Historic Tour Depicts History Of Iuka

A special feature of the Heritage Day festivities on May 14th will be a historic tour of Iuka's landmarks. The Historical Committee has added seventeen new signs to the group that were erected last year. A new brochure has also been printed highlighting fifty-five sites of interest and if one follows the map included in the brochure a very enjoyable walking or driving tour can be undertaken. The smaller brochure that was printed last year at the time of the Re-enactment can still be used for a shorter tour as the numbers on the map remain the same - the new brochure is larger and contains a longer tour because it covers a larger area of Iuka. Wagon rides on May 14 will tour much of the area included in the brochures and will provide an easy way to see Iuka without having to walk or drive.

The history of Iuka is depicted in the descriptions of the sites listed in the brochures. Before Iuka became a town in 1857, Main

Street was known as "Stagecoach Road" because it was a stage coach route between the towns of Eastport and Tupelo. The first stop on the route from Eastport was a Stage coach House c. 1853 (No. 50 on the map). When Iuka became incorporated, many of the homes at Eastport were literally taken apart and moved by oxcart to Iuka (No. 6, 10, 17, 27, 33, 50 and 55). Mineral Springs Park c. 1840 (No. 34) was famous for the healthful springs it produced well before Iuka was known as a town and Shady Grove Cemetery c. 1857 (No. 37) was probably formed before 1857 because many of the early townspeople are buried there.

Iuka's Civil War years are well documented by the sites and homes still standing. The Battle of Iuka marked the Merrill-Nelson Home. c.1855 (No. 13) for extensive damage when a cannonball crashed through the roof during the bombardment of the town. Moss Rose c.1845 (No.28) also received damage during the

battle. Twin Magnolias c.1842 (No.3) was the final resting place of Confederate General Henry Little who was killed at the Battle of Iuka and buried in the rose garden behind the home until after the war. This was also the home of Iuka's only Mississippi governor, John M. Stone. Many other places of interest has Civil War history; No. 29,33,37,38, 40 and 51.

One of Iuka's most renowned accomplishments was its leadership in Mississippi education. Iuka Female College was established in 1858 (No.12) and later became Iuka Normal Institute. The Carmichael Home c.1869 (No. 15) was a boarding house for Iuka Female College and later for students attending the Normal. Dormitory Annex c. 1858 (No. 14) was built from the timbers obtained from the back section of the Female Dormitory when the college was torn down. Twin Oaks c.1867 (No. 9) also housed students from Iuka Normal Institute and still has an old

cellar lined with brick under the home where food was stored during this period. Academy Row c.1882 (No. 43) also figured prominently in Iuka's educational history. The Boys Academy was in existence in the 1860's and the area surrounding the home was included in the Academy property.

Iuka is justifiably proud of its Public Library c.1970 (No.53). The first library in Iuka was established in the early 1930's from W.A. funds and the present site is the fifth location for a library in the town. Iuka Library was the first non-segregated library in the state of Mississippi.

Iuka's Downtown Area c.1890 (No.31) actually dates from when the town was incorporated December 13, 1857. Many businesses from the town of Eastport relocated in this area at that time. All of the older structures were either torn down or destroyed in a disastrous fire of March 17, 1896. The area between the railroad and the town is known as "Jay Bird Park" because at one time hitching posts lined the park area and when the horses were fed, jay birds flocked into the park to eat the loose grain.

The marked historic sites include many firsts for Iuka: Oakhaven c.1882 (No.5) was the site of the first Baptist Church; Parsonage c.1842 (No.17) was the first Methodist parsonage in Iuka; T.L. Brown Home c.1878 (No.21) was the first Iuka home to be wired for electricity; W.S. Brown Home c.1917 (No.32) became the first brick home to be built in Iuka; Castleberry Home c.1887 (No.42) was the first home to have electricity from battery generated power; Phillips Home c. 1938 (No.45) was the first to be granted a construction loan in Iuka by the Federal Housing Authority. Cosby Clinic and Hospital c.1950 (No.48) was Tishomingo County's first hospital.

