Lowest State Unemployment Rate In Nine Years Recorded

he lowest unemployment for the month of August ine years was announced nday by Mississippi Emment Security Comsion Executive Director nda Ross Aldv.

There were 1,045,600 sissippians working in ust which is the largest ber of people ever emed in the state in the th of August" Aldy said. his represents 16,800 more ople working than in just, 1987.

The August unemployment e of 7.8 percent was oneoth percentage point lower in the July rate and 2.1 pertage points lower than year's August rate of 9.9 cent. The lowest prior gust rate during the 1980's in 1980 when the rate s7.9 percent.

August was due primarily to an increase in seasonal agriculture.

Manufacturing establishments provided 234,100 jobs, up seasonally 700 from July; this number was 4,000 above August, 1987.

Nonmanufacturing provided 641,100 which was 2,300 less this month than last month but 13,400 more than last August. Most of the decrease in nonmanufacturing was seasonal in industries involved in delivering summer youth services.

The economy continued to show steady improvement even though there were seasonal decreases in nonmanufacturing and agricultu.e. The state's economy should continue to expand over the next month The slight increase in the with seasonal layoffs in

Dogs To Be **Impounded**

The 1988-89 hunting policy for Bay Springs Lake will remain the same as the 1987-88 policy. Hunting will be limited to waterfowl only. The lands between Highway 4 and 30 will remain closed to hunting to protect the deer and turkey which were stocked by the Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation in 1984-85. In the past, incidents have occured where dogs that were released on Corps of Engineers property, would run deer onto private property where the deer were shot. In an effort to curb this type of activity, Corps personnel will impound any stray dogs and transport them to the nearest animal shelter. It will be up to the owner of the dog to ascertain if his or her dog has been taken to the pound. The best way to keep your dog from being impounded is to keep him from running free on Government lands. Hopefully, this will allow the deer population to increase to such an extent that they will expand into the surrounding

Scholarship Opportunities

Hunters Take Note!

With the 1988-89 hunting season underway, the Corps of Engineers would like to inform the visiting public that all government lands between Mississippi Highways 4 and 30 will be closed to all hunting except waterfowl hunting until the end of deer hunting season early next year. Once deer hunting season is over, certain areas that are as yet to be determined, around Bay Springs Lake will be open to walk in small game hunting. The location of these areas will be

announced at a later date. Areas north of Highway 30

in the Divide Cut Wildlife Management Area are under the control of the State of Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation. Deer hunting is prohibited in these areas. However, small game hunting is allowed with a free state permit which can be obtained at the hunter control stations located throughout the perimeter of the management area. Deer hunting and small

game hunting are allowed in

the Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation's John Bell Williams Wildlife Management Area and in Corps of Engineers fee lands located on Pools D. and E. Corps lands on Pools D and E and the John Bell Williams Wildlife Management area are located south of Mississippi Highway 4. A free permit is required for hunting in both areas. The state permit for the Wildlife Management Area can be obtained at hunter check-in stations in the area. A Corps permit is required for federal lands and can be obtained by contacting Corps resource office at the following locations: Bay Springs Lake Resource Office, Route 1, Box 320, Dennis Mississippi 38838, telephone 601/454-3481; Columbus Resource Office, Route 3, 218A, Columbus, Mississippi 39701, telephone 601/327-2142; and Tom Bevill Resource Office, Route 2, Carrollton, 352X, Alabama 35447, telephone

205/373-8705. These permits are valid for all Corps of Engineers lands open to hunting on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. Locations of hunting areas open south of Pool D can be obtained by writing or visiting the offices listed above. Vehicles are to be operated on roads only and should not be driven around gates and barriers.

On Corps managed areas open to hunting all hunters are required to have in their possession a valid state license and a Corps of Engineers permit. On state managed lands hunters are required to have in their possession a valid state license and a state permit for the wildlife management









