Local Patrolman Plans Trip To Olympics

Few people get a chance to personally witness the historic, dynamic display events and competitive contests that are associated with the Olympic Games every four years. One man from Tishomingo County will experience the 1988 Summer Olympic Games, to be held in Seoul, South Korea, for himself as he travels there as a part of the Olympic Hospitality Committee from the United States.

Mississippi Highway Patrolman Ralph Montgomery, of Belmont, was invited by James W. Greene, chairman of the Amateur Athletic Union Hospitality Committee, to be a host for the committee at the Games to be held September 15 through October 2.

This 100th Olympics is

scheduled to include participants from over 165 countries.

The 14-year veteran of the Mississippi Highway Patrol is the first Mississippian to be a part of the committee. Expenses of the trip must be paid by the committee member, but Montgomery will be able to buy tickets at a reduced price. "Regular price tickets to each event will be \$250," Montgomery explained, "but since I'll be on the hospitality committee, I will be able to purchase them for \$100 per event."

Montgomery recently received a letter from Mississippi Governor Ray Mabus congratulating him on his selection to the committee.

The officer learned of the job after meeting a physician

connected with the U.S. Olympic team and applied. He learned he had been chosen in November of 1987.

As far as his roll on the committee, Montgomery has been diligently working on putting together a "Mississippi Packet" filled with pamphlets and information in general about the industries, resources, etc. that Mississippi has to offer to any businessman or industry that might be looking for something we have. The packet contains a large variety of information about North Mississippi, since Montgomery and his family live in this part of the state.

"It includes information from the timber industry, catfish farms and the Tenn-Tom Waterway, just to name a few things," said the trooper, "you never know who will visit your exhibit and see the literature you've brought."

Work at the exhibit will only be for about two to three hours a day, according to Montgomery. He stated that among the events he hopes to attend while he is not working at the exhibit include some of the track and field events, baseball, boxing and table tennis. "There will be athletes competing from Mississippi on some of the U.S. teams and I will try to attend the events they will be participating in," he said.

Montgomery, originally from the Belmont area, has lived throughout Mississippi including Hazlehurst and Jackson, but decided to move back to Tishomingo County with his wife, Marilyn, so that their four children (Natalie, Monte, Marc and Emily) could grow up in this area, which Montgomery says is a "great place to live."

Patrolman Montgomery stated that he is very excited to be traveling to such a prestigious event.

No TVA Rate Increase Approved By Directors

The TVA Board of Directors today approved a staff recommendation not to raise electric rates for the next fiscal year, beginning October 1 and ending September 30, 1989.

"It's with great pleasure and a sense of accomplishment that we approve a rate action today that does not include a rate increase," said TVA Chairman Marvin Runyon. "TVA plays a vital role in the overall economic

health of this region. It is our sincere hope that by holding electric rates steady we will encourage industrial development, help create more and better-paying jobs, and improve the quality of life in the Tennessee Valley."

TVA Senior Vice President Robert C. Steffy, Jr., presented the Board an updated financial plan for fiscal 1989 during a public Board meeting in Nashville.

"This final review confirms our projections of last month," Steffy said. "Revenues under the rates currently in effect will be sufficient to ensure the safe and reliable operation of the power system and will allow us to continue to hold the line on rates in the future."

"It's a pleasure to approve something this important to the future of the Tennessee Valley," said Director C.H. Dean, Jr. "It has taken some very tough decisions to reach this point."

"I'm extremely proud of the

hard work and sacrifice that went into this rate proposal," said Director John B. Waters. "I think it shows that TVA is serious about putting its financial house in order."

At a public meeting last month, the Board was presented initial operating and financial projections for the coming year and a preliminary recommendation for no rate increase. Since then, the Board has been studying the data and receiving comments from the public.

Iuka Police Department Makes Two Major Arrests Recently

Iuka City Police reports have indicated that officers have made two, unrelated arrests recently of major offenders.

The first arrest was made Saturday, August 27th on the charge of embezzlement.

An Iuka man, employed by Jones Pool Company in Iuka, was arrested on charges of embezzlement after failing a polygraph test administered by Officer Jerry Crocker of the Tupelo City Police Department.

Apparently an undisclosed amount of money was found to be missing from the business. The owner reported that the money had been stolen. Iuka policemen Rick Cornelison and Bobby Flynt, after extended investigation decided to bring in the polygraph (lie detector) test to be administered to all of Jones' employees and other suspects. The man arrested did not pass the test.

He was jailed and has now been released on \$5,000 bond.

In another incident, occurring Sunday night, August 28th, an Alabama man, found to be a fugitive, was apprehended by the I.P.D.

Timothy Edward Glass, 26 of Calhoun County Alabama, was picked up while walking along the four-lane U.S. Hwy. 72 East in Iuka by officers.

The policemen found that

the man was wanted in Calhoun County for several offenses. Included were parole violation, charges for aggravated assault and also charges for possession and sale of marijuana, the police reports indicated.

