Raid Uncovers Illegal Bingo Game

gambling cards found at the Sunday night raid of an illegal gaming operation that took place at Funland Skate Center, south of luka on Highway

25. The Crown Royale and Lottery type tickets were only a part of the items seized. Four pick-up loads of machines, boards, video were confiscated by law officials, according to a

skating rink located south of luka recently where apparent illegal gaming activities were being conducted by Tennessee and Alabama promoters, yeilding several thousand dollars weekly.

Authorities arrested eight persons during the raid conducted Sunday, September 25 including seven who were said to be organizers of the operation and the owner of the rink, Harold W. Enlow, who leased the building and was arrested for interferring with seizure, stated officials. No participants of the games were arrested, although it is a criminal offense.

The operation, carried on ners. from Funland Skate Center, located on Highway 25 S., went by the title L.E.T.S. Bingo and drew crowds amounting to 600 to 800 people. Most of the participants were brought to the games by bus or van from the surrounding Alabama and Tennessee areas, said repor-

More than just Bingo was being played during the Sun-

Tishomingo County Sheriff Richard Dobbs who revealed the numerous "pull-tab" cards that were found strewn after the raid.

Monday was spent sorting through garbage cans full of "pull-tab" cards by Tishomingo County officials. These lottery type cards, which sold for \$1.00 or \$2.00, consisted of games such as Crowne Royale (a poker type game) and Black Jack or 21. The cards were represented as possibly being worth up to as much as \$1,000 each however, in sorting through the opened stubs, lawmen found only a few \$1.00 win-

"Almost \$17,000 was confiscated in cash and checks by lawmen Sunday night, during the raid," stated County Attorney Richard Bowen. Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Investigator Jim Wall and a Sheriff's Deputy participated in the raid as undercover agents. Sources revealed that tip led to the investigation of the bingo

that had apparently been distributed by use of mailing lists and other means, were sent to out-of-town residents advertising the L.E.T.S. Bingo. "The people participating were led to believe that the games were on the up-and-up," said Bowen. L.E.T.S., which is said to stand for Lincoln Employment Training Shop, was claiming to be using its proceeds to benefit a nonprofit organization aiding

It was stressed by both Bowen and Dobbs that bingo is legal in Mississippi if all of the proceeds are going to a non-profit charity or a religious

operation was not found to be non-profit by authorities. Bowen roughly estimated that only 25% of the profits were being returned in prize awards, based on the information given on the flyers as to cash paved in each game.

The flyers also stated that to enter the establishment, you must be a player. A \$20.00 book of bingo card

sheets had to be purchased at the door, reports said.

Gambling devices seized during the raid included random number pick, machines, bingo number display boards, video monitors, numerous pull-tab cards and bingo card booklets.

Suspects arrested during the raid of the operation Sunday were all released on \$1,000 bond and included Thomas E. Wisher, 45, and his wife Reba Wiser, 50 Route 1, Fayetteville, TN; Robert S. Storey, 60, Main St., Elkton, TN; Stoney R. Green, 25, Route 1, Ardmore, TN; Brian Walden, 20, Route 6, Fayetteville, TN; Rufus Rutledge, 59, 145 Smith Dr., Harvest, AL; and Leslie L. Barnes, 19, Route 1, Ardmore, TN.

Harold W. Enlow owner of the building was also released on \$1,000 bond.

Meeks has been held without bail since his arrest on August 9. Officials said Meeks faces possible grand jury charges for kidnapping his wife.

men entered guilty pleas Monday, September 26 during Tishomingo Circuit Court to two counts each of kidnapping. The two men had been charged with capital rape and kidnapping, and had been held without bond since the August 30, 1987 offense.

were accused of abducting two girls, a 13 year old and her 14 year old friend near downtown luka. According to law enforcement officials, the girls were forced at gunpoint into a vehicle, the 14 year old girl later jumped from the car. It was reported that the 49 year old Tishomingo County man forcibly raped the younger

girl, then the girl was driven

back to her home. The 49 year old who was accused of the actual rape was sentenced to two 10-year terms, six years suspended. The other man faced the same charge because of his involvement. He was sentenced to two 10-year terms, with four years suspended pen-

ding good behavior. Officials said that the 49 year old Tishomingo man was on parole from Tennessee on an attempted rape charge when this offense occurred. When he is released in Mississippi, he faces serving out the remainder of the time on the Tennessee charge.



