\$27 Million Appropriated For NASA Rocket Site

Congressman Jamie Whitten, Chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations, said today that the committee has approved NASA's plan to request proposals for the design and development of the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor.

NASA was advised that the Appropriations committee agreed with NASA's plan to release the \$27 million for

either a government or non-government ASRM production facility at the government site at Yellow Creek, Miss.

In its formal request, NASA asked:

"...to issue a Request For Proposal (RFP) for design and development of the Advanced Solid Rocket Motor (ASRM)...
"The Tennessee Valley Authority property known as

Yellow Creek, in northeastern Mississippi, has been selected for the location of the facility for production of the ASRM, while NASA's Stennis Space Center, near Bay St. Louis, Mississippi, has been selected for testing of the motor.

"The necessary environmental impact analyses have been initiated. Contractor teams are in place, and NASA is prepared to conduct a

rigorous and competitive procurement. Proposals for ASRM development will be solicited to include a Government facility, to be designed, built, and operated by the selected contractor on the Government site..."

Congressman Whitten said the \$27 million was included in this year's appropriations bill, approved in the Conference with the Senate.

Murder Suspect Surrenders Following Three Day Manhunt

Reports from Alcorn County Sheriff Bill Gant have confirmed that Alvin J. Meeks, the Tishomingo County man, who is the prime suspect in the murder of an Alcorn County woman and the abduction of another turned himself in to Tishomingo County authorities late Tuesday night.

Alvin Meeks, 27, of Burnsville was being sought in connection with the Sunday morning August 7 murder of Linda Meeks, 29, at her Gaines Road residence in Alcorn County and the kidnapping of his wife, Tana Spencer Meeks, who was also at the residence.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs, Meeks was taken into custody at approximately 10:30 p.m. Tuesday at the county jail in Iuka.

Prior to this, Meeks was spotted in Colbert County, midday Tuesday, traveling South down the Natchez Trace Parkway, according to Colbert County Sheriff Buddy Aldridge. "He had apparently been in Alabama (Decatur) Monday night with his alleged hostage and wife Tana and his sister, Hester Lambert," stated Sheriff Gant. "The girls had apparently attempted to talk Meeks into turning himself in to authorities," he continued.

Sheriff Aldridge went on to explain that as the trio crossed the Natchez Trace Bridge traveling toward the Mississippi State line, a controversy apparently caused (Alvin) Meeks to stop at the edge of the bridge. He then pushed his wife off of the bank there. "His sister ran away at that time to try and find authorities," said Aldridge.

Authorities from Colbert County, AL, Tishomingo and Alcorn counties were all called to the scene. A search was made but nothing was found, stated Aldridge. Gant stated that the two women were transported back to Alcorn County for questioning.

Lawmen concentrated their efforts in and around the area where Alvin Meeks' lives after this incident and Gant stated that he believes that the family of Meeks recognized their great determination and helped him in making his

decision to turn himself in to authorities.

Events leading to the murder of Linda Meeks are still not certain, but reports have stated that Alvin Meeks and his wife, Tana had been separated and she had been living at her brother and sister-in-law's residence, Ricky and Linda Meeks in Alcorn County. Ricky and Tana Spencer Meeks, who are brother and sister, are both first cousins of Alvin Meeks.

Alvin Meeks, in an attempt to win his wife back, had rented a tuxedo and was taken to her present place of residence by limousine, said sources. It has been speculated that the events leading up to the shooting may have stemmed from the uncooperative manner of Tana Meeks in Alvin Meeks' efforts.

According to an autopsy performed at Magnolia Hospital in Corinth on Monday, the victim, Linda Meeks, was shot once in the head with what is thought to be a .38-caliber handgun, said Deputy State Medical Examiner, Dr. Thomas McLees. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene.

The approximate time of the shooting is estimated to be around 6:45 a.m. Sunday. The victim's two children were present at the house when the incident occurred.

Linda Meeks' 8-year-old son and 13-year-old daughter, who were apparently in another room sleeping, had heard their mother come into the room where she was looking for the telephone book so that she could call the sheriff. They heard her say that she had found it and soon after this they heard the gunshot, stated Alcorn County investigator, Jimmy Taylor. The children then entered the living room where they discovered their mother's body lying on the floor and Alvin Meeks dragging Tana Meeks out of the door, the official went on to explain.

After the authorities from Alcorn county arrived at the scene of the murder at approximately 7:00 a.m., a search for the suspect and his hostage began, and according to officials, a reported sighting of the couple on a railroad track

about 3 1/2 miles west of Burnsville on the north side of U.S. Hwy. 72 led to a land and air search by authorities from three counties.

A canine unit from Tupelo was taken to the railroad tracks where the sighting occurred but the scent was lost at the place where Meeks apparently left the tracks.

At about 11:00 a.m. the Tupelo Strategic Weapons Assault Team (S.W.A.T.) forced entry into the suspected assailant's home where they found the tuxedo Meeks had worn and some other personal items. Meeks had apparently returned home and changed clothes after the shooting and abduction had occurred.

Burnsville Mayor Bobby Johnson and Tishomingo County Constable, Tim Bivins

found Meek's 1984 Chevrolet Chevette in a field near the railroad tracks.

Also called in to aid in the search for Meeks was a helicopter and airplane.

The officials continued their search on into the late evening with no new evidence appearing.

Authorities included in the search for Meeks included Mississippi Highway Patrol officials, special weapons unit and tracking dog unit from Tupelo, officials from the state narcotic's bureau, Alcorn, Tishomingo County Sheriff's Departments, Colbert County Sheriff's Department and Iuka and Burnsville City Police Departments.

The hostage, Tana Meeks and sister-in-law, Hester Lambert were unharmed in the ordeal.

Surplus Food Distribution

The Tishomingo County Welfare Department announced today that U.S. Department of Agriculture Surplus Commodities will be distributed, Thursday, August 25, 1988, beginning at 8:00 a.m.

Identification will now be required for a person picking up an allotment for someone else. The person picking up the allotment should bring something to identify himself, such as a drivers license or social security card. This is a new requirement that will be enforced. Also, if the household is authorizing someone else to pick up their allotment, the front and back of the voucher must be completed and signed.

Households receiving food stamps receive their vouchers with their food stamps. All other certified households (self declared income) will have vouchers mailed on August 10, 1988, therefore, it will not be necessary for these households to come to the Welfare Office to pick up their vouchers. Households that do not receive a voucher by mail need to come to the office to have their certification updated. Anyone wishing to make an application may apply after August 15, 1988. Eligibility is based on income.

Misrepresentation of need, or sale or exchange of USDA commodities, is prohibited and could result in a fine, imprisonment, or both. USDA's Emergency Food Assistance Program is available to all eligible recipients regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex or handicap.

The following items are scheduled to be distributed, but is subject to change: 3 butters, 1 flour and 1 milk. Those receiving the surplus foods are requested to bring a paper sack for their convenience in carrying the items.

Local 4-H'er Tours Co-ops

Learning didn't stop when classes were out for Keith Broadway, who recently joined 29 youth from throughout Mississippi for the 4-H Cooperative Business Shortcourse.

The shortcourse, conducted by the 4-H department of the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and sponsored by the Mississippi Council of Farm Cooperatives, was conceived to educate youth leaders about cooperative business and the role of cooperatives in Mississippi agriculture.

In addition to receiving classroom-type instruction about the cooperative form of business, the 4-H'ers participated in a day tour of agricultural cooperatives throughout the state.

Keith qualified to participate in the program by winning the senior Safety Visual Presentation 4-H competition.

The tour originated at Mississippi State University and included stops at Stapleton in Greenwood, Delta Pride Catfish in Belzoni, Mississippi Chemical Cooperative in Yazoo City, MFC Services in Madison, and the Mississippi Electric Power Association's coal powered electric generating plant in Hattiesburg.

The youth also gained first-hand knowledge of a cooperative business by forming their own soft drink cooperative.

The organizational consultant for this activity was Ginger Cocke, communications coordinator for Electric Power Associations of Mississippi.

The 4-H cooperative elected a board of directors and hired a manager and an ac-

countant. Stock in the cooperative sold for \$1 per share. At the end of the program, 4-H members received 63 cents profit for every dollar they invested.

On the last night of the program shortcourse participants were given a quiz on the cooperative form of business. Based on the test scores and overall participation and interest in activities, two 4-H'ers were selected to attend the annual meeting of the American Institute of Cooperatives in Rochester, New York.

Those selected for the all-expense-paid trip were Michael Hess of Jones County and Jennifer Magee from Waltham County. They were notified of their selection at a banquet hosted by Electric Power Associations of Mississippi.

Also receiving trips to the AIC meeting were Heather Saum of Lowndes County and Phyllis Vandever of Yazoo County, first and second place winners, respectively, in the cooperative business visual presentation contest.

Accompanying the youth on the tour were L.L. "Red" Monroe, executive director of the MFCF, Dr. Charles Sappington, state 4-Header, and Jim Yonge, 4-H youth development specialist.

