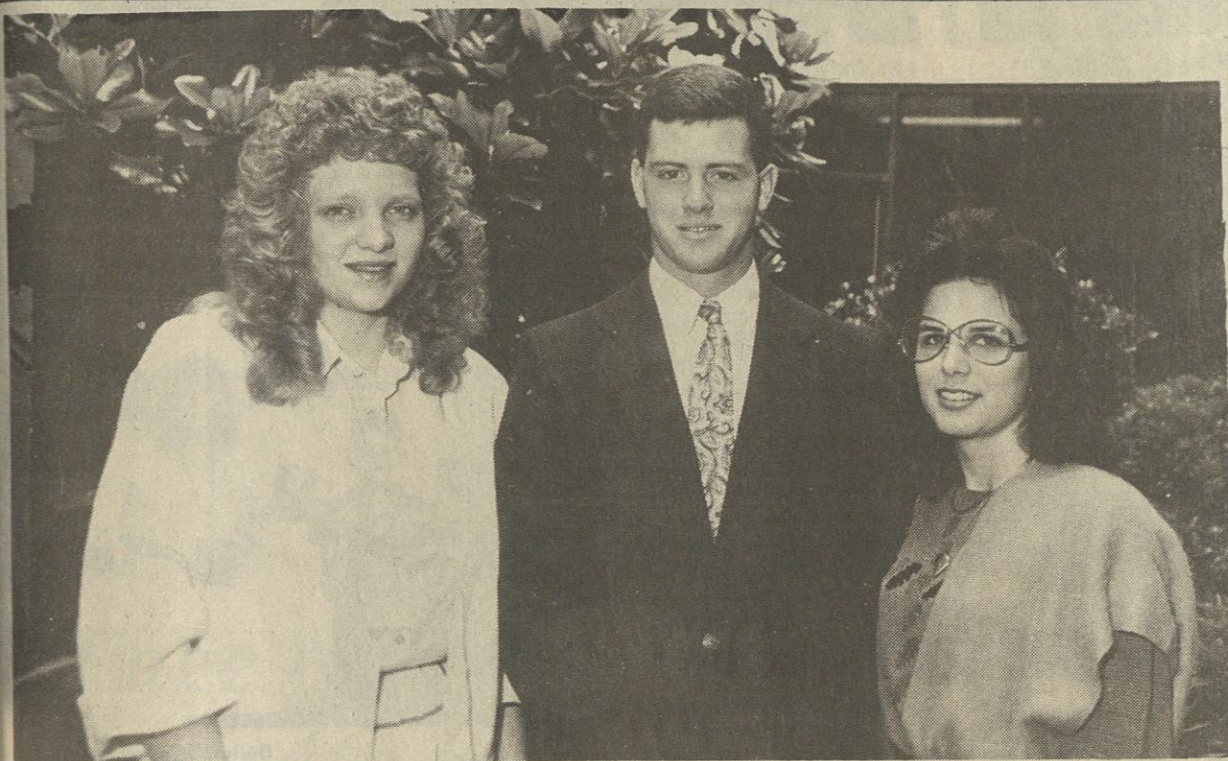

Gun Shot Fatal To Iuka Woman

An Iuka woman was shot early Friday when a gun, handled by her brother, discharged leading to her death, reports confirm.

According to reports by Tishomingo County Coroner, Dale White, Anita Carol Lambert, 24, of Iuka was shot in the forehead at approximately 9:30 a.m. Friday, May 13, 1988.

Apparently, said Tishomingo County Chief Deputy Danny Horton, the victim's brother, Billy Ray Brown, along with other

family members and Ms. Lambert were getting ready to go to the lake from the victim's home that morning when a gun (.357 pistol) Brown was handling discharged into the forehead of the victim. "Other details concerning the shooting are sketchy at this time however, further investigations are pending," stated Deputy Horton.

"The victim was taken to the Tishomingo Hospital where resuscitative measures were taken," explained coroner, Dale White, "from

there she was airlifted to Memphis, Tennessee, to the Elvis Presley Trauma Center, where she died May 14, from the gunshot wound."

Services for Ms. Lambert were at 11 a.m. Tuesday, May 17, at Harmony Hill Baptist Church with the Rev. Billy Feltman and the Rev. Perry Murphy officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include her husband, Stanley Watkins of Iuka; one daughter, Maria

Lambert of Iuka; two sons, Eric Lambert and Palmer Lambert, Jr., of Iuka; her mother, Mary Britt of Iuka; her father, Haymon Brown of Iuka; one sister, Sheila Sanders of Iuka; two brothers, George Brown and Billy Brown, both of Iuka; one half-sister, Barbara Rutherford of Iuka; three half-brothers, Estes Ray Brown of Missouri; Junior Brown and Ricky Brown, both of Iuka; her grandmothers, Ruby Walls of Belmont and Ada Brown of Iuka; her grandfather, Leroy Bolton of Houston, Texas.

