Belmont Lady Cardinals Win Class 2A Championship

"When It's All Said And Done, Belmont's #1." — The Belmont Lady Cardinals once again hold the Class 2A State Championship title. The Lady Cardinals were presented the championship after defeating Shaw 51-48 in the Mississippi State Coliseum in Jackson, Friday, March 11. This is the fourth title for Belmont in the past six years. A parade and reception was held Saturday, March 12, in the Belmont High School Gym honoring the team and Coach Malcolm Kuykendall.

The team bus was escorted upon leaving the Natchez Trace onto Highway 4 by a local ambulance service and two units of the Belmont Fire Department to the school gym. At the gym a loud, excited crowd of parents, fans, school administration, school board members, County Superintendent of Education, other dignitaries, along with local news media were on hand to greet them. These festivities have "become a tradition" for Belmont who have brought home state titles in 1983, 1985, and 1986.

Coach Kuykendall praised the team for their talent, dedication, and determination, and expressed appreciation to the parents, fans, and school administration. Each of the players then expressed thanks to Coach Kuykendall, their parents, and loyal fans. Kuykendall is credited with seven state championships, six in the last eight years. Coach Kuykendall said, "It gets harder every year; everybody wants to beat us because they think we have won enough." The club will be losing four senior members

this year, but are looking forward to the 1988-89 season. A large poster displayed in the gymnasium sums it all up well — "When It's All Said and Done, Belmont's #1." Pesticide Applicators Training Scheduled

Two meetings have been scheduled to train Tishomingo County residents in the safe use of pesticides. This will enable them to become Certified Private Pesticide Applicators and will also enable them to buy restricted use pesticides. Wm. M. Hopper, County Agent has announced that one training session will be held Monday, March 21, at 1:30 p.m., at the Public Library in Belmont. Another session will be held in the conference room of the County Courthouse at

7:00 p.m. on March 21. The conference room is on the lower level of the courthouse. Many new farm and garden chemicals are being added to the "Restricted Use" list each year and one must be a certified applicator to buy and use these chemicals. These sessions will last about one and one half hours. Anyone interested in becoming a Certified Private Pesticide Applicator is invited to attend either one of the sessions. There is no charge for the course.

NASA Considering Site In Tishomingo County

A decision is expected to be made soon which could effect the future of the abandoned Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant site. It is hoped that NASA will choose to go with a government-owned site as a possible location for the proposed facility. NASA is considering three other government-owned sites in addition to Yellow Creek which is owned by the Tennessee Valley Authority. The sites are the National Space Testing Laboratory in Bay St. Louis, Mississippi; Vandenberg Air Force Base in California; and the Kennedy Space Center at Cape Canaveral, Florida.

The proposed plant would construct solid rocket motors to power future shuttle missions. None of these proposed sites have been involved in the actual construction of NASA rockets. The Bay St. Louis plant is a testing lab for NASA and Vandenberg and Kennedy serve the space agency as launch sites. The Yellow Creek site does not have enough uninhabited acreage to be used as a test site. It is hoped that the site can be used for production, using Bay St. Louis as a testing site for the motors. The proposal has strong support from Rep. Jamie Whitten

and Sen. John Stennis. Officials are convinced that NASA could save \$85 - \$100 million to locate at Yellow Creek. Buildings, roads, railroads and cranes are already in existence there and it has the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway which would provide an efficient and safe transportation routes for the rocket motors. The decision could mean a tremendous boost for economy in Tishomingo County. The construction work would provide 400-500 construction workers employment and the plant, when operational, could employ more than 1,000 persons.

In a telephone conversation with Iuka Mayor John H. Biggs Wednesday morning, Rep. Jamie Whitten said the decision to use government-owned property is pending appropriation for the President's budget and Congress. Mr. Whitten said he was still optimistic that the Yellow Creek site will have the best shot due to the time that could be saved in construction and the \$100 million that could be saved by using the already existing facilities. He further stated that he would stay on top of the matter and that at this time, the future of NASA locating in Tishomingo County is bright.

Cutbacks Announced In Commodity Foods

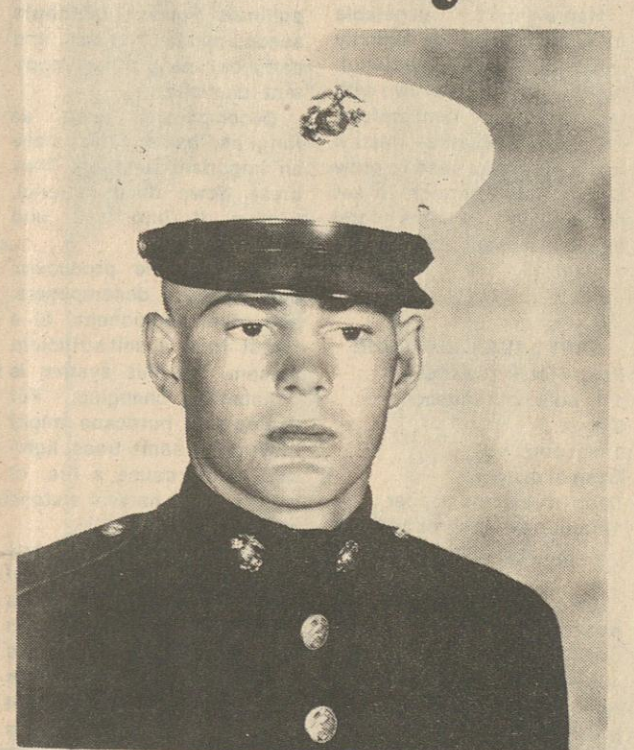
Welfare Commissioner, Dr. Thomas H. Brittain, Jr. announced that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has set cutbacks in commodity foods for needy households. "Effective April 1, 1988, rice and honey will no longer be received from USDA for distribution to needy households. Cheese and dry milk will no longer be received effective May 1, 1988. Current state inventory of these commodity foods will allow distribution to needy households through

the month of July 1988. Since the State has the option of continuing to accept available supplies of butter, flour and cornmeal through September 1988, it will do so even though clients may not find it cost effective to travel to welfare offices to receive just these three products. Dr. Brittain noted that the program phase-out is a federal government decision that is based upon the decrease in United States surplus farm products. He added, "The termination of this programs means to

