## Iuka Site Chosen For NASA Rocket Facilities



Original view of Yellow Creek Plant Site - Proposed future home of NASA

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration released the decision after much deliberation that the Yellow Creek Plant located in Tishomingo County near Iuka had been selected as the preferred site for their new government-owned rocket plant.

The new plant, according to a spokesman for NASA, will build an improved design of the solid-fuel rocket boosters used to lift the space shuttle.

Testing of the boosters would take place at the Stennis Space Center, formerly known as the National Space Technology Laboratory, on the Mississippi Gulf Coast in Hancock County, stated sources from the office of Rep. Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.).

There are still two factors remaining that could be stumbling blocks for the Yellow Creek Site. Funding of \$1 billion must be provided by Congress for the project and contractors bidding on the project could recommend a privately owned alternate site in Montgomery, AL. However, NASA officials have stated a preference for the Yellow Creek Site.

Officials have estimated

that the rocket plant will create approximately 1,000 construction positions and an estimated 1,400 positions when full plant operation begins. Construction for the project could begin as soon as the final contracts are reached and funding is approved.

According to reliable sources, NASA is making ground-breaking plans for the abandoned Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant Site located just north of Iuka near J.P. Coleman State Park sometime in February of 1989.

It is estimated by officials from NASA that it will be sometime in 1992 before the end of construction and actual production could begin of the boosters.

Mississippi lawmakers feel that Yellow Creek's potentials outweigh those of the other proposed site. Congressman Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.) stated, "I have tried to be very active in support of the Yellow Creek site, pointing out that water transportation and the millions of dollars saved by using TVA lands makes this clearly the best location. I am greatly pleased at the decision." "The Superconducting, Supercollider has taught Mississippi that

we can compete and win," stated Rep. Trent Lott (D-Miss.)

J.R. Thompson, director of the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, AL., explained that he made the Yellow Creek site choice after a five-member NASA scientist team made their recommendations for the site.

The NASA officials report that the proposed plans for the new plant's product - Advanced Solid Rocket Motors (ASRM) - will be the most modern in the world using robots and automation for the delicate and hazardous jobs.

Yellow Creek has been chosen in part, according to officials, because two huge costs are already being paid for with public funds.

Other advantages crucial in the decision include access to the Tennessee-Tombigbee, which provides an excellent route to the Gulf Coast where the (ASRM's) will be tested. Water transportation is essential for the boosters due to their large size and delicateness. Also the T.V.A. (Tennessee Valley Authority) has also spent \$1 billion previously at the site building buildings, roads, fences, etc. Space agency officials feel that at least \$100 million in

construction costs and a year's building time could be saved at Yellow Creek. There is also adequate alternate transportation modes by several area highways and railroad lines. An abundant labor supply for all phases of construction is also available in the Tishomingo County and entire tri-state area.

Local citizens were elated at the news of NASA's official decision with many commenting that it was the best thing to happen to this area since the nuclear plant and the Tenn-Tom Waterway. It is projected that the NASA decision will greatly boost the ailing economy of the areas in and around Tishomingo County.

Efforts made to acquire the NASA plant demonstrates that a small, rural Mississippi county can make great advancements when its citizens, lawmakers and other officials combine effective political influence, financial lures, determination and cooperation. "Everyone is really excited to hear NASA's decision," stated one official, "We have all worked hard to get this site the recognition it deserves."

## Second Primary Race Slated For Tuesday

The final Democratic primary for the position of Tishomingo County Superintendent of Education will be held Tuesday, August 2, 1988.

The two candidates vying for the position, who were chosen from the field during the July 12th primary election, are Larry Green of Paden and Danny McClung of

Tishomingo.

This second special primary will allow all registered voters in Tishomingo County to cast ballots except for those living in the entire First Supervisor's District, East Burnsville (in the Second Supervisor's District) and East Iuka (in the Third Supervisor's

District), according to a Federal Court Order issued and signed by Judge L.T. Senter, Jr. The order was then approved by the United States Department of Justice, stated officials.

According to a spokesman from the Tishomingo County Election Commission, the winner will be sworn in to of-

fice as soon as possible after the election.

The regular election for the post was postponed from August of last year due to a suit filed against the Tishomingo County Election Commissioners.

Everyone eligible to vote in this election is urged to participate.

## Brutal Slaying Remains A Mystery For Officers

A Golden man's murder is still under investigation after his body was discovered early last Wednesday at his home, stated reports.

Randy Milam, 52, of

Route 1, Golden was pronounced dead at the scene after he had been shot several times in the chest area, according to Dale White, Tishomingo County

Coroner.

Reports further indicated that Milam's wife and daughter were awakened before 6:00 a.m. by what sounded to them like firecrackers in the house. After they left the daughter's bedroom, where they were sleeping, they went to Milam's bedroom and discovered his body.

White stated that according to official reports from an autopsy performed in Jackson, the subject was shot eight times. He went on to explain that "the projectiles (bullets) were removed from the body and have been sent to the State Crime Lab for ballistics identification."

State agents have been called in to aid in the investigation including Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Investigator Junior Rossell and State Crime Scene Specialist Julia James, sources confirm.

Danny Horton, Chief Deputy from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department said that "potential sources of information are being interviewed at present and investigations are continuing," however, he refused to release further information at this time.

Milam was a retired employee of the General Motors Corp. after 20 years.

Services were held Friday, July 22, 1988 at Deaton Funeral Home in Belmont with the Rev. Ronnie Goodwin officiating. Burial was in the Belmont City Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Myra Milam of Golden; two daughters, Angela Milam, Belmont and Joy Milam of Golden; one son, Timmy Milam of Golden; three sisters, Dorothy Bryant of Kossuth, and Linda Lane and Hilda Moore, both of Frankstown; six brothers, Arlo Milam of Joliet, Ill., Ray Milam of Hartselle, Al., Chester Milam of Detroit, Mich., James Milam of Corinth, A.E. Milam of Golden and Jessie Milam of Red Bay, AL.

