cabinets so they are more efficient. Purchases should also be planned so families only buy what they need. Multi-purpose items should be selected so that only one item would have to be stored rather than many.

Individuals who live in smaller dwellings will also have to become tidy workers. People should not allow objects to become scattered all

over the house as they work. Many tasks will have to be concentrated at work centers and things will need to be put away immediately after being completed. Projects will have to be planned so they can be finished in an allotted time, and not left out to be finished at a later date.

Finally, when living in smaller areas, it is important to keep things simple. Areas that are over decorated or over crowded seem smaller. Highly patterned or detailed objects seem to consume more visual space than objects with a simple design. Expand the space visually by getting along with the essentials.

SKILLET GUMBO

2 cups diced cooked ham or canned luncheon meat
1 cup green peppers, chopped
1 cup onion, chopped
1-1/2 cups cut okra
1 can (14 1/2 to 16 ozs.) tomatoes, not drained
1 cup chicken broth
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon ground red pepper

W. R. Wimbish Reappointed To Serve On Council



At a recent regular meeting of the Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners, Mr. W. R. Wimbish was reappointed to represent Tishomingo County for a two year term on the Northeast Mississippi Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council.

Mr. Robert S. Weir of Tupelo who is chairman of the Northeast Mississippi RC&D Executive Board said he was well pleased that Mr. W. R. Wimbish had been reappointed and had agreed to serve as a member of the council which consists of 22 member counties in Northeast Mississippi. Each member in the county is represented by two councilmen who are appointed by the local Soil and Water Conservation District. Mr. Carlos Ginn is also presently serving as the second councilman representing Tishomingo County.

The purpose of the council is to:

1. Review and evaluate the resources, problems and opportunities for the development and conservation of the resources.
2. Review and consider for inclusion of the plan, project proposals submitted by sponsors of the following counties: Alcorn, Benton, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Clay, Itawamba, Kemper, Lee, Lowndes, Marshall, Monroe, Noxubee, Oktibbeha, Pontotoc, Prentiss, Tishomingo, Union, Webster, Winston, Calhoun and Lafayette.
3. Coordinate the efforts of the State and Federal agen-

cies and other interests who participate in collecting material on resource needs and assist in preparing and carrying out plans. Application and plans relating to programs and projects involving State and Federal agencies shall have been determined by the responsible State or Federal official that the proposal is compatible with the provisions and objectives of the State and Federal laws which he administers before inclusion as a part of the plan.

4. Work closely with local sponsors and other interested parties to settle conflict of interest and agree upon project measures to be carried out.

5. Review and approve, subject to consideration by the individual sponsors, drafts of the project plans.

6. Present final draft of the plan to organizational sponsors for review and approval before being submitted for implementation.

7. Coordinate, promote and direct the application of the project plan.

8. Proceed to make amendments and additions, as needed, to the work plan.

9. Set priority for work involving the use of technical assistance and funds provided through the Council by the various agencies participating in the project.

10. Prepare and carry out annual plans of work.

IMPORTANCE OF COLOR VISION

If you or anyone in your family has a problem with color vision, you may want to consider an eye examination to find out just how limited your color vision may be. Color plays a very important part in anyone's life; in fact, there are situations in which a good sense of color is vital.

Drivers, for example, can't afford to take a chance on an inability to distinguish traffic lights clearly. Anyone involved in working with or repairing multicolored wiring must know the exact color and its purpose in the electrical system. School children must learn how to use color coded materials. These are just a few examples of the importance of being able to recognize colors clearly.

As yet there are no drugs

that can cure color deficiencies; no programs that can help it. But someone who has a problem in identifying colors can be helped adapt to this problem. Also be improved with use of colored filters or tinted lenses for glasses or contacts. Your first step in finding out if you have a color vision problem is to have your eyes examined by your optometrist.