During the month of July, Tishomingo County 4-H'ers were working hard to complete their records for the 1987-88 year. The hard work paid off for most of the 4-H'ers submitting the records to state competition.

Senior Division - This division includes 4-H'ers 15-18 years of age. County 4-H'ers with state winning records were Kristi Starkey of the Action 4-H Club in Conservation of Natural Resources, Pam Lambert of the North Crossroads Club in Food Preservation, and Anthony Bray of the Rainbow Club in Wood Science.

Second place record winners were Nancy South of the Midway 4-H Club in Leadership and Lori Rutledge of the North Crossroads 4-H Club in Child Care.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Nutritious Meals That Appeal To Children

Planning nutritious meals that appeal to children is not always an easy task.

Start with the basic four food groups (fruits and vegetables, breads and cereals, milk and milk products, meat and meat alternates), then add variety. Keep color, flavor, texture and shape in mind as you plan.

COLOR--Choose foods such as orange carrots, purple plums, green peas and red radishes. Children, like adults, like things that appeal to the eye. Combine the natural colors of foods in meals to appeal to children.

FLAVOR--Mild milk, sweet applesauce, spicy chicken coating and tart pickled beets will add flavor variety. Meals that contain all bland tasting foods or all bold flavored foods are less appealing than those that have a combination of flavors.

TEXTURE--Whether you think about textures or not, variations, such as soft mashed potatoes, crispy celery, creamy pudding, chewy meat and smooth peanut butter, will make meals more interesting. Much of the appeal of a meal comes from variations in textures of the foods. Combine soft, crispy, chewy and cream whenever possible.

SHAPE--Some shape is dictated by nature, such as round peas, other shapes can be determined by the cook - triangular toast, cucumber strips, diced potatoes or grated carrots. Variations in shapes will also make the meal much more interesting to children.

For a special treat, let your child decorate ordinary

foods. Make faces on hamburger buns with green olives and pimento. Turn a pear half into an animal with raisin eyes and apple slice ears.

Decorate open face sandwiches with processed cheese slice designs with a cookie cutter. Make pancakes into artwork by forming shapes with the batter. Hard-cooked eggs can be dyed any time of the year.

Planning a nutritionally balanced meal may not be as difficult as getting children to eat the meal. Keep variety in meals and involve children in simple preparation whenever possible.

BAKED APPLE

4 Servings
4 large apples
1/4 cup sugar, white or brown
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon or nutmeg
1 cup water

1. Cut out the core of each apple without cutting through to the bottom. Stick a fork through the apple skin on top in 3 or 4 places.

2. Put apples in a small baking dish.

3. Mix sugar and cinnamon. Put 1 tablespoon of mixture into center of each apple.

4. Pour water around, not over, the apples.

5. Cover dish. Bake at 350° F. for about 60 minutes, or until apples are tender.

OTHER FILLING IDEAS: Crush pineapple packed in juice, Raisins, alone or with sugar and cinnamon.

Four Percent Increase On High School (GED)

Almost 9,000 Mississippians received a High School Equivalency (GED) Certificate in 1987. This represents an increase of more than four percent over the previous year. Bill Box, state GED administrator, says 13,454 adults took the GED test in the state last year.

"The average age of the examinees was 25.7 years," says Box, "with 26.4 percent under the age of 20." Box says since the GED Testing Program was begun in Mississippi, 131,098 adults have received a GED certificate issued by the State Department of Education.

Nationally, 758,367 persons took the GED Tests in 1987 - three percent more than in 1986. Box says as a result of this testing, conducted at over 3,300 testing locations, almost 75 percent of the examinees earned scores that qualified them for a high school equivalency credential.

Since 1971, the GED Testing Program has enabled over 6.5 million adults to obtain formal recognition of their educational development through their attainment of a high school equivalency diploma, says

Box. Annually, one of every seven high school diplomas earned in the United States is based on results from the GED Tests.

Across the country, examinees had completed an average of 9.9 years of schooling before leaving high school. More than half of the examinees reported they were planning to continue their education or training beyond a high school level.

CRP Signup Extended

To give farmers more time
to consider the effects of the
drought, the U.S. Department
of Agriculture extended the
July 18-Aug. 5 signup for the
Conservation Reserve
Program through August 31.
The voluntary program takes
highly erodible land out of
farming for 10 years and
places it into trees, filter
strips, wildlife habitat and
other permanent vegetative
cover.

Cropland which has been
hayed for drought relief is
eligible during this seventh
sign-up period for the 1988
crop year, if the land meets
other program requirements.
Acreage conservation reserve
and conservation use acres
are not eligible for the CRP.

