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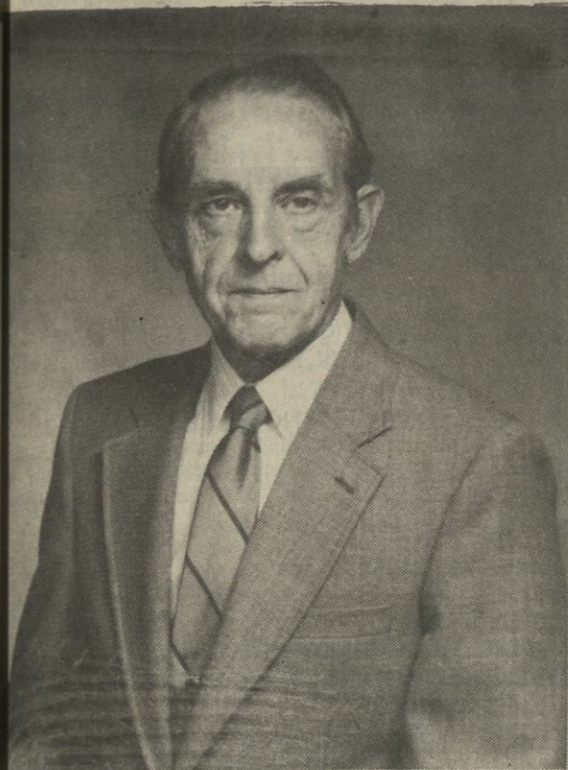

### Local Man Witnessed Bomb Which Destroyed Nagasaki

August 9th marks the 43rd anniversary of the dropping of the atomic bomb on the city of Nagasaki, Japan. A local resident, Charles B. Jordan, of Iuka, witnessed the destruction of the Japanese city of Nagasaki as it closed up. Jordan was a son of the Japanese army in a prison camp inside Japan when U.S. Forces dropped the atomic bomb on Nagasaki at the close of World War II. Although he and fellow prisoners did not realize the significance of the explosion, they knew immediately that it was something very different from anything they had witnessed before. Mr. Jordan entered the U.S. Army at the age of seventeen with his mother's consent.

After turning eighteen, he was stationed on the Philippine Island of Corregidor. That fortress fell to the invading Japanese very early in the war. For the next thirty months he was kept in a prison camp in the Philippines and subjected to inhuman treatment and conditions. He and fellow prisoners were forced to work long hours in coal mines for their captors. Ten months before the end of the war, Jordan was transferred to Japan. During this time period he was kept in an austere camp in a reclaimed tidal area near the waters edge and continued to do forced labor in coal mines. By now he had fell away to a mere ninety pounds due to the lack of food and the constant hard work.

On the morning of August 9th, 1945, the air raid alarm sounded and Jordan noticed there were planes in the air which were larger than any he had previously seen. A short while later the earth shook as though there had been an earthquake. "Although Nagasaki lay across the bay from where we were, a distance of about sixty miles, we could see a large mushroom like cloud and we knew something out of the ordinary had just happened." When they formed up to do the work in the mines, the Japanese guards told them it was a big Japanese holiday and they would not have to work. "By August 15th, our Japanese guards had all just disappeared. Then we saw the Japanese Commander come out to the senior prisoner and surrender his sword to him." We knew then that the war was over. American planes began to fly over and dropped rations to the starving ex-prisoners by parachute. "I had a good friend who had survived the Bataan Death March and forty months as a POW, but he was killed when a parachute broke off of a C-ration crate and the crate landed on him and killed him," Jordan said. The first Americans to arrive at the camp after the bombing were news correspondents from New York, Chicago, and Washington newspapers. Mr. Jordan flew over the destroyed city of Nagasaki on his way out of Japan and to freedom. "I was still very young then but I remember that the devastation was like something I had never seen or heard of before."

After the war and his return to civilian life, Jordan obtained a BS degree from Ouchita College in Arkansas and became a Baptist minister. He met and married Clesteen Hendrix of Burnsville, Mississippi, while both were working in Pine Bluff, Arkansas. He later worked in Houston, Beaumont and Shreveport before retiring in Iuka in 1978. What does Mr. Jordan think of President Harry S. Truman's decision to drop the atomic bomb so late in the war? "I believed then and I believe now, that he made the right decision and should go down in history as the man who saved thousands of American soldiers lives by his brave decision."