Mississippi the loss of approximately \$15 million in food products and \$980,000 in Federal funds used for state and county administrative costs and shipping/storage outlets." The food surplus program began in 1983 with Public Law 98-8 which established the Temporary Emergency Assistance Program (TEFAP) authorizing the distribution of surplus agricultural commodities and authorized \$50 million for the cost of storage and distribution. The intent of the program was, and continues to be, to make food available to needy persons and families, including unemployed and low-income persons. Donations of commodities were administratively initiated in 1981 as part of efforts to reduce vast stores of commodities.

Mississippi's first distribution was in August 1983 with cheese and butter. The program has grown to include dry milk, flour, cornmeal, rice and honey. "Last year in Mississippi we served over 980,000 households at no cost to the State."

Survivors include one daughter, Lisa Daniel of Hamilton, Ala.; one son, Kevin Daniel of Hamilton, Ala.; three sisters, Betty Parker and Martha Bostick, both of Iuka, and Margaret Smith of Phil Campbell, Ala.; one brother, James Daniel of Belmont. Pallbearers were Dale Staggs, Tommy Mitchell, David Mitchell, Lee Davis, Clovis Fikes and Johnny West.

"GARDENS"

The months of March and April are two busy gardening months. Plans made in January and February have been carried out, and the rush is on to get seed and vegetable plants into the garden. Don't be fooled by warm days. Cold nights, late frosts, and cold wet soils can injure and kill vegetable plants and seeds of warm-season vegetables such as beans, Southern peas, okra, tomato, pepper, and eggplant.

Continue to set out plants of cabbage, broccoli, lettuce and onions in early March in north Mississippi. Irish potato seed pieces also can be planted until mid-March in the northern counties.

Plant sweet corn in March and April. The normal sweets and sugary enhanced sweets are more tolerant of cool soils than are the super sweets with the "shrunken 2" gene. These super sweet corns require warm and moist soil for good seed germination.

Sidedress Irish potatoes with a nitrogen source (one pint ammonium nitrate per 100 feet of row) when the sprouts begin to crack the soil surface. Sidedress early planted onions, cabbage, broccoli, lettuce, and cauliflower when the transplants take hold and begin active growth. An organic mulch (such as pine needles) around these plants helps control early weeds while a black plastic mulch stimulates root and top growth as well as controls weeds.

Home-grown vegetable transplants become spindly when crowded, have insufficient light, or are grown with too high a temperature. Remember tomatoes need 4 to 6 weeks from seed to grow a plant large enough to set out while peppers and eggplants need 10 to 12 weeks.

EASY SAUSAGE QUICHE

Pastry for 9" pie shell
1 lb. bulk pork sausage
3 eggs
1 teaspoon salt
Dash of cayenne pepper
1½ cups (6 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese, divided

Line a 9" quiche dish or pie pan with pastry; trim excess pastry around edges. Bake at 400 degrees for 3 minutes; remove from oven and gently prick with a fork. Bake 5

minutes longer. Let cool on a rack. Cook sausage until browned; drain. Combine eggs, milk and seasonings in a medium mixing bowl; beat lightly. Stir in sausage. Sprinkle ¾ cup cheese over pastry shell; top with sausage mixture. Sprinkle with remaining ¾ cup cheese. Bake at 375 degrees for 50 minutes or until set. Yield: One 9" quiche.

4-H Communicates

NATIONAL WILDLIFE WEEK March 20 - 26, 1988, has been proclaimed National Wildlife Week. Since 1938 each Wildlife Week theme has stressed the importance of wildlife habitat and the need to conserve our natural resources. In keeping with this tradition, Wildlife Week 1988 focuses on one of our most important natural resources—forests.

When people think of forests, they probably think of trees. After all, a forest, by definition, is a large area of land covered with trees. But there's much more. Each forest is a growing, changing community made up of many different plants and animals that interact with each other in a variety of ways.

The trees and other green plants, called producers, make the food needed to "fuel" the animals, or consumers. And the animals pollinate flowers, distribute seeds, aerate the soil, and carry out many other important functions.

Decomposers, such as fungi and bacteria, also have an important function. They break down dead material, turning it into soil and nutrients.

Together, the producers, consumers, decomposers, and other components of a forest form a self-sufficient system. But this system is constantly changing. For example, a hurricane might blow down some trees, lightning could cause a fire, or people might harvest a stand of trees.

Occurrences such as these often begin a new period of forest growth. Sometimes they alter conditions so much that different tree species can grow there. When this happens an entirely different community may develop

where the original forest once stood.

Forests cover about one-third of the United States. Of these forests, the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service manages 156 National Forests spread out over 186 million acres. The rest are managed by other federal and state agencies and by private landowners.

Today, most forests are managed to meet many different needs. Some have large wilderness areas that are managed to emphasize conditions that occur naturally. But most forests are managed for specific uses, such as timber, recreation, hunting and fishing.

To help educate our young people about the importance of our forests, 4-H has project areas in natural resources, including wildlife, conservation of natural resources, forestry, and wood science.

