## Iuka Elementary Kindergarten Participates In Science Project

The Iuka Elementary school kindergarten classes are participating in a science project written and granted specifically for the Iuka City Schools and the Prentiss County Schools. The project has 27 learning objectives which coincide with the Mississippi State Department

of Education science curriculum. They are intended to broaden the experiences and knowledge of the environment of each child by providing hands-on experiments, field trips, classroom materials and audio-visual materials. The kindergarten teachers will be attending a workshop this fall

## Citizens Warned Of Job Training Scam

Warnings are being issued against job training courses being offered to local residents connected with the proposed NASA advanced solid rocket motor booster plant at Yellow Creek.

According to Rep. Mack Loyd Wadkins, Executive Director of the Tishomingo

County Development Foundation, there have been several reports throughout the county of groups who are offering courses that can be taken at home for \$4000 that will ensure the participant a job at the NASA facility.

"These groups are in no way connected with NASA and these courses do not

have to be taken in order to get a job," stated Wadkins.

The state of Mississippi, say reports, will be working with NASA so that technical training programs can be set up in state community colleges. However, these courses are not being offered as of yet and will be announced by the colleges at the

time of their offering.

Iuka Mayor John H. Biggs warns area residents not to be taken in by these people offering the home correspondence courses. If someone approaches you with promise of a job with NASA after their course is taken, you may contact local authorities so that this job scam can be stopped.

## Mantachie Man Drowns At Eastport Marina

A Mantachie man drowned accidentally Sunday evening, September 4, at Eastport Marina near Iuka while visiting the area with business associates.

According to a report from Tishomingo County Coroner, Dale White, Johnnie Dale Smith, 37, of Route 1 Mantachie, had been riding pontoons with some of his business associates from Alabama on Sunday when the incident occurred.

Apparently, the other businessmen had gone to a

convenience store near the marina leaving Smith on the pier. When they returned, they discovered he had stepped off of the pier, into the deep water there. "He could not swim," stated White, "it was a tragic accident."

Smith who was a native of Wisconsin, was the owner of Smith's Tool & Die Company in Mantachie.

"The accident occurred at approximately 6:15 p.m. and the victims' body was not recovered from the marina until about 7:23 p.m.," stated

the Coroner. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Dragging operations began soon after the man was discovered missing by members of the Tishomingo County Rescue Squad, Jim Barnes of the Mississippi Game & Fish Commission and County Coroner Dale White. Two divers (Don Clark and another man from a nearby boat) were also involved in the search for the Mantachie businessman.

Smith was an Army veteran who was stationed in Korea and he attended the Church

of God of Prophecy.

Services will be Friday, September 9, 1988 at the Congdon Funeral Home in Zion, Ill., with the Rev. James Harbor officiating. Burial will be in Mount Olivet Cemetery in Zion. Senter Funeral Home of Fulton is in charge of local arrangements.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Millard Smith of Winthrop Harbor, Ill.; one brother, Jimmie Smith of Winthrop Harbor; his grandmother, Bessie Mae Smith of Fulton.

## Iuka Post Office Sets New Window Hours

The Iuka, MS post office will adjust retail window hours beginning Saturday, September 10, Postmaster Ray Curtis announced today.

Beginning Saturday, September 10, post office hours will be 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM Monday through Friday, and 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM on Saturday.

The changes follow an announcement by Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank that the Postal Service would be able to readjust window service hours and still comply with the congressionally ordered operating fund cuts of \$160 Million for 1988 and \$270 Million for 1989.

"Savings generated by window service reductions in

## ASCS Farm News

### DISASTER AFFECTED CROPS

The President has approved legislation for disaster payments to participating and non-participating farms.

If you plan to harvest disaster affected participating or non-participating grain crops or soybean acreage for other than grain or beans, such as silage, grazing or hay, you should request appraisal before harvesting the crop. Producers should leave representative strips for appraisals if they are unable to wait for an ASCS appraisal.

If you harvest the disaster affected crops for grain, you should request bin measurement before using any for livestock feed. If you destroy a crop without any benefit, you should request an appraisal.