## Whitten - Stennis Instrumental In Funding For Rocket Plant

Local citizens and officials have kindled a flame that is spreading throughout the tri-state area with their enthusiasm over NASA's choice of the Yellow Creek site for their solid rocket booster plant.

It is the hope of lawmakers that the \$500 million plant will be this economically depressed area's entryway into the high-tech space industry, as was the case for Huntsville, AL when it joined the space program.

Tri-state economic development leaders feel that the outreach of the project will have a tremendous affect on the economy of an area in at least a one hundred mile radius of the Iuka site. A meeting will take place August 24 in Sheffield, AL with key representatives attending from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), state and local economic and industrial development agencies from the tri-states - Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee - to discuss the regional impact to result from the selection.

It was announced last week by both branches of Congress that appropriation bills have been passed funding NASA's budget. Included were funds to begin construction at the rocket plant site.

Rep. Jamie Whitten (D-Miss), Chairman of the U.S. House Appropriations Committee, has worked diligently in the acquisition of the plant for the North Mississippi area. According to a spokesman for Whitten, the bill passed for

NASA included \$83 million to be used for the rocket production facility-operated site.

Chairman of the U.S. Senate Appropriation Committee, Sen. John C. Stennis (D-Miss.) also aided in the selection of the Yellow Creek site. The Senate, according to sources, set aside \$88 million for the fiscal year, beginning in October for NASA projects, with assurance that money from this amount will be appropriated solely for the government-owned site in Tishomingo County.

Local officials have put long hours and much effort into the acquisition of the NASA facility at the abandoned Yellow Creek nuclear plant site. Among those working toward this goal was Rep. Mack Loyd Wadkins (D-Iuka), Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation. His job duties as TCDF Director include bringing new businesses and industrial development to the county. Iuka Mayor John H. Biggs was also instrumental in the project.

Everyone - each citizen, each local official and each lawmaker - who helped in this NASA venture is to be greatly commended. Not only the plant itself, but the many spin-off industries associated with the plant, as well as the service-generated and indirect jobs created by its presence, will affect everyone throughout the region. Many people who had to leave the county due to lack of employment opportunities may now be able to return to the area as a result of NASA's decision.

## Larry Green Wins Special Election

Eligible voters went to the polls again Tuesday, August 2 to choose a Superintendent of Education for the Tishomingo County School District.

Two candidates vied for the position; Larry Green of Paden and Danny McClung of Tishomingo.

Unofficial results indicated that Green led the two man field with 1,545 votes with McClung receiving 1,050 votes.

Not only did Green lead the voting in his own home

precinct of Paden, but also dominated West Burnsville, North Burnsville, Coles Mill, Midway and Cotton Springs precincts, according to a spokesman at the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's office.

Reports from the polls indicated a better turn-out for this run-off election than for the first primary.

Green will probably be sworn in to office sometime today, stated officials, after the votes are certified.

## Business As Usual At Local Republic Bank

Republic Bank's conservator, Don L. Shields, and branch office manager, John Harmon, met with Mayor John H. Biggs on Monday, August 1, 1988, to discuss the current status of the bank so that customers and residents of the trade area would have a better understanding of the transition that Republic is currently undergoing.

Mr. Shields was appointed Conservator of Republic on July 22, 1988, after the Federal Home Loan Bank Board (FHLBB) removed former management from their duties. Mr. Shield's duties are to manage the institution and preserve the assets of Republic until a buyer or merger partner can be found for the thrift.

Mr. Shields conveyed to Mayor Biggs that depositors are in no danger of losing their deposits. Republic bank depositors will find business

as usual at their thrift as the institution will maintain the same offices, hours, and services. John Harmon will remain as the Iuka branch manager and Laverne Strickland will remain as the Belmont branch manager. Customer accounts will continue to build interest as usual.

Republic Bank will also maintain the rates and terms of all contracts and will carry insurance up to \$100,000 for all checking and savings accounts by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation (FSLIC), an agency of the U.S. Government. Republic Bank, a Jackson, Mississippi, based thrift, reported assets of \$79.9 million as of May 31, 1988. No other changes have occurred in the operation of the institution or any of its three locations other than the change in management.

## Whitten Announces \$375,000 To Recapitalize Loan Fund

Congressman Jamie Whitten announced today that the Appalachian Regional Commission has approved \$375,000 to recapitalize the Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District's revolving loan fund.

The District serves Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo Counties. The ARC grant will be matched with local funds provided by beneficiaries of the revolving loan fund.