ASCS Farm News

WHEAT CERTIFICATION ENDS MAY 1, 1988

All producers who have wheat planted should begin to certify that acreage now. The final day to report acreage is May 1, 1988. Failure to report your planted wheat acreage can cause you to lose history credit for the crop and may cause your 1989 base to be reduced.

FAILED WHEAT CERTIFICATION

All producers with failed wheat must report this acreage before evidence of the crop has been destroyed. ASCS-574 must be filed in the county office requesting approval of the failed acreage.

ASCS OFFERS PRE-MEASUREMENT SERVICE

To assure farmers that they are in compliance with the 1988 acreage reduction requirements and eligible for farm program benefits, pre-measurement and other land measurement services are available.

At the request of producers, we will stake and measure any type of acreage,

or portions thereof before crop planting time. Farmers are required to plant within the stakes that are placed when the land is pre-measured, and to report their crop acres to ASCS after planting.

Acreage reduction requirements are 20 percent for feed grains except for oats which are 5 percent, 27.5 percent for wheat, 12.5 percent for upland cotton and 10 percent for extra long staple cotton. To be eligible for price support loans, target prices and other farm program benefits, producers must comply with these and other 1988 acreage reduction program provisions.

Farmers may request pre-measurement for acreage conservation reserve (ACR) land, and planted acres of program crops. The ACR is cropland removed from production and put into conserving uses under the 1988 farm programs. Other ASCS producer services include measuring total cropland, fields or subdivisions to be planted and land areas for other purposes. Fees vary, based on the type of service rendered.

In order to schedule pre-measurement service requests on a timely basis, farmers should apply early.

JOHNNY WON'T TELL YOU

If your child has a vision problem, chances are he won't tell you or even be aware of it himself. More than likely he's been seeing the same way ever since he was born. Even if his vision is blurred, if he's seeing a double image, or only seeing well through one eye, he may be too young to be aware that anything is wrong. How does a parent explain to a child what his eyes should be seeing? You may have noticed him rubbing his eyes more than normal or holding some toy or other object unusually close to his eyes. Or he may stumble over things he should have seen.

You may think it's all part of growing up. You can't be sure unless you have your child's eyes examined. Many eye specialists recommend that a child's eyes be examined shortly after birth and again by the time he's four years old. After that he should have yearly eye examinations as part of his annual health checkup.

If your child hasn't had an eye examination recently, maybe it should. Especially if you think there may be a vision problem.

"HAY FEVER" (Allergic Rhinitis)

Have you ever been bothered by hay fever or allergy? Most everyone who lives in northeast Mississippi has experienced allergy to some degree. We will be featuring this topic in our column for the next few weeks including the mechanism of allergy, drug therapy, skin testing and much more.

Hay fever, the common term for allergic rhinitis, is the body's response to normally harmless foreign particles inhaled into the nose and throat. The reaction is often caused by inhaling pollen, such as ragweed, tree, or grass pollen, but may also result from mold spores generated in dead or decaying organic matter as well as dust, animal dander, and feathers. Allergic rhinitis affects approximately 20 million Americans.

The term "hay fever" dates back to a time when harvesting and haying in late summer widely led to discomfort in farm workers. However, the most common symptoms of allergic rhinitis—itching and tearing eyes, a runny nose, uncon-

trollable sneezing, and a scratchy, sore throat—may occur at any time of the year during a particular pollen season (seasonal allergic rhinitis) or throughout the year, depending on what someone is allergic to (perennial allergic rhinitis). Despite the name, fever is not a sign of such conditions, and allergic rhinitis is not contagious.

For most people, allergens, the substances that cause allergies, do not threaten general health. When people breathe in foreign substances, their immuno-logical

system produces antibodies, which resist and defend the body against disease and thus fend off any harmful effects. In people who suffer from allergic rhinitis, however, the body produces allergic antibodies that react with the allergens, and the familiar symptoms of allergies appear. Allergies seem to run in families, although different family members may be allergic to different factors.

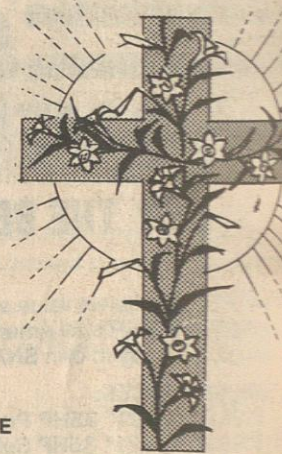

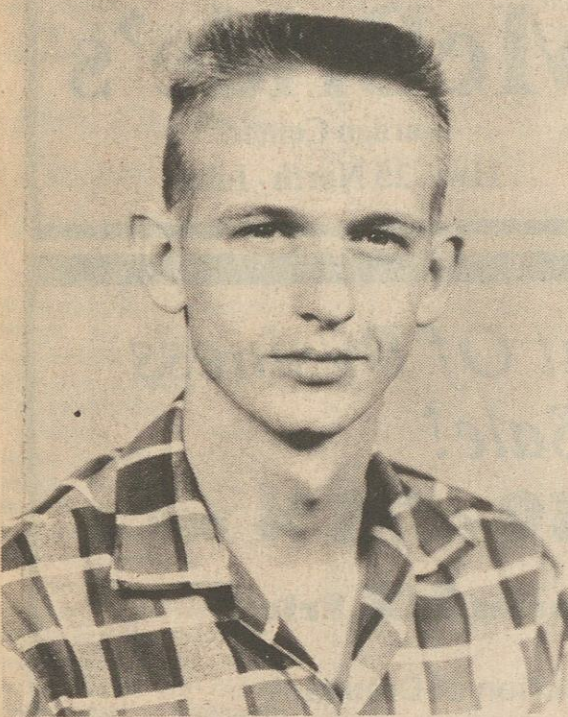

Bascule Bridge Closed to Public For Next 3 Months

The Nashville District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) are cooperating in the major repair of Wilson auxiliary lock near Florence, Alabama. As

part of this major repair work, the bascule bridge over the auxiliary lock will be closed to the public while the bridge surface is improved. During this time the public will not be allowed to cross the bridge to visit the main lock. One lane will remain open for use by contractor, Corps of Engineers and TVA employees. The work will begin Monday, March 14, and is expected to last three months.

