The Iuka Dixie Boys All-Star baseball team has advanced to the State Tournament being held July 23-28 in Hattiesburg. The team will be playing the Hattiesburg team Saturday, July 23 at 8:00 a.m. for their first game of the tourney.

Recently these 13 and 14 olds competed in the District Tournament held July 13 in Baldwyn.

On Wednesday, July 6, Iuka defeated the Marietta team in a final score of 15-5. The winning pitcher was Mike Osborn who had seven strikeouts and a no-hitter during three innings he pitched. Relief pitcher Chris Cornelison, who pitched the

remaining two innings of the game, had seven strike-outs and allowed 3 hits. Also during this game, Chris Cornelison was four for five with three triples; Heath Ham was two for two; Kevin Senter had two hits; and Mike Osborn, Jason Cutshall, Shane Kramer, Scott Murphy and Reuben Massey all had a hit.

During the Thursday night game Iuka scored 15 against Baldwyn, who had 11. Winning pitcher was Kevin Senter who in his two innings pitching had four strike-outs and only allowed two hits. In hitting, Chris Cornelison had three for three with two doubles, Brad Enlow had four for five with two doubles,

Kevin Senter had two hits, a double and a triple and Mike Osborn had two hits. Others with one hit each were Shane Kramer, Ben McAnally and Reuben Massey.

The last game of the District Tournament, played on Friday, July 8, was also won by the Iuka team with an impressive 21-5 score over the Baldwyn team. Chris Cornelison was winning pitcher. He also was three for four with a "grand slam". Heath Ham had two for two in the game. Having two hits each

Raids By City Police Lead To Five Arrests

A search of two houses recently in Iuka led to five arrests, Iuka officials reported.

A burglary call on Tuesday, June 21, led Iuka Police Officers to an address on N. Fulton St. in Iuka. After reaching the residence, IPD

arrested Jimmy Lambert on burglary charges.

After further investigation of the incidents at the residence, drug use was suspected, stated official reports. Following a search of the home, after permission was given by the resident, a

substance that appeared to be cocaine was found.

Officials have reported that Sandra Lambert and Danny Sanders were arrested and charged with possession of cocaine.

All individuals involved were jailed and are now out on \$5,000 bond each.

Officers from the Iuka Police Department involved in the arrests were Danny James, Ricky Cornelison and Bobby Flynt.

In another incident, IPD, working from a tip from an unidentified source, put a house on West Ash Street under surveillance, reports indicated.

After watching the house and seeing known drug users

enter and exit the home, a search warrant was obtained.

On Tuesday, July 12, Earnest K. Goss, 25 and Sarah Cowell, 28, were found in the possession of several bags of what appeared to be marijuana, stated officials. The substance has been sent to the state crime lab to be analyzed.

Paraphernalia was also found at the residence.

Both Goss and Cowell were arrested for possession of marijuana with intent to sale. Bond was set at \$5,000 each and both have been released on bond, according to police reports.

Iuka Policemen present during the raid were Red Taylor, Bobby Flynt, Rick Cornelison and Benny Parrish.

Death of Belmont Man Under Investigation

The life of a Tishomingo County man was taken early Wednesday morning, July 20 at his home, according to unofficial reports given to the News office.

The reports indicated that Randy Milam was shot to death in his home in the Moore's Mill Road Community near Belmont around

5:30 a.m. Wednesday. Details surrounding the incident were still sketchy at press time.

Further investigations into the death were being made by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Wednesday morning and no statements were available at press time.

Whitten Announces Emergency Farm Loans

Tishomingo County is one of three (3) counties in Northeast Mississippi declared eligible for emergency farm loans because they boarder 67 counties in Alabama that have been declared Natural Disaster Areas due to drought damage," Congressman Jamie Whitten said.

Tishomingo County along with Itawamba and Monroe Counties were included in the declaration.

Eligible farmers in those counties can apply for emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration.

To be eligible, farmers must have had Federal Crop Insurance, where available.

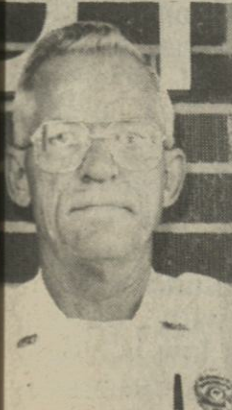

King stated that with the new owners, the Iuka location will be getting some new employees to help them give the best service possible to their customers.