Congressman Whitten said ARC initially capitalized the District's fund in 1986 with \$500,000. The District has made \$350,000 in loans and at least \$300,000 in new loans are currently under review.

These loans will be partially responsible for new businesses creating at least 1,000 new jobs and nearly \$12 million in new private investment.

The revolving loan program assists new and expanding businesses with such endeavors as plant expansions and new equipment in association with locally generated bank loans and owner equity.

## Mabus Sees Economic Boost For State

Governor Ray Mabus praised federal, state and local officials today in helping to attract a rocket production facility in Tishomingo County expected to provide 2,000 jobs.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced that it will likely locate its planned Space Shuttle Advanced Solid Rocket Motor facility at the abandoned Yellow Creek nuclear plant.

Production will be done at the Yellow Creek facility while the rocket testing will take place at the Stennis Space Center in Hancock County.

NASA still must decide whether to go with a government owned facility or a privately owned one. If NASA opts for a government owned facility, as anticipated, Mississippi is expected to get the project.

Gov. Mabus said NASA officials told him "we have been very aggressive in pursuing the project and that helped in getting the project."

"The entire Mississippi congressional delegation, the entire Mississippi Legislature and this office worked very hard together," Mabus said.

The project involves a total capital investment of \$600 million. It will provide 2,000 permanent jobs and a peak construction employment of 2,500 to 3,000 jobs.

J. Mac Holladay, director of the Mississippi Department of Economic Development, said the project will further build up the Stennis Space Center, already an outstanding facility.

"This confirms it as the leading location for this type

of operation in the country," Holladay said.

Both Mabus and Holladay said the project is particularly noteworthy because the jobs created will be high technology, good paying jobs.

"This is a major economic boost for our state, and I believe we will attract many more such high skill jobs in the future. This project is a win-win situation for Mississippi," Holladay said.

## Funeral Services Held For Jim Brewer



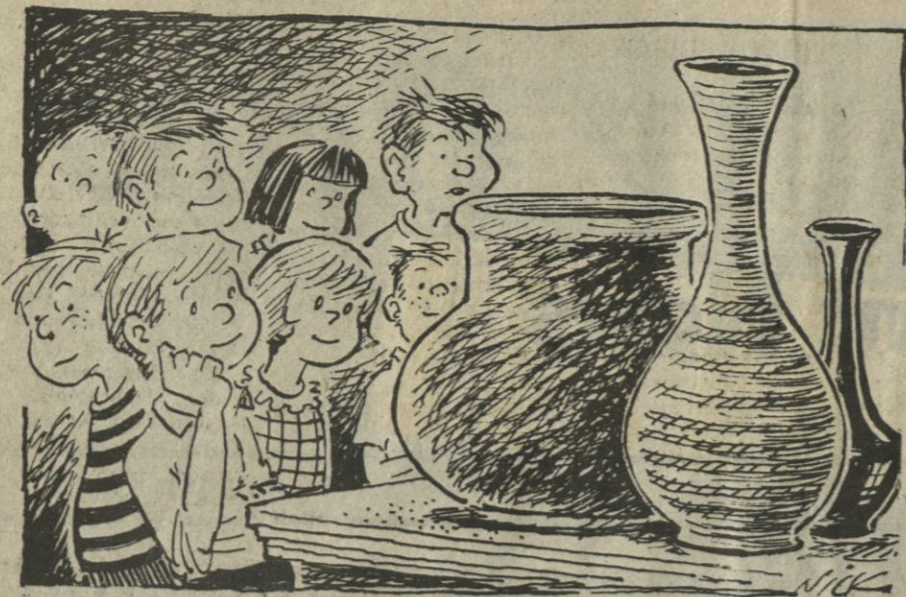

### Pottery Display At Iuka Library

For thousands of years, pottery has been produced in this country, first by Native Americans, and then later by European settlers. American craftsmen have produced wares that appeal to every taste and budget. When the first settlers arrived to the New World, they found a land rich in clay. Throughout the

18th century the industry grew, and it has been estimated that by 1800 more than 300 potters had worked in New England alone. Most worked by themselves or with 1 or 2 assistants, producing a variety of useful wares such as bowls, plates, and mugs. Almost none of their pottery has survived. The most basic method used by potters is hand shaping or modeling. Clay is pinched into shape, or

formed into slabs that are then joined. Sometimes ropes of clay are coiled on top of one another and then worked into shape. Although modeling is an age-old process that is still used today, most pieces are produced by means of the potter's wheel of molds. Perhaps the largest volume of permanganate used in fish culture is for prevention of fish kill due to oxygen depletion.