To enroll in the program,
farmers must submit bids
stating the per acre rental
payment they would accept
to convert their highly
erodible cropland to conser-
ving uses, and also provide a

cropping history for 1981
through 1985.

Farmers will be eligible to
receive 50 percent of the cost
of establishing filter strips or
planting trees on land, as well
as annual rental payments for
retiring highly erodible acres
through 10-year contracts.
The county ASC committee is
responsible for determining
that each producer's offer
does not exceed the
prevailing local rental rate for
comparable land.

By stabilizing eroding
cropland, the CRP has
become a major tool in com-
bating nonpoint source
pollution in streams and
other water bodies. To further
the goal of preventing the
degradation of water quality,
USDA authorized cropland
acres 66-99 feet wide, next to
streams, lakes and perma-
nent bodies of water
which are suitable as
vegetative filter strips.

To continue improving
water quality, we encourage
program participants to take
advantage of the new
vegetative filter strip prac-
tices. Filter strips act as
filters of sediment,

associated nutrients, and
other pollutants, thereby
reducing the loading of
pollutants to the water.

Only one-third of the area
to be planted to trees has to
be predominantly highly
erodible to be eligible for the
CRP. Program participants
requesting only grass seeding
are asked to consider wildlife
cover or windbreaks as part
of their acreage to provide
additional wildlife benefits.

The seventh CRP signup
policies pertaining to land
eligibility for FY 1988 con-
tracts have been expanded.
Only conserving use land that
was designated as ACR or CU
for payment, including the 8
percent, is eligible to be of-
fered for a FY 1988 CRP con-
tract. Land that was in a con-
serving use and designated
only for P&PC purposes is
eligible for a FY 1988 CRP
contract.

continuing through Sept. 18. Dove season reopens Oct. 22 and continues through Nov. 12, reopening Dec. 25 and ending Jan. 15.

Hunters will continue to have a 15 bird bag limit. According to a spokesman at the Department of Wildlife Conservation, the Commission decided to keep the 15 bird daily limit until the results of a hunter survey is tabulated, since several survey questions relate to dove hunting.

Hunters will notice that the third dove season is somewhat later than previous years due to concerns expressed by dove hunters desiring the latest possible season dates within federal guidelines. For now the Commission decided to continue with all-day dove shooting.

Shooting hours this year will be one-half hour before sunrise until sunset.

Conservation enforcement officials are reminding hunters that the mourning dove is a migratory bird and is protected by state and federal laws. Hunters should know they must have their shotguns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells.

Of course shooters must have a valid hunting license signed and on their person before going afield.

Other migratory bird seasons passed by the Commission include: Woodcock, Dec. 26 - Feb. 28, Snipe, Nov. 14 - Feb. 28, Gallinule, Oct. 15 - Dec. 23, King and Clapper rail, Oct. 15 - Dec. 23, Sora and Virginia rail, Oct. 15 - Dec. 23.

Meanwhile, the early September teal season that waterfowl hunters have enjoyed for years has been discontinued this fall. The option was not offered to the states by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, due to depressed populations of blue-winged teal because of the drought on their nesting areas.

Sources within the Department say that the teal season is not gone for good in future years, only until the species population has recovered from record low levels.

"It should take a couple of years and good habitat conditions on the breeding grounds to the population level back up," according to Seth Mott, chief of game for the Department.

The overall breeding population for blue-winged teal this year was 3.6 million birds. This level is similar to last year's but is the third lowest since 1955 and 20 percent below a thirty-three-year average.

Mott said that the Fish and Wildlife Service hopes that restrictions on teal hunting will bring blue-winged teal numbers up to their goal of 5.3 million.

He said that the Service is forecasting an overall flight of all ducks this year at 66 million, the second lowest fall flight since 1955.

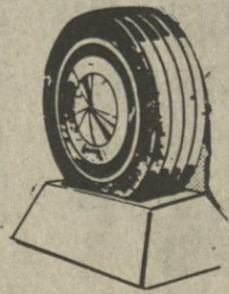

"It should take a couple of years and good habitat conditions on the breeding grounds to the population level back up," according to Seth Mott, chief of game for the Department.

The overall breeding population for blue-winged teal this year was 3.6 million birds. This level is similar to last year's but is the third lowest since 1955 and 20 percent below a thirty-three-year average.

Mott said that the Fish and Wildlife Service hopes that restrictions on teal hunting will bring blue-winged teal numbers up to their goal of 5.3 million.

He said that the Service is forecasting an overall flight of all ducks this year at 66 million, the second lowest fall flight since 1955.

Contract For Small Farmer Training