The Corps, which operates and maintains the lock, is administering the contract for the major repair work, which began last September. Abbe and Svoboda, Inc., Prior, Minnesota, is the contractor for this project.

ORDINANCE NO. Book L-23

AN ORDINANCE TO GRANT TO MISSISSIPPI CABLEVISION, INC., A CORPORATION, D/B/A HERITAGE CABLEVISION (HEREINAFTER "HERITAGE"), ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, THE NON-EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS, PRIVILEGES AND AUTHORITY TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE, MAINTAIN, REPAIR, REPLACE, RENEW, RECONSTRUCT, AND REMOVE A CABLE TELEVISION SYSTEM ACROSS PUBLIC PROPERTY IN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, FOR A TERM OF TWENTY (20) YEARS.

WHEREAS, on July 2, 1963, the City of Iuka granted a franchise to E.E. Stuart, doing business as Iuka TV Cable Company, to operate, construct and maintain television coaxial cables upon, along, through, over and under streets, alleys, bridges and public places of Iuka, Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, on April 3, 1980, the city approved the assignment of said franchise to Heritage from S & G Cable Vision, Inc. (successor in interest to Iuka TV Cable Company, Inc.); and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it to be in the public interest of the residents of the City to extend and renew the franchise of Heritage to operate a cable television system within the city subject to the provisions hereinafter set forth.

BET IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Iuka, Tishomingo County, Mississippi:

I. GRANT OF FRANCHISE

Section 1. **Grant of Franchise.** A non-exclusive right is hereby granted to Heritage, its successors and assigns, to establish, construct, operate, maintain, repair, replace, renew, reconstruct, and remove a cable television system across public property in the city limits for a term of twenty (20) years, in accordance with the laws and regulations of the United States of America and the Ordinances and regulations of the city of Iuka, including the non-exclusive right, privilege, and authority:

- a. to use public property within the City;
- b. to engage in such further activities within the City as may now or hereinafter be consistent with the generally accepted principles applicable to the operation of a cable television system.

Section 2. **Effective Date of Franchise.** The franchise shall become effective from and after the effective date of this Ordinance and compliance by Heritage with Federal Communications Commission rules and regulations.

Section 3. **Assignment.** Heritage shall not assign or transfer any right granted under this Ordinance to any other person, company, or corporation without prior consent of the city Council, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, provided that the company shall have the right to assign this franchise to a corporation wholly owned by the company or to a limited partnership of which the company or other wholly owned subsidiary of Heritage Communications, Inc. is a general partner without prior consent of the City.

Section 4. **Conflicting Provisions Repealed.** All ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with the terms of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, provided, however, that such repeal shall only be to the extent of such conflict.

II. DEFINITIONS

Section 5. **Definitions.** The following words and phrases, when used in this ordinance, shall, for the purposes of this ordinance, have the meanings ascribed to them in this section:

"Cable television system". The term "cable television system" shall mean any facility that, in whole or in part, receives directly, or indirectly over the air, and amplifies or otherwise modifies the signals transmitting programs broadcast by one or more television or radio stations and distributes such signals, by wire or cable, to subscribing members of the public who pay for such services.

vices.

"Channel". The term "channel" shall mean the segment of the electromagnetic spectrum to which a source of television transmission is assigned.

"FCC". The term "FCC" shall mean the Federal Communications Commission.

"Franchise". The term "franchise" shall mean the rights, privileges, and authority granted by the city to the Grantee hereunder and shall include all of the terms and conditions of this ordinance.

"Grantee". The term "Grantee" shall mean Mississippi Cablevision, Inc., d/b/a Heritage Cablevision, its successors and assigns. When the context so requires, the term "Grantee" shall mean and include the Grantee, its officers, agents, employees, servants, and independent contractors.

"Person". The term "person" shall mean any individual, or any corporation, business, or mixed, owned by a private person, including property owned by a public utility not owned or operated by the City.

"Property of the Grantee". The term "property of the Grantee" shall mean all property, real, personal or mixed, owned or used by the Grantee however arising from or related to or connected with the franchise.

"Public Property". The term "public property" shall mean all property, real, personal or mixed, owned or used by the City, including property owned or used by a public utility owned or operated by the City.

"City". The term "City" shall mean the City of Iuka, Mississippi. When the context so requires, the term "City" shall mean and include the City, its officers, agents, employees, servants, and independent contractors.

Section 6. **Use of Property.** The Grantee may use public property within the city and, with the written consent of the owner thereof, private property within the city, in furtherance of such activities within the city as may now or hereinafter be consistent with generally accepted principles applicable to the operation of a cable television system subject, however, to the following restrictions:

- (a) The Grantee shall comply with all governmental laws, ordinances, rules or regulations as may now or hereinafter be applicable thereto.
- (b) The Grantee shall not use or occupy or permit public property or private property to be used or occupied or do or permit anything to be done on or about public property or private property which will, in any manner:
 - i. impair the owner's interest in or title thereto;
 - ii. impair the mortgage or lease as may now or hereinafter be applicable thereto;
 - iii. adversely affect the then value or character thereof;
 - iv. cause or be likely to cause structural damage thereto, or any part thereof;
 - v. cause or be likely to cause any damage or injury to any utility service available thereto;
 - vi. create a public or private nuisance, cause any offensive or obnoxious vibration, noise, odor or undesirable effect or interfere with the safety, comfort or convenience of the owner thereof, and persons lawfully on or about the same;
 - vii. violate the rules, regulations and requirements of any person furnishing utilities or services thereto; or
 - viii. make void or voidable any insurance then in force affecting the same or cause an increase in the rates applicable thereto.

