Annual County Fair Opens Next Week

What do home ec. exhibits, livestock, exciting rides and games, smiling faces and the aroma of popcorn and candy apples all have in common? They can all be found at the annual county fair.

The 36th Tishomingo County Fair will be getting underway on Monday, September 26 at the fairgrounds in Iuka.

Bluff City shows will be providing the midway rides, games and concessions beginning Tuesday night, September 27. Other concessions, attractions, exhibits and entertainment will be rounding out the weeks activities.

Gate admission each evening will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students with plenty of FREE parking.

Exhibits will be entered, viewed and judged including foods, vegetables, flowers, all types of crafts, livestock and crops throughout the week.

Enjoyable nightly shows in the inside arena and/or the outside arena are sure to offer something for the whole family.

The agenda for the week will include the following: Monday - A work day, from 8:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m., will give booth exhibitors an opportunity to set up and 4-H exhibits (other than foods, vegetables and flowers) to prepare their displays. Tuesday - From 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., livestock and crops can be entered and all home economics exhibits will need to be entered also. The nightly events will include a Fashion Show at 6:00 p.m. presented by the 4-H Modeling Squad and the popular King and Queen of the Fair pageant, beginning at 7:00 p.m. This will also be the opening night for the carnival.

Wednesday - Beginning at 8:00 a.m., 4-H foods, vegetables and flowers will

be entered. Also at 8:00 a.m., will be the judging of the home economics exhibits, 4-H exhibits will all be officially judged, along with community homemakers and 4-H booths. At 7:30 p.m. in the inside arena there will be a Bluegrass music show; Thursday - Official swine and sheep judging will take place at 4:00 p.m. It will be armband night on the Midway (\$6 lets you ride all the rides as many times as you like) and Gospel Quartet singing will go on beginning at 7:00 p.m. in the inside arena. Friday - 1:00 p.m. will mark the official judging of the Beef and Dairy Cattle. The 4-H pet show will be held at 5:30 p.m. in the inside arena. The nights events open with the annual Tiny Tot Show at 6:30 p.m. inside and the Open Horse Show at 7:00 p.m. outside; Saturday -

The first part of the day will be used to check out and

remove the various exhibits. The night program will feature a Work Horse and Mule Show in the outside arena beginning at 7:00 p.m. Clogging by the Cotton Patch Cloggers and performance by the Northeast Community College Country Band will all start at 7:30 p.m. inside.

Saturday afternoon will be observed as "Kids Day" on the Midway, with all rides half price from 1:00 - 5:00 p.m.

There will be a nightly door prize given Tuesday thru Saturday by area merchants and banks.

Come out and visit this once-a-year event and enjoy all of the festive activities offered by the 1988 Tishomingo County Fair in Iuka.

Lowest State Unemployment Rate In Nine Years Recorded

The lowest unemployment rate for the month of August in nine years was announced Monday by Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director Linda Ross Aldy.

"There were 1,045,600 Mississippians working in August which is the largest number of people ever employed in the state in the month of August," Aldy said. This represents 16,800 more people working than in August, 1987.

The August unemployment rate of 7.8 percent was one-half percentage point lower than the July rate and 2.1 percentage points lower than last year's August rate of 9.9 percent. The lowest prior August rate during the 1980's was in 1980 when the rate was 7.9 percent.

The slight increase in the

work force from July to August was due primarily to an increase in seasonal agriculture.

Manufacturing establishments provided 234,100 jobs, up seasonally 700 from July; this number was 4,000 above August, 1987.

Nonmanufacturing provided 641,100 which was 2,300 less this month than last month but 13,400 more than last August. Most of the decrease in nonmanufacturing was seasonal in industries involved in delivering summer youth services.

