New State Law Permits Bad Check Restitution

District attorneys will be authorized to assist merchants and private citizens in obtaining restitution for bad checks under a new state law, Representative Mack Loyd Wadkins of Iuka says.

"I am pleased Governor Ray Mabus has signed this important legislation. Many of us have been working a long time to get this bill enacted. It gives us a valuable new tool to deal with the problem

of bad checks in Mississippi," Wadkins said.

One of the last bills to win final passage in the 1988 legislative session, the measure permits district attorneys to help complainants in the recovery and distribution of restitution from people accused of violating bad check laws.

The law, which takes effect July 1, establishes a procedure for processing bad

check complaints and authorizes district attorneys to collect a \$40 fee from the accused as part of a restitution agreement. Terms of restitution agreements will be determined on a case-by-case basis by the district attorney.

In addition, the bill amends an existing law to require courts to impose a fee upon conviction amounting to 85 percent of the amount of the

checks in cases involving complaints filed under the new statute.

These fees will be deposited in a special Criminal Justice Fund and will be in addition to other penalties or restitution ordered by the court.

Wadkins, the principal author of the bill, said the legislation was designed to discourage the issuance of bad checks as well as provide a better system of restitution. He said it was strongly endorsed by the Retail Association of Mississippi.

"The bad check problem in Mississippi is costing consumers well over \$10 million each year. The bill passed this year will reduce this problem to almost nothing. It is the most significant piece of retail legislation to be passed in many, many years," said Spence M. Dye, President of the state Retail Association.

Wadkins represents House District 1 in Tishomingo and Alcorn Counties. He has been a member of the Legislature since 1980.

Unemployment In County Continues To Decline

According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County continued to decline at mid-March. An estimated 1,010 persons were unemployed at mid-month, some 150 below the February estimate and 1,290 below the estimate for March, 1987. The current rate of unemployment was estimated to be 13.8 percent, compared to 16.6 percent last month and 28.1 percent in March, one year ago. The number of county residents employed rose to

6,330, slightly above the February estimate and 450 above the estimate for March, 1987.

Employment in manufacturing jobs located in Tishomingo County stood at 2,650, only minimally below the last estimate but 150 above the estimate for March, one year ago. Nonmanufacturing jobs were estimated to be 2,750, slightly above last month's figure but 180 over one year ago.

Smith noted that the civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tip-

pah, and Tishomingo lost 950 from February and 1,350 from March, one year ago. The estimated unemployed showed a decrease of 1,240 from the prior month and 3,260 from March of the past year.

Employment in manufacturing jobs at mid-March totaled 18,280, up 30 from February and up 450 from March, one year ago. Nonmanufacturing industries had an estimated 22,160 persons employed at the reporting period, up 90 from the previous month and 660 over the March, 1987 estimate.