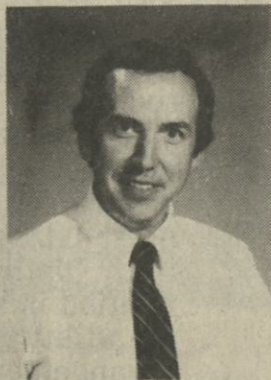

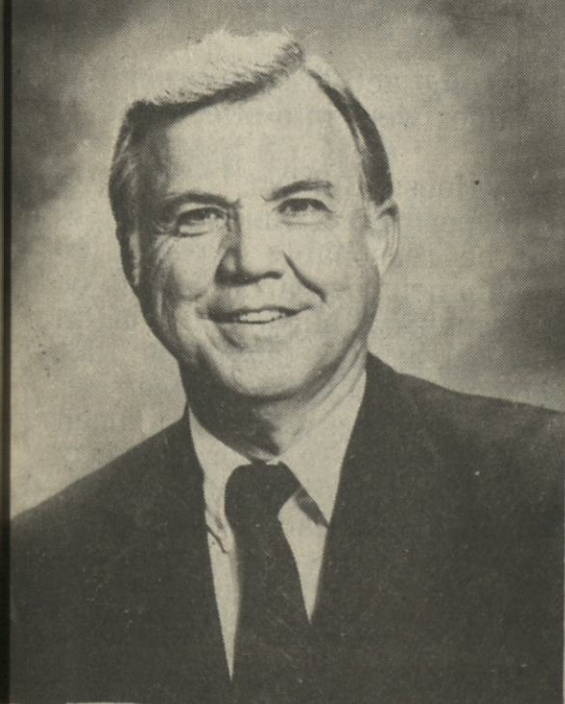

# 1988-89 Women's Basketball Prospectus

When you talk about Ole Miss Women's Basketball, you talk tradition. With 14 seasons behind this program, it has never posted a losing record. When you add seven consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, expectations are high when Van Chancellor's Lady Rebels take the court. And the 15th season of women's basketball at Ole Miss looks to be no different.

The Lady Rebels are returning four starters and 13 letter winners from the 24-7 team that finished the 1987-88 season tied for fourth place in the Southeastern Conference and 12th in the final Associated Press Top Twenty poll.

Although the experience of the team brings great promise for the upcoming season, the loss of All-

Southeastern Conference point guard Kim Bullard will be felt. She led the team in assists with 163 and steals with 69. Her contribution to the Lady Rebels will go down in the history books as fourth in the all-time career assist category (559), and fifth in the all-time career steals category (248). Bullard added 9.4 points per game in her senior season.

The Lady Rebels are also faced with a competitive schedule. Ole Miss will play the University of Arkansas in Memphis in a doubleheader with the men's team and then the following week will host the University of Texas. Play in the SEC is an added pressure within itself.

A competitive schedule and the loss of Bullard aside, the Lady Rebels' 1988-89 team should carry on the tradition without any problem. Coach Chancellor is looking for certain things out of this experienced team.

"We think this team will

give us an opportunity to run more, as we have depth," he says. "We'll also be much more diverse."

The team will count on senior Cynthia Autry for Leadership. The ALL-SEC forward led the Lady Rebels last season in scoring and rebounding with 15.2 points and 8.4 rebounds per game. She recorded a career high 29 points against Houston in the first round of the NCAA Tournament last year.

All-SEC center Kimsey O'Neal will join Autry in the backcourt. O'Neal, who led the team in blocked shots last season with 24, was second in scoring and rebounding, averaging 12.6 points and 6.2 rebounds per game. The junior is no newcomer to All-SEC awards, as she received the Freshman of-the-year honor in 1986-87. With two seasons of her career remaining, she has already captured fifth place in all-time career blocked shots (55).

Senior forward Phyllis Stafford, a junior college transfer, averaged 10.5 points and 5.3 rebounds per game in her first year at Ole Miss. Her field goal shooting percentage of 54.8 earned her fifth place in the all-time season category.

Rounding-out the returning starters is sophomore guard Jackie Martin. In her freshman year Martin averaged 7.2 points and 3.5 assists per game. She was second only to Bullard in assists with 110.

Senior Sherry Slayton of Belmont will be a big contributor in the open guard position this season. The junior college transfer was a part-time starter last season. She averaged 5.4 points and 2.0 assists per game.

Other returning Lady Rebels who saw a lot of playing time last season include sophomore forward Teena Bender and junior forward Michelle Hartzog. Bender averaged 6.4 points and 4.3 rebounds per game. Hartzog averaged 5.6 points and

3.0 rebounds per game last season.

The Lady Rebels depth is expanded with the returning experience of Peggy Bracey, a 5-8 guard from Raymond; Tara Brooks, a 5-7 guard from Kosciusko; Renee Chancellor, a 5-8 guard from Oxford; LaTeasha Johnson, a 6-2 center from Taylorsville; Kylla Morrison, a 6-5 center from Corinth; and Missy Shows, a 5-9 forward from Senatobia.

Joining the Lady Rebel ranks are Charlotte Banks, a 5-11 all-state forward from Harrison Central High School in Lyman; Gall Crick, a 5-7 guard from Nanih Waiya High School in Nanih Waiya; and Bernadette Otting, a 5-5 all-state guard from Vanguard High School in Ocala, Fla.

As with most pre-season outlooks, there is always a lot of speculation. Coach Chancellor states it best. "I've always felt that it is extremely difficult before practicing or playing to have an idea of where a team actually stands."

One thing is certain. In this program, prominence and

tradition will continue in this 15th season of women's

basketball at Ole Miss many seasons to come.