The economy continued to show steady improvement even though there were seasonal decreases in non-manufacturing and agriculture. The state's economy should continue to expand over the next month with seasonal layoffs in

education and service industries ending. The unemployment rate should show a good seasonal decline during the month of September since usual seasonal increases

in educational and agriculture occur. Mississippi's unemployment rate has recorded one of the best improvements of any of the states during this year.

County Eligible For USDA Drought Loan

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng today named the entire state of Mississippi eligible for Farmers Home Administration emergency loans because of crop losses due to drought from April 1, 1988, through August 23, and continuing.

Farmers in all 82 counties have eight months in which to apply for the loans to help

cover part of their actual losses. To be eligible, they must be able to repay the loan and any other loans, be unable to get credit elsewhere, and have adequate security.

With this designation, 1,442 counties in 21 states, including 17 entire states, are now eligible for FmHA emergency loans because of the 1988 drought.

attention to the safety and health problems of those engaged in full or part-time farming and to suggest practical ways to help control these problems. If you would like more information on how to prevent farm accidents, call your County Cooperative Extension Service at 423-3616.

Timberline

When working with landowners, we often stress the importance of growing the proper species of trees on the proper sites. We especially emphasize that upland sites should be converted from low-quality hardwood to pine. On these sites, pines generally grow well and tend to be worth more than lower-quality hardwoods.

People are often justifiably concerned about the effect this stand conversion will have on wildlife, especially the gray squirrel. We at the Forestry Commission like squirrels and other animals as well as anyone, and we are not about to make management recommendations that make them an endangered species.

We recommend converting upland sites to pine. By this I mean the upper slopes and tops of ridges and hills. Stream bottoms, and lower slopes will grow good-quality hardwood and can be very expensive to convert to pine. Hardwoods are generally the proper species for this type of site and are highly desirable for the gray squirrel as well as other wildlife.

By following a timber management plan landowners may increase their timber income and at the same time make the forest more attractive to a wider variety of wildlife. Some animals that do not make extensive use of open hardwood forests are attracted to the bushy conditions that exist in young pine plantations. Examples of these animals are cottontail rabbits, bobwhite quail, many songbirds, and to some extent, whitetailed deer.

Wildlife biologists tell us that many animals are attracted to the areas where the different types of stands meet. This area is called the "edge effect". The system of forest management described here will produce much of this edge effect.

One of the many things landowners may do to improve wildlife habitat is to establish supplemental

feeding areas or "food plots". Small open areas can be planted with vetch or lespedeza, and firelans, woods roads and utility rights of way can be planted with a green cover crop such as wheat, oats, or fescue. This will help control erosion and also improve the effectiveness for fire control as well as supply food for animals.

Another useful technique to encourage wildlife is to maintain natural food and den trees. This can be accomplished by leaving a few of the more active den trees while deadening hardwood trees to prepare the site for planting pine. Landowners should not leave too many den trees as the shade will stunt the growth of the pine seedlings. Two or three suitable den trees an acre are sufficient.

Probably the most important thing for wildlife is proper stand maintenance. Thinning pine stands followed by a correctly carried out prescribed burn will encourage the growth of grass and food-bearing shrubs. good timber management is often good wildlife management. It is possible to increase your timber income and make your woodland more attractive to wildlife. It just takes a little planning.

During the training, students received instruction in drill and ceremonies, weapons, map reading, tactics, military courtesy, military justice, first aid, and Army history and traditions.

Pervention Program

Law enforcements officers and youth court counselors in the northern half of Mississippi are needed to enroll in a statewide, federally funded drug abuse prevention training program.

The University of Southern Mississippi will offer its Drug Prevention Program in eight cities around the state beginning the fall, with registration required by September 26.

"The vision for this proposed program is to create and maintain a network of law enforcement and youth court officials, parents and community leaders who have a cooperative partnership in communicating a consistent message in their communities that the use of illegal drugs and alcohol is no acceptable behavior, and to provide appropriate... alternatives for a drug-free community," said Dr. Joanne Stevens, project director.