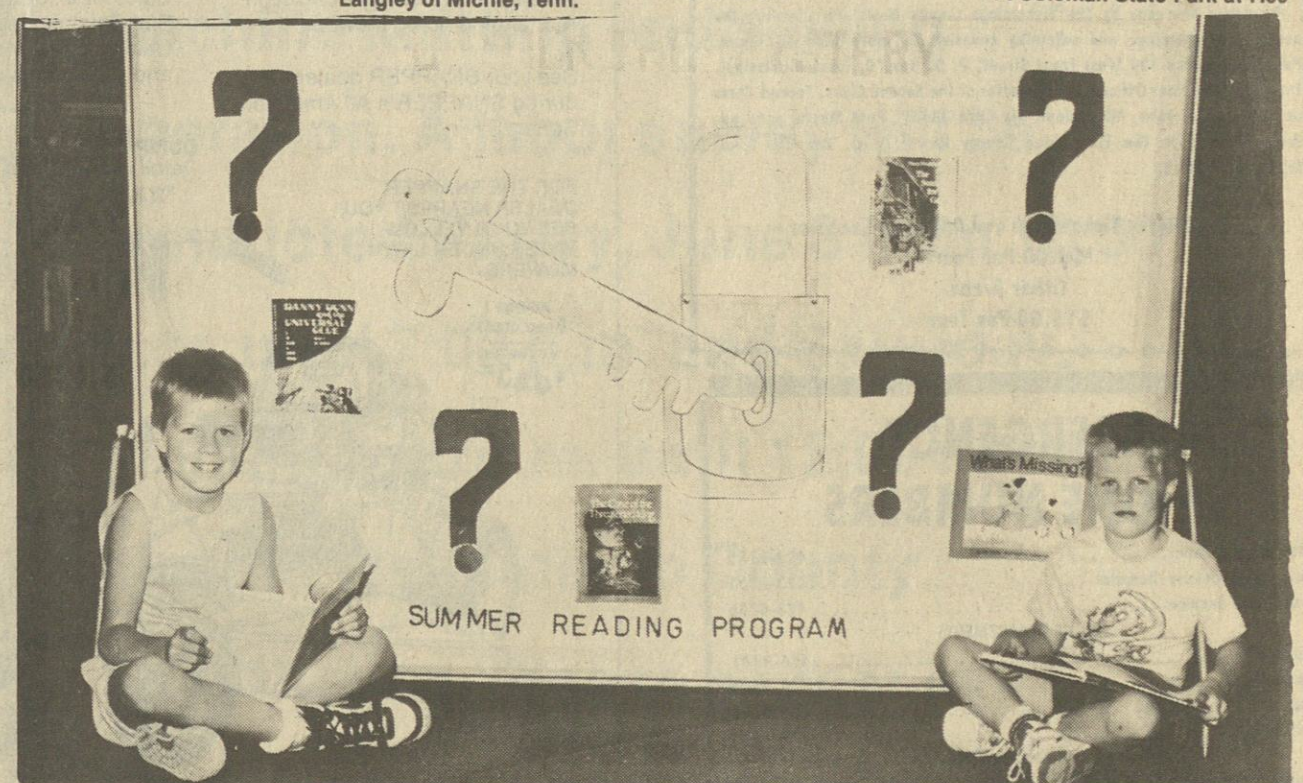

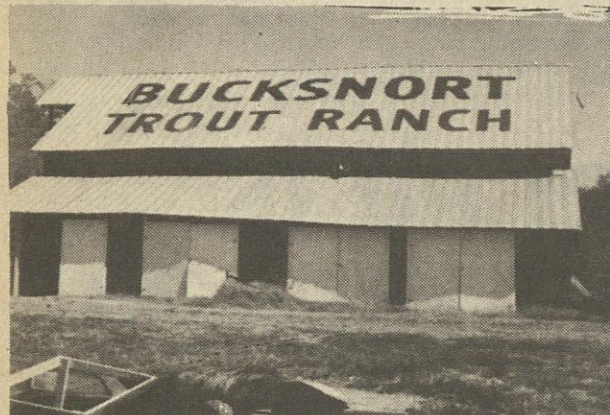
Burnsville Elderly Take Wagon Ride

On October 21, 1987, the Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District purchased 215 rainbow trout from the Bucksnort Trout Ranch. These 215, 6-inch fish were transferred to

Tishomingo County and placed in a local spring to test the possibility of raising trout in Mississippi. Since October 20, these fingerlings were fed 300 pounds of trout feed and 200 pounds of catfish feed and have reached the weight

They were also entertained with a slide presentation on white-tailed deer management and a discussion on the potential of rainbow trout in Tishomingo County.

tainers depends on the type of food to be frozen, personal preference and the types that are readily available. Foods in larger containers freeze too slowly to result in a satisfactory product. For example, do not freeze fruits and vegetables in a container larger than a half a gallon. It takes too long for them to freeze, and the quality will be poor.

There are two types of packaging materials for use in home freezing: rigid containers and flexible bags or wrap made for freezer use. If the label on the packaging material does not state that the material is made for freezing, it probably is not.

Rigid containers made of plastic or glass are suitable for all packs of food. They are especially good if the food is to be packed in a liquid.

Covers for rigid containers should fit tightly. If they do not, reinforce the seal with freezer tape. Freezer tape is especially designed to stick at freezing temperatures. Do not use masking tape because it will not stick at the lower temperatures of your freezer.

Bags and sheets of moisture proof materials are labeled freezer bags or freezer wrap. Protective cardboard cartons may be used to protect the freezer wrap. Protective cardboard cartons may be used to protect the freezer bags from tearing and to make stacking easier.

It is no bargain to use recycled plastic vegetable or bread bags or cottage cheese, ice cream or milk containers. They are not vapor proof and foods frozen in them will lose their moisture, flavor and nutrients.

Remember, in order to make the most of your freezer, to maintain the

quality of your food, to receive the most from your freezer, to maintain the quality of your food and to receive the most nutritional value possible from your foods, always use proper freezer containers.

SWISS STEAK

1 lb. boneless lean round steak
Dash pepper
1 tbsp. margarine
1 tbsp. worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. dried mustard
1 (6 oz.) can sliced mushrooms
1 cup canned tomatoes

Sprinkle salt, pepper, and dry mustard over meat, then pound with mallet. Cut into 4 equal servings. Brown meat in margarine. Drain off excess fat. Add worcestershire sauce, tomatoes, and juice from mushrooms to steak. Cover tightly and cook for 1 1/2 hours or until meat is tender. Add water, if necessary, skim off any excess fat. Add mushrooms to heat thoroughly. Makes 6 servings.

In response to a letter to you in the April 21, 1988, edition of the Tishomingo County News concerning the two kinds of fishermen, I would like to add to this letter another type.

I am a commercial fisherman in and around Pickwick Lake. I make my living by the amount of fish I catch each day and my equipment (such as nets and lines) are essential to my profession.

Lately, I have gone out to find that expensive lines and nets have been ruined by careless fishermen who have cut their hooks out of my lines and nets at places where it takes expensive repairs to mend. This is just not necessary. Also, the nets are being emptied of the fish in them.

I fish approximately 1,000 yards of nets, which I must buy tags for. I begin my day at about 6:30 a.m. each morning and end at about 9:00 at night and my livelihood is being threatened by dishonest and careless people who don't realize that what they are

Radio Collection Holds Memories

When Dr. Edward Foote decided to begin a collection of equipment chronicling the history of mass media, he discovered antique radios are much more portable than antique printing presses.