### EMERGENCY FEED PROGRAMS

Tishomingo County has been approved for the Emergency Feed and Emergency Feed Assistance Programs. Livestock feed assistance is available under either or both programs.

The Emergency Feed Program provides up to 50 percent of the cost of purchasing livestock feed and hay, not to exceed five cents per pound feed grain equivalent.

Under the Emergency Feed Assistance Program, eligible farmers can purchase grain from the CCC at 75 percent of the basic county loan rate for the particular feed grain.

Any farmer who has suffered at least a 40 percent loss of livestock feed due to the drought may apply for assistance at the ASCS office through December 31, 1988.

**BASIC INFORMATION NEEDED AT TIME OF APPLICATION FOR EMERGENCY FEED.**

1. Number of livestock on hand which have been owned for 6 months. 2. Inventory of feed on hand at time of application. 3. Determination of loss by crop.

**NOTE:** If all feed crops have not been harvested, estimate of production will be needed.

**PREVENTED PLANTING DISASTER PAYMENTS**

Producers of 1984 or 1985 crops of wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice who participated in Commodity Credit Corporation Price Support and Production Adjustment Programs may be eligible to apply for prevented planting disaster payments. Such producers must file an

application and supporting documentation with CCC by September 16, 1988. Applications may be obtained at the county ASCS office. Payments will be made to those eligible producers who were prevented from planting wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice or other nonconserving crops on any portion of the acreage intended for wheat, feed grains, cotton or rice because of drought, flood, or other natural disaster or other conditions beyond the control of the producer.

### HELPING YOUR PASTURES

You can do four things this month in Tishomingo County to improve your pastures. You can lime them, you can fertilize them, you can prepare them for planting, you can seed them.

It is particularly appropriate to do these things now because September has been designated as "Pasture Improvement Month." We have some fine pastures in Tishomingo County and we want to keep them that way. We also have pastureland that could stand some improvement. Liming is very important.

Most forage grasses grow best at a soil pH of 6 or above, a pH at this level promotes growth and nitrogen fixation. It also allows for efficient and effective use of applied fertilizer.

### COTTON UPDATE

When yields are good and foliage is plentiful, cotton plants have to be defoliated to be harvested on time. Our cotton farmers in Tishomingo County will begin harvesting their crop fairly soon, and they will be spending time in their fields applying chemical defoliants.

Many factors affect the success of defoliation, including temperature, humidity and plant health. These factors vary from year to year and field to field, so defoliation is no easy task.

In fact, defoliation has not been established as an exact science. It is an art because results are unpredictable.

Cotton must, and I repeat must, be mature when defoliants are applied. This chemical stops fiber and seed development in the cotton plant. If defoliants are applied too early, yield and fiber quality can be hurt.

### SLUG CONTROL

If you still have a problem with slugs in your garden, you can apply materials containing meafural or-

metaldehyde. These pests feed on young garden plants and can do much damage if not controlled.

If you see silvery trails on or around your plants, slugs are present. Those silver threads are their calling card.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### DETERMINING FAMILY'S NET WORTH

Good financial management begins with determining your family's current financial position, or net worth. Net worth tells how much a family is worth in dollars and cents.

Net worth equals total assets remaining after all current liabilities are subtracted. A statement of net worth provides an important picture of financial well-being—a "snapshot" of the family financial situation today.

Lending institutions usually require a net worth statement before issuing or renegotiating a loan, so it is wise to take the time to do this before you talk to bankers or creditors.

Taking this financial snapshot has a few additional advantages. Chances are, preparing a net worth statement will lead to a pleasant surprise. The financial picture may be better than you imagined.

By comparing snapshots as years pass and events change, you will gain a picture of your progress from one year to the next in meeting your family's goals.

Begin by gathering all important financial records. These include current and past income and gift tax returns and all insurance policies, including life, automobile, accident disability, health,

homeowners and liability.

Dig out information regarding company benefit plans and the current status of any accounts you have such as pension, annuities, profit-sharing plans or stock options. Compile current records of balances in savings and checking accounts, or charge cards and store accounts.

