Alusuisse Packaging Expands Iuka Plant



Groundbreaking Ceremonies were held Monday, April 18, for the expansion to the Alusuisse Flexible Packaging in Iuka. The facility, formerly Consolidated Aluminum Corporation, plans to expand the

present manufacturing area by approximately 25,000 square feet and employ fifteen to twenty new employees. Present for the groundbreaking ceremonies were Berlon Durham, Plant Manager; George Monroe,

Plant Engineer and Larry Bonds of Bonds Construction Company. Mack Wadkins, Tishomingo County Development Foundation Director, was unable to attend the groundbreaking due to being in Jackson in legislative session.

Alusuisse Flexible Packaging is pleased to inform Tishomingo County of an expansion to its Iuka facility. Plans are to expand the present manufacturing area by approximately 25,000 square feet. The new building will have a four foot higher roofline, a truck access and a loading dock the entire length on the east side. The new addition will be used primarily for warehousing at this time. A new laminator and a new slitter, which are the latest, state of the art equipment, with more flexibility and greater capacity than they have at the present time, will be installed. Both of these machines will be housed in the present manufacturing area. The office will be expanded approximately 1,400 square feet to accommodate the increase in manpower and new departments being set up at Iuka. The expansion should increase employment by fifteen to twenty employees.

Alusuisse Flexible Packaging, formerly Consolidated Aluminum Corporation, will be responsible for the entire cost of this expansion totaling 2.3 million dollars. S & S Construction Company from Corinth, MS will construct the building.

March Jobless Rate Improves Statewide

The March jobless rate for Mississippi fell to 8.6 percent according to the Mississippi Employment Security Commission. This rate was one and two tenths percentage points below one month ago, when the rate stood at 9.8 percent. This was 3.4 percentage points below the 12.0 percent reported March 1987. These improvements were caused by seasonal changes in construction, agriculture and related services.

Place of residence employment for March stood at 1,059,400 in a labor force of 1,159,500. There were 4,700 more people employed in March than last month and 42,100 more than March 1987.

Manufacturing establishments provided 233,300 jobs, up 200 from the 233,100 reported in February. Non-manufacturing businesses provided 647,100 jobs in March. The yearly increase of 10,300 in manufacturing from March 1987 continues to point out the dramatic improvement in the goods producing industries. Non-manufacturing provided 2,900 more jobs this month than last month and 20,700 more than last March. This monthly employment of 647,100 represents the largest number of jobs ever supported by

nonmanufacturing industries during March. Most of the economy continued to show steady improvement with most dramatic being the marked improvement in manufacturing over the last eight months.

There were 111,649 claims filed in March 1988 as compared to 113,448 during February and 136,404 one year ago. There were 10,505 job openings received in March compared to 8,693 last month and 9,123 one year ago. Of those received 8,529, 72,87 and 9,123 were filled by local Employment Service Offices.

Mr. Tuckier served the City of Iuka as Alderman from 1973 to 1977. He was a steamfitter and member of the Plumbers and Steamfitters Local Union 760, Sheffield, Alabama for 47 years.

Rex L. Tuckier was a man that cared for his fellow man.

He was a man known for expressing his belief for what he thought was right. He stood up for the little persons.

Services were at 10 a.m. Wednesday, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Elder J. B. Brimingham officiating. Burial was in Lindsey Cemetery.

Choctaw Indian Dance Troupe To Perform At Iuka Heritage Day



Native Indians will once again grace Mineral Springs Park. Although Chief Iuka, for whom the town was named, was from the Chickasaw tribe, Iuka residents and guests will have an opportunity to view the Choctaw Indian Dance Troupe from Philadelphia, Miss. Saturday, May 14, during Iuka Heritage Day Festival. The group will be performing throughout the day at Mineral Springs Park and consists of twenty-four dancers and two chanters.