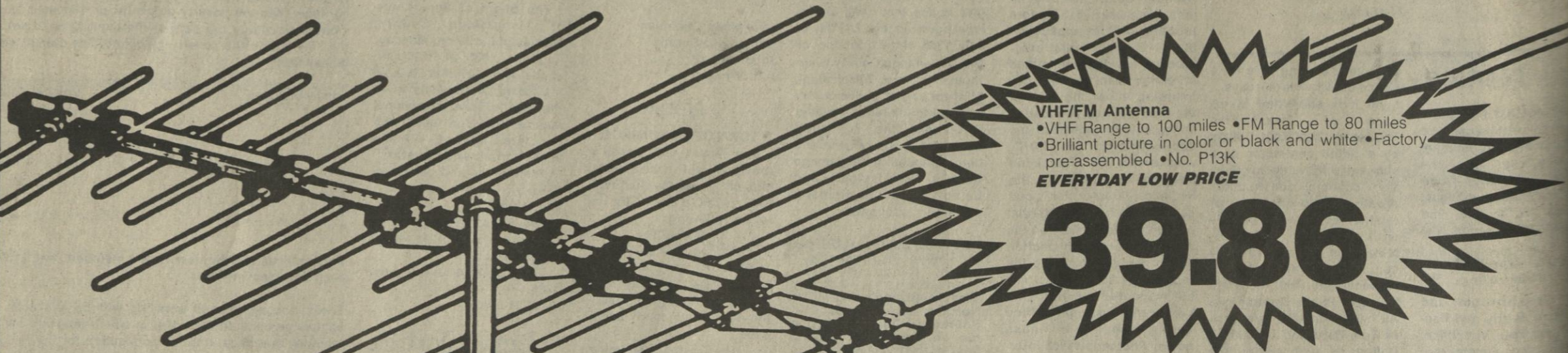

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### Destruction Of Fire

"Have you ever thought of how vital forest fires affect you," stated Clovis Crane, District Commissioner for Tishomingo County SWCD. "A person does not have to own a single acre of forest land to feel this affect," he continued. The loss is more personal when timber is damaged or destroyed on your land. "Fire is a destructive agent," remarked Clovis. The only time it can serve man properly is when the fire is under complete control. Wildfire that is not controlled in the woods is a killer. "This fact must be clearly understood by every man, woman and child before this enemy can be defeated and driven from the woods of our county," he continued. "Woods burning in this area is not a problem unique to our generation," commented Clovis. Early historical records are full of references to the occurrences of forest fires reported by explorers and colonizers. "Constant use of wildfire will develop into a habit that has persisted down through the generations," he added. In this early period, the supply of virgin timber appeared to be inexhaustible but took a long time to grow. Today, this virgin timber is gone. The new forests are being grown more rapidly and in greater volume due to man's efforts. Wildfires are now recognized for what they are, the greatest enemy to the profitable growing of trees. However, a deep seated custom of uncontrolled woods burning still persists in some areas of the county. "While wildfires do not destroy today's forest, they do lay waste to tomorrow's trees by killing the tiny seedlings up from the forest floor," continued Clovis. Even the topsoil of the forest floor suffers when its ac-

cumulation of humus is turned to ash. Where seed trees manage to survive the fires and sow their many thousand seeds with the season. The new tree growth is sparse. The burned soil offers little to sustain tree life. Each person can help save the forest because people cause most wildfires. Nine-tenths of all forest fires are caused by careless or negligent people. Others are caused by those who willfully set fires to woodland growth and those who casually toss away a lighted cigarette. "This damage to lives and property can be equal," remarked Clovis, "whatever the cause of the fire." "Since productive forests puts cash into the pockets of wage earners and those who supply the needs of forest products," added Clovis, "it is more than a duty to protect our forest, it is good business for all of us."

### Chatting With Your Home Economist

DRESSING SLIM

Poor clothing choices can exaggerate a weight problem, and clothing choices can camouflage it. In fact, proper clothing selection can take five to 10 pounds off the figure. An understanding of good fit is important to dressing slim. A good fitting garment is one that fits the body with sufficient room to be comfortable when sitting, bending or reaching. A good fitting garment is free of wrinkles at seams and points of strain such as waist, bust, hips, thighs and upper arms. Garments that are too tight generally give an impression of excess weight. Garments

that are too small will only make the wearers look heavier than they really are.

The direction of lines can be a powerful tool in dressing slim. Optical illusions can be created by using the body lines, the silhouette lines and the design lines in a variety of ways.

Generally, vertical lines will make the figure appear taller and slimmer where horizontal lines will make the figure appear wider and heavier. In diagonal lines, the longer and more vertical the diagonal line, the more slenderizing the effect.

The use of color can also minimize or maximize body size. Darker and duller colors are more slenderizing than lighter and brighter colors. Also, one color garments tend to increase apparent height and slenderize the figure.

To disguise a thick waist or abdomen, select medium weight fabrics, one color outfits, slimming jackets or sweaters and princess lines. Avoid sheer, clingy and bulky fabrics, contrasting bottoms and tops, short jackets that end at the waist, contrasting belts and hip length blouses tops for women.

To disguise large hips, select soft, curved lines, gored skirts and soft waistlines or no waistlines. Avoid hip pockets, draped hips, excessive fullness or gathers and fitted slacks or skirts.

To disguise large upper arms, select slightly gathered sleeves, raglan, cape or kimono sleeves, and soft, moderately full sleeves. Avoid sleeveless styles, fitted sleeves and short cuffed sleeves.

To minimize a full bust, select soft collars, V-shape seaming and small high V-necklines. Avoid stripes or plaids, extremely severe styles and plunging necklines.

### TEXTILE FIBER PRODUCTS IDENTIFICATION ACT

The Textile Fiber products Identification Act requires textile products to label fiber content, manufacturer and country of origin.

The act covers all fibers, yarns, fabrics and household textile articles which include articles of wearing apparel, draperies, floor coverings, furnishings, beddings and other textile articles customarily used in a household.

The generic names and percentages of all fibers in the product in the amount of 5 percent or more must be listed in order of predominance by weight. Fibers present in the amount of less than 5 percent are listed as "other fiber" or "other."