Once these documents are located, you can begin the net worth statement. Remember, the objectives of this exercise is to determine your financial worth, after you subtract what you owe from what you own.

First, list all of your liquid assets -- those that can be converted to cash easily. Among your liquid assets are cash, checking accounts, savings accounts and any accumulated cash value of whole life or permanent insurance policies.

Also ranking high in terms of liquidity are any holdings in money market mutual funds. If you have certificates of deposit, keep in mind that you'll pay an interest penalty if you withdraw them before the maturity date.

Next, list your marketable investments valued at current market value -- the amount you could obtain if you sold them today. Marketable investments include stocks, bonds, mutual funds, collections and other investments.

List next any non-marketable investments in the form of tax shelters, accrued equity in your company pension plan that is not given up if you leave the company, stock options, notes receivable or interests.

Finally, complete your accounting of assets by itemizing and valuing your

personal assets. Include real estate holdings (your home), all furnishings, household goods and equipment, clothing, jewelry, records and vehicles.

To total the family's liquid assets, marketable investments, non-marketable investments and personal assets, complete the asset side of the net worth ledger. Now you know what the family owns.

Now, make a list of all debts such as amounts outstanding on your home mortgage, car loan and other consumer loans, any loans against insurance policies, any margin loans, taxes owed, notes payable, all outstanding balances on credit card accounts, revolving charge accounts, automatic overdraft accounts at banks or savings and loans.

Once this work is complete the final step is easy. Simply subtract total liabilities (the amount owed) from total assets (the amount owned) to arrive at net worth. This is a picture of the financial assets that would remain if you disposed of all your current financial obligations today.

### FRUIT HONEY RECIPES

#### GENERAL METHOD

Save all washed, sound pieces of peelings from fruit used for preserves, pickles, etc. Cover with water and cook slowly in a press to remove all juice. Dip the juice through a jelly bag and press to remove all juice. Drip the juice through a jelly bag and add sugar at the rate of 1/2 as much sugar as juice. Boil rapidly until the consistency of honey, pour into hot jars, leaving 1/4 inch head space. Wipe jar rims and adjust lids. Process 5 minutes in boiling water bath.

#### PEAR HONEY

8 cups pear juice (from peelings)  
4 cups sugar  
juice of 1 lemon (if desired)  
Sterilize canning jars. Measure juice, bring to boil. When it boils vigorously, add sugar and lemon juice. Boil rapidly until the consistency of honey. Pour into hot jars, leaving 1/4 inch head space. Wipe jar rims and adjust lids. Process 5 minutes in a boiling water bath.

### Conservation Help Available

Tishomingo County covers approximately 289 thousand acres with about (66%) forest land. This 191 thousand acres is owned by approximately 2,048 forest owners with average ownership being around 70 acres. Over one-half of this land is covered with the renewable natural resource we know, our forest, which probably less than 10% receives any type of management at all. In order to receive the best return in any forest, proper management is the key to success and the key to the key to disaster. Too many landowners have been at their woodlands as garden instead of a capital investment capable of producing a profitable return. Our county contains many different land structures, soils, and forest types so no type of management is suitable for all areas. Each forest tract has its own characteristics, such as tree

species, topography, streams, hills, timber size and drainage. In addition, each landowner has different objectives. Production of maximum wood fiber is only a small part of the total picture of management. What about wildlife, recreation, hunting, grazing, water resources, or just looks? Where does one start? A large majority of landowners do not live on their property and have only a small working knowledge of timber production. Seek the advice of professionals. The Mississippi Forestry Commission can help with timber management, the Mississippi Wildlife Conservation Department with wildlife, the Soil Conservation Service with soil and water management, the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service and Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service with other agriculture related questions. The first step to any management decision requires a plan of action. Forest products take years of development; therefore, mistakes take years to

correct. The Mississippi Forestry Commission can provide you, free of charge, a plan which will include: a map of your property with the different timber types designated, a present description of each type, and action that should be taken to bring that type into full production. In addition to providing you with a forest management plan, your County Forester can inform you of present cost-share programs in which State and Federal programs can pay up to 65% of the cost of tree planting and site preparation work. He can help you develop a systematic plan for constructing firelanes to protect your valuable timberland, timber marking, and advise you in marketing your forest products. Many lumber and pulpwood companies have cooperative management programs in which they help timber owners with their management needs. If your woodlands are not producing as they could be, contact a company representative or

your County Forester, Brenda Glasgow, at the Tishomingo County Courthouse or phone 423-9070.