Historic Tour brochures are available free of charge at the old Tishomingo County Courthouse.

Head-on Collision Leaves One Dead

A Sunday night collision, approximately four miles west of Burnsville, left a Prentiss County man dead when the car he was driving swerved into the oncoming lane colliding with a tractor-trailer rig.

According to reports by Burnsville Police Officer, W.C. Mayhall, the victim, identified as Jimmy R. Moss, 49, of Route 5, Booneville, MS, was traveling west on U.S. Highway 72 around 8:30 p.m. Sunday night when the accident occurred.

Reports indicate that an ongoing motorist had seen Moss' car traveling toward Burnsville and stopped to advise Mayhall that he had seen the vehicle run off the road several times, hitting several

road signs. Mayhall then got behind the 1981 Buick Regal that Moss was driving as it entered the city limits. "Moss was not driving very fast (about 45 mph) when I turned on the blue lights for him to pull over, but he refused to do so," Mayhall explained, "I continued to follow him when he pulled over into the east-bound lane, crashing into the oncoming truck."

The driver of the tractor-trailer, Paul T. McCalla, Jr., of Route 4, Corinth, saw Moss' vehicle coming toward him and slowed his truck to try and avoid the collision, stated Mississippi Highway Patrolman, Mark Pitner, who investigated the accident. The truck, 1987 International owned by the company Mc-

Calla worked for (K.C. Transport of Memphis) was badly damaged, but the driver was not injured, according to reports.

Officer Mayall was also assisted at the accident site by two Alcorn County officers, along with the Corinth Fire Department personnel who removed Moss from the car with Jaws of Life equipment. "The Burnsville Fire Department also responded to the scene due to a leakage of diesel fuel from the damaged truck on the highway," stated Mayhall.

Services for Moss were held Tuesday, April 26 at McMillan Funeral Home Chapel in Booneville with Rev. Gene Bordeaux officiating. Burial

was in Burgess Creek Cemetery.

Moss was survived by his wife, Brenda Staggs Moss of Tishomingo; two daughters, Tammy Miller of Fort Payne, Alabama, and Sonia Moss of Iuka; one step-daughter, Lynn Ford of the home; one son, Tyron Moss of Iuka; two stepsons, Sean Ford and Brad Manley, both of the home; four brothers, James E. Moss of Tishomingo, Hewell Moss of Rienzi, Jerry Moss of Iuka and Billy Joe Moss of Tennessee; five half-brothers, Leon Moss of Booneville, R.B. Moss of Baldwin, Troy Moss of Memphis, Bobby Gene Moss of Napoleon, Ohio, and Benny Moss of Burnsville; five grandchildren, and one step-granddaughter.

Beef Referendum Scheduled May 10th

The Beef Promotion and Research order of July 18, 1986, provided that \$1.00 per head on cattle sold and an equivalent amount on imported beef and beef products be collected for use in promotion, research and educational programs. The money collected is to be used for the establishment of a coordinated program of promotion and research designed to strengthen the beef industry's position in the market place and to expand uses for beef and beef products. A referendum of producers of cattle and importers of cattle, beef and beef products will be held May 10, 1988 to determine if this order shall be continued. The order shall be continued only if it is approved by a majority of persons voting.

Voting will be conducted at the County Extension Office in each county from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 a.m. on Tuesday, May 10, 1988. Individuals producers and importers desiring to vote shall register on the day of voting at the County Extension office in which their residence is located. Partnerships, Corporations and joint family ownerships shall register and vote at the County Extension office in the County where their headquarters or business office is located.

Eligible voters of Tishomingo County will vote at the County Extension office located in the Cour-

thouse in Iuka.

The following persons are eligible to vote:

(1) Producers who owned or acquired ownership cattle during the period of October 1, 1986 through March 31, 1988.

(2) Importers who imported cattle, beef or beef products during the period of October 1, 1986 through March 31, 1988.

(3) Any person who claims to be a producer or an importer shall be permitted to register and vote.