The name of the manufacturer or the registered identification number must be listed.

Country of origin is the name of the country where the textile product was processed or manufactured. For example, if a garment is completely made in the United States of fabric made in the United States, it is labeled using the phrase "Made in the U.S.A."

If a garment is made in the United States of fabric made in a foreign country, it is labeled "Made in the U.S.A. of Imported Fabric," labeled "Made in (name of country)."

As a general rule, labels should be attached at the center of the neck midway between the shoulder seams. Garments without necks and all other textile products should have a label attached where it is easy to locate and

read.

### QUICK DILL PICKLES

(Can be packed whole, as strips, or as slices.)

- 4 lb. (4-inch pickling cucumbers (32 to 40 cucumbers)
- 1/3 cup canning or pickling salt
- 4 cups water
- 2 1/2 cups vinegar, 5% acidity
- 24 to 32 peppercorns
- 1/2 cup dill seed or 12 to 16 heads fresh dill weed

Wash cucumbers. Cut 1/16-inch slice off blossom ends. Slice or strip, if desired. Place in bowl and cover with 2 inches of crushed or cubed ice. Refrigerate 3 to 4 hours.

Drain. Combine salt, water, and vinegar, and heat to boiling. Pack cucumbers in sterilized pint jars, leaving 1 inch headspace. Add 4 peppercorns and 1 tbsp. dill seed or 2 heads fresh dill to each jar.

Pour vinegar solution over cucumbers, leaving 1/2-inch headspace. Adjust lids. Process 10 minutes in boiling water. Remove jars, cool and store. Yield: 6 to 8 pints.

#### CRP SIGN-UP

Individuals in Tishomingo County with highly erodible land have another chance to take part in the Conservation Reserve Program. The sign-up period opened July 18 at our local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office, and was to close August 5.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has extended that deadline to August 31, giving our Tishomingo County farmers more time to assess the effects of the drought before enrolling acreage. I hope those of you who are undecided about participating will use this time to consider the program.

When you enroll your erodible land in CRP, you are saving two valuable resources: money and soil. Why farm land that is unproductive, or soon will be? The program offers you many alternatives to unproductive farming.

Bumblebees and yellow jackets build their nests in cavities in the soil, and they particularly choose soil that isn't disturbed often. Lawns and berry patches are prime nesting areas for these insects because the nests stay hidden.

You don't think about this when you walk barefoot across your yard, or perhaps you are too intent on picking the ripest berries to recognize the need for caution. People get stung that way too.

Be careful not to disturb nests when you pick fruit or walk outside. Those furry, buzzing bumblebees can inflict a severe sting; likewise for yellow jackets.

If you find a nest, you can control these insects by using an insecticide for wasps. If you use an insecticide with jet spray capabilities, direct the sprayer at the nest opening. KILLING POISON IVY

Have you managed to avoid poison ivy this summer? It's a challenge in Tishomingo County because we have plenty of that irritating plant growing here.

#### EYE COORDINATION

When your eyes are working the way they should, they're both looking directly at an object with the same intensity and precision. But if they're not, there may be a problem in the muscles of one or both eyes.

Each eye has six muscles that control movement and position. They must be in good working condition to give you proper eye coordination. If there's a weakness or defect in any one of these muscles, your eyes are not getting the help they need to see well.

This can cause problems. Your eyes won't be as clear as they should be. You'll probably be putting extra strain on the eye muscles to try to get them into line. This causes headaches, fatigue, and sometimes double vision. It affects your depth perception, your ability to judge the size of things seen at a distance.

To be in good health you should be able to control all of your muscle movements, including the muscles of your eyes. If you noticed any weakness in your vision, it's time to have an eye examination.

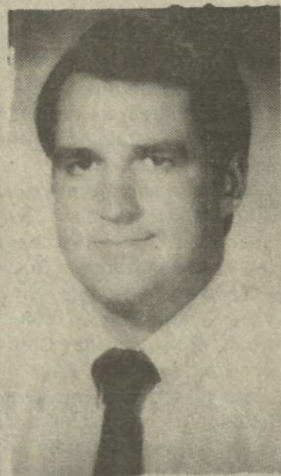

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## IMPORTANT NOTICE NEW LAW CONCERNING POWER LINES

A new law concerning activities in proximity to electric power lines went into effect July 1, 1988.

Under this law (House Bill No. 1265), if a person is going to perform a function or activity that could be reasonably expected to cause persons, equipment or parts of tools or materials to be brought within ten feet of an electric utility's lines, it is unlawful for that person to proceed with such function or activity until (1) the electric utility has been notified in writing on a form to be provided by the utility; and (2) the utility has made safety arrangements to deter contact with utility lines. Any person who violates this law is subject to the imposition of civil penalties and other liabilities.

### Centralized Purchasing Systems

Pete Johnson, State Auditor, announced today that 46 of Mississippi's 82 counties, 56%, have installed or will install stringent centralized purchasing systems by October 1, 1988.

Johnson said, "56% of Mississippi's county governments have in place or will have in place by October 1,

1988, stringent centralized purchasing systems. In May, I called for county supervisors to install in each county countability of the expenditure of public funds. At that time, only 25 of 82 counties, 30%, had a centralized purchasing system in place similar to the one proposed by the Mississippi State Auditor's Office. As of today, 21 additional counties, 26%, have, by resolution, indicated that they will by October 1, 1988, also install stringent centralized purchasing systems. I am pleased and

encouraged that in just two short months, 26% of Mississippi's counties have indicated that they realize the efficiency and accountability which a centralized purchasing system will ensure. The 46 county board of supervisors who have, to date, instituted or taken action to institute stringent centralized purchasing systems are to be commended for their leadership in this important county reform. I call on the remaining 36 counties who have not, to date, indicated that they plan

to institute a stringent centralized purchasing system to do so prior to October 1, 1988."