Section 7. **Taxes.** The Grantee shall pay all real estate taxes, special assessments, personal property taxes, license fees, permit fees and other charges of a like nature which may be taxed, charged, assessed, levied, or imposed upon the property of the Grantee and upon any services rendered by the Grantee.

Section 8. **Insurance.** The Grantee shall, at all times during the term of the franchise, carry and require their contractors to carry:

Insurance in such forms and in such companies as shall be approved by the City to protect the City and Grantee from and against any and all claims, injury or damage to persons or property, both real and personal, caused by the construction, erection, operation and maintenance of any structure, equipment or appliance in connection with the cable television system. The amount of such insurance shall be not less than \$100,000 as to any one person, \$300,000 as to any one occurrence for injury or death to persons, and

\$100,000 for damages to property, with, as to Grantee, so-called umbrella coverage of at least \$5,000,000.

Workmen's Compensation Insurance as provided by the laws of the State of Mississippi as amended.

Automobile Insurance with limits of not less than \$100,000/\$300,000 of public liability coverage and automobile property damage insurance with a limit of not less than \$100,000 covering all automotive equipment, with, as to Grantee, so-called umbrella coverage of at least \$5,000,000.

All of said insurance coverage shall provide a ten (10) day notice to the City in the event of material alteration or cancellation of any coverage afforded in said policies prior to the date of said material alteration or cancellation shall become effective.

Copies of all insurance policies required hereunder shall be furnished and filed with the City prior to the commencement of operations or the expiration of prior policies, as the case may be.

The Grantee shall pay all reasonable expenses incurred by the city in defending itself with regard to all damages, penalties or other claims resulting from the acts of the Grantee, its assigns, employees, agents, invitees, or other persons. Said expenses shall include all out-of-pocket expenses such as attorney's fees, and shall include the value of any service rendered by the City Attorney or any other officers or employees of the city.

Section 9. **Repairs.** During the term of the franchise, the Grantee shall, at its own expense, make all necessary repairs and replacement to the property of the Grantee.

Such repairs and replacements, interior and exterior, ordinary as well as extraordinary, and structural as well as non-structural, shall be made promptly, as and when needed.

Section 10. **Hold Harmless.** During the term of the franchise, the Grantee absolutely assumes and agrees to pay the City for, and the Grantee forever indemnifies the City against, and agrees to hold and save the city harmless from any and all damage, injury, costs, expenses, liability, claims, settlements, judgments, decrees and awards of every kind and nature whatsoever, including attorney's fees, costs and disbursements, that may ever be claimed against the city by any person whatsoever, or on account of any actual or alleged loss, damage or injury to any property whatsoever, however arising from or related to or connected with, directly or indirectly, (a) injury to or death of any person, or loss, damage or injury to any property of the Grantee, and/or (b) the non-observance by the Grantee of the provisions of any laws, statutes, ordinances, resolutions, regulations or rules duly promulgated by any governmental entity which may be applicable directly or indirectly, to rights, privileges, and authority, and the obligations and liabilities, assumed by the Grantee under the franchise, and/or (c) the non-observance by the Grantee of any of the terms and conditions of the franchise, and/or (d) the granting of the Franchise.

Section 11. **Insolvency of Grantee.** In the event that the Grantee shall become insolvent, or be declared a bankrupt, or the property of the Grantee shall come into the possession of any receiver, assignee or other officer acting under an order of court, and any such receiver, assignee, or other such officer shall not be discharged within sixty (60) days after taking possession of such property, the city may, at its option, terminate the franchise by giving written notice thereof to the Grantee.

Section 12. **Default of Grantee.** In the event the Grantee shall fail to comply with any of the terms and conditions of the franchise within sixty (60) days after receipt of notice in writing from the City specifying the failure or default, the City may, at its option, terminate the franchise by giving written notice thereof to the Grantee. This section shall not apply to failures or defaults beyond the reasonable control of the Grantee.

Section 10. **Termination.** In the event of termination or nonrenewal of the franchise, Grantee at its own expense will remove all coaxial cable, amplifiers and any other items of equipment which may have been installed from time to time, provided, however, that in the event that Grantee is successful in concluding a sale or transfer of its system to a successor or substituted grantee, Grantee shall be relieved of its obligation to perform under the terms of this section.

III. CONSTRUCTION, INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE

Section 14. Compliance

with Applicable Laws. During the term of the franchise, the Grantee shall comply with all governmental laws, ordinances, rules or regulations as may now be hereinafter applicable to the construction, operation, maintenance, repair, replacement, renewal, reconstruction, and removal of a cable television system, the sale and supply of audio and video communications services, the use of public property and private property and the engagement in such further activities as may now or hereinafter be consistent with generally accepted principles applicable to the operation of a cable television system.

Section 15. **Installation and Maintenance of Property of the Grantee.** The Grantee shall be constructed, operated, maintained, repaired, replaced, renewed, reconstructed, and removed in accordance with generally accepted engineering principles so as not to endanger or interfere with the lives of persons or to interfere with improvement which the city may deem proper to make or to unnecessarily hinder or obstruct pedestrian or vehicular traffic or use of public property or private property.

Section 16. **Interference.** The Grantee's cable television system shall be so designed, engineered and maintained so as not to interfere with the radio and television reception of persons who are not subscribers of the Grantee.