Many mills in the state have also increased their inventory quotas for pine pulpwood and hardwood pulpwood. Pine pulpwood prices have ranged from \$30/cord to \$39/cord. Hardwood pulpwood prices have ranged from \$25/cord to \$35/cord.

Timberline

Our forests of today provide raw wood for our factories, recreation, watershed protection, wildlife habitat and wilderness. People like yours truly work with the forest, and are often able to enhance production of these

This is important to know, since a lot of Mississippians own individual tracts of woodlands; many have shared in companies that manage forests, and we all agencies.

We members of the forestry profession try to help all the different types of landowners to obtain the benefits they want from the forest, but forests do have limits to the amount of benefits we can derive from them without adverse effects.

Originating, growing, and tending stands of trees is called silviculture (silva is the Latin word for forest). Without exaggeration, silviculture is the heartbeat of

Silviculture is essential when we humans want to manage the forests -- to accelerate the production of wildlife, timber, forage or to

increase recreation and watershed values. On almost any land, whether treecovered, or bare, nature will practice her own silviculture

She may take hundreds or thousands of years to do it. though, and she will do it without consulting us as to our preferences. Whether we like to admit it or not, we of ten become impatient with nature's way. silviculture must be prac-

But even as we use our own the public lands tried and true silvicultural managed by government practices we must still work within the natural conditions imposed by a tree species and by the required environment

The great number of tree species found in Mississippi -· multiplied by all the possible growing conditions and all the stand histories -- yields an infinite variety of forest scenes or situations.

We have to think in terms of forest types. For example, in Mississippi we have the pine-hardwood type, the oakhickory type, and in many

cases the pure pine type. Even though dominant timber types, such as pinehardwoods, are used as names a forest is actually a community of hundreds of

News From Ochsner

Tobacco Kills over one thousand people a day in the United States----a figure that is equivalent to the number of human deaths that would result if two full-loaded jumbo jets were to collide head-on in mid-air everyday. Jim Troxler finds that statistic shocking and wants to tell young

people why. As the Cancer Control Coordinator for the Ochsner Cancer Institute, Troxler spends much of his time in schools throughout the New Orleans area, explaining to teenagers the hazards of smoking. Some listen. Others

ignore him. "Nationwide, over 4,000 people become new smokers everyday----85 percent are teenagers," says Troxler. "I think there's a strong need to get a message to the youngsters about the dangers of smoking and do it

now, because they are our

Troxler often quotes the words of the late Dr. Alton Ochsner, Sr., who said: 'Tobacco is a loaded, often lethal weapon. Time pulls the trigger." Dr. Ochsner, one of the founders of the Ochsner Medical Institutions, was the first physician to connect cigarette smoking to lung

In a typical learning session, students are shown a pair of freeze-dried human lungs. One lung is clean and white, the other is coated with a dark and spotty substance that indicates someone who has been smoking for several years and has lung cancer.

"That scares them," he says. "These kids are raised with images of super heroes who are going to last forever. Suddenly, realize...maybe not."

Why are teens so susceptible to picking up the cigarette habit? That reasons vary by individual and may represent many influences from everyday living. One of the biggest influences is life

Seventy-five percent of the kids who start smoking come from families where one or both parents smoke." says Troxler, "Since the majority of learning cues come from parents, a child will see a parent smoke and automatically feel that it is okay, despite the warning."

Peer pressure is another influence that pursuades enagers to light up, says Troxler. "These kids take chances and will do just about everything to fit in. Smoking is just one of many patterns of behavior found in this age range.'