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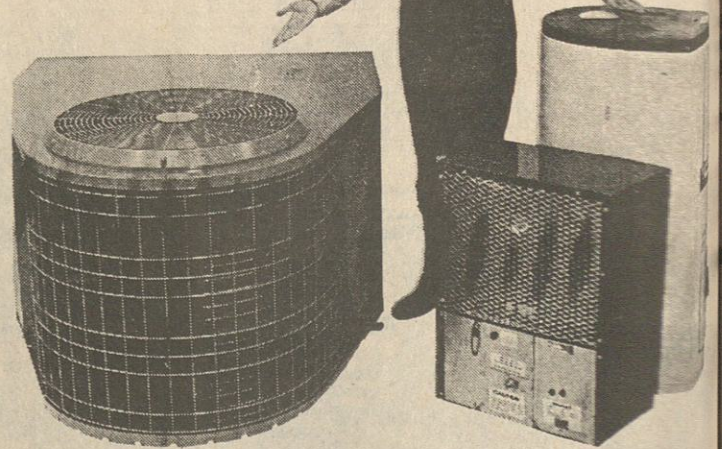

Good Food Buys

Rice Gives Special Touch To Extend Food Budget

Nearing the holidays, budgets always are tight. Rice is one food that can help you stretch your budget. It's economical, delicious, nutritious, versatile, easy to prepare and bland enough to

pair with almost any other food to the advantage of both.

The original convenience food, rice is easy to store and takes little pantry shelf space. Every ounce is edible, so there's no waste and it comes to you ready to cook. It doesn't even need washing since it's mechanically milled and cleaned.

Rice has earned a place for itself in the diets of babies, all the way through special diets

of all ages to elderly people.

Nutritionally, rice is a primary source of energy -- an inexpensive one, too. Milled or white rice contributes high quality vegetable protein as well as some calcium, iron and B vitamins.

Brown rice, because it is unpolished with only the fibrous hull removed, retains more natural salts, vitamins and minerals than white rice. Parboiled rice is treated to a special steam-pressure process which insures greater retention of food nutrients.

Though there are more than 7,000 varieties of rice produced throughout the world, you need concern yourself with only three different lengths and four different kinds:

Long grain rice is easily detected because its length is four to five times its width. The grains are clear and translucent. They remain distinct and separate after cooking. Medium grain rice is about three times as long as its width. Because this type requires a shorter growing season, produces higher yields per acre, and is easier to mill than long grain rice, it is slightly less expensive.

Short grain rice is only one and half to two times as long as its width.

Brown rice is the whole, unpolished grain of rice with only the outer, inedible, fibrous hull removed. Brown rice requires more water and longer cooking time than white rice, but it has a delightful, chewy texture and

nutlike flavor.

Regular milled white rice is rice from which hulls, germ, outer bran layers, and most of the inner bran are removed in the milling process. The grains are bland in flavor and fluffy when you follow cooking directions.

Parboiled rice is rice that has been cooked before

milling by special steam pressure process. This treatment aids in the retention of much of the natural vitamins and minerals. It requires a longer cooking time than regular milled white rice, but after cooking, the grains are fluffy, separate and plump. You may notice a slight nutlike flavor.

Pre-cooked rice (quick-type) is completely cooked. It needs only to stand in boiling water to be ready for serving.

Wild rice is not rice at all, but the seed of a wild grass found around the Great Lakes region. It is much more expensive than the types of rice just described.

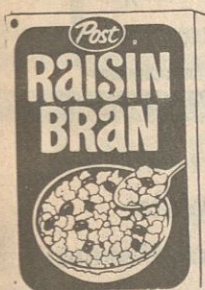

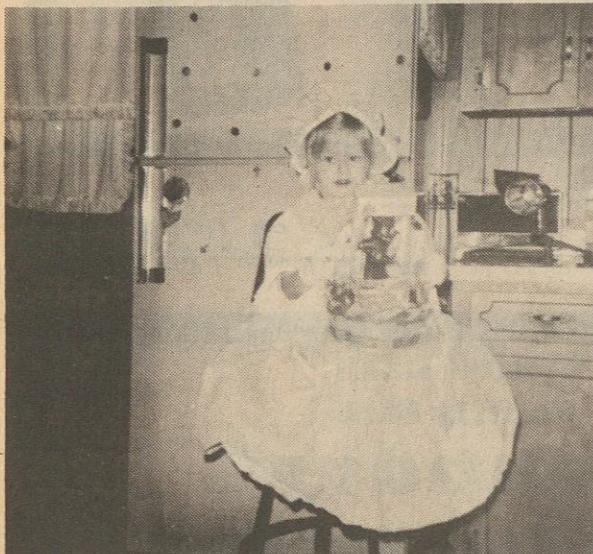

News From The House

A major deadline faced lawmakers this week as the 1988 legislative session reached the halfway point with a growing stack of bills awaiting action in the Mississippi House of Representatives.