Donna Grant, spokeswoman for the troupe, said "As with other elements of Choctaw culture, Choctaw

music expresses the Indian value of living in harmony with nature and the "deep and different" spirituality that other Americans find difficult to understand." Today, dances in three categories have been preserved: social dances, animal dances, and the war dance she says. The social dances include the jump dance, the wedding dance, the stealing partners dance, the friendship dance and the walk dance. Grant says unlike with other tribes, the unique Choctaw war dance is danced by both men and women and would last for eight days prior to battle in former times.

Songs for dances are led by the chanter who may also dance if he is a younger man. If he is older, he stands in the middle of a circle of dancers. He begins with a "shout" appropriate to the category of dance song, and the others join in, continues Grant.

The dress of the Choctaws of Mississippi is the same as it was 100 years ago. Origin and time of adoption of this distinctive dress is not certain, but it is similar to traditional peasant dress in France's Brittany Province said Grant.

Worn daily by many older women, the handmade Choctaw dresses have full skirts requiring up to six yards of colorful material. Bright design and decorative aprons and multicolored ribbons normally adorn this costume, with beaded necklaces added

for dress-up occasions. The colorful shirts for men are trimmed in ribbon and worn with ribboned black felt hats and ribboned belts at special tribal events. Beaded sashes carry on design ideas native to the Choctaws - designs which trace their origin to the fabled Mississippian period in southeastern Indian prehistory.

Nothing better illustrates Indian friendship with the land than the practical art of basketry. Ms. Grant said an abundance of cane in the low lying area of east-central Mississippi gave Choctaws a plentiful supply of the best basket material, and the making of baskets with cane is among tribal crafts prac-

ticed today by Choctaw people.

Choctaw women produce both single and double weave baskets. Double weave baskets, using one of the most difficult and tedious techniques of plaited basketry, requires skillful weaving of one basket inside another with one continuous weave of material.

The Tishomingo County Development Foundation is delighted to have the representatives of the Choctaws here for our one day festival. Along with the dance demonstrations, the group will have beautiful handmade baskets, beadwork, and other traditional Indian crafts for sale.

The Segars Clinic Report

HAYFEVER (Allergic Rhinitis)
Allergy season is upon us and many people in this part of the country are suffering with allergy attacks. These cover a wide range of symptoms including sneezing, coughing, headaches, earaches, emotional changes, tiredness, and the list goes on. For the last four weeks this has been the topic of our column and we plan more regarding molds, animal dander and dust. If you or your family is suffering from allergy and you still have unanswered questions, please feel free to call the clinic.

AVOIDING ALLERGENS

The severity of seasonal allergic rhinitis symptoms often is directly related to the weather. The pollen count is

highest on breezy, dry summer afternoons; rides in an open car increase exposure to the allergens. The pollen count falls dramatically when the weather is cold or humid and when heavy rains occur in the morning. Whatever the climate, the hay fever sufferer will almost certainly be more comfortable in the city than in the country and indoors rather than outdoors, especially if the interior is air conditioned. If exposure to the outdoors during the height of a pollen season cannot be avoided, wearing a face mask to avoid inhalation of pollen granules may be helpful. Rarely, moving to an area that has a low pollen count, at least during the pollen season, may be the only alternative to immunotherapy (allergy shots).

Letter To The Editor..

Being from Tishomingo County and fishing the Tennessee River almost all of my life, and now I fish Bay Springs some, I would like to be one of the first to say, we welcome people to our rivers and vacation places. We have many sportsmen visiting our county and we say welcome.