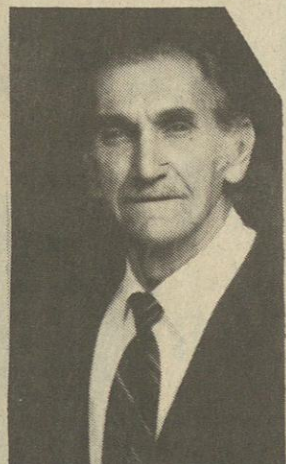
She was a delegate to Girl's State in the summer of 1987 and has served as vice-president and president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

Wear the socks or hoisery you plan to wear with the new pair of shoes.

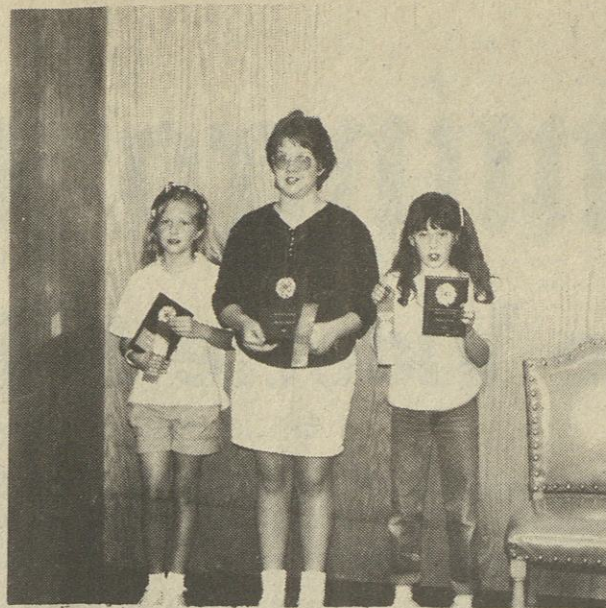
Hold the sole of a flat shoe to the sole of your foot. They should be wide and match in the same places.

When trying on shoes, wiggle your toes, walk on tip-toe, arch your feet, sit down, and then walk again. If the shoes hurt your feet in the store, you can count on sore feet every time you wear them.

Check your heels and toes standing up. Your feet should not extend off the toe or heel of an open shoe.

Feel the insides of shoes to make sure the lining and finishing are smooth and non-irritating.

Don't buy by size alone. Sizes vary between manufacturers and styles.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

IF THE SHOE FITS WEAR IT

The average person walks about 65,000 miles in a lifetime, which is equivalent to walking around the world two and a half times. The feet of a person weighing 150 pounds absorb a total cumulative pressure of about 2,500 tons a day. These facts bring to focus the importance of selecting proper footwear.

Improper fitting shoes play a major role in 87 percent of all Americans who suffer from some sort of foot trouble. Shoes that don't fit can cause corns, calluses, muscle fatigue and soreness. Foot injuries can throw a whole body out of alignment.

When shopping for shoes, aim for quality (the best you can afford) and good fit. The better the fit, the longer your shoes and good condition of your feet will last.

The most important fit point is the front of the foot. Make sure there is enough room in the toe box to wiggle your toes. There should be enough space between the end of the toe and the tip of the shoe to allow sufficient free movement of toes and to avoid compressing the foot from heel to toes.

To prevent toes from touching the end of your shoe, about 1/2 to 3/4 inch extra length needs to be allowed. Toe room also means plenty of height. Be sure there is plenty of room on top of the toes. Shoes should not press down on the toes.

The ball of your foot should be over the widest part of the sole that should be wide enough so the foot does not feel pinched.

The shank of the shoe should follow the line of the arch and should be firm enough to support and hold the foot in place.

Always have both feet measured. No two feet are identical. Then try on both shoes. One foot is almost always longer or shaped differently. Always accommodate the larger foot, and if necessary, alter the fit of the other shoe.

Don't believe a salesperson who assures you that a tight shoe will stretch to fit. Leather shoes do give, but only slightly.

Don't buy shoes early in the morning or after you've been standing for hours. Your feet expand slowly during the day. To get the most representative fit, shop

TUNA CASSEROLE

1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 small onion, chopped
1/4 cup flour
2 1/2 cup nonfat dry milk crystals
1 1/4 cups water
8 oz. noodles, cooked
1 16 oz. can English peas, undrained
1 1/2 oz. can tuna
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 cup grated cheese
Salt and pepper to taste

Melt butter in skillet, add onions, and cook over medium heat until tender, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Add flour and dry milk and stir until evenly blended. Add water and stir until the mixture is smooth.