Since oxygen depletion may cause the loss of an entire fish population, routine observations of all ponds before sunrise should be made during the summer months when the water is hot and oxygen level would be naturally lower. Sunrise is the time when natural dissolved oxygen will be lowest. This is because of the discontinuance of photosynthesis during the darkness hours.

Snails, tadpoles, or fish at or near the surface indicate low oxygen. Normally, whenever the permanganate is added, the fish almost immediately return to deeper water. When treating for oxygen depletion, no phosphate fertilizers should be added and the fish should not be fed.

Frequently it is desirable for all fish in a stream, lake, or pond to be destroyed. In cases such as this, normally 0.05 ppm of rotenone is used. A waiting period of 5 to 7 days is normally necessary for the natural detoxification of rotenone before restocking can be attempted. When more immediate restocking is desired or if the rotenone effects need to be stopped, permanganate can be applied to detoxify rotenone.

In field usage, concentrations of 2.0-2.5 ppm permanganate successfully neutralized the concentration of 0.05 ppm rotenone. The use of permanganate apparently had no harmful effects on the water treated. Probable owing to its fungicidal action, this

chemical may have beneficial effects on any fish present or that are added immediately to such treated waters.

#### Summertime--The Right Time To Prevent Food Poisoning

Summertime is here, and Tishomingo Countians are practicing the rituals of the season: softball, swimming, sunbathing, and most of all, ignoring the clock.

Unfortunately, bacteria that cause foodborne illnesses doesn't take a summer vacation. So, as you plan picnics and barbecues, remember to watch the clock to keep summer eating safe.

Time is just what these bacteria need to multiply along with the right temperature, a source of nourishment and other favorable factors. Failure to cook or reheat foods long enough is one of the most common food handling mistakes made.

Protein-rich raw foods such as meat, poultry, eggs and seafood can provide bacteria with the nourishment they need to multiply. If these raw foods are not cooked long enough at the proper temperature, bacteria can survive.

A study of foodborne illness outbreaks involving meat and poultry over a 10 year period found that inadequate cooking or

reheating was a factor in about half of the cases.

To be sure food is cooked sufficiently, use a meat thermometer when grilling large cuts of meat. The internal temperature of roast beef or pork should be at least 160 degrees F for medium, which is adequate to destroy either salmonella bacteria or the trichina parasite. Most people prefer roast chicken or turkey that is cooked to 180 or 185 degrees F.

Avoid interrupted cooking. Many people like to partially cook ribs or other foods inside, then finish them on the grill. However, partial cooking is safe only if food is moved immediately from the oven or microwave to the hot grill, with no time on the counter or in the refrigerator.

Cooling errors, such as leaving cooked foods at room temperature too long, contributed to about 50 percent of the food-illness outbreaks in the study.

After cooking, perishable foods should be cooled rapidly and evenly. Refrigerate foods containing meat and poultry within two hours after cooking. If you're grilling outside in 90 degree weather, it's wise to refrigerate foods even sooner to avoid giving bacteria too much time to reproduce.

Deep containers holding large portions don't allow even cooling of the food inside. Divide larger portions into shallow, covered containers to promote fast cooling. Shallow containers will probably fit the cooler better, too.

Use care when preparing foods ahead of time. Cooking ahead of time can be convenient if you're planning to serve large numbers of people. However, preparing foods in advance can also compound any undercooking, cooling, sanitation or other food-handling mistakes you might have made. In the study of food illness outbreaks, preparing foods a day or more ahead was a factor in almost one-third of the cases.

The bacteria that cause most foodborne illness are common in our environment--on raw meat and poultry, in water and soil, to name just a few places. "Staph" bacteria, located in the nose and throat, can cause staph infection if you are not careful when you have to sneeze or touch your nose while preparing foods.

When these bacteria are allowed enough time to reproduce in food, some of the people who eat that food may become ill. Children, the elderly, AIDS and cancer patients are most at risk of serious health problems from foodborne illness.

Ironically, bacterial foodborne illness is easy to prevent. Watch the clock! Take the time to practice food safety to prevent foodborne illnesses.