The people who I hope will read this probably won't because mostly just local people read this paper. If I can, let me describe two kinds of fishermen. No. 1 — We hurry home from work, hook to our boat and go to the lake,

we wait patiently in line to unload our boat. Then we're off. Other boats are coming and going so we idle out around and finally into open water where we can open her up and get to the spot we like the best, but on the way we have to slow to a idling speed because there are other people along the way fishing, and the sportsman's thing to do is either go a ways from them or idle your speed. When we do get to our favorite spot someone else is there, so we don't want to be a bad sportsman, so we fish in some other spot, until they leave, then we try our luck in our favorite spot. When we don't catch anything, we

decide to leave, we either use our trolling motor or we idle out away from everbody before we open our big motor up. If we are meeting or passing another boat, we give them enough room as to not endanger them. If we see someone who needs help, we stop to lend a hand, if he's just out of bait, we let him have part of ours. Being a good sportsman is more than just wetting a hook.

The second fisherman is something like this: We get to the river an if we have to wait in line we start cussing and let people know we need a bigger ramp to unload on. When we do finally get to unload we make sure everybody around knows we had to set in line ten minutes. We get our boat in the water — now we own the river. We race up the big motor a few times to make sure people admire our big rig, we shout to our fishing buddy, loud enough for all to hear, "Put your crash helmet on, I'm going to open this baby up!". By this time, everybody is supposed to be out of our way, and if not, too bad. We hit the throttle, stand her on her backside and then we're off. We meet an oncoming boat, we holler to our buddy, "Hope that sucker moves over!". He didn't so we get a big laugh seeing that old man or woman almost fall overboard. We take her into a hollow, to our favorite spot, but someone else is there. We shout back to our buddy, "Hang on, we'll show them who's fishing hole they're in". We head straight for them, but just before we get to them we lay her into a steep turn and watch the waves as they almost flip the little boat over. We make a circle to see if they got the message. Nope, guess not, so we open her up

again and this time, we run as close to them as we can without hitting them. We wouldn't want to hurt anybody because anglers don't do things like that.

We decide to go somewhere else so we take off, we're running wide open, some how we manage at high speed to avoid hitting another boat. There's the spot, we shut her down, grab our reels, cast a few times, and then

The Magnolia House

(CIRA 1864)

The Magnolia House on Fourth and Fulton (Vine) has a long history of owners. People living there were carpenters, merchants, preachers, anesthetist, missionaries, and blacksmiths. When the town of Iuka was started, Mr. Hubbard sold this land to Mr. K. McRae, a blacksmith from North Carolina, and his wife, Fatima, and their six kids. This was his homestead until his death, at which time, the home went to his son, J.D. McRae, who lived there many years.

Next Mr. Samuel Newland DeWoody acquired the property in 1871. The story of his family has some interest. S.N. DeWoody's father, Mr. Samuel Ramsey DeWoody, came from the descendants of William DeWoody who emigrated from Ireland, and floated down the Tennessee River in a flat boat with his family to Alabama. Samuel brought his family to Eastport in 1849. Samuel was a druggist, served as Mayor of Eastport, along with being Justice of the Peace and a tavern owner. He was also on the school board at Eastport, active in his church and at one time a postmaster. When the Federals invaded Eastport, Mr. Samuel DeWoody's house was burned, and at this point he moved to Iuka. This was 1862, and in 1863 he died.

His son, Samuel Newland DeWoody, who married in 1869 to Laura Moore, was the one who bought the Magnolia House in 1871. Both S.N. DeWoody and his wife are buried in Oak Grove Cemetery. Mrs. Laura DeWoody sold the house to Mrs. Lula Thorn in 1898.

In 1903, the house was sold to Mrs. Mellie Culpepper. It seems odd that mostly women owned the house, but then their husbands were in business or preachers, both which had their reasons not to own property.

Mrs. Mellie Culpepper's husband, J.B. Culpepper, came from Georgia and was a preacher at the Iuka Methodist Church. In 1907, the house was sold to J.W. Jourdan, Bud, who among other interests, worked at the Tishomingo Savings Institution, and at one time was the owner of the Iuka newspaper around 1880's.