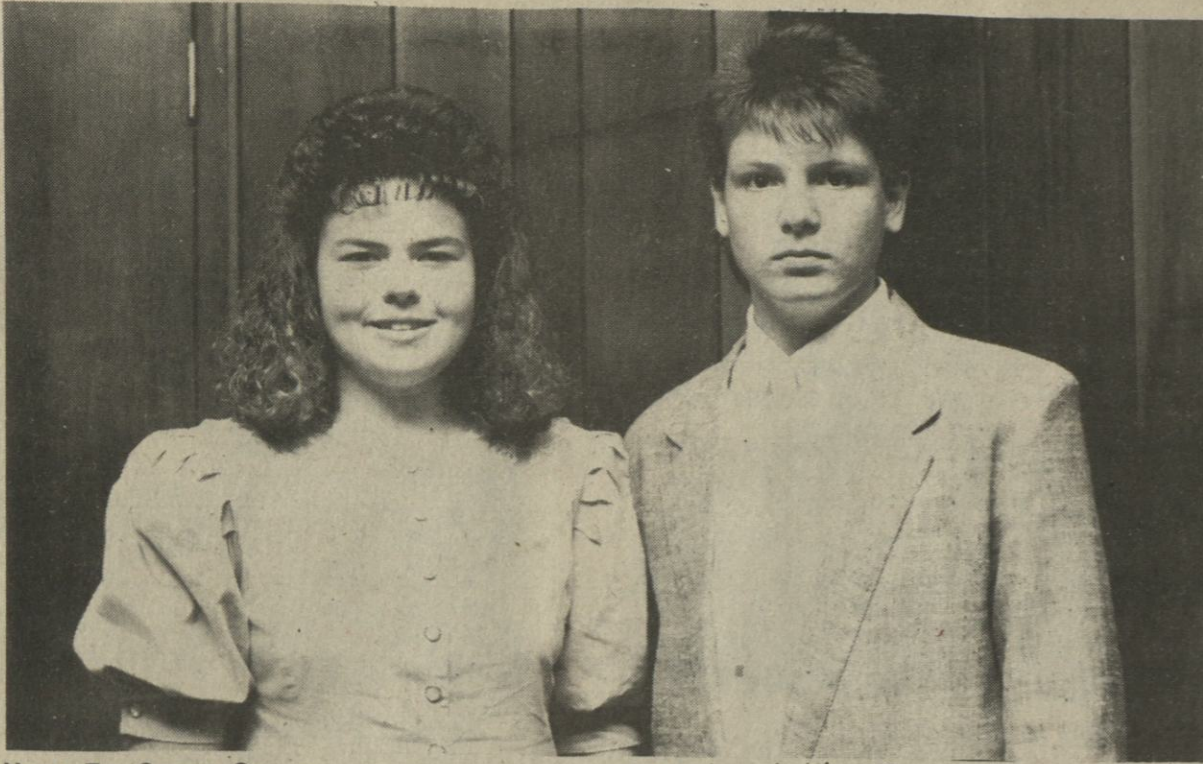
Davis Home Destroyed By Fire

The home of Mr. and Mrs. G.E. "Tipp" Davis located in the Crossroads Community just off Hwy 25 N., was destroyed Friday evening, July 15 by a fire, the cause of which is unknown. According to Mrs. Davis, her husband

and her mother, who is an invalid, were at home when the fire was discovered. She went on to explain that after her mother was removed from the house and the fire departments were called, the house was already engulfed

with flames. "The few items we saved were pretty much ruined by the water," stated Mrs. Davis. Fire Departments who responded to the call were North Crossroads, Burnsville and Coleman Park. Ricky Cummings of the Burnsville Fire Department

stated that it took approximately two hours to bring the flames under control. He said that after the fire started, it was estimated that it only took about 30 minutes for the house to completely be covered in flames.

mends a schedule allowing people who work in hot environments to acclimatize over a six-day period. On the first day, they should perform at about 50 percent of the normal working level and increase the workload by 10 percent each succeeding day.

People at particular risk of heat illnesses include the elderly and those with conditions such as diabetes, heart disease, arteriosclerosis, high blood pressure, and Parkinson's disease.

Conditions that reduce the capacity to sweat such as skin diseases and burns increase risk, as do some medications. People who have had heat disorders before also face increased risk.

"Once sensitized, they're more prone to recurrences," Dr. Longest said.

Heat stroke is the most serious heat illness, and is recognized as a medical emergency. According to the National Center for Health Statistics, 2,386 people died of heat stroke in 1983, the latest year with available statistics.

When the body temperature exceeds 106 degrees Fahrenheit, its cooling mechanisms fail to function, resulting in heat stroke. It can be fatal if not treated immediately.

Symptoms of heat stroke include a high body temperature, nausea, dizziness, accelerated pulse rate, confusion, convulsions and unconsciousness.

Most victims of heat stroke will have red, dry skin in-

Fluid Intake A Must To Avoid Heat Illness

Drinking plenty of fluids this summer is especially important because this year's combination of higher-than-normal temperatures and lower-than-normal humidity increases the amount of fluid the body loses through perspiration.

Adequate fluid levels in the body are necessary to avoid heat-related illnesses such as heat stroke, heat exhaustion, heat syncope, heat cramps, and heat rash.

Temperatures are up to ten degrees higher than normal for this time of year, according to Dr. Charles Wax, state climatologist at Mississippi State University. Lack of rainfall during the drought has caused humidity to be very low, he said.

"The sweat evaporates off

your body and you may not realize how much water you're losing," Wax said. During humid weather, perspiration—the body's mechanism for cooling—evaporates at a slower rate because the surrounding air is more saturated.