Training in northern Mississippi will begin October 10 in Greenville, October 11 in Grenada, October 11 in Grenada, Oc-

ttober 12 in Senatobia and October 13 in Tupelo. Training for central Mississippi begins in Jackson October 6. Five training sessions are scheduled monthly at each training site through February.

"The southern region of the state, with its 45 counties already has its full complement of trainees for each of the four sites in that region," said Dr. Francis Zipp, the project's co-director. "However, there are still

opening in 37 northern ties." The U.S. Department of Education funded program with a \$2 grant. Project director to involve some 320 youth court statewide -- plus school administrators, teachers and agencies.

DETAILS Suspenders, reptile buckles and belts, tortoise belts and buttons, lace pocket squares, silk closures, black embroidery, lace collars, rhinestone buttons, stretch belts, 2" and 3" cinch belts, neck bows, cuff links, black pipings, bindings, and soutaches, velvet trims, tassels, military ribbons, fur trims, logos, silk flowers, black hose, cameos, shoes with straps, flat lace-up

shoes.

SPICED PEARS (about 4 pint jars)

3½ pounds medium-ripe pears (14 to 16)
2½ cups granulated sugar
1¼ cups white vinegar
1 cup water

Tie in a spice bag: 2 teaspoons whole ginger 2 tablespoons whole cloves 7 sticks cinnamon (3-inch pieces)
Wash, peel, and core pears. Place immediately in a solution of ½ teaspoon ascorbic acid and 2 quarts of water to prevent browning. Combine sugar, vinegar, and 1 cup water; bring to a boil. Add spices tied in a cheesecloth bag. Boil 5 minutes. Drain pears and add to syrup. Simmer 5 minutes or until soft but still firm. Remove spice bag.

Pack pears into hot jars, leaving ½-inch head space. Fill jar to ½-inch of top with boiling hot syrup. Remove air bubbles. Wipe jar rims. Process 15 minutes in a boiling water bath.

NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK

President Reagan has proclaimed September 18-24, 1988, as National Farm Safety Week, the 45th consecutive observance. Agriculture ranks among the top industries in number of accidental deaths and injuries per 100,000 workers.

Agricultural work accidents resulted in 1,600 deaths and 160,000 disabling injuries in 1987 according to estimates by the National Safety Council. Many farm residents were also disabled or killed in home, roadway and recreational accidents. Other farmers and farm workers suffered work-related illnesses, often caused by exposure to sun, dust, noise, toxic gases and chemicals, that are known to result in disability and sometimes premature death. Although the 1987 agricultural death rate dropped 6 percent from 1986, farming remains among the nation's most hazardous major industries.

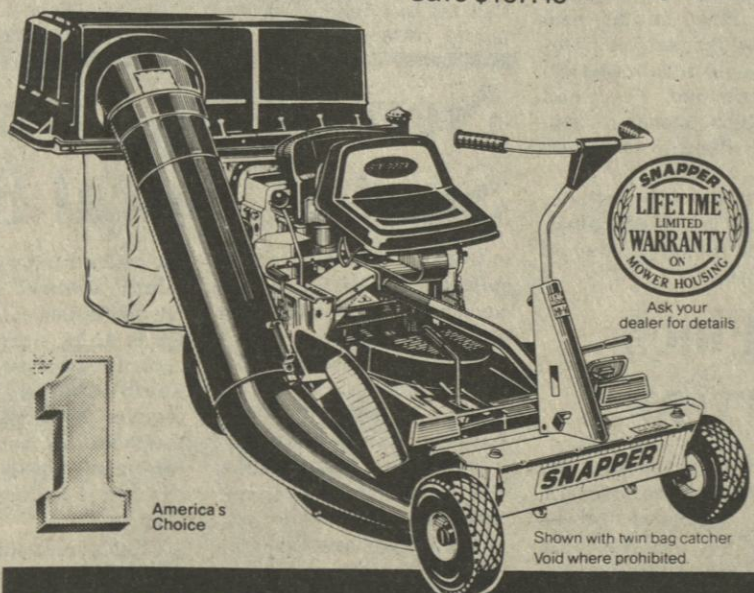

HOW WE SEE

After centuries of wonder about how we are able to see, science has come up with the answers. It also has answers for people who need help in seeing clearly.