Chicken and Rice Skillet

2 whole chicken breasts,

split, skinned & boned (1 pound boneless), cut into bite-size pieces  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
1 16-ounce can tomatoes in juice, chopped  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup chopped green pepper  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
1/2 teaspoon oregano, crushed  
1/2 cup long-grain rice

Season chicken with salt and pepper. In large non-stick skillet or skillet sprayed with non-stick cooking spray over medium-high heat, brown chicken. Add tomatoes in juice, water, onion, green pepper, garlic, and oregano; bring to a boil.

Stir in rice; return to a boil. Reduce heat; cover. Simmer about 20-25 minutes or until liquid is absorbed and chicken is tender, stirring occasionally turning chicken once. Makes 4 servings.

Can You "Overuse" Eyes?

Can you harm your eyes by using them too much? The answer is "No". Eyes don't wear out. You do not damage the eyes by excessive use even though there is discomfort from strain or fatigue.

There are elderly persons who have little else to do but read or watch television, but who deny themselves such pleasures in order to "save" their eyes - for fear they will "wear them out" and lose their sight. They are frightened by the symptoms of eye strain which are normal with excessive use and which cause discomfort but no physical damage.

The eyes are made to be used at all ages. With rare exceptions, you

need have no fear about using your eyes as much as you wish, as long as your eyes are open they are working. They won't deteriorate from use, no matter how much use they have. Barring accident, disease, the eyes last a lifetime. If you get eyestrain or fatigue it is probably not visual overactivity, rather that you do not have the proper corrective lenses.

### County Agent's Notes

#### Approved Termite Control

Chlordane was an effective chemical control for termites, but the product is no longer being manufactured. Homeowners do have six alternative termiticides to choose from.

Two of these products, Dursban and Pryon are organophosphates. The others -- Demon, Dagnet, Torpedo, and Tribute -- are pyrethroids. (Someone asked me where do these companies get the names for these products. I just shook my head.)

None of these products will last as long as chlordane, but they will provide 5 years of protection. Some may last considerably longer beneath a slab.

#### Reclusive Spiders

While brown recluse spiders can give a poisonous bite, they aren't aggressive by nature. Humans are generally bitten only be accident when the spiders become trapped in bedding or clothing.

Recluse spiders seek out

room corners, floor and wall crevices and other dark hiding places. They also can be found in piles of old shoes and clothing.

You can control recluse spiders with dursban, diazinon or malathion. The female spiders usually lay eggs in May, June and July. Eggs hatch in about 30 days.

Careful inspection and clean-up will help locate and destroy spider egg sacs.

#### Soybean Insects

Grasshoppers are a serious problem in Tishomingo County soybean fields. While our double crop beans are at greater risk of grasshopper infestation, any newly emerged crop will be attacked by these pests.

We thought we might have a buildup of spider mites and thrips because of the dry weather we've had in Tishomingo County, but recent rain has kept these populations down.

You may want to begin control measures if the thrips cause flecking (spotting) on soybean leaves. There are no treatment guidelines for thrips but consider treating them if damage leads to stand reduction.

### Timberline

In last week's column we took a brief look at fusiform rust, a serious fungus disease of southern pine trees. Today, we'll look at some ways of dealing with the problem.

Complete eradication of the disease is not possible. In nurseries and seed orchards, where values are high, the damage caused by fusiform rust can be reduced by spraying the trees with fungicides. In plantations or natural stands, where spraying is not economically feasible, other steps can be taken.

In young plantations, pruning branches with rust galls less than 15 inches from the stem will reduce the likelihood of trunk infestations. Pruning is useless on trees that already have a trunk gall or canker. Moreover, new infections sometimes occur even after pruning. Sometimes it is possible to save a high-value tree with a small, newly developed trunk gall. Carefully cut away the bark and some of the wood around the gall and apply tree wound paint.

In commercial stands, trees with trunk cankers should be removed in thinning operations, provided their removal does not open the stand too much. Diseased trees are not a direct threat to the surrounding healthy ones, since spores that infect pines come only from oak leaves.

The following rule of thumb might be useful in planning the salvage of trees with trunk cankers: If less than 50 percent of the circumference is killed, there is more than even chance of salvage for eight years. If 50 percent of the circumference is killed, but there is no bend at the canker or no sunken face, there is an even chance of salvage for five years. There is less than an even chance of salvage for five years if 50 percent of the circumference is killed, with a bend at the canker and either a sunken or normal face.

To some extent, the resistance to fusiform rust is a genetic trait. This is just one quality that plant breeders look for when developing new strains of trees, such as improved seedlings available from the Mississippi Forestry Commission, as well as industry and commercial nurseries.