crime were some of the key issues during the past week. Several bills were approved; scores of other measures were pending at the start of the current week, either in committee or on the House calendar.

House committees faced a Thursday (March 10) deadline to act on general bills and constitutional amendments originating in the House. The cutoff did not apply to revenue bills, appropriations, or local and private legislation.

One of the bills that has drawn a lot of attention is the proposal aimed at boosting teacher salaries in Mississippi to the Southeastern

average. A modified version of the bill was being studied at the close of the past week by an Appropriations Subcommittee following its approval by the House Education Committee. The measure required both committees' approval before being sent to the full House.

Other legislation recommended last week by various House committees included bills which supporters said would more clearly establish the legal rights of residential tenants and landlords; grant additional power to the Attorney General's Office to combat white-collar crime; provide salary increases for state employees and numerous state and county officials, including sheriffs and county supervisors; create an Economic Development Highway Fund to promote major industrial development projects; and provide for an election on the question of municipal annexation in the area to be annexed.

The House gave unanimous approval to a bill which backers say is designed to help private citizens and merchants obtain restitution for bad checks. The measure, patterned after an Alabama law, would authorize District Attorneys to assist in the recovery and distribution of restitution from people accused of issuing bad checks.

The legislation sets up a procedure for collecting restitution and allows a service charge for processing

complaints. Sponsors said the bill is aimed at chronic bad-check writers rather than average citizens who may have a check bounce one time or another due to an innocent mistake. Almost identical bills were passed in 1986 and 1987 by the House but died in the Senate.

The House approved legislation to help see that dairy farmers receive payment for their milk in the event a processing plant goes broke; authorize the Highway Department to construct warning devices at railroad crossings within cities and counties, using federal money to cover most of the expense; reenact a 1982 law authorizing a fee on pulpwood measured by volume; allow counties to use credit cards to pay travel expenses of sheriffs and deputies in transporting prisoners; and create an interim study committee on needs of the elderly.

Other House-passed measures would permit the State Health Board to collect reasonable fees for conducting water quality tests for public water systems, and revise the formula for distribution of oil severance taxes to the state and oil-producing counties.

A measure to allow county boards of supervisors to provide grave-digging services for county residents triggered a brisk debate last week. Opponents maintained grave-digging should be left to

private enterprise but backers said there was a legitimate need for the bill, especially in some rural counties.

The measure failed to get the required 3/5ths vote for passage of revenue bills following adoption of an amendment setting a minimum \$1 fee for grave-digging services. Earlier, a question had been raised whether a 2/3rds vote was required since, without the amendment, the bill appeared to involve granting a donation or gratuity.

A measure to bring the Parole Board under the state's Open Meetings Act was narrowly rejected by the House. Opponents argued the legislation is not needed and could hinder the Parole Board's work. Proponents said Parole Board meetings should be open to the public and media like other state and local agencies.

A bill was defeated to increase the maximum number of deputy sheriffs required in counties with a population of 3,500 or less. Backers said the measure was needed in a number of counties, but opponents argued the matter should be left to local authorities.