What happens when we see? It all depends on light (even a cat can't see when it's pitch black). Every object exposed to light emits light rays. These rays travel from the object to our eyes. They enter through the cornea, the transparent membrane in the center of the eye. The cornea bends the rays slightly inward on the way to the lens, which narrows them even more.

In normal eyes, the rays converge together in sharp focus when they

reach the retina. This is the "back wall" of the eye that transmits the image to the brain.

What kind of image the brain receives depends on how sharp the picture is. If it isn't in focus, it will be blurry. And that means the eye needs corrective glasses. Difficulty in focusing on objects at a distance (like up close (like the newspaper) are common. These are some of the problems corrective glasses can solve.

ASCS Farm News

The "O/92" provisions are available for the 1989 wheat and feed grain programs. Some producers are debating whether or not to plant winter wheat because of the dry soil conditions. This reminder may assist them in making this management decision.

The "O/92" provisions gives wheat and feed grain producers the option to devote all or a portion of their permitted acreage to conserving uses and receive deficiency payments on the acreage. The maximum acres for deficiency paymen-

ts under this provision is 92 percent of the permitted acreage.

The signup dates and the projected deficiency rates for the 1989 wheat and feed grain crops have not been announced. However, the "O/92" provisions will be available for these crops.

ORNAMENTALS

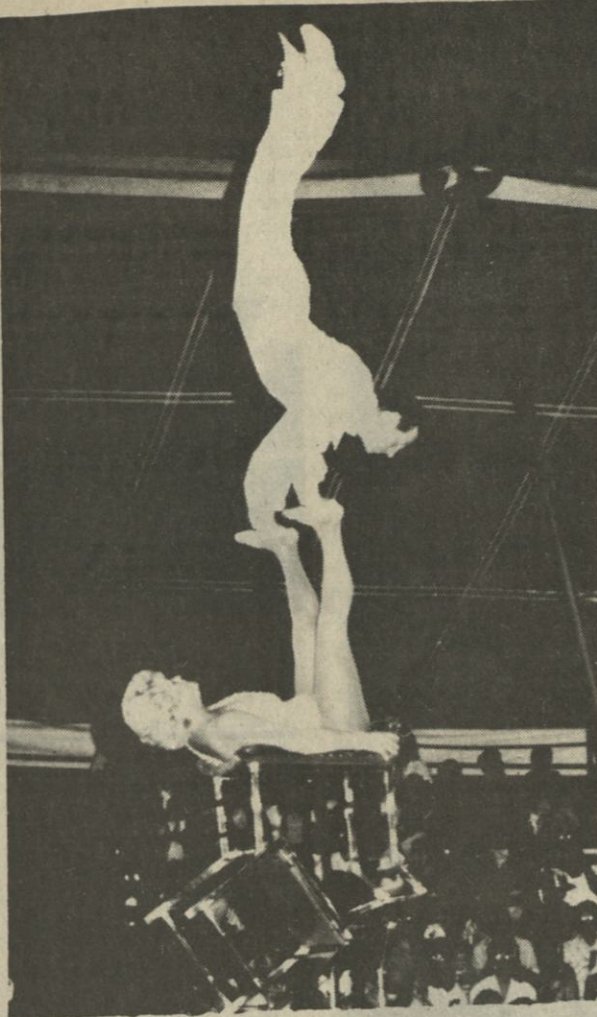
Aphids, lace bugs and whiteflies are still feeding on our ornamentals in Tishomingo County, judging by the number of telephone calls I have received. All three of these pests suck plant sap, causing considerable damage.