Return to heat and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add cooked noodles, peas with liquid, and tuna. Stir until evenly mixed. Turn heat to low; cover and cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add mayonnaise and grated cheese and stir. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Continue cooking for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Yield: 4 servings.

The meeting then adjourned for refreshments with Evelyn Tucker and Eva Decker as hostesses.

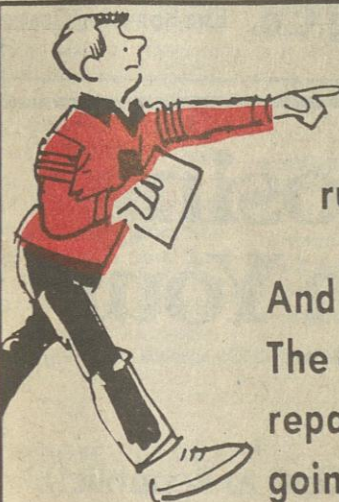

DIXIELAND ALL-BREEDS DAIRY HEIFER SALE

Anyone interested in purchasing a registered dairy heifer of any breed for a 4-H or FFA project or a breeder who would like to add a few good pedigreed animals to his herd will have that opportunity on June 4. That is the date of the Sixth Annual Dixieland All-Breeds Dairy Heifer Sale which will be held at the Fairgrounds in Pontotoc, Mississippi, beginning at 12:30 p.m.

MUD DAUBERS

You can safely remove mud dauber nests from your home without fear of being stung. The mud daubers, solitary wasps that build small nests of mud on outside walls of buildings and structures, don't defend those nests when threatened.

Most of the mud dauber nests can simply be picked off and discarded.

To keep you from being confused, let me describe what mud daubers look like so you won't get stung making a mistake. Mud daubers are long and slender, and have a prominent threadlike waist.

Some mud daubers are black and yellow, and they build a series of cylindrical mud cells. They plaster these cells with mud, forming a nest the size of your fist.

Another species of mud dauber you may find are the robust, black-colored organ pipe daubers. These insects build pipelike tubes on the sides of smooth surfaces like walls and bridges.

A third species of mud dauber inhabits abandoned nests of other mud daubers. These daubers are easily recognized by their bluish-to-blackish metallic color and blue-colored wings.

Remember, that all you have to do to remove their nests is just pull them off.

WATERMELON CHECK

If you have a small watermelon patch here in Tishomingo County, you may want to check for striped and spotted cucumber beetles. They will attack the melon seedlings and strip seedling

have to look out for include brown rot (caused by fungus), scab (another fungal infection) and bacterial spot (caused by bacteria). We also must be aware of the insects that can severely damage peach and plum trees: stink bugs, peach tree borers, oriental fruit moths and plum curculios (dark brown snout beetles).

Protect your fruit trees by using good sanitation measures. Sanitation can be simple, inexpensive and effective if you allow it to be. The first thing you should do is to remove dead branches and rotted, mummified fruit from your trees. Then make sure you remove plant debris, such as leaves, bark and sticks.

Use caution when you apply pesticides. Apply sprays as a mist of fine droplets, under adequate pressure. Cover twigs, leaves, blossoms and fruit when you spray.

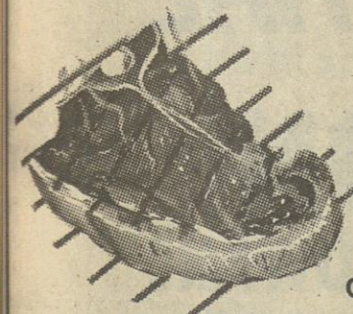

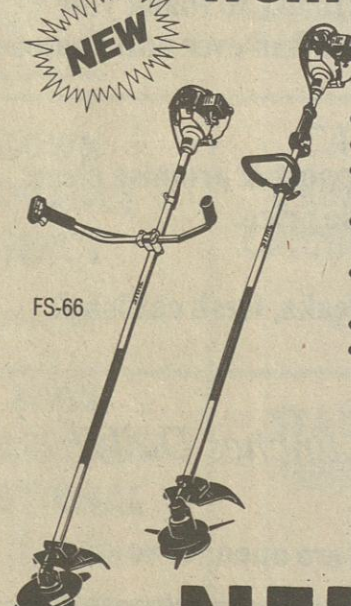

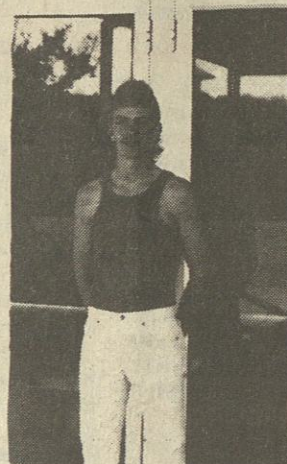