Section 17. **Installation of Cables.** The Grantee shall have the right, privilege, and authority to lease, rent, or in any other manner obtain the use of wooden poles with overhead lines, conduits, trenches, ducts, lines, cables and other equipment and facilities from any and all holders of public licenses and franchises within the city, and to use such poles, conduits, trenches, ducts, lines, and cables in the course of its business. The Grantee shall install its cable on the existing poles owned by other holders of public licenses and franchises with the city whenever possible for the installation of its cable. When installation of cable on poles is insufficient, or when holders of other public licenses or franchises have both installed underground cable, then in that event, the cable used by the Grantee shall be installed underground.

Section 18. **Restoration of Ground Surface.** In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surfacing, landscaping or vegetation, by Grantee, the Grantee shall, at its own cost and expense and in a manner approved by the City, replace and restore all paving, sidewalk, driveway, or surface of any street or alley disturbed, in as good a condition as before said work was commenced.

Section 19. **Alteration of Grade.** In the event that, during the term of the franchise, the city shall elect to alter, or change the grade of any street, alley, or public way, the Grantee, upon reasonable notice by the City, shall remove, relay, and relocate its poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes, and other fixtures at its own expense.

Section 20. **Temporary Removal of Cables.** The Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the city, temporarily raise or lower its cables to permit the moving of buildings. The expense of such temporary removal, raising or lowering of cables shall be paid by the person requesting the same and the Grantee shall have the authority to require such payment in advance. The Grantee shall be given not less than five (5) days advance notice to arrange for such temporary cable changes.

Section 21. **Tree Trimming.** The Grantee shall have the authority to trim trees upon and overhanging street, alleys, sidewalks, and public places of the City so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the cables of the Grantee. All trimming shall be done at the expense of the Grantee.

Section 22. **Line Extensions.** It shall be the obligation of the Company to make available to all residents of the city of Iuka, cable service within 1,000 feet of each residence, regardless of the density of homes, adverse terrain or any other factors which might render the availability of the service difficult or impractical, technically unfeasible or economically noncompensatory. Company shall extend service to all new subscribers, at the normal installation charge and monthly rate as prescribed.

IV. SERVICE

Section 23. **Service Requirements.** During the term of the franchise, the Grantee shall furnish reasonable, adequate and efficient cable television service to subscriber terminals.

The foregoing requirement may be temporarily suspended due to circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the Grantee.

Section 24. **Capacity and Performance.** During the term of the franchise, the cable television system of the Grantee shall conform to the capacity and performance requirements contained in the then current regulations of the FCC.

V. SUBSCRIBER RATES AND SERVICE AGREEMENTS

Section 25. **Subscriber Rates and Charges.** The Grantee shall have the right, privilege, and authority to establish and change its rates and charges to its subscribers for its services from time to time.

Section 26. **Service Rules and Regulations.** The Grantee shall have the right to prescribe reasonable service rules and regulations and operating rules for the conduct of its business.

Such rules and regulations shall be consistent with its terms and conditions of its franchise.

Section 27. **Service Agreements.** The Grantee shall have the right to prescribe a reasonable form of service agreement for use between the Grantee and its subscribers.

Such service agreement shall be consistent with its terms and conditions of its franchise.

VI. CRIMES AND PENALTIES

Section 28. **Injury to Property of the Grantee.** No person shall wrongfully or unlawfully injure the property of the Grantee.

Section 29. **Interception of Signals of the Grantee.** No person shall wrongfully or unlawfully intercept the signals of the Grantee. If a wire, apparatus or other equipment of a cable television system has been altered or tampered with, a rebuttable presumption is created that the person to whom authorization of the cable system operator has been created the condition is existing.

Section 30. **Penalty.** Any person violating any of the provisions of Section 31 or 32 of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS

Section 31. **Access.** The Grantee shall and does hereby grant to the City the right to enter upon the property of the Grantee, upon reasonable notice, at any and all reasonable times to inspect the same for purposes pertaining to the rights of the City.

(a) **Franchise fee.** The Grantee shall pay to the City three percent (3%) of its annual gross receipts for basic service rendered to subscribers within the City.

For purposes of this Section, "basic service" is defined as the entry level purchase necessary to become a cable television subscriber.

All payments as required by the Grantee to the City shall be made quarterly and shall be due ninety (90) days after the close of the calendar year.

Section 32. **Discrimination Prohibited.** The Grantee shall not grant any undue preference or advantage to any person, nor subject any person to prejudice or disadvantage with respect to rates, charges, services, facilities, rules, regulations or in any other respect.

Section 33. **Severability.** If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged to be unconstitutional, illegal, invalid, or inapplicable to any person or circumstances, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged to be unconstitutional, illegal, invalid or inapplicable to any person or circumstances.

Section 34. **Effective Date.** This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as required by law.

Section 35. **Publication.** The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause publication of this ordinance to be made as provided by ordinances of the Charter of the City of Iuka.

Section 36. **Reservation.** The right is reserved to the City Council or its successor or equivalent to adopt, in addition to the provisions contained herein and in existing applicable ordinances, such additional regulations as it shall find necessary in the exercise of the police power.