Thirst is not always an accurate indicator of the body's need for water. On the average, the body loses about 2.5 quarts of sweat per day, but during strenuous work or play, it can lose up to 3.5

quarts per hour, according to an article in Consumers' Research Magazine.

Inadequate water intake and overexertion by unconditioned or unacclimatized people are major causes of heat illnesses, said Dr. John Longest, director of the Student Health Center at Mississippi State University. Acclimatization refers to a person's adjustment to heat conditions.

The National Institute for Occupational Safety recom-

ending that perspiration has stopped, but in exertional heat stroke, the victim might still be sweating profusely.

Victims should be cooled and transported to a medical facility as soon as possible to prevent brain damage or death. The victim can be cooled by immersion in cold water or by application of cold compresses; using a fan will facilitate the cooling

process. Victims should NOT be given liquids to drink.

Heat exhaustion is not as serious as heat stroke and usually has no long-lasting effects. This condition results when fluid lost by excessive sweating causes a reduced blood volume. Symptoms are normal or sub-normal body temperature; clammy and moist skin; dizziness, headache, weak,

rapid pulse, and feeling of weakness. Heat cramps use the muscles in the can affect any fatigued during work or exercise. Heat cramps are treated by gently stretching the muscle and drinking a salt solution. A teaspoon of salt per quart of water is a good solution.

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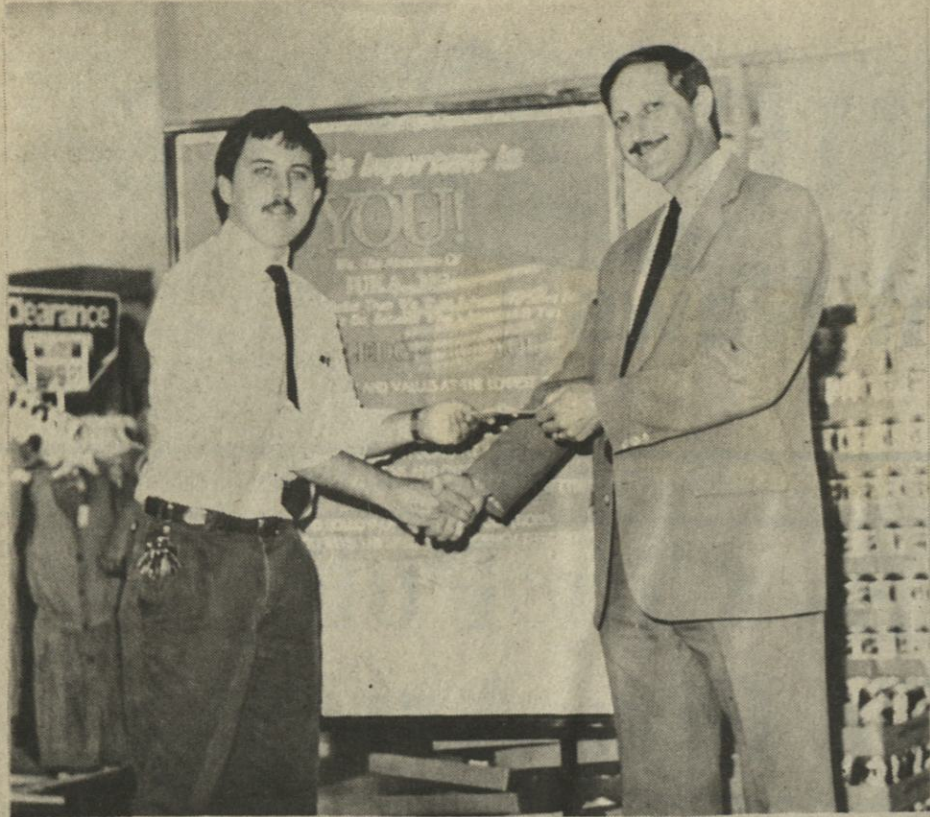

ASCS Farm News

The seventh Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) sign-up began July 18, 1988 and will continue through August 5, 1988. The purpose of the Conservation Reserve Program is to encourage farmers, through 10 year contracts with USDA, to stop

growing crops on highly erodible cropland and plant it to a protective cover of grass or trees. It also reduces sedimentation and improves water quality. The Conservation Reserve Program is authorized by the Food Security Act of 1985. The program has been changed to include filter strips as an eligible practice. Filter strips, cropland areas 66-99 feet wide with a permanent cover, next to

streams, lakes and estuaries are eligible for CRP even if the soil erosion criteria is not met on cropland. Areas designated as filter strips must be adjacent and parallel to streams having perennial flow, seasonal streams (except gullies and sod waterways), or other water bodies of a permanent nature (including wetlands) with water areas of not less than five surface acres. Filter strip areas substantially reduce additional sediment that is being delivered to the stream or water body.

Annual rental payments of up to \$50,000 per year will be made to farm owners or operators who enter a contract to convert eligible land to permanent vegetative cover. Payment will be made in cash or negotiable payment-in-kind certificates. Rental payments will not affect the total amount of payments a farmer is eligible to receive through other programs.

At the time of application, producers must submit bids stating annual rental payment they would accept to convert their highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetative cover.