COMPANY CASSEROLE
1-8 oz. package noodles
1 lb. ground beef
butter
2 8-oz. cans tomato sauce
1 tsp. salt
Cayenne or pepper to taste
1 c. cottage cheese
1/4 c. sour cream
1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
1/2 c. green onions, chopped
1 to 2 tbsp. green pepper, chopped

Cook noodles in 3 quarts salted water. Brown ground beef in 3 tablespoons butter. Stir in tomato sauce, salt and peppers. Remove from heat. Combine cottage cheese, sour cream, cream cheese, onions and green pepper. Spread half the noodles in greased casserole; cover with sour cream mixture. Top with remaining noodles. Pour 2 tablespoons melted butter over noodles. Pour beef sauce on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. One additional cup cottage cheese may be whipped to sour cream consistency and substituted for sour cream and cream cheese because cottage cheese costs less and is lower in calories. Yield: 6-8 servings.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

MAKE SPRING CLEANING EASIER

Spring has arrived in Tishomingo County, and along with the warmer temperatures, the desire for a thorough house cleaning often seems to accompany the season.

Don't let spring cleaning get you down. Plan the household tasks to be completed and set up your own

schedule. Everyone works at a different pace and has their own preferred way of performing household tasks.

These differences mean the time and energy devoted to care of the home varies, but it can be used to best advantage through careful planning and preventive maintenance. The following are some suggestions on how to save time and make home care easier:

*Make it a habit to pick it up, clean it up and put it away before leaving an item. For example, after each use, the tub or shower can be rinsed of soap film or wiped dry to leave it clean for the next user and to help prevent mildew

growth. Family members should be encouraged to rinse dishes used for snack foods and stack them or put them in the dishwasher.

*A clean filter on the heating and cooling system means less dust and dirt in the air. Include changing or cleaning filters as a part of the regular cleaning schedule.

*Protective mats or rugs at entry ways will help catch soil before it can be tracked onto floors. Where gritty soil or mud is a problem, keep a rubber or fiber doormat outside so family members can clean their shoes before entering the house.

*Music helps set the mood and creates a pleasant atmosphere. Play a favorite album or tape or listen to the radio while working.

*Cleaning equipment and electrical appliances do the best job when they are clean and in good working order. Plan for regular maintenance of these cleaning aids so they will be less apt to breakdown in the middle of the job.

*Save on time and energy by using the right equipment for the job and getting the most from it. Vacuum cleaner attachments can make short work of cleaning upholstery, drapery, woodwork, corners and crevices.

*A good supply of soft, absorbent, lint-free cloths make cleaning easier, too. Choose non-abrasive materials that won't scratch surfaces. Old cloth diapers, cotton knitwear and terry toweling are good choices. Paper towels or disposable non-woven cloths can be used for messy cleanups and then discarded.

*Know how much time will be needed for the various jobs to be done and plan

ahead so work can be finished in the time available without unnecessary interruption.

*Save steps by carrying what you need with you. A tote bag or box with a handle can hold frequently used products and supplies. Add a plastic or paper bag for litter pickup or for collecting misplaced items.

Try to store supplies and equipment near the point of use. Clean all the equipment and supplies before returning them to storage so they will be ready for the next use.

An inventory of cleaning supplies helps when it's time to write out the shopping list. It makes sure you will not run out of a cleaning product or need a fresh vacuum cleaner bag in the middle of a job.

*Home furnishings manufacturers supply information about the care of items on their labels. Remove and save these in a file for further reference. The use and care manuals for appliances can be kept in the same place. Both will be helpful when cleaning an item for the first time or when operating seldom used equipment.

*When using a new cleaning product or cleaning an article or surface for the first time, read the labels carefully and always test for good results on a scrap or in an obscure corner of the item to be cleaned. A test of color-fastness is especially important when cleaning any fabric or carpeting.

*Give yourself a break. Take brief rest periods to relieve monotony and give tired muscles a chance to relax.

County Agents' Notes

COST OF MARKETING

Much ado is made these days about the importance of marketing our agricultural products. Is anybody curious as to how much all this marketing costs us? I was.