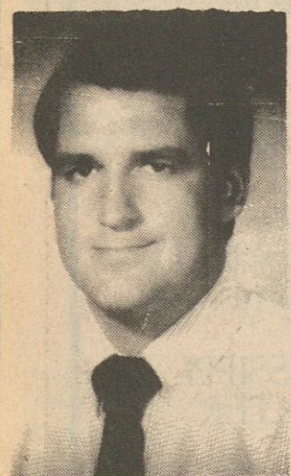

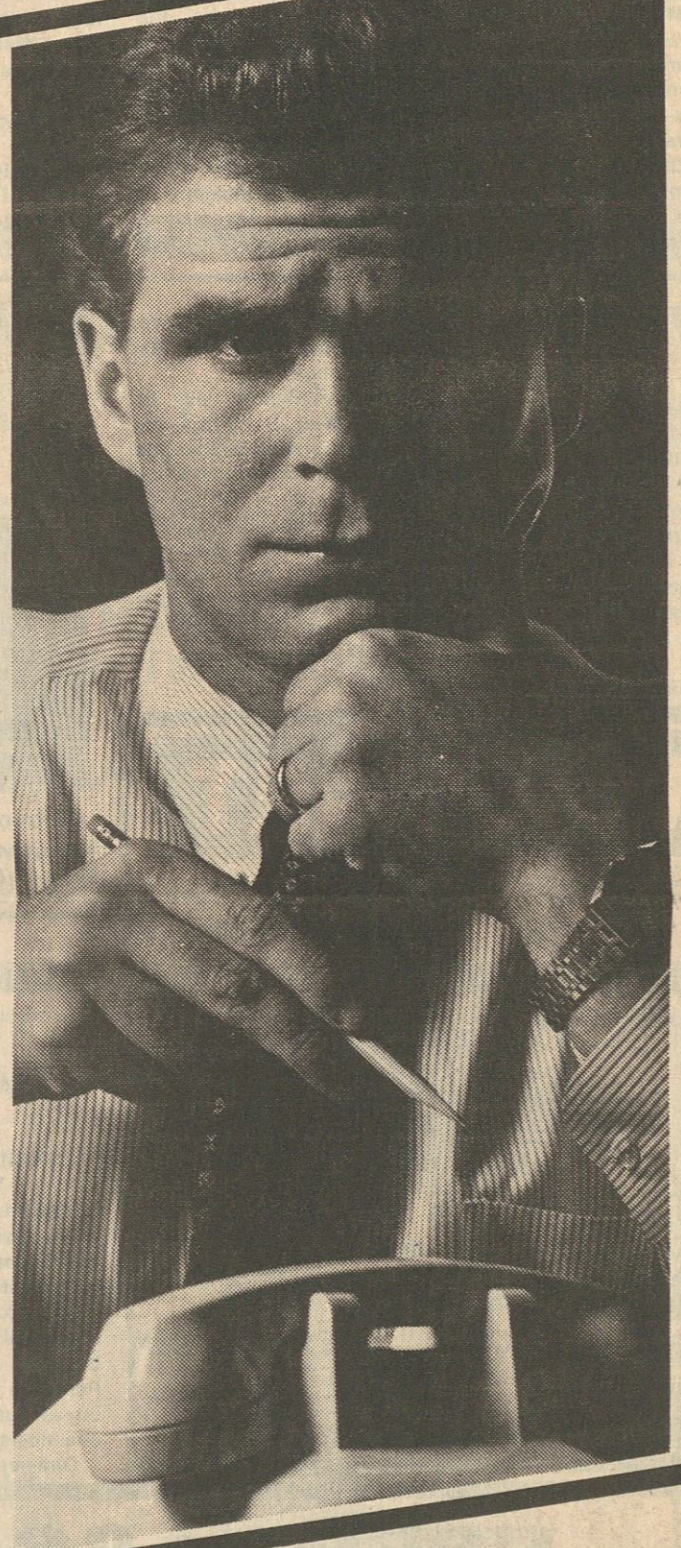

County Agents' Column

PESTICIDE APPLICATORS' TRAINING

Plans have been completed for two sessions to be held to train farmers and gardeners on the safe use of pesticides. These training sessions will enable those attending to become Certified Private Pesticide Applicators and to buy and use "Restricted Use" chemicals.

One session will be held at

the Public Library in Belmont at 1:30 p.m. on Monday afternoon, March 21. The other session will be held that night (March 21) at 7:00 p.m. in the conference room of the Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka. The conference room is on the lower level (use the back entrance).

All landowners, farmers, and gardeners are invited to attend one of these sessions.

BEEF CATTLE MEETING

The Tishomingo County Cattlemen's Association will meet Tuesday night, March 22, at 7:00 p.m. at the Vo-Tech Center in Tishomingo for an educational program on beef cattle production. A sponsored meal will be served and everyone interested in beef cattle production is invited.

PRESCRIBED BURNING

All fires in a natural environment do some damage, whether they are accidental or intentional. Many of you with timberland are having to deliberately set fires -- but hold on, readers. It's all for a good cause in Tishomingo County.

Prescribed burning is the use of fire under specified and controlled conditions. It is a practice that provides timber owners and forest managers with an effective and economical means of performing many necessary management tasks. Properly planned and executed by professional foresters, prescribed burning accomplishes these objectives at

reasonable cost and with minimum damage to the forest.

Air pollution control regulations must be observed during all burning. You need to obtain a burning permit from the Mississippi Forestry Commission. Check with the MFC dispatching tower nearest you or the county forester's office.

FORAGE TIPS

I often get questions from many of you in Tishomingo County about which forages can be seeded in the spring. As a general rule, cool season forages are seeded in the fall and warm season forages are seeded in the spring. Simple enough.

Some forage species can be seeded at either time. Tall fescue, white clover and red clover are best seeded in the fall. If they are planted in early spring, they can be successfully grown -- provided you have good growing conditions.

The main problem with planting these cool season forages in the spring is competition from our annual summer weeds. Some warm season forages you might want to consider planting: annual lespedeza, sorghum-sudangrass hybrids, pearl millets, bermudagrass, bahiagrass and Sericea lespedeza.