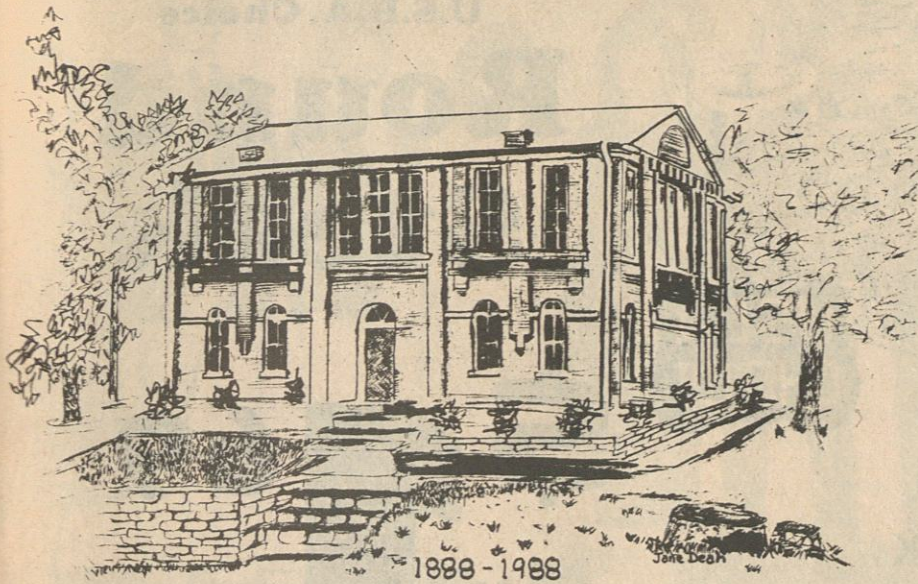

County Agent's Column

FEEDER PIG SALES
Feeder pig prices in February were quite a bit higher than they were the month before. Also, the sales in late February were higher than the ones earlier in the month.

During February feeder pig sales were conducted in Waynesboro, Amory, Laurel, and Bruce. A total of 3,743 pigs were sold averaging \$89.20 per hundred weight and \$45.62 per head.

This compares to January 1988 in which a total of 3,694 pigs were sold averaging \$65.63 per hundred weight and \$35.03 per head.

PREGNANT COW CARE
Catching calving problems before they have time to get worse can mean the difference between a calf that's living and one that died. You also protect your cows when you pay attention to their well-being.

Luckily, we don't have that bad of a problem here in Tishomingo County. Let's keep it that way, folks. Here's what you need to do:
Watch cows closely during calving season. Try to ear tag each calf as soon after birth as possible. This time is also good for castration and implantation of a growth

stimulant.
Remember that a cow's nutritional requirement almost doubles during lactation. If you want her to stay on her cycle, give milk and rebreed, you have to provide her good nutrition. Pay particular attention to her mineral requirements, especially when early grazing becomes available. Mineral imbalances caused by grass grazing typically strike mature milking cows which have recently calved.

TOOLS THAT HELP
Most of you don't even think about handling a tool when you reach for that hammer. Hammers and other tools are used everyday on farms in Tishomingo County because they make our daily chores much easier.

Tools, whether they be simply hammer or a powerful chainsaw, can inflict serious injury when carelessly or incorrectly used. Now, how many of you think about that when you reach for the hammer? To prevent minor and

major accidents. Please consider the following tips from the National Safety Council:
Use the right tool for the job, and keep the tools you use in good condition. Make sure handles aren't defective and cutting edges aren't dull.
Follow manufacturer instructions when using and maintaining power tools, checking placement of shields and guards. Turn off and unplug power tools before changing bits or blades, and also when you service or repair them.
Keep bystanders away from work areas and protect young children from harm by

putting your tools away after use. Wear well-fitting clothes and appropriate protective equipment. A broken thumb is no fun, especially when it could have been prevented.
Tools should help, not hurt.

