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

Whitten - Stennis Instrumental In Funding For Rocket Plant

Local citizens and officials have kindled a flame that is spreading throughout the tri-state area with their enthusiasm over NASA's choice of the Yellow Creek site for their solid rocket booster plant.

It is the hope of lawmakers that the \$500 million plant will be this economically depressed area's entryway into the high-tech space industry, as was the case for Huntsville, AL when it joined the space program.

Tri-state economic development leaders feel that the outreach of the project will have a tremendous affect on the economy of an area in at least a one hundred mile radius of the luka site. A meeting will take place August 24 in Sheffield, AL with key representatives attending from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), state and local economic and industrial development agencies from the tristates - Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee to discuss the regional impact to result from the selection.

It was announced last week by both branches of Congress that appropriation bills have been passed funding NASA's budget. Included were funds to begin construction at the rocket plant site.

Rep. Jamie Whitten (D-Miss), Chairman of the U.S. House Appropriations Committee, has worked diligently in the aquisition of the plant for the North Mississippi area. According to a spokesman for Whitten, the bill passed for NASA included \$83 million to be used for the rocket production facility-operated site.

Chairman of the U.S. Senate Appropriation Committee, Sen. John C. Stennis (D-Miss.) also aided in the selection of the Yellow Creek site. The Senate, according to sources, set aside \$88 million for the fiscal year, beginning in October for NASA projects, with assurance that money from this amount will be appropriated solely for the governmentowned site in Tishomingo County.

Local officials have put long hours and much effort into the aquisition of the NASA facility at the abondoned Yellow Creek nuclear plant site. Among those working toward this goal was Rep. Mack Loyd Wadkins (D-luka), Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation. His job duties as TCDF Director include bringing new businesses and industrial development to the county. luka Mayor John H. Biggs was also instrumental in the project.

Everyone - each citizen, each local official and each lawmaker - who helped in this NASA venture is to be greatly commended. Not only the plant itself, but the many spin-off industries associated with the plant, as well as the service-generated and indirect jobs created by its presence, will affect everyone throughout the region. Many people who had to leave the county due to lack of employment opportunities may now be able to return to the area as a result of NASA's decision.

Business As Usual At Local Republic Bank

Republic Bank's conservator, Don L. Shields, and branch office manager, John Harmon, met with Mayor John H. Biggs on Monday, August 1, 1988, to discuss the current status of the bank so that customers and residents of the trade area would have a better understanding of the transition that Republic is currently undergoing. Mr. Shields was appointed Conservator of Republic on July 22, 1988, after the Federal Home Loan Bank Board (FHLBB) removed former management from their duties. Mr. Shield's duties are to manage the institution and preserve the assets of Republic until a buyer or merger partner can be found for the thrift.

Mr. Shields conveyed to Mayor Biggs that depositors are in no danger of losing their deposits. Republic bank depositors will find business institution will maintain the same offices, hours, and services. John Harmon will remain as the luka branch manager and Laverne Strickland will remain as the Belmont branch manager. Customer accounts will continue to build interest as

Republic Bank will also maintain the rates and terms of all contracts and will carry insurance up to \$100,000 for all checking and savings accounts by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation (FSLIC), an agency of the U.S. Government. Republic Bank, a Jackson, Mississippi, based thrift, reported assets of \$79.9 million as of May 31, 1988. No other changes have occurred in the operation of the institution or any of its three locations other than the change in management.

Whitten Announces \$375,000 To Recapitalize Loan Fund

Congressman Jamie Whitten announced today that the Appalachian Regional Commission has approved \$375,000 to recapitalize the Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District's revolving loan fund.

The District serves Alcorn. Benton, Marshall, Prentiss. Tippah and Tishomingo Counties. The ARC grant will be matched with local funds provided by beneficiaries of the revolving loan fund.

Congressman Whitten said ARC initially capitalized the District's fund in 1986 with \$500,000. The District has made \$350,000 in loans and at least \$300,000 in new loans are currently under review.

These loans will be partially responsible businesses creating at least 1,000 new jobs and nearly \$12 million in new private invest-

The revolving loan program assists new and expanding businesses with such endeavors as plant expansions and new equipment in association with locally generated bank loans and owner equity.

Mabus Sees Economic Boost For State

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced that it will likely locate its planned Space Shuttle Advanced Solid Rocket Motor facility at the abandoned Yellow Creek nuclear plant.

Production will be done at the Yellow Creek facility while the rocket testing will take place at the Stennis Space Center in Hancock County

NASA still must decide whether to go with a governmanet owned facility or a privately owned one. If NASA opts for a government owned facility, as anticipated, Mississippi is expected to get the project.