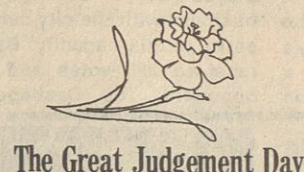

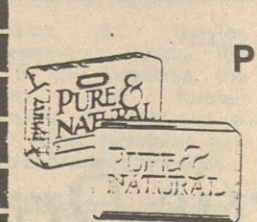

good grade on it as I truly described my neighbor. I can't remember M.C.'s topic, but when he had to come up front to read it, he got so tickled and Mrs. Foote said go on M.C. and read it. He said, I can't read my writing after it gets cold. So, he passed just the same. He was always so jolly and enjoyed his school days, especially playing basketball. Everyone in school loved him.

After graduation, I did not get to see much of many of our class, as I married June 4, 1938 and moved to Central and Harmony Community. But I have never forgotten any of our class, four of the 18 have passed on, then Loyce Thompson Matthews, Mable Gilliland and our beloved M.C. and Lorraine Lindgram.

The second World War called so many of our boys. So M.C., gladly went to serve his country. But he came back badly injured in his head, from which he suffered on and on until God saw fit to call him home, to never suffer anymore. So 4 of our 18 are awaiting we others to join them.

M.C.'s wish was to be layed to rest in his service uniform, with our dear American Flag draped over his casket, which was later folded and presented to his son, Mack of Dallas, Texas. He wanted to be put beside many more of his war heroes in the Corinth Cemetery on March 9, 1988. He had suffered so long, his

sister, Lois, said he would pray for God to call him home. He will be sadly missed by all who knew him, but we feel relieved to know he no longer suffers, and is waiting for we other classmates to join him, Lorraine, Loyce, and Mable. Since very few of us knew of his death, I want to thank Celeste Hall Wright and Robert for going to his service to represent our class of 1938. Housekeeping

A Weekly Summary

With a crucial committee deadline behind them, members of the House of Representatives shifted their efforts this week to scores of bills awaiting floor action.

Teachers' salaries, county government, white collar

crime, tort reform, and compulsory automobile insurance were among the widely discussed topics of the past week as committees worked at a stepped-up pace to complete their chores. By the end of the hectic week, more than 180 bills had been sent to the bulging calendar for consideration by the full House.

Highlights of the week included House approval of a bill calling for an average increase of approximately \$3,000 for school teachers in the coming school year with another \$700 pay raise in 1989-1990, making a total increase averaging \$3,700. The legislation triggered more than six hours of debate last Friday before winning passage. Several unsuccessful attempts were made to modify the proposed salary scale or phase-in the pay raises to lighten the cost of the package.

Most legislators agree teachers should get an increase but differed sharply over specific amounts and whether the raises could be adequately funded without hurting other vital programs. Backers said the bill would clearly establish education as a top priority and help boost teacher salaries in Mississippi to the Southeastern average. Other lawmakers expressed serious reservations over proposals for funding the bill.

Bills also were awaiting action at the close of the past week that would provide pay raises for state officials, judges, state employees, and various county officials including sheriffs and supervisors. The Attorney General's Office would be granted new powers to combat white-collar crime under a bill winning House approval last week. The measure, recommended by the Judiciary 'A' Committee, would authorize the Attorney General to conduct investigations into cases of statewide interest involving alleged fraud, kickbacks, and similar offenses.

The Attorney General would be given new, limited subpoena powers and be allowed to prosecute cases investigated by his office. Backers said the legislation includes safeguards to prevent abuse of the additional powers. Also, the bill spelled out that the authority extended to the Attorney General would not diminish any powers of local officials to investigate or prosecute white-collar crime in their area.

Although committee work took priority because of the March 10 deadline, several measures also saw floor action last week as House members prepared for another key deadline in the current week. Legislators faced a Thursday, March 17, cutoff for passage of general bills and constitutional amendments originating in their own chamber.

The flood of bills pouring out of committees last week included proposals involving compulsory auto liability insurance, a mail-in voter

registration plan, an economic development highway act, an expansion of the Medicaid program, a long-term care Ombudsman act for nursing home residents, inspection and testing of underground storage tanks, revisions in Workers Compensation laws, and a county home rule measure.

A number of bills were approved by House committees dealing with the civil justice system, including proposals to reduce the statute of limitations on damage suits from six to four years and discourage frivolous lawsuits.

Other bills in the so-called tort reform" package were rejected or died in committee. Main casualties included hotly contested bills to limit punitive damage awards and revise the joint and several liability system.

Other bills recently approved by the House include a measure to require vehicles

in which maximum security prisoners are transported to be equipped with a partition to protect the driver. Sponsors said the bill could prevent dangerous criminals from trying to overpower officers and escape while en route to prison. The bill still faces Senate action.

A bill that would allow

motorists to purchase distinctive automobile license tags showing the colors and acronym of the owner's favorite state university was passed by the House. The tags would cost \$37 with most of the proceeds going to the universities for maintenance and renovation projects.

Another bill passed by the House would allow people from foreign countries to own up to 320 acres of land in

Mississippi if the property is used for industrial development. Backers said the legislation was to assist economic development efforts.

In addition, the House voted last week to give health officials expanded authority to conduct screening tests for newborn infants for genetic disorders; tighten the child pornography law by making it illegal to ship or mail videotapes showing a

child engaged in sexual conduct; allow the Public Safety Department to hire civilian driver license examiners; make several technical revisions in uniform school laws; provide for the pledge of allegiance to the flag on a daily basis, instead of monthly, in elementary and junior high schools; and continue a 1987 incentive scholarship program for teachers, due to expire in July unless reenacted.

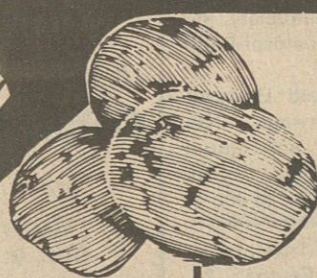