In addition to the rental payment, the Commodity Credit Corporation will pay up to 50% of the cost of establishing permanent vegetative cover. Eligible practices are Permanent Tame Specie Cover Establishment, Permanent Native Specie Cover Establishment, Forest Tree Plantations, Permanent Wildlife Habitat, Field Windbreak Establishment, Shallow Water Areas for Wildlife, and Vegetative Filter Strips. Except to provide for haying, grazing or forestry after termination of the CRP contract, cost-sharing will not be approved "to specifically enhance or change the commercial production." Producers may still improve the land at their own expense, but under no circumstances are ornamental, nut or fruit trees allowed on CRP land. Cost-sharing will be approved only for vegetative cover that is adaptable to the area without excessive cost.

The producer must pay the total cost of any irrigation needed to establish or maintain vegetative cover. No cost sharing will be authorized for fencing CRP land. Vegetative filter strips must be established 1.0 to 1.5 chain

lengths in width unless additional width is needed to meet the SCS field Office Technical Guide criteria from the cropline boundary adjacent and parallel to eligible streams and other water bodies.

Eligibility is limited to predominantly "highly erodible" cropland unless the area is devoted to a filter strip. Highly erodible land offered shall meet one or more of the following criteria:

1. An erodibility index equal to or greater than 8 for either wind or water erosion, with an erosion rate a. Calculated with cover and maintenance, and practice factors reflecting the crop years 1981 through 1985. b. Greater than that recommended by the SCS Field Office Technical Guide.
2. An erosion rate of 3T or greater if land capability class is II, III, IV, or V.
3. An erosion rate of 2T or greater if land capability class is II, III, IV or V and a serious gully erosion problem exists.
4. Land capability class VI, VII or VIII regardless of the erosion rate.
5. An erosion rate of 2T or greater if land capability class is II, III, IV or V and trees will be established on the designated acres.

Cropland is defined as land that has been tilled annually to produce an agricultural commodity other than orchards, vineyards, or ornamental planting or has been set aside in a production adjustment program in two of the crop years from 1981-1985 and is suitable for crop production. Land designated as set-aside or diverted acres in a current production adjustment program is not eligible for a 1988 contract.

"Commodities" include any crop planted and produced by annual tilling of the soil, or an annual basis by one-trip planters. Sugar cane is a commodity. Plus, Alfalfa or other multiyear grasses and legumes in rotation with an annual crop are also considered "commodities" for the purpose of CRP eligibility.

A conservation plan must be approved by the local conservation district for the offered acreage. The plan will set forth the conservation measures and maintenance to be carried out by the owner or operator during the term of the contract.

Bases, quotas, and allotments will be reduced by the ratio of the acreage put in to the program to cropland on

the farm. The producer will choose which bases, quotas, or allotments will be reduced over the life of the contract. Reduction in bases, allotments, or quotas due to participation in CRP will be reinstated after contract termination providing subsequent annual program legislation provides for bases, allotments and quotas.

Haying and grazing are not permitted during the contract period. Cleaning of grain or crop residue is considered part of the harvesting operation.

Owners will share payments with tenants and sharecroppers on a fair and equitable bases. Farms which have had an ownership change since January 1, 1985, are generally not eligible. Participants who lose control of reserve land must refund payments unless the new owner or operator continues the contract.

Agencies involved in the Conservation Reserve Program are: Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service, State Forestry agencies and local soil and water conservation districts. Applicants may obtain further information from any of these agencies.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

JOB FRAUDS AND SCHEMES

If a job opportunity in the want ads sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Dishonest companies tempt job seekers with two kinds of offers: employment services and work-at-home schemes.

Fraudulent employment services promise nonexistent jobs, such as employment abroad, skilled jobs requiring no experience and jobs with six-figure salaries. Or, they may charge you for information and counseling that you can get free from other places, such as the local employment office.

Never send money through the mail for employment assistance. Even if the company offers a guarantee or a refund, you can't be sure the company will respond or even

be there when you want your money back.

Licensed agencies have a general manager who has passed a state examination. The license has to be posted in the office where you can see it. The agency must give you a copy of your contract stating the fees you will be charged, how long you have to pay and the method of payment.

Be sure to read your contract carefully and understand any other promises included in it. These agencies cannot charge you a fee before you get a job. Before signing a contract, be sure you understand what you will have to pay.

Fraudulent work-at-home offers sound easy and rewarding by promising large sums of money for a few hours of work. But, they are designed to take your cash and give little or nothing in return.

One of the more common offers is for part-time work stuffing envelopes. You send money to get information about the job, but once you pay the fee you find the company is not offering work. It merely sends you a booklet explaining how you can place such an ad in your local paper and trick other people into sending money to you.

A different scheme offers cash in exchange for goods produced at home. You buy the materials from the company to make the goods and then mail the finished product to them. The company may then refuse to buy the finished goods, saying they are not up to standard. You lose the money spent on materials and postage, and the company has made its profit selling you the materials.

Other schemes involve setting up a business operated from home, such as selling cards, bronzing baby shoes or raising small animals. They all require a large investment to buy materials and equipment from the company with no guarantee customers will want to buy the goods.