Glass is presently awaiting extradition to the Alabama county where he is an offender.

Iuka officers making the arrest were Rick Cornelison and Bobby Flynt.

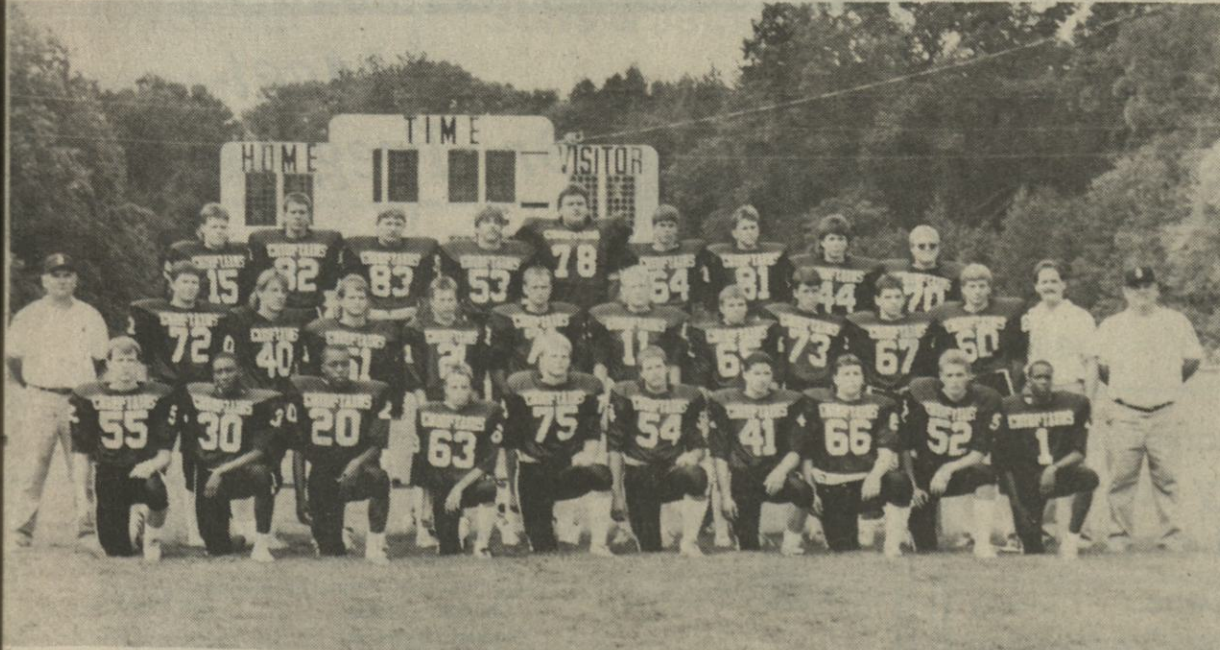
The remaining two county teams will be competing against one another for the season opener this Friday in 1-A division competition.

seling, and Guilt. Dr. Howard's certification is for a period of two years, after which time he may apply for recertification and meet the requirements of continuing education and substantial involvement in Christian Counseling. The public can know whether a counselor is a Certified Christian Counselor by looking for the appropriate identification on business card, letterhead, telephone listings and directors as well as a display of a Certificate of Certification in the counselor's office.

Dr. Howard resides in Belmont, MS with his wife Tammy, two daughters Cassie and Anna, and son Jonathon. He is the son of the Rev. Pat and Christene Howard of Belmont, MS. He is a Business Administration graduate of the former Professional College of Business, Tupelo, MS; He has an Associate Degree of Sacred Literature from Bethany Theological Seminary, Dothan, Alabama, and will be receiving the Doctorate of Ministry Degree from Southern Baptist Center for Biblical Studies, October 7, in Jacksonville, Florida. He is the pastor of Calvary Baptist Church of Belmont, MS where he also practices Christian Counseling to the public, and is a Church Growth Specialist for the Sunday School Dept. of the Mississippi Baptist Convention Board.

Adult Classes At Vo-Tech Center

The Tishomingo County Vocational Center through the cooperation of the vocational division of the State Department of Education is organizing adult evening classes for the fall semester. The classes are being offered to upgrade the skills for adults. The courses are also offered for adults to gain a new skill. The courses are non-credit. Registration for these classes will be held at the Vocational Center September 12, 1988 at 7:00 p.m.

Upon successful completion of a class, each person will receive a certificate.

Laboratory fees are charged for each class, the cost varies according to the nature of the class and the fees must be paid on the date of registration. Two of the classes require pre-registration. They are basic Computer Literacy and Body and Fender. Persons wishing to pre-register for these two classes should come by the vocational center and sign up and pay the necessary fees if they wish to insure space in the classes or they may choose to wait until registration night.

Late registration is accepted thru the third regular class meeting. Refunds are made on the following basis: After one class period 60 min. refund; after two class periods a 20% refund; and after 3 regular class periods 0% refund.