The agricultural economist at the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service defines marketing as "the performance of business activities that direct the flow of goods and services from producer to consumer." In other words, marketing costs are the price we pay to turn corn into corn flakes, to put those flakes in a shiny box and to drop those boxes off at the general store.

So what does marketing of agricultural products cost us? American consumers spend \$200 billion each year on foods that had their start on our farms. The farm value of the food we grow is about \$60 billion. Our farmers get 39 cents of each dollar we spend at the grocery store for farm-grown foods.

Labor accounts for 50 percent of marketing costs, and packaging is 12 percent. If we break down the marketing bill further, we have the following: transportation, 8 percent; profits, 6 percent; depreciation, 3 percent; business taxes, 4 percent;

advertising, 3 percent; rent, 3 percent; utilities and insurance, 8 percent; and interest, repairs and bad debts combined, 3 percent.

TERMITE ID'S

I've received several telephone calls about swarming termites. This is the time of year for termites to swarm, and they do this to distribute their populations. (Mighty nice of them to think of us in that way!)

But here's the wrinkle in the problem. You may think you have termites when you really have flying ants (a nuisance), or you may think you have flying ants when you have termites (a serious problem). How do you tell the difference between the two varieties of insects? Look at the antennae, body and wings of the specimen you capture.

A termite's antennae are beaded, and the "beads" are stacked on each other in a short line. Antennae of flying ants are made up of long segments and are shaped like an elbow.

Termites have no definite shape between their body segments. In flying ants, the link between body segments is very definite. Termites also have equally sized wings extending over the tip of the abdomen. Wings of flying ants are uneven in length and do not hand over the abdomen tip.

If you examine these three things, you can do a good job in telling the difference between termites and flying ants.

ADJUST THERMOSTAT

You can significantly save money in summer by properly setting your thermostat. This is probably the single most important consideration in cutting air conditioning costs.

NEED MORE LIGHT?

It amazes adults when they discover children reading a book or magazine in poor light or shadows. How can they do it? Young, healthy eyes can compensate for a lack of light because their focusing muscles are stronger and more flexible. But they'll get eye strain if they do this too often or for long periods of time. The eyes need light to see well.

This is especially true for older people. When the light is right, most older people can do any difficult job, from repairing broken furniture to fine needle work.

The best kind of lighting is a diffused light that covers a large area and eliminates

glare. Glare can come from light shining directly into your eyes. It can come from light reflected off shiny surfaces.

It's a good idea to have more than one light in a room. Then, when you leave the brightly-lit area, you're not walking in shadows.

Resting your eyes from time to time is also helpful. So are regular eye checkups.

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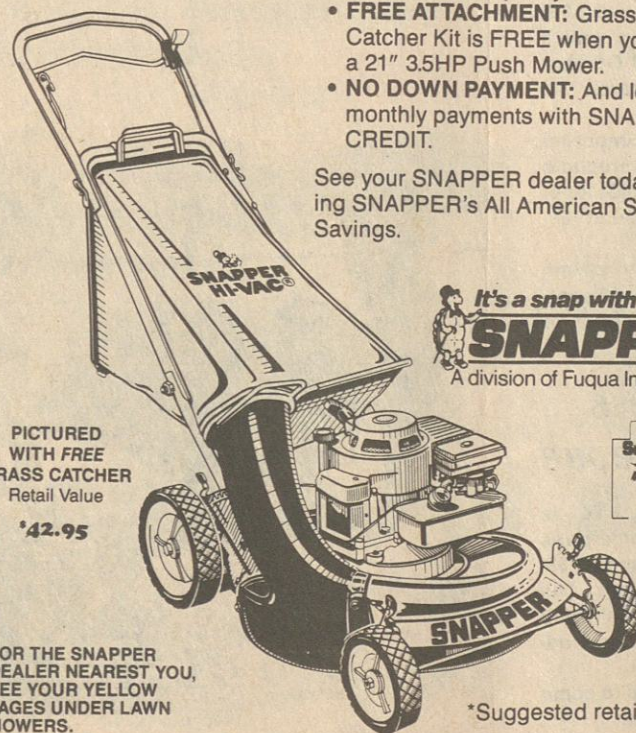
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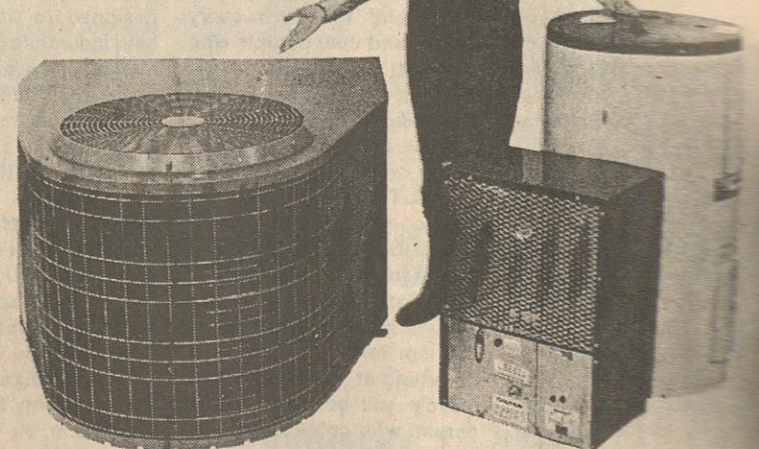