Q. My daughter has been diagnosed as having cellulitis. What causes cellulitis and how is it treated? Also what are the results if it is not cured?

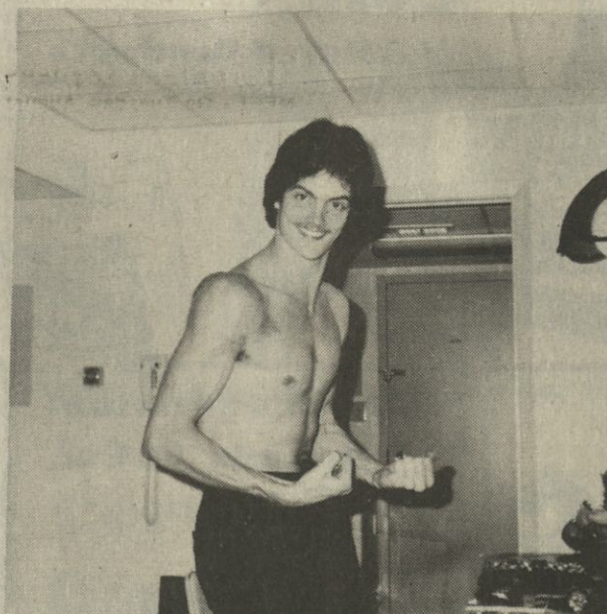
A. Cellulitis is an acute infection and inflammation of the skin, says Dr. Marilyn C. Ray, a dermatologist at the Ochsner Clinic in New Orleans. It usually occurs as a complication from an injury to the skin, such as a cut or bite.

Any part of the body can be affected, but usually a cut or sore on the lower leg is the most common site of infection. The area will appear red and tender to the touch. A sample from the infection site is usually taken in the

physician's office cultured to determine type of bacteria causing the infection. When the type of bacteria causing the infection is known, treatment with antibiotics usually solves the problem.

It is important to treat the condition quickly because if left untreated, the infection can spread into the bloodstream causing sepsis or poisoning. At this stage, a person will feel general malaise and may have fever and chills. Also red lines may appear on the skin along the path of the blood vessels from the infection site.

Dr. Ray recommends you consult your physician as soon as you become aware of a cut or sore which appears to be infected or is not healing properly.

blood sugar rise. That's why breakfast usually includes fruits, cereal and/or bread. But researchers were also concerned about having sufficient protein, so they included cheese, milk, meat or eggs in their recommendations. That's because protein foods will keep the blood sugar level dropping rapidly as the day wears on.

Studies of teenagers' eating habits show that those from the lower economic groups skipped breakfast more often than those from middle or high income groups. Other reasons for missing breakfast included: not hungry in early morning; no time to eat; do not like breakfast foods; dislike making own breakfast and miss companionship of other family members at breakfast time.

Lack of appetite is probably habit. If you try breakfast for two weeks, even with the introduction of one food a week, you can probably reverse this habit. Another habit, no time to eat, can be remedied by getting up earlier.

Another reason often given is that one is dieting so breakfast is easy to skip. But studies prove breakfast skippers have a harder time controlling their calorie intake and they eat higher calorie foods at a mid-morning break. Breakfast usually discourages snacking.

With all of these facts before you, do you really want to skip breakfast?

and sugar and buttered toast, or one with fruit, bacon, egg, milk and buttered toast. Nor is there any reason why a cheeseburger, pizza or peanut butter sandwich with a glass of milk won't serve the purpose if you eat fruit later. Maybe you prefer fruit, a cup of yogurt, cereal with wheat germ, milk and a cup of tea.