Ads promising large amounts of cash in exchange for work done at home rarely deliver what they promise. A few work-at-home schemes are legitimate, but honest companies will be willing to give information about their opportunities before you send a fee or make an investment.

You should be suspicious of any offer that promises information after you have sent a check. If a contract is involved, don't sign without having a lawyer check it out first.

CONTACTS AND THE NATURAL LOOK

Millions of people wear contact lenses today. Contact lenses correct vision problems, in most cases better than glasses do. But they have the advantage of giving your face a "natural" look. Unless you tell them, others would never know you're wearing corrective lenses.

They do require more care than glasses. And, like glasses, they should be prescribed and fitted by a professional. Because they float on the tears over the eye, however, extra care must be taken in keeping them clean and germ-free. Your eye specialist will show you how con-

tact lenses should be applied and removed. This must be done carefully hygienically. Both eyes and your contact lenses should be checked periodically by your optometrist. If you follow the rules, contact lenses serve your correction vision needs even better than glasses. Contact lenses give more natural vision (especially peripheral) because they are closer to the eye. In fact, in "contact" the cornea) glasses must be about a half-inch from it.

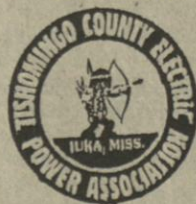

A new law concerning activities in proximity to electric power lines went into effect July 1, 1988.

Under this law (House Bill No. 1265), if a person is going to perform a function or activity that could be reasonably expected to cause persons, equipment or parts of tools or materials to be brought within ten feet of an electric utility's lines, it is unlawful for that person to proceed with such function or activity until (1) the electric utility has been notified in writing on a form to be provided by the utility; and (2) the utility has made safety arrangements to deter contact with utility lines. Any person who violates this law is subject to the imposition of civil penalties and other liabilities.

Better Eating, Better Health

The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and the Red Cross are combining their nutrition expertise this year in an attempt to save lives of many Mississippians.

Six out of 10 of the leading causes of death in Mississippi list poor diet as a contributing factor, according to Barbara McLaurin, and extension human nutrition

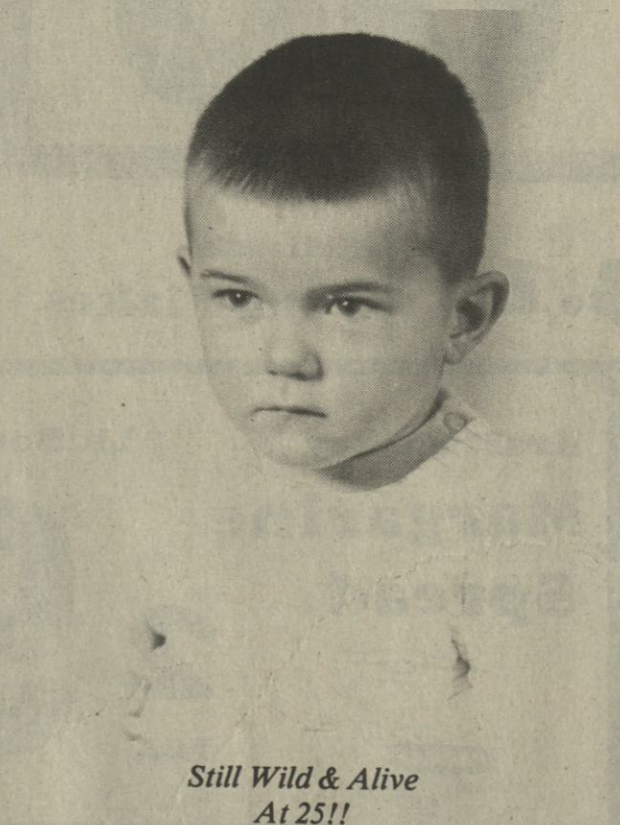
specialist. "But many people still don't understand the vital relationship between diet and health," she said. "Heart disease, high blood pressure and even cancer are some of the health problems that may be avoided by eating a sensible diet."

The new program, "Better Eating for Better Health," focuses on changing the attitude of participants and making them aware of new dietary information that could save their lives.

"The problem is many people don't know any more about right than they learned in grade school health class years ago," McLaurin said. "Suggestions for healthy eating have changed since then and people need to be aware of these changes."

The 12-hour course goes beyond teaching the basic four food groups. Dietary Guidelines for Americans, a set of seven rules on nutrition basics that insure a diet balanced in nutrients without too much of other food components are a major thrust of the course.

"Simply, these guidelines recommend eating a variety of foods, maintaining a desirable weight, avoiding too much fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, sugar and sodium, eating foods with

Controlling Summer Pests On Pets

4-H'ers involved in the Pet Care Project and those who just love their pets should keep their dogs and cats healthy and comfortable by controlling parasites such as fleas, ticks and mange mites.

Ridding your pets of these pesky parasites also will help keep your house and yard safer for you and your family. It is usually easier to control parasites on the pet and in their pens than to control them after they have infested your house, so take heed.