Johnson in May called on all Mississippi county boards of supervisors to implement a stringent centralized purchasing system. The major components of such a system are the removal of individual supervisors from direct purchasing of items for the county, a purchase clerk to handle all county purchasing, a receiving clerk to ensure that items ordered are received and an inventory control system to ensure that all items ordered and received are properly safeguarded. This system can be implemented utilizing existing county personnel at a relatively low cost to the county. A centralized purchasing system increases efficiency by avoiding duplication and waste and increases accountability over the expenditure of public funds.

The Mississippi Association of Supervisors endorsed, as part of its 1988 legislative agenda, the need for centralized purchasing in

all Mississippi counties. The Association has actively assisted the Mississippi State Auditor's Office in seeing to it that this important reform is implemented in all Mississippi counties. For further information, contact: Mary Coleman at 359-2344.

### ARC Funds Projects In Northeast Mississippi

Gov. Ray Mabus has announced that the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) approved grants totaling \$197,700 for projects aimed at assisting the furniture industry in northeast Mississippi.

The project cost will be \$238,400, with 50 percent provided by the ARC grant and 50 percent by the Mississippi Bureau of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education.

Services available through extension home economics to residents of Tishomingo County range from group activities to one-on-one assistance or counseling for family and home management.

Early in 1988, the federal Cooperative Extension Service established a set of initiatives or priorities with a vision of improving services to families in the 21st Century. Those basic initiatives

are being carried out in all areas of extension, including the division of home economics.

County home economists work at a grassroots level to facilitate the national initiatives which include building human capital, improving nutrition, diet and health, conserving and managing natural resources and revitalizing rural Mississippi.

Home economists serve as the educational link between research based information and the public.

They often assist in

organizing or participate in programs for independent organizations. Some of those organizations in Tishomingo County have included the Pilot Club and other civic clubs. Home Economics classes, senior citizens, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Youth Camps, Soil Conservation, and others. Home economists also conduct classes from time to time on various subjects such as food preservation, clothing, family life and money management.

Another way information is circulated to the public is through extension homemaker clubs. Tishomingo County has fifteen clubs involving more than 200 women meeting at various times each month.

Clubs usually have 10 to 20 members who participate in educational programs at each meeting. Topics may include food, nutrition and physical well-being, citizenship responsibilities, managing family income, home furnishings, clothing care and selection and several others.

Extension homemakers clubs are also instrumental in various volunteer activities on the county wide and statewide basis. Activities range from assisting with recreation activities at local nursing homes to raising money to help construct a Ronald McDonald house in Jackson. The house is a home away from home for the parents of critically ill children who are undergoing treatment at the University Children's Hospital.

More than 14,000 women of all ages participate in Mississippi's homemaker clubs. Contact Nellie R. Horton, Tishomingo County Extension Home Economist at 423-3616 for more information on how and why joining a club could be beneficial.

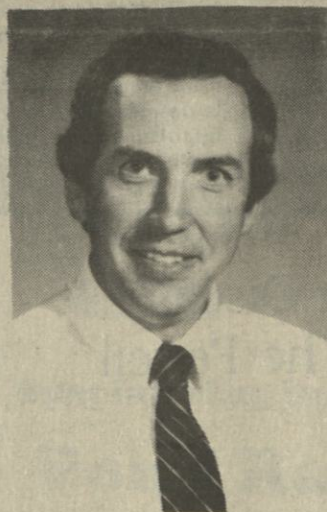

## Is Your Child Safe?

Imagine that your child was hit by a car on his way home from school. Paramedics can't find any identification on your little boy - only the name Johnny on the lunch box. But then one notices a small label inside his shirt - "I'm a Child Safe Kid. In case of emergency, call 1-800-25-CHILD." At the bottom of the label is the child's identification number. As Johnny is placed in the ambulance for the trip to the hospital, a police officer radios the Child Safe information ahead to the hospital.

Within minutes a nurse is on the phone to the Child Safe Emergency Response Center. The Child Safe operator takes Johnny's I.D. number and information from the nurse at the hospital to be able to verify the emergency. Then Johnny's record is activated and Child Safe begins the process of finding his parents.

There is no answer at the family home. His father is away from his office. They call Johnny's grandmother who says her daughter-in-law is at the dentist's office. The dentist's office is called and

Johnny's mother is notified and arrives at the hospital shortly after the ambulance.

This story is fictitious but Child Safe and the service it offers is very real. Child Safe is a community service of the Mississippi PTA and the Mental Health Association of the Capital Area.

Through the Child Safe Emergency Response Center, your child can be protected 24 hours a day. In emergency situations, vital medical and identification information is readily available to police, hospitals and other authorized agencies. Parental access is verified by a pre-assigned password.

The Emergency Information Record that you submit is kept on file. Fifty (50) iron-on clothing labels bearing your child's unique file code number are issued. The labels link your child to the toll free hotline.

Child Safe was founded in 1984 in response to the need for a reliable method of providing identification for lost and injured children. The program operates nationwide. The annual registration fee is \$5.00 for each child.

## Unemployment Up In County For June

A rise in the number unemployed was experienced in Tishomingo County at Mid-June. According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, there was 10.1 percent of the civilian labor force, or 720 individuals, unemployed at the reporting period, compared to 9.1 percent in May and 18.7 percent in June, 1987. This slight increase was due primarily to schools in the area closing for the summer. The labor force was estimated to be 7,140, 100 above the previous estimate but 240 below the estimate for one year ago. An estimated 6,420 individuals were employed, compared to 6,400 in May and 6,000 in June, 1987.

Manufacturing employment in the county rose to 2,630, slightly above the previous estimate but 190 above the estimate for June, one year ago. Employment in nonmanufacturing jobs rose by 70 at mid-month to reach

2,890 with an increase of 240 experienced from one year ago.

Smith noted that the civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo dropped to 60,940, some 220 below the May estimate. However, an increase of 500 was experienced from one year ago. There were 5,450 individuals unemployed at mid-June, representing 8.9 percent of the civilian labor force. This compares to 8.4 percent in May and 12.1 percent in June, 1987. Approximately 55,490 area residents were employed at the reporting period, 530 below the previous estimate and 2,390 above one year ago.