Eating habits and traditional meal patterns are changing, so the options for different food combinations are open. You can skip milk, for example, if you want to combine yogurt with granola and fruit-flavored gelatin.

Perhaps you want to make a bacon-toast-egg sandwich. Or, if you put up sandwiches the night before and refrigerate them, make two so you can have one for breakfast and the other for lunch.

Without breakfast, it's hard to get a day's quota of nutrients. Breakfast means "breaking the fast." It's the longest time the body is without food unless you snack all night. That means the blood sugar level is low. That's the culprit that may give rise to tremors and blabs.

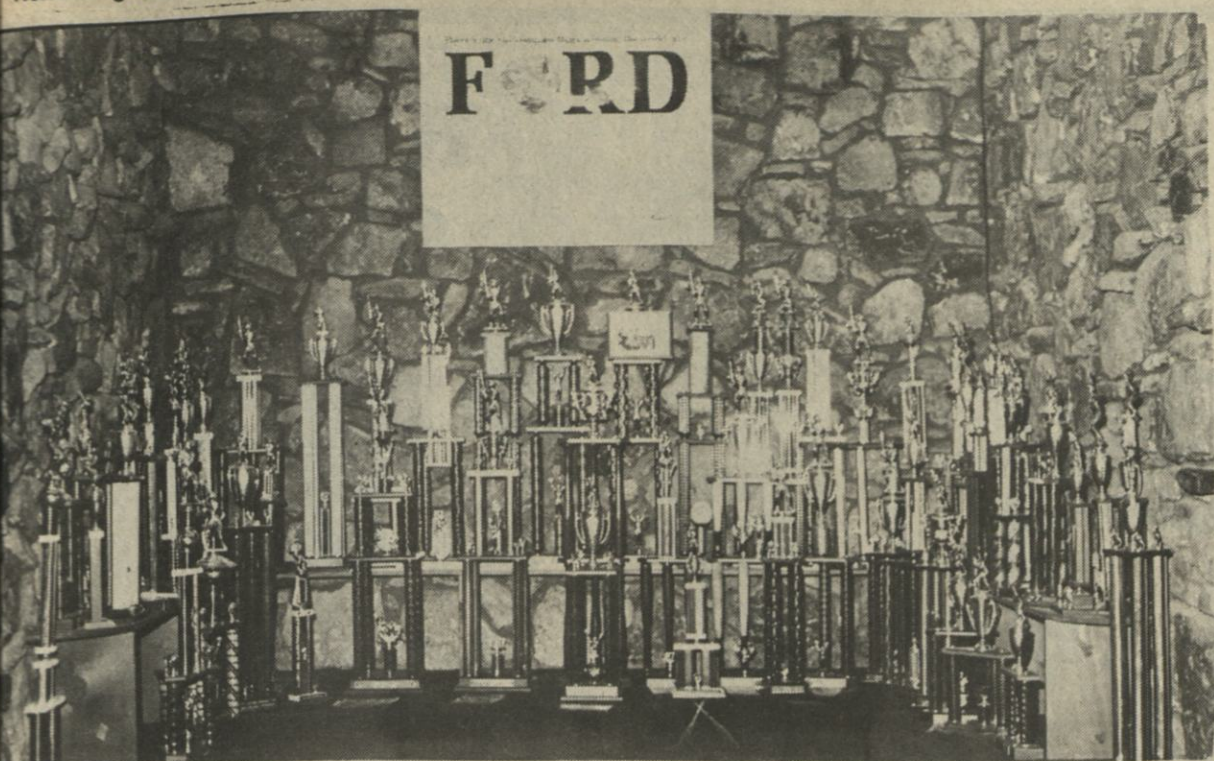

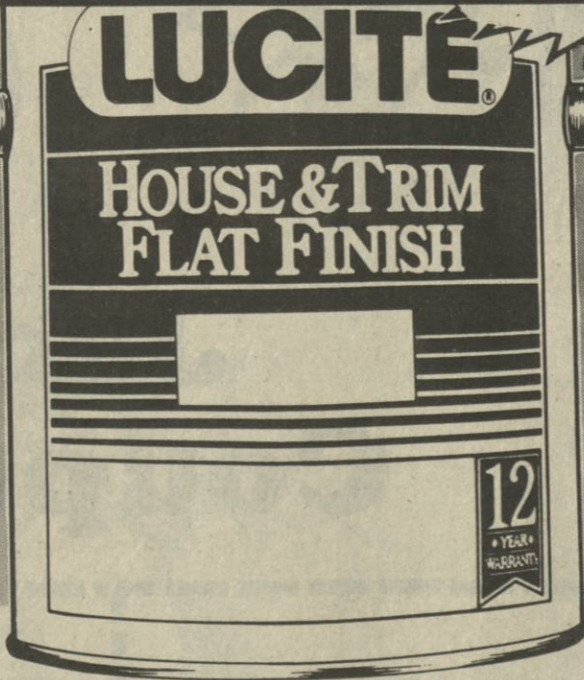

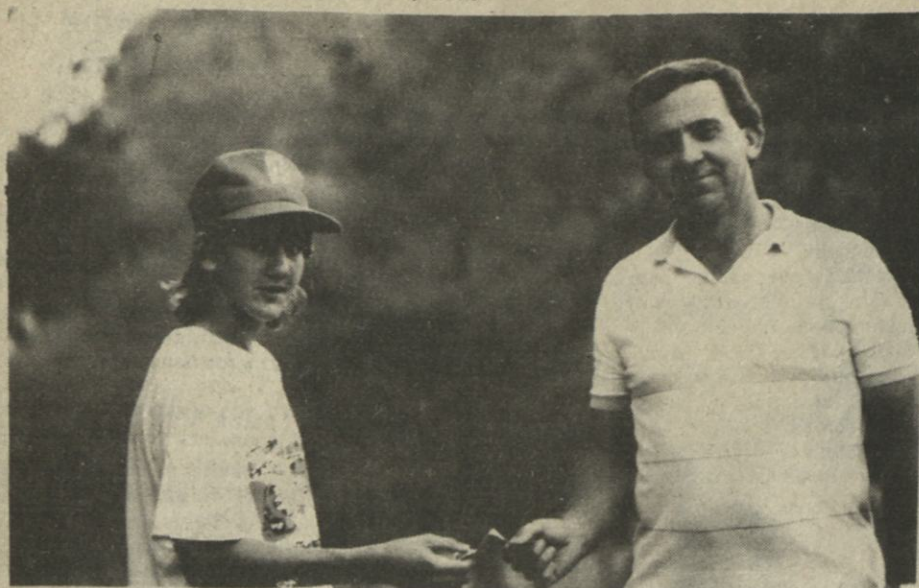

## County Unemployment Rose To 10.5 In July

Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, announced today that unemployment in Tishomingo County rose at mid-July. There were 760 individuals unemployed in the county at mid-month, or 10.5 percent of the civilian labor force. This compares to 10.1 percent in June and 16.4 percent in July, 1987. The labor force for the county was estimated to be 7,270, 160 above the previous estimate but 100 below the figure for one year ago. Individuals employed in the county were estimated to be 6,510, compared to 6,390 in June 1987, one year ago.

Approximately 2,700 individuals were employed in manufacturing jobs in the

county at mid-July, while 2,930 were employed in non-manufacturing jobs.

Smith commented that a total of 60,980 individuals were in the labor force in the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo counties at mid-July. This number represents 330 above the June estimate and 1,370 above the estimate for July, 1987. Of this number, 5,760 were unemployed, or 9.4 percent of the civilian labor force. One month ago 9.0 percent were unemployed in the six-county area, while one year ago 12.0 percent were out of work. A total of 55,220 were employed in the six-county area, a minimal 10 above the June estimate, but

2,770 above the July, 1987, figure.

Manufacturing employment in the six-county area was estimated to be 18,330, slightly below the previous estimate but 620 above the estimate for one year ago. Employment in non-manufacturing jobs also decreased slightly from last month to reach 22,640. However, a substantial increase of 1,520 was experienced from one year ago.