Fleas are small wingless insects with hard, dark colored bodies. They normally feed only on the host animal, but will attack humans in the absence of their host.

To help control fleas, keep the pet's sleeping quarters clean by removing and burying feces, and by changing bedding periodically. If you find fleas in the house, vacuum the house thoroughly and frequently.

Remove lint and dust found in cracks and crevices along floorboards, baseboards, and in the pet's sleeping area to

reduce the likelihood of breeding and reproduction.

Ticks are a major pest of dogs, especially if dogs are allowed to run loose. Ticks are important to control from a health standpoint because they transmit diseases such as Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

When you find a tick on a person or animal, remove it immediately. The best method is to gently pull tick off with tweezers, grasping it as closely as possible to its point of attachment. After removing the tick, always treat the wound with a good germicidal agent.

To reduce ticks around the house, eliminate dense, woody underbrush and cut grass and other vegetation along paths and walks. Eliminating mice, gophers, rabbits and other rodents may also help reduce ticks.

Mites burrowing into the skin can cause a mange infection in your pet. There are three types of mange: Red mange, found on the eyes, nose and forelegs of dogs; Sarcoptic mange, found on the head of dogs, causing wrinkled, thickened skin covered with a yellowish crust; and Otodectic mange, confined to the inner ear of both dogs and cats, causing a gray deposit in the ear.

Pests can be controlled with chemicals found in dust, spray, and dip forms, among others. One way to help control parasites is with flea and tick collars, which are treated with chemicals.

Only use chemicals with an adult present. Always read the label and follow every safety precaution. Treatments for dogs and cats are often different, so be sure you have the correct product for your pet.