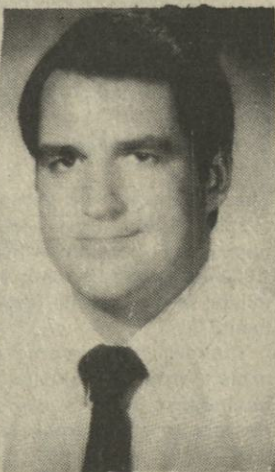

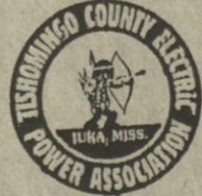

## John Blount Dortch Campbell Has Interesting Ancestry

Something that is interesting to most people is their family background - their heritage, but most of us rarely find out much past our great-grandparents. John Blount Dortch Campbell of Tishomingo recently found out some interesting facts about some of his ancestors.

According to John, one of his sisters, Mrs. I.R. Coleman Clarkdale who is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, found out by tracing the family line that their father that they were direct descendants of the four-governor of Tennessee, Willie Blount.

The information was found in the National Encyclopedia of American Biography. According to the information received by Campbell, Blount was Governor from 1809-15. He was born in Bertie County, North Carolina in 1768 and was the sixth son of Jacob Blount, who was a member of the Provincial Congress and an officer in the Revolutionary War. John Campbell was proud to find out this bit of family history, but he himself has lived quite an eventful life.

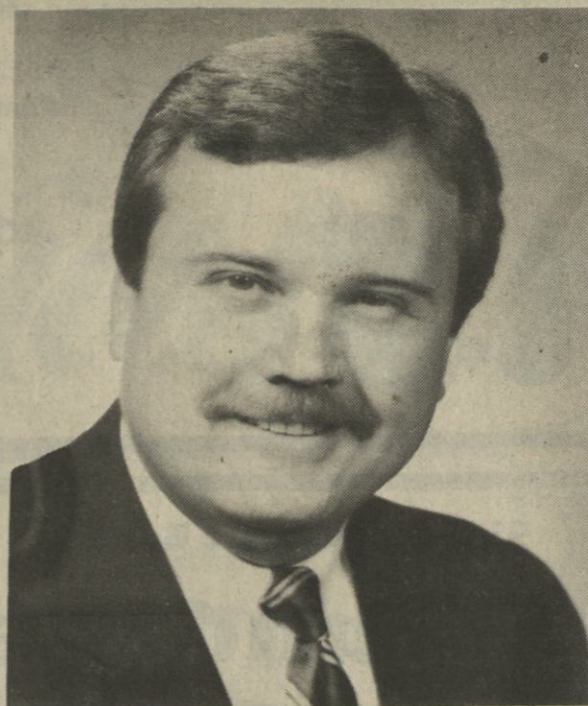

His father had acquired a position as managing Editor of the Clarksdale Daily Register where he worked for the next 26 years, stated Campbell, without even one vacation.

After graduating from Clarksdale High School, John put himself through Jackson Commercial College in Jackson, MS, and after finishing in 1940 he went on to explore many different occupations. He worked with the Civilian Conservation Corp created by President Franklin D. Roosevelt for several years. One position he held while working for this program, which was a branch from the Department of Interior, was personnel clerk at Roosevelt State Park. He was also appointed a member of the U.S. Forestry Service where he served as a squad foreman in Morton, MS, at the Holly Springs National Park.

Later Campbell gave the grocery business a try at a community located southwest of Pontotoc. From this he went into the insurance business where he worked his way to Assistant State Manager of the National Bankers Life Insurance Co. headquartered in Dallas, TX. It was while he was traveling with this company that he met his wife Katherine Nunley Campbell who was working at a cafe in Tishomingo, where she lived. "That's one policy I've been paying premiums on ever since," said Campbell, referring to his wife of 30 years.

After his work with the insurance company John began working as a correctional officer at the Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman. He retired from there after 20 years of service. "I saw a lot of things go on while I worked there," stated Campbell, "it was a bad place."

Campbell has one child living, Patricia McGregor who lives in Pontotoc County. He had one son who is deceased. So what does this descendant of Governor Willie Blount do now? "Well, I guess my only hobby is the guest for the almighty dollar," said Campbell, "I've never found a substitute for it."

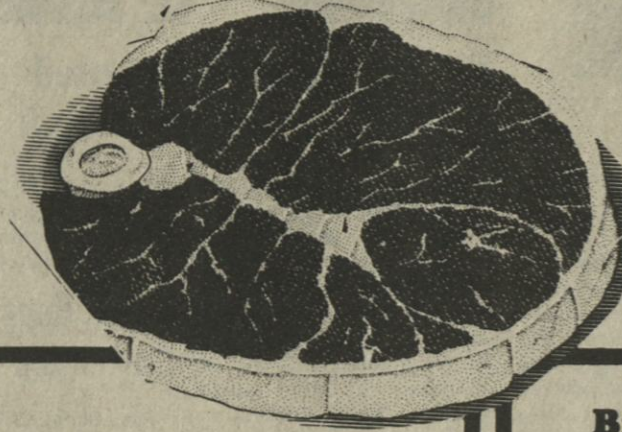

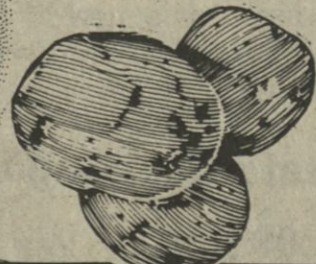

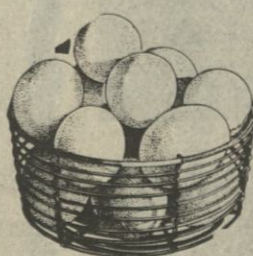

John could remember as a young boy being deathly afraid of the dark. It seemed that no matter how accustomed he became to the outdoors, there came a point in every overnight outing that darkness arrived to surround him. After the fire died down and his buddies fell asleep, John would lie there in his sleeping bag, his eyes wide open, thinking of home. Darkness in itself wasn't all that bad. But John changed as he grew up. He took his fear as a challenge and found the darkness to be exhilarating. He could identify every sound and often fell asleep dreaming up stories of what was going on in the night woods around him; the

lonely call of the whip-poor-will sounding through the darkness as a mother barred owl fed her young; the soft padding of a coyote's paws on the damp sand as a raccoon wrestled with a mussel at the river's edge.

But this outing was different. He had been laying in the darkness for hours, never sleeping, yet never fully awake. The darkness was cool with a kind of numbing effect. There was a strange peacefulness in the atmosphere, but John could find no comfort in it. The sounds of darkness that he had learned to love were missing. It was a deep, deep darkness that he had never known before. The buzzing sounds were there, but they, too, were strangers to him. They came, and they went. They faded in and out, almost as if they were teasing him; coming near, but then fading away. While they were gone, all was quiet. No, there was

The human body has one, and only one, reaction to the onset of drowning. It holds true from the youngest non-swimmer to the most experienced of swimmers. The arms wave up and down at the sides in an uncontrolled reflex. It looks like the person is cooling off or playing. The person's head comes above the water, one, two, maybe

three times. A person gasping for his last breath cannot yell, and the sound of a gurgle from a sinking body does not carry very far. The human body, with lungs full of water, loses its buoyancy. This is how John found the "deep darkness".

John's last name is Doe. He could be you. Or your friend. Or a family member. Thinking "it only happens to other people" is the first step in having it happen to you. Ignorance has already set in, and carelessness is not far behind; John's family only looked away for seven seconds. Seven seconds, and he was gone. Forever. Be smart. Be safe, leave the "deep darkness" to the fish.

## The Segars Clinic Report

Dear Dr. Scott,

I've been hearing alot about TMJ disease and wanted to ask you a few questions about it. I frequently have pain in my jaw joint with headaches and pain down my neck and up into my ear. could this be TMJ and how could I know for certain?

It would be difficult to diagnose your problem with the little information you have given us, but certainly TMJ is one thing to consider. Let me give you some more insight into the TMJ puzzle.

This problem can begin suddenly or occur over a long period of time. It may or may not be associated with injury to the jaw or neighboring areas. The pain of TMJ can be worse with chewing, yawning or opening the mouth wide. It is often associated with a sound of clicking, popping or grinding.

These are just a few of the manifestations that can accompany TMJ. I hope they have helped to clear the picture somewhat. If you still strongly suspect this is indeed your problem, I would suggest you see your family physician. There are some new and interesting strides being made in the problem of TMJ disorders.

## Hot Weather Tips

During the hot and humid days of summer here in Tishomingo County, think about dressing cooler. The following are some helpful tips from Nellie R. Horton, Extension Home Economist for Tishomingo County. Wear light instead of dark colors. Wear cool colors (blues, greens and purples). Avoid too many heavy-looking accessories. Choose open-toed, sling-back shoes or

sandals. Select garments made of cotton, linen, silk or ramie (or blends of these fibers). Wear cotton undergarments. Wear loose-fitting garments to allow for air circulation. Keep cotton or cotton polyester knits in mind for comfort, breathability and no wrinkles. Choose unlined jackets or blazers. Choose skirts because they are

cooler than slacks. Eliminate ties and scarves. Wear a half-slip instead of a whole slip. Select sleeveless or short-sleeve styles instead of long sleeves. Be sure to drink water - at least eight or more cups daily. Your body used more fluids during this hot, humid weather, so to prevent dehydration, you must drink plenty of fluids.

## Healthy Meals At Fast Food Restaurants

Eating out, especially at fast food restaurants, is a way of life for many people. Nutritionists would not recommend that anyone eat in a fast food restaurant every

day, but there is nothing wrong with an occasional meal out.

However, there may need to be some trade offs in other foods during the day before indulging in some fast foods. Some fast food meals can add up to 1,200 calories.

People who lead physically active lives have more leeway with calories than their less active friends.

The following are some sensible suggestions for choosing healthful fast foods:

\*Select a plain baked potato, but skip the cheese sauce and other high-fat toppings. Instead, stuff it with vegetables, lean meats, and a low calorie salad dressing. Or, try chili as a topping, provided it is not greasy.

\*Roast beef sandwiches offer a low-fat, low-calorie alternative to hamburgers.

\*If a hamburger is chosen, choose a small one and use condiments and sauce sparingly. Add lettuce and tomato to increase nutritional benefits.

\*Fried fish and chicken sandwiches are higher in fat than a hamburger. Tartar sauce and other dipping sauces also add fat and sodium.

\*Pizza is another relatively good choice, but skip the pepperoni and sausage topping as well as the extra

cheese.

\*The salad bar wins as the best fast food choice. However, select ingredients with care. A salad can easily add up to 1,000 calories. Choose salad greens and plain vegetables. Drain off the excess dressing from marinated vegetables. Go easy on the dressing or look for the low-calorie variety. Avoid or use sparingly bacon bits and croutons as well as potato and pasta salads laden with dressing.

\*Watch out for biscuits and croissants that usually have a high fat and sodium content. Plain buns, breads and

English muffins are lower in fat and better sources of complex carbohydrates.

\*For beverages, skip the shakes, which tend to be high in fat. Milk—especially low fat milk—is a better choice.

\*For dessert, choose fresh fruit from the salad bar.

Fast foods are here to stay and it is up to the consumer to choose the food that offers the most nutritional benefit for the least calories.

More and more fast food restaurants are catering to the consumers' interest in health and nutrition by providing healthy alternative

foods. Some also nutrition information on their menu items.

## Guidelines Announced For Free & Reduced School Lunches

The State Department of Education, Tishomingo County Schools and The Iuka Separate Municipal School Have recently announced the United States Department of Agriculture income guidelines for free and reduced price meals served under the School Lunch, School Breakfast, Food Distribution and Child Care Food Programs. Families with children in any of these facilities, who are unable to pay the full price of the meals are encouraged to apply for benefits.

Applications and instructions for applying, will be sent home with each student during registration or on the first day of school. To apply for the meal benefits, households should fill out the application and return it to the school or center. Additional copies of the application are available at the administrative office of each facility.

For the school/center officials to determine eligibility, the household must report income information or provide a food stamp or AFDC case number. If the child receives AFDC payments, or is a member of a food stamp household, the parent or guardian only has to provide the name of child, food stamp or AFDC case number, and the signature of the parent or guardian. Other applicants must report the total household income and the amount, and the source of income received by each household member. In order for income applicants to be approved, the household must also provide the following on the application: the names of all household members; the social security numbers of all adult household members or an indication that the adult does not have a social security number; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data. The information provided may be verified at any time during the year by school/center or program officials.

Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price or free meal if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown in the income scales. Households may apply for benefits at any time during the year as circumstances change.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for meal benefits for them, the household should contact the school/center for more information.

reduced meal policy. The policy indicates who is responsible for determining eligibility. The determining official is in most instances the principal, the food service supervisor, or the center director. Each school/school District/center has an individual named as the hearing official. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the determining official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to the hearing official. The school/center office or the

superintendent's office staff can provide you the name, address and phone number of the hearing official.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S.D.A. no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.