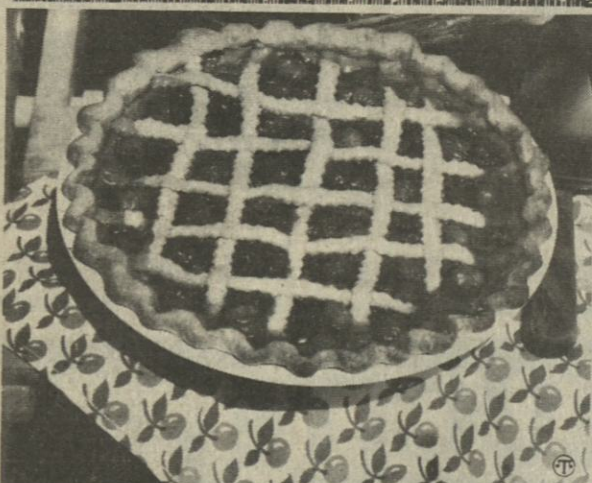

## IHS Offers ACT Assess.

As the new fall term opens, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation will move one step closer to college and other postsecondary plans by registering to take the ACT Assessment.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 3,000 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

Most students take the ACT Assessment during junior year or early in senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

Mrs. Linda Barnett's office has the information and forms students need to register for the ACT Assessment. ACT also provides free copies of the booklet, Preparing for the ACT Assessment, which contains information about getting ready for the examination, plus a complete practice test.

The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$11.50. Late registration will be accepted for an additional \$12.00 late handling fee. For 1988-89, ACT has established this test date schedule: Test Dates are October 22, 1988, December 10, 1988, February 11, 1989, April 15, 1989, June 10, 1989; Registration Deadlines are September 23, 1988, November 11, 1988, January 13, 1989, March 17, 1989, May 12, 1989; Late Registration Deadlines are October 11, 1988, November 29, 1988, January 31, 1989, April 4, 1989, May 30, 1989.

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies, and natural sciences. The Assessment also includes a

two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. It focuses on interests, academic and nonacademic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors, and the institutions and agencies students specify.

## The Segars Clinic Report

Dear Dr. Scott,

It seems that every year  
about this time when the  
weather starts to change, I  
get a case of bronchitis. Can  
you tell me why.

Bronchitis is an inflam-  
mation of the bronchial  
tubes, or bronchi (the air  
passages that extend from  
the windpipe into the lungs).  
The inflammation may be  
caused by a virus, bacteria,  
smoking or the inhalation of  
chemical pollutants or dust.  
When the cells of the bron-  
chial-lining tissue are irritated  
beyond a certain point, the  
tiny hairs (cilia) within them,  
which normally trap and  
eliminate pollutants, stop  
functioning. Consequently,  
the air passages become  
clogged by debris and  
irritation increases. In  
response, a heavy secretion  
of mucus develops, which  
causes the characteristic  
cough of bronchitis.

Brief bouts of acute bron-  
chitis often evolve from a  
severe cold. This disorder  
may also follow or accom-  
pany the flu, or it may begin  
without having had an infec-  
tion.

Chronic bronchitis is  
defined as excessive mucous  
secretion in the bronchi and a  
chronic or recurrent mucus-  
producing cough that lasts  
three or more months and  
recurs year after year.

There is no doubt that  
cigarette smoking is the  
chief cause of chronic bron-  
chitis, and recent studies in-  
dicate that smoking  
marijuana causes similar  
damage.

Bronchitis, an inflam-  
mation of the bronchial tubes  
may be caused by smoking,  
air pollution and viral or bac-  
terial infections.

In your case, it can be  
brought on by an allergy  
much the same as air  
pollution. You inhale irritants  
that affect the bronchial  
tubes as we explained earlier.

Complications of a cold or  
flu may lead to acute bron-  
chitis, which can be treated  
with bed rest and by drinking  
plenty of fluids and staying in  
doors in damp, cold weather.