Old Courthouse To Be Scene Of Jones - Holland Wedding

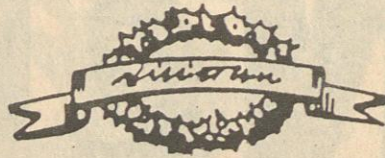
Chess Pardue Receives World War II Medals

County Agent Notes

NEW PEACH STANDARDS
Mississippi peach producers can grow as fine a peach as anywhere in the United States. That's what one of the horticulturists with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service told me recently.

You can find these firm, plump Mississippi peaches at roadside markets across our great state. You can also find peaches brought in from Georgia and South Carolina. But because Mississippi has no grade standards for peaches sold here, lower grade peaches from out-of-state are being marketed as number 1 grade and sold below the prices of our homegrown highest quality peaches.

The Mississippi Peachgrowers Association has now taken care of that problem. The group's board of directors is lobbying to establish grade standards for all peaches sold in the state. The board has proposed to representatives from the State Department of Agriculture that peaches must meet Mississippi quality grade number 1 before

they can be sold.

Tax shock has jolted USA homeowners. To pay off consumer debt, many are turning into home equity loans.

Some USA lenders say their home equity business has more than doubled since February 1987. After filing out 1987 tax returns, we're realizing that borrowing against our homes is the only way left to get a full tax break on interest costs.

"We've literally had people come straight from their tax adviser to the savings and loan," says Miss Wein at Citicorp.

Last year, confusing rules disallowed deductions for home equity interest for some homeowners, depending on their total mortgage debt vs. what they paid for their homes.

New tax rules for 1988 allow deductions for 100 percent of interest paid on a home equity loan, up to a loan value of \$100,000. In contrast, you can deduct only 40 percent of interest on other consumer debt, like credit cards.

Many homeowners figure home equity loans are the only smart way to get rid of other consumer debt. "We're getting 25 applications a day, double the rate in early March," says Peter Reed, vice president of First National Bank of Chicago.

At Anchor Savings Bank in Norwalk, N.Y., loan applications have jumped to 140 a week in April from 45-50 a week in February, says Vice President Gary McCann.

Some loan deals:

- United Penna. Bank, Wilkes-Barre, Pa. No points, no closing costs. Interest rate: 8.5 percent through Sept. 30; then 2 percentage points over the prime lending rate, currently at 8.5 percent.

Failure to report could result in a fine of up to 25% of the properties fair market value.

CONTROLLING WEEDS AND BUSHES ON SET-ASIDE LAND

Land that has been designated for the second conservation year as acreage conservation reserve (ACR) must be moved, clipped, or bushhogged at least one time during the peak growing season to control weeds and bushes unless individually waived by the county committee.