Use orthene, malathion, diazinon or cygon for control. Remember that thorough coverage is essential.

CHEMICAL SPILLS

Many truckloads of agricultural chemicals travel our Tishomingo County roads almost every day of the year. Some of these chemicals are solids or gases; others are liquids or dusts.

Accidents do happen, and sometimes these chemicals are spilled during the traffic

mishap. If you come upon a chemical spill, and you don't know what the chemical is, always assume it is hazardous.

Do not let your vehicle ride over the spill. Don't eat or smoke near the spill and don't allow anyone else to do so. Don't walk in a spilled chemical. Avoid contamination to your skin, shoes and clothing.

Rope off the area near the spill, if possible. Evacuate the surrounding and downwind areas if the spilled substance is gas, dust or volatile liquid.

NEMCC Has Record Enrollment

Dogs To Be Impounded

The 1988-89 hunting policy for Bay Springs Lake will remain the same as the 1987-88 policy. Hunting will be limited to waterfowl only. The lands between Highway 4 and 30 will remain closed to hunting to protect the deer and turkey which were stocked by the Mississippi Department of Wildlife Conservation in 1984-85. In the past, incidents have occurred where dogs that were released on Corps of Engineers property, would run deer onto private property where the deer were shot. In an effort to curb this type of activity, Corps personnel will impound any stray dogs and transport them to the nearest animal shelter. It will be up to the owner of the dog to ascertain if his or her dog has been taken to the pound. The best way to keep your dog from being impounded is to keep him from running free on Government lands. Hopefully, this will allow the deer population to increase to such an extent that they will expand into the surrounding lands.

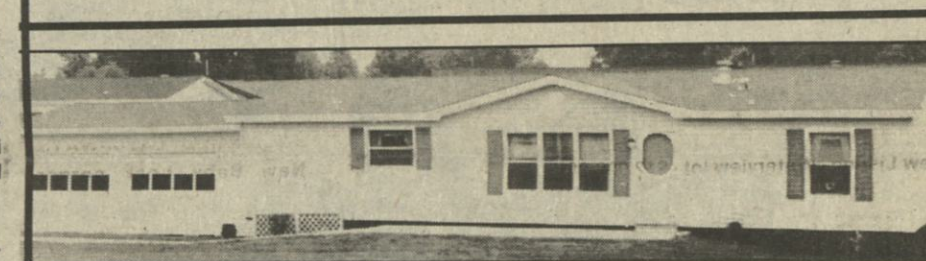

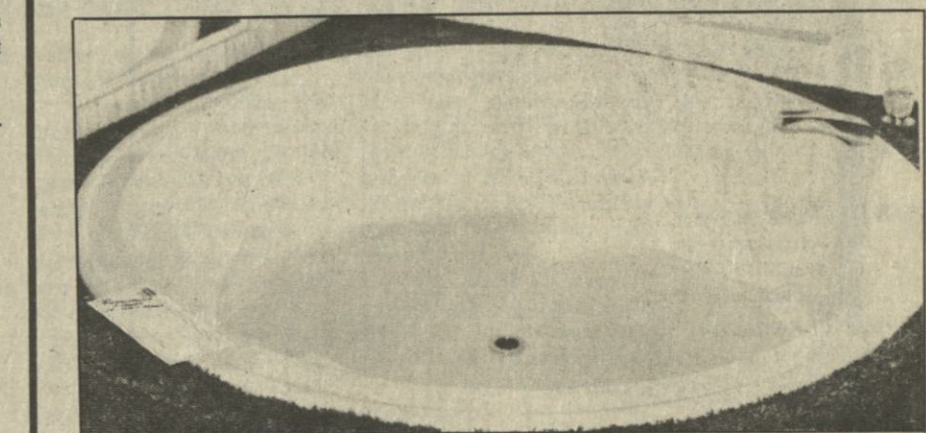