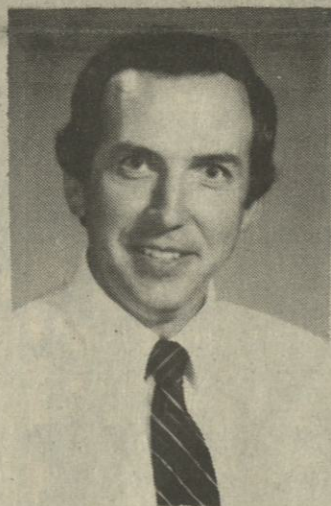

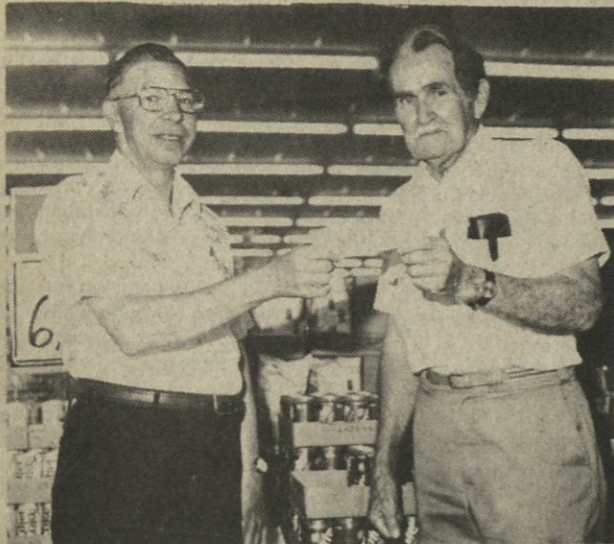

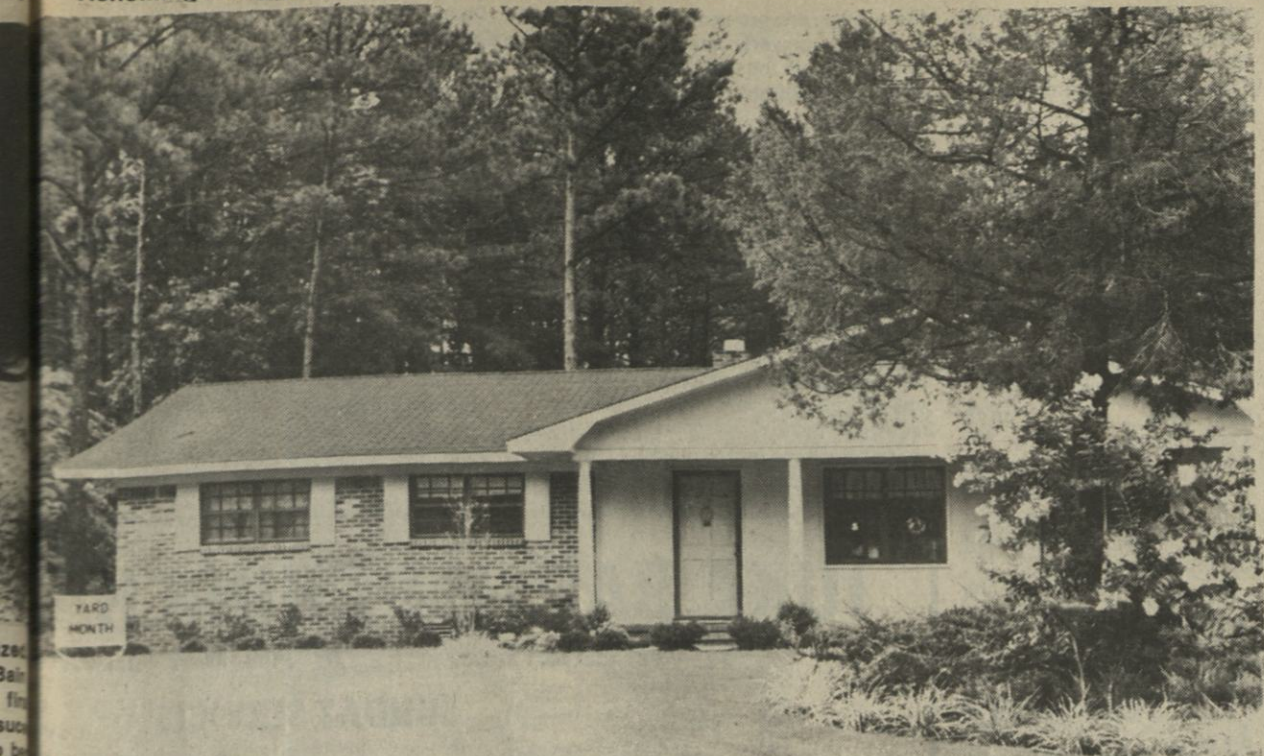

Tenn-Tom Today

Since completion of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, traffic has increased continuously. Commercial tonnages have increased tremendously in the last few weeks and will continue to increase for the next few months. Due to the lack of water in the Mississippi River, more barges are using the waterway.

An average tow of eight barges can move as much freight as 120 rail cars or 480 tractor trailer trucks. Barge transportation requires less energy than any other type of

transportation. A barge can move a ton of freight twice as far as a train and six times as far as a tractor trailer truck on the same amount of fuel. Barges are best suited for carrying bulk cargo. Coal and other energy products make up about 70 percent of the commerce traveling on the waterway. Other cargos include ores, chemicals, and grains.

Boaters that used the navigation channel of the waterway should keep to the starboard or right side when meeting oncoming traffic. Boaters should reduce speed sufficiently to prevent any damage when approaching another boat, in motion, or tied up. Boaters should slow down to just above idle speed when passing dredges or

Ask Ochsner

Q. When going swimming, I always use suntan lotion to protect my skin from burning. However, sometimes I still end up burned, mostly on my face and shoulders. I thought using the lotion afforded protection. What can I do to protect my skin?

A. The swimming season always brings the possibility of sunburn. Even if the sunburn itself is not serious for you, the fact that the sunburn today will cause the wrinkles of tomorrow and may also lead to the development of skin cancer should make preventive measures a must. Here's the best way to go about literally saving your own skin. Dr. Robert Riet-

schel, an Ochsner Clinic dermatologist, says almost all suntan lotions and oils sold today have a number displayed on the container along with the letters SPF, which stand for skin protection factor. The higher the number, the longer you will be able to stay out in the sun before you start burning.

You can calculate your own skin protection factor by multiplying the number of minutes it takes your skin to burn by the number on the suntan lotion container. For example, if your skin burns in 10 minutes, and if you use an SPF 15 product, you will be able to stay in the sun 15 times longer (in this case about two and a half hours) before starting to burn.

However, if you are perspiring heavily or the lotion comes off when you go swimming, the suntan preparation must be reapplied. Suntan lotions which are waterproof are also available over the counter. For those who have problems of sensitive skin and reaction to sunscreens, an effective alternative would be a PABA-free sunscreen. Dr. Riettschel says that products that have an SPF of 15 or higher are quite acceptable for routine use.

For the face, he recommends using a lotion with a SPF of 15 at all times. The face is one area of the body which is exposed to the sun more than other parts of the body and should be protected daily. Several cosmetics and moisture lotions for both men and women now contain sunscreens which minimize the wrinkling process.

You can take your own preventive measures against skin cancer and wrinkles by paying close attention to the skin protection factor number on the containers of suntan lotions and oils and using them during all exposures to

the sun. And when swimming, remember to reapply the lotion at intervals, he concludes.

A management plan will present a logical, orderly progression toward higher quality products. Your County Forester is available right now to help you start an orderly program that benefits you and those who will follow. Through proper management and harvesting practices your woodlands will mean profit and pleasure instead of a tax burden.

Weekly State Crop Report

Mississippi met acreage intentions for its 1988 row crops despite the drought.

The July crop production report by the U.S. Department of Agriculture showed the state with 1.23 million acres of cotton, 2.4 million acres of soybeans, 275,000 acres of rice and 225,000 acres of corn.

Mississippi farmers plan-

sted 2.5 million acres of soybeans last year. Some agricultural analysts predicted state farmers would plant as many as 2.7 million acres this year, but the drought made even 2 million acres unthinkable a month ago.

"The rains that started two weeks ago have lessened the impact of the drought, and so it hasn't hurt us as much as we thought," said Dr. Bob Williams, economist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. "The chances of the drought having a severe impact on our farmers is still pretty high."