The following classes are being offered for the fall semester and other class can be offered if as many as 10 people ask for a particular class.

Basic computer literacy (2 classes) advanced computer

literacy, office procedures and typing, welding, auto mechanics, Art, Body and Fender, Cake Decorating, Small Engine Repair Machine Shop and Accounting.

Recreation users also must watch for commercial tows on the waterway. Playing "chicken" with a loaded 8-barge tow is not advisable, although except in a few narrow places there is ample room for passage.

You'll find the operators of marinas on the Tenn-Tom friendly and helpful. In a number of location restaurants in towns near the waterway will send a car for you.

A word of caution: Keep your gas tanks filled at every opportunity—it's a long haul between marinas in some stretches. Here are the names and locations of marinas along the waterway (mileages are measured from the foot of Government Street in Mobile--Demopolis is at mile 215):

Bay Springs Marina, mile 413, full service to pleasure craft. Nearest town is Iuka, MS.

Midway Marina at Mile 394 at Fulton, MS, full service, restaurant, mechanic on duty, laundry, airport service, transportation.

Smithville, MS, Marina at Mile 377, another full service

marina which can provide divers' service, laundromat, snacks.

Tote N' Float, Mile 338.6, full service, food, fuel and ground transportation. Annie's Restaurant in nearby Columbus will send a car for you if you're in the mood for a restaurant meal. Airport service, mechanics, divers.

Demopolis Yacht Basin, Mile 216.7, motel, groceries, full service with dry dock facilities, ground transportation. A restaurant and bar are in the plans for summer 1987.

Ezell's Fish Camp, Mile 165, fueling facilities. On the Black Warrior-Tombigbee system off Alabama Highway 10 but not close to a town of any size.

Lady's Landing, Mile 79.5, fueling facilities.

There is at least one public boat launching area on each of the 10 lakes that make up the waterway and two or more on the larger bodies of water. Many are connected to Corps recreational areas that offer everything from picnic facilities to, in some cases, camping areas.

July Jobless Rate rose to 7.9 percent

The July jobless rate for Mississippi rose seasonally to 7.9 percent according to Linda Ross Aldy, Executive Director, Mississippi Employment Security Commission. This rate was one tenth percentage point above one month ago, when the rate stood at 7.8 percent. This was 2.7 percentage points below the 10.6 percent reported July 1987. This is the lowest July rate since July 1980 when the rate stood at eight and eight tenths percents.

Place of residence employment for June was 1,048,800 in a labor force of 1,339,100. There were 5,500 less people employed in July than last month but 16,100 more than July 1987. The 1,048,800 employed represents another record, since this the largest number of people ever employed during the month of July in Mississippi.

Manufacturing establishments provided 233,400 jobs, down seasonally 1,700 from 235,100 reported in June and this number was 7,000 above July 1987. This represents the largest number of July jobs in manufacturing since July 1979 when 234,800 jobs were provided. Nonmanufacturing provided 643,400 jobs which was 5,800 less this month than last month but 13,700 more than last July. Most of the decrease in nonmanufacturing was seasonal losses in public education and less summer youth jobs and Government and services.

The economy continued to show steady improvement even though there were seasonal decreases in both manufacturing and non-manufacturing. Next month we expect continued expansion of the State's economy with only seasonal layoffs in education and service industries occurring. The employment rate should decline during the month of August since usual seasonal increases in manufacturing should occur.

searching for something to eat while they wait for dinner. What are some ideas for quick foods I can prepare ahead of time?

A. You may want to clean and store fresh, raw vegetables. They are good to nibble on while waiting for dinner, or can easily be cooked for dinner. You may also want to boil some eggs, or prepare a fresh vegetable or turkey salad to keep in the refrigerator.

Be sure to remind your children to put perishable foods back in the refrigerator immediately. Cheese and crackers and fruit are always good to have on hand for hungry kids. If your children are old enough, they could also reheat some of the dishes you prepare ahead and stored in the refrigerator or freezer.

STUFFED PEPPERS

1 tablespoon vegetable oil
3/4 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped carrot
1/2 cup chopped celery
1 garlic clove, minced
2 1/4 cups low-sodium beef broth
1/2 teaspoon oregano, crushed
1/4 teaspoon basil, crushed
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 cup barley
6 green peppers (about 2 1/4 pounds)
1/2 cup tomato sauce
1 1/2 ounces shredded Part-skim mozzarella cheese (6 tablespoons)

teria on raw meat and poultry that can infect other foods including cooked meat or poultry.

You should immediately wash everything the raw meat or poultry has touched, including your hands, utensils, cutting boards and serving dishes. Once the raw meats are cut, fresh beef, lamb, pork, and veal can be safely kept in the refrigerator for three to five days, one or two days for poultry.