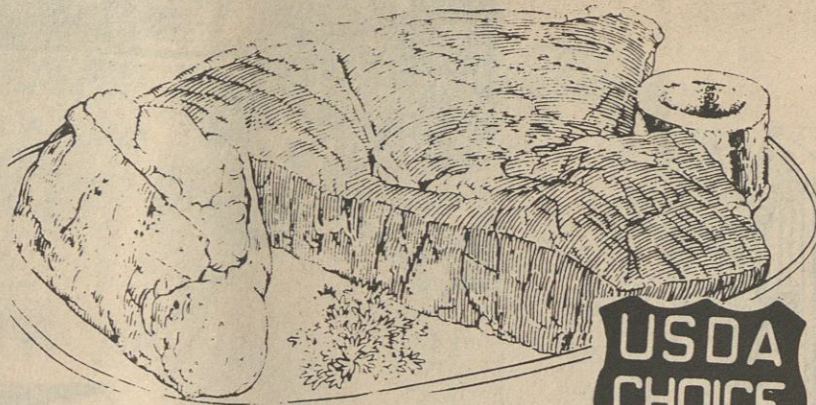

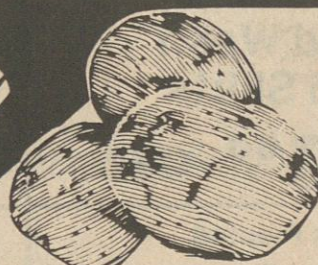

The 1988 Wheat and Feed Grain Program contains an optional acreage diversion program known as 0/92. The maximum acreage for deficiency payments under this program is 92 percent of

the permitted acreages. Deficiency payment rates on the CU acres will not be less than the projected rates of \$1.53 per bushel for wheat, \$1.10 for corn, \$1.08 for sorghum. Measures may be taken to limit the amount of acres idled under the 0/92 provision. Producers may apply to participate in the 0/92 program through Friday, March 11.

means a farm planting 1000 acres of cotton with 900 acres in whole fields would only have a tolerance on the 100 acres in the partial or changed fields. The tolerance would therefore be 5 acres instead of 50 acres. This is an important change that could prove very costly to producers. If you do not understand this, please contact the ASCS office.

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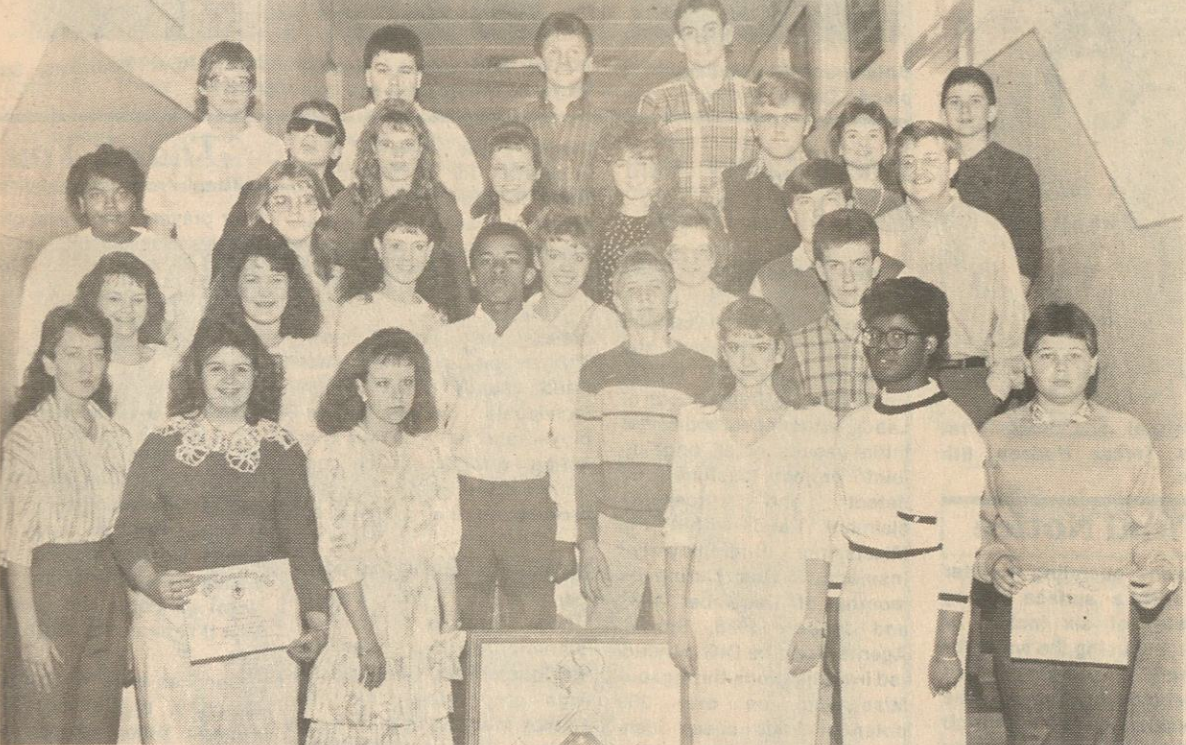

4-H Communicates

Since we have just concluded our Energy Design Contest with 4-H'ers in the county, I thought now would be a good time to tell you some ways you should respect electricity.