Manufacturing employment in the six-county area was estimated to be 18,350, 20 below last month's estimate but 190 above the estimate for June, 1987. Employment in nonmanufacturing jobs rose to 22,660, 170 over the May figure and 1,700 above the June, 1987, estimate.

## Ask Ochsner

Q. For the fourth time this year, I have visited my doctor and have been diagnosed as having a urinary tract infection, and he has referred me to a urologist. Before I go to the urologist, I would like to know about these infections and why I need to see a urologist? Miss ED, Biloxi Miss.

A. According to Dr. Harold A. Fuseller, Jr., a urologist at the Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans, urinary tract infections are so common that at least one in every five women will experience them in their lifetime. Unfortunately, as in your case, some women may have repeated bouts with the disorder. The condition also occurs in men, but with not as much frequency.

Some of the symptoms include a frequent and urgent need to urinate, burning with urination, and sometimes a fever is present. If not treated, symptoms may progress to include back pain in the kidney area. If these symptoms persist or are severe, you should see your physician immediately.

There are different types of infections which your physician can confirm by taking a urine specimen or a culture sample. After seven to ten days of treatment with antibiotics, a follow up urinalysis should be taken by your physician. Dr. Fuseller emphasizes that even if the symptoms of the infection subside after taking antibiotics for a few days, it is important to take all of the medicine prescribed to make sure the infection is completely gone.

If you should experience several infections a year, as in your case, your physician may refer you to a urologist

for further testing. Sometimes an intravenous pyelogram or IVP (a special X-ray of the kidneys and bladder) and a visual inspection of the bladder (cystoscopy) may be necessary. If these procedures reveal any abnormalities, they will be treated.

Urinary tract infections are annoying and often distressing! But with proper treatment, they rarely pose lasting risk to kidney function and health. Recurrent infections are frustrating for many women, and your doctor may be able to recommend certain hygiene practices, which can help keep them under, concludes Dr. Fuseller.

### ODDS AND ENDS

A new recreation season brings new questions. Hopefully the information below will answer some of

yours.

Foot traffic is welcomed on the Waterway levee. Many people come to a closed gate on the levee and are not sure whether to go past, you can as long as you:

a. Go in by foot. No vehicles are allowed past gates.

b. Don't block the gate with your vehicle.

Piney Grove Campground on Bay Springs Lake should be operational by the summer of 1989. This area will feature approximately 135 campsites. Some sites will be primitive, i.e. no conveniences but the majority will have electricity, water, a picnic table, a lantern holder, and a fire ring at each site. The campground will also have a shower building and a waste disposal station.

We would like to remind all boaters that there may be a slight delay before locking through to another pool if a commercial tow is nearby. This year, as in the past, commercial vessels will be permitted to lock through first. Also, the weekend locking schedules will be in effect again.

Please be careful when

fishing below all locks and dams. When water from the lock chamber is passed to the pool below, there is a slight but sudden rise in the lower pool elevation. For instance, if you are fishing below Lock E and a boat is locking through going downstream, the water in the lock chamber is being released downstream as the boat is lowered. While this water is being released, the water level below the lock may rise two feet. Anyone or anything at the waterline when this occurs may get wet. There is a warning though. Thirty seconds before the water rises a siren or horn will blast for 5 - 15 seconds. If you hear this - watch out.

In Mississippi, according to state regulations, there must be at least two individuals in a boat when pulling a water skier. One individual to drive the boat, the other to observe the skier. (The observer must be over 10 years old.)

The lake elevation is controlled by Pickwick Dam. Normal summer pool elevation at Bay Springs is 414' MSL (Mean Sea Level).

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## Tishomingo County News-Vidette-Belmont

Normal winter pool is 408' MSL. Right now the lake is at summer pool elevation.

Large rock has been placed at a few sites on the Bay Springs shoreline to protect it from erosion. Much of this rock will be underwater during summer pool. Fishermen may want to try these areas in the early mornings and late afternoons of summer. Please use caution when fishing near these rocks. GO SLOW. Stay away and cast toward the rocks.

A reminder to all boaters -- you are responsible for your

wake. Operators of vessels should be careful of the wake behind. A boat operator should be held responsible for damage that his produces. Please use caution when boating especially when the crowded. This may be operating at a slower rate.

Wear your P.F.D. safe; obey the rules of the road while operating.

On the average, a boat takes in about 16,000 gallons of water during her life.