You may also want to purchase foods that are easy to prepare during the week. Many grocery stores are offering a variety of ready-to-eat products to be sure they are stored properly. Many of these products need to be refrigerated and should be taken home immediately. After more than two hours without refrigeration, bacteria grow rapidly in the foods. Make sure your refrigerator temperature is below 40 degrees F. Bacteria can also grow in your refrigerator if it isn't cold enough.

Q. Now that I've cooked some dishes ahead of time, what reheating instructions should I leave for my family?

A. To destroy bacteria, leftovers or foods for serving later must be thoroughly reheated to at least 165 degrees F. Cooking in a covered dish helps to hold moisture and assure that food will heat all the way through.

Q. What foods can I serve that will be safely reheated?

A. Planning ahead makes it easier. There are many foods that can be cooked over the weekend, sliced into individual portions and safely kept in the refrigerator for a few days.

All meat and poultry should be thoroughly cooked to at least 160 degrees F to kill bacteria. You may want to cook it more for taste. Meat and poultry roasts that have been cooked can be safely stored in the refrigerator for three to four days.

Advance preparation of meats and vegetables for stir frying is also an idea for families on the run. After cutting the meat, be sure to promptly refrigerate it. Beware, however, of the bac-

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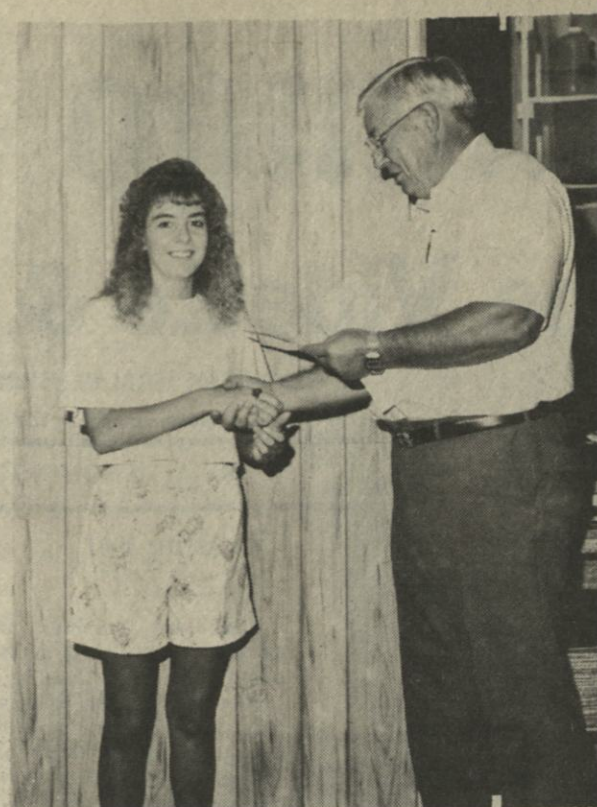

County Agent's Notes

PORK REFERENDUM

All pork producers should mark their calendars of Wednesday and Thursday, September 7 & 8. That is the days to vote on the 100% Pork Referendum.

Federal Law mandates that this referendum be held to determine whether the 25 cents per \$1.00 value checkoff be continued.

Voting will be held at the county Extension office in the courthouse on September 7 & 8 during regular business hours.

Any person may vote who produced and owned two or more hogs or pigs for sale from November 1, 1986 until the referendum date. Importers may also vote. There is no age limit on those eligible to vote.

PECAN WEEVILS

Have you noticed small beetles with long brown snouts in your backyard pecan tree lately?

Your tree has likely attracted pecan weevils. These insects begin to appear in late summer, particularly following a good rain. If you want to check your pecan tree for weevils, here's a scouting tip from Dr. Pat Harris, area entomologist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

Place a sheet on the ground under your tree and hit the limbs with a long pole. If the pecan weevils are on the tree, they will feel the jarring of the limbs and fall off onto the sheet.

Count the number of weevils you knock off. If you find three or more weevils per tree, you would be wise to spray with Imidan, Iorsban, pydrin or seven. Follow label instructions.

Harris also said to check fallen pecan nuts for weevils. Some of the first nuts to fall are often the ones most heavily infested with the weevils. It is important, then, that you gather these nuts and destroy them.

CONTROLLING FLEAS

Treating pets for fleas is not sufficient control nor is it effective. Fleas live and breed where our pets rest, eat and play. People in those areas are readily subject to attack.

Sleeping areas, bedding and other areas frequented by your pets should be treated at the same time pets are being treated. Insecticides that can

be used in animal quarters and outdoor areas include sevin, diazinon, malathion and methoxychlor.

Be sure to treat floor cracks, baseboard spaces and carpet linings for fleas and flea larvae. These areas can safely be treated by using approved control measures. You may want to stop by the office and get a copy of publication 245, "Control Household Insects," for more suggestion.

Dove Season Marks Tradition Of Good Hunting and Eating

It's an annual southern tradition. Dedicated hunters begin their Labor Day weekend with a trip to the dove fields, and fresh game tops the menu for the Saturday night meal.