The cotton plantings for 1988 are a significant increase over last year. Farmers planted 1.15 million acres in

1987, and were expected to plant the same this year. "The 80,000-acre surplus was quite a surprise," said Williams, economist. "When we made their planting this year, they were about last year's planting last year's yields." Mississippi averaged 10 million harvested cotton last year, making the second highest state record. State rice production also remembering high and good yields increased their plantings 75,000 acres this year.

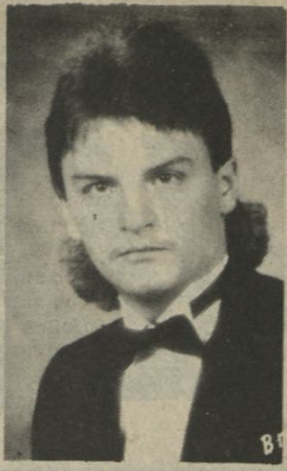

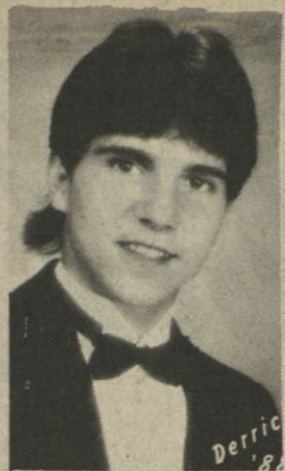

POISONOUS GRAZING
Cattle will eat most anything, particularly when their pastures don't offer them much grass.

Pastures need to be scouted for poisonous plants, especially perilla mint. July is a good month to rid your pastures of this weed. Most cattle deaths occur in August and early September because the plant is particularly poisonous at that stage of growth.

Weedmaster, at rates of 1.5 to 2 pints, should give good control. You can also try several other herbicide mixtures to kill the weed. Come by the office for more information.

SAVING WATER
Outdoor watering uses more water than any household use. And with water in short supply this summer, we need to find areas where we can conserve our water use.

A 1/2 inch garden hose can discharge 360 gallons of water per hour, and three-fourths inch hose can discharge almost four times that rate per hour.

Use good management techniques when you water your lawn and outdoor plants. Overwatering a 5,000 square

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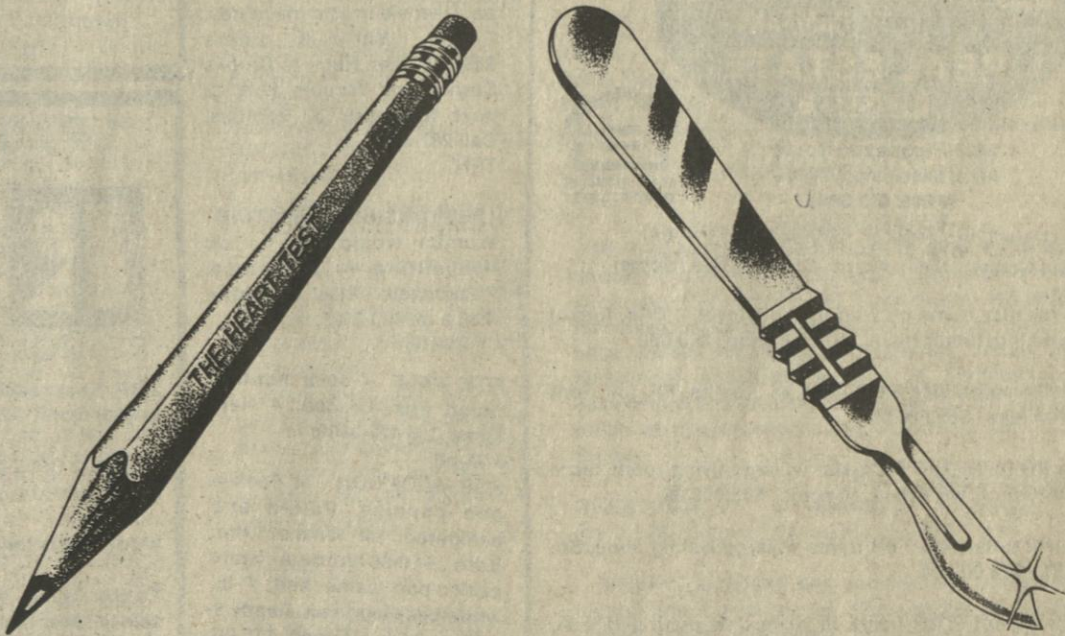

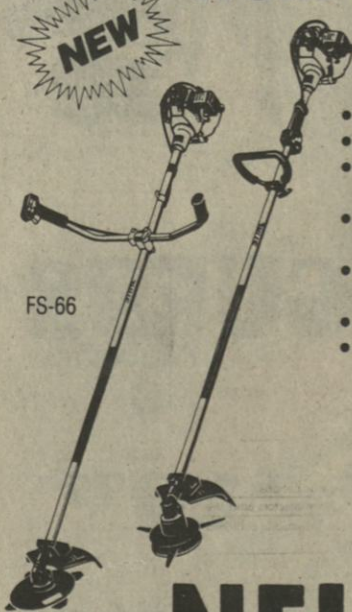