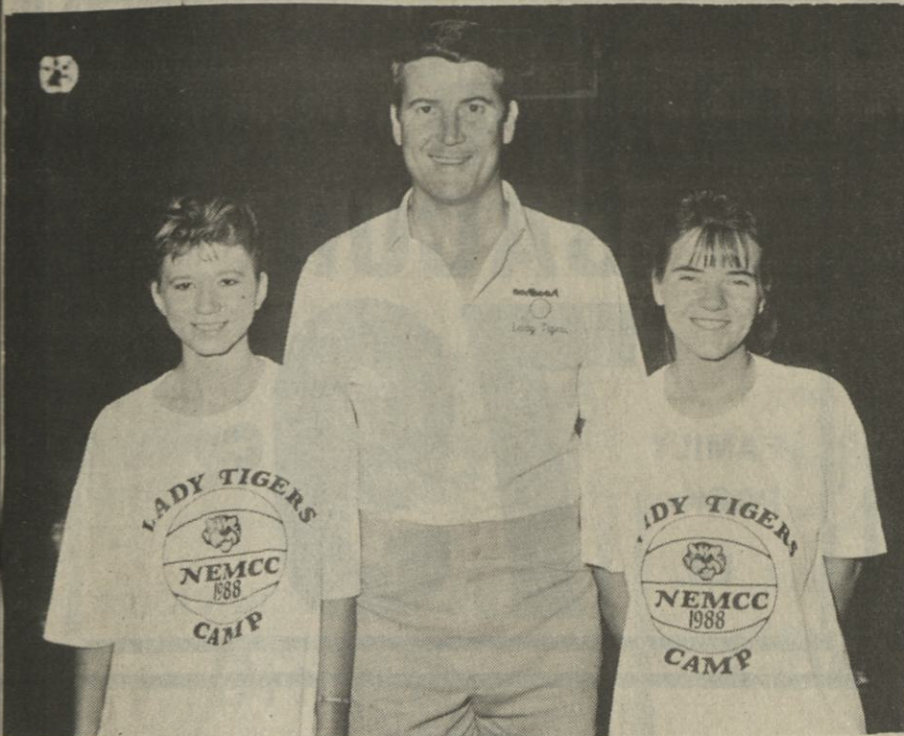

## Ask Ochsner

Q. My son recently returned from a camping trip and his legs were covered with bright red bites which were very itchy. I'm told these were chigger bites. What are chiggers and how can we avoid the bites in the future?

A. During the summer when outdoor activities, such as camping and hiking, become more prevalent, chances are that you may be burdened by one of the most common summer pests--chiggers. Chiggers, or red bugs as they are often called, are tiny mites that lay clusters of eggs in grassy or bushy areas.

Dr. Jeffery Frey, an internist at the Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans, says that generally, the egg-laying adult chiggers do not bother humans, it is their offspring that do. Tiny chigger larvae hatch and attach themselves to your skin as you walk through the grassy areas. Usually the chiggers will at-

tach to areas which are covered with elastic, such as the tops of socks, underwear or other constricting clothing.

Chigger bites will not appear for two to three days after exposure. The blister will be red in color and slightly swollen. The best way to treat chigger bites, Dr. Frey says, is to coat the bites with clear fingernail polish or fingernail polish remover. The chemicals in these products smother the larva. However, it will still take a couple of days for the bites to heal.

To prevent chigger bites in the future, he says, particularly if you plan to go camping or participate in outdoor activities, it is best to wear clothing with closures at the wrists and ankles and spray your skin with insect repellent.

If you become ill with a fever or rash when camping or after any outdoor activity, see your doctor as soon as possible. It may be necessary to take antihistamines or other prescribed medicine depending in the severity of

the condition.

## Lowest Rate Since 1980

Mississippi Employment Security Commission Director Linda Ross Aldy announced

that the June jobless rate rose seasonally to 7.8 percent, eight tenths percentage point above last month.

This slight increase was due primarily to schools across the state closing for the summer and students joining the labor force. "This rate, though higher than last month, is still 2.8 percentage points below the June 1987 figures and is in fact the lowest rate for the month of June since 1980" said Aldy.

In a total labor force of 1,149,300, place of residence employment for June stood at 1,059,200 or 92.2 percent of eligible Mississippians being employed during the month of June. The 1,059,200 represents yet another record since this is the largest number of people ever employed during the month of June in Mississippi.

Manufacturing establishments provided the largest number of jobs numbering 235,100; up 1,700 from May and 6,200 above June 1987. These figures represent the largest number of jobs in manufacturing since October 1979.

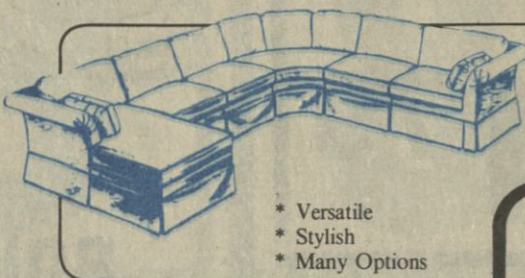
stood at 649,200, down 5,400 from May but 19,600 more jobs than June 1987. Seasonal losses in public education represent most of the decrease in nonmanufacturing. The remainder of the

economy continued to show steady improvement with the most dramatic being the marked improvement in manufacturing over the last

eleven months. The only significant loss in employment was a seasonal loss of 11,500 jobs in public education.

## ASCS Farm News

### EMERGENCY HAYING PROVISIONS

The period for emergency haying of acreage enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program has been extended through August 31.

The CRP acreage must be in counties approved for emergency haying and grazing of Acreage Conservation Reserve and Conserving Use acreage. If hay harvested from CRP acres is sold, a 25% reduction will apply to the annual rental payment. The hay can be donated and no 25% reduction will apply.

Individual county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committees are no longer required to apply for an extension of the 30 day period approved previously.

Producers in Tishomingo County can get further details from the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

### SEVENTH CRP SIGNUP

The seventh signup for the 10 year Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) has been extended through August 31. The signup begins July 18 and was scheduled originally to end August 5. The extension will give producers more time to consider the effects of the drought.

Cropland which has been hayed in counties approved for drought relief is eligible during this signup for entry into CRP for the 1988 crop year if the land meets other program requirements.

Acreage designated as Acreage Conservation Reserve and Conservation Use for the 1988 program year is not eligible for entry into the CRP for 1988.

The total CRP contracts from the first six signups have enrolled more than 25.5 million acres. The USDA goal is to bring 40-45 million acres

into the program by the end of 1990.

Under this conservation program, producers receive annual payments to keep highly erodible land out of production and planted with a protective cover which can include trees. In addition to the annual rental payments, CRP participants also receive up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing the vegetative cover.

Filter strips, cropland areas 66-99 feet wide with a permanent cover, next to streams, lakes and estuaries, will be eligible for CRP in the seventh signup even if the cropland does not meet the soil erosion criteria. This provision was introduced in the sixth signup last February to permit farmers to use CRP enrollment as a cost-effective option to control nonpoint source pollution emptying into water resources.

One-third of the area to be planted to trees has to be predominately highly erodible to be eligible for CRP. Producers seeding grass are encouraged to plant additional cover to protect wildlife and serve as windbreaks.

If you are interested in enrolling your cropland in CRP, you should contact the Tishomingo County ASCS office.