According to statistics from the Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation, hunters harvested more than 3 million morning doves during the 1987 seasons. For Mississippi hunters, the 1988 dove season opens 30 minutes before sunrise on September 3. The first of three seasons will close September 18.

Hunters need a valid state hunting license and a shotgun that will hold no more than three shells. There is a daily bag limit of 15 birds. The person in charge of the Saturday night feast will need, depending on the method of cooking, various spices and food staples.

Nelda Starks, nutrition education specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, said doves are a versatile meat for cooking.

"Before cooking, though, the birds should be thoroughly cleaned and soaked in a solution of salty water 15 to 20 minutes," Starks said. "If the birds are shot up pretty bad, add about

1 tablespoon of vinegar per quart of water when soaking."

"After soaking, wash in cold water and dry well. If you don't plan to cook the game immediately, wrap in foil and freeze. But plan to cook the meat within three months," she said.

Doves can be fried, roasted, baked, barbecued, braised or baked in foil with vegetables, just to name a few of the most popular methods of preparation.

Starks said to fry doves for six to eight people, the preparer will need 14 to 16 doves, salt and pepper, flour, salad oil and vinegar or sherry.

"Salt, pepper and flour doves. Brown them in oil in a heavy skillet until crisp on both sides. Sprinkle about 1 tablespoon of vinegar or sherry over each bird and cover the skillet," she said. "Reduce heat and simmer until tender. Remove cover and cook a few more minutes. Take birds out of skillet and drain well. Brown gravy can then be made from the oil."

Baked doves is a simple but tasty method of preparation too. For "Dove Delicious," split birds down the back. Boil them for 15 minutes, then place a slice of butter and half of a 1/4 inch slice of onion inside each dove. Salt and pepper to taste. Wrap each dove in foil and cook for 30 to 45 minutes at 400 degrees F. Serve in foil.

This recipe can be taken a step further by placing the unwrapped doves in a saucepan with gravy and let simmer until gravy is thick enough to serve.

More information on preparing Mississippi game is available from local extension home economists.

County Extension Clubs First To Adopt-A-Highway

Mississippi Highway Extension has established Adopt-A-Highway (AAH) for Mississippi. This program allows citizens to support the Department's anti-litter programs in more than a dozen ways: by letting groups adopt a minimum of two sections of highway; by being permitted to adopt a way for purposes of cleaning up litter and to receive recognition for their efforts. The department will place an attractive 3 1/2 X 5 1/2 inch white sign on the end of the adopted way, giving the group credit for reducing litter on the highway.

County clubs across the state are represented in the program, and Tishomingo

County is no exception. Extension Homemakers Clubs are the first in Tishomingo County to Adopt-A-Highway, and they are encouraging others in our area to join the program. Thus far, the Sunshine Extension Homemakers Club has adopted 2 miles; Midway Extension Homemakers Club, 4 miles; Dennis Homemakers Club, 2 miles; and Belmont Extension Homemakers Club, 2 miles. These Extension Homemaker Clubs challenge many kinds of groups to Adopt-A-Highway: newspapers, banks, contractors, radio station, manufacturing companies, restaurants, finance companies, insurance companies, supermarkets, and quick-stop stores are all included, along

with many different clubs and civic organizations.

The following regulations apply to the program: 1) Sections of highway to be adopted should be a minimum of two miles in length; 2) The adoption period shall be a minimum of one year; 3) Interstate highway sections shall not be considered for adoption; 4) Safety considerations shall be given to traffic volume, traffic speeds and number of intersections in selecting highway sections; 5) Districts shall coordinate with the adopting organization to insure all rules of safety are followed, i.e. wearing of safety vests, working only when traffic control signs are in place, etc.; 6) Traffic control signs will be supplied by the Highway Department and must be returned at the end of the adoption period. If the signs are not returned in a reasonable condition or not at all, then the organization will be charged accordingly for such; 7) Project identification signs at each end of sections will be provided by the Highway Department identifying the program, length of section and organization name; 8) Trash sacks or containers for the litter will be furnished by adopting organization; 9) Adopting organization will be responsible for removing litter from the highway right-of-way a minimum of three times per year and transporting such to solid waste sites; and 10) If the adopting

organization does not comply with these rules and regulations and does not maintain their designated section to acceptable standards, then the agreement will be voided and all signs removed.