Advertising is probably the most visible of influences. "Each year, tobacco companies make nearly 30 billion dollars from the sale of cigarettes, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. To stay in business, a large number of new smokers must be created everyday." To accomplish this, cigarette producers create glossy, multi-million dollar advertising campaigns aimed at a of audiences. variety Although the campaigns are not allowed on TV or radio, they do find placement in newspapers, magazines, billboards and other media that teens are exposed to on

"The message is clear," says Troxler. "If you smoke cigarettes, you're cool, macho, independent and beautiful. These are images

Troxler's presentation to school groups is broken into two to three sessions. One session covers the adverse effects smoking has on the body. Another consists of a film or slide presentation. Audio visuals include medical graphs, tables and various advertising campaigns aimed at youngsters. The question and answer period, which concludes each lecture, quite often will reveal disturbing feedback from the students, says Troxler.

'Some students tell me they smoke a pack of cigarettes a day. One case in par-14-year-old teenager, has been smoking a pack a day for seven years!"

The nicotine in cigarettes is such a powerful drug, says Troxler, that a teen can develop a dependency for it within a short period of time. The number of cigarettes required to develop an addiction is not known, but once trapped, breaking the habit could be the biggest struggle a teen has ever faced: a struggle more intense than that experienced by the average adult.

'Adults are more aware of their own mortality," says Troxler. "You know that one day you will die. heavy breathing, troublesome coughs and generally feeling under the weather, all serve to motivate us to guit. The teenager, however, views dying as something that happens to the elderly.

In one recent session, a student asked, "why not ban tobacco altogether"? Troxler took a deep breath and recited the response he has given in lectures many times. "Tobacco has been with us ever since there has been a country. It's been a part of the fabric of this country, woven into everyday life. It's been accepted for so long that it's hard to turn off. The Revolutionary War was financed with tobacco money. In both world wars, soldiers were supplied cigarettes as an item of comfort. We didn't fully appreciate its dangers to society until the last several years. Now, it's time to do something before it's too late. Cigarettes kill. That message needs to get into the schools. Even if we've only discouraged a handful of kids from smoking, we've made our future a little brighter.

Unemployment **Declines In Tishomingo County**

According to figures just released by the Mississippi State Employment Service, the number unemployed in Tishomingo County declined at mid-August. Charles Smith, Manager of the Employment Service, stated that 9.7 percent of the civilian labor force was unemployed at mid-month, compared to 10.5 percent in July and 15.6 percent in August, 1987. This is the lowest rate in the county in several years.

A minimal decline in the number employed was experienced from last month with a rise of 410 noted from one year ago.

Manufacturing employment at 2,750 experienced a slight increase from last month with a large increase of 250 noted from one

Anyone who has any of these symptoms should have a complete medical and sleep evaluation. A physician may refer the patient or the patient may contact a sleep disorders center himself for an allnight study of his breathing patterns and heart rate during

If apnea is diagnosed, or if the snoring is serious enough n itself to warrant treatment, a variety of corrective measures can be taken. The doctor may prescribe medication to help keep the breathing passages open or recommend a specially designed breathing mask to wear over the nose while sleeping. By applying a little air pressure to the nose the mask will help keep the passageways in the throat

Sometimes there's an anatomical cause for excessive snoring. The muscles may be unable to keep the upper airways open, or the area where the back of the nose and mouth connect to the trachea (the pharnyx) may be abnormally small. Nasal deformities and enlarged tonsils or adenoids also may obstruct air flow and cause

snoring. If any of these conditions are present, surgery may be recommended.

Some tips to remember: Alcohol before bed should be avoided-it not only agravates snoring, but also has an exaggerated effect on someone with apnea. Sedative medications also may worsen apnea. Fore those who are overweight, getting more exercise and losing weight may improve apnea, the patient's overall health as well as his or her sleeping habits.

For denture wearers, sleeping with them in place

may help to prevent snoring. A humidifier also can help, since dry air contributes to this problem.