Then the house was sold to E.T. Hammerly, a cashier of the Citizens Bank of Iuka, who sold it to his boss, Mr. W. T. Ross, the president of the bank. Mr. Hammerly also married Mr. Ross's daughter, Pearl. Mr. Ross sold the house to Joel Traylor (1942) who sold it to Mr. H. Dobbs. Mr. Dobbs lived in the house for several years and tried to start a funeral home there around 1954-57. Competition

was too much, and business too slow and this did not work out.

Other owners were C.W. Henery, Jr.; J.S. Gleason; D.L. Medley; B. Davis; R. Barrett; R. Morris; Mary Louise House; Mr. and Mrs. E. W. O'Brian and now the present owners, Mr. Larry O'Brian and his wife, Melba. The Magnolia House is a lovely old home with tall ceilings and excessively large windows. This home sits on the top of a hill overlooking it's neighborhood and has a porch around two sides. Like most old homes a swing is the main attraction and placed where a cool breeze blows constantly.

Housekeeping

The decision on implementing a countywide system of road management would be left to voters in each county under a hotly debated bill passed by the Mississippi House of Representatives.

The bill originally would have required a county-unit system in each county by October 1989. The local-option referendum was inserted by the House by a vote of 68-54 following a lengthy floor fight. A number of other amendments also were adopted before the bill was finally passed, 110-12, last week.

Passage of the county-unit bill was among the highlights of a busy week that also saw dozens of other measures gaining approval as lawmakers prepared for another crucial deadline. The cutoff is Thursday, April 14,

for original floor action on general bills previously passed by the opposite chamber.

The county-unit bill was a revised version of a Senate measure and was expected to be sent to a conference committee to settle House-Senate differences. Under the bill, all counties would be mandated to adopt a central purchasing and inventory control system, leaving it to voters to decide this fall if they want a countywide system of road management.

Several counties already operate under some form of centralized or unit system, but the majority use the traditional beat system where each supervisor is responsible for road work in his own district. Proponents maintain a county-unit system is more efficient. Other legislators contend what works for one county may not necessarily work for another, saying the final decision should be left to voters at the local level.

A proposal to increase maximum weekly benefits under the state's unemployment compensation law from \$130 to \$145 won final legislative approval last week with adoption of a compromise bill recommended by a House-Senate conference committee.

The measure, which also provides a small decrease in employers' contributions to the unemployment compensation trust fund, had gone to conference after different versions were passed by the House and Senate. The earlier House bill would have upped the weekly maximum to \$150, while the Senate set the figure at \$140.

Other measures passed by the House in the past week included:

--A bill to speed up the collection of insurance premium taxes, producing an estimated one-time windfall of nearly \$19 million for the coming year; the measure was part of the Governor's

package to help fund a teachers' pay raise and other programs.

--A bill to regulate sports agents who deal with student athletes with stiff penalties for anyone who violates restrictions spelled out in the legislation.

--Separate proposals to authorize 20 percent salary increases for sheriffs and county supervisors; another bill would provide a similar increase for the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House.

In addition, the House approved bills to authorize appointment of a special 25-member task force to study housing conditions in the state; provide for libraries to participate in a statewide library development program; allow a lifetime hunting and fishing license for Mississippi residents; increase boat registration fees; update maximum fines for violating boating laws; permit the

Public Employees Retirement System to develop a group life and health insurance plan for retired public employees; and designate the Public Service Commission to take over the safety inspection of trucks hauling hazardous material.

Other bills passed by the House would allow the Public Safety Department to issue special identification cards for people without driver licenses, continue a voluntary mediation program to help farmers, provide for a statewide program to combat litter, and authorize a law enforcement officer to make an arrest without a warrant in a domestic violence case. A number of the bills had been passed earlier in both chambers, and the House voted to simply make the Senate version conform to its own measure.

Numerous measures failed to survive last week's deadline for committee action on general bills, including the House-passed

landlord-tenant rights bill, a measure to help minority-owned businesses gain a share of state contracts, and a bill to boost the interest in damage-suit awards from 10 percent and require interest to be paid from the time the complaint was filed rather than when judgment is rendered.