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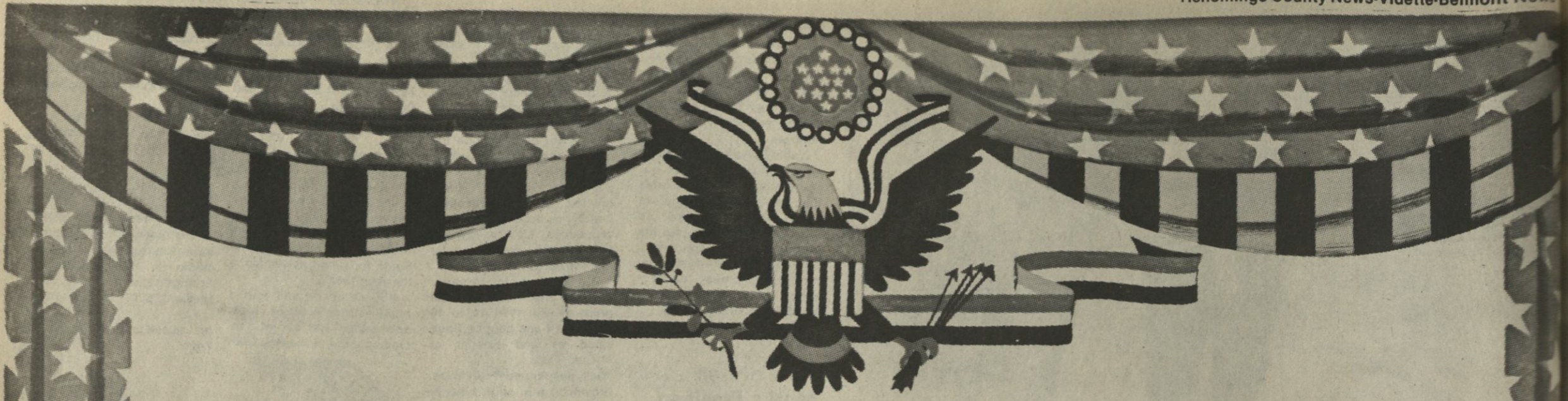

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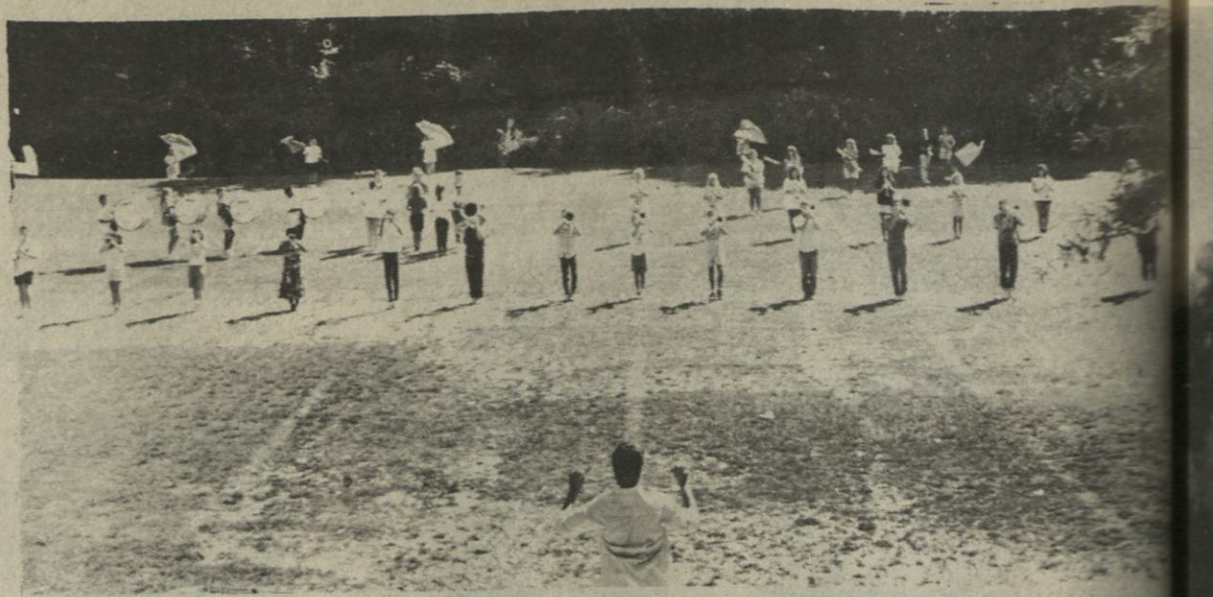
Iuka Teachers Attend Seminar

School Accreditation Instrument Revised

A grant of nearly \$40,000 from the state Department of Education (SDE) will fund a revision of the instrument used to accredit Mississippi's public schools, a University of Southern Mississippi educators says.

The evaluation tool must be revised according to changes called for in the 10th edition of SDE Bulletin 171, said Dr. Johnny R. Purvis, education service center director for the USM Curriculum and Instruction Department. Purvis will produce the new evaluation tool in cooperation with a statewide SDE committee appointed by state schools Superintendent Richard Boyd.

Objectives of the \$38,520 project include making accreditation standards consistent with changes in SDE Bulletin 171, adding new "incentive standards" designed to encourage improvement beyond minimum standard in public schools and developing a training manual for evaluators who travel to the schools to perform accreditation evaluations.

"It should help both evaluators and school officials in the school districts to communicate about what's required of them," Purvis predicted. "It will lessen the odds of misinterpretation of accreditation requirements." The year-long project will be completed in two stages, with new minimum standards due by October 3 for use in the five-year accreditation cycle, with the incentive standards and the training manual due for the fall of 1989, Purvis said.