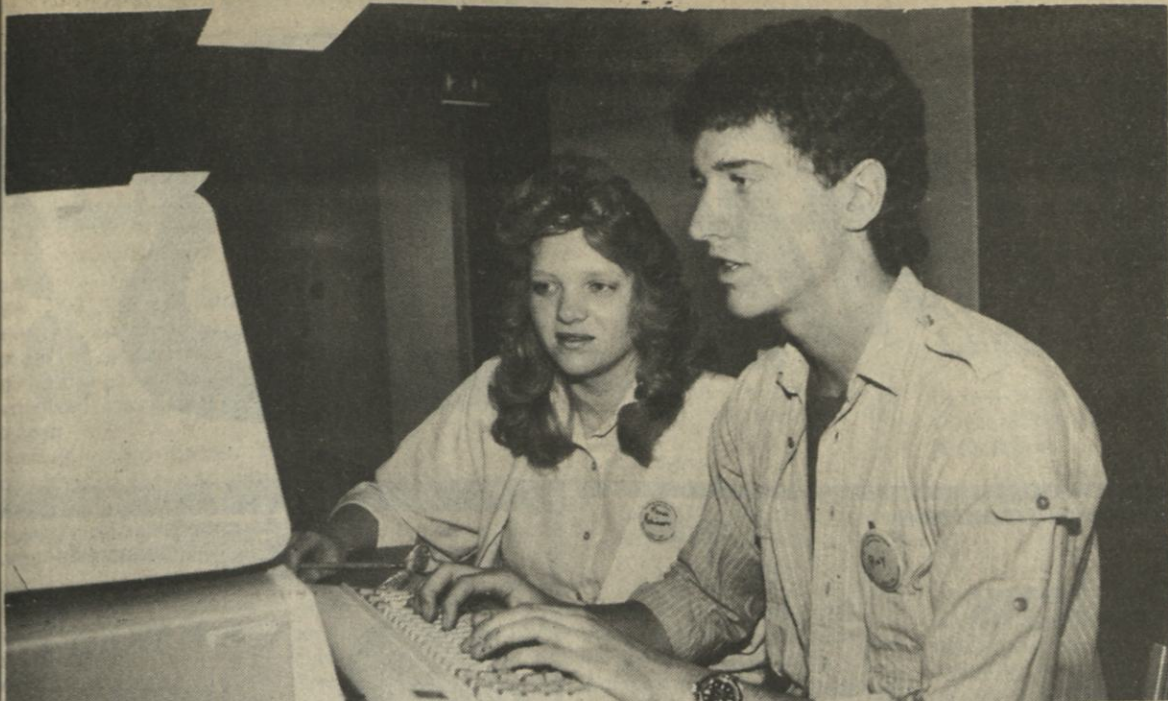

Researched supported by the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) today announced a major advance in the search for the hereditary unit, or gene, that when defective causes Friedreich's ataxia, one of the crippling neuromuscular diseases covered by MDA programs. The investigative team, in an article in today's issue of the prestigious scientific journal Nature, reported narrowing the search for the gene's location to an area representing less than one half of one percent of the total human genetic material.

## Resarchers Make step Toward Discovery

"This discovery brings us, for the first time, within reach of the Friedreich's ataxia gene," said R. Rodney Howell, M.D., chairman of MDA's Task Force on Genetics, which earlier spearheaded the successful search for the gene responsible for Duchenne muscular dystrophy, the most common childhood form of the disease.

The international team of investigators, led by Susan Chamberlain, Ph.D., of St. Mary's Hospital Medical School in London, reported identification of two pieces of genetic material, called "markers," that are inherited with the Friedreich's ataxia gene and are therefore certain to lie near the gene. The 50,000 to 100,000 genes constituting an individual's inherited make-up are contained on 24 different structures called chromosomes. The two markers identified by Dr. Chamberlain's group lie in a small area of chromosome 9, indicating the gene is also in the area.

Isolation of the gene, the goal of this research, will allow MDA-supported investigators to identify the precise abnormality that triggers the disorder. That discovery, it is hoped, will in turn lead to effective approaches to treating the disease.

The team and other experts believe that today's finding will also lead to the development in the near future of a genetics-based diagnostic test for Friedreich's ataxia. According to MDA Mid-South/Memphis Chapter President, Mr. Floyd Harvey, "A genetic test would help physicians diagnose Friedreich's ataxia earlier than ever before possible, significantly improving care for patients with the disease."

Friedreich's ataxia, which usually strikes adolescents, is a life-threatening disorder causing muscle weakness and loss of coordination, and affecting speech and heart function. There is as yet no cure or specific treatment for the disease.

MDA currently supports more than 500 research projects worldwide seeking the causes of the cures for Friedreich's ataxia and 39 other neuromuscular diseases. MDA also maintains a nationwide network of 230 clinics where people with

these disorders receive diagnostic services, rehabilitative care, and counseling.

## Volunteer Fire Dept. Funds To Increase In Coming Year

Senators Irb Benjamin and John White said that they are pleased to announce that the amount of funds allocated for the volunteer fire departments in Tishomingo County will be nearly tripled in the coming year.

"The Legislature passed a bill which boosts the funding for the state's County Volunteer Fire Department Fund from \$1.6 million to \$4.4 million, which is the same amount that goes into the Municipal Fire Fund," they said. "The Senate has tried for several years to increase this fund in order to improve rural fire protection, and I am very happy that we were able to get the legislation enacted this year."

The funding available to Tishomingo County will increase from \$16,497 to \$44,837, according to the

Senators.

"The additional funds will help these fire departments upgrade their equipment and service, which, in turn, should bring about better firefighting capabilities and, hopefully, an upgrading of the fire insurance rating which means lower fire insurance premiums," they said.

They noted that the bill further allows for fire districts to qualify for these funds, it sets minimum standards for fire prevention, and it requires local support for the departments.

"This bill is one of the most positive accomplishments which we were able to make during the recent legislative session, and we look for benefits for our people for years to come," they said.