One of the first activities of the 4-H electric project is for members to do a safety check of their homes. We want project members to learn to respect electricity, not fear it.

While electric power allows us to enjoy countless modern conveniences, the same energy can be deadly.

Proper respect and handling of electric appliances and currents is a major lesson of the 4-H electric project.

Members offer the following safety tips to keep in mind when working around electricity.

• Inspect electrical wiring in your home and buildings periodically. As your operation grows, expand and upgrade your electrical system to keep up with increasing power demands.

• Keep power and extension cords out of pathways so they do not pose tripping

hazards.

• Make sure power tools and appliances are properly grounded.

• Store and use electric appliances and tools away from water. Ground fault circuit interrupters can help prevent shock in work areas, kitchens and bathrooms with wet or damp surfaces.

Check for worn or damaged wires, plugs, cords or sockets and repair or replace them promptly.

Even with extreme caution, electrical shocks can happen. Know what to do if someone has received a severe shock.

Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) can revive many shock victims if administered soon after the shock. You may want to enroll your employees, as well as yourself, in a CPR training class in your area.

On February 27, Sue Dill and I accompanied 8 volunteer 4-H Leaders to Tupelo to attend the Northeast District Spring Leader Forum. A record 100 volunteers took part in this training. All of the leaders enjoyed themselves. Some of the workshops they attended included: German Paper-Cutting, 4-H Photography Exhibits, 4-H Home Environment Project, and the 4-H Community Pride Grants. All of the workshops were informative and I hope

to see all these leaders at future training meetings.

On March 12, Tishomingo County 4-H'ers will be starting a three class workshop to learn some basic machine sewing techniques. Any 4-H'er who would like to attend should call 423-3616 to register for this class and to get the place and time.

The meeting adjourned and a delicious course of coconut cake, peanut candy, dip, potato chips and drinks was served.

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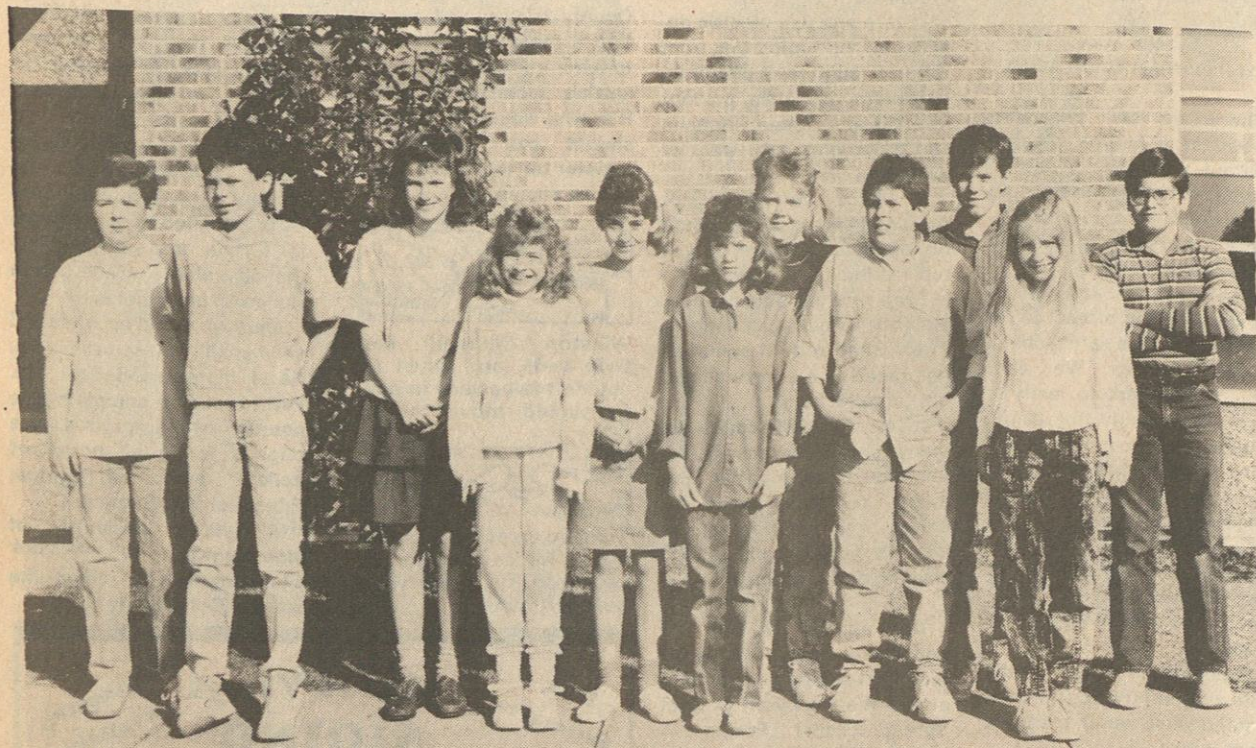

Final Notice

Anyone operating a water well with a surface casing diameter of six inches or larger and using the water for anything other than household purposes must file an application for a permit from the Mississippi Bureau of Land and Water Resources by March 31, 1988. Likewise, anyone currently using surface water, that is water from a lake, stream, reservoir, etc., must also file for a permit by March 31, 1988.

There will be no grace period and no exceptions to this deadline. In order to comply, the proper forms must be received in the office of the Bureau of Land and Water Resources by March 31, 1988. The postmark date does not apply. Anyone continuing to use groundwater or surface water after March 31 without having filed for a permit will be violating state laws and may be subject to the revocation of rights to divert or withdraw any more water.

New Rules Govern Tax Deduction

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 could have a big impact on landowners who plan to deduct expenses for conservation work on their land according to L. Pete Heard, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Section 175 of the Internal Revenue Code limits expense deductions to those that are consistent with a conservation plan approved by the SCS.

The conservation plan can be an individual plan or a county plan approved by the SCS state conservationist. "County plans have just been completed and consist of up to 15 commonly used soil and water conservation practices that farmers apply. These practices are ones generally applied without SCS layout, design, or installation assistance," says local District Conservationist, Don Jones.

Copies of the county plan are available in the SCS office located at 115 Front Street. Landowners who plan to deduct conservation expenses should check either their individual or the county conservation plan to ensure the practices they plan to deduct are covered.

The SCS field office will be supplied with the IRS Form 8645 on which the landowners will certify their expense.

Don Jones, District Conservationist, suggests landowners having questions about the new rules should contact the IRS or a tax consultant.

Federal Agency Joins MESC In U.I. Project

The Mississippi Employment Security Commission (MESC), in conjunction with the Office of the Inspector General (OIG), United States Department of Labor, announced today the initial results of an ongoing joint project designed to detect and prosecute claimant fraud within the Mississippi Unemployment Insurance System. During the months of December 1987 and January 1988, Special Agents from the OIG conducted investigations throughout Mississippi on over 200 potential fraud cases identified by MESC. Mississippi law provides for up to 30 days imprisonment and a \$500 fine for each instance of fraud.

Liston Thomasson, Unemployment Insurance Director, said that the percentage of fraud in Mississippi is

relatively low, however, it is imperative for all Mississippians to know and fully understand that defrauding the Unemployment Insurance System is a violation of both

state and federal law. Thomasson explained that fraud usually occurs when individuals become reemployed and fail to report this action to MESC on the continued claim cards they are provided at their original in-

terview. Another important part of the initial sign-up policy involves a full explanation of their duties and responsibilities. Thomasson also emphasized that the money involved in filing such claims comes from the pockets of Mississippi employers, who in turn are forced to compensate by raising prices. "In this sense," Thomasson continued, "Unemployment Insurance fraud affects everyone in