Grant Will Aid Children

A \$116,206 federal grant will fund home-based assistance statewide for young children with dual sensory impairments, a University of Southern Mississippi researcher said.

The U.S. Department of Education Office of Special Education Programs grant will fund the third consecutive year of the "Early Identification and Intervention for Infants and Young Children with Dual Sensory Impairments" project, said its director, Kathleen Stremel-Campbell, senior researcher in USM's special education department.

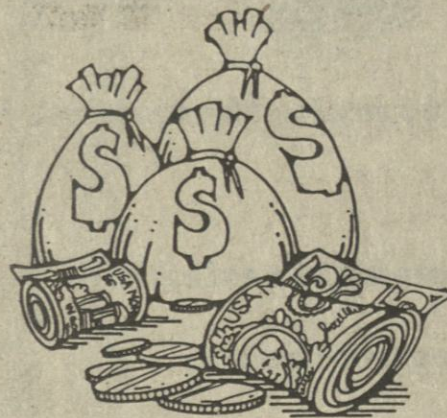
Stremel-Campbell uses the federal funds to work with children who, for example, have a combination of vision and hearing problems -- and with their families -- in homes throughout Mississippi, to increase the children's ability to communicate with those around them and interact in their community environments. Some of the children are using "augmentative communication devices" designed by USM electronics engineering technology students to help them tell others their basic needs and wishes.

On focus of the project during 1988-89 will be to involve the children in Head-Start programs, she said.

singing; a ladies aid society scene; period sutlers selling goods; and the ordnance sergeant repairing weapons.

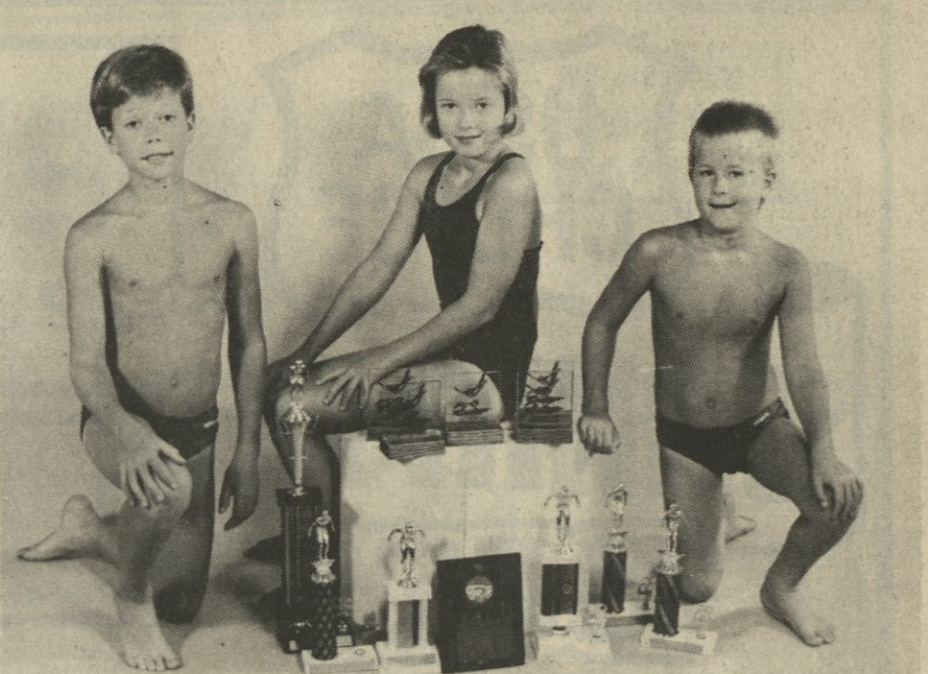

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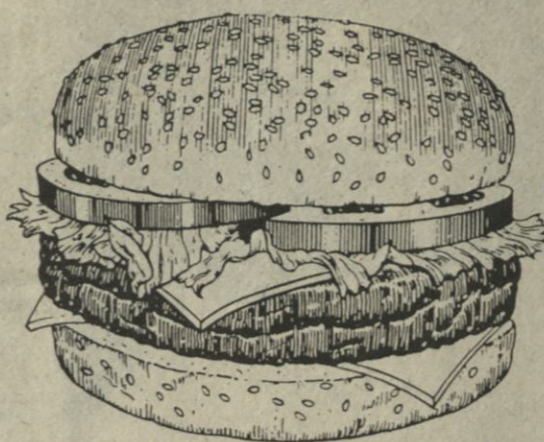
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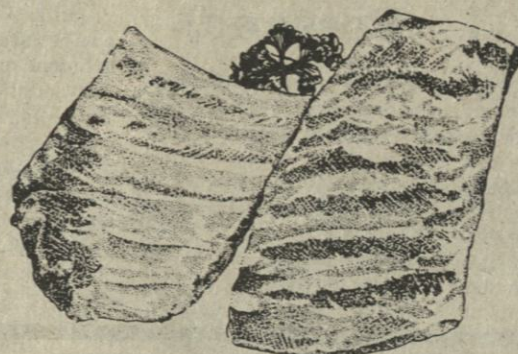