The University of North Alabama associate professor of radio, television and film made this discovery when he tried to move a 2000-pound 1920 printing press into his garage.

"I began collecting while I worked at the Ohio Educational Network. I began collecting old printing presses, but after I had difficulty putting my first piece in my garage with an auto wrecker I saw radios require less space and finances," the Tishomingo County, Mississippi, native said. Dr. Foote is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Avon Foote of Iuka.

Today his collection consists of representative radios from the early days of electronic media.

His prize radio is a 1923 Radiola Senior manufactured by Westinghouse.

"This radio is often pic-

tured in books and magazines about antique radios," said Foote. "What's interesting is that the radios pictured are all in museums and mine appears to be in much better condition."

The radio was actually manufactured in 1922, according to the date engraved on the radio. The first station in the country, KDKA of Pittsburgh, had only been on the air for two years when the set was made. The receiver also had a strong tie to the state of Alabama.

"This radio is a regenerative receiver and this is significant because the father of radio, Lee de Forest, was reared at Talladega," said Foote. "Even though he invented the radio somewhere else, he got a lot of his early motivation to be an inventor while he lived in Alabama."

The receiver has only one tube and is contained in a hinged, mahogany box. Because there's no speaker, a listener had to wear heavy headphones to hear a broadcast.

"I have the original 'Matched tone' head sets that come from the same time period," Foote said.

A second member of his collection is a 1933 Majestic that holds special memories for the professor.

"It was real meaningful for me to get the radio because when I was a child we had a Majestic in our home. It was a different type, but it really sparks memories for me," he

said.

The radio is a cathedral style set that was converted to operate on electricity decades ago. Dr. Foote got this radio from an antique store.

"I traded a 1946 Zenith Transoceanic radio that I brought from a friend. The Majestic's case was all beat up and had to be refinished. It also didn't work, but I restored it electrically after acquiring the schematics from the company in Chicago that originally made the radio. Today it works on newer tubes but on the original circuitry."

The member of his collection that represents the final years of the radio era is a Zenith table model from the late 1940's. "This is a fairly interesting radio because it is one of the very earliest FM radios. It has two FM bands and that's very rare because the Federal Communications Commission directed manufacturers not to make that kind of FM unit. Apparently some of the sets were already on the production line and were permitted to be sold. Today there's nothing on the second band," he said.

The radio is almost art-deco in design, made of hard plastic with a gold dial in front of the speaker.

"It's a classic design that no one has attempted to make since," Foote said.

"My interest in radios began when I was a teenager. Back then, I built a crystal radio from a kit and learned

that was the type of radio for early listeners," he said.

He also credits the late Jo Van Sandt, one of the first managers of WLAY in Muscle Shoals, for his interest.

The Child Find Director implements child identification, location and evaluation of children birth through twenty-one who are handicapped, regardless of the severity of their handicaps, and who are in need of special education and/or related services. The Child Find Director works with the local Headstart, Welfare, Health and Mental Health agencies, as well as local education agencies, physicians and other individuals to identify and locate children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services.

Once a referral is made, it is the responsibility of the Child Find Director to insure that the Referral-to-Placement procedures are followed. The director works with Local Survey Committees at each school to implement this procedure. The following activities briefly describe the procedures.

Prior to evaluation, a copy of the Parent Information Pamphlet and Procedural Safeguards are given to parents. District personnel explain the Parent Information Pamphlet to parents and insure that they understand the Procedural Safeguards.

After parental consent for testing is obtained, a non-discriminatory evaluation is conducted. Students are evaluated in all areas related to the suspected disability by qualified personnel.

Parents are notified when a student is ruled eligible for a special education program. An Individual Educational Plan is developed for the student before the student is placed. Parents must sign permission for placement. Parents, teacher and students participate in this process. All students receiving special

Limited funds are available for high priority practices which include Establishment of Permanent Grasses, Terrace Systems, No-Till Systems, and Tree Planting. Farm owners, operators or tenants who have soil erosion problems can request cost-share assistance at the ASCS

office. ACP applicants should report completion of practices as soon as possible so that cost-share payments can be made on a timely basis.

—May 31—

Last Day for Crop Loans
Farmers are reminded that May 31 is the last day to obtain price support loans on their 1987-crop corn, sorghum, cotton and soybeans. The loans have a nine-month maturity date with variable monthly interest rates.

County loan rates are \$1.90 per bushel for corn, \$3.21 per bushel for sorghum, \$4.83 per

bushel for soybeans, and \$5.325 per pound for cotton. Each loan rate is based on national average rate that varies from county to county to reflect prices received by farmers, production and consumption trends and transportation costs.

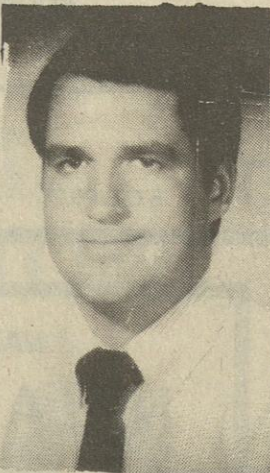