Gov. Mabus said NASA officials told him "we have been very aggressive in pursuing the project and that helped in getting the project.

"The entire Mississippi congressional delegation, the entire Mississippi Legislature and this office worked very hard together,"

The project involves a total capital investment of \$600 million. It will provide 2,000 permanent jobs and a peak construction employment of 2.500 to 3.000 lobs.

Timberline

In last week's column we took a brief look at fusiform rust, a serious fungus disease of southern pine trees. Today, we'll look at some ways of dealing with the problem.

Complete eradication of the disease is not possible. In nurseries and seed orchards. where values are high, the damage caused by fusiform rust can be reduced by spraying the trees with fungicides. In plantations or natural stands, where spraying is not economically feasible, other steps can be.

taken. In young plantations, pruning branches with rust galls less than 15 inches from the stem will reduce the likelihood of trunk infestations. Pruning is useless on trees that already have a trunk gall or canker. Moreover, new infections sometimes occur even after pruning. Sometimes it is possible to save a high-value tree with a small, newly developed trunk gall. Carefully cut away the bark and some of the wood around

There are no paint. treatment guidelines for In commercial stands. thrips but consider threating trees with trunk cankers them if damage leads to should be removed in thinning operations, provided their removal does not open the stand too much. Diseased Financing trees are not a direct threat to the surrounding healthy ones, since spores that infect pines come only from oak

leaves. The following rule of thumb might be useful in planning the salvage of trees with trunk cankers: If less than 50 percent of the circumference is killed, there is more than even chance of salvage for eight years. If 50 percent of the circumference is killed, but there is no bend at the canker or no sunken face, there is an even chance of salvage for five years. There is less than an even chance of salvage for five years if 50 percent of the circumference is killed, with a bend at the canker and either a sunken or normal face.

To some extent, the resistance to fusiform rust is a genetic trait. This is just one quality that plant breeders look for when developing new strains of trees, such as improved seedlings available from the Mississippi Forestry Commission, as well as industry and commercial nurseries.

Potassium permanganate has long been used for various operations in fish to such treated waters. culture.

Perhaps the largest volume of permanganate used in fish culture is for prevention of fish kill due to oxygen depletion.

Since oxygen depletion may cause the loss of an entire fish population, routine observations of all ponds before sunrise should be made during the summer months when the water is hot and oxygen level would be naturally lower. Sunrise is the time when natural dissolved oxygen will be lowest. This is because of the discontinuance of photosynthesis during the darkness hours.

Snails, tadpoles, or fish at or near the surface indicate low oxygen. Normally, whenever the permanganate is added, the fish almost immediately return to deeper water. When treating for oxygen depletion, no phosphate fertilizers should be added and the fish should

Frequently it is desirable for all fish in a stream, lake, or pond to be destroyed. In cases such as this, normally 0.05 ppm of rotenone is used. A waiting period of 5 to 7 days is normally necessary for the natural detoxification of rotenone before restocking can be attempted. When more immediate restocking is desired or if the rotenone effects need to be stopped, permanganate can be applied to detoxify rotenone.

In field usage, concentrations of 2.0-2.5 ppm permanganate successfully neutralized the concentration of 0.05 ppm rotenone. The use of permanganate apparently had no harmful effects on the water treated. Probable owing to its fungicidal action, this effects on any fish present or that are added immnediately

Summertime-The Right Time To Prevent Food Poisoning

Summertime is here, and Tishomingo Countians are practicing the rituals of the season: softball, swimming, sunbathing, and most of all. ignoring the clock.

Unfortunately, bacteria that cause foodborne illnesses doesn't take a summer vacation. So, as you plan picnics and barbecues. remember to watch the clock

to keep summer eating safe. Time is just what these bacteria need to multiplyalong with the right temperature, a source of nourishment and other favorable factors. Failure to cook or reheat foods long enough is one of the most common food handling mistakes made.

Protein-rich raw foods such as meat, poultry, eggs and seafood can provide bacteria with the nourishment they need to multiply. If these raw foods are not cooked long enough at the proper temperature, bacteria can sur-

A study of foodborne illness outbreaks involving meat and poultry over a 10 year period found that inadequate cooking

about half of the cases. To be sure food is cooked sufficiently, use a meat thermometer when grilling large cuts of meat. The internal temperature of roast beef or pork should be at least 160 degrees F for medium, which is adequate to destroy either salmonella bacteria or the trichina parasite. Most people prefer roast chicken or turkey that is cooked to 180 or 185 degrees F.

Avoid interrupted cooking Many people like to partially cook ribs or other foods inside, then finish them on the grill. However, partial cooking is safe only if food is moved immediately from the oven or microwave to the hot grill, with no time on the counter or in the refrigerator.

Cooling errors, such as leaving cooked foods at room temperature too long, contributed to about 50 percent of the food-illness outbreaks in the study.

After cooking, perishable foods should be cooled rapidly and evenly. Refrigerate foods containing meat and poultry within two hours after cooking. If you're grilling outside in 90 degree weather, it's wise to refrigerate foods even sooner to avoid giving bacteria too much time to reproduce.

Deep containers holding large portions don't allow even cooling of the food inside. Divide larger portions into shallow, covered containers to promote fast cooling. Shallow containers will probably fit the cooler better, too.

Use care when preparing foods ahead of time. Cooking ahead of time can be convenient if you're planning to serve large numbers of people. However, preparing foods in advance can also compound any undercooking, cooling, sanitation or other food-handling mistakes you might have made. In the study of food illness outbreaks, preparing foods a day or more ahead was a factor in almost one-third of the cases.

The bacteria that cause most foodborne illness are common in our environmenton raw meat and poultry, in water and soil, to name just a few places. "Staph" bacteria, located in the nose and throat, can cause staph infection if you are not careful when you have to sneeze or touch your nose while preparing foods.

When these bacteria are allowed enough time to reproduce in food, some of the people who eat that food may become ill. Children, the elderly, AIDS and cancer patients are most at risk of serious health problems from foodborne illness.

Ironically, bacterial foodborne illness is easy to prevent. Watch the clock! Take the time to practice food safety to prevent foodborne illnesses.

Chicken and Rice Skillet

2 whole chicken breasts,

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

IMPORTANT NOTICE **NEW LAW CONCERNING POWER LINES**

A new law concerning activities in proximity to electric power lines went into effect July 1,

Under this law (House Bill No. 1265), if a person is going to perform a function or activity that could be reasonably expected to cause persons, equipment or parts of tools or materials to be brought within ten feet of an electric utility's lines, it is unlawful for that person to proceed with such function or activity until (1) the electric utility has been notified in writing on a form to be provided by the utility; and (2) the utility has made safety arrangements to deter contact with utility lines. Any person who violates this law is subject to the imposition of civil penalties and other liabilities.

The Segars Clinic Report

Dear Dr. Scott,

I've been hearing alot about TMJ disease and wanted to ask you a few questions about it. I frequently have pain in my jaw joint with headaches and pain down my neck and up into my ear. could this be TMJ and how could I know for certain?

It would be difficult to diagnose your problem with the little information you have given us, but certainly TMJ is one thing to consider. Let me give you some more insight into the TMJ puzzle.

This problem can begin suddenly or occur over a long period of time. It may or may not be associated with injury to the jaw or neighboring areas. The pain of TMJ can be worse with chewing, yawning or opening the mouth wide. It is often associated with a sound of clicking, popping or

These are just a few of the manisfestations that can accompany TMJ. I hope they have helped to clear the picture somewhat. If you still strongly suspect this is indeed your problem, I would suggest you see your family physican. There are some new and interesting strides being made in the problem of TMJ disorders.

Guidelines Announced For Free & Reduced School Lunches

The State Department of Education, Tishomingo County Schools and The luka Separate Municipal School Have recently announced the United States Department of Agriculture income guidelines for free and reduced price meals served under the School Lunch, School Breakfast, Food Distribution and Child Care Food Programs. Families with children in any of these facilities, who are unable to pay the full price of the meals are encouraged to apply for

Applications and instructions for applying, will be sent home with each student during registration or on the first day of school. To apply for the meal benefits, households should fill out the application and return it to the school or center. Additional copies of the application are available at the administrative office of each

For the school/center officials to determine eligibility. the household must report income information or provide a food stamp or AF-DC case number. If the child receives AFDC payments, or is a member of a food stamp household, the parent or guardian only has to provide the name of child, food stamp or AFDC case number, and the signature of the parent or guardian. Other applicants must report the total household income and the amount, and the source of income received by each household member. In order for income applicants to be approved, the household must also provide the following on the application: the names of all household members; the social security numbers of all adult household members or an indication that the adult does not have a social security number; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data. The information provided may be verified as any time during the year by school/center or program officials. Households are required to

report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases. the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price or free meal if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown in the income scales. Households may apply for benefits at any time during the year as circumstances change.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for meal benefits for them, the household should contact the school/center for more information. Each school/center has a




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