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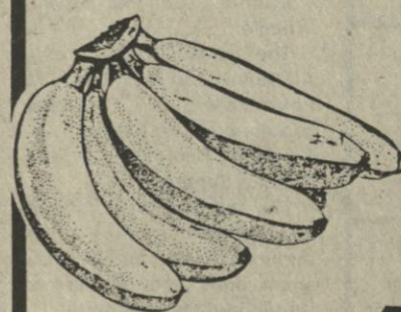
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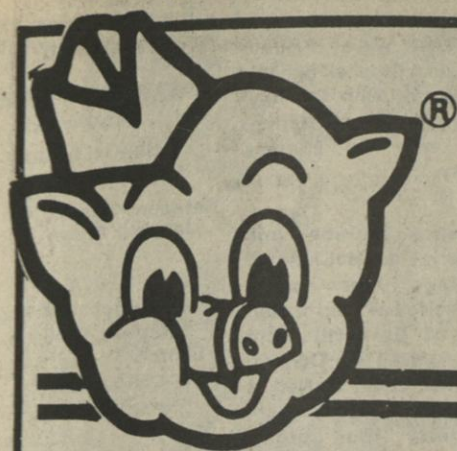
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Terrific Thursday Held At Southwood

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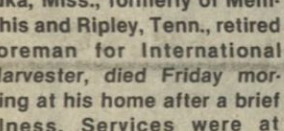

Four-Lane Program Underway

Eighty-two miles of the 1987 Four-Lane Highway Program, a \$1.6 billion highway act to four-lane 1,077 miles of highway over a 14-year period, are under contract at a cost of \$114 million, according to John R. Tabb, director of the Mississippi State Highway Department.

Tabb said, originally the State Tax Commission estimated that \$42,632,525 would be produced by the various taxes enacted in the 1987 Legislative Session for funding of the 1987 Highway Program. This figure was revised after several months of collection to a more realistic \$39,632,525 when it was realized that the tag fees and contractor's tax would not produce the expected revenue due to time lapse between collection of the tax and the actual receipt of those funds.

However, he said receipts from the motor fuel tax produced revenues of \$1.8 million more than the revised

projection, which helped reduce the deficit created by the tag fees and contractor's tax. Estimates for the remainder of the program should be accurate since the time lapse created in the first year has been overcome.

Tabb said an additional 1-cent per gallon motor fuel tax will go into effect Jan. 1, 1989, but that all of the taxes enacted in the 1987 Legislative Session designated for the Highway Program are scheduled to be repealed August 31, 2001.

Projects for the program are divided into three phases. Under phase I, the Mississippi State Highway Commission has awarded 10 projects totalling \$94 million which accounts for 63 miles since enactment of the program.

Under phase II, three projects totalling \$20 million and covering 18 miles, have been awarded. These projects were under construction prior to the enactment of the highway bill. A list of the 1987 Four-Lane Highway Program projects awarded to date is as follows:

-Lauderdale County; US 45; from State Route 19 northward to US 45 Bypass at I-59.
-Itawamba County; US 78; from Fulton Interchange eastward 1.7 miles.

-Alcorn & Tishomingo Counties; US 72; from Stricklin to Burnsville approximately 7.0 miles.

-Montgomery County; US 82; Winona Bypass.
-Forrest and Perry Counties; US 98; from 1.5 miles east of US 49 to State Route 29.

-Lowndes County; US 82; from State Route 12 to Lehmberg Road.

-Sunflower County; US 49 W; from Inverness Bypass to Indianola.

-Benton & Union Counties; US 78; from Hickory Flat to the west end of New Albany Bypass.

-George County; US 98; from Lucedale Bypass eastward to the Alabama State Line.

ACTION: Proposed rule.

SUMMARY:

Technical information or comments are solicited on the proposed base (100-year) flood elevations show in your community's preliminary Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). These base (100-year) flood elevations are the basis for the floodplain management measures that the community is required to either adopt or show evidence of being already in effect in order to qualify or remain qualified for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program.

DATES:

The period for comment will be ninety (90) days following the second publication of this proposed rule in a newspaper of local circulation in the community.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:

The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determinations of base (100-year) flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448)), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR Part 67.4 (a).

These elevations, together with the floodplain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their floodplain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, or pursuant to policies established by other Federal, State, or Regional entities. These proposed elevation will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605 (b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under Section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not prohibit development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact.

Lessees and owners of real property in the City of Iuka, Tishomingo County, Mississippi are encouraged to review the preliminary FIS and FIRM available at the address cited above. Proposed base flood elevations along flood sources studied in detail are shown on the flood profiles in the Study. The flood sources studied in detail are:
